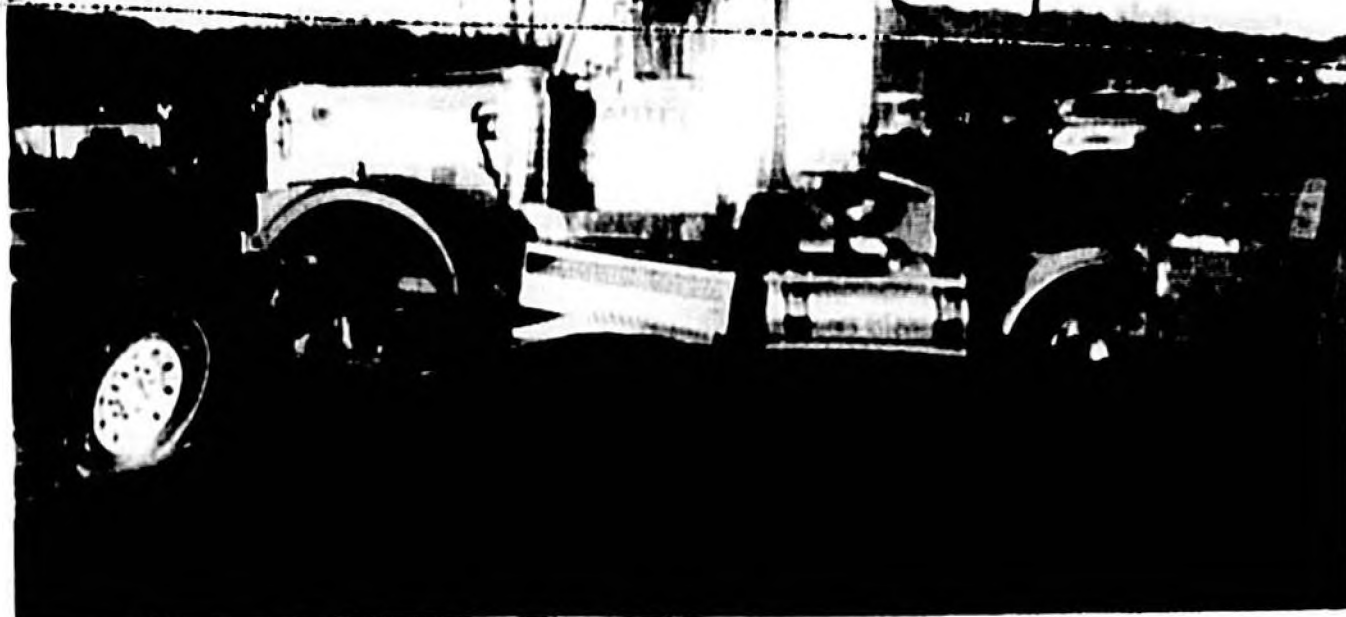

Seniors warned about Canadian Lottery scam

SANFORD — The Seminole County sheriff's Economic Crimes Unit is looking into the apparent scam of an 80-year-old Sanford woman. A safety alert has been issued throughout the area by Sheriff Don Eslinger, expressing caution about being notified of winning the Canadian Lottery. "In the past few weeks, individuals have been contacting senior residents in Seminole County," the

sheriff says. "These persons are claiming that the residents have won the Canadian Lottery with millions of dollars waiting to be claimed. Don't become the next victim of this scam," it says. The situation came to light recently when it was learned a Seminole County woman had been lured out of as much as \$32,000 since last September. Sheriff's spokesman Ed McDonough explained that the woman has sent money for various reasons to three companies, all

Travelers beware of free vacation offers

Florida Agriculture and Consumer Services Commissioner Bob Crawford is cautioning consumers to thoroughly investigate any vacation travel offers before signing up. "There are no totally 'free' vacation offers, so consumers should understand exactly what is included in any travel certificate or vacation plan they may

be offered by telephone or through the mail," Crawford said. In another ploy to sell vacation plans, some vendors are sending unsolicited faxes to businesses, making it appear to employees that the offers are approved by the company in which they are employed. Those faxes violate Florida law if sent interstate, and federal law if sent interstate.

Is the state song offensive?

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's official state song, Stephen Foster's "Old Folks at Home," known as "Swanee River," has hit a sour note with some lawmakers, who say it is racially offensive and should be scrapped.

The song was written in 1851 in dialect by Stephen Foster — a native of Pittsburgh who never set foot in Florida — and contains a reference to "darkeys."

"If it is written in dialect, then that is offensive to me and offensive to many people in this state," said Rep. Les Miller, D-Tampa. "I can guarantee I'll be leading the effort to change this."

"There's nothing offensive about the song," said Sen. Charles Williams, D-Live Oak, adding it "is part of Florida's history."

"We have a lot of pressing issues in the state," said Rep. Randy Mackey, D-Lake City.

"Why bring up something that's divisive?"

Earlier this week, Virginia moved to ditch its song, "Carry Me Back to Old Virginia," because of similar problems.

Rep. Willie Logan, D-Opa-locka, is crafting legislation that would retire Florida's song and replace it with one selected or written by Florida schoolchildren.

