# Camille's Animal Victims Destroyed

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—The crack of rifles in camouflage along the coastline devastated the Gulf Coast as humans of the only snake available to their injured and starving animal friends.

Mrs. Emily Gloeckler, president of the Florida Association of Humane Societies in St. Petersburg, said Hurricane Camille left untold thousands of dogs, cats and other pets homeless and injured along the coastal areas of Louisiana, Mississippi and Florida.

"The snakes and Army National Guardmen cooperating with the Humane Societies are destroying the animals," she said.

"It's so bad," said Mrs. Gloeckler, "that there is nothing else to do. We have been criticised for killing these animals, but many of them were too badly injured to save and we just can't find the space or food to care for the others."

More than one big, husky snake and soldier fought back as he placed the muzzle of his rifle between the trusting eyes of an injured dog and pulled the trigger, she said.

"Donations coming in from across the country are being used to care for some animals in areas that were not so badly damaged, and to rebuild their Guiltless Animal Shelter, which was smashed to splinters by the storm.

"Money is the thing we need most right now. Some people are sending gifts of dog food, but we have no way to handle it. Food supplies for humans come first," Mrs. Gloeckler said.

She said representatives from the American Humane Association in Denver, the Humane Society of the United States in Washington, D. C., and the Humane Society of Pensacola, Fla., are in the Gulfport area, searching the rubble for injured animals and looking for the owners of those few animals for which homes could be found.

"Ellis Miller, manager of the Pensacola Humane Society Shelter, returned from Gulfport Wednesday and told of night spent stumbling through shattered buildings where the whines and screams of trapped animals filled the air around him.

"It's just awful," Mrs. Gloeckler said. "We have managed to find homes for some of the animals, but so many people are dead, and so homeless that it's an almost impossible job."

## Governor, Lawmaker For Farmer - Charge

MIAMI (AP)—A Florida NAACP official says Gov. Claude Kirk and Rep. Paul Rogers have joined big farm corporations in a move to deny legal services to migrant workers and city poor people.

"They are political bedfellows of the farmers," said Marvin Davies, state field director of the National Association for Advancement of Colored People. "They will never support legal advocates for the poor."

Davies' remarks followed a threat by Kirk at Tallahassee to veto the South Florida Migrant Legal Services program unless it was reformed.

The president of the organization, Miami attorney Roy T. Holcomb Jr., said Kirk's statement was only an effort to grab political credit for reform already proposed.

Kirk said Tuesday an 18-member board including more lawyers should be named to run the program, the office should be moved from Dade to Broward or Palm Beach County, and the service should be expanded to all rural poor people.

The Governor was quoting word for word, Holcomb said, from an amendment drawn up by the migrant organization itself and submitted to Washington Aug. 4 along with an application for funds from the Office of Economic Opportunity.

## Would No Longer Penalize Drivers For Poor Records Of Others New Auto Insurance Plan Proposed; Would Save You Money

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A new auto insurance plan proposed by the Florida Insurance Commissioner Brown and his staff would eliminate the factor so that you pay solely on the basis of what kind of driver you are, not what you do for a living, Williams said.

Williams said his plan would have two major consequences: It would eliminate many non-chargeable accidents, the father's insurance would not be affected.

"We want to eliminate this factor so that you pay solely on the basis of what kind of driver you are, not what you do for a living," Williams said.

He said his plan, called the Named Operator Policy, would correct the present system of insurance classifications and it would no longer penalize drivers on the basis of records of other family members.

"What we want to eliminate from rating is the system we have now in which people are lumped together in occupational and other groups," he said. "For example, you now may pay a certain rate because you are a teacher or a waitress."

"The head of the household would not be penalized because of the driving record of another member of the family," Williams said. "If the son's insurance is cancelled because of a chargeable accident, the father's insurance would not be affected."

However, the plan would offer no relief for parents who were paying high insurance policies for their children who were poor drivers.

In general, Williams said, motorists who are good drivers would realize substantial savings through application of his plan.

"We anticipate that such policies would cost approximately half as much as a driver would pay under the present insured-vehicle system," he said.

The plan, which is based on insurance plans for drivers who don't own cars, is sure to arouse the insurance industry's opposition, Williams said.

## Education Contract Cancelled

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP)—Unfavorable publicity moved the Florida Public School Council Wednesday to terminate a \$14,400 contract with a New York firm to develop a teacher evaluation system, officials said.

The contract difficulties began when Education Commissioner Floyd Christian two weeks ago said he believed the firm was nonexistent. A check of the Manhattan telephone directory for the company called Future Resources and Development Inc. showed no listing.

Council officials also said they had been unable to locate the firm at that time.

Merle Dimuth, executive director of the council, reported Aug. 11 that the firm did indeed exist. It was incorporated August 1 to conduct various kinds of studies and is a subsidiary of the Famous Artists School International which is listed on the American Stock Exchange, he said.

Dimuth has since resigned as council director to return to the school system in Lakeland. Officials of the New York company contacted council members and asked that the contract be terminated, according to council member Paul Wolfe.

Wolfe said officials of the New York firm believed the final product would not be well received because of what he termed adverse publicity.

