### Aggressive driver crackdown nets 31 citations

Local law enforcement officers have been cracking down on aggressive drivers who travel Interstate 4 in Seminole County since Aug. 4 as part of the Aggressive Driving Deterrent — Combined Aerial Road Enforcement (A.D.D. C.A.R.E.) program. The program is a collaborative effort between the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, the Florida Highway Patrol and law enforcement municipalities located along the I-4 corridor in Seminole County. During the month of August, authorities performed aggressive driving enforcement operations on eight days. A total of 31 motorists were stopped and ticketed for aggressive driving.

According to Steve Olson, public information officer of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, aggressive driving can be defined by tailgating, improper lane changes (cutting off another driver), multiple lane changes or high rates of speed. In order to be considered aggressive, a driver must exhibit two or more of these driving patterns.

The operations will continue in September, and during the coming months. A.D.D. C.A.R.E. is intended to educate the public of the dangers of aggressive driving and to promote voluntary compliance towards safer driving.

## Gaming facility has no city license

**SANFORD** — An adult gaming facility planned for downtown is not licensed to operate in the city and won't be for at least 90 days following city commissioners approval of a moratorium on such licenses.

The moratorium, enacted during a special meeting late Friday afternoon, will give the city time to review ordinances regarding indoor amusement facilities and make possible changes. In addition, City Manager Al Grieshaber promised to revamp the

city's licensing applications to provide more information about the nature of all businesses that operate in the city.

"The city of Sanford doesn't have adequate safeguards in place to determine the appropriateness" of businesses that want to operate within the city limits, Grieshaber said, especially those that plan to operate under game room/arcade/dance hall/indoor amusement category.

Grieshaber's call for a moratorium followed a published report in the Seminole Herald that a gaming operation planned to open at 207 Magnolia Ave., next door to the Helen Stairs Theatre. Rosemarie Hall, one of four partners in the business, said patrons of Joker's Palace would put money into one of 50 video gaming machines in hopes of winning tickets which could be redeemed for trips, merchan-

dise and gift cards at stores like Wal-Mart and Albertson's.

According to Hall, the businesses are legal under what she referred to as the "S&H Green Stamp Redemption" law, and cited Florida Statute 849-161 as the governing rule. There are about 30 such businesses in Florida, including five in Volusia County.

On Tuesday, Hall vowed Joker's Palace would open for business Friday morning, providing free food and drinks, including beer, to patrons.

However, there is no application for

## Searching for a way

**Seminole Fire Department Chief asks county to consider \$3 million industrial complex for a new training facility**



Proposed location could serve all city fire departments

At a price tag of about \$3 million, the Seminole County Fire Department is asking county commissioners to give them something that just about every other Central Florida public safety department has: a place to train.

"It's been a long standing goal of the fire department to have an emergency training center for Seminole County," said Fire Chief Terry Schenk Tuesday to commissioners.

Beginning its 30th year of service, the county fire department is the second largest in Central Florida after recently taking over the Altamonte Springs

department, but it often travels to Daytona Beach, Lake County or Tampa to train. Occasionally, fire officials are able to procure an agreement with an owner of a defunct building such as a year ago when fire fighters used the old Florida Power and Light building next to Sanford City Hall.

Located centrally in the county at 201 Valentine Way — near the county's environmental center on State Road 419 — the proposed training complex is an existing 19-acre industrial site.

"One of the greatest things about this facility would be the multiple uses," said Lt. Mike Hammond, in charge

of training county fire fighters.

According to Hammond, a variety of disciplines could be taught at the site, including search and rescue, fire fighting, vehicle extraction and emergency medical training.

With recent events such as the Sanford city worker being trapped in a hole, a 300-foot rescue at a Florida Power smokestack in Volusia County and a teetering vehicle on the Interstate 4 bridge above State Road 46, "we have recognized there is a need to be prepared for any and all kinds of emergencies," said Hammond.

Taking a property off the

## Blood trail leads police to determined burglar

William David Warren of Sanford was arrested by Sanford police early Friday morning on 12 counts of vehicle burglary.

At approximately 6 a.m. Friday, Sanford police officers were dispatched to the Hidden Lakes subdivision in Sanford after witnesses saw a suspicious man lurking in the neighborhood.

According to witnesses, the white male, later identified as 32-year-old Warren of Palm Place in Sanford, was wearing blue jean shorts with no shirt and was walking through the neighborhood. At about the same time, an officer patrolling the area heard the rattle of a chain link fence. The officer conducted a search of the area with negative results.

Minutes later, another officer conducted a traffic stop on a silver Cadillac driving on Lake Side

Circle inside the Hidden Lakes subdivision. The car was occupied by three individuals, later identified as Jason R. Hendricks, Shannon L. Cardwell and Warren.

Hendricks and Cardwell were questioned and released. Warren, who matched the description given by witnesses, was taken into custody.

