## Wilson Makes Callant Fight for His Life as Death Knocks at Door

### Fighting for Life with Old Indomitable Spirit So Characteristic of His War Days, the Former President Clings to Remaining Spark of Life with Stubborn Tenacity While Friends Linger at Sick Bed Hold Little Hope for His Recovery.

### LAST REPORT GIVES LITTLE HOPE

Bulletin issued at 1 o'clock states no material change is evidenced in sick man's condition, but fear is entertained that lack of nourishment and weakened condition will offer little chance for his survival of another night.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(By The Associated Press) Life still lingered with Woodrow Wilson today but death is still knocking at his door, through the weary stretches of the night past the dangerous hours of early morning and soon into the full light of another day he kept the grim visitor waiting outside his portal with a persistence that astonished even his physician. The little rest he snatched fitfully during the hours of darkness helped to stay for a moment the hand that almost extinguished the faint spark of vitality. Those at watch at his bedside were encouraged ever so little but did not dare believe that there had been any marked change for the better. So weakened was he by being for a full day and night face to face with death that there was scarce strength enough for him to open eyes on the sunlight of another day.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—At 1 o'clock this afternoon there was no evidence of any material change in the condition of former President Wilson.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—A bulletin issued at 11:30 a. m. says that Mr. Wilson is growing steadily weaker. He has been able to take very little nourishment. He has had some sleep and no pain, recognizes those about him but is exhausted to talk. Our efforts are directed entirely toward making him comfortable. Signed Doctors Grayson, Ruffin and others. Dr. Grayson said, "I am subject to hazard sudden death."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Standing ground Woodrow Wilson continues to grow weaker and weaker. But having lasted through the night which physicians thought might bring the end, they cannot help but have a remarkable feeling that he has taken no nourishment for almost 24 hours. He is disinclined to drink water, pulse respiration and temperature were practically normal early in the morning.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—The evening hours passed, the faint remnant of his vitality faded the stage in which both mind and physician were now to do more than hope for the best. No one knew at what moment the supreme crisis might come or whether he again would emerge victorious.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—The immediate cause of this relapse was a minor digestive disturbance which first appeared Monday. In the beginning it was not itself alarming; but it was enough to undermine the slender supporting support by which vitality has been sustained.

## Reverent Hush of Impending Sorrow Falls in the Steep Narrow Street Leading to Woodrow Wilson's Home

As Report Spreads of the Former President's Critical Condition Through the Steeply Tapering Lane From the Word from the Sick Room.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Up and down the steep, narrow street to Woodrow Wilson's home since he laid aside the presidency for the peace of private life, there flowed today a curious traffic marked by the rush of an impending sorrow. It was not very great as numbers go, for "S" streets, where the Wilson home stands, should be a shoulder with a half dozen other mansions, is a byway of city traffic. But as word spread that the former president lay close to the end of his life's journey, a police cordon was necessary to free the street of motor cars that turned that way from the sick room.

Admiral Grayson was the spokesman from the house of sorrowful waiting. Once, early in the day he came out weary with his long vigil and his own emotion, while the reporters clustered close about him on the sidewalk. He could give them no word of encouragement. The end was only a matter of hours away, it seemed. It was not very long, he said, that it was near. The other doctors who had counseled with Mr. Grayson in the morning hours, would not talk of the condition of the patient when they came out. But they were grave when they said that the former president was sleeping and in no pain. It was plain they entertained no hope.

Opposite the Wilson home, where a high bank stands fronting a stretch of vacant, brush grown land, a line of patients grew and thinned and grew again. For the most part they were people of the neighborhood.

## Breach of Promise Suit Now a Battle of Sentimentality

(By The Associated Press) ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 2.—Trial of the \$500,000 breach of promise suit brought by Mrs. Onozima de Bouchel against Asa G. Candler, Sr., Friday developed into a battle of letters in the United States district court here.

As proposed by Mr. Bodwell two prizes will be given to the men and two to the women. The first prize in both competitions will be a beautiful loving cup with the second prize will be a handsome trophy. The cups and trophies have already arrived and have been greatly admired by many who have seen them at Mr. Bodwell's office on Magnolia Avenue. ## ENGLAND OFFERS RECOGNITION TO RUSSIAN SOVIET

Diplomatic Relations After A Suspension of Six Years Are Now Resumed.

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Feb. 2.—The government of Soviet Russia has been accorded recognition by Great Britain, and, according to the text of a note given out at the foreign office Friday night, embodying the agreement between the two governments, Russia is invited to send representatives to England to negotiate a new treaty settling all outstanding questions.

By a large body of opinion opposed to unconditional recognition of Russia, Premier MacDonald is accused of hesitating. These observers point out that, although in office only a little over a week, he is trying to settle the thorniest foreign problems without even waiting for the reassembling of the parliament. But, it is added, the sure of parliamentary approval in these matters because the liberal party itself has advocated recognition of Russia.

## United Mine Workers Adjourn Today After A Stormy Convention

(By The Associated Press) INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 2.—Amid riotous scenes the biennial convention of the United Mine Workers of America was adjourned today by President John L. Lewis Saturday morning. Adjournment was announced while delegates howled as Alexander Howat, deposed president of the Kansas district, was dragged from the platform by two sergeant-at-arms. Howat sought to address the convention on the report against and grievances committee which refused to consider his plea for reinstatement. Lewis declared the vote showed approval of the active committee.

