Prenatal ed part of big baby shower

SANFORD — The Seminole County Healthy Start Coalition will throw the "Biggest Baby Shower" June 23 in partnership with The Newman Center for Women to celebrate and educate women about proper prenatal care and to address prenatal racial disparities.

The "Biggest Baby Shower" is for pregnant women living in the 32771 zip code and surrounding areas. The 32771 zip code, which is located in Sanford, currently has the highest incidence of African-American infant mortality and late entry into prenatal care for Seminole County.

"We want to encourage women to see a doctor as soon as they think they might be pregnant—our health depends on it," said Marnie Shanbhag, executive director for the Seminole County Healthy Start Coalition.

The event will provide lunch, gifts and education to pregnant women living in the Sanford area, as well as have speakers from the Newman Center for Women and WIC Breastfeeding Consultants.

The Biggest Baby Shower is being held at the Sanford Civic Center located at 401 E. Seminole Blvd., Sanford, from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Flier opens mystery without many clues

SANFORD — A flier posted on a downtown business is a mystery to local shop owners and city staff.

The flier, which indicated that a gentlemen's club and massage parlor, called "Suzi's", would be coming soon to downtown Sanford, has been circulating rumors downtown as to where it originated.

It was allegedly taken down from 111 E. First St., earlier this week and it appears to be a practical joke. Most business owners are laughing at what one called a "clever joke".

Russ Gibson, director of Planning and Community Development, said he received close to 50 calls on Monday regarding the flier, but he cannot find any facts to substantiate it.

Gibson has asked code enforcement to

look into it and he said he has not heard back from the owner of the building, George Andrew Speer, where the flier was allegedly posted.

"I was only able to leave a voice message for him to return my call," Russ said in an email.

The Herald spoke briefly with Speer and asked if he had heard of the flier.

Investigator calls for discipline, better abuse reporting

SANFORD — An investigator hired by Seminole County Public Schools recommended discipline against personnel who failed to report child abuse incidences against teacher Kathleen Garrett.

The school district released the investigative report on Garrett Monday morning. Garrett, a teacher of autistic students at South Seminole Middle School, was arrested and charged with child abuse last October.

Andrew Thomas, an outside investigator hired by the district, decided not to investigate what charges should be brought against Garrett, but rather how abuse could happen in the school system and how to prevent it.

Thomas's recommendations to the district were to improve employee training to identify and report suspected child abuse by a fellow employee; improve aide and administrator training on proper techniques for teaching autistic students; and improve opportunities to observe classrooms without intrusions.

According to the Casselberry Police Department, Garrett stands accused of using "threats, intimidation, and bodily harm to physically and mentally control already permanently disabled victims."

One example, a witness alleged, was Garrett hitting a victim on the back of his head with a closed fist for wetting his pants. Another victim was allegedly straddled by Garrett while laying on the floor.

Although the recent release of the report is not going to be used to charge Garrett of further criminal

First Baptist to honor missionaries

First Baptist Church of Sanford will honor retiring missionaries Walter and Pauline Routh on Sunday, June 26. They served for 38 years in Vietnam and the Philippines.

During the 10:30 a.m. service, Rev. Routh will bring the message and their daughters will present special music. At 6 p.m. Sunday there will be a time of fellowship with the Routh family in the Memorial Education Building. This will be a time for friends to visit with the Routh family, and see a display of items depicting their work.

Friends and supporters of the Rouths are invited to attend both events.

Walter was born in Sanford in 1934. He lived at 1616 W. Second St., with his parents and sisters, Hazel and Marian. Just across a large yard was the Routh Bakery, his father's business, which fronted on West First Street.

Walter graduated from Seminole High School in 1952. He served as president of his class during his freshman and junior years, and as president of the student council in his senior year.

During his childhood, Mrs. A.J. Peterson would bring Walter, Hazel and other neighborhood children to Sunday School at First Baptist. When Walter was 10 years old, he was awarded a week at Children's Missionary Bible Camp for learning 301 Bible verses in their volunteer program in the public schools. While at the camp, he accepted Christ as his Savior and joined First Baptist Church soon afterwards. On March 19, 1952, First Baptist licensed him to the ministry.

He graduated from Stetson University in 1955 and from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1958.

While in seminary, he pastored a mission church in Louisville, Ky. During the summer of 1957, Pauline Hays came to the mission to play piano. Louisville was her home and she was teaching at a local junior high school. Walter and Pauline were married that October.

Following seminary graduation, Walter led a church in Felicity, Ohio. In March 1963, Walter and Pauline were appointed by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention as missionaries to Vietnam.

Walter was pastor of several churches while with the Foreign Mission Board. Soon, they began to see other opportunities which interested them, but they could not take advantage of these while with the Board. So, in 1972, they resigned and formed the Walter A. Routh Jr. Missionary Association.

