B-29 Winging Toward U.S. In Try For Record

Giant Bomber Leaves Orly Field In New Attempt To Crack N. Y.-Paris Record

PARIS, Oct. 16, (AP)—The Army's long-distance flyer, the Pacusan Dreamboat, is roaring toward Westover Field at Chicopee, Mass., and what may be a new transatlantic speed record. The giant aircraft left Orly Field, Paris, at 3:38 A. M., Eastern Standard time. Just prior to taking off on the 9500-mile trip, however, the pilot of the Dreamboat commented: "I'm not going to push it."

The ceremony at this morning's takeoff was not repeated in the fashion of yesterday, but official Army recorders nevertheless listed the split-second departure of the B-29. Observers expressed the belief that the Pacusan Dreamboat would make the flight in approximately 11 1/2 hours, an average flight rate of about 316 miles per hour. The present record is 14 hours, 39 minutes, and is claimed by a TWA Constellation for a Paris-to-New York run a year ago.

Operators' Want Stymies Action In Maritime Walkout

NEW YORK, Oct. 16 (AP)—An operators' demand that they be allowed to select ship masters without regard to union membership has stymied settlement of the 10-day old maritime strike. Most of the nation's ports are tied up today, but negotiations will be resumed to end the dispute. The latest hitch occurred last night at a conciliation meeting between east and Gulf coast operators and the AP of L. Masters, mates and Pilots.

The union tentatively approved was raised contained in a new operators' proposal, but the union heads balked at a stipulation that operators retain their right to select masters, "without regard to union membership or non-membership." Union President Capt. Harry Martin said the MMP would study the proposal, but he said the answer would be "no" to today's negotiating session.

Dania Murder Case Remains Unsolved

FORT LAUDERDALE, Oct. 16, (AP)—Sheriff Walter R. Clark today admitted he is up against a stone wall in efforts to solve the double murder of a young couple whose bodies were found on lonely Dania Beach exactly one week ago. The sheriff says two sailors have been absolved of any connection with the Dania Beach murder, but they are being held in Broward county jail after admitting the armed robbery of a Pampano couple Friday night. Sheriff Clark obtained an Army-type mine detector and will comb the sands along Dania Beach tomorrow in an effort to locate the .32 calibre pistol used to kill Lawrence G. Hogan and Miss Elaine Eldridge of Fort Lauderdale.

TOKYO, Oct. 16, (AP)—Emperor Hirokito called on General MacArthur today without any imperial fanfare or prior announcement of his coming. The Emperor dropped in just about the time that news of Japan's new constitution, which strips Hirokito of all his political power.

Goering Steals Spotlight From Fellow Nazis In Cheating Rope

Cards Down Sox In Final Series Contest, 4 To 3

Slaughter Scores On A Double In Eighth For Winning Tally

St. Louis, Oct. 16, (AP)—The never-say-die St. Louis Cardinals won the 1946 world series yesterday with a thrill-packed 4 to 3 victory over the Boston Red Sox.

The victory maintained the Cardinals' record of having never lost a seven-game world series, and it was Boston's first World Series defeat in six contests.

The Red Sox showed over the winning run on relief pitcher Bob Grooms in the eighth inning when they stopped the Red Sox for decisive Cardinal victories when they needed them most, played a hero's role in the eighth inning, and scored the winning run on a double by Dickson's aid in the eighth inning with men on second and third with no outs. He got the first two men but gave Dom DiMaggio one down the alley and DiMaggio doubled to knock in the tying run. Brecheen then retired Williams.

When the Red Sox threatened in the ninth with two straight hits, Brecheen batted down to get three Red Sox batters in a row to retire the side and clinch the Cardinal victory.

It was Brecheen's victory, but stout-hearted little Murray Dickson must come in for a share of plaudits. Dickson was nicked for a run in the very first inning and some thought it might be a repetition of the third game, when he lost the verdict on Rudy York's first inning home run.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16, (AP) Supreme Court Justice Robert Jackson said today that Hermann Goering's suicide "killed the myth of Nazi bravery."

In a statement, the chief United States prosecutor at Nuremberg declared: "The founder of the concentration camps where death was handed to millions, could not face the gallows, himself."

