In movies, "Love Story" has been followed by "Ryan's Daughter," and the recent "Long Ago Tomorrow," a tearwringing tale of love between two crippled youngsters.

Broadway, too, has become misty-eyed with nostalgia-revivals of such romantic classics as "No No Nanette," and "On The Town." Even a spoof of the genre, "Dames at Sea," pays homage to the old dreamscome-true plots. The romantic touch has spelled success in most cases.

Success is no surprise to Lois Wyse. She's been succeeding since she guit her job as a reporter for the Cleveland Press and married Marc Wyse, head of a Cleveland advertising agency more than 20 years ago. She became a full partner and ad copywriter in her husband's

# Money Crisis Seen Eased By Dollar Cut

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Nixon has agreed to devalue the dollar for the first time since 1934, a move that could bring a speedy settlement to the simmering international monetary crisis, perhaps before Christmas.

The agreement, reached Tuesday in a nine-hour meeting with French President Georges Pompidou in the Azores, stripped away a major obstacle to settlement of worldwide monetary disruptions,

No percentage devaluation was mentioned in the Nixon-Pompidou communique, nor was the method of devaluation. But a high administration official said an 8-per-cent devaluation was "about the highest figure mentioned" and was "very much in the hallpark." Should devaluation be accomplished by congressional action raising the price of gold, an 8-percent

The official price of gold has held at \$35 an ounce since the United States stopped redeeming pa-

BELL RINGER PUNCH 1 envelope (6 ounces) instant openhouse punch mix 2 cups cold water

1 cup orange-flavor liqueur 1 cup dry red wine I large bottle (28 ounces) Z club soda, chilled Unpeeled thin orange slices.

Gradually stir contents of envelope of punch mix into cold water: continue to stir until punch mix is completely dissolved. Add liqueur and wine; stir and chill.

Just before serving, pour of ice cubes of a 3-cup ice mold). Add club sods and mix lightly. Garnish with orange

Makes about 2 quarts or about 16 four-ounce servings. NOTE: For a non-alcoholic punch, prepare as above but omit orange-flavor liqueur and red wine: use 11/2 quarts ginger

Stir in butter and enough milk for a light and fluffy consistency. Stir in the cabbage. onion and mace. Add salt and pepper. Reheat over low heat. May be made ahead and kept hot or reheated in top part of double boiler placed over boiling water. Makes about 216 cups or 4 servings.



# Marinate White Fish With Lime

When Hans Pluntke whips up dinner, he has to think in terms of 1,000 steaks or 1,500 baby lobsters-not to mention a couple of thousand buttered rolls and several hundred stuffed avocados.

Pluntke is the executive chef of the new Acapulco Princess Hotel in Mexico.

I spent some vacation time in Acapulco recently and had a chance to meet Pluntke and try his culinary artistry. A tall, handsome German of

38. Plumtke sits in an office with three see-through glass W walls, keeping a wary eye on a id staff of 150 assistant chefs and pantry girls, some 50 pot wrestiers and another 50 dish-

"To be successful as a chef you must combine showmanship with a knowledge of good flavor," he said.

"We like to specialize as much as possible in the native loods. You might say that we go in for Mexican food with a French touch."

A good example is Pluntke's chicken salad, served in a half coconut shell as a bit of showmanship, laced with a Roquefor dressing and garnished with bacon strips and hearts of

It took years of hard work to arrive at the position Pluntke holds today. Born in Breslau. Germany, he served his apprenticeship in Hamburg and then went on to work in hotels in Germany and other European countries. Eventually he became a head chef and came to America, running the kitchens of places such as the Hilton Hotel in Washington, D.C. and the Fairmont in Dallas

Finally he was taken abroad when the Acapulco Princess went into operation last Octo-

"It's been seven days a week

and 16 hours a day since came here, to get the kitchens organized and teach a staff of Mexican help how to cook French gourmet style. But we're getting on." he said. One specialty that is proving a favorite is Ceviche, a novel way of eating raw fish that makes it palatable for the most

squeamish diner "We marinate a white fish such as filet of sole in a mixture dominated by lime for five hours and gradually the meat 'cooks' just as if it had been put over a fire," he said. "It becomes flaky and opaque." CEVICHE
