Business Incentive Urged

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Industrialists say Florida already has the lower of hundreds of millions of dollars—must permit local governments to issue industrial revenue bonds in order to be competitive with surrounding states.

The business spokesman told the Senate Subcommittee on Local Government Wednesday that Florida has missed out on a great deal of growth in recent years because the bonds were forbidden in the old constitution.

"Florida has lost hundreds of millions worth of business" to other southern states in the past because of that, said House Commerce Committee Chairman Murray D. Dubbin, D-Miami.

The new constitution would permit issuance of the bonds if implementing legislation is passed.

Many major plants "did not locate here in the past because we did not have industrial revenue bonds," said E. Earl Davidson, executive director of the Florida Council of 100.

Duke Bruce, senior vice president of the First National Bank of Miami, said Florida is one of the five states who do not presently permit industrial revenue bonds.

New Nursing Home Policy Is Outlined

A new nursing home policy to supplement Medicare was explained by DelRay Chapter, American Association of Retired Persons, by Alvin Stevenson, area insurance vice president for AARP, at the March meeting.

"When nursing or convalescent home facilities are not locally available, this policy will provide for payment for nursing service in the patient's home," the speaker pointed out.

AARP health insurance policies are designed to supplement other insurance coverage and do not give complete coverage, it was noted.

Stevenson also advised that premium cost of the non-cancellable automobile insurance available to AARP members is based in each case on a combination of factors at the time of application — age, health, annual mileage, accident record and value of the car. A 10 per cent rebate is given those taking an approved defensive driving course.

DelRay Chapter, DelRay at Large, discussed wills and estates.

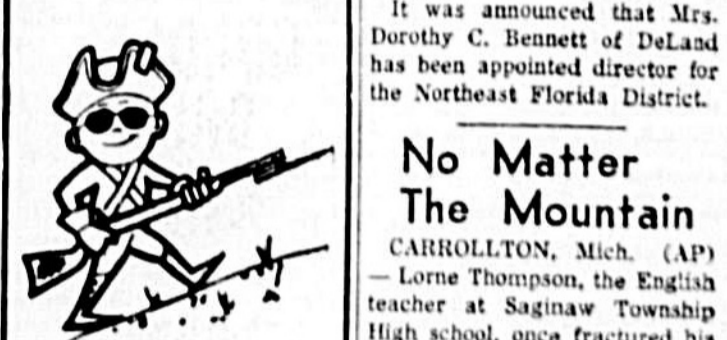
"Wills are a basic instrument in estate planning. When properly executed, they policy will substantially reduce probate and inheritance tax costs," he advised, going on to cite nine different ways for avoiding probate of a will.

He stated, "In general, the best program for retired couples is to have all property in joint ownership with right of survivorship and to have 'mutual' wills with provision for third parties in event of death in a 'common disaster.' On the death of either partner, no probate would be involved as all jointly owned property would be automatically transferred to the other."

Carter also called attention to the role of trusts and gifts to reduce taxes and accomplish other purposes.

AFL Has New Plan For NFL

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — The American Football League, which three days ago was expected to approve retention of the status quo in professional football, has turned its joint meeting with the National Football League around and appears to have insured realignment for 1970.

The AFL prepared a plan to present to National Football League team owners today in their first joint meeting on the matter since they received alternatives Monday.

Although no one was saying much about the plan, The Associated Press learned that the AFL idea involves a general outline of the form pro football will be amalgamated into two divisions of seven teams each and two of six, or they could be integrated into two conferences with divisions of four, four and five.

NFL owners appeared to be more receptive to the AFL idea Wednesday.

"Both leagues would be on equal footing from one league to the other," Commissioner Pete Rozelle said, acknowledging for the first time that the NFL was thinking of anything but retention of the present 16-10 setup with the addition of inter-league games.

At the beginning of the week, Rozelle said, the NFL was not sure if it would be a two-year residence in Miami.

New Orleans won out in a spirited tussle with Miami for the Super Bowl game between the AFL and NFL champions Jan. 11.