## Meeting In Honor Of Lenin Is Broken Up

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—Four men were arrested Friday night when they attempted to hold a mass meeting in honor of Lenin at Labor Lyceum. They were held on a \$50 bail for hearing. Director Brennan refused the permit and a crowd gathered in front of the building to hold it there. Police reserves prevented the meeting.

## McAdoo Received \$250,000 As The Counsel of Doheny

### PERMITS SHOW A STEADY GROWTH OF 'CELERY CITY'

January Permits Amount to \$37,835 or 33 Per Cent Increase Over January, 1923.

That Sanford has started the new year with such figures giving on Saturday by City Clerk L. R. Phillips, which show that 33 permits were issued during January for the sum total of \$37,835. It is interesting to note that January, 1924, has had a material increase over the corresponding month of the two years previous. January 1923 the sum represented by building permits was \$28,400 or \$9,435. January 1922 the amount was 13,460, which makes the gain in two years \$24,370.

The gain of last month over January 1923 represents a gain of 33 per cent while the gain over the same month of 1922 is equal to 173 per cent. Indications are that there may still be more building activity going on in this city this month. Among the largest permits issued were the one issued to the Florida MacCracken Concrete Pipe Company for the erection of a building plant east of Sanford and the other to the Sanford Machine Company for the erection of a warehouse addition to the present plant at Second Street and Railroad Avenue.

## Freas Declares His Faction Positively Won't Support Plan

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Ramblings of dissatisfaction among house Republicans over the action of the majority members of the house ways and means committee in deciding to report a tax bill carrying the income rates proposed by Secretary Mellon crystallized Friday in an announcement by Representative Freas, Wisconsin, a leader of the Republican insurgents, that his faction would not support the measure.

In announcing the stand of the insurgents, Mr. Freas revealed that a compromise on the Mellon rates had been virtually agreed to yesterday by some Republican members of the committee, including Chairman Green and the insurgent group. The proposed majority, included a 50 per cent reduction in the normal taxes instead of a 25 per cent cut as suggested by Mr. Mellon and a maximum surtax of about 40 per cent instead of 25 per cent. Eleven members of the committee insisted upon the Mellon rates, which were adopted.

While the Republicans of the ways and means committee worked further details of the rate schedule, preparatory to taking the bill up again next week in full committee, Secretary Mellon issued estimates showing the rate reductions proposed by Representative George C. Goetz, Tex., for the Democrats, would cost the government \$347,981,491 in revenue against a loss of \$287,814,261 if the Mellon rates were accepted. He made no comment on the estimates. The Democratic National Committee issued a report today showing that 6,841,293 persons would be benefited under the Goetz plan for tax relief against \$433 under the Mellon plan. The statement also said it was estimated "that either plan will raise an adequate amount of revenue for the government."

## U. S. Mexican Claims Convention Ratified

(By The Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, Feb. 2.—The general United States Mexican claims convention was ratified by the Mexican Senate yesterday after a compromise between majority and minority block. The minor block had refused to form a quorum and permit matter be brought before the Senate.

## SCHOONERS COLLIDE

B., Feb. 2.—Eight members of the crew of the British schooner Maid of Scotland are missing following the sinking of the craft in a collision yesterday with the Peruvian steamer Perene near Partridge Island. It also is feared that several men from the Perene may have been lost.

## Oil Magnate Declares In Testimony that Both McAdoo and Gregory, of the Prosecution, were Formerly in His Employ.

## TEAPOT DOME

Oil Babble Nears Burning Point as Name of Democratic Candidate for Presidency is Linked With Oil Scandal.

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Feb. 2.—Wm. G. McAdoo, candidate for the Democratic nomination for President, did not allow to be so unchallenged what he terms "the wholly unjustified" linking of his name with the oil lease transaction occupying the attention of the Senate Oil Committee. However he stated that the reason for his trip east was the condition of Woodrow Wilson, Mrs. McAdoo's father. The former Secretary of War, who made his visit to the national capital would include an attempt to appear before the Oil Committee and give his version of the connection of his former law firm and himself with the Doheny interests.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Halted before the Senate Oil Committee Saturday against the protest of his attorneys and physicians, former Interior Secretary Fall refused to answer questions about the naval oil leases and his relations with Sinclair and Doheny. Two major reasons were given for his refusal. First, that the authority given the committee by the last Congress had expired; second, in the light of the action of Congress directing civil court action in criminal oil lease cases and the answers might tend to incriminate him.

Clearing the crowded hearing room the committee went into executive session to determine the course of their attitude toward the former cabinet officer and senator. As the committee deliberated Mr. Fall waited with lawyers and physicians in the ante room.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—William G. McAdoo, candidate for the democratic nomination for president, and Thomas W. Gregory, the Democrat selected by President Coolidge to assist in the prosecution of the oil lease cases, have had employment as counsel for oil interests, Edward L. Doheny, California oil magnate, testified today before the senate investigating committee.