"This song does bring some concern," he said.

Logan said he plans to meet with Gov. Lawton Chiles and Secretary of State Sandra Morham in hopes of getting their support.

A spokesman for Morham, whose Cabinet role includes overseeing cultural and historical matters, said she had not seen the proposal and would not comment.

But Chiles spokeswoman April Herrie said, "It certainly is a song that, when you look at it, seems pretty dated."

Adopted as the official state

song by the 1835 Florida Legislature, it is performed at governors' inaugurations and other state events. The composition fondly recalls life on "de old plantation" and the friendly sounds of "de banjo strumm-

ing." Since the new Capitol building was dedicated in 1978, Foster's line, "Oh, darkeys, how my heart grows weary," has been changed to "Oh, brothers, how my heart grows weary."

The first verse and chorus of Florida's state song, Stephen Foster's "Old Folks at Home," known as "Swanee River":

Way down upon de Swanee Ribber,
Far, far away,
Dere's wha my heart is turning ebbin'
Dere's wha de old folks stay,
All up and down de whole creation
Sadly I roam,
Still longing for de old plantation,
And for de old folks at home.

All de world am sad and dreary,
Ebrywhere I roam;
Oh, darkeys, how my heart grows weary,
Far from de old folks at home.

Crossbow brings down burglar

TAMPA — After his shop was broken into twice this week, Claude Gates decided to take precautions.

He didn't rely on police or buy a gun — he took up a crossbow with a 50-pound draw.

Gates and the employees of CHG Engineering, a chrome plating business, stood in the shadows armed with crossbows, waiting for the burglar.

Tuesday night, they say they got him.

"I'm not an archer," Gates said, adding he had not touched a bow in years but didn't want to use a gun because it could be turned against him in a struggle. "A gun in the heat of battle ... can do more damage."

Gates, who was inside the store, said he saw a man ride a bicycle up to his business, dismount and proceed to rob the place.

The 50-year-old said he ordered the intruder to stay still, to no avail, and was forced to use his weapon. He let fly two razor-edged arrows.

One struck the intruder's side and went through, and the other lodged in his buttocks.

The case has been turned over to the Hillsborough State Attorney's office to determine if Gates should be charged, said police spokesman Steve Cole.

Meanwhile, police arrested Shon Penalver, 46, on suspicion of breaking into Gates' business.

Penalver, who had outstanding warrants for burglary, grand theft and possession of burglary tools, was released from Tampa General Hospital Wednesday and now faces burglary and grand theft charges.

Gates said he used to have guns for target shooting, but they were all stolen from his home in 1965, along with stereo equipment.

His company also has been burglarized many times in the past; Gates estimated \$30,000 worth of merchandise has been taken since he went into business 10 years ago.

Cig tax lights Republican fire

TALLAHASSEE — Whenever someone brings up Gov. Lawton Chiles' proposal to tax smoking, he draws Republican fire.

Higher cigarette taxes in Florida could breed bootlegging and be bad for business at stores near the state's border, a Republican leader told a legislative budget workshop Thursday.

"We are uniquely in a position where the cigarette tax could hurt us," said Rep. Tom Feeney, R-Oviedo, one of House Speaker Daniel Webster's top advisors.

Republicans have tried to snuff the Democratic governor's most visible tax proposal since he outlined his \$42 billion state budget request for the next fiscal year.

Chiles' budget director, Bob Bradley, said he included the potential change in cigarette buying habits in his calculations.

Floridians pay 58 cents a pack in state and federal cigarette taxes. Chiles wants to raise the state's 34 cents to 44 cents.

That would tie Florida with Illinois, North Dakota, Vermont and Wisconsin for 11th highest state cigarette taxes. Washington's 82.5 cents leads the nation.

Florida, just above the national average of 33.2 cents, and ranks 24th nationally.

Chiles said a 10-cent increase would raise \$121 million, and most of that would be spent on programs to try to prevent youths from starting to smoke.

The governor's budget writers considered "elasticity" — the tendency for people to change buying habits if prices rise — as part of their \$121 million revenue estimate, Bradley said.

As soon as Chiles made the proposal, Webster, R-Orlando, said the first Republican-controlled House since 1874 wasn't about to start by approving a new tax of that magnitude.

Legislative committees are hearing spending requests from Chiles and state agencies prior to the start of the regular session March 4. Feeney, Webster's liaison to seven House "councils" that decide where and when legislation gets introduced, questioned Bradley as he described the governor's budget to the Fiscal Responsibility Council.

If the tax causes North Floridians to drive three or four miles across the border to get cheaper cigarettes, they may also buy gas and groceries in neighboring states, hurting stores along the border, Feeney said.

Even away from the border, he said, "People who are heavy smokers but live in Orlando and make one trip a year up north, they are going to stock up on cheaper cigarettes."

"People coming south will bring a couple of hundred dollars worth of cigarettes to sell to friends," he added.

Bradley said cigarette taxes in Florida would still be lower than in many states, but Feeney called that response "a little mischievous."