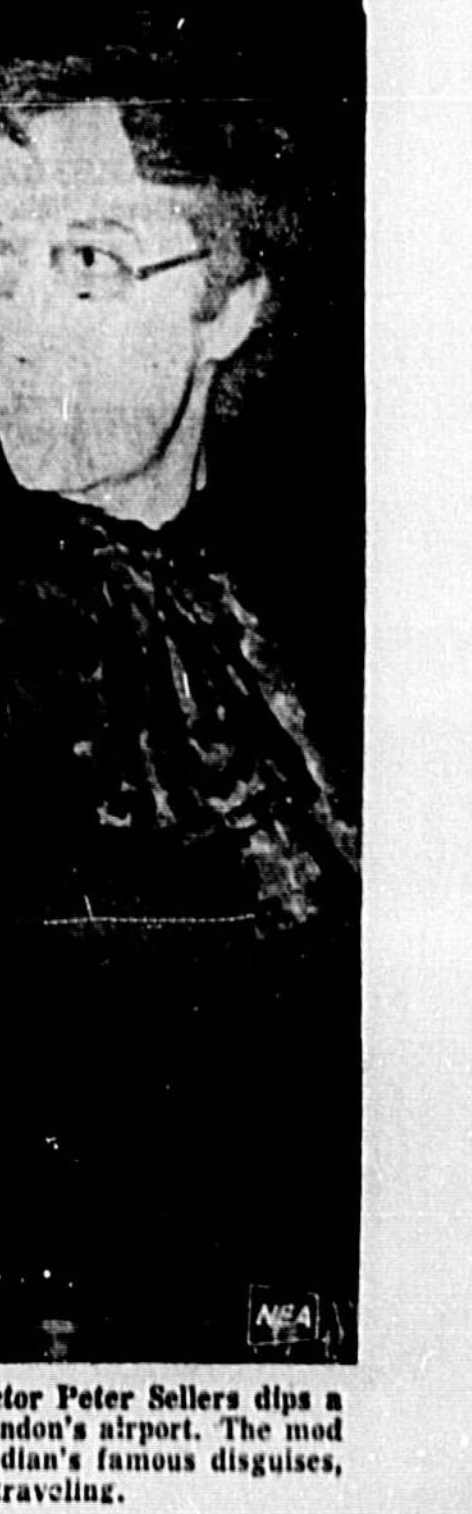

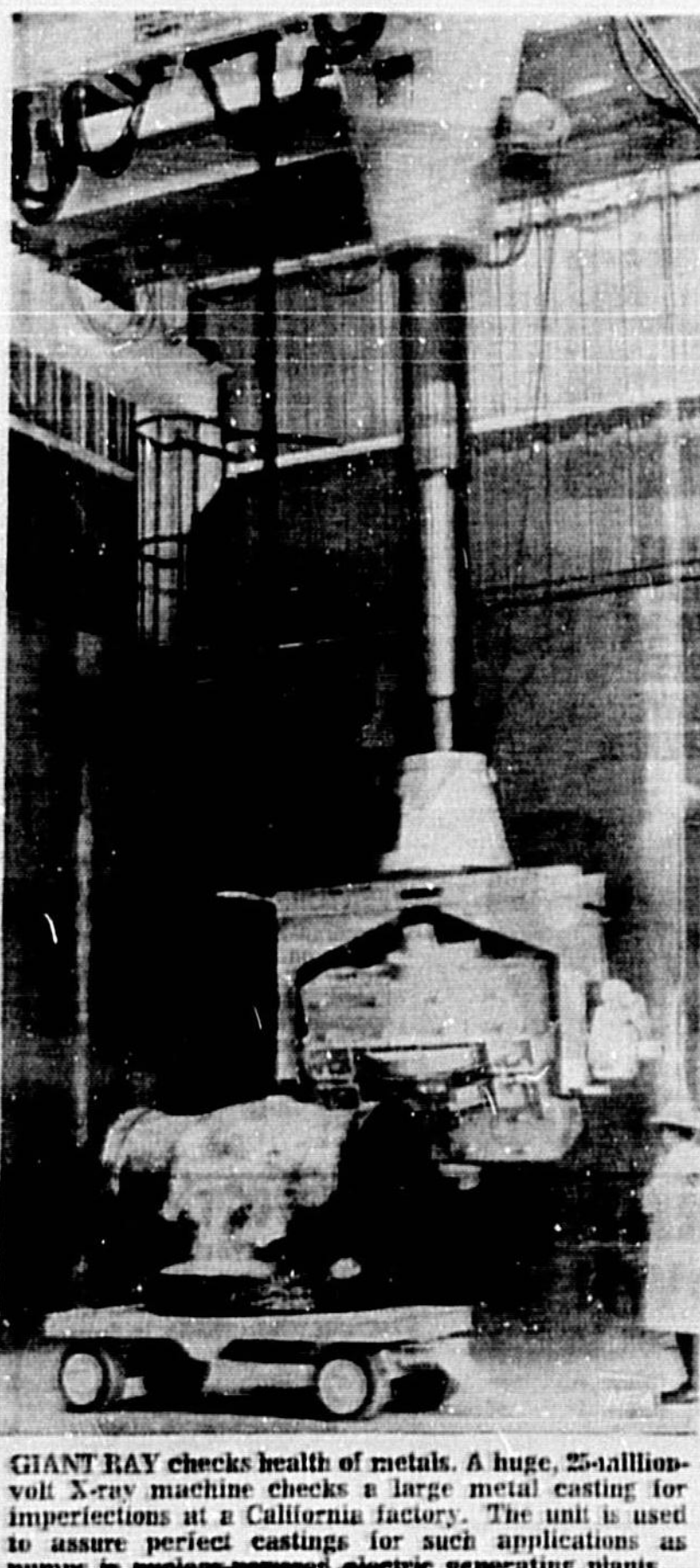

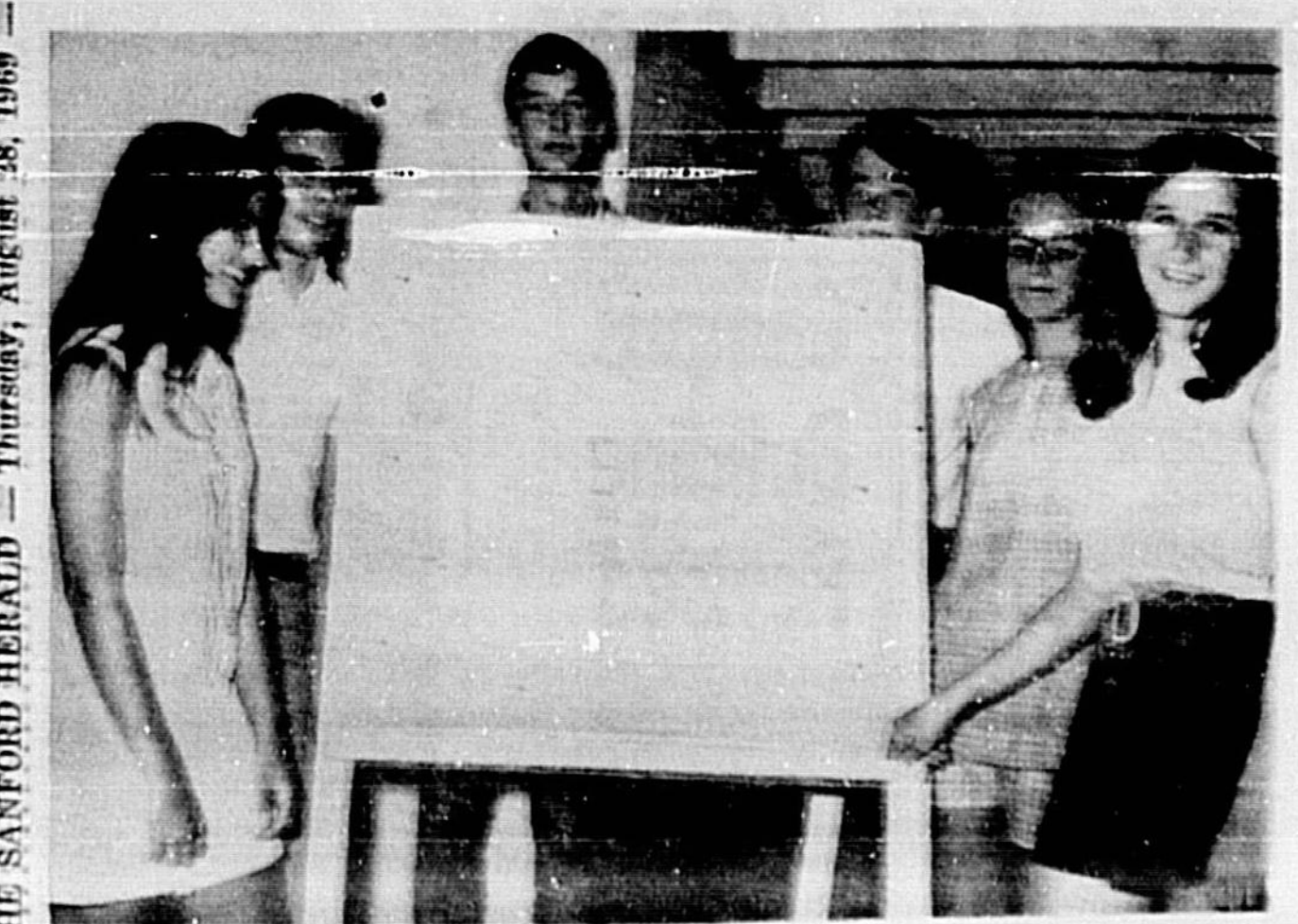

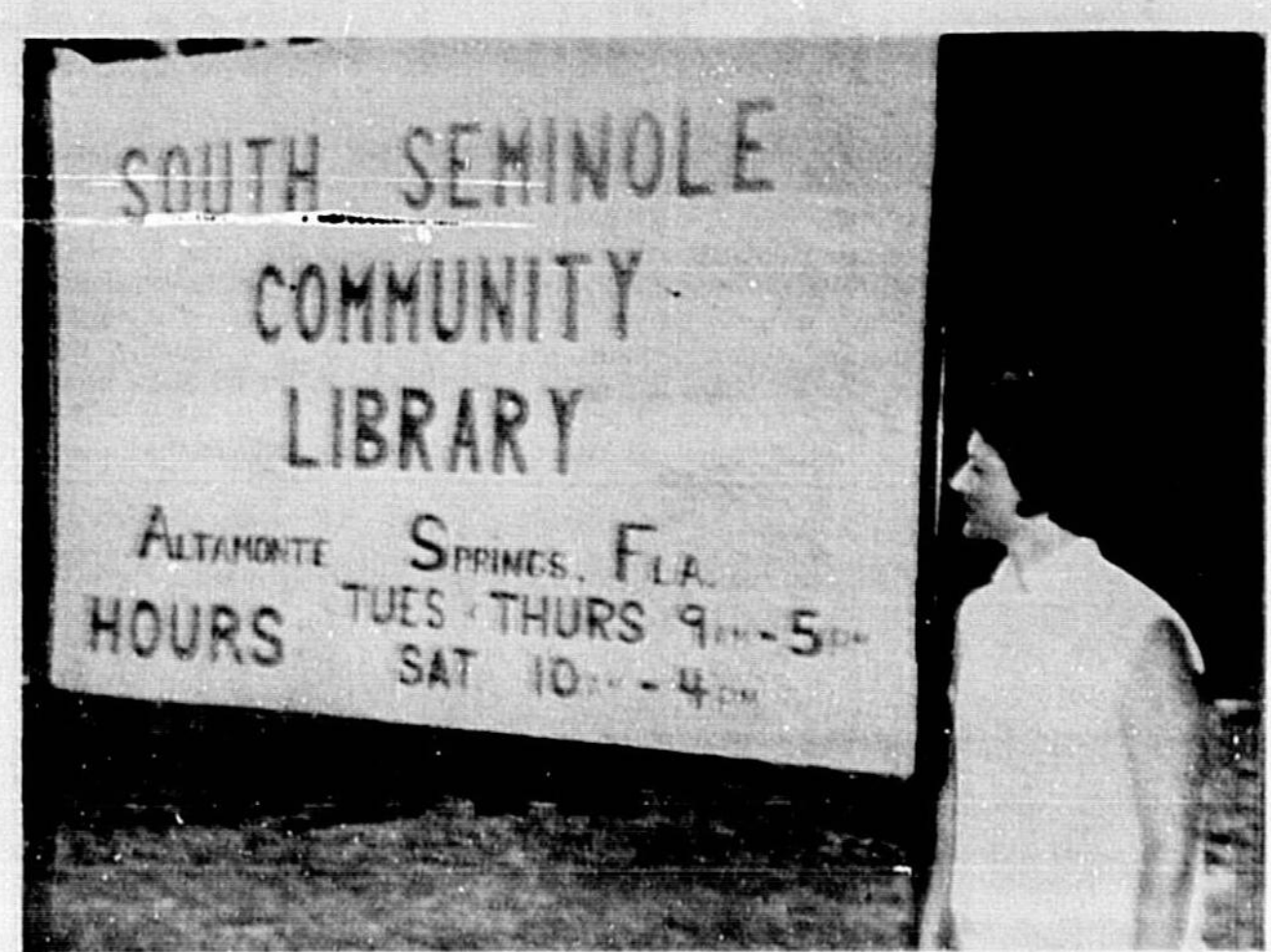

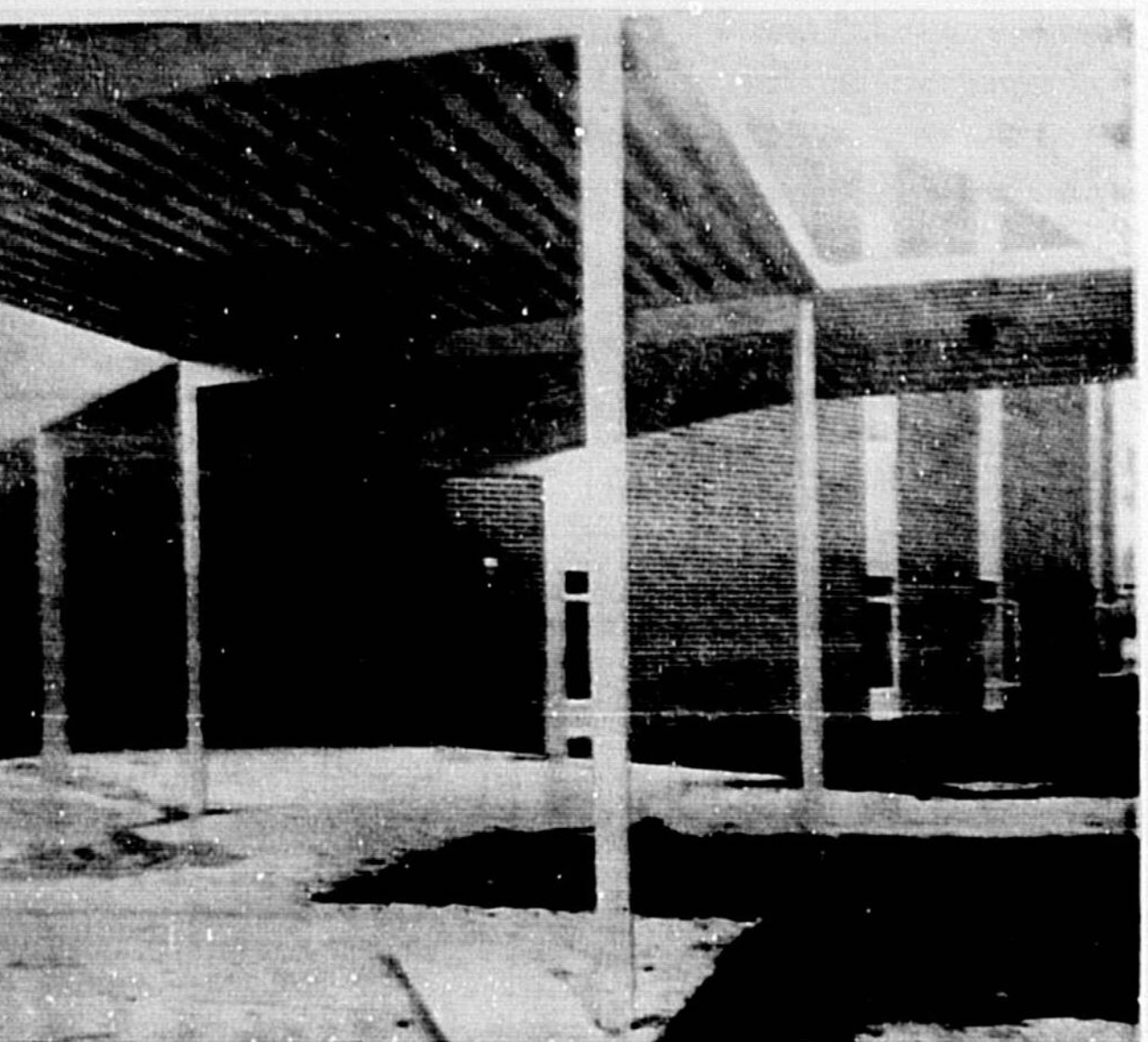

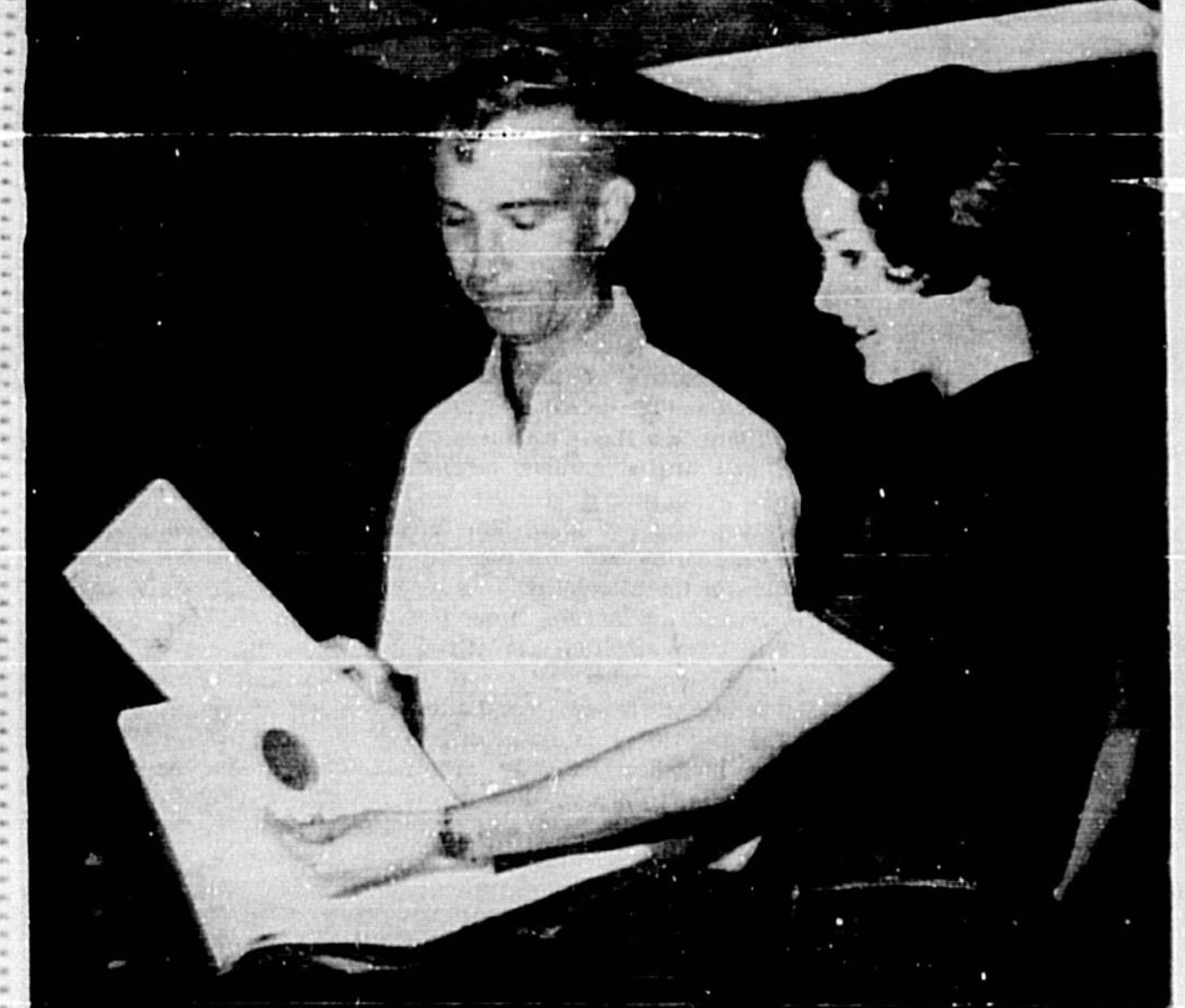

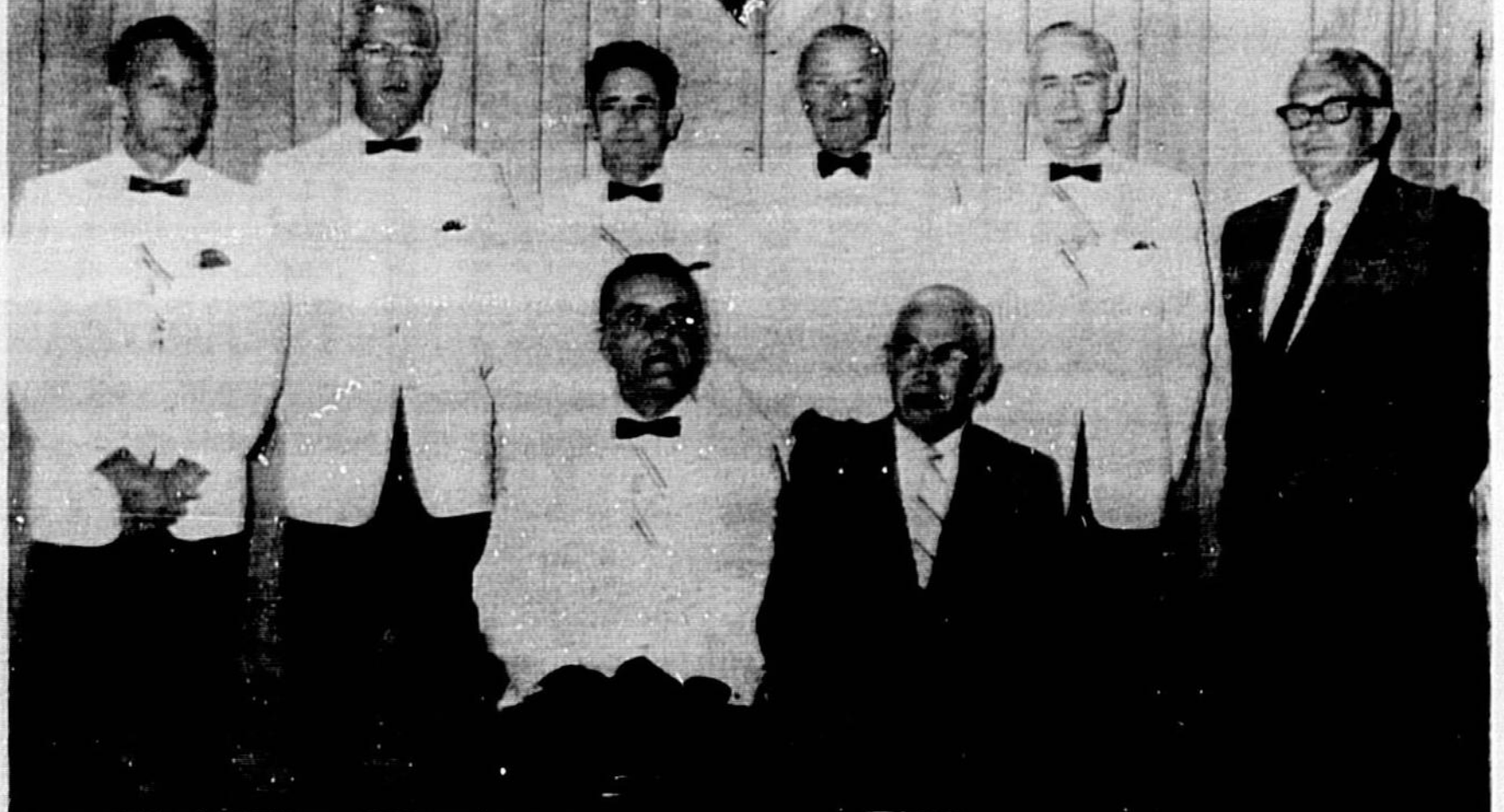

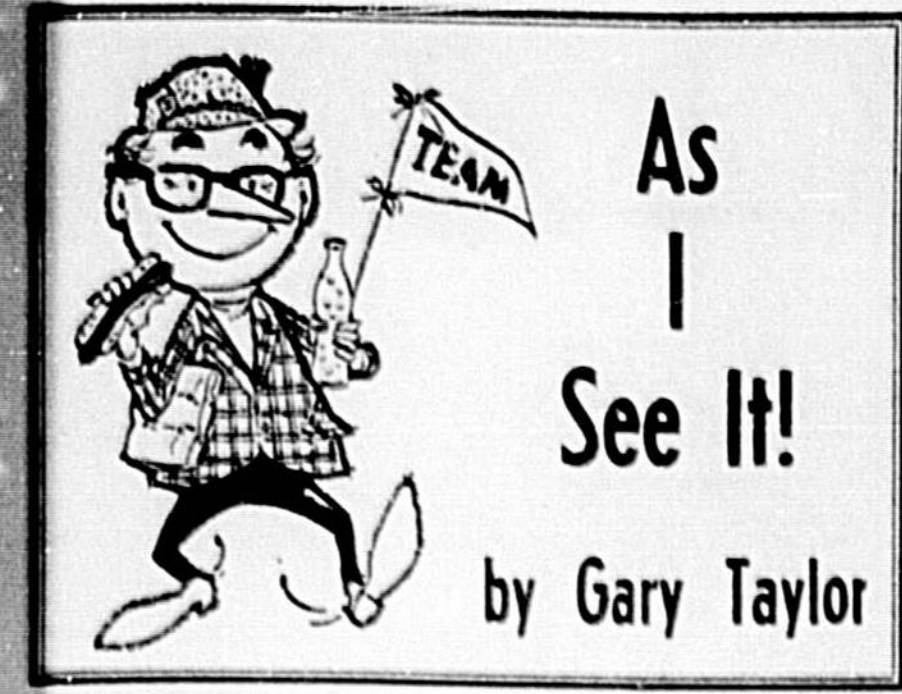

This week I will take a look at the AFL for the upcoming season. It looks like a repeat for New York and Oakland for their division title. Here is how it should finish:

First for a look at the Eastern Division. The Jets should repeat their finish over the second place Oilers. Joe Namath will be back leading the team as usual. Namath, the hero of the Super Bowl, has unretired after he gained the publicity he wanted by retiring. Broadway Joe won the AFL's Most Valuable Player award and the Hickok Bell as Free Athlete of the Year.

The Jets have added two promising rookie backs, Lee White and Chris Gilbert, to their offensive attack. Halfback Emerson Boozer has a year of confidence in his knee, which underwent surgery in the mid-season of 1967. Boozer looked like his old self at the end of the season last year and he should be a big factor in the Jets' offensive attack this year. George Sauer and Don Maynard will be back catching passes as usual. Sauer caught 66 last season while Maynard caught 57. Maynard caught 10 touchdown passes during the regular season and then sealed the Colts in the Super Bowl.