"He was bleeding when we found him," said Cleo Cohen, public information officer of the Sanford Police Department. "His shorts were covered in blood and he had several lacerations on his arms, legs and hands. There was also blood found in 12 of the vehicles that

## Lake Mary sees upside to revitalizing downtown

In a 4-1 vote, city commissioners passed a proposal Aug. 21 that will revitalize Lake Mary's downtown district.

For more than a decade, city officials have discussed the possibility of developing the area that surrounds Lake Mary's city hall.

The goal of the current project is to encourage growth in the town's center, maintain and enhance property values and unify the old and new section of the city with a geographic center. The stair-step shaped core district is approximately 40 acres and includes retail, commercial and residential zoning.

Along with retail and residential areas that include upscale townhouses and condominiums, city planners have proposed various amenities for the district such as a band shell near the city's community building, numerous parks and green areas, and a large interactive fountain for children.

The goal is to bring pedestrian traffic to the area. In order to increase the chances of this, commissioners direct-

ed city staff to require 8-foot sidewalks and, whenever possible increase the width 10 feet.

"The smaller we make sidewalks the more we are discouraging pedestrian traffic," said Commissioner Michael J. McLean.

However, before reaching this decision, commissioners waffled on the sidewalk issue, as well as the front yard setback, both of which are directly related to the city's rights-of-way and location of buildings.

Commissioner Gary L. Brender was concerned that the setback would be wasted space that could be more wisely used.

Staff held fast that the space would be useful in making the area more pleasing to view and could be used by the merchant as an outdoor cafe or area to rest.

"The setback would create an open pedestrian area with greenery," said John Omana, community development director. "It would promote a more open, airy type corridor."

In order to prepare for the revitalization project, city officials passed an ordinance

29 JUN 03 I'm sorry I missed a few days writing. I was Sgt. of the Guard yesterday and all was fine until 1300 hours. I began having tremendous pains in my bladder and midsection. Then it got worse so I saw our medic, "Doc" Sutton, who gave me a pill to help clear

up what he thought was an infection.

I took the pill and then later was in severe pain and started cramping up. Then I stopped sweating and was in severe pain like you cannot begin to imagine. I went over, almost crawling, to the Aid Station and they gave me two IV's with antibiotics and flu-

ids in them, but I was still doubled-up with severe pain like being kicked in the gut over and over again and it didn't subside. The doctor said it might be a kidney stone resting on top of my bladder causing me to feel like I had to go real bad, but they couldn't

**FSA announces County Committee elections**

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is announcing the upcoming County Committee elections. The locally elected County Committee assists FSA in administering federal farm programs in Volusia and Seminole counties. The committee consists of three members, each representing a region within the Volusia-Seminole area. This year, the seat representing Seminole County agriculture is up for election.

The FSA would like to encourage farmers and ranchers, especially minorities and females, to consider becoming a nominee on the ballot. Nominations will be accepted until Sept. 5. The ballots will be mailed to eligible voters on Nov. 18, and the deadline for returning completed ballots to FSA is Dec. 1.

Eligibility for nominees is as follows: Must be of legal voting age and have an interest in a farm or ranch as either an owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper; or a partner of a general partnership or member of a joint venture that has an interest in a farm as owner, tenant or sharecropper.

The County Committee meets about once per month. Members are compensated for their time and travel. Elected members of the County Committee are an integral part of administering programs such as direct and counter cycle payments, disaster relief, non-insurable assistance program and loan programs. This committee represents the local agriculture community, and their knowledge of local crops and farming practices is invaluable in implementing the federal programs in Volusia and Seminole counties.

It didn't last long. Blame it on the casino that almost opened in downtown.

**Joker's Palace** is yet another example of how Sanford does business. Here is a business proposing to give away free beer to patrons who want to gamble from until 1 a.m. Not that that's a bad business if you're into that kind of thing, but some of the city's boards have tried to run people out of town for less (like putting up vinyl fences).

True, the owners of Joker's Palace hadn't formally applied for a business license, but City Hall officials knew something was in the works. For instance, they knew the owners wanted to operate an arcade and stay open until 1 a.m. They had even nixed the 1 a.m. closing, saying the business could not operate after 11 p.m. With that limited information, a whole host of questions should have been raised. They weren't.

So here's my tip, Colonel: Send everyone in city hall that deals with approving permits — zoning, building, business, etc. — to a basic journalism class. You know, who, what, where, when, why and how. Your idea about updating the applications to require more information is a good one, but ultimately your people have to dig a little deeper than reading a piece of paper. Of course, now that I've given the Colonel a tip about how he should do his job, I suspect he'll want to return the favor. No problem there. I get that kind of advice all the time, and occasionally some of it sinks in through my thick skull. Besides, a wise old editor once told me, there are three things everybody is an expert at: how to run the local paper, how to coach the football team and how long Sunday morning's sermon should be. No doubt the Colonel would add city manager to that list.

