

'Put Up Or Shut Up'

Two From Seminole County Challenge Property Assessment

Two Seminole County taxpayers have challenged the assessment of their properties in a summer proving they feel their property is assessed too high. Whether this is true remains to be seen, according to attorney Gordon Frederick.

Statutes, which allow the taxpayer to "put up or shut up," the owner has called upon county tax assessors to sell certain property at their price or reduce the assessment.

Under the act, any taxpayer who has protested his assessment by appearing before the Board of Equalization, and who

is dissatisfied with the board's action, can challenge the assessment value of his property within 10 days after the decision of the Board of Equalization.

The taxpayer, in effect, states what he believes to be the fair value of the property and authorizes its sale at not less than that amount. If the property,

after being advertised, cannot be sold at this figure then the assessment must be lowered. If a bid equal to or greater than the value set by the taxpayer is received then he must follow through and sell at that price, according to Frederick.

In this case the owner's property was assessed by the tax assessor at \$14,850, and the owner has authorized its sale at \$9,500. On another parcel the assessment is \$15,000, and the owner authorized sale at \$8,300.

Sanford Getting New Zoo By Spring?

Major Tourist Attraction Pushed By City Board

Sanford may have a new zoo and tropical garden by next spring if an unofficial decision reached by four city commissioners Monday night is approved in official session.

Expressing an eagerness to "have the new zoological gardens and tourist attraction open by the time we open the marina", three commissioners and Mayor A. L. Wilson discussed in budget session the idea of borrowing the necessary funds to "get the job done now."

Last year \$17,000 was appropriated as the first increment of a total estimated cost of \$65,000 to \$70,000. This money has not yet been used and the second increment of \$20,000 is to be set aside in the budget now under study for next year.

Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts suggested that the commission borrow the rest of the funds and "get started right away." The idea met with the approval of those present. Commissioner Joe Baker was not present and no official action could be taken.

The new zoo and gardens will be located on the sanitary landfill area just west of the industrial park on Hwy. 17-92 on the lakefront drive.

Plans for the new zoo call for enclosures "natural habitat" type pens, giving the animals large areas in which to roam with large pools for aquatic animals to eliminate a "cage" atmosphere.

Interpersed and surrounding the entire zoo area will be a botanical garden filled with tropical plants and flowers. Also mentioned in connection with the zoo is a reproduction of old Fort Mellon, reconstructed as a tourist attraction.

Adoption of the 1965 Southern Standard minimum housing code for the City of Sanford was approved by city commissioners Monday, on recommendation of the Zoning and Planning Commission.

Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts made the motion for approval with provisions that the right of entry by the city building official be strictly defined and that housing owners in violation of the code be allowed to make repairs before the city commission sitting as a board of review, if protests are to be made.

Art Harris of the Z and PC suggested that the commission also cut the maximum amperes required to 150, instead of 200.

In a second motion commissioners requested that the code not be enforced until the city approves an accepted program. City Attorney W. C. Hutchison was instructed to draw an ordinance setting up the new housing code as part of city regulations.

Request by First Methodist Church for city condemnation and demolition of a church-owned building at 421 Magnolia Avenue was denied Monday, on the premise that "the city is not in the demolition business."

Rev. Robert Jenkins had requested the condemnation and demolition. Inspection was made by the city building official and the fire department, with both concurring and recommending demolition.

Motion to deny was made by Commissioner Joe Baker who said such an action was interfering in private enterprise and seconded by Commissioner Earl Higginbotham who added that "this is not in keeping with our usual procedure."

The Day 'Curly' Gave Up

The controversy regarding the legality of the annexation of certain properties in South Sanford and a portion of U.S. 17-92 seemed at a end today with announcement of the former county commissioner Vernon (Curly) Dunn that he is "dropping the matter."

Dunn has had opposition to the annexation, protested to the State Road Department, and the county commission and corresponded with the Attorney General.

