Arms Conference Will

Publisher Predicts Rising

SYRACUSE, Nov. 21.—The

government at increasing prices,"

FAGG OUTLINES
AIMS OF CIVIL
BODY IN STATE

Administrator Says
Over \$15,000,000 To
Come Into State In
Payrolls By Feb. 15

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 21.—(A.P.)—
Marcus Fagg, civil works ad-
ministrator, last night estimated
\$15,000,000 would flow into Flori-
da within the next 90 days as the
federal government seeks to put
4,000,000 men to work by spending
\$400,000,000.
One hundred thousand men
will get regular 30 hours a week
employment in Florida, and their
minimum pay will be \$12 weekly,
or a total payroll of \$1,200,000,
Fagg said.

Pitkin Calls Upon Nation's
Advertisers To Unsell New
'Philosophy Of Subsistence'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—In a
frank and at times brutally plain
discussion of the problems occa-
sioned by a mounting increase in
the number of unemployed in
America, Dr. Walter B. Pitkin of
the Columbia University School of
Journalism, speaking before mem-
bers of the Association of Na-
tional Advertisers at their 20th
annual convention here declared
that "We can't have increased
buying unless there is a very rapid
step-up in income, and that is not
in sight."
Dr. Pitkin told the group it
should concern itself not with the
problem of how to sell commodi-
ties, but with the far more im-
portant question of whether there
would be any future market to
sell anything to.

EARLY CITRUS IS
BRINGING LIGHT
RETURNS SO FAR

WINTER HAVEN, Nov. 21.—
Comparison of auction market
prices for Florida fruit announced
during the week-end by the Citrus
Growers Clearing House Associa-
tion here, revealed an average
decline of \$1.02 a box in grape-
fruit prices for the period ending
Nov. 16 as compared with a simi-
lar period in 1932.

Grapefruit Price Is
\$1 Box Lower Than
Quotations Of 1932

The 23 cars sold in the 1932 pe-
riod averaged \$2.16 a box as com-
pared with \$3.20 a box last sea-
son, when 25 cars were sold. Dur-
ing the same period this year, 56
cars of oranges averaged \$2.36 a
box, compared with 18 cars aver-
aging \$3.40 a box last season.