"The people we are competing with are Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi," he said, and the 44 cents would far exceed Georgia's 12 cents, Alabama's 16.5 cents and Mississippi's 16 cents.

Cops shoot women after chase through 2 counties

JONESBORO, Ga. — A woman who allegedly told a hitchhiker she was going to Atlanta to kill somebody was shot and killed by police after a chase through two counties ended in gunfire.

The woman led officers on a 20-mile chase along Interstate 675 and spun into a Clayton County patrol car Thursday night, said Clayton County police Capt. Doug Jewett.

He said she was shot in the head after she fired a pistol at a state trooper and three Clayton County officers when her car wrecked just north of the Anvil Block Road exit in Clayton County. Jewett said it was not immediately known who fired the fatal shot.

The woman was not

identified early today.

The chase began at a gas station in Henry County, about 23 miles south of Atlanta at Locust Grove. A man who had been a passenger in the woman's car flagged down a Henry County deputy sheriff and said she had a semiautomatic pistol in her car, Jewett said.

"He said she was acting crazy and threatening him and waving around a pistol and saying she was on her way to Atlanta to kill somebody," Jewett said.

The deputy chased her white Toyota Tercel onto I-75 to I-675 where she crossed into Clayton County. At one point when the deputy pulled alongside, she fired two shots at his car, Jewett said.

Judge steps down after visiting young victim

TAMPA — Saying he could no longer remain fair and impartial, a judge removed himself from the case of a severely abused toddler he had returned to his parents.

The parents, Tammy Lynn Kidder, 21, and Eric Van Webb Shumpert, 20, are charged with willful torture and aggravated child abuse of the 2-year-old.

Circuit Judge Gregory Holder visited the boy in the hospital where he was recuperating from abdominal bruises, burns and a bald spot on his head.

"My visit to this child last Friday night will ultimately preclude my further involvement in this case," Holder said Thursday, canceling a hearing to find out what happened.

"I will take no further action in this case. There is no way I could be fair and impartial," he said.

The parents lost custody after the child suffered a broken leg and wound up in a body cast in

October 1984. Police suspected abuse at the time but couldn't prove it.

On Jan. 15, Holder ordered the boy returned to his parents on advice of an attorney with the state's Department of Children and Families, despite opposition from the toddler's foster mother and a court-appointed guardian who warned he would not be safe.

On Thursday, during a passionate speech, Holder held up Shumpert's juvenile file, more than an inch thick.

"Just this morning, I did discover that there was a criminal file on Eric Shumpert — a juvenile file — a file that I was completely unaware of," Holder said as he withdrew from the case at the request of Shumpert's attorney.

Gov. Lawton Chiles was asked about the case during a Tampa outing to raise adoption awareness.

Leisure time: At the movies; Star Wars, 20th anniversary

I fell asleep during my first viewing of "Star Wars". I was 6 years old and suffered insomnia the night before due to anticipation of getting to see the film the next day. Near the end, during the awards ceremony sequence, I began to doze off while my father gently nudged me awake. It seemed so long, long ago in a galaxy far, far away....

Movies today do not leave such a lasting impression on me as the "Star Wars" trilogy did in the late 70's and early 80's. "Star Wars" has been called the single most influential movie behind "Gone with the Wind" and "The Godfather". Generations after would have to settle watching the trilogy via the small screen... until now.

Marking the 20th anniversary of "Star Wars", creator George

Lucas and 20th Century Fox are releasing "Star Wars -- The Special Edition" which opens in Central Florida today. The sequels, "Empire Strikes Back" and "Return of the Jedi", will follow on February 21 and March 7 respectively.

What is so "special" about the "Special Edition"? Lucas -- even though the films did better than he could possibly have imagined -- never was able, financially and resourcefully, to make the "Star Wars" he had originally intended. Lucas wanted to introduce Jabba the Hutt, for example, in the first film, but, aside from references to the character, moviegoers had to wait 6 years between "Star Wars" and "Jedi" to actually see who Jabba was.

Not this time. -- A digitally computerized Jabba slithers his way into "Star Wars" in a revamped scene Lucas shot during the filming of the movie.

Jabba was supposed to be human but Lucas later decided against it; yet he had no time or money to implant a creature in, so the sequence was cut altogether. In "Special Edition", Lucas takes the old shot and through computer generated magic, takes live actors from the present plus one digitized Hutt and inserts them into the old footage. From early trailers, the scene is worth the price of admission alone.

Lucas is also able, with help from his special effects company Industrial Light and Magic, to improve some visuals, clean up the original cells and other surprises I wish to withhold so that you can experience the delight yourself. The two sequels are also refitted with additional scenes and better effects and sound.

"The phone has been ringing off the hook," said David Schofill, manager at United

Artists Seminole Town Center Cinema 10. "It's incredible! We have more calls for 'Star Wars' tickets than we had for the opening of 'Independence Day'." According to Schofill, "Independence Day" showed in four of Town Center's theaters, but due to the distribution of "Star Wars" each host theater -- including Seminole Town Center -- will have just one print. "Managers [from other United Artists theaters] have been begging for more than one print," said Schofill. Schofill said he would take his five-year-old son to see the films. "It was a big thing for me when I was a kid," said Schofill.