"Unbelievable as it seems, Dunn said, "the SRD does not request, require, oppose or approve of annexation of state properties by the municipalities. They have, in effect, announced to the municipalities that the gates are wide open to permit them to annex strips of state roads between their boundaries and the boundaries of neighboring cities."

"The stupid, ridiculous situation exists where a municipality can annex non-contiguous properties and then make the annexation contiguous by annexing state roads that circumvent the letter of the law."

Seminole County property owners were hit today by a 33 percent increase in ad valorem taxes when the county commission approved the 1966-67 budget. The figure was \$2.85 million.

City Okays \$81,000 Costs Marina---New Materials. "Seawall superintendents" will soon see some new activity around the perimeter of the landfill on Sanford's waterfront development project and observation bleachers installed by the city will likely be filled with watchers again.

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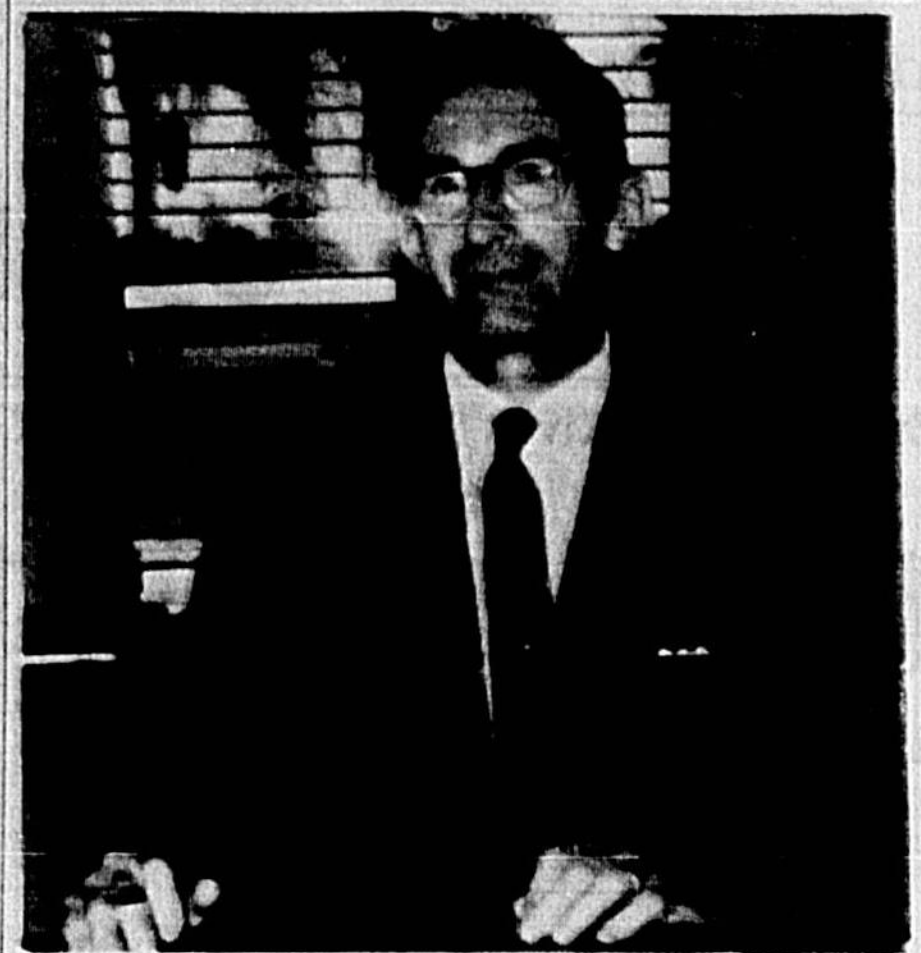