This association, based in Sanford, had a board of directors which took care of all business matters, freeing the Rouths to minister. Many churches, groups and individuals supported the Rouths throughout the association.

Vietnam fell to the Communists in 1975. Walter was able to bring 52 Christians out during the final days. He and Pauline came back to Sanford and helped get them started here.

Since Vietnam was now closed to missionaries, the Rouths began work in the Philippines after language study.

In 1967, Riverside Church in Atlanta called Walter as pastor, where they remained for two years. God then led them back to Vietnam and the Philippines.

Vietnam had a communist government, but people were allowed in, under certain circumstances. The Rouths chose social work.

They were based in the Philippines, and from there they were able to visit Vietnam two or three times a year for a few weeks at a time for about 15 years. "We were social workers on the surface, but missionaries at heart," Pauline said.

They worked with the government to help build schools, and upgrade cattle among other areas. While doing this they ministered to people in all walks of life including government officials. They also encouraged the churches.

In June 2004, the Rouths came back "home" to live in Lake Mary and serve at First Baptist Church. They continued their membership there through most of their ministry.

Following visits to several sponsoring churches and individuals throughout the United States, they officially retired from the foreign mission field on March 31, 2005.

The Rouths continue to minister to others through First Baptist. They actively visit church members and prospects, and substitute as Sunday School teachers. Pauline plays the piano when needed and Walter has taken on the chairmanship of the pastor search committee.

The Rouths have four children; Deanna, Donna, Darlene and Walter III, known as Buddy. Darlene and Buddy were born in Vietnam. Each of these has stories of their own. Come to the services on June 26 and visit with them.

Walter is a "home town boy" who many of you know and several of you were in school with him. First Baptist Church encourages you to come to the services on June 26 to renew your friendships and celebrate this milestone in the lives of Walter and Pauline Routh.

SANFORD — The Seminole County Fire Department will participate in a nationwide "Stand Down for Firefighter Safety", June 21-23.

The International Association of Fire Chiefs implemented this program due to the increase of line-of-duty deaths to firefighters this year.

"We focus on firefighter safety throughout the year, however, this is a great opportunity for our firefighters to review the safety guidelines to prevent death and injuries," says Terry Schenk, Seminole County fire chief.

The morning shift will start with a radio announcement and moment of silence for line-of-duty deaths. Firefighters will also review recent local firefighter deaths to include Seminole firefighter Lt. Frank Kucera

in May.

Throughout the day, firefighters will review emergency scene accountability, fire ground safety procedures, and infectious disease exposure policy, as well as, conduct equipment checks, according to a Seminole County news release.

They will also participate in a physical fitness and safety training exercise. At the end of the day, they will review what they have learned

and discuss personal commitments to safety for firefighters and have a second moment of silence for line-of-duty deaths.

"Safety is always the number one priority for our firefighters to make certain they go home safe," Schenk said.

thing different but quick."

So they came up with Hunker Down. The board of the game has a hurricane sitting on top of a map of Florida. The eye of the storm centers on the Tampa Bay area and that is where up to six players start the game.

A single, 12-sided die is rolled to determine how each player moves through the storm. A storm cloud space forces the player to pick up a feeder band card. These are bad. Feeder bands, as all Central Floridians know bring the high winds and rain.

The trials brought on by the feeder band cards are taken from last year's experience.

"Either it happened to us or to our friends," Connelly said.

For example, one reads: "You forget where your homeowners insurance policy is. Go back 5 spaces." Another says: "Your kid's swing set blew into the window of a lawyer's mansion! Skip your next turn."

On the other hand, you could land on a Relief square which allows the player to pick up a relief card. This moves the player forward and eventually out of the storm.

One relief card reads: "You've mastered making coffee on your BBQ grill. Move ahead 1 space!" Another says: "You own 14 coolers. Go to the next grocery store (space) for supplies!"

The grocery store is another space to land on, but of course

it will delay you because during and after the hurricane there are millions of people doing the same thing.

Robin Dunakin, Seth Legasick and Connelly finalized the game and formed POST FX, a Sanford corporation.

They started selling the games on the first day of hurricane season, June 1, of course. The games sell for \$24.99 at www.hunkerdowngame.com. Part of the proceeds will appropriately enough to the American Red Cross of Florida Disaster Relief Fund.

The packaging of the game is designed to fit into a hurricane preparedness kit, Connelly said. The board was printed in North Carolina, the cards in Florida. The sandbags come from California, and the 12-sided die that resembles a

certain type of radar all hurricane veterans know was created in Massachusetts.

Connelly said 18 neighbors put the game together over a 10-hour period. The game pieces fit neatly into a small pizza box that is placed in the sandbag.

Two people can complete the game in about 30 minutes. Four people may take 40 to 45 minutes, Connelly said.