**Pub crawl:** February saw two new watering holes open up downtown: **Red Room Lounge and Rhythm & Brews.** Both are chugging along drawing new people into downtown after dark.

**Word Around The Clock** is a new establishment, perhaps called **The Local**, will open up in October just south of the Red Room. Not a lot of details yet, but word is **The Local** will offer a wide selection of brews, including some high-end drafts beers, and the usual pub games of darts and billiards.

I'll have more details as the come available.

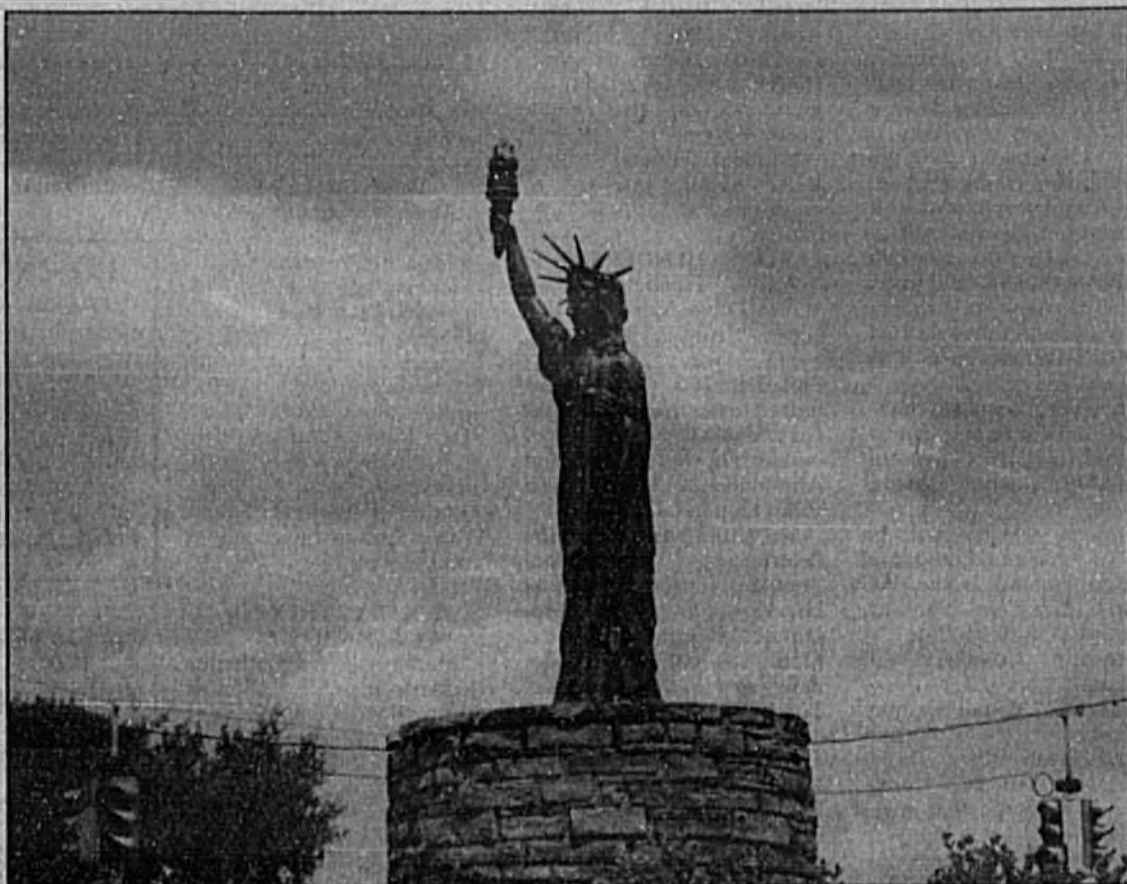

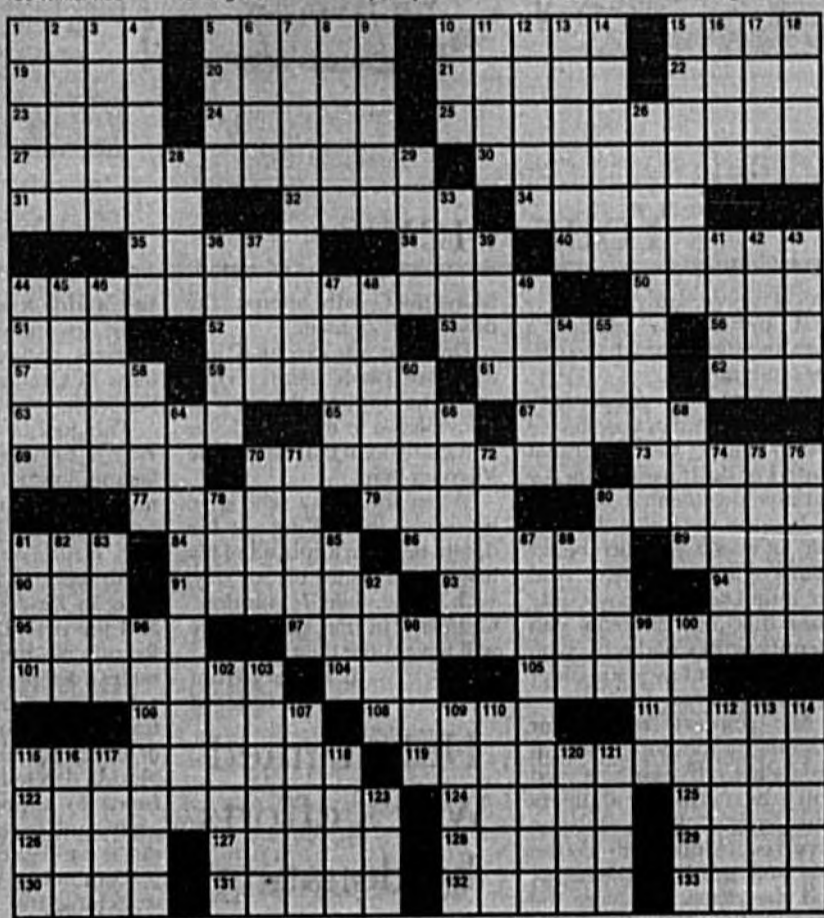

# The Way We Were: Mystery man in photograph revealed

Soon after the picture of the Pig 'n Whistle was published, I received information about the man who is standing in front. I recently came across my notes which I had misplaced.

Clarence Page called and told me that he was the "car hop" pictured. From what I recall from our conversation, he was one of the first workers at the Pig. He also remembered that Paul Davidson worked as a

walter in the dining room and another worker was LeRoy Hickson. The cook and a few others came from the first Pig 'n Whistle in Macon, Ga., to help get the Sanford restaurant started, and then they went back. Billy Robinson later told me that the man behind the counter was Paul Daniels.

Page went to Brunswick to help open a Pig 'n Whistle there and was drafted soon afterward into the Army. When he got out of the service, he came back to Sanford where he worked at Gregory Lumber Company and later in the maintenance department of the Seminole County School Board.

The picture of the Pig will be in the Sanford Historical Society's 2004 calendar which will be available in September.

**Pictorial history available**  
The Sanford Historical Society is announcing the arrival of its pictorial history of Sanford, published by Arcadia Publishing Company. This book is completely different from *The Seminole Herald's* "Sanford Our First 125 Years" so don't confuse them. It was not intended for the two

books to come out so close together.

The historical society's book gives a pictorial history beginning with the Timacuan Indians and Mellonville. There are photographs of General Sanford and other early settlers, our city in the 1800s, the celery and citrus industries, early businesses, churches and a myriad of other images depicting our history. The majority of the 200 pictures are from the Sanford Museum owned Vincent Collection. Included will be more recent views such as the Municipal Zoo, Municipal Pool, the Pig 'n Whistle and the Vigilante. Several of the pictures will be familiar, but there are many, many that have never been published before. There are detailed captions with each picture.

