July 4: Fireworks, fun, music, food and more

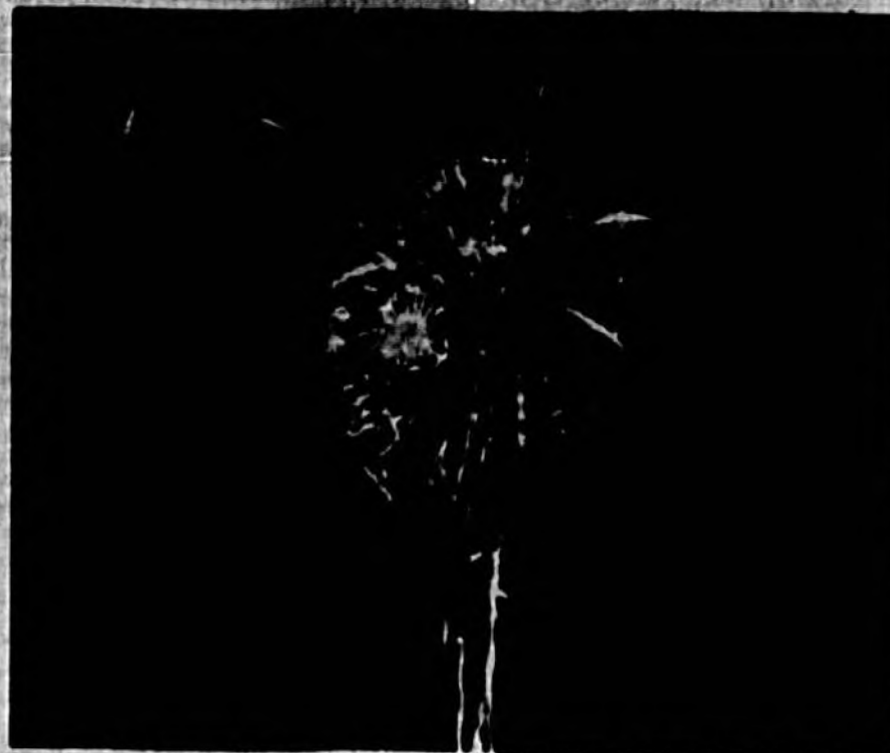

And the rockets red glare. The bombs bursting in air. No. It is not another Seminole County commission meeting on adult entertainment. It is Sanford's July 4 Celebration. And the fireworks are expected to light up the night sky as an estimated 30,000 spectators gaze along the waterfront.

Sanford Main Street, MIX 105.1 FM and COOL 105.9 are set to bring this "big bang" to roaring life tonight starting at 5 p.m. Actually, the day started off with a Merchant Sidewalk sale at 10 a.m. in Sanford's historic downtown. Main Street Program Director Jennifer Singelsen said that Seminole Towne Center merchants are also having their own sidewalk sale.

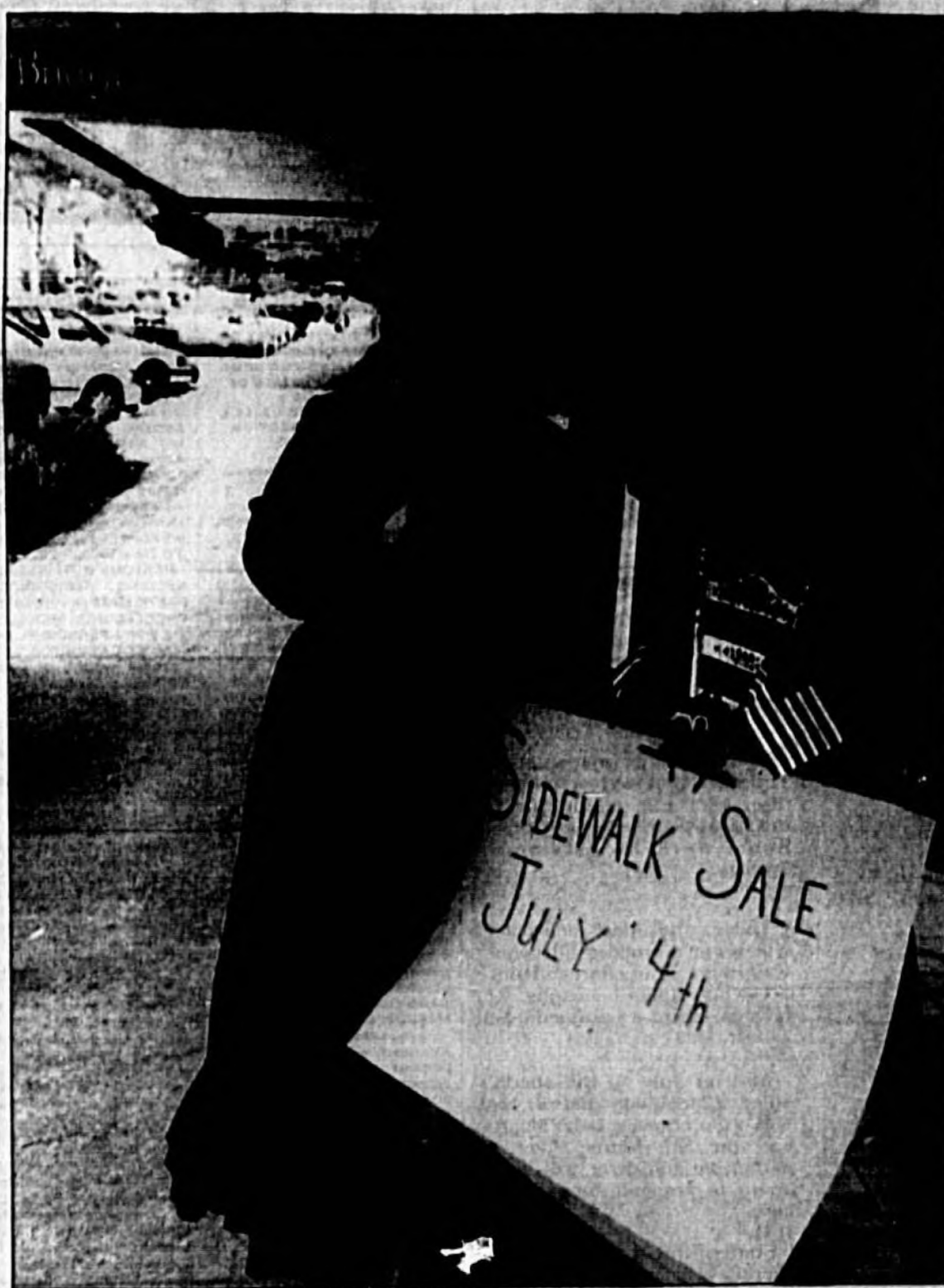
Browse and shop till 5, when the entertainment will start at Fort Mellon Park and will continue throughout the evening. The band "Instant Replay", which is a 15 piece pop band and troupe, will feature songs from the 60's and 70's, and will continue to perform throughout the night. The music doesn't stop then. At the First Street Gallery, there will be a dance and party featuring the local talent of "Felix and the Cats", a blues group that will be performing until 12:30 a.m. Cover charge is \$5.

