## Truman Declares Lower Prices Are Key To Prosperity

### President Cites Need For Greater Production, Reasonable Pay Demands

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8. (AP)—President Truman told Congress today he thinks the key to American prosperity this year is lower prices. And he added that means labor must stop pushing wage demands that will keep prices high. Said the President:

"As the year 1947 opens America has never been so strong or so prosperous. For never have our prospects been brighter."

And then he went on to say: "I reject, and I know the American people reject, the notion that we must have another depression. I am referring to minor detours and bumps in the road ahead—these we know we shall have."

In an economic message to Congress, President Truman outlined his views on how depression can be avoided. He said we need more production—about 5 percent more than last year. He said we've got to keep employment at its record-breaking high level. But to do both of these things, the people have got to be able to buy the goods to keep production going.

Mr. Truman said that means prices have got to come down so the people can buy. He asserted that businesses should reduce prices whenever it can to increase the purchasing power that will bolster markets. He added that labor should refrain from demands for excessive wage increases that would require price increases or prevent price reductions.

The President called for labor laws that do not punish labor, but that do put a stop to jurisdictional strikes and some secondary boycotts.

The President does think some wage adjustments are necessary. He said management must recognize that greater production can permit bigger pay checks as well as lower prices. The President declared that the minimum wage should be raised above its present 40-cent base—and the fair labor standards act should be extended to classes of workers that now are excluded.

Beyond that, the President thinks taxes ought to stay high for a while. He agreed that they ought to come down as soon as possible, but he doesn't feel this is the time. When taxes do come down, Mr. Truman believes the cuts should be distributed fairly so as to lighten the load on the mass of consumers and still give business the incentive for high production.

The President called for an extension of rent controls. He said we ought to start a long-range housing program to reduce the cost of housing and help start a million new houses this year.

Mr. Truman said that Social Security benefits should be increased.

## Legislation Offered By Senator Ball To Outlaw Closed Shop

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8. (AP)—Legislation was presented to Congress today which would have far-reaching effects on labor unions and their contracts. Under a measure offered by Senator Joseph Ball of Minnesota, Congress would outlaw closed shop contracts, union shop contracts and maintenance of membership contracts.

The Minnesota Republican seeks to ban agreements which require workers to join a union before they can be hired. He also is seeking to end contracts under which non-union men may be hired but then made to join a union within a certain time.

In maintenance of membership agreements which Ball wants to end, workers who do not remain in it while the contract lasts or allow their jobs to be taken over by others are prohibited. Ball wants especially to prohibit the so-called yellow dog contract under which employers make non-membership in a union a condition of employment. But actually this type of contract already is banned under the Norris-LaGuardia Act and the National Labor Relations Act.

## Selection Of Marshall Is Widely Hailed

### Appointment Is Approved In Washington, Entire World; Marshall Is Silent

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8. (AP)—The Senate unanimously approved the nomination of George Marshall as Secretary of State today. It acted less than an hour after the President sent the appointment to Capitol Hill for approval.

By ASSOCIATED PRESS. General Marshall said today that he would be foolish to comment at this time on matters of State Department policy. In fact, the General refused to say anything about his plans as number one Cabinet officer. (Continued on page 2)

Marshall talked to newsmen when the plane carrying him home from China stopped at Guam. He said that he had discussed the possibility of his appointment with President Truman, but the General's aide explained that the actual appointment was not known to Marshall until he heard it over the radio in the plane, as it flew westward from China.

The appointment of General Marshall was hailed today by James A. Farley as an excellent choice. Former Postmaster General Farley said that President Truman was fortunate in being able to obtain Marshall for the post. Farley added "I think he will carry on in the same excellent manner as did secretaries Byrnes and Cordell Hull."

In Washington, where the appointment is being applauded, both diplomatic and congressional leaders agreed that the General likely will follow the international line set by Byrnes and that will include a firm stand toward Russia.

Foreign quarters are alert to these and other possibilities. Chinese political circles in Shanghai believe the State Department move means the switch in emphasis on the Far East. Chinese Communists are keeping quiet for the moment.

But in the first expression of opinion from Russian-controlled sources, the Berlin newspaper Night Express welcomed Marshall as a sign of what it called more flexible views and policies than Byrnes. It predicted that Marshall would work for closer cooperation with Russia.