The vote, not announced, was not unanimous. But the majority prevailed for New Orleans in both leagues.

It's a one-shot deal for New Orleans, which was what the city advocated.

"This does not set a pattern, we'll play it loose, just as we have for the first games," said Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

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Boston Rewriting NHL Record Book

BOSTON, Mass. (AP) — Boston continues to rewrite the National Hockey League record book but the Bruins just can't seem to wipe out the Montreal Canadiens as easily as they do scoring standards.

The Bruins edged Pittsburgh 3-2 Wednesday night with Bobby Orr becoming their latest record maker but they remained three points back of Montreal in the East race because the Canadiens ripped Chicago 5-2. Boston has six games left to play and Montreal five.

In other games, New York whipped Minnesota 4-2, Toronto and St. Louis played to a 1-1 tie and Detroit dethroned Oakland 2-1.

Jacques Lemaire scored twice for Montreal and Bogie Vaclun kicked out 42 Chicago shots as the Black Hawks sank deeper in the East Division cellar.

Or scored his 20th goal of the season, matching the record for the National Hockey League Flash Hollett in 1944. It was the game-winner for the Bruins and pushed Orr's record total to 22.

Orr also assisted on Phil Esposito's 45th goal—the 119th point of the season for the record-breaking Bruin center.

The Bruins have scored 279 goals—15 more than the old NHL record for a team, but they still trail the Canadiens.

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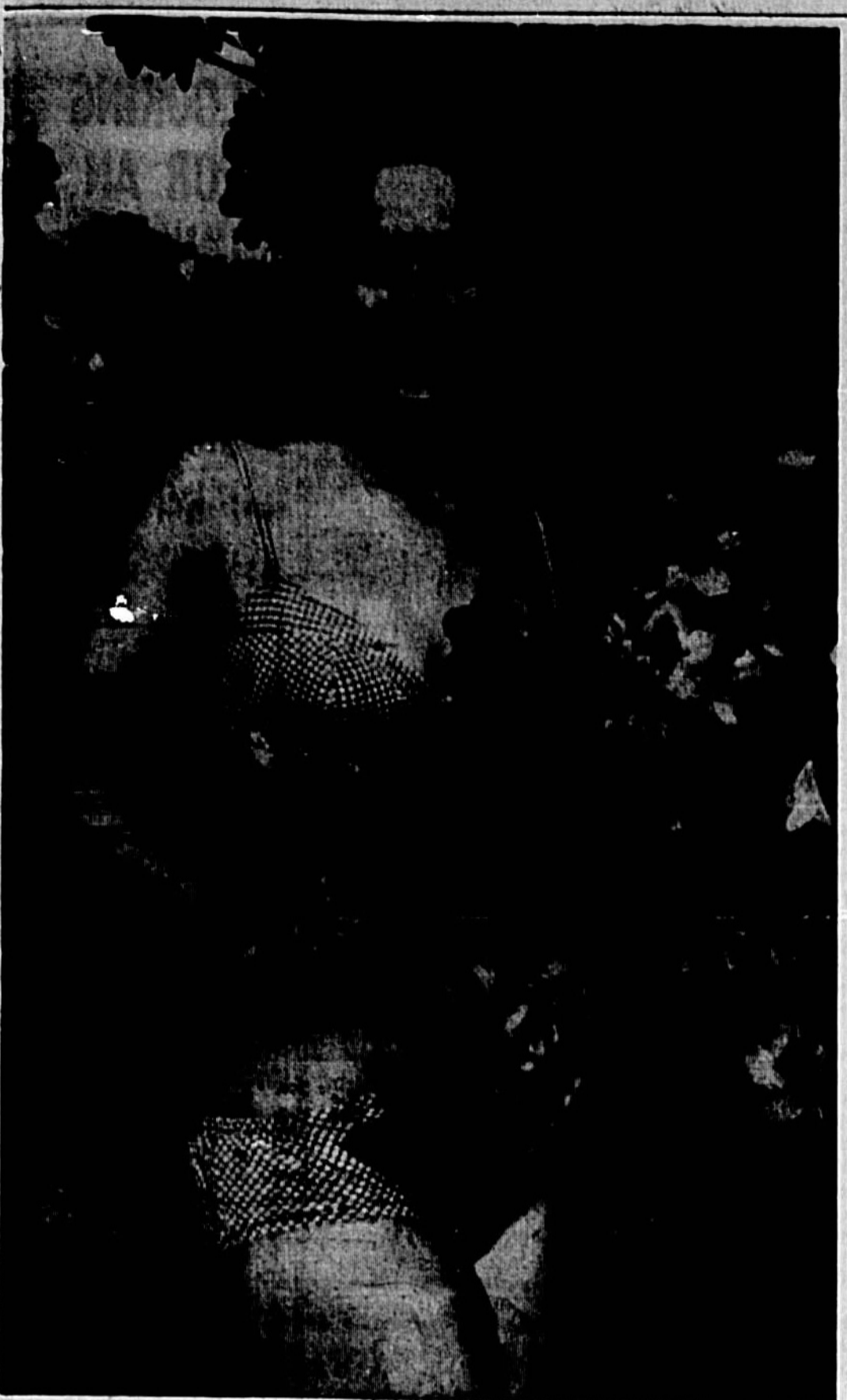