These books are available at the Sanford Museum, 520 E. First St. The cost is \$21 which includes tax, or it is available by mail for \$25. Museum hours are Tuesday-Friday 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturday 1 to 4 p.m.

According to the general belief, on Tuesday, Sept. 5, 1882, members of the Carpenters and Joiners Union, led by their secretary, Peter J. McGuire, paraded down a street in downtown New York City to call attention to unionized workers.

Eventually, as the parades continued year after year, other unions joined in, parading in New York and other cities. By 1893, more than half of the states were observing "Labor Day" on one day or another.

Finally, a bill establishing the first Monday in September as Labor Day was introduced to Congress, and President Grover Cleveland signed the measure into law on June 28, 1894. As a legal holiday, it became a day off work for all government employees. Canada soon joined in, also observing Labor Day as the first Monday in September.

Other countries, (I have no idea which ones) observe Labor Day on May 1 for some reason.

## Family still seeking the highest bidder

"If I have any weaknesses, they are not in the area of cooing wealth. ... I believe as sincerely as anything that the struggle for freedom is not one that should reward any participant with individual wealth." — Martin Luther King Jr., *Playboy magazine*, 1960

In the late 1980s, Coretta Scott King sued Boston University over possession of some of the papers that had belonged to her late husband.

Back then, she was still revered as a keeper of the flame. She had not yet relinquished that role to become a mere merchant of the dream.

So, when she took the university to court (her challenge was ultimately unsuccessful), many civil rights leaders supported her. Not that it mattered much, but so did I. While the university had legal title to the papers, which her husband Martin Luther King Jr. had donated to the school in 1964, Mrs. King had the greater moral claim. She said her husband had always wanted his papers housed at a Southern educational or civil rights institution.