English and French journalists are measuring the switch in Truman's early tactics, with Mr. Truman thus having made another move in dealing with the problem of organizing next year's presidential campaign.

The Italian press is talking about political crisis in America, although in Italian journalistic parlance any Cabinet change is a crisis.

The Germans, probably more than any others, are nervous over Byrnes' resignation. They seem to be sorry because they feel that Byrnes' speech in Stuttgart last September gave them a hope of existence. Now he won't be on hand for the approaching peace conference in Germany.

But Lieut. Gen. Lucius D. Clay, who becomes the European commander in March, told German leaders in Stuttgart today that he believed Marshall's appointment would not change American policy in Germany.

About the happiest man in the entire picture seemed to be Byrnes. When a group gathered around Byrnes at a diplomatic reception in the White House last night to wish him well, he said with a smile:

"There are two happy days in the life of a man in public life—the day he is elected, and the day he steps out."

## Need Is Revealed For More Space At Court House

### Ware Says Increased Records, Service Call For Addition

Seminole County Commissioners are faced with a new problem: how to provide more space for cramped departments in the Seminole County Court House. This problem was brought up yesterday by Judge R. W. Ware when he held his office space was inadequate and too crowded to carry on the increased business.

Judge Ware pointed out this morning that he required more vault space to store valuable records, also declared that there has been quite an increase in the business of his office, with as many as 200 to 300 persons a day, applying for some sort of service. Many types of licenses including mail, stage auto drivers, hunting and fishing licenses. In addition, there are legal matters pertaining to divorces, adoptions, the detailed work on all county court proceedings.

Tax Assessor Sanford Doudney said today that he had brought up the matter of more space for his department last year but that the Commission did not agree with his request. The commissioners yesterday passed a resolution commending C. R. Clontz, retiring commissioner who was present for his address to the members of Seminole County while in office.

Hilton Brown of Chulotina was appointed as superintendent of the County Home.

## Five Persons Hurt As Fire Destroys Pier

### Damage Estimate Is Several Million In Railroad's Export Dock Fire In Jersey

WEEHAWKEN, N. J. — Jan. 8. (AP)—A spokesman for the New York Central Railroad said that damage is expected to run into several million dollars in the general alarm fire today in two of the road's export piers at Weehawken, N. J. New York Central Fire

Chief Ernest Wevill expressed a belief that the blaze was started by the lighting of gas when a drum of carbide struck a leak and the carbide came in contact with water.

The fire was tamed by high winds and dense clouds of smoke floated over the Hudson River waterfront opposite mid-town Manhattan. Five railroad employees were injured when the fire broke out on pier three, which was destroyed. The flames spread to pier four and thousands of New York bound commuters watched spurts of flame leap hundreds of feet into the air.

A fleet of three New York City ferries impounded 20 railroad cars and had apparatus from Weehawken, West New York, and Union City, N. J.

Three were 50 railroad cars of freight on pier three when the fire started and all but about ten were removed. The railroad said that all of 40 freight cars on pier four were taken to safety.

So tremendous was the fire that black clouds of smoke rolled across from the west side and spread over the midtown Manhattan area. The New York Fire Department had at least two false alarms from Weehawken residents who believed the tremendous blaze to be on the New York side of the river. Two calls came from locations 24 blocks away from the 42nd street ferry slip in New York which is directly opposite the blazing railroad pier.

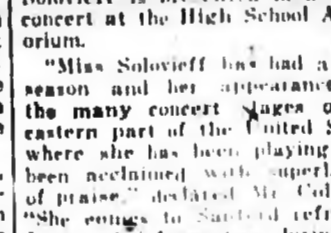

## French Count, Great Grandfather Of J. M. Moye, Planted First Citrus Grove

By Willard Connolly. The great grandfather of J. M. Moye of Sanford, Count Odette Philippi, a titled Frenchman, and pioneer white settler of the Florida peninsula, is credited with planting the first citrus grove in Florida near the Indian River where he first settled prior to locating on the west shore of old Tampa Bay.

According to D. B. McKay, former publisher of the Tampa Times, Count Philippi was a great nephew of King Louis XVI of France. He was a schoolmate and intimate friend of Napoleon Bonaparte, who became emperor of France. He was distinguished as a chief surgeon in the French Navy. At the great naval battle of Trafalgar, Oct. 21,

1804, the British fleet, commanded by Lord Nelson, handed the French a knockout blow and Count Philippi was taken prisoner and sent to the Bahama Islands.