10,112 GIs Killed During Paris Peace Talks



SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command announced today that 10,112 GIs were killed during the eight weeks of 1969 prior to the offensive.

If the current casualty rate continues the total of American dead in the Vietnam war will exceed the Korean war toll of 33,623 by the end of this month. More Americans than in any other war in U.S. history except the Civil War and the two world wars.

The U.S. Command said 1,491 Americans were wounded last week, compared with 1,694 the week before.

South Vietnamese casualties were 223 killed and 1,156 wounded, up from 259 and 1,908 the previous week, the government said. Despite the mounting allied casualties, the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese were paying a far heavier price for their offensive.

The enemy's offensive rolled into its 26th day with no respite, U.S. headquarters reported about 30 rounds and mortar attacks on allied bases and towns Wednesday night.

For the second night, the chief target was Da Nang, South Vietnam's second largest city and a major military base.

U.S. spokesmen said more than 20 rounds of 160-mm rockets and mortars hit two buildings at the U.S. Navy's Camp Tan Son Nhut, a Navy cargo loading pier, a Seabee base, a Navy hospital and a Marine air base.

Two rounds missed Camp Tan Son Nhut and landed in a nearby village, killing two Vietnamese civilians and wounding six others.

Spokesmen said military casualties and damage were light, with about half a dozen Americans wounded but none killed. One mortar round did light damage to a ward in the hospital, but no casualties were reported there.

The rockets that hit Da Nang Tuesday night killed 14 civilians and wounded 24.

Hard ground fighting also was reported close to Da Nang, where South Vietnamese headquarters said enemy squads slipped into Vinh Dien, a district capital 10 miles south of Da Nang, before dawn Wednesday.

South Vietnamese military and armored personnel carriers battled all day to root them out.

Government spokesman said 115 enemy soldiers and 19 government men were killed and 74 of the defenders were wounded.

Civilians were caught in the crossfire with five killed, 11 wounded and 32 homes destroyed.

Elsewhere in the northern sector, a North Vietnamese force overran a militia camp near Tam Ky, but U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese troops took it back and killed 18 of the enemy in a sharp fight.

Government casualties were termed light and there were no Marine casualties in the fighting, spokesman said. Tam Ky is about 200 miles northeast of Saigon.

U.S. spokesmen said enemy troops appeared to be avoiding contact with the 11th Airborne Cavalry Regiment in the jungles and rubber plantations northwest of Saigon. The commander, Allan Wedge, is expected to forestall an attack on Saigon. Spokesmen said American forces had killed 174 enemy soldiers since the operation began Tuesday. Dive-bombers, helicopter gunships and artillery raked the enemy positions.

In one Atlas Wedge action Wednesday night, enemy machine guns and small arms opened up on tanks and armored personnel carriers from the 11th Airborne Cavalry Regiment five miles northwest of Da Nang. The American armor was repelled with American and 50-caliber machine guns while helicopter gunships and artillery raked the enemy positions.