But that was then. These days, it's increasingly difficult to remember that the King family was once held in such high esteem. They are mostly known now for their relentless profiteering — putting a price tag on King's words, suing writers and film producers who dare quote him without paying, and blocking public efforts to commemorate King if they don't add cash to the family's pockets.

A few years ago, the family made multimillion-dollar deals with Alcatel, a French telecommunications company, and Cingular, an American telecom group, selling them permission to use portions of the "I Have a Dream" speech in commercials. They turned Dr. King into cell phone slack.

The heirs have succeeded in converted King's legacy into a profit center — I Have a Dream Inc. So it comes as no surprise that — even as the

nation observes the 40th anniversary of the triumphant "I Have a Dream" speech — King's heirs are attempting to sell a collection of his papers to the highest bidder. For the second time since 1999, the King family is trying to get at least \$20 million for precious documents left by their father — among them a typewritten early draft of the "I Have a Dream" speech, notepaper on which he scribbled his Nobel Prize acceptance speech, and a diary he kept while in jail in 1962.

The family came close to a deal to sell the same collection (a separate cache of documents than those at Boston University) to the Library of Congress four years ago. While the \$20 million cost was controversial, Congress was on the verge of appropriating the money, according to U.S. Rep. John Lewis, D-Ga. But the deal fell apart because the family insisted on retaining copyrights, he said.

Lewis, who believes the papers belong in the public domain, said he will again try to persuade his colleagues to purchase the collection for the Library of Congress. That will be difficult, however, in an era of multibillion-dollar deficits.

In years past, the King heirs have attempted to justify their greed by claiming that money they received from their father's legacy would be used to further his work. Would that it were so.

While Mrs. King spent years raising funds to build the private, non-profit King Center for Non-Violent Social Change near downtown Atlanta, the complex has fallen into disrepair. Run by her second son, Dexter, the center keeps a skeletal staff; it offers few ongoing programs; it houses only a handful of artifacts. By contrast, the King National Historic Site, King Visitor's Center, run by the National Park Service across the street from the King Center, offers frequent exhibits and programs.

In selling the papers, "I'm trying to live up to my father's wishes," Dexter King said on Wednesday.

But it is difficult to see how commercializing his memory figures into his father's dream.

### Iraqi Diary an assignment in civics class

To the editor: I have the *Herald* sent to me during the six months I spend in North Carolina in order to keep up with local events, deaths and so on. But this year — what an extra bonus!

The first thing I read is the Iraqi Diary, and I wait anxiously for the paper. (Delivery of which, by the way, is extreme erratic. I haven't gotten quite a few issues and they're often very late; I just got the one with the July Fourth info last week. And they tend to come in clumps — some days I'll get three or four, two weeks' worth. I understand you can't do anything about this, but you might like to know for the next time you're arguing with the post office.)

I teach American Government in a community college here in the fall and at Seminole Community College, Oviedo Campus, in the spring. One of my most difficult tasks is to persuade students that political involvement is worthwhile and not a totally boring waste of time.

This Year, Charlie (Carlson) III's diary will help me make the point. I require my students to keep a journal, summarizing and reacting to (primarily) newspaper clippings. I hand out one and they come up with one on their own each week. Wednesday's episode (Aug. 20) of Iraqi Diary is going to be the next journal handout.

What could possibly prove the necessity for critical thinking about political issues better than Charlie's phrase, "I'm firmly convinced that you can start a war without good reason if you have a good promotion campaign."

It's not very often that students have an opportunity to learn from contemporary primary sources — that is, to learn from the direct observation of an important event by someone who is actually there.

Most of our information about what's going on in the

world is necessarily filtered — first, through the reporter's eyes and then through the editor's judgment.

Teachers try to use primary sources as often as possible — for example, the Federalist Papers or documents from the various presidential libraries — because they give the "flavor" of events so much better than a re-telling in a text. And the Iraqi Diary series not only does this, but students can identify with Charlie III, who can only be a few years older than themselves.

My primary reason for teaching is the hope that I'm producing active citizens who will be critical thinkers and who will become involved. Motivation is the first and principle challenge, and the *Herald* will help me produce that, 600 miles away. Thank you.

### MLK's dream is the answer to Iraqi 'evil'

To the editor: As I reflect on the 40th anniversary of the 1963 March on Washington for jobs and freedom, I'm drawn to the "I Have a Dream" speech of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. I was there that day, and in 1983 helped organize a delegation from Philadelphia to Washington for the 20th anniversary celebration.

But, my interest in Dr. King and these events extend far beyond the "Dream," as inspiring as that was. From a new, young minister in Montgomery, Ala., in 1955, to his assassination in 1968, Dr. King grew in spirit and in practice to be the leader of a movement dedicated to a method for achieving the dream: the way of nonviolence.

Under influences such as those of Dr. Howard Thurman, Boston University theology professor (from Daytona Beach) and Bayard Rustin, of the Fellowship of Reconciliation, Dr. King saw the necessity to examine the means to a good end. The teachings of Jesus Christ and

Mahatma Gandhi offered "the other way" of love.

