

## STORM STRIKES FLORIDA HOLDING STATE IN GRIP FOR THIRTY-SIX HOURS

Barometer Went Lower Here Yesterday Than In Recent Years **BIG DAMAGE DONE** IS NOTED IN SANFORD SECTION -ELECTRIC LIGHTS AND POW-ER SHUT OFF TODAT

One of the worst storms that has truck Florida in the past ten years occurred yesterday when a gale hit the coasts and for thirty-six hours accompanied by a terrific wind and rain storm the state had troubles with wires being down and high water caused by the tides and rising of waters in the bays almost put several citles out of commission. All of 'the electric light globes and gas globes were blown off along the streets. The storm reached a velocity of 75 miles an hour and the barometer reached 28.81. It was the high wind blowing the high tides over the city of Tampa that caused most of the damage, putting the utilities plant out of commission and stopping all business. (By The Associated Press) JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 26 .---The hurricane passed to sea between St. Augustine and Titusville about midnight and is now moving up the Atlantic coast. Conductor Kelsey, of the Atlantic Coast Line train which left Tampa at 9:30 last night said he was in Port Tampa yesterday morning when the storm struck. He described the rising tide as a tidal wave. Port Tampa City was quickly under two to ten feet of water. Houses unroofed; the Coast Line phosphate terminals damaged. Ruther than have his train murooned at Port Tampa, he took it to Tampa during the day, with scores of Port Tampa residents. The lower portions of, Tampa was flooded. Stores in the Franklin street rotail district was under eighten inches of water, the power house was flooded at noon and all power cut off. When the train left Tampa last night the city was without lights, or car service. The wires the greater part of the distance to Jacksonville were down and the train felt its way and arrived on time this morning. Kelsey reported the storm left destruction everywhere in its wake. The Seaboard Airline trains from South Florida did not arrive here late this morning and the Coast Line train from St. Petercburg which has not been heard from since yesterday morning had not reached Leesburg at ten o'clock today. It is not known whether the train, which was due to leave St. Petersburg last night even started. The Western Union succeeded in establishing its wire to Plant City this morning accepting messages for Tampa subject to five or six hours delay. Reports from Lakeland and Plant City declare enormous damage to the orange crop in five countles in that section. Many towns last night without lights on account of shutting down of power houses when the wind threatened to break transmission lines, endangering pedestrians and other traffle.