As part of the July 4th Celebration today, the First Street Gallery will be rockin' blues style with the sounds of "Felix and the Cats". The band will perform for the listening and dancing pleasure of Gallery patrons from 10:30 p.m. to 12:30 p.m. The concert will cost \$5. Seating is limited for the show, and the band plans to start immediately after the fireworks.

Felix Reyes, the band leader, is a native Sanfordite who lives with his wife, Erica. Reyes moved from Atlanta last September. After a great 1996, the Cats closed out the year in Atlanta with five nights at the Olympics playing at Underground's "Bud Light" stage. This was the last gig for Reyes' band which had a successful five-year run.

Before following his wife to Sanford in September, Reyes stopped in Jacksonville where he appeared at the "Springing the Blues" festival in August 96. Later the same month, Reyes was booked to open for Maria Muldaur (*Midnight at the Oasis*) in Savannah, Georgia as part of the Historic Train Station Concert Series.

In April 97, Reyes auditioned new band members while he performed solo at the "Roy C." show at the Sanford Civic Center as part of the "Ace Moreland Band", comprised of musicians under Sanford's King Snake Records. Reyes also played with Moreland's band at the recent Two Rivers Festival.

This June, Reyes firm'd up his band with new drummer Tom Bastito, electric bass

Nunsense a rollicking good time

As part of Sanford's July 4th celebration, come see a celebration of a different type. The Ritz Theatre will run its last spring season production, *Nunsense*, now in its second week, tonight and through July 13. Tonight will be a special show to coordinate with the fireworks display at the lakefront. The show will start at 7 p.m.

The old Touchton building in historic downtown will double for a fund-raising event by a diverse group of nuns. The sisters of Hoboken must get money to bury four

remaining sisters they are keeping in a freezer. The sisters suffered food poisoning from bad vichyssoise, and now Mother Superior and four of her subordinates are going to raise your spirits in song, dance and wonderful comedy. Director Fred Rogers with his talented staff that includes musical direction by Stephen Pritchard, stage manager Amy Eckenwiler and

technical director Joel Buntin, sets up a pink splashed stage adorned with a silver garland curtain. And once the lights come up and the nuns take the stage, the joy begins.

Amie Fontino, who is also the production's vocal coach, is the cautious Mother Superior. This a robust role for Fontino who brings out sister Mary Regina's secret desire to be a stage star. Rachel Fine plays the high strung Mistress of Novices, Mary Hubert, who likes to kick up her heels once in a while. Abigail Paul plays sister Robert Anne, the streetwise nun who wants a chance to do a number, but it always falls on a deaf ear. Anne comes from

Exhaustive Face/Off

Face/Off (R): Face/Off is a well directed, well acted film, but that is it. This movie is like an electrical outlet with too many plugs in it -- it overloads itself. This film has elements of science fiction, action, psychological drama and thriller rolled into one crowded movie.

Directed by Hong Kong director John Woo, Face/Off is about a mournful FBI agent named Sean Archer (John Travolta) who is hot on the tracks of his son's killer Castor Troy (Nicholas Cage), a sadistic satyromaniac who has trouble keeping his libido in check. The audience must assume that Archer's and Troy's conflict has gone far past the death of Archer's son.

A violent shoot-out in a hangar leaves Troy in a coma, and Archer writing off the murderous devil until he finds out that Troy has planted a huge bomb in downtown Los Angeles. Then the unthinkable happens to Archer. To find the location of the bomb, Archer must go undercover to coerce Troy's brother into telling where it is. But he must go undercover as Castor Troy! After a high tech operation, Archer has become his enemy. But when Troy awakens and finds himself faceless, he dons the face of Archer and then the ironies fly.