Mr. Doheny said he personally had retained Mr. McAdoo after his retirement as Secretary of the Treasury, that he thought his company had paid his "all told" about \$250,000 in fees, and that it would pay him a retainer of \$50,000 a year. His company and half a dozen other companies employed Mr. Gregory after he quit as attorney general. Mr. Doheny stated, for the purpose of appearing before President Wilson or the state department in connection with Mexican oil matters. His company's share of the fee paid was \$2,000.

Testimony also was given that companies in which Mr. Doheny has an interest had given employment to two other members of the cabinet in the Wilson administration for which they quit office, Frank K. Lane, former secretary of the Interior, and Lindley M. Garrison, former secretary of war. Mr. Lane was assistant to the president of the Pan-American Petroleum and Transport Company, Mr. Doheny said, while Mr. Garrison was associated with the New York banking firm of Blair & Co.

The committee also was told by Mr. Doheny that he had advanced \$5,000 to Leo J. Stutz of Colorado, who told him he wanted the money for George Creel, chairman of the committee on public information during the war, who was employed, Mr. Stutz said, in connection with efforts to prevent the leasing of the naval reserves to the Republicans after the change of administration. This was in 1920; he added, when he and Mr. Stutz were seeking to get a lease of the Teapot Dome reserve from the then Secretary Daniels.

Evidence relating to the employment of former Democratic officials by oil interests was brought out in an inquiry by the chairman, Lenroot, put as a result of a demand made in the senate yesterday by Senator Reed of Missouri, who also is a candidate for the democratic presidential nomination. Mr. Reed insisted that the committee give Mr. Doheny a searching examination as to whether he had paid any money to men while serving as public officials or afterwards. Final congressional action was taken Friday on the Walsh resolution directing the President to initiate court action for annulment of the oil leases and punishment of any persons guilty of any crime in connection with their negotiations. The house adopted the resolution on a rising vote, 120 to 4—less than a quorum—with any debate. Republican Leader Longworth said (Continued on page 8)

# In The World Of Sports

## FIVE CLEVELAND PLAYERS WILL BE WITH THE BOSTON CLUB THIS YEAR

(By The Associated Press)  
**CLEVELAND, Feb. 1.**—The trading of one unassisted triple play hero for another and the passing of Catcher Steve O'Neill, the last surviving member of the Cleveland Indians of 1911, were features of the seven-player trade made by the Cleveland and Boston American League clubs. It was the largest baseball deal in which Cleveland has figured since Tris Speaker came to the Indians in 1916, and strangely enough that trade was made between the same two clubs.

The trading of William Wambagans, second baseman, who has the distinction of making the only unassisted triple play in a world's series game, for George Burns, first baseman, who pulled the annuity in a game against Cleveland last season came as no surprise. This deal has been "in the air" since early in the fall.

Incidentally, Wambagans almost figured in the deal which brought Tris Speaker to Cleveland. At that time Boston was to have the pick of an infielder, and Lee Fohl, then manager of the Indians, was now holding a similar position with the Red Sox, kept him on the bench and used Fred Thomas during the training season. Boston is thought to have fallen for the bait and selected Thomas, who failed to last, while "Vamby" remained the star of the Indians.

Besides strengthening the Indians at their weakest position, first base, the deal will give Cleveland the greatest wrecking crew it ever had, with six sluggers who last season batted better than .300 leading off. These are: Charlie Jamieson, 11, .345; Homer Summa, 11, .328; Speaker, 11, .380; Joe Sewell, 11, .353; Riggs, 11, .328; and Burns, 11, .328.

The trading of O'Neill created a sensation among the local fans, with whom he is a favorite. He had given Cleveland some of the best catching it has ever had. His passing, it is believed, will put the burden of the receiving in 1924 on Duke Sewell and Glenn Wright, with chances favoring the former. With Lee Fohl the Boston Red Sox now have five players who are residents of Cleveland on its roster. The others are O'Neill, Wambagans, Charles Dornkott, a semi-pro pitcher, and Harold Rosenback, an amateur outfielder.

## Glenna Collett Wins Tournament After A Thrilling Play-off

**BELLAIR, Fla., Feb. 1.**—Miss Glenna Collett of Bhoote Island Country Club defeated Mrs. Dorsey Hurd of Merlon Creek in the final of the women's annual January tournament here yesterday. It was the best played match ever seen at Bellair between two women golfers.

The match was a thriller from beginning to end for the large gallery which followed from the first tee to the 19th green where it ended in victory for the young Providence girl.

On the last hole Miss Collett drove her ball to within a hole of a moving railroad train which was just pulling into the station. She had barely room to swing the club, but managed to put her approach shot on the green 25 from the cup. She sank the putt which gave her a half and sent the match to an extra hole which she won with a par four.

Mrs. Hurd ruined her chances for getting a half when she put her second shot into a trap. Miss Collett covered the 18 holes in 76 strokes, while Mrs. Hurd required 77.

Rex Farris and his trusty player-manager, Pete Norton, tonight were in a position to announce for the first time something that resembled an official itinerary for the baby Gators' road jaunt into western Florida that is billed to commence Thursday morning.

