





The General's plane stopped off today at Honolulu where he posed for pictures smilingly. Only a handful of people knew he was coming be-cause he had radioed ahead asking for absolute secrecy.

For newsmen Marshall had only this to say: "I have no statement to make as 'Secretary' of State at this time." This was exactly what he had said yesterday.

Marshall is planning to rest a few days unless he's asked to rush back to Wash-Ington.
