



"Did you ever hear of anyone having as much trouble as I have had?", a friend of ours said to us the other day.

We have known men who have worked hard all their ives, saved their money, invested it conservatively, and then went bankrupted in their old age to spend their declining years at a poor farm. We have known men who have been driven almost crazy by nagging wives, and wives who have committed suicide because of cruel and inconsiderate husbands.

The world is full of people like that.

We have known young men who have lost a leg in a railroad wreck. We have seen boys who lost the sight of both eyes in fireworks' accidents. We have seen strong, vigorous young men with a whole world of opportunity before them made helpless invalids by the ravages of tuber-