"We wanted something face paced," she said. "We still play it. We're not bored with it yet. It's never the same game twice." There are 60 feeder-band and 60 relief cards to ensure a variety of outcomes.

Neighborhood children tested six different prototypes before the final version emerged, Connelly said. The Seminole County Business Incubator helped the neighbors start the business including how to form a corporation and how to collect sales tax.

They are trying to get it into stores, Connelly said, and they have sold some games at a Sanford flea market. The games are shipped from Sanford where postal workers are now familiar with the company's owners.

People from Tallahassee and Virginia have bought the game, Connelly said. To keep up with the demand for something new, she said they are considering writing new sets of cards.

"We want to keep the game fresh," she said.

"I don't speak with the press," Speer said.

Gibson said that it is either a practical joke or the business owner is not aware of the city's regulations against such businesses in Sanford.

The flier was allegedly pulled off of the door by a citizen who then reported it to City Hall.

"The city of Sanford has not found any evidence of it," Gibson said regarding a gentlemen's club moving into downtown.

George Megrichian, owner of Ruby Juice, said that he was one of the local business owners that called Gibson on Monday to find out if there was any truth to the flier.

He said at first he thought it was a joke, but then he wasn't sure what the regulations were.

"I thought the city wouldn't allow something like that. I was kind of torn

between it being factual or it being a prank," Megrichian said.

Some other business owners laughed about the flier, positive that it was a joke.

"I have no idea," Bill Painter, owner of Colonial Room said.

A part-time worker at Miss Libby's Antique Emporium said that she hadn't heard anything about the flier but she has had people ask what's going in the currently abandoned building.

According to Painter, Speer is renovating the building in order to rent it out for two separate shops.

Down the road, at Tin Lizzie Tavern, there were mixed reviews on the flier. One patron wanted to know why it was a big deal if a massage parlor and gentlemen's club went in to downtown Sanford.

The other laughed and thought it was obviously a practical joke.

Owner, Terry Olson, said this was the

first she had heard of the flier.

"Usually in here, you hear the guys talk. If the guys knew about it, they'd be talking," Olson said.

Another patron remembered hearing something about a gentlemen's club coming to downtown a few weeks ago from another patron of the bar, but could not recall who it was, or any other details about it.

Gibson said that a business owner would need to go through the city to get a business license and it is against regulations. Gibson said he has reason to believe that it is a joke.

"It takes up a lot of our time, energy and resources, of which we are already short of," Gibson said.

activity by the district, she has resigned from her duties and will no longer teach in Seminole County. She will also be investigated by Professional Practices.

In the report, Thomas interviewed as many witnesses as he could, but explained that many who are no longer employed with the school were not legally subject to the interviews.

In the beginning of the report, Thomas said that some described Garrett simply as a strict disciplinarian who had high expectations of her students, while others described her behavior and teaching methods as unorthodox and inappropriate.

Although several aides testified to Thomas that Garrett tried to run her class through fear and intimidation, Thomas said that Garrett was not universally feared by her students.

"One parent told me that her son, on seeing Ms. Garrett unexpectedly while shopping, ran over and hugged her. She told me her son looked forward to going to school when he had Ms. Garrett as his teacher, which had not always been the case when he had other teachers," Thomas's report said.

Most of the report centers around how these situations were not reported immediately, as they seem to predate her South Seminole Middle School employment. Just prior to that position, she taught at Indian Trails Middle School.

A few parents from Indian Trails middle school have come forward about incidences that seem to have led to Garrett's transfer from Indian Trails to South Seminole.

That was another concern of Thomas's investigation. At Indian Trails, Garrett taught a class of Trainably Mentally Disabled students. Thomas wrote in his report that then Principal Eugene Petty and Assistant Principal Larnell Watford learned of at least three incidents of possible student abuse or neglect by Garrett.

"Despite the School District's mandatory reporting policy, it strongly appears that none of these incidents was reported to the [Abuse] Hotline by either

Mr. Petty or Ms. Watford," Thomas wrote.

One of the incidents is a case where Garrett allegedly grabbed a young woman's hair and slammed her forehead down onto the desk forcing her eyeglasses to fly off.

The young woman was transferred from Garrett's class, and after further complaints by the parents, Garrett was involuntarily transferred to South Seminole Middle School.

South Seminole Principal Richard Mossman told Thomas that he was not given any information for the transfer other than that parents were upset and it was an issue that could not be resolved.

"Mr. Mossman claims that Dr. [Ron] Pinnell (Executive Director for Secondary Schools) never mentioned any allegations of child abuse that had been made against Ms. Garrett," the report said.

Thomas recommended disciplinary action be taken against some of the involved personnel, mostly relating to failure to report suspected child abuse.