Regal Cinema Lake Mary Cinema 10 has also been inundated with calls for reserve seating. "We're very excited," said Robbie Youngman, manager at the theater. "I've personally been looking for-

ward to this for a long time!," Youngman said that he expected each showing this weekend to be sold out. Youngman also urges moviegoers to get tickets quickly.

In addition to national campaigns through Pepsi, Taco Bell and Frito Lay, local area stores are also feeling "the envy you." The "Special Edition" trilogy, as 20th Century Fox advertises put it best, is three reasons why movie theaters were built. Now go young Jedi and see the movies.... It is your destiny!

This re-release of the "Star Wars" films is not just an event, it is the continuation of a phenomenon. Now the next generation will be able to experience these treasures as they were meant to be seen. If it is your first time seeing these "timeless" classics, I envy you. SCC teacher resigns after students complain

Seminole Community College Executive President E. Ann McGee confirmed Thursday the resignation of adjunct instructor William Clayton.

However, his termination will not go into effect until the end of the present term in April, McGee said. "He has been reassigned with duties outside the classroom."

According to McGee and Director of Health and Technologies Angela Kersanbrock, Clayton will remain on campus for the remainder of his employment.

Clayton, who resigned Wednesday according to McGee and Kersanbrock, was the center of a college investigation this week. Allegations came from six nursing students claiming he assaulted one female classmate by pushing her during a class exercise demonstrating the use of a vest to restrain patients in a hospital bed. He also allegedly directed inappropriate comments at two others during a Jan. 23 Certified Nursing Assistant lab examination.

Kersanbrock confirmed Friday morning that she and Culp interviewed Clayton Tuesday, on Wednesday, she received his letter of resignation, she said.

Clayton was suspended on Tuesday pending the outcome of that investigation, according to SCC public information coordinator Craig Orseno and Kersanbrock.

He has been employed by the

college as a nursing and allied health instructor since August of 1991, according to college personnel records. Clayton also was on call to teach in various laboratories, which include health care and

Campaign reform

LIKE IN most years, the Florida Legislature will again consider proposals to "clean up" political campaigns. Both Gov. Lawton Chiles and Secretary of State Sandra Mortham have proposed sweeping packages that try to force candidates to take responsibility for advertisements circulated on their behalf as well as to limit so-called "independent expenditures": spending done on behalf of a candidate without consultation with that candidate.

They apparently have come up with nine people who will fight it; the U.S. Supreme Court justices.

Michael Cochran, assistant general counsel in the state Division of Elections said that the problem is that the U.S. Supreme Court has basically equated the use of money in political campaigns with the exercise of free speech.

We can't disagree with that concept. Anyone giving large amounts of money to a political campaign is generally telling the political candidate, "I'm giving you money, now you do whatever I want you to do." That's certainly free speech, although it isn't exactly what the general public should like.

Chiles' 10-point plan would, among other things, force outside political groups who spend money on a particular race to give candidates 14 days notice as well as provide them with copies or scripts of the advertisement.

Currently, the spending party must give just 24-hour warning of the expenditure and doesn't have to reveal the content of the ad.

We believe this state is in dire need of election reform, and hope it would carry over to the local area as well.

Candidates should be aware of, and be accountable for what their supporters do, and have full knowledge of campaign advertising. The oft-used excuse of "I didn't do it, one of my supporters may have done it," shouldn't hold any more.

Unfortunately, it appears as though any attempt to bring about election reform, at least here in Florida, will be a fight against the court which is impossible to win.

Black art every day

WASHINGTON--Twenty years ago, you did not see black art every day.

So I will never forget stumbling, as a University of Michigan student, upon a street art show--a junky collection of framed posters, really. Browsing through works spread out on the grass, I stopped cold.

Peering from within a watercolor cloud of color was a woman--with caramel skin and a tousled Afro not unlike my own. Half-smiling, she would fold her arms modestly over her breasts. Mesmerized, I acted as if this cheap reproduction was a master's original, spending a "fortune"--\$20, I recall--to own.

I still have her. The picture reminds me of the warm recognition I felt that day, of how unusual it once was to behold beautiful, black art. Art I could hang rather than tape to the walls like my college-girl posters. Art that looked like me.

My, how things have changed.

Leroy Campbell can tell you how much. One of the most popular contemporary black artists, Campbell, a New Yorker who just 10 years ago was working as a hospital orderly, now sees his sweetly nostalgic paintings, collages and prints sold everywhere from mall frame shops to pricey galleries to--his best proof of success--the two-story Brooklyn gallery and publishing company he opened last fall.

Ironically, Campbell says, the African-American art boom that lets him and other nationally recognized talents such as William Tolliver, Brenda Joynt, Charles Bibba and Kathleen Wilson prosper is partly due to a TV hit: *The Cosby Show*.

"Here was a positive, middle-class family with the work of...black artists like Varnette Honeywood as a functioning part of their home," recalls Campbell, 40. "African-American viewers started taking their flowers and still lifes off the walls, to put up work that looked like them. In a sense, *Cosby* gave them permission to have black images in their homes."