Reds Sink American Ship

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — An American merchant ship with war supplies for the fighting forces in Viet Nam was blasted by a Communist mine today and sank in the Saigon River. Seven of its American crewmen were killed. The mine ripped a gaping hole in the port side of the vessel, the 30,000-ton Baton Rouge Victory, and flooded the ship's engine room. The ship was run aground at the river bank 20 miles east of Saigon and it sank to the bottom with water up to its main deck. Late in the day, the ship was reported blocking one of the main shipping lanes to Saigon. Elsewhere in the war, the U.S. military command disclosed that a U.S. Marine amphibious force 1,500-strong landed unopposed on beaches 50 miles southeast of Saigon early Monday. The Marines, who followed the landings had made no contact with the Viet Cong units believed to be operating in the jungle swampland in the area. Another Marine force had landed a week earlier 50 miles east of Saigon. Both were assigned a blocking role in Operation Toledo, a combined U.S.-Vietnamese sweep against the Viet Cong in the area. No other major ground action was reported. "In that war over North Viet Nam, four U.S. Air Force F105 Thunderchiefs tangled with four MIG17s Monday in a four-minute aerial battle 20 miles north of Hanoi. The MIGs attacked the Thun-

Blast Crashes Roof Of Church; One Dies

PLAINVIEW, Tex. (AP) — A thundering explosion Monday night sent the roof crashing down on 20 worshippers in the Church of God in Christ, Falling Branch, killing a woman and injuring 30 other persons. Twelve persons were trapped for a time as a small fire broke out and was quickly quenched in the concrete and brick frame building. Investigators found no ready explanation. One fireman thought he smelled natural gas but officials said they had detected no evidence of a leak. "The United Baptist church was singing when it happened," said a church member. "The lights went out, then there was an explosion that blew the floor out of the building and sent the roof crashing down on the people who were sitting near the back of the church. A falling beam pinned David Lewis of Lubbock and his wife, who were sitting near the back of the church. Lewis said many persons escaped because the toppling roof lodged about five feet above the floor on the front side. The blast occurred about 9:50 a.m. during a song ending the service.