According to present plans, the yearling basketballers play six times on their eight-day journey. Thursday night of this week they are slated to appear in Live Oak against the high schoolers of that city. The following afternoon they battle Quincy High, and on Saturday swing into action against the Graceville five.

On Monday the Florida floormen play Chipley, Rex Farris' home town, and on Tuesday they will likely play in Tallahassee. This is the only scrap now pending. ## PROPOSED MATCH WITH LUIS FIRPO SURPRISES WILLS

**HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Feb. 1.**—If Harry Wills, Negro heavyweight, is matched to box Luis Angel Firpo, it is news to him. Wills said today he had never heard of Lewis Raymond, representative of a New York syndicate who is reported to have signed Firpo and Wills for a 15-round bout.

It will be out of the question for Wills to think of even facing on a glove for the next two months, his physicians stated. Wills has a badly broken right hand, one of the largest bones between the wrist and fingers being shattered. Wills broke his hand last week in New York while training for his bout with Bertley Madden, scheduled for Feb. 5. The bout was postponed until Feb. 25, but the condition of Wills' hand is such, said his physician, that either another postponement or cancellation will be necessary.

"Before I left New York," Wills said, "my manager, Paddy Mullens, had a talk with Tex Rickard concerning a bout between Firpo and me. No articles, however, were signed. That is all I know of a Firpo-Wills fight. If I am signed to meet Firpo my manager must have made the arrangements after I left New York."

Wills indicated, however, that he was leaving everything to Mullens as regarding future bouts.

## SALE OF BALDWIN UPHELD BY JUDGE LANDIS' DECISION

(By The Associated Press)  
**NEW YORK, Feb. 1.**—The sale of the contract of Howard Baldwin, star pitcher, to the New York Giants for \$25,000 by the former owners of the Newark International, was upheld Wednesday by Commissioner Landis over the protest of the newly-organized syndicate now in control of the Newark club.

The commissioner's ruling was announced after a formal hearing attended by representatives of agents as well as former and present Newark club interests.

The decision in favor of Bernard Moran and William Ashton of Baltimore, former Newark owners, was based upon the existence of a stipulation in the franchise bill of sale giving them the right to dispose of Baldwin, and also upon the fact that the deal for the transfer of the club has not yet been completed, since no money has as yet changed hands.

Michael McTigue and Corbett McCarthy, Newark business men, representing the new interests, based their claim for Baldwin on the contention that the pitcher automatically became transferred with any stipulation to the contrary. This view, however, was not sustained.

Financial details of the Newark transaction, revealed for the first time, brought out that the purchase price for the club is \$65,000. According to the terms of the agreement between McTigue and McCarthy, this is to be paid by Tuesday in preferred stock by the new club and reduced annually by not less than \$7,500 in cash.



ORDINANCE NO. 74

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 183 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SANFORD, 1913.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA:

Section 1. That Section 183 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Sanford, of 1913, be amended as follows:

Section 183: FIRE LIMITS. No person shall build, construct, enlarge, or authorize the building, construction or enlargement of any frame or wooden building, tent, booth or other structure, or any veneered building, or any wooden building, covered with corrugated or other iron, in the area within the corporate limits of the City of Sanford, Florida, described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the south shore of Lake Monroe with the east line of Elm Avenue extended; run south to the south line of Fulton Street; thence west to the east line of French Avenue; thence south to a point 117 feet south of the south line of First Street; thence east to the east line of alley between Elm Avenue and Myrtle Avenue; thence south to the north line of Third Street; thence east to the east line of alley between Sanford Avenue and Palmetto Avenue; thence south to the north line of Eighth Street; thence east to the west line of alley between Sanford Avenue and Cypress Avenue; thence North to the North line of Third Street;

thence east to the west line of Pine Avenue; thence north to the north line of Union Avenue; thence easterly along the north line of Union Avenue to the west line of Chapman Avenue; thence northerly along the west line of Chapman Avenue to the south shore of Lake Monroe; thence westerly along the south shore of Lake Monroe to beginning, and also

Beginning at a point 57 feet south of the north east corner of Block 11 Tier 9 in A. C. Martin's Addition to Sanford, Florida; run west to the southwest corner of Lot 1, Block 11, Tier 11 in said A. C. Martin's Addition, which point is also on the easterly line of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad right of way; thence northerly, along the easterly line of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad right of way to a point 87 feet north of the north line of Ninth Street in said A. C. Martin's Addition; thence east to the west line of French Avenue at a point 88.7 feet north of the north line of said Ninth Street; thence South 211.7 feet to beginning.

Section 2. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its final passage and adoption. Adopted this 28th day of January, A. D. 1924.

RESOLUTION NO. 118

A RESOLUTION PRESCRIBING THE FORM AND DETAILS OF AN ISSUE OF BONDS BY THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA, IN THE SUM OF THREE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS, AUTHORIZED BY ORDINANCE NO. 67, DULY ADOPTED DECEMBER 10th, 1923, AND PLEDGING THE NET INCOME, REVENUE AND PROFITS TO BE DERIVED BY THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA, FROM THE OPERATION OF ITS WATER WORKS PLANT OR PLANTS, TO AN AMOUNT SUFFICIENT TO CREATE A SINKING FUND TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST OF SAID BONDS, AND IF SAID INCOME, REVENUE AND PROFITS SHOULD PROVE TO BE INSUFFICIENT FOR SAID PURPOSES, PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF AN ANNUAL TAX UPON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA, TO PRODUCE EACH YEAR A SUM SUFFICIENT TO PAY THE INTEREST ON SAID BONDS AND TO CREATE A SINKING FUND FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE REDEMPTION OF SAID BONDS AT THE MATURITY THEREOF.