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Whites, Blacks Boycott Eight Orange Schools

APOPKA, Fla. (AP) — White and black parents, angry by a school board decision to mix their children at Apopka High School, called an eight-school boycott today.

More than 2,000 persons, about 300 of them Negroes, met Wednesday at a high school football stadium to plan a boycott of the Orange County School Board's plan to merge predominantly black Phyllis Wheatley High School into Apopka High.

The issue was simple: parents of both races in this small town that calls itself "Folgate Capital of the World" want to maintain the present racial identification of their schools.

Former Florida Justice John McLeod, a white speaker, said he didn't like boycotts and hippie-type demonstrations "but this is like the case of the mule that you have to hit with a stick and two by four to get his attention. We're desperate now to get the school board's attention."

Mrs. Jennings told the crowd white leaders had committed themselves to support of black desires for separate schools.

"The mayor promised us the fight would not stop here, that we would work at a state level and he assured us you would work with us to upgrade our school," she said.

At the meeting, end of pamphlets prepared by County School Board officials were distributed. Parents of boycotters were liable to six-month jail sentences and \$500 fines if convicted of violating Florida laws were distributed.

"If this letter is right, Mr. White has a lot of affidavits to serve," Mayor Leonard Hurst said.

90 Pilgrims Meet Death

CAIRO (AP) — An Egyptian airliner loaded with Moslem pilgrims returning from Mecca crashed in upper Egypt Tuesday, killing 90 persons, the Middle East News Agency reported.

The plane, a Soviet Ilyushin Il-14, crashed in a field near the town of Assiut, about 110 miles from Cairo.

The plane was carrying 90 pilgrims, including 70 from the Middle East and 20 from Europe.

The cause of the crash is not yet clear.

19 Sportsmen Killed

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A chartered plane carrying a group of Tennessee sportsmen crashed and burned while landing in a heavy fog this morning at New Orleans International Airport and one report said 19 men were killed on Feb. 27.

The FBI identified the gunman as Douglas Alton Dickey, 27, and said documents in his possession showed he was born in Casa Grande, Ariz. He was held on a federal charge of air piracy, which carries a maximum penalty of death.

Robert E. Rightmyer, agent in charge of the New Orleans FBI office, said Dickey boarded the plane, Delta Airlines Flight 518, Wednesday night at Dallas.

Rightmyer said the man produced his pistol and took over the plane about five minutes before it was scheduled to land at New Orleans. He agreed to a landing when the pilot said he could not make it to Cuba without refueling.

Once the plane was on the ground, Rightmyer said, the gunman said the 89 other passengers could get off. The last passenger to approach the exit door, where the man stood gun in hand, was Reed, assistant special agent in charge at Oklahoma City.

Reed stopped in front of the man and informed him he was under arrest. He said the man replied: "I do not intend to kill you. I am going to Havana and I am going to shoot you in the leg."

Reed subdued him in a quick struggle, during which the pistol fired once.

Reed's presence on the plane was due to his recent transfer from the FBI office at Mobile, Ala., to Oklahoma City. He was flying back to Mobile to move his wife and six children to their new home.

Arabs, Israelis Duel Again

TEL AVIV (AP) — Arab and Israeli forces duelled again in the violence-scarred Beisan Valley south of the Sea of Galilee today. The Israeli army said 11 border policemen were wounded.

The newspaper also said some of the Arab rounds came from Soviet 122mm artillery and 120mm mortar rounds from Israeli troops. Israeli soldiers have been stationed in the area, and some have moved north into Syria.

A military spokesman in Amman accused the Israelis of using napalm and machine guns in the air attack.

At the United Nations, Israeli Ambassador Yosef Tekoa decried the Israeli attack on Beisan, saying it was a "pretext for 'cruelty against Jews similar to Jews'."

Foreign Minister Abba Eban of Israel, speaking in Chicago Wednesday night, discounted the significance of recent cease-fire violations in the Middle East.

