Major Tourist Attraction Pushed By City Board

in official session. Expressing an eagerness to "have the new zoologal gardens and tourist attraction open by the time we open the marina", three commissioners and Mayor A. L. Wilson discussed in budget session the idea of borrowing the necessary funds to "get the job done

Last year \$17,000 was appropriated as the first increment of a total estimated cost of \$65,000 to \$70,-000. This money has not yet been used and the second increment of \$20,000 is to be set aside in the budget now under study for next year.

Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts suggested that the commission borrow the rest of the funds and "get started right away." The idea met with the ap-proval of those present. Commissioner Joe Baker was not present and no official action could be taken. Plans for the new zoo call for spacious "natura habitat" type pens, giving the animals large areas in which to roam with large pools for aquatic animals to eliminate a "caged" atmosphere. Interspersed and surrounding the entire zoo area will be a botanical garden filled with tropical plants and flowers.