Whereas, at a regular meeting of the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, held on the 10th day of December, A. D. 1923, this Commission did duly enact and adopt that certain ordinance, No. 67, entitled:

"An Ordinance Providing for the Acquisition and Establishment of a Water Works Plant or Plants by the City of Sanford, Florida, to be Maintained and Operated as a Public Utility, and Providing for an Issue of Utility Bonds by the City of Sanford, Florida, in the sum of Three Hundred and Seventy-five Thousand Dollars, the Proceeds to be Derived from the Sale Thereof to be Used to Acquire, Establish, Purchase and Construct a Water Works Plant or Plant,"

Whereas, this Commission did cause said ordinance to be duly published as required by law, and

Whereas, this Commission did cause an order to be adopted, calling an election to be held throughout the City of Sanford, Florida, on the 11th day of January, A. D. 1924, to determine the question at said election, whether the ordinance aforesaid, should be adopted, approved and confirmed by the electors of the City of Sanford, Florida, and whether the bonds provided for in said ordinance, should be issued by the City of Sanford, Florida, in the manner and for the purposes in said ordinance provided and set forth, and

Whereas, in full and strict compliance with all the requirements of law, and at the time and place designated in said notice of election, and after due publication of said notice of election, an election

was duly held in the City of Sanford, Florida, on the said 11th day of January, A. D. 1924, and as the result of said election, the aforesaid ordinance, No. 67, was adopted, approved and confirmed by the electors of the City of Sanford, Florida, and by said election it was further determined, that the bonds provided for in said ordinance should be issued by the City of Sanford, Florida, in the manner and for the purposes in said ordinance provided and set forth, and

Whereas, the question of issuing bonds for the purposes specified in the said ordinance had not been submitted to the voters of the City of Sanford, Florida, within one year prior to January 11th, 1924, and

Whereas, in strict compliance with the requirements of law, the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, did, subsequent to the date of the said election, proceed to canvass the returns of the said election, and at said meeting, did unanimously adopt a resolution declaring the said election to be in favor of the adoption, approval, and confirmation of the said Ordinance No. 67, and in favor of the issuance of the bonds provided for in said Ordinance No. 67, by the City of Sanford, Florida, and

Whereas, all precedent conditions and requirements imposed by law to exist, happen and be performed, before said bonds or any part thereof, can be lawfully issued, do exist, have happened and have been performed, and the form and details of said bonds, and the interest coupons to be thereto attached, and the special tax to be annually levied to pay the interest on said bonds, and to create a sinking fund for the retirement of said bonds at maturity, not having been properly designated, and it now being desired that the same be so indicated,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That bonds of the City of Sanford, Florida, in the aggregate sum of Three Hundred and Seventy-five Thousand (\$375,000.00) Dollars, provided for by the said Ordinance numbered 67, and as approved and confirmed by the electors of the City of Sanford, Florida, be issued at this time, said bonds to bear a rate of interest of five and one-half per centum (5 1/2 per cent) per annum, to be of the denomination of One Thousand Dollars each, to be numbered from 1 to 375, both numbers inclusive to be dated January 1st, 1924, and to mature January 1st, 1924; both principal and interest of said bonds shall be payable at the City of New York, State of New York, in lawful money of the United States of America, interest payable semi-annually on January first, and July first of each year; said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor of the City of Sanford, Florida, and the Clerk of the City of Sanford, Florida, and shall have affixed thereto the seal of the City of Sanford, Florida; the interest coupons to be attached to said bonds to be signed with the engraved or lithographed fac-simile signatures of said Mayor and said Clerk; the said bonds and coupons, with the necessary variations as to dates and numbers, and the certificate of validation thereof, shall be substantially in the following form, to-wit:

Know All Men By These Presents, that the City of Sanford, in the State of Florida, a municipal corporation, duly organized and existing under and in pursuance of the Laws of the State of Florida, for value received, acknowledges itself indebted and promises to pay to the bearer hereof the sum of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS, in lawful money of the United States of America, on the first day of January, A. D. 1924, with interest thereon at the rate of five and one-half per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, January first and July first of each year, on presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto annexed as they severally become due, both principal and interest being payable at The Chase National Bank, in the City of New York, State of New York.

D. 1924, the ballots cast at said election and the vote and returns thereof having been duly canvassed, proclaimed, certified, filed, recorded and declared as required by law, and also pursuant to certain orders and resolutions of the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, duly had and adopted.

Ponce de Leon to Jacksonville, under construction, detours marked. Westville to Aucilla river by Marianna, Quincy, Tallahassee and Monticello, rough on account of heavy rains. Monticello to Aucilla river, rough. Aucilla river to Greenville, good. Greenville to Madison, rough. Madison to Lake City in bad condition due to rains for past week. Follow old road all the way. Lake City to Jacksonville, hard-surfaced road, fine.

