Blame Laid In XB70 Loss

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Air Force said it has taken disciplinary action against three colonels and a civilian for helping to stage an unauthorized publicity stunt that ended in the death of two top pilots and the loss of a \$500 million plane.

Air Force Secretary Harold S. Brown, in an investigative report, charged that the ill-fated formation flight June 8 over Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., was made for the sole benefit of General Electric and without proper authorization from Washington, GE, which built engines for five planes involved, wanted to use pictures of the flight for advertising.

In the report to Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, Brown said that one colonel had been removed from his job, while two other colonels and a top civilian official of the Air Force Command Aeronautics System Division were officially reprimanded for their part in the stunt.

The crash occurred when an F104 fighter piloted by famed test pilot Joseph A. Walker collided with the \$500 million, two-mile-an-hour XB70, one of only two such planes in existence. Walker and Air Force Maj. Carl S. Cross, flying his first copilot mission in the XB70, were killed.

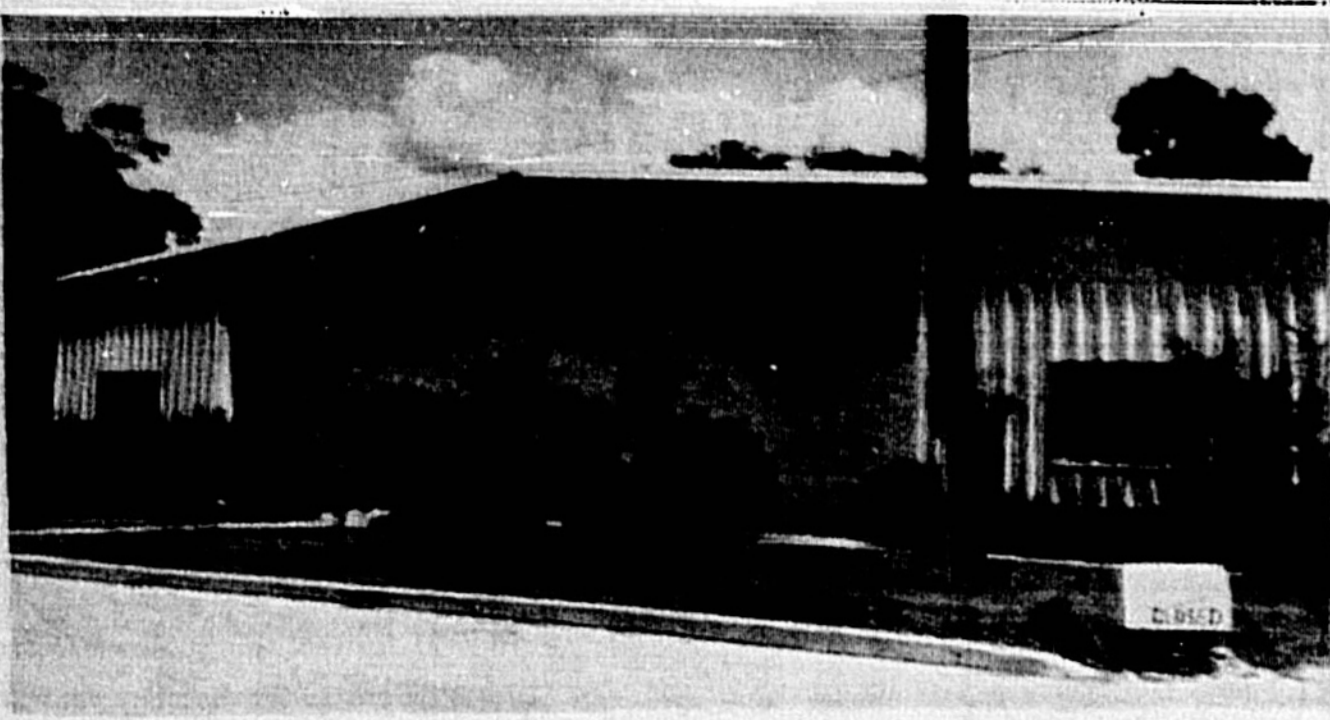

Forest Lake Bindery Nets School \$80,000 Annually

In another couple of weeks, Forest Lake Bindery at Forest Lake Academy will have completed its third full year of operation. The sales almost will have doubled showing a total of more than \$80,000, with a potential outlook for another \$150,000 in business contracted for the 1966-67 year.

