Lawrence Welk Hour Explained By WFTV

Editor, Herald: At the top of your "TV Preview" on Dec. 10, you ran an "Editor's note" referring to the simultaneous telecasting of "All in the Family" and "The Lawrence Welk Show."

"All in the Family" is a network program on CBS. As such, it is transmitted to CBS affiliates in cities throughout the country at the same time every week. Nearly all of these CBS stations carry the program at that time; only a few choose to videotape this program and play it at some later day and/or hour. The Orlando CBS affiliate has chosen to do this with "All in the Family," and three other CBS Saturday night prime-time programs, ever since the start of the current season in September. They have done so in order to play a local movie from 8 to 10 p.m., delaying "All in the Family" from 7:30 p.m. on a given Saturday to 7:30 p.m. the following Saturday.

Our "Lawrence Welk Show," however, is a different story. This has been made public by the fact that the Welk show was dropped by the ABC network at the end of last season. It is now syndicated to stations throughout the country on tape, and never reaches any of its stations on a live or simultaneous basis. Prior to this program going into syndication, we had carried it for a long time at 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. Saturdays, the time that apparently found considerable favor with the followers of this program over the years. Therefore we maintained it at that time, and when it went into syndication, so as not to disrupt the viewing habits of its large and loyal audience. Therefore it was the change which caused the conflict, not Channel 9.

As a matter of fact, when we entered into a contract with Mr. Welk for 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. Saturdays, the CBS network had announced that "All in the Family" would be shown on Mondays at 10:30 p.m. so there was no apparent conflict at all. Once contracted, we cannot be expected to change our scheduling because another station subsequently revises its schedule. I understand that very shortly the CBS station will move "All in the Family" to its live time of 8 p.m. Saturdays. This will still conflict, with the last half hour of the Welk show, but there is nothing we can do about it. We are under contract to Mr. Welk from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. a time which has become traditional for his show. Nothing but utter chaos would result if we made a change every time we had a good program scheduled for a certain hour and another station decided to put one of its good programs on at the same time.

IPSA Begins Bulk Delivery Of Mail

A new dimension has been added to the delivery of other than first-class mail. On Nov. 30, the Independent Postal System of America started in 49 cities and their environs around the country. Formal ceremonies were held in Oklahoma City. IPSA's national headquarters. Originated by Irish immigrant Thomas M. Murray, the service has been offered on a limited scale since 1968, but with its extension, IPSA now is producing stamps to prepay such items as it accepts for delivery. There will be one, five, 10, 25 and 50-cent denominations whose simple, utilitarian design is printed in two contrasting colors.
Private mail delivery is nothing new. The very first postal services offered to the public were operated as private concerns as long ago as the 16th Century. In more modern times, private postal services were in operation augmenting government services.
In 1942, Alexander Greig had a private post in New York City to carry letters between the post office and his clients' addresses. This was before there was carrier service.
There were dozens of other local posts operated in other cities until after the Civil War, whenever, in some instances the

 And Mathias' aides Tuesday asserted the senator's support of Nixon's re-election bid, denying any reports of a purge.