Thomas recommended that then Assistant Principal Larnell Watford, Indian Trails Middle School; then Assistant Principal Josephine Opisso, South Seminole Middle School; and then Principal Richard Mossman of South Seminole, be investigated by the Education Practices Commission because although all three have retired, they still hold Department of Education certificates as educators.

The investigation, Thomas recommends, should be based on whether those three violated state standards of professionalism by failing to properly report allegations of abuse.

The four aides who claim to have witnessed abuse by Garrett may be subject to reassignment.

Thomas recommended that the two aides, Sabrina Mort and Jennifer Rodriguez, who were aides for Garrett during the 2004-2005 school year, not be disciplined. Those were the aides who came forward last October, leading to the arrest of Garrett. Thomas did think that they should have come forward sooner, but did not want to pun-

ish them for finally coming forward.

"Without the decision by Ms. Mort and Ms. Rodriguez to come forward and forcefully complain to Assistant Principal Agosto about Ms. Garrett, the alleged abuse may never have been discovered. If those ladies were punished, it seems to me that it would send the following message to the District's employees: 'Don't report, because if you do, you will suffer,'" Thomas wrote.

The other two aides who were supposed witnesses to Garrett's abuse was Michelle Alessandri and Sabine Nowik. Thomas recommended that "serious consideration" should be bestowed on those aides, although they claimed to have reported the incidents to their supervisor.

"They have been unable to satisfactorily document their claims to have made reports to Ms. Opisso, so I question whether they did, in fact, make such reports," Thomas wrote. "Furthermore, they did not report those incidents to the Abuse Hotline or to law enforcement."

To ensure that this type of incident does not happen again in the Seminole County School District, they are collaborating with Kids House of Seminole to produce a visual training modular on identifying and reporting abuse. Also, other steps have been taken such as enlarging windows in classrooms. There will also be several teacher in-service days specifically designed for teachers of the autistic and assistants for next school year.

"We regret it happening," Community Involvement Director Richard Wells said in a press conference Monday.

Wells said that the district is also working with parents and have formed a committee with representation from those parents, teachers, assistants, the legal department, advocates, principals and Seminole Educational Association to review the ESE process of severely disabled students dealing with safety issues. The first meeting was held June 8, and the second meeting is scheduled for June 27 at 2 p.m.

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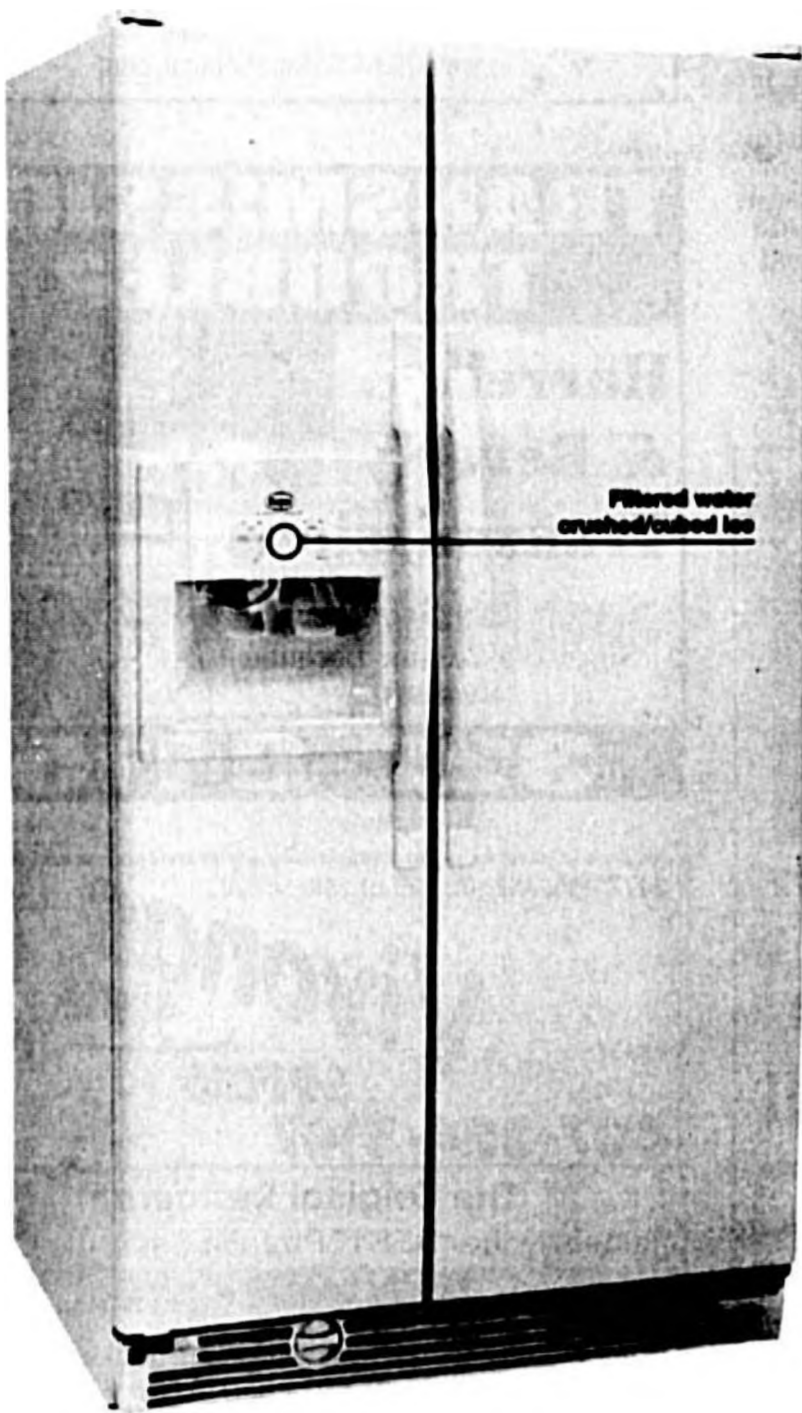