Road No. 2.—Georgia line to Fort Myers: Georgia line to Lake City via White Springs, bad condition, due to rains. Lake City to High Springs, same condition. High Springs to Gainesville, 25 miles of asphalt, excellent. First 10 miles south of Gainesville, new asphalt surface very good. End of asphalt to Micanopy rough but good going. Micanopy to Marianna, county line under construction, but passable. Marion county line to Lowell, new lime rock base excellent. Ocala to Belleview under construction. Road condition between Ocala and Belleview changes daily; inquire at Leesburg or Ocala Chamber of Commerce for best route. Belleview to Leesburg to Eustis and Mount Dora very good. Mount Dora through Orange, Osceola and Polk counties to Bowling Green, good. Bowling Green to Gardner fair. Gardner through Arcadia to Carlstrom field good. Carlstrom Field to the Belmont road rough and sandy in spots by fair road. Belmont road to Fort Myers, good.

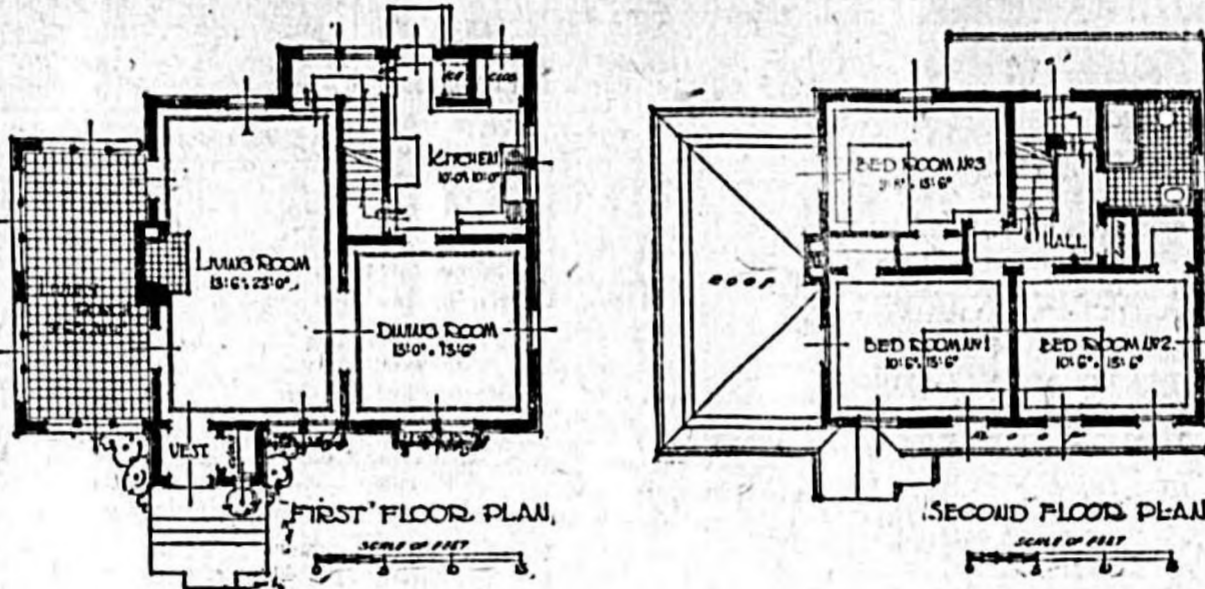

Sanford through Seminole and Orange counties to Orlando, good.

Road No. 4.—Georgia line to Miami: George line 13 miles south, sand-clay very rough, due to rains. Ten miles penetration and lime rock base, good. Six miles old shell road very rough; nine miles brick and penetration to Jacksonville, good. Sixty-two miles rock shoulders just completed from Duval county line across St. Johns and Flagler counties to Bunnell. Bunnell to Volusia county line rough. Volusia county line to Daytona and New Smyrna, fair; New Smyrna to Titusville, rough; Titusville to Cocoa six miles rock road, fair, and 12 miles paved. ## BIG MOMENTS OF SPORT

A bright sun beamed down on picturesque Edinboro Park, America's Newmarket, the afternoon of last Oct. 20. The sun seemed all the warmer and fresher and brighter, having dissipated the dull gray clouds of an almost continuous two days' downpour that left the broad course a quagmire knee deep in mud and ooze. But the thousands that packed the spacious stands, the lawn and the paddock were gay with the flags that snapped in the breeze—and restless, too. This was the day of the first international Derby between the mighty brown Zev and Papyrus, winner of the English Derby for \$100,000, the greatest stake of turf history.

The day was a series of thrills—a gold letter day in the history of the American turf. But doubtless the greatest thrill of all was the appearance to the view of the packed stands and awns of these two great three-year-old champions, bred by Steve Donoghue and Earl Sande, the best riders on the respective sides of the Atlantic. From the time Bar Gold, companion of Papyrus, used as a lead pony by "Red Coat" Murray, wormed his way through the throng on to the track until competitor and vanquished had gone to their stables, every eye was keyed to breaking point. But the big shock of all was the start, when Papyrus went away from the gate like a flash, leaving the fast-breaking Zev flat-footed.