"Cease-fire incidents are just cease-fire incidents and not generalized war," he said.

The Cairo press criticized the Nixon administration for treating Israeli pilots in the United States to fly supersonic Phantom warplanes and accused the President of "pursuing the same pro-Israel policies of former President Johnson."

Kirk Urges 'Poor' Unit

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk says creation of a state department of community affairs would be a step toward making public education meaningful to children from poverty-stricken homes.

He stressed at the Urban Conference on Education Wednesday that slum children need to be taught skills that will make them eligible to hold good jobs.

Concentrate Sales Up 30%

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — Florida Citrus concentrate has been on a 21 million-a-day boom with demand up 30 per cent in one year, says Florida Citrus Board president Robert W. Rutledge.

Rutledge told the Citrus Board Wednesday that demand for Florida concentrate has outstripped the expectations of many industry figures.

"Demand for frozen orange concentrate has increased dramatically and many persons continue to underestimate demand for the industry's No. 1 product," he said.

Concentrate sales "are 30 per cent above one year ago," Rutledge said, and inventories continue to fall below normal levels.

He stressed the rapid rate of increase in demand for concentrate to increased spending for advertising and promotion, improved packaging and a quality improvement program.

The citrus industry has invested considerably to earn greater share of an ever-growing, ever-greater food market, Rutledge said.

He said there is a "strong outlook for the citrus industry's marketing period."

The mutual board voted to conduct a citrus research institute early in the summer to uncover new products from existing research programs and to speed development of new studies.

The board also agreed to appoint a committee to insure that additional packaging improvements are accomplished.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Corps of Engineers says barge canal needs \$5 billion to complete.

The jury heard testimony that Arrant and another man plotted to use Arrant's wife to lure the 29-year-old Benson to a deserted country road where he was shot through the head and robbed of \$1,500.

Arrant must return to Atlanta, Ga., to complete an eight-month moonlighting sentence he is serving in Raleigh State Prison where he will join his brother, John Thomas Arrant, who also is serving a life sentence for homicide.

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Pentagon Cuts Plans For FB111

WASHINGTON (AP) — The new Pentagon leadership has cut down the FB111 strategic bomber program.

Chief Robert S. McNamara indicated today that a good replacement for aging B52s.

Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird told Congress Wednesday he is cutting plans for the swing-wing jet to only four squadrons—a nominal 60 planes.

Three years ago McNamara was proposing 290 FB111s—variants of the controversial TX2 design—contending it would be as good as, and less expensive, as another advanced bomber the Air Force could develop to haul its nuclear bombs to the 1970s.

Laird made plain he was buying the four squadrons mainly to recover something from the vast funds spent on the program — "to salvage what we can of the work in process," as he put it.

Despite months of work, Laird said, the FB111 "is still experiencing development and production difficulties and the cost per aircraft continues to mount."

Pentagon officials said the 60 planes will cost \$1.7 billion overall, which includes heavy research and development on a completely new nuclear-equipped plane the Air Force calls the Advanced Manned Strategic Aircraft—AMSA.

Laird proposed spending \$10 million to move toward full-scale engineering development for an AMSA in the next fiscal year.

The FB111 trimming was the latest setback to McNamara's program for having each of the services develop the planes they needed from one basic design.

The Navy tried to get a carrier-based fighter, the F111B, from the TX2 design but jostled the Air Force's design for the development difficulties and a spending more than \$200 million.

The Air Force fighter-bomber version, the F111A, is coming along with fewer problems although 13 has crashed during tests, combat trials in Southeast Asia and training flights.

The Air Force says F111A bugs will be worked out and that it wants the plane.

Laird apparently is also satisfied the F111A will be an asset in the Air Force inventory.

Pentagon officials say he has approved a force level of more than 400 F111As, about the same number authorized by the outgoing defense administration of Clark M. Clifford.