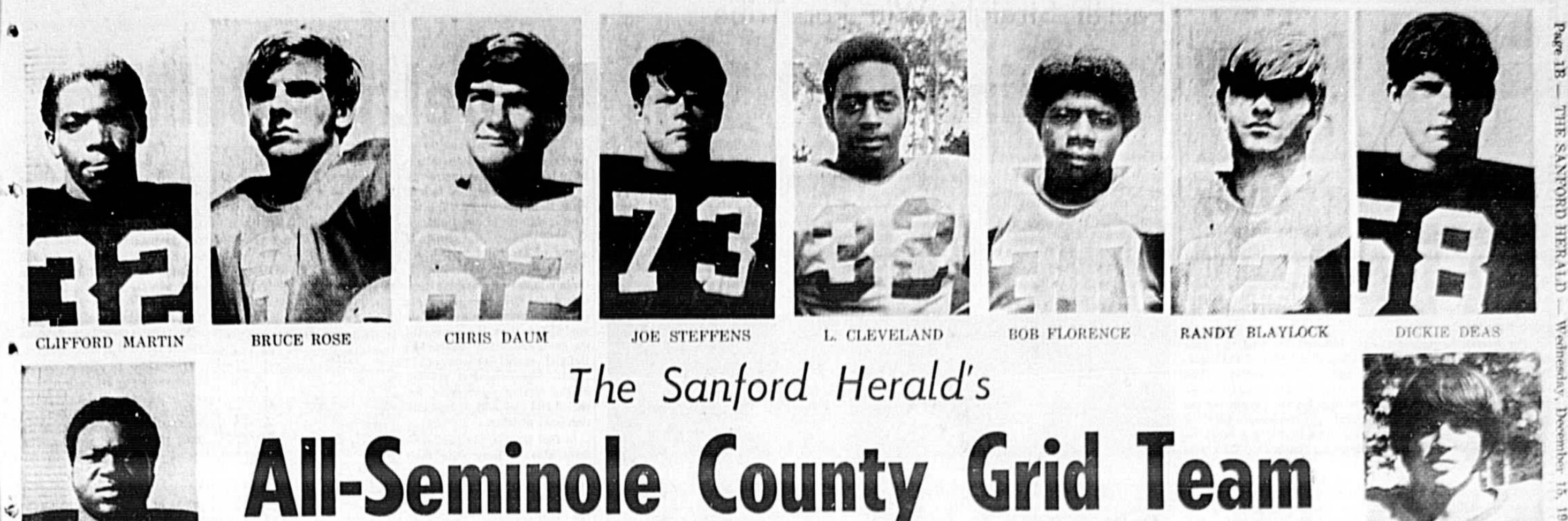

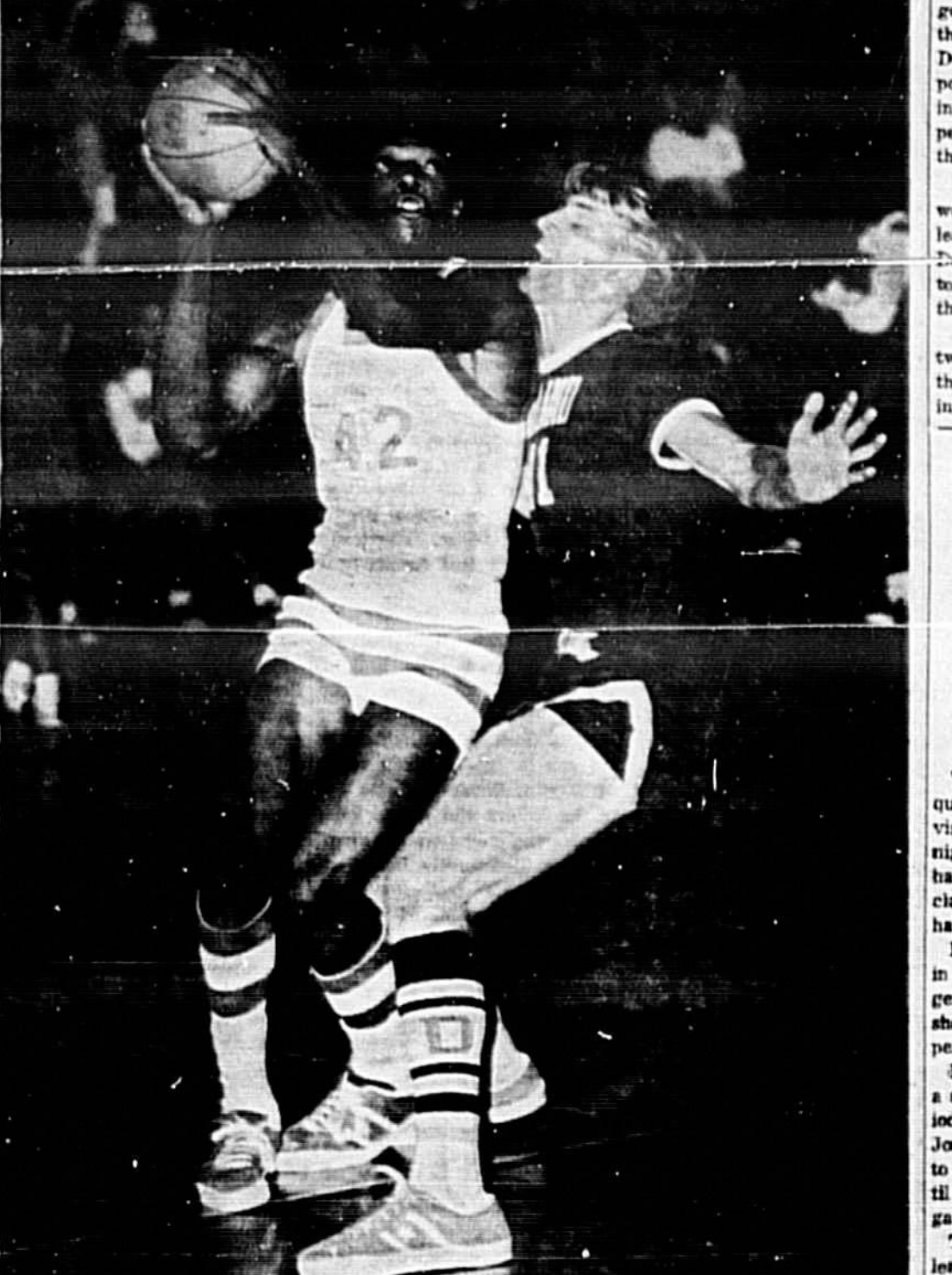

Bell Ringer Punch

If you want to serve a punch at a party, you can please two kinds of guests: those who want a spirited drink and those who prefer a beverage without alcohol. The following recipe gives both methods of preparation; you can make up a batch of each.

BELL RINGER PUNCH
1 envelope (8 ounces) instant openhouse punch mix
2 cups cold water
1 cup orange-flavor liqueur
1 cup dry red wine
1 large bottle (28 ounces) club soda, chilled

Unspec'd thin orange slices, halved

Gradually stir contents of envelope of punch mix into cold water; continue to stir until punch mix is completely dissolved. Add liqueur and wine; stir and chill.

Just before serving, pour chilled mixture over ice (1 tray of ice cubes or a 5-cup ice mold). Add club soda and mix lightly. Garnish with orange slices.

Makes about 2 quarts or about 16 four-ounce servings.

NOTE: For a non-alcoholic punch, prepare as above but omit orange-flavor liqueur and red wine; use 1½ quarts ginger ale.

Fruitcake Holiday Tradition

Some people may feel there is no longer time for tradition in our holiday celebrations but others know well it's worth the small amount of time and the traditional ingredients to have holidays the happy old ways. Your own rich fruitcake traditionally made with nature's own sweetener, old-fashioned molasses, isn't just a cake. It's an event... a delight something to make the timing of a holiday more beautiful at your house. Here's the traditional recipe:

DARK FRUITCAKE
1 cup old-fashioned molasses
½ cup water
2 packages (15 ounces each) raisins
2 jars (1 pound each) mixed candied fruit
1 cup butter or margarine
1½ cups sugar
3½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
¼ teaspoon baking soda
¼ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon nutmeg
¼ teaspoon ground cloves
½ cup orange juice or brandy
3 cups coarsely chopped nuts

Blend together molasses and water in a large deep saucepan. Place over low heat; stir constantly until mixture comes to a boil. Add raisins; bring to a boil again. Reduce heat and simmer 5 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in candied fruit. Remove cream together butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Blend in eggs one at a time. Sift together flour, baking soda and spices. Add to butter mixture alternately with orange juice. Stir in molasses-fruit mixture. Stir in nuts. Turn into a waxed paper-lined 10-inch tube pan, or 2 waxed paper-line 3 x 5 1/2-inch loaf pans. Bake in 275 degree F. oven. Bake tube cake 3 1/2 hours and loaf cakes 3 hours.