As a race it was tragic. Papyrus, smooth-hoed, never had a chance in the muddy going. Experts knew this (as did Donoghue) when the English horse cantered down to the quarter pole before the start. The winner of the Epsom Derby was sprawling as he sprang when Donoghue called on him at the end of about a mile. But the start! It was something to catch an image. None present will ever forget the struggling emotions of mortification and patriotic pride when Donoghue and Papyrus out-broke Sande and Zev.

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## FIRPO IS WILLING TO FIGHT FOR THE RAYMOND UNION

(By The Associated Press)

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 2.—Hugh Gartland, representative of Luis Firpo, the Argentine fighter, said Friday he hoped to complete all the details for the fight between Firpo and Willie the American negro heavyweight, prior to Firpo's departure for New York. These details include the choosing of a referee and the arranging of the motion picture rights. Gartland is in daily cable communication with Willie McGarvey, who is conducting the New York end of the negotiations for the proposed fight with the Raymond syndicate.

According to Gartland, the syndicate not only will deposit a \$50,000 guaranty for Firpo but has offered to put up the entire \$250,000 which will be Firpo's end of the purse, if Firpo desires it.

Regarding the report that Firpo would join the fight syndicate, Gartland pointed out that under the New York state laws a boxer could not also be a promoter of the contest.

Firpo, who still seems to be carrying an amount of surplus flesh, is training strenuously for the fight with "Farmer Lodge. The date for this battle appears to have been finally set for Feb. 16, Lodge having been able to postpone his departure for the United States. As now arranged, the winner of the Firpo-Lodge battle will fight Ermino Spalla, the Italian heavyweight, Feb. 23. It is said that the promoters hope to arrange a "big" fight between both Spalla if Firpo defeats both of them.

Some of the sporting newspapers have been assured that Lodge is not a fit opponent for Firpo, and as a consequence the Argentine Boxing Federation has passed a resolution reminding the new municipal Boxing Commission that Lodge will be required to undergo a physical examination to determine his fitness to meet Firpo. Tomorrow Lodge will begin training in public with a number of French and Argentine sparring partners.

## Cleveland Planning To Alter Hall For Republican Meeting

CLEVELAND, Feb. 1.—Bids will be requested soon by the Cleveland convention executive committee for the work to be done in the public hall basement to meet the requirements of the Republican national committee for the national convention here next June.

Woodrow Wilson Mourns Loss War Time President Who Succumbs Today

Washington, February 3.—Woodrow Wilson, America's wartime president, died this morning at 11:15 o'clock. His death came as a result of extreme weakness due to an attack of infection earlier in the week.

He had heard himself hailed by the millions of Europe as "the God of peace" and his name acclaimed at one time almost as a new Messiah, he heard himself excoriated and denounced as an autocrat and worshiped at home and abroad.

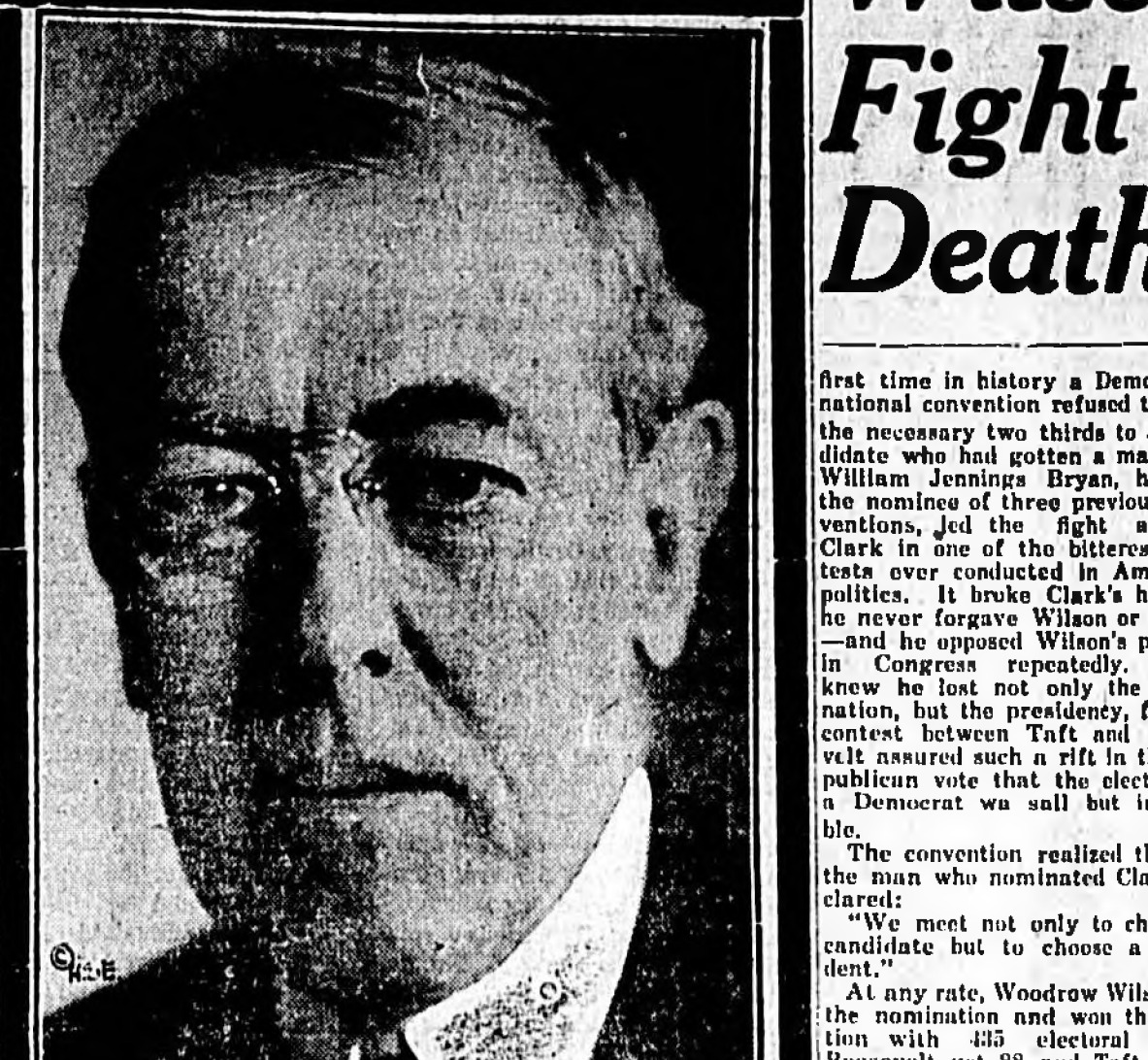
After having borne the burden of a war president, he undertook the task of making a peace which he sincerely believed would be a lasting one and although he died before he could see the success of his efforts.