River Rats take over top spot in FCSL

The Sanford River Rats are back in an accustomed position.

Sitting atop the Florida Collegiate Summer League standings.

The defending champions ran their winning streak to five in a row and six of seven after a weekend sweep of Orlando that gave them a 1-1/2 game lead before falling 2-1 to the Winter Haven Wart Hogs in a make-up game on Monday.

The River Rats were to have traveled to Winter Haven on Tuesday and then return home tonight (Wednesday) to host the Daytona Beach Barracudas in a 7 p.m. game at Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium to complete a streak of five consecutive games without a break.

The team will get a break on Thursday before taking to the Rinker-Stenstrom Field turf to host the Zephyrhills Snappers in a single game Friday evening at 7 p.m. and a twin-night doubleheader on Saturday at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m.

Admission is free to everyone at all FCSL games this season.

As expected, the River Rats overcame a 1-2 start to zoom back to the top of the standings, but it wasn't easy as two of the three weekend wins over the Orlando Shockers saw Sanford getting walk-off wins, one in extra innings.

The River Rats got off to a good start in the series opener on Friday, taking a 3-1 lead after three innings, but Orlando came charging back with a run in the fourth and three runs in the fifth to give the guests a 5-3 lead.

Sanford evened the game with two runs in the bottom of the sixth inning on an RBI double by Jon Lozada and a throwing error.

Neither team was able to score over the next four innings and went to the bottom of the 11th inning tied at 5-5.

With one out, Ovidio's Bridger Hunt was hit by a pitch and stole second before moving over to third on a wild pitch. After a pop up for the second out of the inning, third baseman Tyler Stevens, who was playing his first game in a River Rats uniform, sent the local fans home happy with an RBI single to right to plate Hunt with the winning run.

The trio of Derek Abriola, Kyle DeYoung, seeing his first action of the season, and former Winter Springs High star Chris Maher were outstanding in relief of starter Zach Whitmer, allowing only three hits and no runs over the final six innings, walking three and

striking out nine.

Maher worked out of jams in both the 10th and 11th, leaving the bases loaded in the top of the 11th, to earn his first victory without a defeat.

Offensively, designated hitter Lozada had a big night, going 3-for-5, including his third double of the season, scored two runs and drove in one.

Catcher Jonathan Lucroy also enjoyed a successful evening, going 3-for-4 with his first two doubles of the season and scored a run.

Hunt and Stevens also had two-hit games, Hunt going 2-for-5 with his second double of the season, a run scored and an RBI, and Stevens going 2-for-6 with the game-winning RBI.

Also contributing were Courtney Propst (fourth double of the season), Jimmy Miles and Kyle Patrick (single, run, RBI each) and Chris Kemp (single).

The middle game on Saturday turned out to be one of those odd games that was much closer than the score indicated.

The River Rats scored two runs in the bottom of the first inning, but the score was only 2-1 before Sanford scored two more runs in the fifth inning.

Even when the hosts scored two more runs in the seventh inning to take a 6-1 lead Orlando was not out of it.

But the River Rats exploded for seven runs in the bottom of the eighth inning to make the final score a misleading 13-1 blowout.

Sanford got outstanding pitching again as starter T.J. Large, who was the ace of the University of Alabama staff this past season, went the first seven, allowing three hits and an unearned run, while striking out seven and walking just one to even his record at 1-1.