BERLIN, Oct. 16, (AP)—Some Germans in the street in Berlin today denounced Hermann Goering as a scoundrel who certainly should have hanged after learning from Nuremberg that flamboyant Goering took his own life with poison last night. Said a middle-aged German housewife: "That's a shame. That scoundrel of all people escapes hanging."

NUERNBERG, Oct. 16, (AP)—Hermann Goering—flamboyant to the last—stole the spotlight from his ten fellow Nazi war criminals when he cheated the hangman by taking poison. But the other ten beginning with former Foreign Minister Joachim Von Ribbentrop and ending with the gauleiter of Holland, Arthur Seyss-Inquart, have paid for their war crimes at the end of a rope.

Goering's dramatic suicide two hours before he was to have headed the Nazi death march has created a first-class mystery for intelligence officers of the Army of Occupation.

Army officers immediately began a sweeping investigation to learn how the corpulent number two Nazi secured the poison which kept him from the gallows. The prison commandant—Col. B. C. Andrus—blatantly announced Goering's death by suicide last night, the last body of the hanged man had been cut down.

The body of the World War I flying ace was brought into the prison courtyard on a stretcher. When the last of the ten men had been hanged, Col. Andrus stated "Goering was not hanged. He committed suicide." With that, the blanket was removed, and the palama-clad body of the former Reichsmarschall and Luftwaffe commander was displayed. His blue shirt was open exposing his chest. His face bore a marked expression of agony.

Abattoir Plans Meet Approval Of Farm Bureau

Resolution Passed Favoring Completion And Operation

A resolution favoring completion and operation of the Central Florida Quick Freeze and Laker plant with abattoir according to the rules and regulations of the sanitary code of the City of Sanford and the State Board of Health, was passed by the members of the Seminole County Farm Bureau at their annual meeting at the Court House Monday evening. It was announced today by County Agent C. R. Lawson.

It was also voted to call this resolution to the attention of the City Commission, which was meeting at the same time at the City Hall.

The farmers stated that this plant is of direct importance to the growers of livestock for killing of stock and putting it on the freezer, and that approval of such an abattoir by the State Board of Health is based on whether or not smells or noise would affect the interests of adjacent property owners.

The Bureau left up to the Board of Directors the election of a president, vice president and secretary, and it was announced that action on this would be taken soon. The Bureau voted to sign a petition for a referendum on a Salt Convention District.

The following were elected to the board of directors: R. E. Cooper, H. C. Hertz, Henry Schumacher, M. L. Cullum, J. C. Hutchison, Perry Whitehurst and Leo Huter.

Henry Thurston and Leo Huter were elected as delegates, and Henry Witte and R. E. Cooper at the State Farm Bureau convention at Miami on Nov. 15 and 16.

Motor Boat Inspection Service To Be Given By Coast Guard Auxiliary

Road Building In Monroe, Oviedo Is Authorized

Herndon Says Others Will Be Built When Funds Are Available

Construction of roads in the Lake Monroe and Oviedo sections was authorized yesterday afternoon by the Board of County Commissioners who met at 2:00 o'clock for this purpose, according to O. P. Herndon, county clerk.

Orange Boulevard in Lake Monroe will be paved under State Road Department specifications in 1947 for a distance of 2 1/2 miles.

Florida Avenue in Oviedo will be built 18 feet wide to the same specifications for a distance of one and a quarter miles. Two 600 foot streets, paid for in full by Oviedo, will be paved under County supervision, and work will start immediately, Mr. Herndon said.

The Board contributed an additional \$500 toward the cleaning of the Smith Canal on the West Side. This said, Mr. Herndon will make the total county contribution for the project, \$2,740. Property owners are likewise contributing to complete the engineering work which is designed to prevent flooding of the area during periods of heavy rainfall.

Other roads in the county will be built as soon as the money is available, Mr. Herndon declared.

Byrnes Holds Final Paris Press Confab

PARIS, Oct. 16, (AP)—United States Secretary of State James Byrnes held a farewell news conference in Paris today and expressed the belief that Yugoslavia eventually will sign the Italian Peace Treaty.

Senator Declares He And Taft Did Not Maneuver To Break Down Price Controls

Senator Kenneth Wherry of Nebraska today lashed out at President Truman on grounds of falsehood. He charged Mr. Truman was wrong when he said Wherry wrote the so-called profiteering amendment to the OPA bill passed by Congress last summer. He also accused the President of maliciously charging Wherry and Senator Taft with maneuvering to break down price controls.