Though a cast of collectors always supported pioneers like Elizabeth Catlett, Jacob Lawrence and local genius Lois Mailou Jones, other art lovers--who could not afford fine art or find decent copies--longed for choices beyond what Campbell describes as "80s art about struggle and rebellion."

They craved depictions of "family, commitment, doing things together--like Honeywood's famous painting of the girls getting their hair done," Campbell says. "We wanted in our homes, the one place we could control, to look at our walls and be recharged."

Suddenly, says Campbell, "publishing companies went crazy for black art." Print sales skyrocketed; some of today's most respected names--Paul Goodnight, Joe Holston and former pro football player Ernie Barnes--started thriving.

But as recently as six years ago, many stores and galleries featured black art only in February--Black History Month--says Tina Rahman, owner of Tina's Gallery in suburban Washington.

In 1992, Rahman was a homemaker searching for a creative outlet when her husband--surveying two costly paintings by European artists she'd brought for their Potomac home--asked, "With so many talented black artists, why not buy something reflecting your own culture?" But finding fine African-American art--not prints--remained a challenge.

She opened her own bright space offering contemporary fine art, about 75 percent of it by African-Americans, including gifted up-and-comers Michael Howard, Elizabeth Martinez and Grace Kiss. Rahman's biggest sale--\$50,000 for Campbell's original "Joe and Joe Neckbone Jr."--was to a Jordanian American woman who told Campbell it reminded her of her grandfather. "Art transcends race and culture," explains Rahman.

The increase in blacks buying fine black art has not begun to peak, says Gary, Ind., art dealer Cheryl Sutton. Thousands "who started with a poster...have progressed from limited-edition pieces to recognizing the tremendous investment value of one-of-a-kind pieces....We see it now as more than decoration....It can be an heirloom to pass on to our children."

Still, the black art market is like every other market--the best salesmen sell the most, says Barry Lester, owner of the hip Capitol Hill gallery Attitude Exact. "It's not talent but marketing that gets you the play," says Lester. "Nobody's as talented as (multimedia artists) Michael Brown or Michael Billups. But they don't have the marketing to be as big as a Tolliver. But they should be."

Though Lester, 34, decries consumers' "herd mentality," he is more worried about the artists. "With so much money to be made, some of the art I'm seeing now isn't so accomplished."

For Campbell--whose parents, like those of many artists, were less than thrilled about their son's early doodling--the black art boom reflects black people's expanding horizons.

"Now," says Campbell, who on Feb. 6-11 will exhibit at New York's Jacob Javits Center, "our children with the same doodling abilities are saying, realistically, that they want to become artists." He laughs.

"Though their parents are still afraid to hear it."

rotate. Florida Highway Patrol troopers shut that portion of the road down.

The accident occurred shortly before 5 p.m. when an unidentified small, light-green car cut off the truck as it was on the bridge, according to Florida Highway Patrol Trooper Mark Kuczynski.

Troopers redirected traffic to an alternate route via U.S. Highway 17-92.

The trucker, Raymond Howard Roach, 58, of Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., said he was driving in the inside lane and was forced to swerve when the car, driven by a woman, cut him off. Alone in his truck, he was not injured.

No other cars were involved, Kuczynski reported. "It's a wonder no one hurt you," he told Roach.

"Everything happened so fast," Roach recalled as a Seminole County hazardous materials recovery team cleaned up the small amount of diesel fuel that leaked from his truck. "My first worry was the oncoming traffic. When I realized no one was going to hit me, I undid my seatbelt and got out."

Roach said he simply walked back onto the side of the road and sat down, shocked and shaken. Another motorist called 911 from a cellular phone.

A 35-year trucking veteran, Roach is employed by Astec Transportation of Chattanooga, Tenn. He was heading to Daytona, he said, at the time of the accident. This was his first accident, he claimed.

Co-worker Ray Roberts, 42, said he was four cars behind Roach. Neither man remembered the license plate on the small car that allegedly cut the truck off.

"Some lady just cut right in front of him, and he had nowhere to go," Roberts said.

A sudden brush with death put Roach's priorities in order, he said. "When something like

this happens, it sure changes the whole way you look at your life and your family."

Yet Raymond insisted the accident would not force him into an early retirement. "Trucking is a tough way of life, but you can't let one thing like this stop you. Might as well get back behind the wheel and go again," Kuczynski reported the accident would be under investigation. He also said he would not charge Roach.

located in Canada. The companies have been identified as Central Distributors of Mount Royal, Lighthouse Direct International in Montreal, and Promotional Processing Services in Pointe Claire.

McDonough said last September the woman reported being contacted about purchasing authentic Roman coins. She eventually bought two of the coins for a total of \$9,806.

The following month, the woman was contacted again and told she had won \$3 million in the Canadian Lottery. However, the caller said she would have to pay \$15,000 in fees and taxes in order to get the money. The woman reportedly sent the \$15,000 as requested.

The third company which contacted the woman spoke about her winning a trip to Las Vegas.