The plot is predictable after this point, and, at the end, the film seems too tidy. I was looking for a darker film, and, in my opinion, that would have been the best approach. Keep the thriller and psychological drama aspects. Leave out the excess. This movie could have been cut more. Scenes go on far too long and you may feel exhaustion at the end of the film.

There is a scene in this film where Archer and Troy are battling in boats. An audience

member questioned, "How long is this scene going to take?" This is an example of what Face/Off is: long winded. John Woo is a talented director; no argument here on that point. But brevity could have been a key to the movie's success. And if screenwriters Mike Webb and Michael Colleary -- both are making their feature film writing debut -- would have narrowed their story to include maybe one or two focal elements the story would have been a lot better.

As I mentioned, Woo is talented. His style is so easily distinguishable. He likes to slow motion the action, especially projectiles like bullets and arrows. In the opening sequence where Sean's son is murdered, Woo also shows the audience that his range exceeds the action genre. It is a nightmarish scene with slow motion and a disturbing fade-out at the end. There is also this scene with a standoff in a church that is reminiscent of the western with the classic "high noon" stare downs. The scene also reminded me of those Japanese "chop-socky" movies Quentin Tarantino was inspired by.

John Travolta stars in his second Woo film. He teamed with the director for the critically panned Broken Arrow. Here Travolta and co-star Nicholas Cage (Con Air) mas-

Sheriff announces holiday patrols

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has announced holiday patrols for the Fourth of July weekend, beginning last night and continuing through Sunday.

The Alert 2 helicopter on Thursday provided aerial security and traffic monitoring for the fireworks display at Crane's Roost Park in Altamonte Springs.

Today, the Alert helicopters will begin patrolling all county waterways in an effort to reduce accidents. Each helicopter will have on board a paramedic and a diver.

Also on July 4, the sheriff's office 22-foot-long patrol boat will begin cruising Lake Monroe and the St. Johns River. A paramedic and diver will be on board to respond to emergencies.

Starting this morning, deputy sheriffs will be patrolling Lake Branley, Bear Lake and the St. Johns River on jet skis. They will be looking for DUI boaters and conducting safety inspections.

Tonight, the Alert 2 helicopter and the patrol boat will provide security for the fireworks display at Lake Monroe, Sanford.

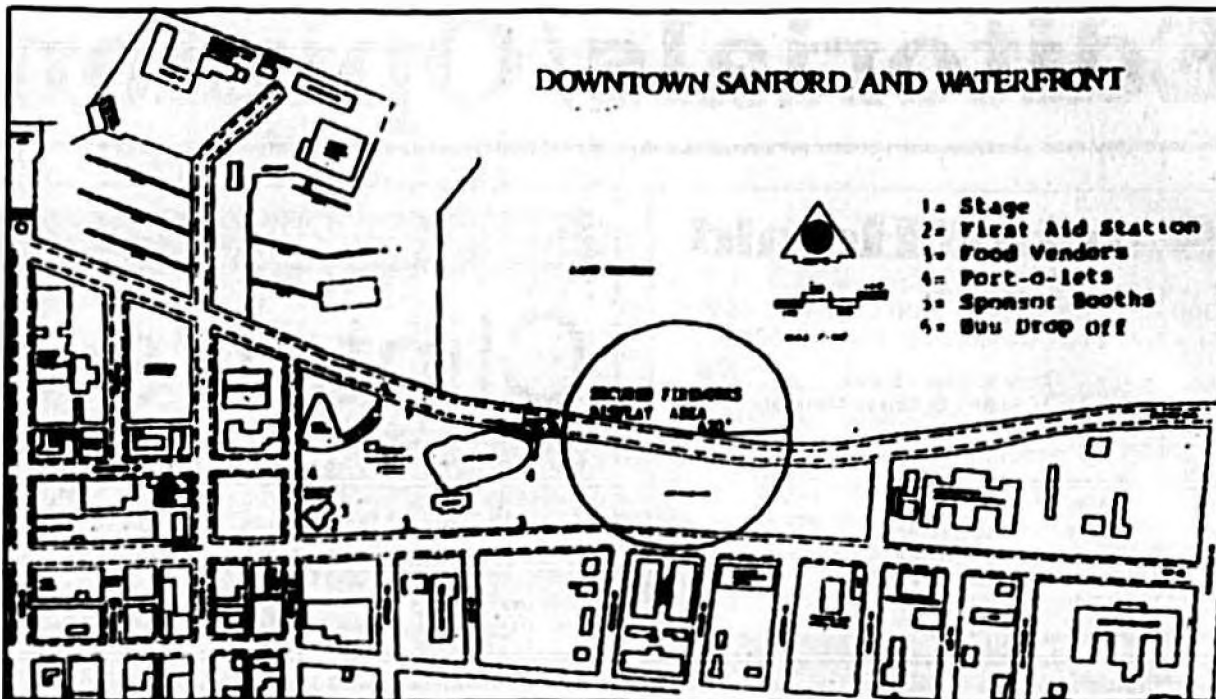

Clinton's use of kids shameful

Am I the only one who's grown tired of President Clinton's shameless habit of using "children" to defend practically every public policy he advocates? It's as if he thinks he's the second coming of George Washington: a latter-day father of our country.