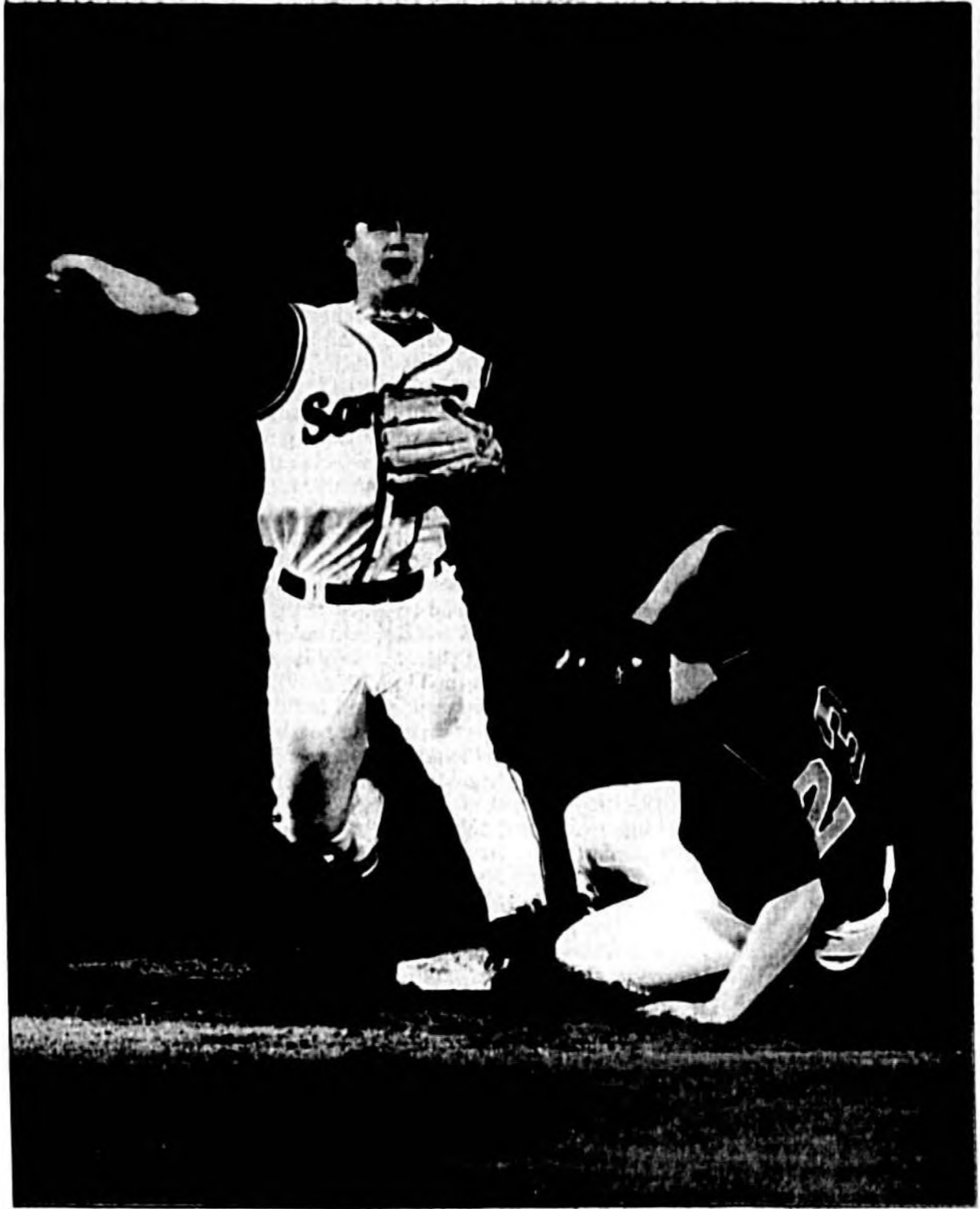
Dylan Lindsey walked one and struck out three in his inning of work and John Ducey worked a perfect ninth, striking out one.

Lake Howell's Smith among UCF 2005 Athletics Hall of Fame class

Five Golden Knight greats, including UCF's first athletics director, have been selected to comprise the 2005 class of the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame. Frank Rohter, who served as AD from the time classes began at the school in 1968, until 1974, will be joined in the Hall by soccer All-American Rony Francois, place-kicker Franco Grilla, wrestler Johnny Rouse and single-season rushing leader Marquette Smith. They will be formally inducted in a ceremony Sept. 23 at the Rosen Plaza Hotel on International Drive.

Rohter helped lay the foundation for the early success in athletics enjoyed by UCF, then known as FTU, all while serving as the chair of the physical education department. He was responsible for hiring some of UCF's most successful coaches during his tenure, including UCF Athletics Hall of Fame inductees Torchy Clark, Gerry Gergley, Dennis Kamrad and Jim Rudy. What made his hiring of these successful coaches more amazing was the fact UCF had little funding and no facilities for athletics and each coach also had to accept a teaching position at the University in addition to their coaching duties.

Francois played soccer from 1980-83 and led the team to two Sunshine State Conference regular season and tournament titles and its first two NCAA Tournament appearances in 1982 and 1983. He was a three-time All-South performer and earned All-America honors in 1982. Francois earned first-team All-Sunshine State Conference honors three times and was named the league's offensive MVP twice. He finished his career

with 39 goals, 23 assists and 101 career points.