The top scorer for the Jets last season was Jim Turner. Turner kicked 24 field goals and 43 extra points, for a total of 145 points.

The Houston Oilers, after a first place finish in 1967, came in second last season and should do the same this year. The Oilers have a top-notch defense. They have a good pass rush, sound linebacking and the best secondary in the AFL. Although the Oilers may not have had the best secondary in the AFL at the end of the season last year, a trade executed by Coach Walt Linn has made them the best. Leroy Mitchell came to Houston from Boston for four players. Mitchell is probably the best corner back in the league.

Hevie Granger led the Oilers in rushing last season with 848 yards in 206 carries. Alvin Reed, a tight end, caught 46 passes for 747 yards and five touchdowns.

Of course everyone will be looking at the Buffalo Bills. Winning only one game last season, the Bills should be candidates for the cellar. But a 4-foot-2, 284 pound package of muscle named O. J. Simpson has been added as a rookie to the squad. In Simpson lies all hopes for a fair finish.

For the Miami Dolphins, with Bob Griese at the quarterback position, could pull ahead of the Bills into third. The Dolphins don't have first place contention yet, but after about two more college drafts, the Dolphins could have a team.

The Boston Patriots are looking to rule the cellar. Even with their draft choice, Ron Sellers of Florida State University, they don't look to far.

The Oakland Raiders look to repeat their Western Division title again this year. But they hope to have an easier time doing it this time. Oakland won the title last season after they beat Kansas City in a play-off. They both finished the season with 12-4 records.

The Raiders will be looking forward to their first full season with Charlie Smith on the team. Smith, a halfback from Utah, didn't break into the lineup until mid-season last year. Smith is a spectacular runner and a constant threat to catch the ball out of the double wing. Oakland broke open the celebrated "Heldt" game against the New York Jets with a Daryle Lamonica-to-Smith pass of this type.

And speaking of Lamonica, he completed 296 passes in 416 attempts last season for 3,342 yards and 22 touchdowns. The Raiders put as much on Lamonica's back as the Jets on Namath.

George Blanda will be back with his ever-accurate foot. Blanda scored 117 points with 34 extra points and 21 field goals. Keep your eyes on the Chiefs. They will be out to revenge their loss in the play-offs last year. The Chiefs have Len Dawson, the top passer in the AFL last season. He completed 221 passes in 224 attempts for 3,376 yards and 17 touchdowns.

Besides Dawson, the Chiefs have two other league leaders in Jerry Wilson and Nolan Smith. Wilson led the league in punting with 62 punts for an average of 45.1 yards per punt. Smith led the league in punt returns with 18 for 270 yards and one touchdown. He averaged 15 yards per return.

The Chargers should have a pretty fair team this year, but they are not really a threat to clinch the title.

The Chargers have the AFL's leading pass receiver, Lance Alworth. Alworth caught 62 passes for 1,312 and 16 touchdowns. The Chargers will have tough going at home for the first four games. Three of their first four home games will include battles with Kansas City, New York and Oakland. One rookie the folks in this area will be watching is Larry Rountz, a graduate of the University of Florida.

Speaking of professional football, I hope you folks in this area are supporting the Orlando Panthers. The Panthers were the Continental Football League Champions in 1967 and 1968 and were the runners-up in 1966. They will be looking to repeat that finish this year, but there is a rough road ahead. The Panthers have Norfolk and Wheeling to compete with and could have quite a battle on their hands to capture the Atlantic Division title.

The Panthers met the San Antonio Toros in a pre-season battle last week and dominated the defending Texas League champs, 27-7. The Texas League has now become a part of the Continental Football League and is known as the Texas Division.

Since moving to Orlando, the Panthers have compiled a 23-7 record, and two league championships.

Started in Newark, New Jersey in 1965 by industrialist Tom Granatelli and Sal Rosen, the franchise was switched to Orlando in 1966. Last year, Granatelli transferred the ownership of the franchise to the Orlando community and President Elmer Cook has continued to broaden the base of community activity. Major stockholder is cosmetics manufacturer Glenn W. Turner.

Taking a look at the leaders in the Major Leagues, we still see Rod Carew leading the AL with his 352 batting average. Reggie Smith is close behind at .327. Roberto Clemente is leading the NL at .358 and Cleo Jones is close behind at .351.

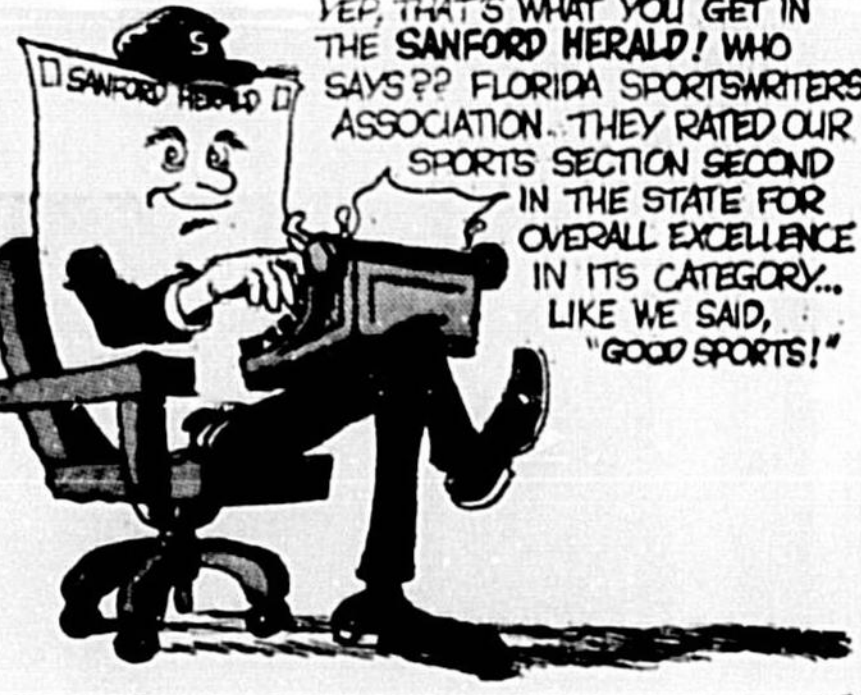

## 'Sunshine' Law Is Upheld

MIAMI (AP) — A Circuit Court judge ruled Tuesday that public agencies must keep minutes of their decision-making decisions even if the meeting is open to the public. The ruling by Judge David Popper came in a decision in which he struck down a section of Dade County's school desegregation plan. Testimony showed that portions of the program were discussed during an "informal conference" prior to the school board's formal meeting. Attorneys for a citizens group opposed the desegregation plan, challenging its validity under Florida's "Government in the Sunshine" law after two school board representatives testified no minutes were kept during the informal conference, which was open to the press and to the public.