Name an issue -- any issue -- and the president claims to have arrived at his position because of his profound concern for the well-being of America's 70 million or so youngsters. As to those folks who differ with the president on an issue -- well, they must not love kids as much as he does.

That's precisely what the president intimated this week when he announced his support for new clean-air standards. I approved some very strong new regulations today that will be somewhat controversial," said Clinton. "But I think kids ought to be healthy."

But the debate is not about healthy kids. It's whether the benefits of the Draconian new regulations endorsed by Clinton justify the extraordinary new costs. Some 250 members of Congress, 27 governors, 1,000 mayors, and assorted state and local government officials do not think so.

Their sentiment is shared by at least one

member of the president's Council of Economic Advisers. "The incremental health-risk reduction for more stringent standards is small," according to a memo written by Alicia Munnell.

She estimated that just one of the new rules will cost as much as \$60 billion a year, while providing benefits of \$1 billion or less.

Munnell, a liberal economist, would no doubt agree with critics of the new clean-air standards that there are far more cost-efficient ways to reduce health risks for the nation's children.

Yet, her boss -- the president -- is moving

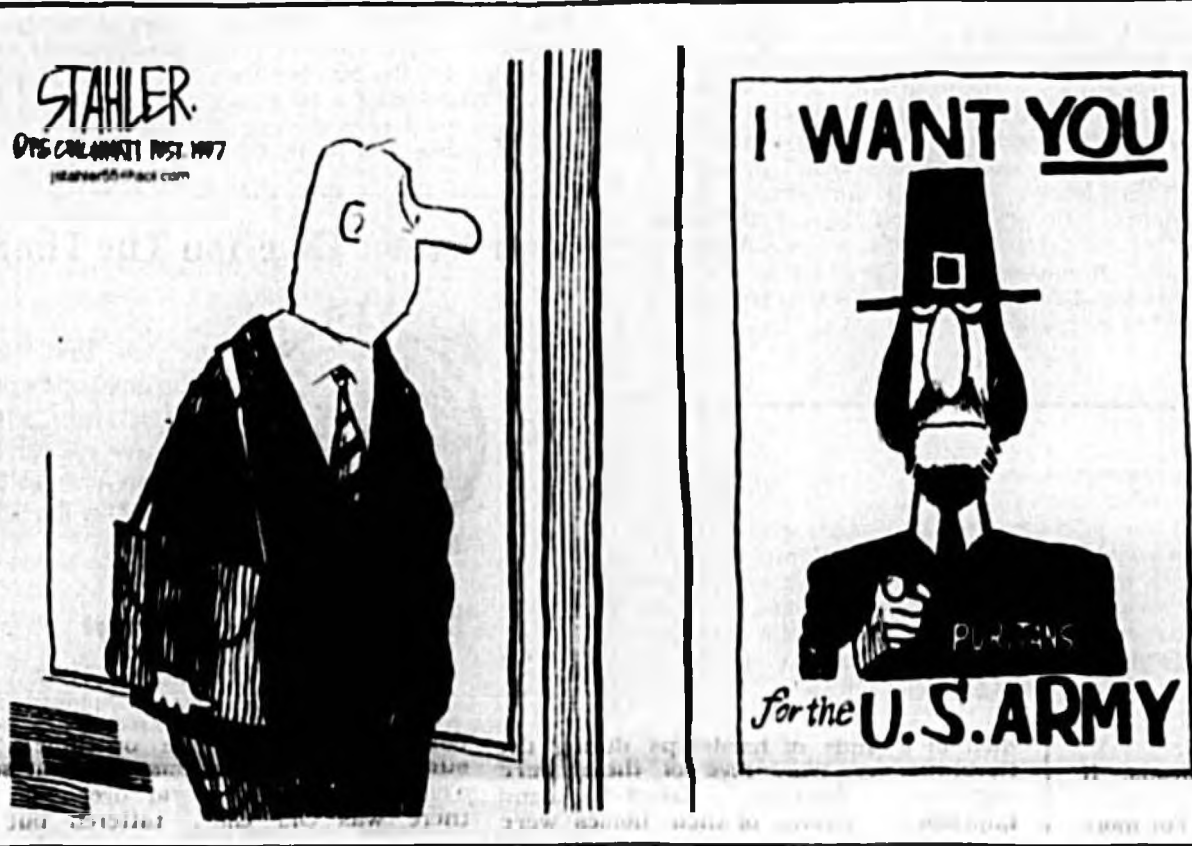
full speed ahead with implementation of the onerous new clean-air standards in the name of kids.

Kids are also the pretext for the president's regulatory jihad against the distilled spirits industry.

He's peeved with the rapacalions because they decided late last year to abandon their 50-year-old voluntary ban on television advertising.

"Liquor has no business with kids, and kids have no business with liquor," the president preached. "Liquor ads on television would provide a message of encouragement to drink that young people simply don't need. Nothing good can come of it."

But there is no evidence whatsoever to support Clinton's wild claim that kids will start swilling gin or vodka or rum just because a Tanqueray or Absolut or Bacardi commercial airs on television. Indeed, that is the conclusion of Morris E. Chafetz, founding director of the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, a division of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Indians' trust fund mismanaged

If any other government agency--or any private corporation--were as mismanaged as the Bureau of Indian Affairs, there is little doubt that those responsible would now be in jail.

But in Bill Clinton's Washington, the bureaucrats who run the BIA just keep right on working with the president's blessing. That's because nobody much cares what happens to the BIA--or the millions of American Indians whose interests the agency is supposed to represent.