The skill with which he dealt with fever in the islands won the esteem and gratitude of the people and within two years he won his freedom. He first settled at Charleston, S. C. Later he moved with his family and 100 slaves to a site near Ft. Lauderdale, and then settled near the Indian River where he planted citrus stock secured from the Bahama Islands.

The Indians ran him out, and burned all his buildings. He loaded family and slaves on a boat, sailed around south Florida, and on advice of a friendly pirate chief, Gomes, settled near Tampa Bay.

In 1806, the United States had a horse population of 20,000,000 and a truck population of one. In 1946, there were 10,000,000 horses and 5,000,000 trucks.

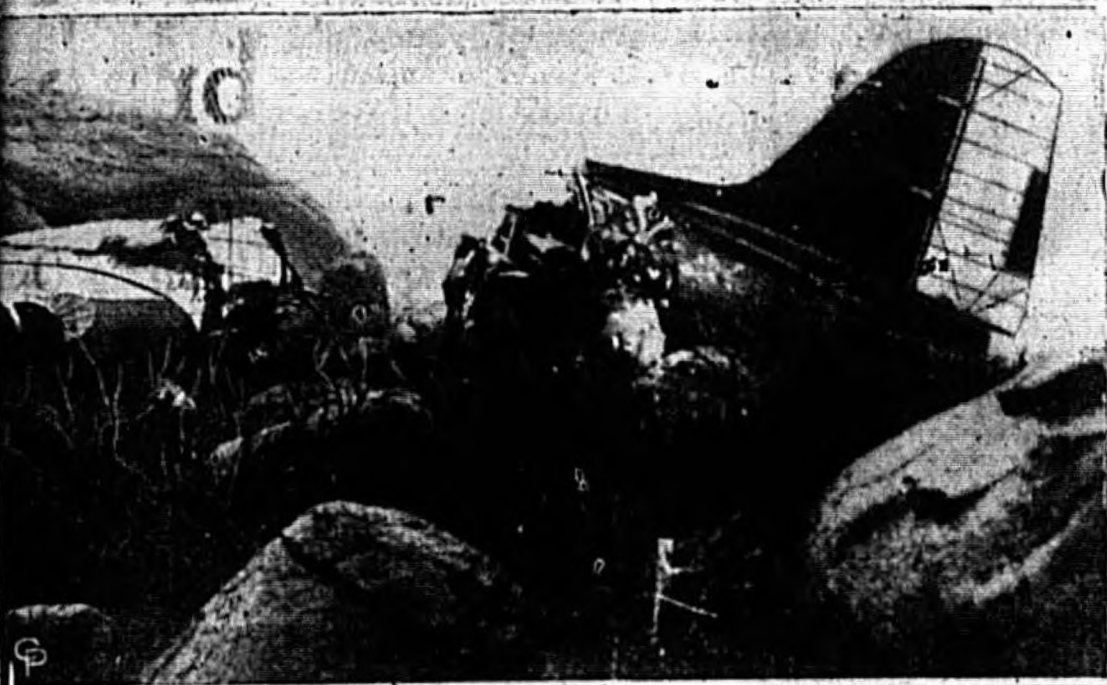

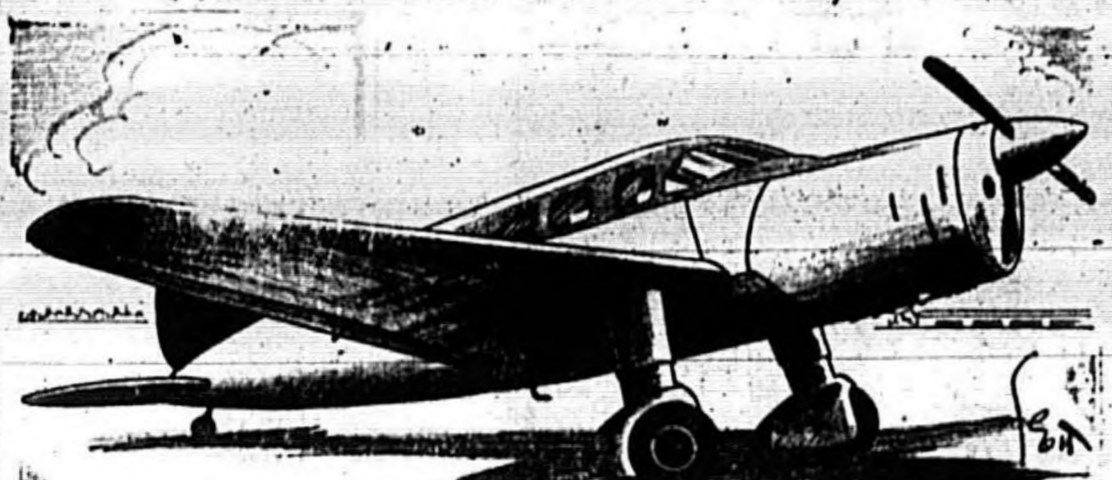

## Case Offers New Version Of Labor Bill

**Measure Would Restrict Unions, Also Protect Their Right To Strike Or Picket**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Representative Francis Case today offered a new version of his labor bill which passed Congress last year but was vetoed by President Truman. The South Dakota Republican declared that the new measure is intended to let labor and management live together in peace. Case added that he hopes that his bill will allow Congress to meet its responsibilities in a comprehensive way.

Earlier, Senator James Murray predicted that if Congress passes drastic labor legislation it will create serious bitterness and conflict. The Montana Democrat added that if such legislation were passed, he believed labor and management could get together and work out their differences. Murray offered his views after a conference with CIO leaders. He told newsmen that last night he was the host at a dinner which was attended by CIO President Philip Murray, four or five other CIO leaders and several Democratic senators.

Among other things, the present Case measure defines unfair labor practices by workers in a way closely paralleling the restrictions which would now cover employers under the Wagner Act. The legislation would restrict labor unions in some respects, but it still would protect their right to strike, picket peacefully, and assemble in an orderly manner. It would deny exclusive bargaining rights to labor organizations which engage in jurisdictional and sympathy strikes and would make them liable for civil damages.

Case also would grant congressional recognition of the right of various states to enact laws forbidding closed-shop agreements.