"If it was simple enough to take minutes at the second meeting, it was simple enough to take them at the first for the benefit of the public," Judge Popper said.

"The law is clear that any action taken out of a public meeting shall not be binding. You have not followed the law in any way, shape or form."

Earlier court rulings have held that briefings and conference sessions involving the decision-making process must be open to the public.

## Language Confusion

PORT ELIZABETH, South Africa (AP) — African pupils who may want to study at high school now have to learn a third one. Before the present government came to power in 1948 Africans were taught mainly in English. The late Prime Minister Hendrik Verwoerd, then minister of native affairs, in 1954 ordered that Africans be educated in their own tribal language to stop producing what he called "black Englishmen."

High school education continued mainly in English but now, said Alexander Maitso, principal of the Kwazakhele High School here, the government has ordered that high school education must be in both English and African. Maitso said the change from the vernacular to one white language already caused confusion and the situation would become worse.

Federal judges, school boards, County School Board attorneys and parents—black and white—will watch closely when Florida school children cringe back to the classroom this year. Many will claim desks in different schools. Some will ride yellow buses clear across town to reach their destination. A few will remember last spring when their parents walked picket lines. All will be affected by as emergency appeal from Dade County School Board attorney George Belles, assumed jurisdiction over the county's school integration plan. Only two whites appeared for the first day of classes at both Blake and Middleton High schools in Tampa. Nearly 900 Negro pupils registered at Mid- dleton and 750 enrolled at Blake.

### FTU Gets \$72,000 Police Study Grant

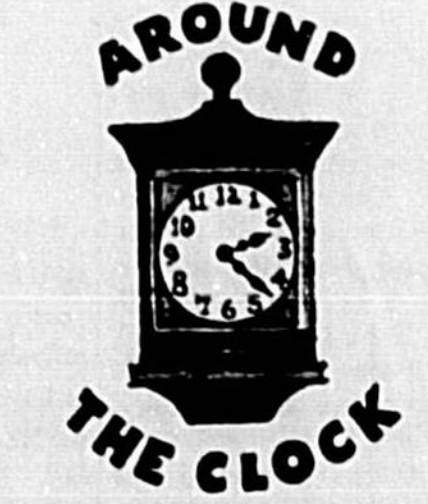
Florida Technological University became the first four-year school in Central Florida to receive a crime bill allotment, it was announced yesterday.

Chris Schmidt, spokesman for FTU, told The Herald that the college had received a federal grant of \$71,900 to assist and setup a law enforcement education program.

The program, similar to a police science program presently in operation at Seminole Junior College, will be available to all law enforcement officers throughout the Central Florida area to aid in furthering their knowledge in combating crime.

Schmidt said that funds would be available for the upcoming fall quarter which starts the second week of October. Eligible law enforcement officers and anyone who promises to enter the law enforcement field can receive loans up to \$1,800 per academic year.

The program will deal in advanced police science and criminology.

## Favors Lakefront Site For Hq. Insurance Firm Eyes Sanford

Lakefront city-owned property fronting on French Avenue mentioned as the site for the Sanford Zoo was abandoned this morning during a special City Commission meeting after it was revealed that an Atlanta-based insurance firm is interested in putting a regional headquarters building on five of the 10 acres.

On a motion by Commissioner Earl Higginbotham, a decision was made to eliminate the formerly designated industrial site from further consideration as a potential zoo site.

The commission action followed a report from Mayor Lee P. Moore, who conferred with Atlanta insurance officials Thursday along with John Krider, Seminole Chamber of Commerce manager, and Don Rastal, Sanford Industrial Commission director, concerning the location of the insurance firm first at temporary quarters in Building 289 at the Sanford Airport and then in newly constructed facilities adjacent to The Sanford Herald.

More seemed optimistic that the unnamed firm would eventually locate a facility here to employ from 174 to 200, with a yearly payroll of \$800,000.

"There's no question in my mind that Sanford is first in consideration by the company of a Florida location," Moore said.

The mayor said insurance officials were shown three sites

and were only interested in the Lakefront property and would make a formal presentation to the firm's Boston home office in October.

Krider stated a survey team from the firm will be here in a week or so to look into airport temporary quarters, said postponing action on the relocation could kill the zoo removal but no one wanted to disturb the present situation with the insurance people.

Irene Lacey, zoo committee member, told the commission it was a matter of integrity and questioned for what the zoo committee was being used. "All we want is land for the zoo and we want it right now," she said.