Grilla is probably most recognized for his game-winning kick as time expired on a frozen field in Youngstown, Ohio in 1990 that gave UCF a first-round win in the I-AA playoffs against previously unbeaten Youngstown State. He served as UCF's place-kicker from 1989-92 and was named to the Orlando Sentinel's 25th Anniversary UCF Football Team. He owns the school record with 103 consecutive PATs made and is second in career field goals made with 47.

Rouse wrestled at UCF in 1971 and 1972 and finished second in the state his first year and third his second year. He returned to UCF in 1973 as an assistant coach and stayed until 1976. He served one year as head coach in 1982. He won the Regional Olympic Trials in 1976, but an injury prevented him from competing at the National Finals. Rouse coached Winter Park High School for 19 years. He was honored by the National Wrestling Hall of Fame with a Lifetime Service Award and is a member of the Winter Park High School and Metro Conference Hall of Fames. Currently, he is currently coaching UCF's highly successful wrestling club.

Smith was the Gatorade High School Player of the Year at Lake Howell High School and played tailback at UCF in 1994 and 1995 after transferring from Florida State and led the Golden Knights in rushing both seasons. He set the school's single-season record for rushing yards with 1,511 and also set a record with 14 touchdowns as a senior. He is the only player in UCF history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in back-to-back seasons and is third in career rush-

ing with 2,569 yards, despite having played only two seasons. Smith earned second team All-America honors in 1995, and was an honorable mention selection on the Orlando Sentinel's 25th Anniversary Football Team. He was drafted by the Carolina Panthers in the fifth round, but knee injuries in successive years during the pre-season cut his NFL career short.

The induction of these five brings to 36 the number of inductees into the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame. The UCF Athletics Hall of Fame was formed in 1998 to honor those individuals who, through their demonstrated athletics achievement or service, have distinguished themselves and the University. Eligible categories for inclusion are former UCF athletes, coaches and administrators. Athletes must wait four full academic years from the completion of their eligibility, while coaches and administrators are immediately eligible upon the completion of their tenure at UCF.

An eight-member committee, comprised of representatives of the UCF faculty, Golden Knights Club, Alumni Association, local media and the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame, trimmed a list of 43 initial nominees to 14 finalists. That list was further trimmed to the five inductees.

The induction ceremony will begin with a reception at 6 p.m., followed by dinner. Admission for the event is \$40 for Golden Knights Club donors and UCF Alumni Association members and \$50 for all others. 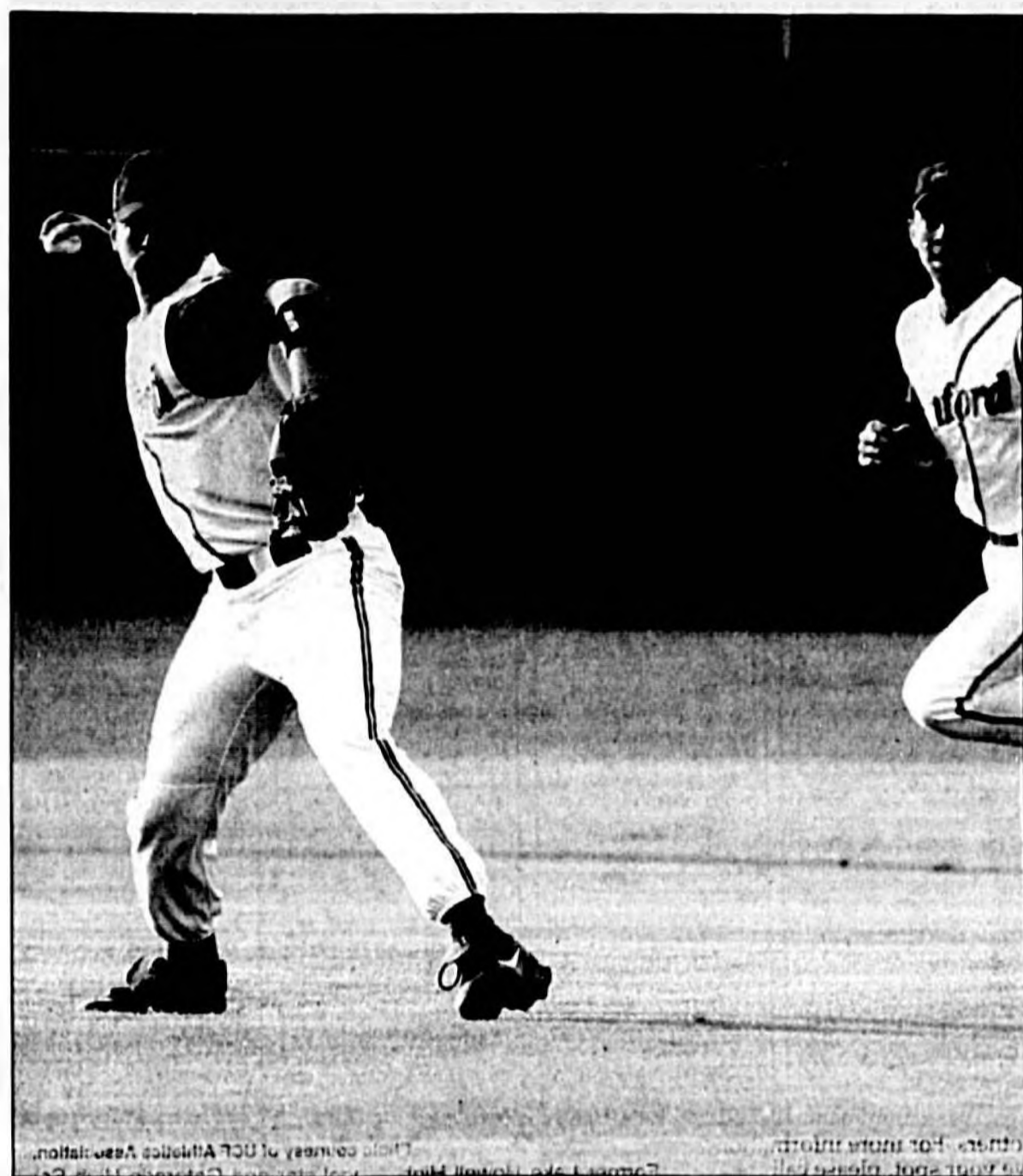

