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

#### Southern Bell Telephone Company Encourages Employees

Washington, May 2.—Democratic leaders in the house and senate will undertake tomorrow another campaign to expedite important legislation pending in congress with a view to getting as many salient features of their program on the statute books before the national political convention in June.

The "clean up" movement will be instituted in the House with the calling up of the Philippine independence bill on which a special rule will probably be reported with the view of disposing of it in one day. With this measure out of the way it is proposed to rush action on other bills with similar closure rules and to continue this form of action relentlessly.