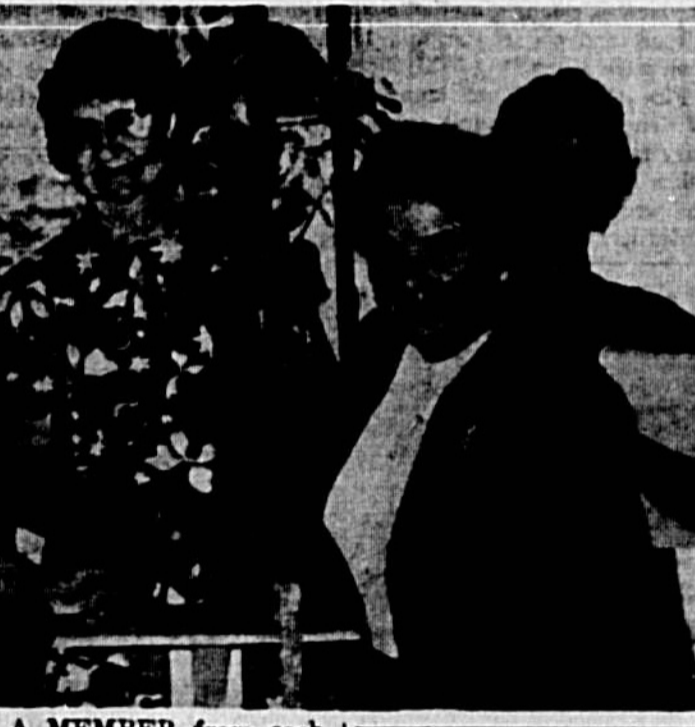

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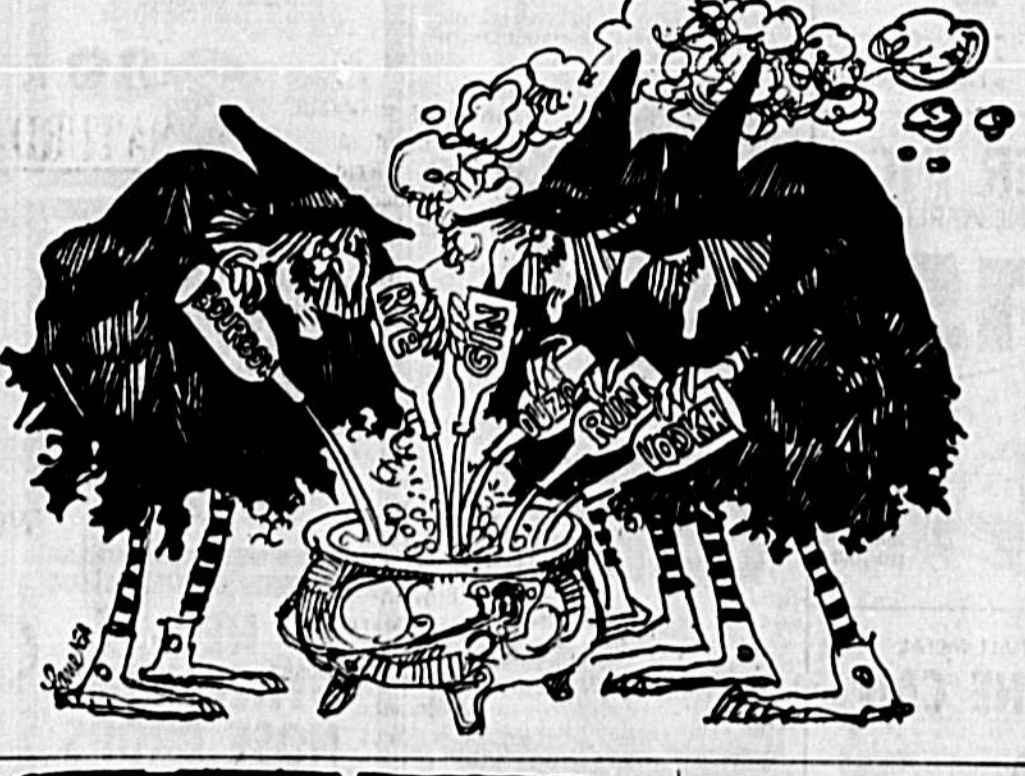

