Smith has also filed a protest against the court's decision, claiming that there is a witness problem in the case. McClelland, the prosecutor, has promised to bring Gracy to court to testify in his own defense.

And there are some people for whom the worst troubles they ever had were worrying about the things that never happened.

Who are we to say that they are not as much to be pitied as the man who lost a leg in the war, or the banker whose bank was bankrupted?

Even men of great wealth have their troubles. There is J. P. Morgan, the ogre-eyed monster of high finance, who even today, lies stricken in his magnificent Long Island estate, the victim of paralysis.

Troubles! Of course, our friend has had his troubles. But so has everybody else.

Linotype's Birthday

Celebrating the recent birthday of the linotype machine, the Miami Herald recounts something of the invention of this machine and its development.

"The linotype, with a keyboard somewhat resembling that of a typewriter," the Miami Herald explains, "sets type by mechanical means instead of the old hand-set method."

"As is customary with the new, the printers of those days opposed the linotype, feared it would supplant them. But, instead of reducing the demands for workers in the printing trades, it had the opposite effect in bringing about a wide expansion in newspapers, magazines, books and all publications."

"The creation of the Mergenthaler machine is ranked second only in importance to Gutenberg's invention of movable types, about 1450 A. D. Thus more than 400 years elapsed before the next great improvement came in printing, an art, a profession, a trade, industry and business."

LABOR AND EFFORT

It is true that modern civilization has taken immense burdens off our voluntary muscles only to place them on our nerves and heart; keeps on saving labor and increasing effort, sparing sinews and spilling with fatigue the gray matter that resides not only in the brain but in its lines of communication throughout the body?

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There are many who work themselves to death from mere inability to restrain the passion for work, which masters them as the craving for drink masters a drunkard. Overwork in these cases is as immoral as overeating or drinking. This, so far as the individual is concerned. With course, revolt and lie down and sleep when tired or exhausted; in fact, they can develop an extraordinary and perverse persistence in effort when overfatigued; a kind of manic energy not so different in kind to the madman's. Shriveled Grain Held Total Loss By Eyewitness

Minnesota And Wisconsin Corn Rolling Up In Leaf; It's All

EN ROUTE TO THE DAKOTA DROUGHT AREA. July 18.—A spatter of rain fell near Minot, N. D. last night and lifted the hearts of men and women who have suffered almost beyond endurance from the drought.

On the way north and west into the brown wastes of the Dakotas, it became increasingly apparent that there was much more at stake in this crisis than crops and cattle. The morale of the people is threatened.

The news came racing down the burning prairies that, rain—except if it was only a pitiful two-tenths of an inch—had at last broken through the blazing sun. No one was optimistic enough to believe that such a shower would save the burned crops, but it did lift part of the woe from the minds and hearts of people who try to win a living from this stubborn soil.

Hope came from another source too. The weary farmers received word from Washington that the W. P. A. hoped within the next few hours to have relief for at least 25,000 of them. The relief will come in the form of jobs, for which the farmers will receive the regular W. P. A. pay, enough they hope, to keep them and their families from starving.

Through Wisconsin and Minnesota to the fields look wasted. The corn leaves are rolling up, white at their tips. The small grains are shriveled and worthless, even for pasture.

In Minneapolis, G. A. Trivett, state commissioner of agriculture for Minnesota, said:

"It would take more than a rainfall to save the small grains—nothing short of a miracle could do that. The only crop for which there is the slightest hope now is corn. Up until now the corn has thrived on the unseasonal heat, but from here on out it must have soaking rains, regularly, to produce a yield halfway normal."

Tom Moodie, North Dakota W. P. A. administrator, sent these gloomy words across the state:

"Until you have made a personal survey of the situation you will not believe it. The parched earth is cracked every few steps with cracks large enough to bury a cat."

"What cattle we have left up here are lean and lanky. Their ribs bulge out, and their backs are arched. These poor animals can't be kept alive."

Minnesota was fighting grasshoppers, and state entomologists say they hoped to keep the scourge under control through prompt action.

"We may have a corn crop yet," said Paul Kirk, federal crop statistician for Minnesota. "However, the situation is changing so rapidly that it may be necessary for us to issue a semi-monthly report instead of one each month."

Townsend May Join Lemke's Movement

DENVER, July 18.—(AP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend said yesterday his movement may effect a coalition with Rep. William Lemke's union party and the forces of the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, who has endorsed the Lemke organization.

"If they will join our pension plan, we will go along together," said the old age pension plan leader.

Dr. Townsend was accompanied by the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith, leader in the "share-the-wealth" movement launched by the late Senator Huey Long.