YIELD: One 7-pound or two 1 1/2-pound fruitcakes.

Thin, crisp, spicy are Moravian Cookies, an authentic specialty brought from Moravia during the 18th century when the colonists came to this country, driven by religious persecution. The Moravians brought an old-fashioned recipe for cookies. Even today in Pennsylvania, "seeing the Pitas" is an annual Christmas custom. The Pita is an elaborate manger scene made with beehive wood carvings, with some painted according to the craftsmanship of the builder. Moravian Cookies are traditionally made with old-fashioned molasses. To make your holiday celebration more authentic, use this recipe:

MORAVIAN COOKIES
¼ cup old-fashioned molasses
¼ cup shortening
1 teaspoon baking soda
1½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
1½ teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ginger
¼ teaspoon ground cloves
¼ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon nutmeg

Heat molasses to boiling in saucepan large enough for mixing cookies. Remove from heat; stir in shortening and baking soda. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and spices; blend into molasses mixture. Chill 8 hours or overnight. Roll out dough 1/16-inch thick on lightly floured board or pastry cloth. Cut with cookie cutter. Place on lightly greased baking sheet and bake in 350 degree F. oven 5 to 7 minutes.

YIELD: About 4½ dozen cookies.

Marinate White Fish With Lime

When Hans Pluntke whips up dinner, he has to think in terms of 7,000 steaks or 1,500 baby lobsters—no, to mention a couple of thousand battered rolls and several hundred stuffed avocados.

Pluntke is the executive chef of the new Acapulco Princess Hotel in Mexico.

I spent some vacation time in Acapulco recently and had a chance to meet Pluntke and try his culinary artistry.

A tall, handsome German of 30, Pluntke sits in an office with three see-through glass walls, keeping a wary eye on a staff of 150 assistant chefs and pantry girls, some 20 pot washers and several 50 dishwashers.

"To be successful as a chef you must combine showmanship with a knowledge of good flavor," he said.

"We like to specialize as much as possible in the native foods. You might say that we go in for Mexican food with a French touch."

A good example is Pluntke's chicken salad, served in a half coconut shell as a bit of showmanship, laced with a Roquefort dressing and garnished with bacon strips and hearts of palm.

It took years of hard work to arrive at the position Pluntke holds today. Born in Breslau, Germany, he served his apprenticeship in Hamburg and then went on to work in hotels in Germany and other European countries. Eventually he became a head chef and came to America, running the kitchens of places such as the Hilton Hotel in Washington, D.C. and the Fairmont in Dallas.

Finally he was taken abroad when the Acapulco Princess went into operation last October.

"It's been seven days a week and 16 hours a day since I came here, to get the kitchen organized and teach a staff of Mexican help how to cook French gourmet style. But we're getting on," he said.

One specialty that is proving a favorite is ceviche, a novel way of eating raw fish that makes it palatable for the most squeamish diner.

"We marinate a white fish such as file of sole in a mixture dominated by lime for five hours and gradually the meat 'cooks' just as if it had been put over a fire," he said. "It becomes flake and opaque."

CEVICHE
3 pounds white flaked fish
Salt to taste
1 cup sliced onion
1 cup sliced tomato
2 hot peppers chopped fine
Dash vinegar
Lime or lemon juice to cover
Let fish marinate in this mixture in refrigerator for at least five hours and serve on lettuce. Good with a chilled white Sangria.