## U. S. Reminds Poland Of Election Pledge

WARSAW, Jan. 9, (AP)—The United States again reminded Poland today to honor her pledge to hold free elections. A diplomatic note to the Polish foreign minister charged that the Provisional Warsaw government has continued its intimidation of the Opposition and has violated both the Yalta and Potsdam agreements. Washington delivered similar notes on Aug. 10 and Nov. 22, but they have not been answered.

The Polish general election has been set for Jan. 10, but it is not yet certain whether the Opposition Peasant Party will participate. Last night the leader of the Peasant Party, Vice Premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk, announced that his followers would contest the government coalition despite the party's charges of intimidation, political arrests and irregularities. However, Mikolajczyk said that his party will not boycott the elections if in the last minute it appeared that free voting was impossible.

## Sub-Zero Weather Is Seen In New England

NEW YORK CITY, Jan. 9, (AP)—The nation experienced nearly normal winter weather today except in New England and northern New York States, where temperatures of zero and below were reported this morning.

The frigid northeast reported 15 below zero at Caribou, Me., and today's minimum's generally were 15 to 25 degrees lower than yesterday.

## Rail Chairman

The Southeastern States Soaring Contest will be held at the Municipal airport on March 1 and 2 and will award championships in standard events for motorless ships. It was announced today. The two day air festival is being sponsored by the Junior and Senior Chambers of Commerce and the City of Sanford.

Activity in relation to the celebration will be under the co-chairmanship of Jack Ratigan, president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and Ed Higgins, manager of the senior trade group. George Touhy has been named general manager and will supervise all details relating to the meet.

W. V. Blitting, president of the Senior Chamber of Commerce, announced that he had appointed H. H. Coleman, Lea Leshar Clarence Hedding and Al Lee to serve on the committee. Mr. Ratigan will have Roll Carnes and Chick Lassiter collaborating with him.

Until recently the extremely favorable thermal conditions that prevail here were unnoticed, but at a meet held at the airport a few weeks ago, the glider pilots were most enthusiastic about the atmospheric conditions. This meet is sanctioned by the Soaring Society of America, whose headquarters are at Elmira, N. Y., and authorized by the National Aeronautical Association.