"Disatisfied group, headed by Dr. Townsend, Fisher, Coughlin, Lemke and myself, will control at least 215 of the 435 votes in the House of Representatives during the next Congress," Smith said.

J.P. Morgan Planning Voyage On Atlantic

NEW YORK, July 18.—(AP)—Only his doctors stand between J. P. Morgan and his first trans-Atlantic voyage in three years.

America's almost legendary titan of finance is taking all orders from his doctors but sources close to him indicated he was optimistic over getting a favorable answer within a week or two.

Morgan's wish is to reach the British channel in his yacht Corsair at least a week in advance of the opening of the grouse shooting season in Scotland, Aug. 12. Well informed sources made clear the voyage to Europe is virtually certain if the doctors approve.

Morgan is rapidly recovering from an attack of neuritis.

Inflation Danger Pictured As Blanketing U. S.

Capital Labor Unite In Strong Appeal For Sound Money

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va., July 10.—The dangers of inflation of the currency, and the toll which it would take from every one, irrespective of whether he be an investor, business man or laborer, were pictured here at the opening of the tenth annual conference of the Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Virginia.

Orrin G. Wood, president of the Investment Bankers Association, and Matthew Wolf, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, opened the discussion before the session of the conference which will be devoted this week to current problems of business and finance. This section is sponsored this year for the first time by the New York Stock Exchange.

While representing the supposedly conflicting interests of capital and labor, Mr. Wood and Mr. Wolf were united in their plea for sound currency, and in their description of forces which are maneuvering us into a position where inflation will be the outcome.

So long as we run along with an unbalanced budget, with debts increasing and taxation wholly unadjusted, we know something of what the day of reckoning will bring, Mr. Wolf declared. To argue, as it is argued in some quarters, that it is impossible to reduce expenses so long as we have 11,000,000 unemployed, begs the question, he said.

We have the authoritative statement of the Comptroller General of the United States who, speaking out of his sixteen years as "watchdog of the Treasury," reports the colossal wastes which have gone on and the uncounted fiscal policies which are involved in much of the emergency undertakings, the speaker said.

Mr. Wood declared that the most realistic cause of the fear of inflation is the present state of our federal finances. It is not only the deficits and the increasing debt which cause concern, but the method of functioning used by the government, he said.

ply funds to cover the government deficit were sold to investors, no increase in the circulating medium would take place, and the absorption of investment funds would gradually bring pressure through higher rates of interest.

When, however, the government sells bonds to a commercial bank, that bank gives the government credit by the way of a deposit, and there is thus created in addition to the deposit circulating medium of the country, which will continue until the bond is eventually paid by the government.

"There is one step in advance of this; if the bonds are bought by a Federal Reserve bank there will have been created additional reserves for the member banks, which will form the base for an increase in deposit money of ten times the amount of the purchase.

"Both these operations, therefore, are of a definitely inflationary nature—the creation of an addition to the purchasing medium having no relation to the production and exchange of goods and services."

You can't convince the market that the Detroit Tigers are out of the running. He still is sold on the idea that the Tigers will be up there when the teams straighten out for the home-stretch dash. This, despite the fact that the Detroit team, winner of two pennants and a world championship, this summer suffered all sorts of bad breaks after two seasons of what amounted to a charmed existence—most entirely free from injuries.

But the Tigers' luck finally changed. Maybe it was simply the law of averages catching up with them, or perhaps Lady Luck, fickle female that she is, refused to favor Detroit any longer and turned to other contenders. At any rate, most of the luck the Tigers of 1936 have had has been bad.

After taking part in a dozen games, big Hank Greenberg suffered a fracture of the left wrist—the same one he injured shortly before the World Series last fall. Then Mickey Cochrane, spark-plug of the outfit, had a nervous breakdown. Alvin Crowder, the veteran hurler, went on the voluntary retired list when he developed a sore arm and his services were lost to the team. Schoolboy Rowe had his trouble getting started and valuable ground was lost.

Yet, despite the loss of key players and the fiery manager, Del is keeping his chin up and carrying on for Mickey. He still thinks that the Tigers are the equal of any other team in the American League, and that goes for the first-place Yankees, too.

Rowe's 2-hit game against the Philadelphia Athletics helped buoy up Baker's spirit. And now that Simmons has found his batting eye with a vengeance, the Tigers, he thinks, are headed for happier days.

The veteran Detroit coach, who took over the reins when Cochrane was forced out, is certain that the Tigers have had more than their share of bad breaks and are due for some good ones. There is still time he feels, to come back and make up lost ground. The race is only half run, with the toughest part of the grind still ahead. His advice to followers of the national pastime is: "Don't sell the Tigers short."