In all, McDonough said the woman eventually cashed in her certificates of deposit (CDs) at a Sanford bank to make payments to what has now been identified as a scam. In all, she has reportedly paid approximately \$32,000 to the three Canadian

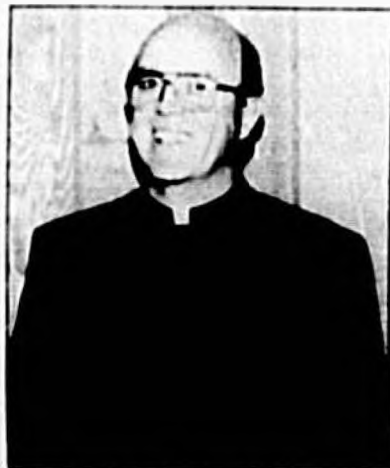


Parishioner recently gathered to put the final touches on plans for an upcoming mission. They have worked long and hard to offer this event to the public and to make it a success.

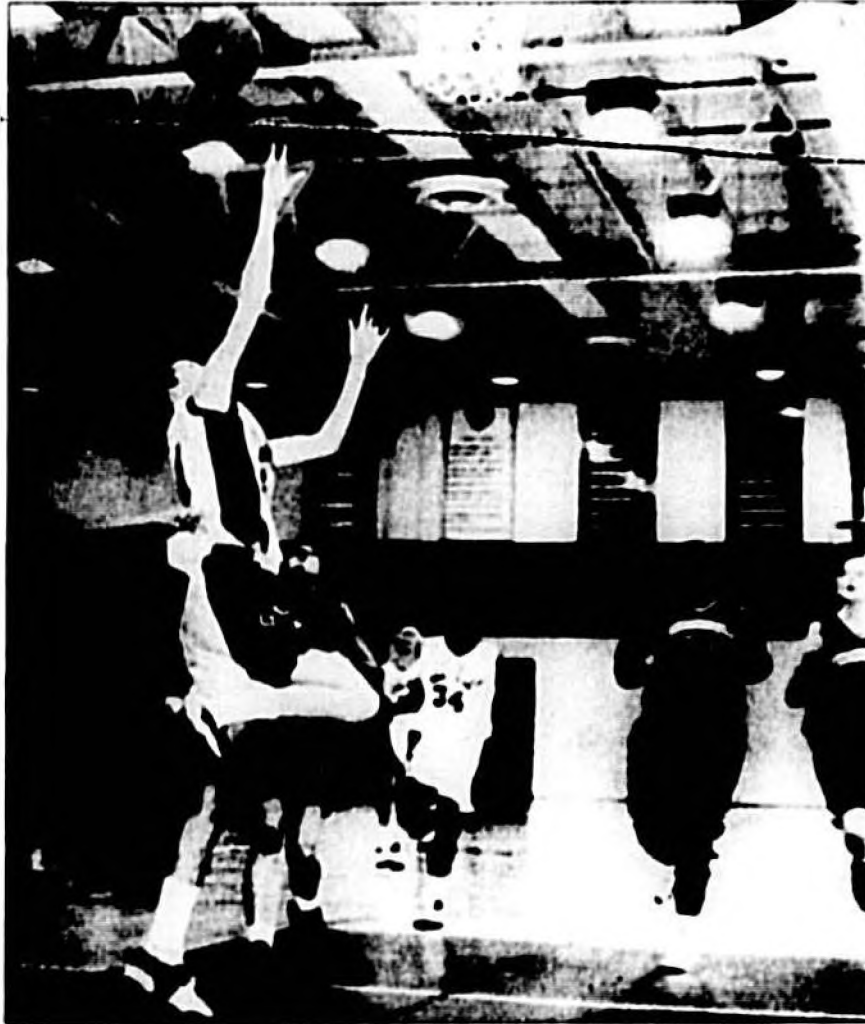
Medals will be awarded to the first Male and Female finisher in each division and all participants will receive a ribbon.

Dealing with post-holiday debt Settle on a budget and stick to it

Now that the holiday gift-giving season is over, millions of Americans are faced with paying the bills for presents and other seasonal expenses. For many, overzealous holiday spending may have pushed them into serious and troublesome financial situations, or aggravated existing indebtedness.

Early signs of dangerous personal financial trends include:

- Not paying bills on time, or skipping which to pay.
- Paying only the minimum on large credit card bills.
- Frequent overdrafts on checking account.
- Spending all income with no money going to savings.
- Being denied credit because of a bad credit report.

If one or more of the warning signs applies, consumers might consider the following guidelines for getting back on track:

- Determine exactly where the money is going. Draw up a budget and stick with it.
- When having problems making payments, contact creditors immediately about alternative, more manageable payment plans. Do not wait until the matter had been turned over to a collection agency, which might not be willing to negotiate.
- Check out companies offering debt consolidation loans carefully. Exorbitant

fees, high interest rates and inflated promises can aggravate debt and credit problems rather than ease them.

Beware of firms or individuals who offer to "clear up" negative data reported to credit bureaus. If the negative information is accurate, credit bureaus may report it for at least seven years. Bankruptcies may be reported for 10 years.

