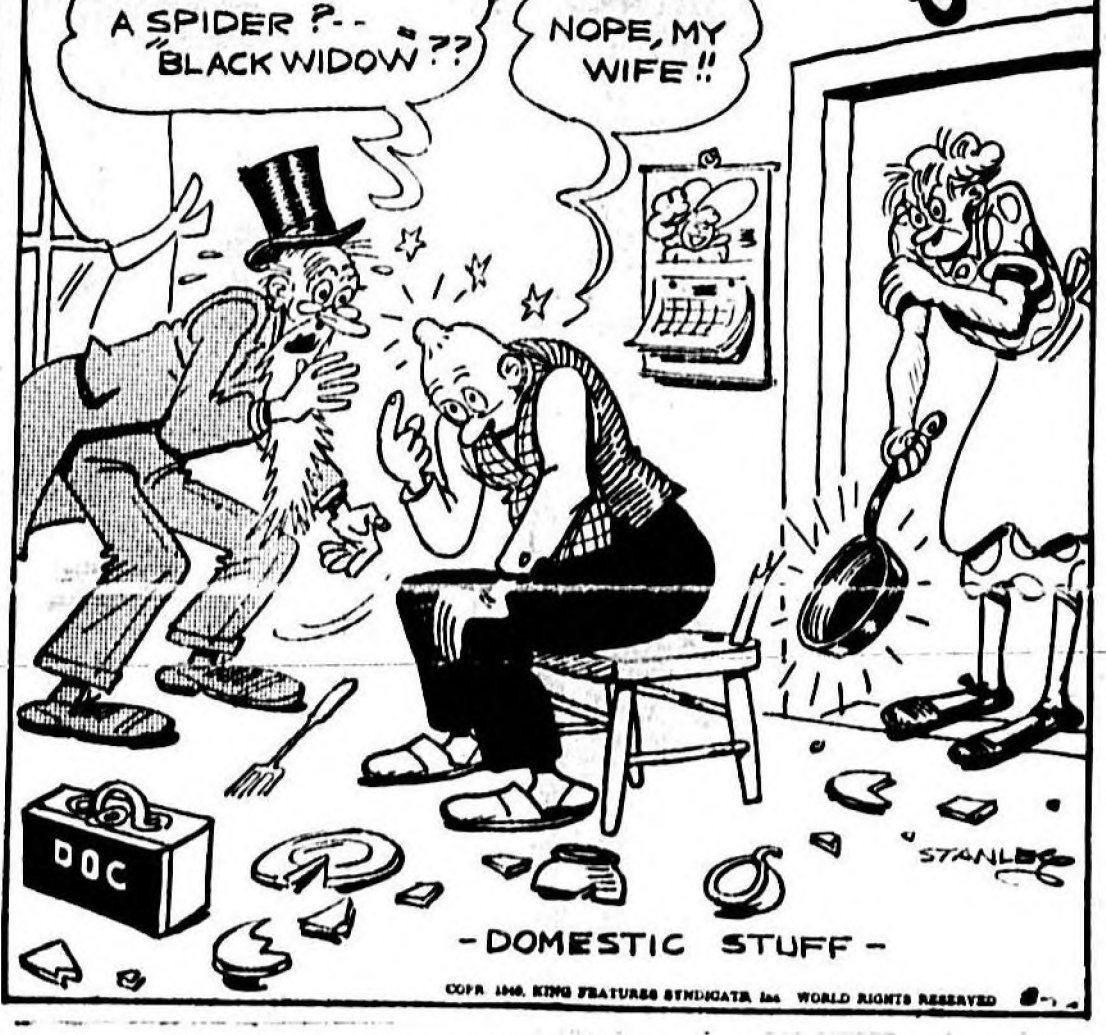

Maragon's Pay Revealed In Senate Probe

Five Percenters Had Income Of \$30,000 In Five Years But Banked \$119,000.00

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—John Maragon today refused to answer questions at the Senate five percenters inquiry on the ground that his answer might tend to incriminate me.

The Greek-American had taken the witness chair after an account ant testified that Maragon made bank deposits of \$119,000.61 during a five-year period in which he has said his income was only around \$30,000.

He would not talk, that is, when asked about his financial affairs, or answer many other questions.

But he did say "yes" when Senator Mundt (R-SD) asked:

"Do you know Harry Vaughan?"