Dr. King was executed, just as those predecessors were, when he applied the way of nonviolence to the great killer of the dream of that day — the Vietnam War.

When the many who give lip service to Dr. King and his dream begin to apply all of his insights to issues of our day, such as the violent "solution" to the evil in Iraq, perhaps we will have more than a dream.

a business license for Joker's Palace on file with the city. Hall has contacted city officials and provided some written information but not a formal application.

were burglarized."

According to Cohen, it appears Hendricks and Cardwell's involvement began when they received a phone call, which was made by Warren using a stolen cellphone. Warren asked the two to come pick him up and take him to the hospital saying he had been stabbed.

When officers conducted a search of the Cadillac, a checkbook belonging to Shawn Perkins of Lake Side Circle was found. Perkins' vehicle had been broken into and he had reported the checkbook, credit cards and a driver's license stolen.

During a search of the Hidden Lakes neighborhood, police found several duffel bags full of stolen items, including cellphones, checkbooks, toolboxes, car stereos,

Grieshaber admitted that Hall and her partners may perceive their business to be a target rather than catalyst, but he said the primary issue is to establish criteria and standards for a whole category of businesses.

"We're not just aiming at one business or focusing on one area of the city," Grieshaber said. "We need some criteria, some standards about how these businesses operate within the city of Sanford."

Such standards could include distance requirements from certain facilities like bars, churches or schools, as well as restrictions on certain activities that occur on site.

Grieshaber also intends to establish standards and criteria for how the city reviews applications for

business licenses, primarily by revamping the current application.

"The application is devoid of any compliance acknowledgment that all state requirements have been met," Grieshaber said.

As an example, he noted that gaming machines must be registered with the state's department of revenue. The city's license application requires no proof a business is abiding by state laws that regulate its activity.

"It's incumbent on the city to get a statement of compliance," Grieshaber said.

The city manager also wants the application to indicate that any false or misleading information provided by businesses during the licensing process would result in revocation of the license.

boom boxes, cigarettes, sunglasses and other everyday items usually left in cars.

According to Cohen, many vehicles had no signs of forcible entry. In fact, the majority — if not all — of the vehicles were not locked. Officers speculate the one vehicle that may have been locked may have caused Warren's injuries.

"It's still burglary," Cohen said. "But, this should serve as a warning to people to lock and secure their cars. Also, remove all personal items. Thieves frequently look into car windows and may be able to see items that target them to steal the car or break into your car to obtain the property."

Warren was taken to Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford where he was treated and released with minor

injuries, including scratches to his arms, legs and hands.

According to officers, while being transported from the hospital to the Seminole County jail, Warren confessed to the burglaries, saying "I confess, I did them all, I did every last one of them."

Warren is currently being charged with 12 counts of vehicle burglary, but according to Cohen, this number could increase as the investigation continues.

According to police records, Warren had outstanding warrants for failure to appear in court for felony theft and driving with a suspended or revoked license.

Warren is being held without bond at the John E. Polk Correctional Facility in Sanford. He is scheduled for a first appearance today.

tax rolls was a contention for several county commissioners, but the money it could save the county could be well worth it.

Grants of \$200,000 for hazardous materials equipment and \$600,000 for urban search and rescue apparatus not to mention countless other firefighting equipment take up valuable storage space throughout the county.

"A new grant we have received will provide us with about \$250,000 worth of mass casualty medical response equipment," Schenk said.

By moving all this equipment to one location will free up more than 6,600 square feet of storage space. Saving the county about \$38,000 worth of space a year that could be available to other departments, Schenk added.

The new training facility would also eliminate the chance of an emergency happening when units are away training in a distant county. In addition, the Seminole-based facility would elimi-

nate unnecessary wear and tear put on emergency vehicles traveling to out-of-county training sites.

Operational costs of the building per year is about \$150,000 with an estimated \$100,000 coming from cities and \$50,000 from county.

"We anticipate to operate the way other counties operate theirs that is a user fee for other agencies that come in," Schenk said. "We've talked to the cities, and of course the fire chiefs are excited about this because they too have long needed a centralized training facility."

"I like the concept there, but I don't see a whole lot of concrete details. A lot of its possible grants and possible city donations," said Commissioner Grant Maloy.

With union contract negotiations ongoing, commissioners were hesitant to approve the county manager to authorize a contract to purchase the property. They, however, unanimously approved that a purchase contract be drafted, but said

they wanted more answers on liability and financial issues before they would sign the dotted line.

The county commission is expected to consider the contract for purchase of the training facility at its next meeting, Sept. 9.

If approved, the training facility would be a partnership with Seminole Community College. According to Dr. Dave Harrison, vice president of the college, SCC's fire and emergency medical training classes have doubled in enrollment since Sept. 11, 2001.