Avoid using credit cards. Pay off balances each month. If debt has accumulated, pay more than the minimum due each month, if possible.

Consumers who fall behind in paying creditors may be contacted by debt collectors. The Federal Fair Debt Collection Practices Act prohibits debt collectors from using harassing, oppressive or abusive tactics when attempting to collect owed

money. They cannot use false statements or engage in unfair practices in the performance of their work. Consumers who believe they are victims of unfair debt collection practices should contact the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services at 1-800-HELPFLA (1-800-435-7352) to file a complaint.

Those who feel they need more help in solving their debt and credit problems might consider contacting the nearest office of the Consumer Credit Counseling Service (CCCS). CCCS's are local, non-profit organizations, providing education and counseling on personal budgeting and the wise use of credit. Services are free or for a reasonable fee. The nearest CCCS office is in Altamonte Springs. Check the phone book white pages or call 1-800-388-CCCS (1-800-388-2227).

Donations made for others create uncharitable thoughts

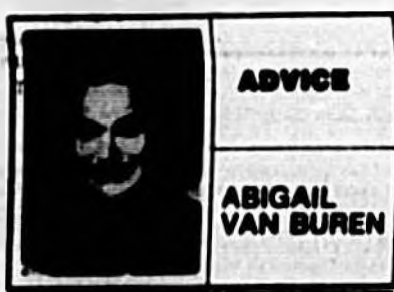

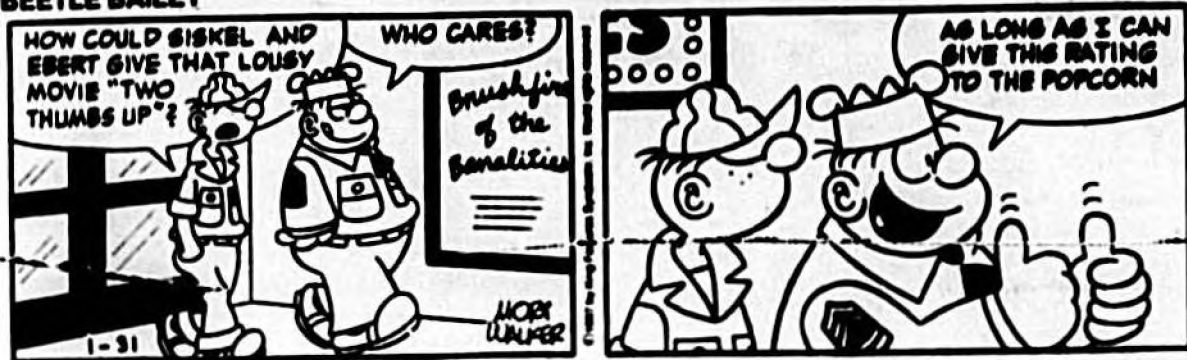

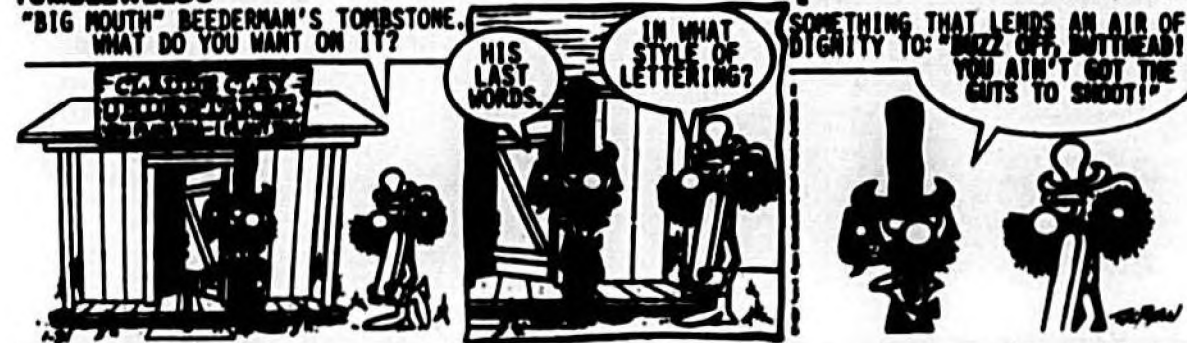

Is increased sex drive normal?

DEAR DR. GOTT: This letter is not a joke. I'm afraid that I have a terrible problem with sexual urges. I'm a 36-year-old married woman in a loving relationship. But my satisfaction is short-lived. I need sexual release and I need it often. My husband says that I expect more from him than he is capable of supplying. As a result, I find that I have to pleasure myself, sometimes as often as 20 times a day. Even so, I experience almost continuous sexual urges, a problem that I have struggled with for many years. I am extremely embarrassed to discuss this with my doctor and fear that I may be a nymphomaniac.

DEAR READER: There are many causes for increased libido (the desire to have sex). As you can imagine, there is tremendous variability in how often women (and, sometimes, men) feel sexual urges. Some people need sex only once a month; for others, two or three times a day isn't enough.