He referred to Maj. General Vaughan, President Truman's army aide.

Mundt then wanted to know whether Maragon had ever been "associated" with Vaughan in "any activities."

"I refuse to answer on grounds that were 'no implications' that he were 'no implications,'" Maragon testified, "Mundt asked that answer left the implication that you and Vaughan have been engaged in activities that are incriminating."

Maragon conferred briefly with his attorney, who said there were "no implications," that he was just following his counsel's advice.

He would not even say when asked by Chairman Hoey (D-NC) whether he had testified before the committee behind closed doors July 28.

Maragon did testify at that time.

The committee has since released a transcript of his testimony. Among other things, Maragon swore then that he had never received any payments for negotiating business with government agencies.

Today Hoey asked him if he had given such testimony.

Maragon said with a slight accent, "I refuse to answer on advice of counsel on the ground that my answer might tend to incriminate me."

He gave the same answer when asked if he had not testified in private session that he had no other income in 1948, 1949, and 1947 beyond certain sums which had been mentioned.

Maragon's lawyer, Myron G. Phelan, took it to say he had advised his client to refuse to answer certain questions.

Seven Men Lost In Sub Disaster In Arctic Waters

84 Crewmen Rescued By Ship Not Far From Murmansk

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—Six Navy submariners and a civilian technician lost their lives and 84 crewmen were rescued today when the submarine Cochino exploded and burned in Arctic waters.

The six Navy men were attached to the U. S. Tusk, a sister submarine which rescued the Cochino's crew. The civilian, who was not immediately identified, was the only one lost aboard the Cochino.

The sunken submarine was equipped with a snorkel—an underwater "breathing" tube which enabled it to remain submerged for long periods of time.

The explosion occurred in the Cochino's battery room and was followed by fire.

A lieutenant and five of the Tusk's enlisted men were swept from the deck by heavy seas during the rescue of the Cochino's crew, which was hampered by high seas.

The Tusk, with the rescued men aboard, is heading for the Norwegian port of Hammerfest. This is the nearest port where medical assistance can be obtained.

The Cochino and Tusk, together with the submarines Toro and Corsair, had been temporarily assigned to naval force under command of Admiral Richard L. Conolly, naval commander in chief of U. S. forces in European waters.

The submarines had been engaged in cold water training exercises in the Arctic. They left the U. S. naval submarine base at New London, Conn., on July 18.

Hurricane Do's And Don'ts

MIAMI, Aug. 26 (AP)—How do shifters weather a hurricane? Florida had lots of good advice today from news papers and radio stations.

Stay inside away from windows. The glass may break and cut you.

Don't be fooled by a lull in the storm. A calm center of hurricane may last from a few minutes to an hour. Then the fury resumes suddenly from the opposite direction.

If you must take a drink to settle your nerves, put it on a clear head may be needed.

Government Report Shows Slight Drop In Cost Of Living Index

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The government's living cost index took a new dip today.

It fell six-tenths of one per cent from mid-June to mid-July.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said the mid-July living cost index was 168.5 per cent of the 1935-39 average. That average is figured at 100 on the index.

The new index is 3 per cent under a year ago but 70.9 per cent over the August, 1939, price level.

Price drops for foods, wearing apparel and house furnishings caused the living cost decline. Foods averaged 1.3 per cent lower, apparel nine-tenths of one per cent, and house furnishings three-tenths of one per cent lower.

Slight rises in costs for rents and miscellaneous goods and services, including municipal transportation fares, were recorded.

Foods alone are seven per cent under a year ago and 88.5 per cent over the level when government price controls were in effect.

Among foods, price declines were noted by the bureau for meats, poultry, fruits and vegetables, fats and oils, sugar and bakery products.

Living cost figures for mid-August—that is, those reflecting price levels of about now—won't be reported for a month. Some government economists anticipate that they may show another dip from the total decline for the year since last August's peak to some where between 4 and 5 per cent.

One factor pointing to further living cost declines is the drop in wholesale prices. All commodities are down 10.6 per cent below what they were at wholesale a year ago, by the government's measurement. These include declines of about 16 per cent in foods and farm products, and about five per cent in other commodities.

But living costs, while on a slow downward slide, will be about 25 per cent above what they were during the days of government price controls.