Wherry said in an Associated Press report: "I challenge the truthfulness of the President's statements that the so-called profiteering amendment was the Wherry amendment. The one which was passed was an administration amendment. If President Truman said it, he didn't need to take it because it was brought in by the administration forces."

Wherry added: "The decontrol of most amendments carried in the Senate 40 to 26. On decontrol of dairy products the vote was 52 to 27. Those votes were right at a 2 to 1 majority. How can the President and his administration charge Senator Wherry and me with breaking down OPA and me with breaking down OPA when these amendments passed 2 to 1 and with the administration in control of both houses?"

Wherry went on to say that the black market was responsible for failure of OPA control of meat. He said Mr. Truman decontrolled meat because Wherry added that the President decontrolled meat now because of the breakdown of meat regulations in the coming elections.

Most came into the nation's principal livestock markets in commodity volume today. Even hogs, which were not expected in any considerable numbers until the latter part of November arrived in larger amounts than a year ago.

The first of the two ballots showed a definite administration trend, they said, with the administration polling its entire strength. Senator Ed. Fraser, later nominated, received 57 votes of the 126 ballots cast.

TALLAHASSEE, Oct. 16, (AP)—Observers today were standing by to see if State Senator Edwin G. Fraser of Macclenny will face a court battle over his nomination for State Comptroller. The State Democratic Executive Committee yesterday dealt Governor Caldwell a stunning blow when it gave the nod to Fraser over Clarence M. Gray of Orlando, who had the Governor's unqualified endorsement.

Fraser, who was supported by a power anti-administration Senate bloc, has expressed a belief the nomination will not be contested. He says it was a clean-cut victory with the assistance of loyal friends, and he believes the opposition is now convinced.

Speculation continues, however, on whether the administration faction might institute court action to test Fraser's eligibility for office. A front page article in the Jacksonville Journal suggested that Fraser is barred constitutionally from holding the office because he was a member of the 1945 legislature which raised the comptroller's salary from \$1500 to \$9000 a year.

Fraser, however, said the newspaper report is political propaganda. He contended there is a "saving clause" in the 1945 act which would permit him to hold the office at the old salary of \$7500.

Goering Fifth Nazi To Take Own Life

NUERNBERG, Oct. 16, (AP)—The great international mystery started by the mysterious suicide of Hermann Goering recalls that the fat ex-Reichsmarschall slain other fancy Hitler in the fifth key Nazi to take his own life to escape Allied justice.

The infamous list is topped by Adolf Hitler, who is believed to have put a fatal bullet in his head as Berlin fell in May, 1945.

Former Nazi Propaganda Minister Joseph Goebbels died by his own hand at about the same time as Hitler—and he died the Goering, by swallowing cyanide. Gustave Chlot Benoit Stummel crashed a syndicate deal in his teeth after the British captured him—also in May, 1945.

The former Nazi labor boss—Robert Ley—hanged himself in the Nuremberg jail a year ago but before the start of the International War Crimes trial.

Three Notes Left In Cell By Goering

Officials Refuse To Divulge Contents; Dozen German Prison Workers Held

NUREMBERG, Oct. 17. (AP)—The Allied Control Council's commission which conducted the execution of the ten Nazi leaders disclosed today that it had translations of the three notes Hermann Goering wrote and left in his cell before he cheated the hangman. The commission, however, refused to divulge the contents. Meanwhile, the three-man Army board investigating the suicide of Goering surrounded itself today with a barrier of security and refused to make any information available to the public as to how the former Reichsmarschal obtained the cyanide and placed the vial in his mouth undetected.

Twelve German prison employees were being questioned today in connection with the mystery. Although not under arrest, they are being "protectively held." They will be kept under constant scrutiny until cleared of all possible complicity.

An answer to the mystery was suggested today in a dispatch from Nuremberg by one of the eight Allied correspondents who was in on those last fatal hours. The newsman had been taken on a tour of the death row in Nuremberg prison shortly before the executions were to start and there was considerable commotion with the correspondent peering into the small iron-barred portholes of each of the condemned men's cells.