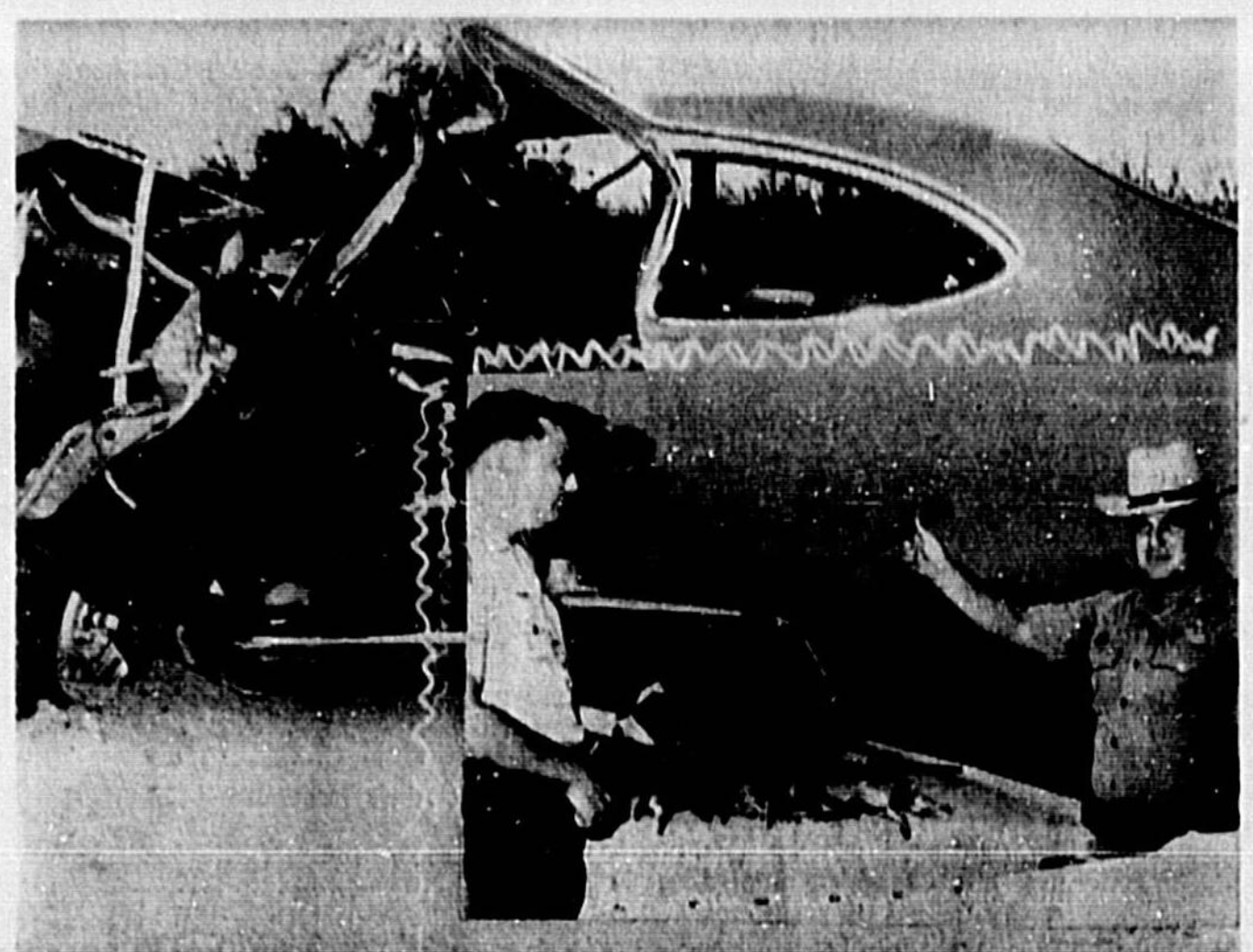
More agreed with Krider, "I don't think we should jeopardize getting a good industry and payroll by trying to pin them down to any time limits," he added. The mayor said from \$4,000 to \$5,000 in yearly taxes could come into city coffers.

A. B. Peterson Jr., zoo committee vice chairman, said postponing action on the relocation would be an attempt to trap the prospect.

## Mix Suit Extension Is Sought

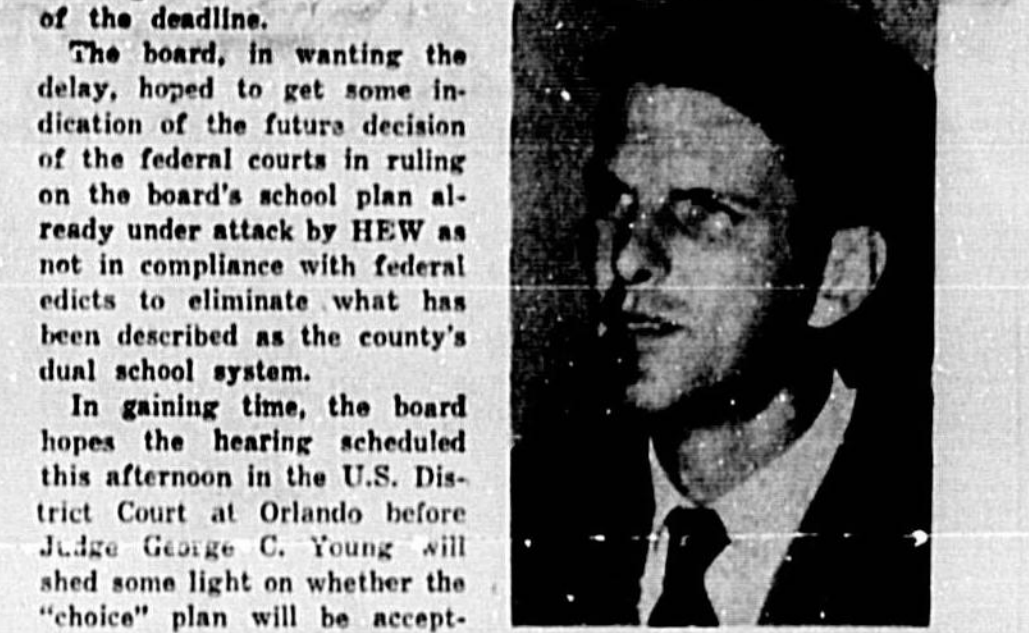
Seminole County School Board, faced with a notice from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) to file within 90 days an answer to 30 allegations made by the governmental agency pertaining to the freedom of choice school desegregation plan submitted by the educators for the 1968-70 school year, voted during yesterday's meeting to seek an extension of the deadline.

The board, in wanting the delay, hoped to get some indication of the future decision of the federal courts in ruling on the board's school plan already under attack by HEW as not in compliance with federal edicts to eliminate what has been described as the county's dual school system.

In gaining time, the board hopes the hearing scheduled this afternoon in the U.S. District Court at Orlando before Judge George C. Young will shed some light on whether the "choice" plan will be acceptable in establishing a unitary school system for black and white students.

In two actions, relative to the HEW allegations, the educators voted to seek the time extension and to ask for the hearing in Washington, D.C.

The action today by Judge Young could affect the outcome of the Washington hearing, since the board has asked to intervene in the conspiracy action brought by 81 plaintiffs against Mrs. Jean Bryant and

## Will Teach At Lyman High Schools Retain Hagman

Employment of Dexter Hagman, former president of the Florida Education Association, was approved 5-2 by the Seminole County School Board Thursday. He will serve as a social studies teacher at Lyman High School.

Hagman had been the center of controversy during the teacher walkout two years ago. Recommendation to employ Hagman by Lyman principal Carlton Henley failed to obtain the backing of Mrs. Jean Bryant and Allan F. Keeth.

Keeth reported that since no one else bothered to check Hagman's background at his former teaching post in Broward County he (Keeth) telephoned there and was informed Hagman is a superior teacher.

Mrs. Bryant said she objected to the man because he was rude and crude during the teacher walkout in Broward County. In another action, the board went on record as wanting teachers, principals and non-instructional workers to bring their problems before the board.

It was brought out by Pat Bule, board member, that teachers are fearful to come before the board with problems, and he felt they should be notified that the board is always willing to hear their problems.

Concerning the remedial reading program, no understaffed because of a change in the federal requirements governing funds, it was brought out by John Ansel, superintendent, that Jerome Uiman, psychologist, and a teacher have been added to the program.

In another matter, Andrew Bracken, administrative aide, revealed that 18,000 of the school's system expected 19,000 pupils already have been assigned to schools of the basis of the freedom of choice plan.