**United Nations Group Is Urged To Hasten; Warren Austin's Appointment Approved**

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Jan. 9.—(AP)—The United Nations Security Council today opened full-scale debate on a basic arms reduction proposal. The Australian delegate called for harmony and speedy deliberation of the issue. Said the Australian, Norman Minkin: "This is not the time for conflict."

Meanwhile in Washington the Senate Foreign Relations Committee put its stamp of approval on the nomination of O. Max Gardner, former ambassador to Great Britain. This puts the nomination before the Senate tomorrow, and confirmation there is regarded as certain.

Here are some other nominations which the committee approved today—former Senator Warren Austin of Vermont as United States representative on the United Nations Security Council, S. Plinckey Tuck as Ambassador to Egypt, and George Wadsworth of New York as ambassador to Iraq.

## Senator Pepper Is On Committee On Agriculture

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9, (Special)—Senator Claude Pepper, D-Fla. in the re-organization of committees in the Senate has been given a prominent position on the Committee on Agriculture. This is the first time in many years that a Florida Senator has been on this committee, the work of which is so important to the vast farming and livestock industries of the state.

The senior senator from Florida has been serving on the Foreign Relations Committee in the last Congress, but relinquished his place on this group to a senator of greater seniority in the upper chamber. The reorganization act reduced the membership on the committee and because of the Republican majority in the present Congress the Democratic representation was changed from 13 to 4.

Plans are being made by the Tourist Club for a picnic and outing about a week from Saturday at Enterprise where they will be guests of the Rev. and Mrs. Harold Barnes. It was announced today by E. M. Armistage, director of tourist activities.

## RIOTS IN BOMBAY

BOMBAY, Jan. 9, (AP)—Rioting broke out in Bombay today between Hindus and members of the group commonly referred to as "Untouchables." There were about 50 casualties in the new outbreaks which only served to complicate a serious strife between the Hindus and Moslems. Officers fired repeatedly to break up mobs which apparently resulted from the stabbings yesterday of a Hindu and a leader of the "Untouchables." The tension was acute and police announced an all-night curfew for the northern area of Bombay.

## Drop In Prices In California Fruit Causes Rivalry

LAKELAND, Jan. 9 (Special)—The recent sharp slump in California orange prices has made the western fruit more competitive with Florida oranges from one standpoint, but quality of Florida fruit has improved somewhat in the meantime, according to reports of Florida Citrus Commission dealer services men.

In a report for the Chicago area for the period ending Jan. 3, one dealer service man said that movement of fruit is slow, and that "the wholesale trade on the whole believes the lagging acceptance of navels is due mainly to their generally poor rating quality."

He added that "one opinion expressed frequently with regard to Florida oranges—and this is borne out by observation in retail stores—is that Florida grading standards should be definitely tightened up and strictly adhered to in order to obtain maximum prices."

There were several comments about the slow retail movement of fruit during the period from Christmas to early January, and most of the reports said that the trade thought the shipping holiday which extended from Dec. 23-31 was helpful.

"Among the chains and wholesalers I have not heard one criticism on the shipping holiday," a citrus commission man in New York wrote. Another New York representative said that "fruit, in general, has been of good quality and has brought good prices on the market. However, the market is still lower on the average than is necessary, due to fruit which is poor of color, blemished or scarred."

It was reported that the Boston market "has shown considerable strength though immediate store delivery was curtailed and store traffic limited to bare essentials because of road conditions and slippery sidewalks resulting from snow and sleet storms. The retail trade feels, the report said, that good consumer acceptance will be enjoyed on Florida citrus from now until the deal ends."

"On good quality fruit retail prices are in line with wholesale prices," the Boston man found. "On poorer quality fruit retail prices are disappointed in proportion to the quality. It is noted that not too much of this poor quality fruit remains in the hands of the retailer."

In Philadelphia, it was found that "despite the shipping holiday last ended, there appears to be plenty of Florida fruit at all levels." The report added that cheap California prices were getting a big play, with the fruit advertised at 10 cents to 39 cents a dozen.

## Miami Cracks Down On Gambling Element

MIAMI, Jan. 9, (AP)—A crack down on gambling in Miami has resulted in the arrest of 24 persons, including two women, on bookmaking charges. All those accused were released on bond pending arraignment in municipal court Tuesday.
