**TO SPEND MILLIONS IMMEDIATELY TO AID NATION'S UNEMPLOYED.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—Expenditure of millions of dollars will be authorized by municipalities within the next few weeks to aid in providing jobs for the nation's approximately 4,000,000 idle wage-earners, according to a statement issued by Col. Arthur Woods, head of the central agency of the National Unemployment conference.

Reports from the mayors of cities in all parts of the country, Colonel Woods said, indicate that prompt action has been taken to make effective the emergency measures recommended by the conference with the completion of plans for the improvement of the sanitary conditions of cities, construction and improvement of public works and assignment of additional men to street cleaning departments.

Colonel Woods announced that the Standard Oil Co., of New Jersey was preparing to re-employ about 5,000 on improvements. Among other reports of efforts to relieve the unemployment problem was one received by Colonel Woods from Savannah, Ga.

**BEER AND WINE FOR THE SICK A NEW RULING**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—As unexpected as a rain storm in a desert, regulations permitting the manufacture and use of beer for medicinal purposes were issued today by the treasury department.

Withheld since March 3 last, when former Attorney General Palmer held the use of beer as a medicine to be legal under the prohibition laws the issuance of the beer regulations came as a complete surprise to leaders of the dry forces who declared there had been an understanding with the treasury that the new rules should not be promulgated until the Senate had acted upon the pending anti-beer bill.

Issuance of the beer regulations will cause redoubled efforts to effect the passage of the anti-beer measures, Senate leaders declared, while Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel for the Anti-Saloon League, described the treasury's action as less defensible than at any other time.

Secretary Mellon, in announcing the issuance of the beer regulations, declared that "the legal right of the parties concerned being plain, the department is unable longer to delay the issuance of these regulations."

**CHAMBER OF COMMERCE NOTES**

Some of the materials for the new pavilion to be built under the auspices of the Tourist and Convention Committee of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce has been placed on the bulkhead. The heavy rains of the last few days have held up the work. The original plans of the committee were to have had this work completed by the first of November. The pavilion, when completed, will also serve as a band stand and arrangements have been made with the local band to give concerts twice a week beginning December first. An amount was provided for the band by the Board of Governors in the new budget and the music furnished should be an added feature for the entertainment of tourists wintering in Sanford.

The Lake Front Improvement Co. has agreed to the use of a portion of their property for quitoes and the usual outdoor recreations indulged in by visitors in other tourist cities of the state.

Tentative plans have been drawn up by the Tourist and Convention Committee and submitted to the City Commissioners providing for a drive way and sidewalk along the bulkhead which will connect Park and Palmetto avenues. The city, will, in all probability, erect a white way along the bulkhead and assurances have been given by the owners of the lake front property that they will erect six white way posts on Park avenue.

Negotiations are being carried on with the Clyde Line endeavoring to have that company defray the expenses of the erection of a white way on Palmetto ave.

Plans of the Tourist and Convention Committee are to have a parkway on the middle of both Park and Palmet-

to avenues and the white way for both these avenues to be placed in these parkways. The plans also provide for a 10-foot drive way on both sides of the parkways.

The beautification of our water front has long been neglected and it is certain that through the activities of the Tourist and Convention Committee of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, the much talked of improvements will materialize.

In order to assure those who are interested in a Golf Course for Sanford that something is being done, it might be stated that the committee appointed for this purpose will have a report of a definite nature to make in the very near future.

It is conceded that Sanford will never attain a reputation as a tourist resort until such time as we have a golf course. It will be recalled that President Harding, during his recent trip to Florida, stopped only at those places which have a golf course. The most influential men in the country play golf. It is their recreation and physical exercise. We can never hope to attract men of affluence to Sanford unless there are the same recreational facilities here as are offered by other progressive communities in Florida.

The ship by water movement which was inaugurated by the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, has already reached such proportions as to make the Clyde line officials begin the daily service earlier than intended. It will be recalled that Associated Press dispatches announced the congestion of freight in Jacksonville, necessitating the City of Jacksonville making a special trip in order to relieve this announce that this boat is being overhauled and will be in daily service by the first of the month. Every merchant in Sanford and contiguous territory should issue billing instructions to ship via water and continue to ship that way even though rail rates decrease. The Central Florida Water Traffic League is gradually building up an organization that will soon be in position to furnish full information as to the rates of freight where a combination rail and water routing is necessary. Membership in this league will also entitle the member to the privilege of having his freight bills audited and the league will handle his claims for shortage and overcharge for a much smaller fee than is usually charged by the different traffic organizations who make this their business.

Attention is again called to a previous request made by the Sanford Chamber of Commerce to list all available rooms with the secretary. No fee is charged for this service, but those who list their rooms with this organization are asked to notify the secretary in the event their rooms are rented subsequent to listing. All indications are for a heavy tourist travel this winter, taxing our hotels to their utmost.

The City Planning Committee of the Chamber of Commerce will soon begin the important task of zoning the city into residential, manufacturing, wholesale and colored sections. A city should be planned the same as a house and built accordingly. Some of our largest cities are now employing heroic measures to correct errors resulting from the lack of city planning

**GREAT FORESTS UNCUT SPRUCE IN ALASKA.**

LAWRENCE, Kas., Oct. 25.—Globe trotter in the summer and professor of history at the University of Kansas in the winter is the program followed by Prof. David L. Patterson, who returned the middle of September from a three-months' trip to Alaska. Summer before last he circled South America, visiting a score of the cities along the west coast and back the east coast after a trip across the Andes. Two summers before that, in the early days of the world war, he visited the battle fronts of Europe as a war correspondent for an American newspaper.

On all these trips Professor Patterson observed closely the conditions of the countries through which he traveled, and from the South American and the European trips brought back large numbers of representative newspapers for his library. His early newspaper training impelled him, on his Alaskan trip, to note the great forests of spruce, as yet practically untouched.

The greatest of these Alaskan forests, said Professor Patterson, are in the southeastern part. They are controlled through the United States forest service, and but two permits to paper pulp companies have been issued. These forests are extensive, and need never be exhausted if properly safeguarded, Professor Patterson said for they are from a second growth in thirty years.

Professor Patterson's Alaska trip combined all sorts of transportation, including the Alaskan railroad now being constructed by the United States government, river steamer and Pacific liner, as well as plain "mushing" as in the gold rush days. His trip carried him through the Atlin Lake country of British Columbia, and as far as Dawson, Yukon Territory.

**SPANISH REPORTED VICTORS.**

MADRID, Oct. 25.—An important success by Spanish troops in Morocco, the occupation of Mount Arruit, was announced in an official communique Monday afternoon. This occupation took place Monday morning, the statement said. Mount Arruit was one of the important outlying positions in the Mellilla area captured by the rebellious tribesmen during the July campaign against the Spanish arms. General Navarro held out at Mount Arruit for a time after the original attack, but finally was overwhelmed by the Moore, and General Navarro was taken prisoner and held as a hostage.