The Forest Lake Bindery owes its foundation largely to a man who spent five years from 1960 to 1965 as principal, Elder William Fuchs, who was dedicated to the task of helping young people train, the head, the heart, and the hand.

Herald Tribune Is Dead After 131 Long Years

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Herald Tribune, heir to the journalistic legacy of Horace Greeley and James Gordon Bennett, died today.

The end of the Herald Tribune, which has not published for 115 days, was announced Monday by the World Journal Tribune Inc., the new publishing firm incorporating the Herald Tribune, the World-Telegram & Sun and the Journal-American.

Matt Meyer, president of the new company, said the publishers planned to go ahead with new afternoon and Sunday papers. Labor difficulties have kept all the planned newspapers from being published since the merger was announced last April.

Meyer said the long delay has caused a loss of "talent in all creative departments of the Herald Tribune."

"It now has reached the point where we cannot bring the public the kind of morning newspaper hoped for. We are unwilling to settle for less," he said.

"We are therefore consolidating our talent and resources into an afternoon and a Sunday newspaper, to be known as the World Journal Tribune, in both instances," Meyer said.

The end of the Herald Tribune left Manhattan with four major dailies, including the World Journal Tribune. The others are the morning New York Times and Daily News and the afternoon Post. Manhattan had six major dailies before the merger. Thirty-five years ago there were 12.

Thus only the word Tribune on the new masthead remained of a journalistic history that began with the penny-a-copy Herald of James Gordon Bennett in 1835. Six years later Horace Greeley's Tribune was merged with the Herald.

Answering Unanswerable

Senseless as it was, said President Johnson, there is a lesson to be learned from what happened on the campus of the University of Texas.

The President, of course, was referring to the ready availability of firearms in this country. Even though reason tells us that no law, save the outright banning and confiscation of all weapons, which no one seriously advocates, could possibly have prevented the tragedy in Texas, emotion demands some sort of legislative outlet.

If this appalling act of revision against violence is what it takes to finally prod Congress into enacting regulations governing the commerce in guns, regulations which surely will at least prevent some needless accidents in the future, then the deaths of 18 innocent people in Texas will not have been entirely futile.

What other lessons can we find? For doctors and counselors, there is perhaps the lesson that those harboring thoughts of violence in the dark, midnight of their souls usually give warnings. It is well-known that poten-