DETROIT (UPI) — Eight alleged crime syndicate officials were indicted on contempt charges today by a grand jury investigating alleged police and political payoffs. Circuit Court Judge Edward S. 3,000 Feared Dead In Turkish 'Quakes'
VARTO, Turkey (AP) — "The whole town was destroyed in a matter of seconds," an elderly peasant said today recalling the Vartio Friday's earthquake in Turkey. Witnesses said the small county seat rocked first horizontally and then vertically, and then there was nothing left. All but three of the town's 700 mud huts and concrete buildings crashed down. Vartio was the epicenter of the violent quake that killed an estimated 3,000 persons in eastern Turkey. "I was on the street," said Osman Duman, 37. "The ground shook under me. I saw houses falling apart and a great cloud of dust rose into the sky. I just couldn't understand what had happened." The leveled town was jolted Monday night as seemingly endless tremors continued to ripple the area. The tremor, described by an Interior Ministry official as "quite strong," caused no deaths or injuries. Premier Juscelino Kubitschek in a radio address to the nation that 2,000 had perished in the four province disaster regions. Government officials moved to provide housing for homeless peasants before the early winter sets in. Thousands were sleeping in the open. Cool weather usually begins here in August. 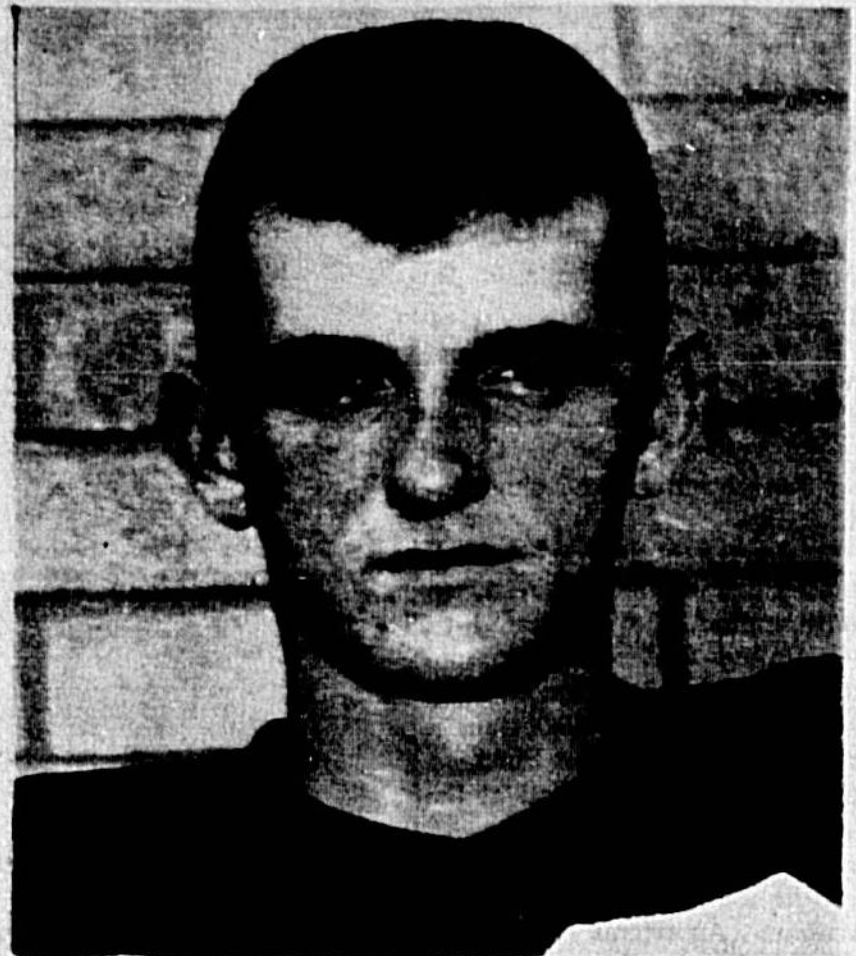

High Cost Of Living Jumped 0.4% In July

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The cost of living index jumped 0.4 per cent in July, raising average consumer price increases during the past year to nearly three per cent, the government reported.

A decline in the real earning power of the nation's factory workers continued in July. The July index was 112.5. This meant it cost \$1.25 to buy the same goods and services that \$1.00 would buy in the base period of 1957-59.

Arnold Chase, assistant bureau commissioner, said relatively few items were responsible for the July increase. The boost in food prices last month was 0.4 per cent, nearly a full

percentage point below the normal July increase, he said.

Meat, poultry, fish, fruit and vegetable prices were relatively stable, he said, but there were increases in the cost of milk, butter and eggs.

Chase attributed nearly half the 2.8 per cent increase in the consumer price index during the past year to increased charges for nearly all kinds of consumer services, especially transportation and medical charges.

Food prices remained relatively stable from June. The Bureau of Labor Statistics blamed the latest increase primarily on the higher cost of services.