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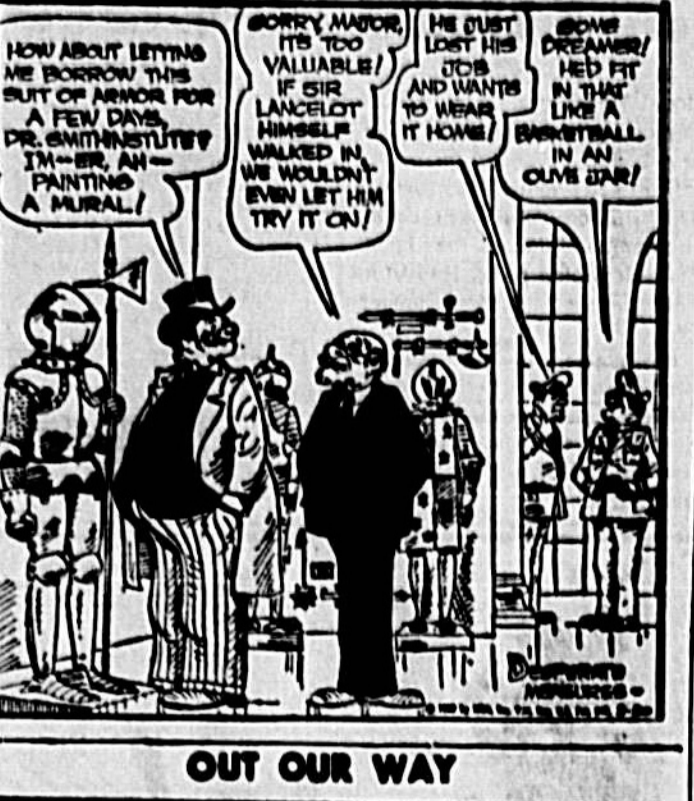

Peru Seizes, Fines 2 U. S. Tuna Boats

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Peru seized two more U.S. tuna boats but released their captain Wednesday night after their captain paid \$25,000 in fines.

The incident could complicate the negotiations John F. Kennedy, a special representative of President Johnson, is beginning with the Peruvian government over the appropriation of U.S. off-shore properties.

Iwata, who arrived last week, declined to comment on the seizure of the two ships from San Diego, Calif., the Cape Azore and the San Juan, 23 miles off the north coast of the Andean nation.

A Peruvian torpedo boat took the two U.S. ships in tow. Peru claims a 200-mile territorial fishing limit while the United States and most other nations recognize a 12-mile limit.

For the San Juan, whose captain had to pay a \$17,000 fine, it was the second encounter with Peruvian naval power. Last Feb. 14, when a gunboat seized another U.S. ship, the San Juan was fired on.

The Cape Azore, whose captain paid a \$8,000 fine, was involved in a similar incident in 1965 when it sailed under the name Mayflower, maritime sources here said. Then it was sailing 75 miles offshore when a Peruvian vessel fired at it, slightly wounding an American seaman.

In Washington, several congressmen called for reprisals against Peru and Rep. Thomas M. Pelly, R-Wash., said there have been nearly 40 "illegal" seizures of American tuna boats in Latin-American waters since 1961.

Rep. Edward A. Garnatz, D-Md., introduced a resolution demanding the return of the U.S. destroyer Liberdade, which is on loan to Peru. U.S. law already provides for the return of such warships from countries that illegally seize U.S. fishing boats.

Iwata is continuing his talks with government officials about the appropriation of the International Fisheries Co., a subsidiary of Standard Oil of New Jersey.

There are indications that the \$200 million debt Peru claims the company owes it may be impossible which could lead to an agreement on the seized property.

Brush also has conferred with American sailing officials and representatives of the fishing industry but there was no indication the fishing dispute had been discussed.

British Invasion Troops Broil Under Carib Sun

ANGUILLA (AP) — British troops, broiled under the Caribbean sun today as they went through the motions of military occupation. The Anguillians remained quiet following the bloodless invasion of their tiny island.

"Doesn't this sun ever go down?" complained a sun-burned paratrooper manning a highway checkpoint.