But both the federal government and Congress soon may be forced to pay attention to the agency. A class-action suit that's pending in federal court could force Uncle Sam to pony up several billion dollars to clean up a mess that's been decades in the making.

At issue is the trust fund that the BIA administers on behalf of 300,000 individual Indians and their tribes. The trust fund was set up in the 19th century to handle the royalty money paid by corporations that use Indian land for their own commercial purposes. In other words, if someone wants to drill oil, or mine gold on Indian land, they have to pay a royalty to the BIA, which puts the money into a trust fund.

But while the rest of the federal government has modernized in recent years, the BIA remains mired in the past. To this day, the agency doesn't have a computerized accounting system to keep track of the trust fund. In fact, nobody has any idea how much money is in there--or who it belongs to. Ledgers were kept by hand, and many of the records are irretrievably lost. Estimates vary, but nearly every expert agrees that several billion dollars in trust fund money is simply unaccounted for.

It wasn't long after Clinton arrived in Washington that the full extent of the trust fund debacle became known. Yet Clinton won the hearts of many Indians by inviting tribal leaders to the White House. He also appointed an American Indian, Ada Deer, to run the agency--the first-ever Indian to hold that post.

Impatient, Congress created a special trustee in 1994 to study the problem and recommend some solutions. His name is Paul Homan, and he came to the job with impeccable credentials. A former bank president, he knew a little something about finances.

After studying the problem and concluding that, in fact, the trust fund was in shambles, Homan came up with a solid idea: Why not remove the trust fund from BIA's jurisdiction, and create a new agency to care for the cash? The new agency would work like a semi-private corporation, similar to Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac.

Homan's plan called for Congress to replenish the trust fund on a one-time basis. After that, the new agency--using computers and modern accounting techniques--would collect and distribute the royalties. Problem solved?

Not quite. Three years after Homan began his mission, the BIA and its parent agency, the Department of Interior, is now trying to sabotage the plan. Bureaucrats at the BIA and Interior don't like the idea of relinquishing power over the multi-billion-dollar trust fund.

This has outraged Homan's supporters in Congress, including Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., a longtime proponent of cleaning up the trust fund mess.

Improving care for the dying

BOSTON--So there is no last right for the dying. No right to doctor-assisted suicide. Not in the Constitution. Not in the Supreme Court's view. Not yet.

In a ruling as sober as its subject, all nine justices refused to accept the notion that assisted suicide was a fundamental liberty for the terminally ill. They rejected the argument that aid-in-dying embodied the "right to determine the time and manner of one's death," or the "liberty to choose how to die" or even the "right to a human, dignified death."

Instead, they reinstated two state bans on the practice. Instead, they declared that "a right to commit suicide which itself includes a right to assistance in doing so...has no place in our nation's traditions ..."

But not even the court's unanimity could hide either the nuances of opinion or the range of life experiences among these justices.

Writing the main decision was Chief Justice Rehnquist, whose wife died of cancer. Among the six who wrote concurrences was Justice Breyer, whose wife works with cancer patients.

Indeed the most eloquent of the briefs was authored by Justice O'Connor. Surely her own encounter with breast cancer colored her reminder that "Death will be different for each of us. For many the last days will be spent in physical pain and perhaps the despair that accompanies physical deterioration and a loss of control of basic bodily and mental function."

Throughout the opinions there was a thread of ambivalence as apparent on the bench as in the public. On the one hand, Justice Souter, "Most terminally ill people find their lives meaningful even if filled with pain or dependence." But on the other hand, he understood the need to give "proper recognition to the individual's interest in choosing a final chapter that accords with her life story, rather than one that demeans her values and poisons memories of her."

Reading this decision, I remembered what a psychologist had told me this spring in Amsterdam. Assisted suicide, he said, was a Rorschach test. We each interpret this ethical inkblot through our own psyche, especially our own fears.

The Supreme Court justices, no less than the rest of us, sought the balance between those fears as O'Connor described them: "The interests of terminally ill, mentally competent individuals who would seek to end their suffering and the state's interest in protecting those who might seek to end life mistakenly or under pressure."

What seems to have weighted that balance for the justices was a belief--or perhaps a wish--that suffering can be relieved enough to make assisted suicide less fundamental to our freedom of choice.

Supporters of aid-in-dying have long argued that, in the real world of doctors and terminal patients, the difference between hastening death with painkillers and assisting suicide is, in Harvard's Laurence Tribe's phrase, "transparently phony." But now Breyer seemed to take comfort from the very idea that doctors can legally "control pain despite the risk that those drugs themselves will kill."

What comfort is there for those of us, the well-pollled majority, who still believe doctors should be able to assist the dying process? Who believes that secret and illegal acts of mercy should be legal and regulated choices?

For one thing, there were enough legal doors left open by the decision to make the future look like a hospital hallway. Beyond that, the Supreme Court clearly rested its moral case on the availability of palliative care. It rested its political case on the belief--just short of an order--that this is a matter for the states to debate.

With nearly the same unanimity, the justices echoed Rehnquist's statement that "throughout the nation, Americans are engaged in an earnest and profound debate about the morality, legality and practicality of physician-assisted suicide. Our holding permits this debate to continue as it should in a democratic society."

And so it will continue. In Oregon, where the nation's only assisted-suicide law will be up for a repeal. In the ongoing meetings of ethicists or doctors or patients. In the media. In Dr. Kevoorkian's chambers.