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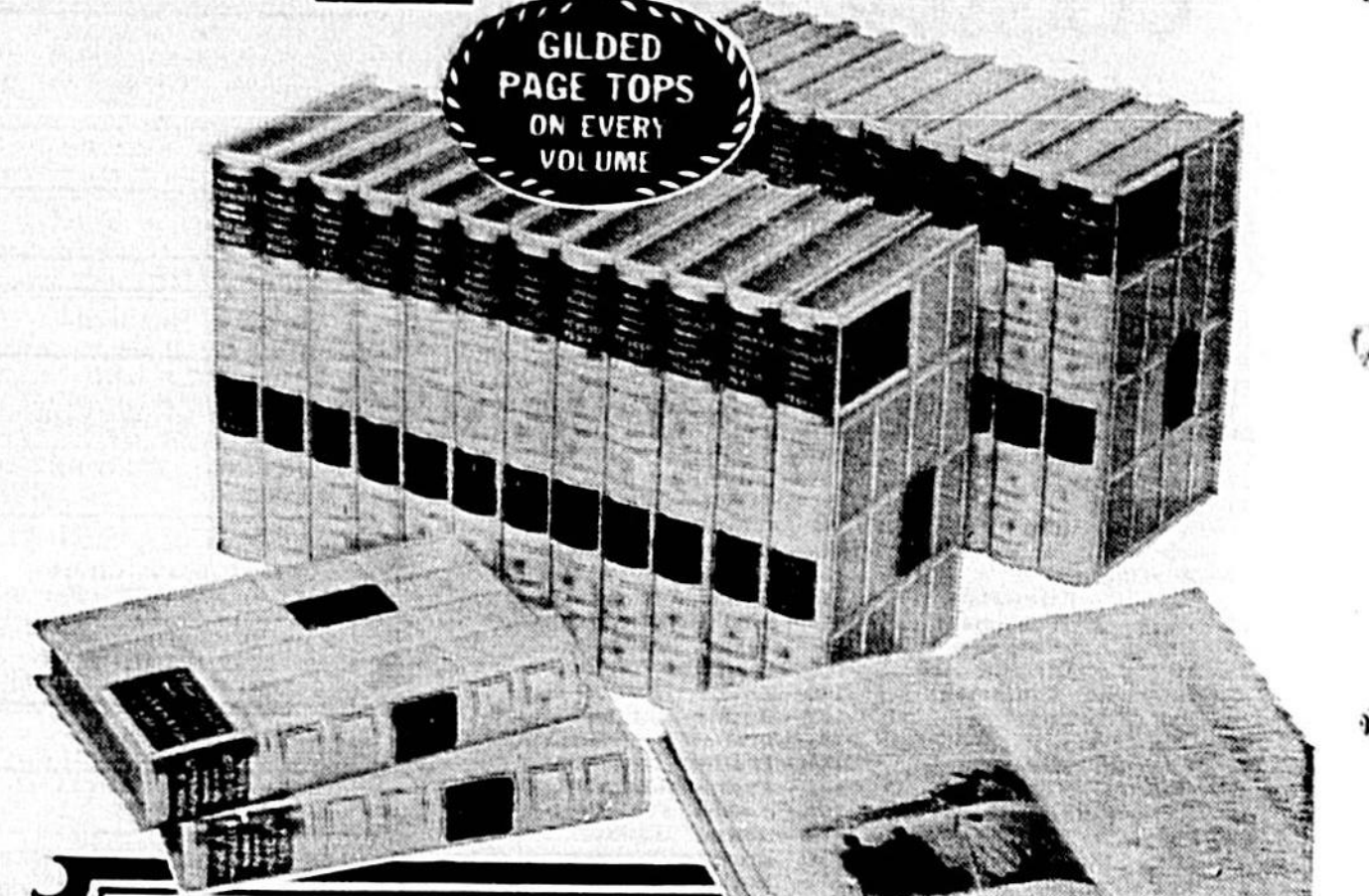