"This will provide us, with the county and other agencies, an opportunity to meet the demands," he said.

The college is set to fund \$900,000 for a burn building that wouldn't actually burn or set smoke into the air. But, it would be equipped with propane burners to emulate the high heat in a fire and would produce fake smoke that dissipates quickly.

revising amendments to the city's comprehensive plan in June. The changes set the maximum density for the proposed area at 18 and also revised the boundary for the core district.

The style for the downtown area will be geared toward a Mediterranean or

However, Commissioner George F. Duryea said, "I don't want to limit someone's creativity to Mediterranean. I don't think architects would want to be told what they can

and can't design."

According to Omana, the city's staff will review each proposed project on a case-by-case basis, walking the applicant through the process and explaining the opportunities the Mediterranean and Italian styles make available.

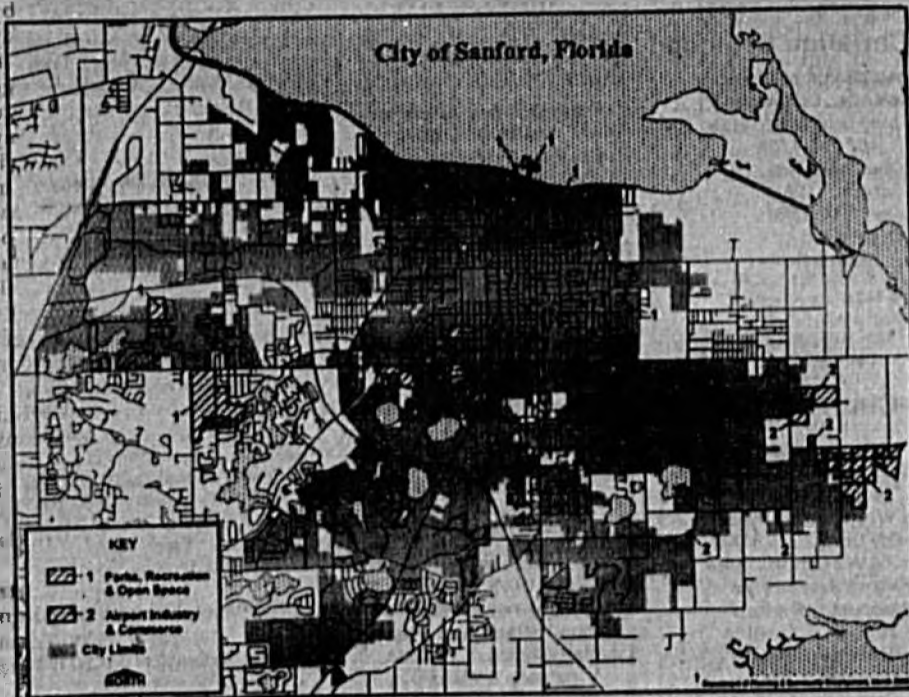

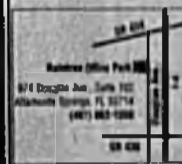

evac me because combat related casualties have priority. Then I got nauseated and threw up a couple of times. I still had my IV in but the bag was empty, so I took my IV out which was a bloody mess because I couldn't put the gauze on in time. I tell you I was in a world of hurt. I then went back to this hot greasy cigarette factory, and crawled onto my cot but the pain was unbearable every time I moved. I felt faint and the 110 degree heat was unbearable.

I got nauseated, but I had to try to move, hoping to lessen the pain. Using my rifle to steady myself, I went outside and just sat on the ground in the dirt doubled over almost delirious. I was so nauseated, never been so sick in my life. If we had been attacked, I think I would have just laid there and said shoot me. I stayed out there all night. There was a hot breeze blowing dust around.

Then about 0400 in the morning, I was 90 percent better but still a little weak from my ordeal. Now, I'm 100 percent better. Doc said it was from drinking too many canned sodas and not enough water, I guess like dehydration or something. I wish I had more water but we just don't have it and sweat most of it out. Canned drinks are all we have to supplement our water needs. Don't worry everything is back in working order and my plumbing is good.

I was thirsty and pulled a can of soda out of the cooler. I could see Doc shaking his head. He is making me regulate my fluid intake. Everyone saw me in pain yesterday, and then they see me up at 0530 taking over duties as SOG and 100 percent better. Plus, I've been out in the sun and heat with my two towers.

McDavid had to take over Sergeant of the Guard for me yesterday because of my illness, and if you saw what all I did before 1300 (time of my illness), you'd be

amazed. Before I fell sick, I posted all of my people on the towers. Then with the 1st Sgt and an interpreter I went outside the wall of the 2nd Cavalry compound to the neighborhood so we could talk to the parents of the kids that have been throwing rocks at the tower guards. They cracked the windshield on one of our Humvees.