You appear to have a healthy sexual appetite, which makes me wonder if your orgasms are complete or if you remain "on the edge," despite your self-pleasuring. I honestly believe that you should discuss this with your family physician. It is conceivable that you could have a physical problem — such as an adrenal tumor — that may be over-stimulating you.

However, it's more likely that you are using sex as a method of relaxing and dealing with tension. Many "over-sexed" individuals engage in sexual activity in order to relieve stress. Once the stress-provoking issues have been addressed, the urges ordinarily dissipate. Your physician can guide and advise you.

I'd like to add that "nymphomania" is an archaic term that was once used to describe women who repeatedly engaged in sex but did not achieve orgasm. In a very real sense, they were using sex merely as a substitute for intimacy. Your pattern seems different, inasmuch as you appear to crave sexual release.

Remember that the medical concept of sexuality has drastically changed over the past few years. Your sexual behavior would be judged today only in terms of how it interferes with your normal life pattern.

For example, frequent masturbation is not harmful, providing it doesn't detract from your responsibilities and goals. In your case, I gather that your libido may be affecting you adversely; hence, my recommendation is that you take a deep breath and discuss the issue with your physician. I congratulate you for having the courage to write me and share such a personal concern.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 28-year-old daughter is scheduled to marry a man whose first wife died of AIDS from a contaminated blood transfusion. I

believe they had unprotected sex before she died. My daughter's fiancé had a negative HIV test right after his wife's death and again, about one year later, in conjunction with the marriage license. Nonetheless, we are worried because we have been told that AIDS may take up to 10 years to develop. Is this true?

DEAR READER: Based on the information you supply, I must conclude that your prospective son-in-law is free of the HIV virus, the cause of AIDS. I say this because he has had two negative blood tests a year apart, which indicate that he was not infected by his late wife. (He could, of course, be subsequently infected by another partner.)

In persons harboring the HIV virus, up to 10 years may elapse before the disease of AIDS becomes apparent. Thus, many HIV positive people are perfectly healthy for years. The rea-



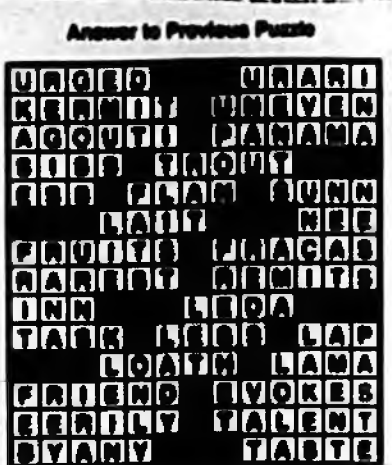

son for this is unknown.

Inasmuch as your daughter's fiancé is HIV negative, you can safely assume that he does not have AIDS, nor would he develop the disease 10 years later as a consequence of his previous marriage.

I advise you to have fun at the wedding, welcome your new son-in-law into the family and put your worries about AIDS aside.

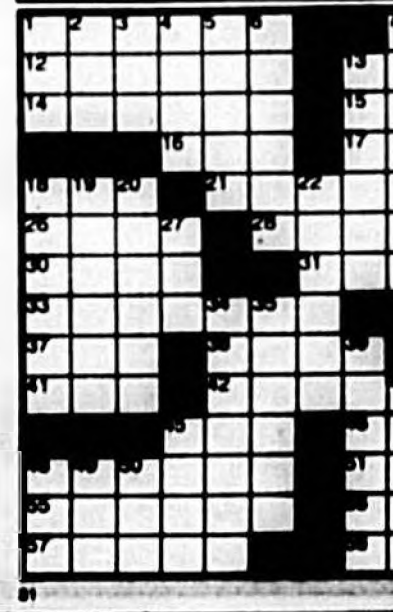

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In the pressure cooker

Frans Jenner, the non-playing captain of the Belgian team in the 1996 European Junior Championship, ruled that if any player made a small mistake, he would be fined 100 Belgian francs (about \$3.23). But if he made a bad mistake, he would be fined 200 francs. And as Jenner was the sole arbiter, you might have expected him to return home a wealthy man. The only snag was that none of the team wanted to play under such pressure!

On this deal, West found a great pressure lead. But first, how would you play in six clubs on a spade lead?

South's one-club opening wouldn't meet with universal approval. West made a weak jump overall that wouldn't please a purist — but there

are few of those left. North's four-spade splinter bid showed game values in clubs with at most one spade. After two cue-bids, South settled for six clubs.

On a spade lead, South ruffs, draws the trump, and plays three rounds of diamonds, ruffing the last in the dummy. He cashes dummy's heart ace, returns to hand with a trump, and leads a heart toward dummy's queen. He makes when West has the heart king or the singleton or doubleton jack, or when East has the singleton or doubleton king.

Here, though, Marijyn Leacher, from New Zealand, hit on a telling lead: the heart six. And as she did it without noticeable pause for thought, South was convinced it was a singleton. If it was, he had only one chance. He won with dummy's ace, played a trump to hand, and finessed dummy's diamond jack. However, East won with the queen, and the heart king in a moment split one down.