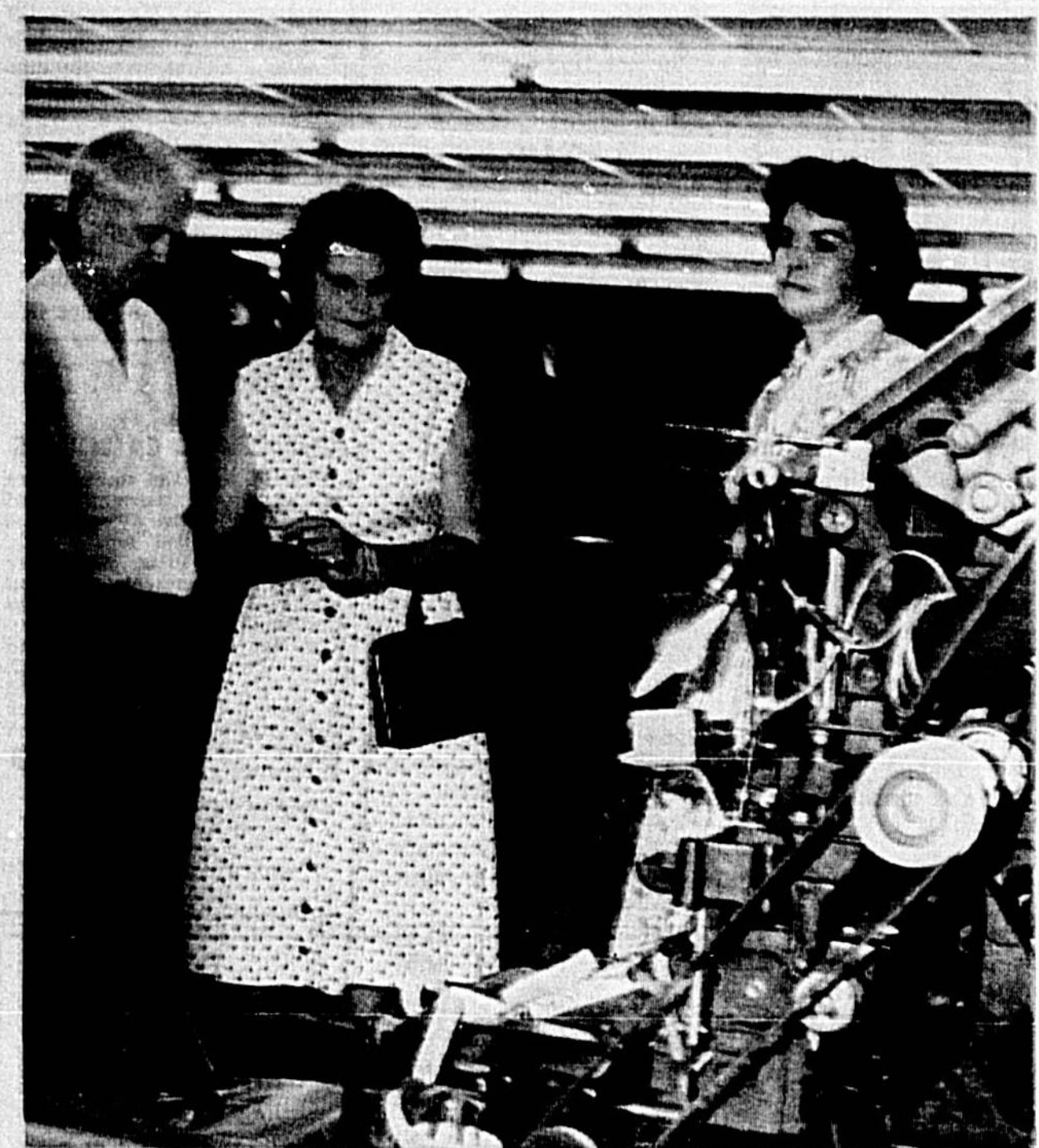

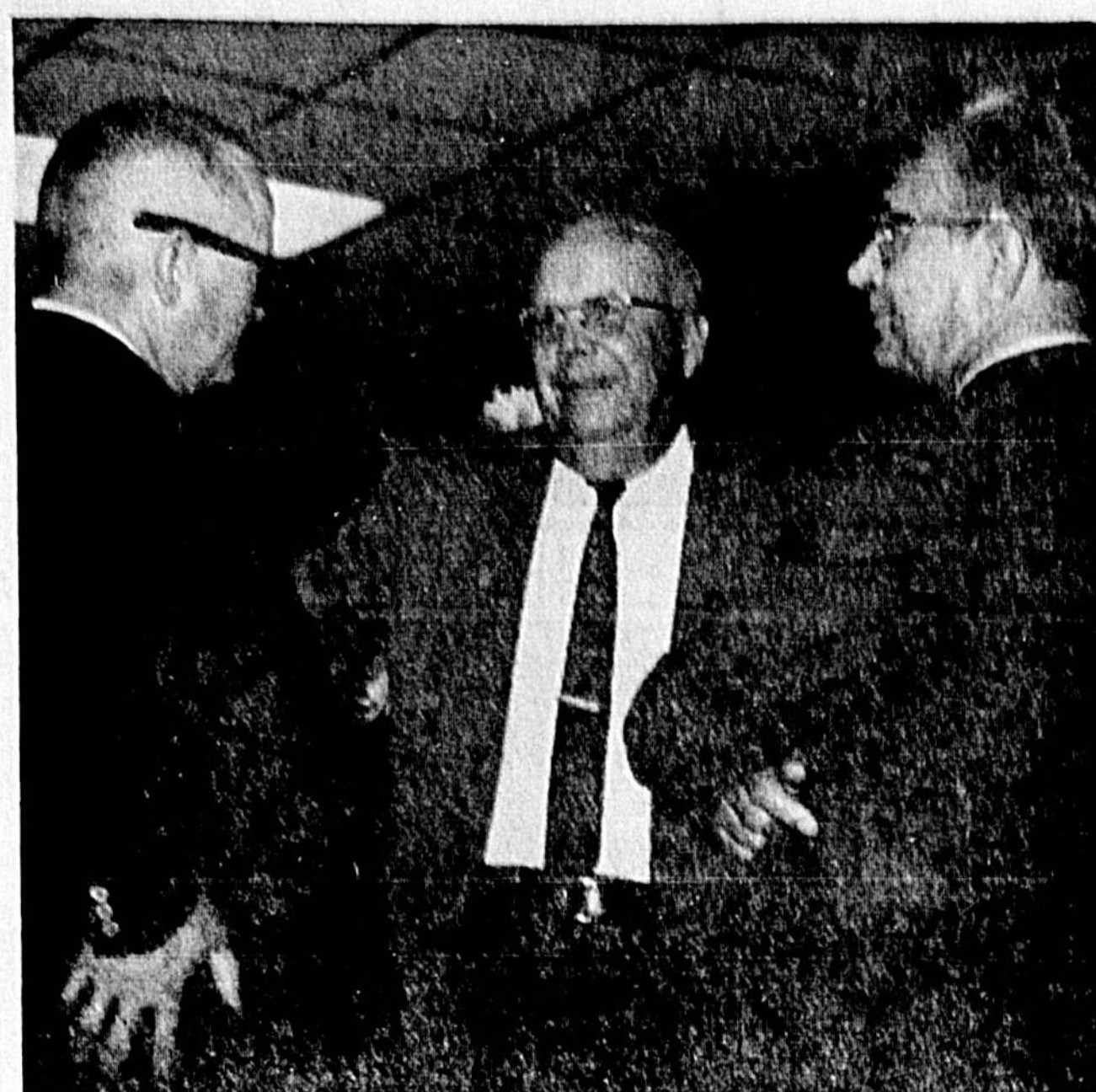

Medicare OK Is Expected For Hospital

Seminole Memorial Hospital officials today hopefully awaited a favorable decision on Medicare from federal inspectors.

A. B. Peterson, Sr., chairman of the board of trustees, said he had expected a communication late Tuesday morning and under the duress of the deadline, but as of press time word had not been received from the U.S. Office of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington, D. C.

Peterson said a telephone call had been placed to officials in Washington, but no one in authority had been reached.

He said calls to the regional offices in Atlanta had received non-sensical answers and officials there said the matter had been turned over to the HEW in Washington.

"We feel we are in complete compliance with civil rights regulations and have done all that we have been ordered to do to have the hospital meet federal requirements under the Civil Rights Act," Peterson said.