We talked to an old bearded guy, he was the elder of the neighborhood. Some teenagers started

crowding us in. All this old man did was turn around and give them a dirty look and they left in haste. This guy gets tremendous respect from several generations younger than him. A kid here does not disrespect his elders. It's not like in the U.S.

I am keeping safe and I have words with my gunners not to forget what is going on with a vehicle stop and concentrate on everything outside of our perimeter made by our

vehicles. They will kill you in a flash around here. There was another soldier killed today.

Today, I took my two teams out and did patrols in which we apprehended one guy for threats and another guy for threatening his neighbor with an AK-47, which we confiscated along with a pistol.

On the way to this guy's location we saw a man outside holding a rifle. We quickly took cover around him, but the rifle

turned out to be just a BB gun. This is a dangerous place for a civilian to be standing outside with a BB gun because we don't know what he's got and we could

blow him away. I saw two mongrooses today, a little one and an older one.

## Are you ready for snook season?

Have you re-spoiled your reels and tied new knots? Snook season opens Sunday at midnight.

Sebastian Inlet will be loaded with snook and snook fisherman. Snook are awesome fish to catch, fight and eat. They are one of the best fighting fish in the water.

Remember that you may only keep snook which are between 24 and 36 inches. Please be careful how you handle the fish you don't keep.

There are many places other than Sebastian Inlet to catch snook. I personally like to fish Port Canaveral at night. Just remember if you fish the port you must keep your distance from the docks. Security is very tight and probably will be tighter with the opening of the snook season.

Snook love to hang around places where water flows. They also like structures such as docks, pilings and mangroves. A few years back you were able to fish the locks at Port Canaveral and it was catching all night. Since September 11 they have limited the area which you can fish. The port is still an awesome place to go.

There are many locations to find snook such as Ponce Inlet, Spruce Creek, Stuart, Jupiter Tomoka, the Indian River and a few places in Mosquito Lagoon. There are also many West Coast destinations such as Englewood, Marco Island and Chokoloskee to name a few.

When rigging for snook you should move up to 12-15 pound test and a 40 pound leader. Snook have very sharp gill plates and can cut lighter lines.

Talk about a fish that will destroy a top water plug, snook will crush them. They love soft jerk baits such as Rip Tide's 5 inch Flats Chub or the 6 inch Jerk worm. Another great bait for snook is the Rip Tide LT Minnow rigged on an 1/8 or 1/4 ounce jig head.

When fishing at night it is always good to use a larger bait because it has a bigger silhouette. The Rip Ride 4 inch or 5 inch Mullet on a jig head will produce. Try to match the size of your bait with the bait in the waters you are fishing.

Last, but not least, when you catch that legal snook and filet him, enjoy one of the best tasting fish in the water. Here is a little secret recipe for snook. Pre-heat your oven to 400 degrees and melt butter in a black skillet on med-

Thompson is already the third starter bitten by the injury bug in practice, joining safety Kentrell Curry (fractured right leg) and tackle Ken Veal (ankle).

KENTUCKY Watch for how Kentucky looks on offense with Jared Lorenson running a new scheme under a new coaching staff. First-year head coach Rich Brooks' stamp will be evident from the get-go. This is a game that is going to mark the era of two new coaching staffs. We're at home at Commonwealth Stadium, which I think is an advantage," Brooks said.

LSU A bruised kidney will sideline Tigers offensive lineman Terrell McGill after he was injured in the team's final scrimmage before the opener. The sophomore from Miami will miss this week's game, but might return for the road trip to Arizona the following week.

MISSISSIPPI Last year's ban on cowbells by SEC officials now also extends to non-conference foes, so any ringing in the Oregon game will result in a penalty. Last season, the Bulldogs were penalized for excessive cowbell noise against Kentucky.

Nichols should get to flex his leg anytime the Rebels come within shouting distance of the end zone and Ridgeway will keep the Commodores pinned deep in their own end after coming off a 42.4-yard average last season.

NORTH CAROLINA Gamecocks coach Lou Holtz will start the season with Kenny Irons and Darius Turman as his starting running backs, even though both freshmen (Demetris Summers, Cory Boyd) will also see snaps coming off strong preseasons. The guy who is playing the best football of his career right now is Gonzie Gray (at tailback). Those five backs will all play," Holtz said.

TENNESSEE Volunteers defensive tackle and junior college transfer Larnall Fitch won't play this season after being ruled academically ineligible. He apparently failed to get his associate's degree from Navarro (Texas) College because he took the same class twice. Fitch will likely go back to Texas for this final course.

VANDERBILT Even though running back Kwame Doster is clearly the big man on campus after being named SEC Freshman of the Year last year, don't forget about junior Norval McKenzie in that backfield. Last year, McKenzie averaged nearly 8 yards per carry and also ripped off a 101-yard effort in a high-scoring loss to Ole Miss. Prediction: McKenzie will finish with more than 500 yards, while Doster becomes the first rusher since 1995 to break 1,000 yards for the Commodores.