There is, as well, comfort in how quickly and passionately this debate has taken hold in our society.

Both sides of the debate on assisted suicide have now found common ground in improving the care of the dying. We see that in new AMA guidelines, in the burgeoning hospice movement, in the demand for better painkillers and better communication.

The legal right for doctor-assisted suicide was never more than a last resort. The larger case, for a more merciful way of dying, is by no means closed.

'Let Freedom Ring' - Fourth of July

The Pilgrims of Early America in 1620 came to a new land seeking freedom and hope. Over a hundred and fifty years later, this hope continued to materialize when the delegates from Virginia submitted a proposal to the Continental Congress to declare the Colonies free and independent States, absolved from allegiance to or dependence upon the Crown." From this, five men wrote a historic document which was completed and accepted on July 2, 1776. After two days (July 4th), the Declaration of Independence was formally adopted by the Continental Congress. This was the beginning of "Let Freedom Ring" in America some 221 years ago.

Freedom and hope continued but not without great struggle and war between the Colonies and the mother country, Britain. Amid the War, when Independence seemed to hang in the balance only by a thin thread, General George Washington fell to his knees in the snow at Valley Forge and called upon God for help. By Divine Intervention, Washington led his discouraged, exhausted and battered army to victory.

Following the war years, the signing of the Constitution of the United States climaxed a four-month debate. During this debate the Constitutional Convention saw tempers flare and former agreements disappear. At one point on June 2, 1887, Benjamin Franklin rose to his feet and spoke these words.

"How has it happened, Sir, that we have not hitherto once thought of humbly applying to the Father of Lights to illuminate our understandings? We have been assured, Sir, in the sacred writing that 'except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it.' I firmly believe this. I therefore beg leave to move that henceforth prayers, imploring the assistance of heaven and its blessing on our deliberations, be held in this assembly every morning before we proceed to business."

Reliance on prayer helped bring forth the Constitution which we now hold dear.

America has a great history and heritage

Fifty-six American leaders made this history possible by pledging their "lives, fortunes, and their sacred honor." This was no easy pledge as nine of the Signers died of wounds of hardships during the Revolutionary War. Five of these were captured, brutally treated and imprisoned. Twelve of their homes were burned to the ground and another seventeen lost everything they owned. All fifty-six were labeled traitors. Many were



offered immunity if they would recant their pledges. However, not one Signer defected or changed his stand, and their honor for freedom was sustained.

American has great songs

During the night of September 13, 1814, Francis Scott Key, a noted Washington, D.C. lawyer, and Dr. William Beanes, George Washington's physician who had been held in the harbor by the British but released to Key that day, awaited in a small boat to return to land. The British in an attempt to take Baltimore planned to bomb Fort McHenry that night and detained Key's boat not wanting Key or Beanes to warn the American army. All night Key waited anxiously-walked the deck in anguish-wondering which flag would be flying over the Fort at dawn.

Dawn came. The gun fire died down; but because of the haze and smoke, they could not discover the outcome. Then suddenly a rift in the mist came at seven o'clock. Key looked, and over the Fort there was Old Glory tattered but still flying. Key, overcome with emotion, immediately penned the words to a poem on the back of an unfinished letter. He

called the poem, "The Defense of Fort McHenry." The next day he shared it with a friend who took it immediately to a printer. An hour after the poem was printed, it was read all over Baltimore. These words became associated with the tune "To Anacreon in Heaven." By an act of Congress on March 31, 1931, this poem, "The Star Spangled Banner" - became our national anthem. The second stanza reminds us of its greatness:

"O thus be it ever when freemen shall stand
Between their lov'd home and the war's desolation!
Blest with vict'ry and peace may the heav'n rescued land
Praise the Pow'r that hath made and preserv'd us a nation!
Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just,
And this be our motto - 'In God Is Our Trust'
And the star-spangled banner in triumphs shall wave
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

Little did Samuel Francis Smith, a young Baptist minister, know that the words he penned would be forever in the hearts of America. On July 4, 1832, the following words were sung in public for the first time:

"My country! 'Tis of thee,
Sweet land of liberty,
Of thee I sing.
Land where my fathers died!
Land of the Pilgrim's pride!
From ev'ry mountain side,
Let freedom ring!"

America has a great God

Abraham Lincoln's creed exemplifies this truth:

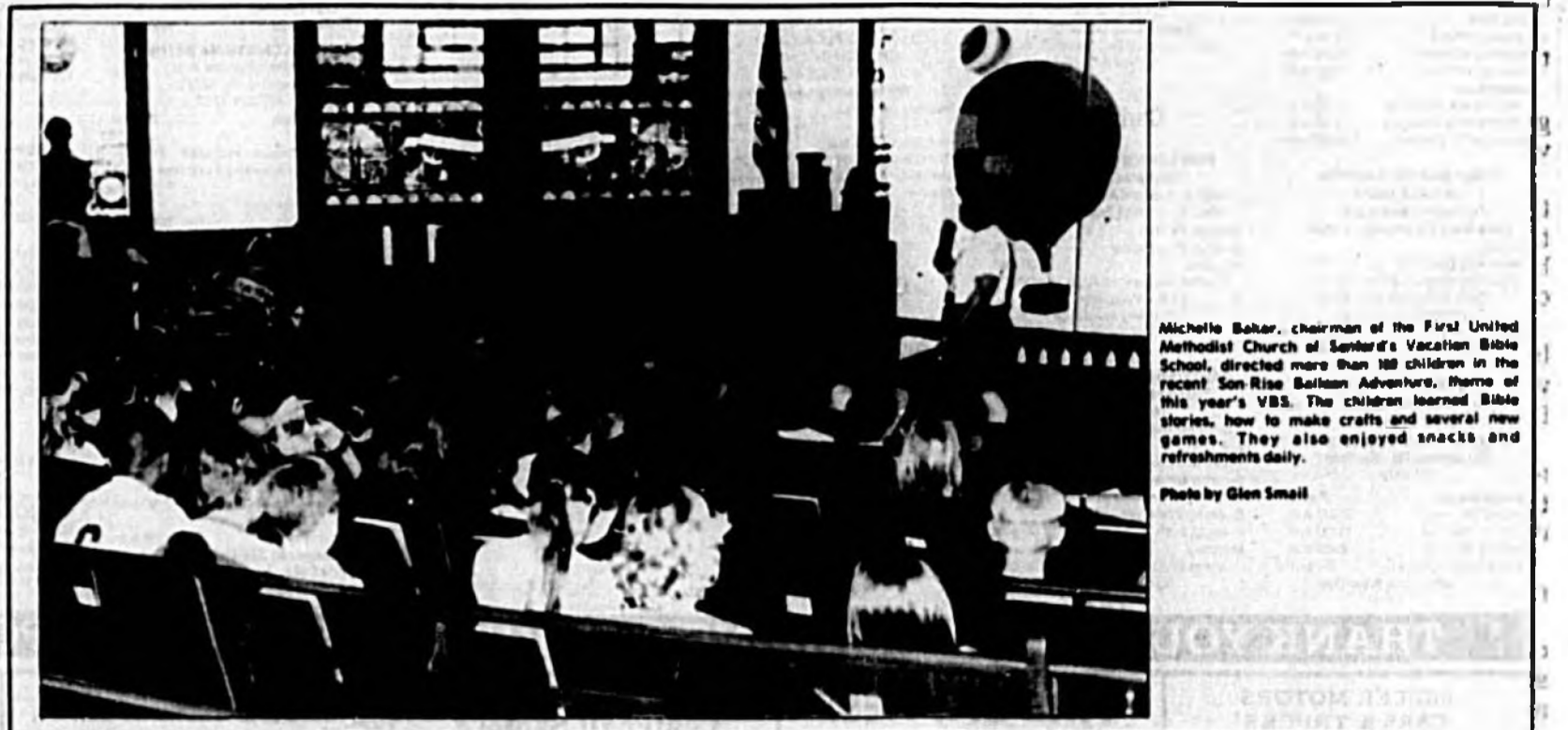
"I believe that the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom and that it is the duty of nations as well as of men to recognize the sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proved by all history, I recognize that those nations are blessed whose God is the Lord.

I believe the will of God prevails, without Him I cannot succeed; with His assistance I cannot fail, I believe I am a humble instrument in the hands of our Heavenly Father, I desire that all my works and acts may be according to His will; and that it may be so, I give thanks to the Almighty and seek His aid."

SANFORD — In 1787 prayer helped determine the future of our country in a significant way. The Constitutional Convention

was on the verge of total failure over the issue of whether small states should have the same representation as large states.

In this hopeless situation, 81 year-old Benjamin Franklin offered a suggestion. He was convinced Scripture is right when it states "Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it" (Psalm 127:1), so he said.

"Gentlemen, I have lived a long time and am convinced that God governs in the affairs of men. If a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it probable that an empire can rise without His aid? I move that prayers imploring the assistance of Heaven be held every morning before we proceed to business.

The motion carried. From then on prayer was offered every morning. The change after prayer was introduced was so dramatic that in a short while a compromise was reached while it is still effective today.

A secondary result of this experience is that both houses of the Congress to this day begin their morning sessions with prayer.

Our forebearers honored God and His word in many ways. In so doing they proved th truth of