The 35-square-mile island has few trees, and many of the young men flown out from cold, gloomy Britain were badly sunburned a few hours after their dawn landing Wednesday. Temperatures were in the upper 80s.

The 6,000 Anguillians offered no armed resistance to the occupation by 135 British paratroopers and marines, and there was only one major emotional outburst.

When acting President Ronald Webster called on British officers at their command headquarters Wednesday, a crowd of about 300 of his people hoisted him to their shoulders, shouted their support and sang the Anguillian freedom song to the tune of the Battle Hymn of the Republic.

Webster went to the school house headquarters to arrange a meeting with the occupiers, which he said would be held today. However, he said he would hold no formal negotiations until the British troops are withdrawn.

Webster also protested the invasion in a note to London Wednesday night.

Anthony Lee, an official from London installed by the invasion force as commissioner for the island, said the British occupation might last several years. But the paratroopers and marines are expected to depart soon, leaving a detachment of London police to keep the Union Jack flying.

The British government has assured the Anguillians they will not be forced back into federation with the island of St. Kitts. They seceded from the federation May 31, 1967, complaining that the federation's prime minister, Robert L. Bradshaw, treated them as stepchildren.

Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart told the British House of Commons the occupation would give all concerned a breathing space to determine where their real interests lie. He made clear that the government feared Anguilla's secession. If it succeeded, would inspire other islands to break away from other British-sponsored federations, leaving Britain to take care of the rebels when they couldn't support themselves.

For the most part, Anguilla's 6,000 Negro inhabitants stood about in small groups and watched impassively as the white invaders set up roadblocks and posted guards at such strategic points as the island's partially paved airstrip.

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Hints To Follow In Building Family Swim Pool

About 3 1/2 million swimming pools of all types are in use in the U.S. and more than half of those belong to the U.S. homeowner.

Before buying a pool, keep these basic facts in mind - the budget you want to apply to the pool; the type that fits your preferences; the location of the pool; the size of the pool; and how you should put your pool in; and the extra to plan for family pool fun.

Pool comes in three basic types. There are the above-ground pools. Then there are two types with a permanent fixed structure. The first is the in-the-ground pool. It is built in an excavation. The second is the in-the-ground pool, whose fixed walls rise from the surface of the ground, though the deep end may be set in a partial excavation. Circular portable pools cost a fortune. They are made of plastic or vinyl and are set up on a flat surface. They are built of a material that is made of plastic or vinyl. They can run anywhere from \$2,000 up to \$10,000. Permanent pools come in many sizes and shapes. They are made of concrete, block, or in all steel, aluminum or fiberglass. The price of a pool should include the recirculating system, ladder, and other accessories. The pool should include slip guard rails, filter, chlorinator, test kit and sand.

In setting up a budget, remember that pools are usually assessed for taxes, and if a pool is to be used for swimming, it should be built on a level site. The site should be checked with tax and insurance people locally. Pools come in almost any shape nowadays, and the average pool ranges from 16 by 20 to 20 by 40 feet. The per-person formula is 32 square feet for each swimmer and 64 square feet for each child. The pool should be at least 8 feet, minimum depth at the children's end and two and one-half to three and one-half feet.

Remember your pool, you should consider the architecture of your house, landscaping, color of the land, and your family activities. Rectangular pools are best for competitive swimming. WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon is expected to seek from Ellsworth Rusk in consultations starting this weekend the ambassador's views on how soon South Vietnam may be politically and militarily strong enough to permit the withdrawal of U.S. troops.

The question is one of several major issues believed to come up after Nixon and his chief foreign policy adviser meet Bunker and Gen. Andrew J. Goodpaster at San Clemente, Calif., Sunday morning.

At present, Nixon is in the position of having said that if enemy attacks on the cities of South Vietnam continued "some appropriate response" would be made but that any action taken would be judged primarily by its possible effect on the Paris peace talks.

The offensive has been going on for four weeks. If the recently launched U.S. counteroffensive around Saigon is the "appropriate response" of which the President spoke it has not been so labeled officially.