Since the July 1 deadline, the 200-bed local hospital has been neither approved nor disapproved and several teams of inspectors have toured the facility during past weeks.

Robert Bessner, hospital administrator, has stated that 28 per cent of residents of the area served by the hospital are eligible for Medicare.

He said the hospital has nearly 75 beds in the "intermediate care" category have been cared for on an emergency basis which permits Medicare payments up to six days. Bessner said average hospital stay is six or seven days.

As of the first part of August, no payments had been received from Social Security for the emergency patients cared for during July and Bessner said American Hospital Association bulletins indicated no hospitals operating under the Medicare regulations. No further word has been received on the matter since that time.



CDR. SULLIVAN 'Hoot Owls' Coming Home On Thursday

"Hoot Owls" of RVAH-6, led by Cdr. Don M. Sullivan will touch down at Ramey Field, NAS Sanford, Thursday afternoon ending a nine-month Pacific deployment aboard the aircraft USS Ranger, from which they flew a total of 480 combat missions in Southeast Asia.

In addition to the missions flown by the "Hoot Owls," Carrier Air Wing 14 flew a total of 16,150 combat sorties, while strikes launched from the Ranger expended over 10,000 tons of ordnance on targets in Vietnam.

Personal and equipment of RVAH-6 will be airlifted from NAS Alameda, Calif. Thursday afternoon and evening and are expected to arrive in Sanford early Friday morning.

The USS Ranger steamed more than 70,000 miles during the 220 day deployment in the Western Pacific, spending only 32 days in Far East ports of Subic Bay, Philippines and Yokosuka, Japan.

After The Tornado Hit

Minor Injuries Heavy Damage

Property owners today pondered the severe damage to a boatyard and fish camp after a small tornado whipped the roof off one building and dropped it across a state highway, yesterday.

The storm lifted the roof off a building at the Sanford Boat Works and dropped it on SR 415 at the St. Johns River on Tuesday afternoon. A Jacksonville woman and her two small children were trapped in a car during the sudden tornado.

The tornado hit during a thunderstorm and heavy lightning in the early afternoon leaving an estimated \$20,000 worth of property damage to the boat works and Johnson's Fish Camp located at the bridge.

The occupants of the vehicle which was completely covered with one of the boat buildings were Mr. Stanley Merck of 2081 Hill Top Blvd., Jacksonville, and his wife.

Rainfall here Tuesday was 1.51 inches.

The Florida Highway Patrol was summoned and helped reroute traffic until the remains could be cleared from the road. Normal traffic was restored at approximately 3:45 p.m.

John Brumley, owner and manager of Sanford Boat Works stated he and his workers were busy in another part of their boat houses when the tornado struck. "I have a lot of property damage to my boat houses, but I have not determined how much damage has been done to my boats," he stated. Brumley has one of Sanford's largest boat works where he works on boats and also has over a hundred craft and yachts in dock there.

Merck who had parked the car near one of the boat houses was under the vehicle when the twisted truck and set the building on top of his car. They were trapped until a part of the roof was removed and they could be removed from the vehicle. Damage to the vehicle was undetermined.

Parts of the boat houses were picked up by the wind and set down in the middle of SR 415 blocking traffic for approximately two hours, according to Seminole County Sheriff's Department.

State Road Department workers were summoned by the Sheriff's Department to clear the roadway of scattered wood, piling, tin and other rubbish.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate opens debate today on a bill that would boost the minimum wage from \$1.25 to \$1.60 an hour by 1968 and bring an additional 7.2 million workers under the law. Sponsors predicted the measure would clear the Senate without substantial change. Republicans promised a floor fight for some amendments.

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Florida's major revenue fund will accumulate a surplus of some \$40 million by next June, state statisticians told the cabinet yesterday. Added to last year's higher-than-expected tax yield and unexpended appropriations, the general revenue fund should show a total surplus of \$80 million, experts said.

Hurricane Threatens Caribbean