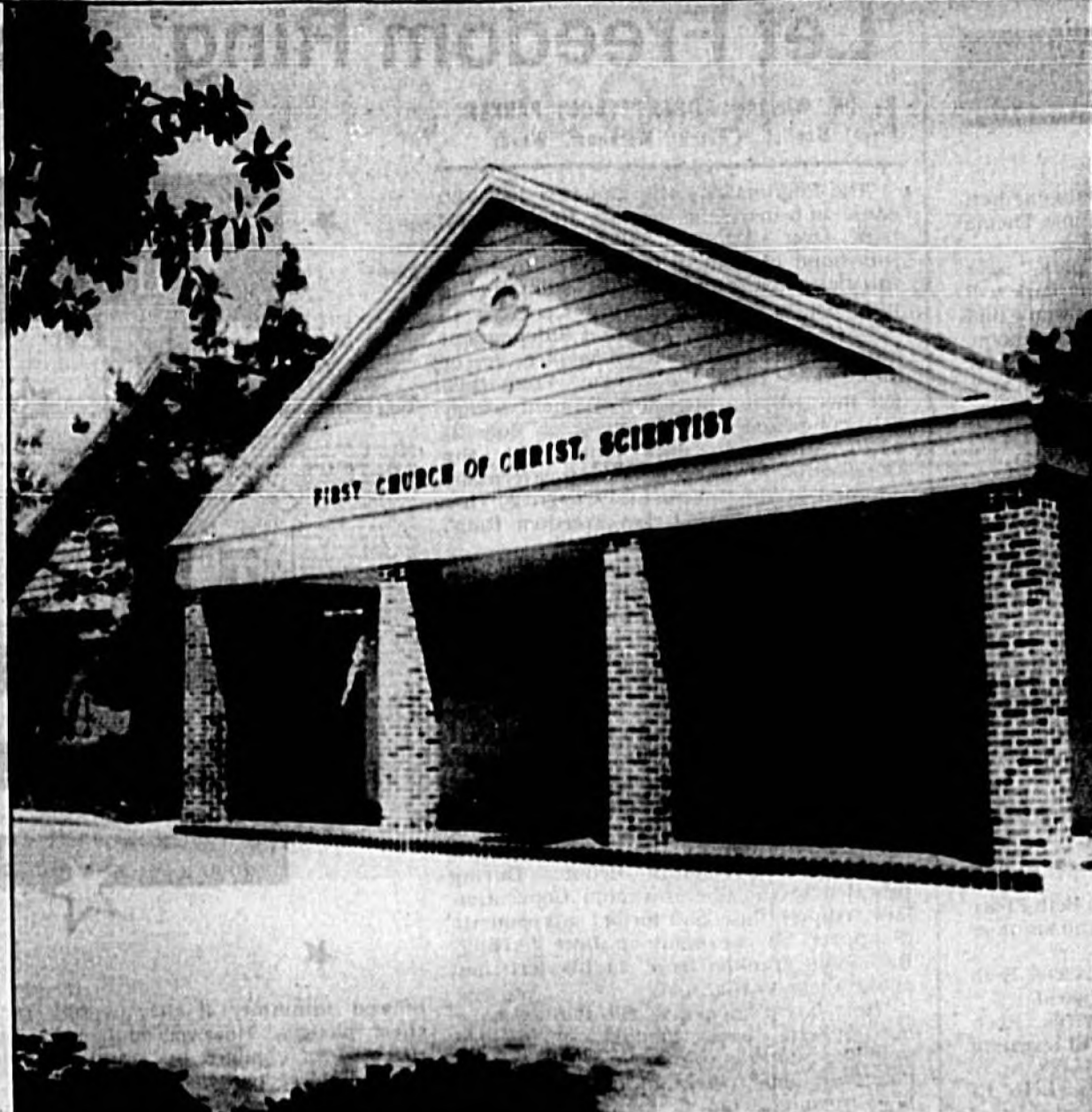

Ear problem is not solved

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor diagnosed my ear pain and discharge as a middle ear infection. He gave me drops to use, but the discharge hasn't abated; moreover, my ear is now bleeding. Should I just live with it?

DEAR READER: In my opinion, no. The middle ear chamber is separated — in fact, sealed off — from the ear canal by the ear drum. Ordinarily, a middle ear infection, which is common in children, causes pain and loss of hearing without discharge — unless the ear drum has ruptured, allowing pus and other matter to drain from the ear.

The fact that you have a constant discharge means that either you have an external ear infection (without middle ear involvement) and the doctor missed the boat — or you have a middle ear infection that has burst the drum.

Although appropriate for external ear infections, drops (which usually contain antibiotics and cortisone) are not customarily used for treating middle ear infections, because antibiotic pills are superior.

If you have a ruptured drum and a draining ear, you need aggressive therapy with powerful antibiotics, and you may need to have the ear drum repaired at a later date.

Therefore, I suggest that you be examined by an ear, nose and throat specialist, who should be able to sort out the situation and administer more effective treatment.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Recent routine blood tests showed that I have a high TSH and a normal T4 content. My doctor is not concerned. Should I be?

DEAR READER: I don't want to be too technical in my response, so I'll over-simplify. The two tests you had showed that you have "subclinical hypothyroidism."

In plain English, your thyroid gland is beginning to produce too little hormone — but you're not yet at the point of having symptoms.

While you are in no danger at present, you should be monitored with TSH/T4 blood tests at least annually. Subclinical hypothyroidism is most common in middle-aged women, can cause excess levels of blood cholesterol and is associated with depression.

Most authorities would not recommend treatment with supplemental thyroid hormone at this stage. However, if your T4 begins to fall (or if you have depression or a high cholesterol level), you should be treated. Your family doctor can supervise the testing and offer treatment, if indicated.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had to go to the emergency room because of a rapid pulse that was diagnosed as atrial fibrillation. With intravenous medicine, my heart rate returned to normal, but that same night, I couldn't catch my breath and required therapy for congestive heart failure. Why would my heart fail AFTER and not DURING the fibrillation?

DEAR READER: Atrial fibrillation is an erratic, sometimes rapid heart rate that can appear without warning and for no apparent cause. Because cardiac efficiency is hampered by AF, doctors usually use medication or electric shocks to return the heart to a normal beating pattern (cardioversion).

In occasional instances, soon after cardioversion, the cardiac muscle fails to contract with enough vigor. Fluid builds up in the lungs, and patients experience congestive heart failure. The reason for this complication is unknown, but it must be treated aggressively, with diuretic drugs, because the mortality rate approaches 50 percent.

It appears that you were treated appropriately — especially if you were prescribed an anti-coagulant in addition to the diuretic. Now that you have made it through the immediate post-conversion period, you are no longer at risk for heart failure.