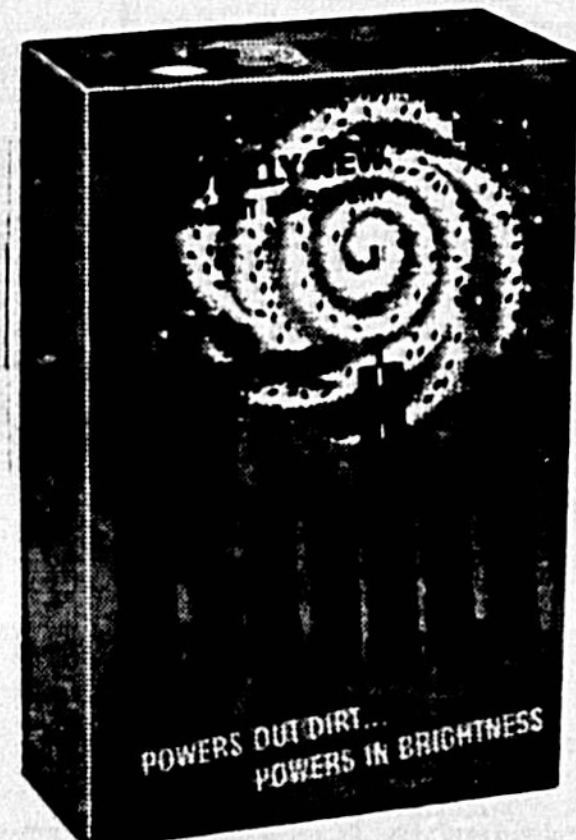

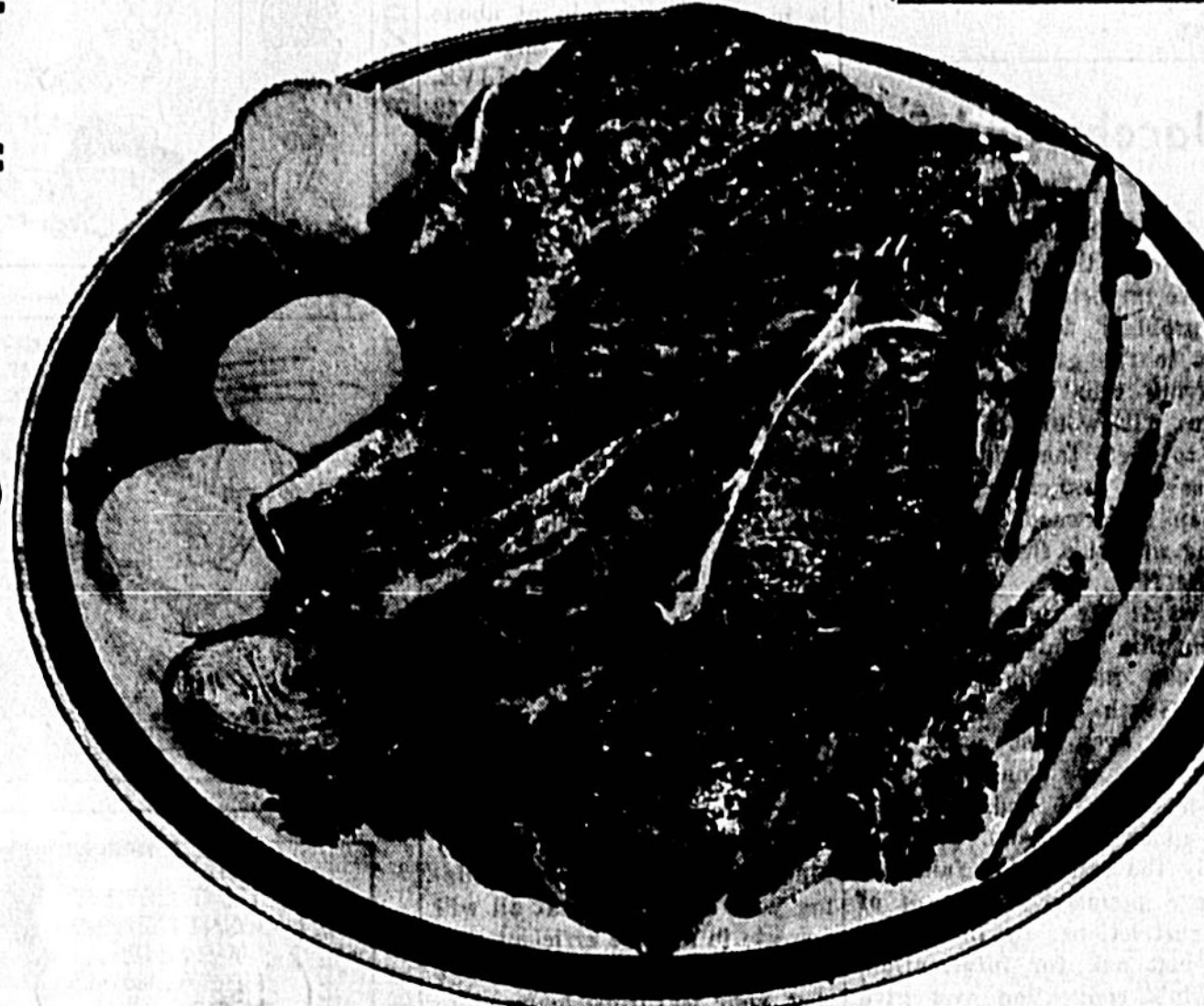

POLYNESIAN CHICKEN

Here is a recipe which turns chicken salad into one of the best luau dishes I've eaten in a long time. Split a whole pineapple lengthwise, leaving the stem on. Scoop out as much pineapple meat as you can, cut it in cubes and combine with equal amounts of cooked cubed chicken. Add chopped pimento and chopped celery, then stir in mayonnaise and a generous squeeze of lime juice. Mound this mixture back into the pineapple shell and sprinkle with sliced almonds. . . . and to give it a final polynesian touch, scatter bits of shredded coconut over the top. Arrange these filled pineapple halves on a platter covered with sea grape or magnolia leaves and garnish lavishly with whatever fresh tropical flowers you can find. Hibiscus are the best. Pick the blossoms in the morning and leave them in your refrigerator all day. For some strange reason, with this treatment they will stay open until after midnight, instead of closing as soon as the sun sets, as hibiscus blossoms are supposed to do. This idea really makes a beautiful buffet dish and it tastes just as good as it looks. Here's a trick to make the chicken especially flavorful . . . simmer it in a can of French onion soup until tender. Let it cool in the soup before removing it from the bone to cut into cubes. You'd be surprised how this method improves the flavor of the chicken salad.