DAFFODIL LEAF
One of the lightest of cakes.
1 cup sifted cake flour
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 egg whites
1 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 egg yolks
1 teaspoon finely grated orange rind

On wax paper sift together the cake flour, 1/3 cup of the sugar and the salt. In large bowl of electric mixer beat egg whites and cream of tartar on high until firm and peak; gradually beat in remaining 3/4 cup of the sugar and the vanilla; continue to beat if necessary until whites form stiff straight peaks; gradually fold in sifted dry ingredients. Divide in half. In a small mixing bowl, without washing beater, beat egg yolks until thickened and lemon color; beat in orange rind; fold into one-half of the egg white mixture. Spoon the yellow and white batters alternately into an ungreased loaf pan (9 by 5 by 3 inches). Bake in a preheated 325-degree oven until top springs back when lightly touched—45 minutes. (Top will crack.) Invert on cake rack until cold. With a small metal spatula loosen edges; ease loaf pan with fingers. Frost, if desired, using a vanilla or orange-flavor frosting.

Coffeecake With Date, Nut Filling

Cooks who like to bake with yeast and who want really delicious coffeecake loaves might consider using the following recipe. These loaves are among the very best we've ever tried—delicious to serve fresh after they're baked, heated or toasted.

One hint: If you toast slices of this coffeecake, do so under the broiler or in the oven part of a toaster-oven. If slices are put in a regular toaster slot, the filling will melt away.

DATE-NUT LOAVES
1/4 cup (about four) butter
1/4 cup sugar
2 teaspoons salt
2 eggs
2 teaspoons soft butter
1 cup cut-up pitted dates
1/4 cup chopped (medium-fine) walnuts or pecans
Grated rind of 1 orange mixed with 1/4 cup sugar
2 tablespoons sugar

Into a 1-quart saucepan turn the milk, water, 1/4 cup butter, 1/4 cup sugar and salt; heat, stirring constantly, until warm (110 to 130 degrees). Pour into flour-yeast mixture. Add 1 whole egg and 1 egg white; reserve remaining egg white. Beat at low speed, scraping bowl, for 1/2 minute. Beat at high speed for 3 more minutes. With a spoon, gradually work in enough more flour to form a soft dough.

Turn out dough on a floured smooth surface; knead until smooth—5 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl; turn to grease top.

Cover and let rise in a warm draft-free place until doubled—45 to 60 minutes.

Punch dough out. Let rest 10 minutes. Divide into 2 parts. Turn out 1 part onto a floured pastry cloth. With a rolling pin, roll to a 15 by 7 inch rectangle; sprinkle with 1 teaspoon soft butter; sprinkle with 1/4 cup dates, 2 tablespoons walnuts and half the orange-sugar mixture. With flat side of spatula press filling into dough.

Beginning with 7-inch side, roll up to form a loaf; pinch together edges, sealing well. Place in a well-buttered loaf pan (9 by 5 by 3 inches), sealed edge down. Fill and shape second part of dough the same way.

Cover and let rise for 20 minutes. To allow steam to escape, with cake tester or metal skewer, make holes to bottom of pans, 1 inch apart, over tops of loaves. With a razor blade make 3 diagonal slashes 1/4 inch deep across top of each loaf. Brush loaves with reserved egg white; sprinkle with the 2 tablespoons sugar. Let rise as previously until doubled—about 20 minutes.

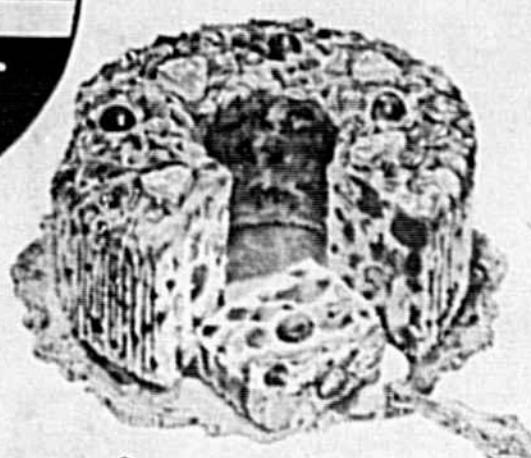
Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven for 35 to 45 minutes. After 20 minutes place a sheet of foil over loaves to prevent over-browning. Turn out loaves on wire racks; turn right side up; cool.

Makes two 3-pound loaves.