Woodrow Wilson was a precedent smasher from beginning to end. He began by revising the practice of Washington and Jefferson in delivering his messages to Congress in person.

At any rate, Woodrow Wilson got 88 and Taft got 8. He came to the White House on March 4, 1913, signaling the return of the democracy to power after successive defeats of the party.

Life was a pretty well settled affair for him. He had a wife, a daughter, a son, and a grandchild. He was a member of the Episcopal church and a member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

Hardly had Mr. Wilson gotten himself turned around when he had his first foreign trip. He was not in the United States for more than a few days before he was called to the White House.

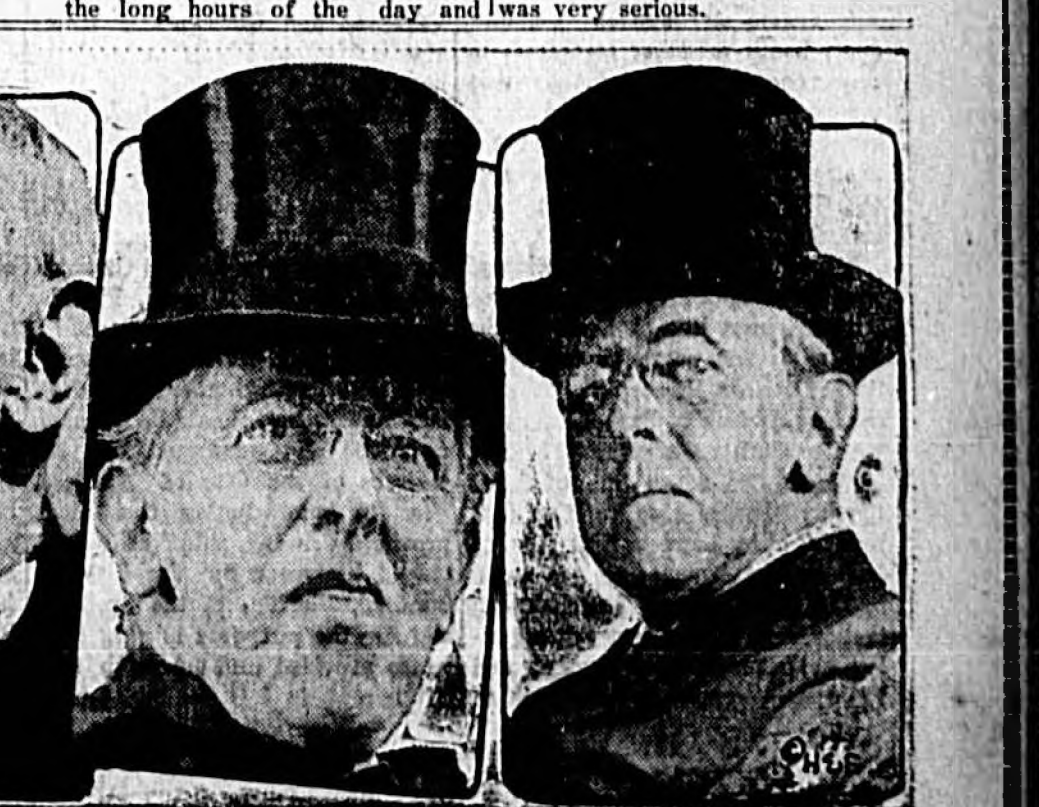
Wilson Made Gallant Fight for His Life as Death Knocks at Door