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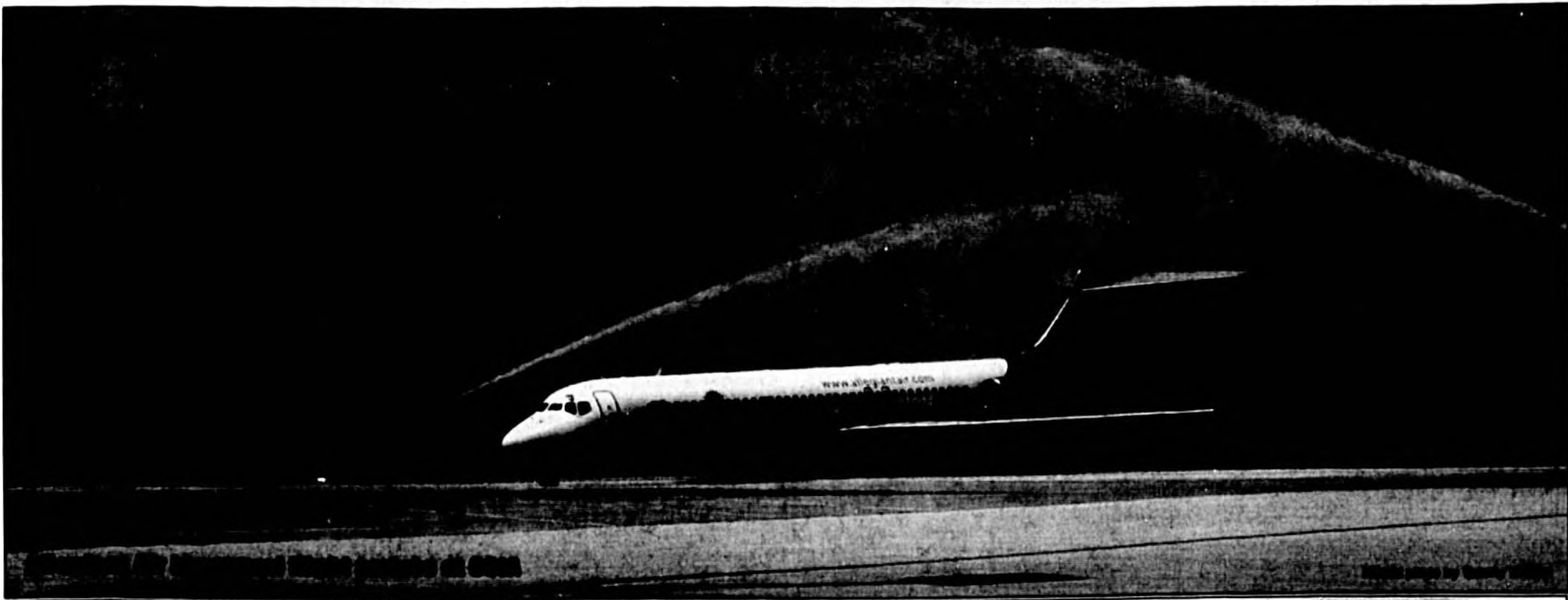