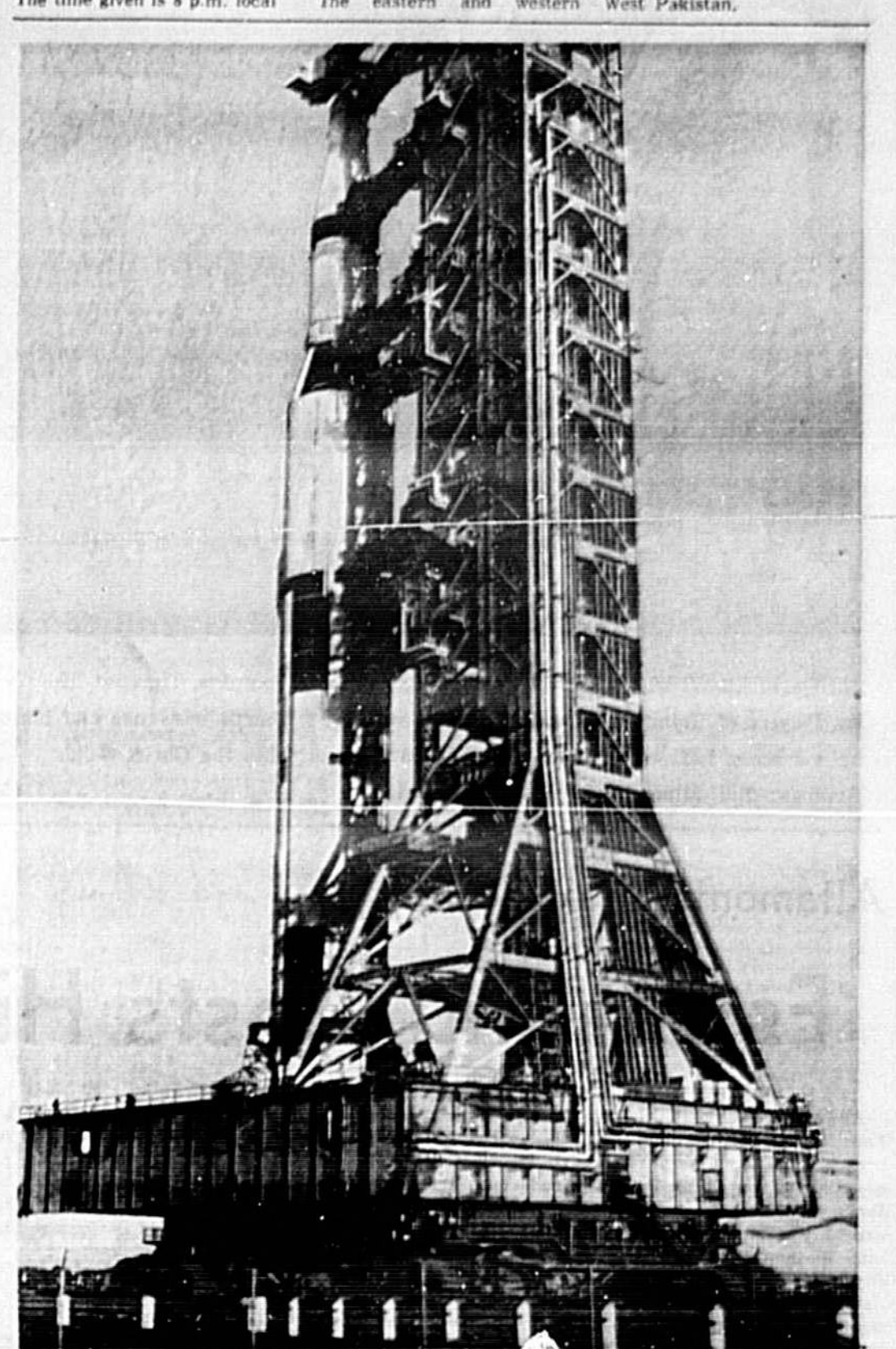