They saw Goering lying in bed — one arm outstretched over the Army blanket which covered him; the other folded over his chest with the flat closed. Perhaps in that final moment, the potassium cyanide, the common cause of the visitors may have served to tip off Goering that the hour of his doom was almost at hand. It is possible that in those final moments, that the G. I. guarding Goering's cell turned his head. It was only human for him to turn around to see what the star was all about — that the Nazi crown prince slipped the deadly vial into his mouth.

The big mistake, says the American correspondent, was that the newsman were taken through the condemned block in a body. It might have, turned out differently, he suggests, if the correspondents had been taken through one or two at a time.

Goering's suicide was still the major news in Nuremberg, although many sensational rumors circulated about the prison. One of these was that the ring-leaders of Adolf Hitler's Nazi state have been buried at sea. An earlier rumor had them in unmarked graves. There are some additional viewpoints: A barber said Americans gave Goering the poison. A laundress said the poison was slipped into the prison in a bar of soap. "Astray dolls" actually were hanged and the real Nazis are alive somewhere — despite the fact that many witnesses saw the executions. Meanwhile, British newspapers charged that American military authorities had "gagged" newsmen and bungled the handling of news in connection with the suicide of Goering and the hangings. The charges drew a sharp reply from American military Government public relations officers today, who said the coverage of the hangings was a fair-power arrangement.

Final Rites Held For Former Resident

Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock at the Seattle Funeral Home in New Smyrna for William James Griffin, 54, who was found dead in his home there yesterday morning. He is reported to have been dead about 15 minutes when his body was found. The Rev. J. Alvin Inman, pastor of the First Baptist Church there officiated and burial was made in Edgewater Cemetery.

Mr. Griffin was born Oct. 11, 1892 in Sanford and had lived in New Smyrna Beach since 1922. He has been a railroad conductor for 27 years, and was a member of the Order of Railroad Conductors. Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Pauline Griffin; one son, Billy; one daughter, Betty; three sisters, Mrs. Margaret Locke and Mrs. Edwina Handy, both of Sanford; and Mrs. Lamar Mace of Globe, Ariz.; one brother, Douglas C. Griffin of Hendersonville, N. C.

Local Meat Supply Increases With Practically No Advance In Prices

Wilson Reveals Sharp Advances In Cattle Prices

Lifting Of Controls Came Too Late To Affect Offerings

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 17. (Special)—A report received in my office this morning from the Aradita State Livestock Market shows sharp advances in prices all along the line, for cattle handled yesterday in the first sale following President Truman's announcement of the removal of controls, said William L. Wilson, director of Florida State Farmers' Markets, today. "The sale on Tuesday was the first held on the Aradita market for two weeks due to a cancellation last week on account of storm conditions then existing over much of the peninsula."

"The President's announcement of Monday night, he declared, 'came too late to affect volume of offerings on this week's sale. It was being handled as compared with 270 for the first sale in October. Gross receipts however, totaled \$12,108.65, as compared with \$9,828.20, two weeks ago. It should be noted that this gross figure is not accurate as a yardstick for advance since the numbers of animals sold in the various classifications was naturally different, in the two sales. The best indicator of advance is in a comparison by classifications. Price ranges were: Calves, \$9.40 to \$19.50 per hundred pounds this week, and \$6 to \$13.40 two weeks ago; yearlings, \$9.50 to \$13.30 this week, \$9.00 to \$11.50 two weeks ago; heifers, \$7.70 to \$14.10 this week, \$6.50 to \$10.10 two weeks ago; cows, \$7.00 to \$15.10 this week, \$7.50 to \$12.20 two weeks ago; steers, \$10.50 to \$14.10 this week, \$8.70 to \$12.20 two weeks ago; bulls, \$10.90 to \$15.50 this week, \$8.00 to \$10.40 two weeks ago."

"Market Manager John D. Kelly advised me this morning that producers and buyers were very grateful and happy for the lifting of OPA controls off meat. Buyers and producers did not have time to gather cattle for this week's sale. We expect a good sale next Tuesday."

"Manager Kelly, veteran head of this largest unit among State-operated livestock markets, today gave this comment: 'Meat has been the cheapest food on the market for several years and the above prices should work higher in the next couple of weeks to get in line with wages and other commodities. After serving as ringmaster and manager of the Aradita market for the last eight years, he has the producers of cattle in this district got the first break in their favor at the sale here this week that they have had in five years.'
