Ninety Millions Per Day. New York, April 28.—The war is now costing Europe more than ninety million dollars daily, according to the estimates of the Mechanics and Metals National Bank. New York banks estimate the cost per hour to England, France and Russia, jointly, at approximately two and a half millions. The costs to the Teutonic powers is in excess of a million a minute. The total cost of the war, if it is in progress on August 5th will have been forty-five million dollars. Of this England's share is eleven and a half billion, Germany's a little less and France's nine and a quarter billion.

GERARD CALLED TO CONFERENCE WITH KAISER

Berlin, Germany, April 28.—James W. Gerard, the American ambassador, will leave Berlin tonight for German army headquarters where he will be received by the German emperor. Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, who has been at the army headquarters is expected to come to Berlin tomorrow to prepare German answer to the latest American note.

Washington, D. C., April 28.—There is nothing new on the German submarine situation. Secretary of State Lansing today received confidential reports from Ambassador Gerard in Berlin.

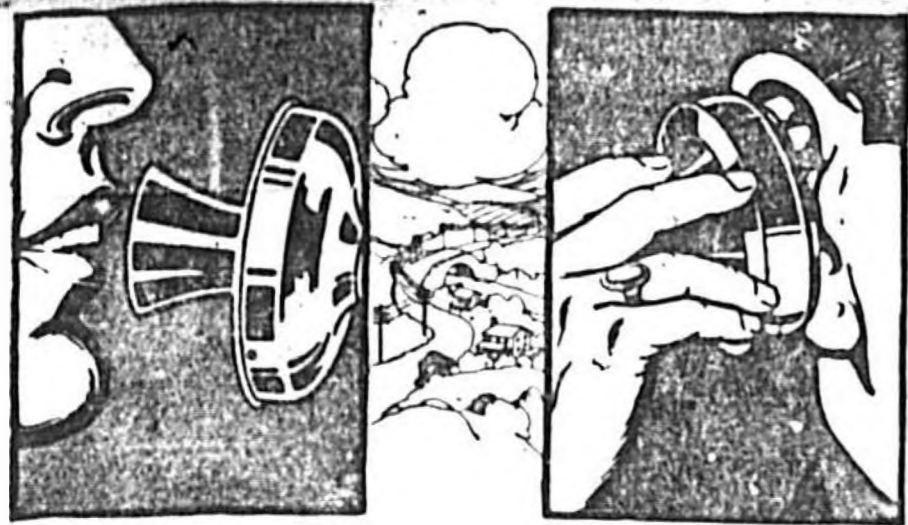

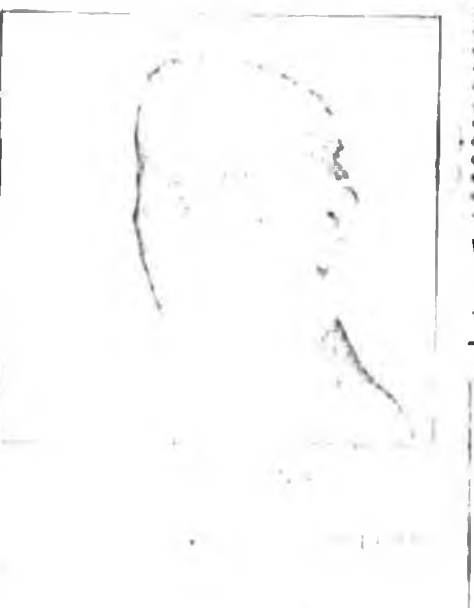

Washington, May 2.—Democratic leaders in the house and senate will undertake tomorrow another campaign to expedite important legislation pending in congress with a view to getting as many salient features of their program on the statute books before the national political convention in June.

Beer saloons which previous laws prohibited operating on Sunday, sold their last drinks Saturday night throughout the state, but here and other larger cities of the state clubs were allowed to remain open on Sunday as usual and disposed of alcoholic beverages until 11 or in some cases 12 o'clock tonight.

No reports had reached here tonight of any disorder marking the passing of beer saloons, allowed to operate under previous prohibition laws, and the "locker clubs" furnished no more than a good-natured joviality as the last drinks were dispensed.

JUNE IN 1816 WAS A MONTH OF ICE AND SNOW

January, of 1816 was mild, so mild that people allowed their fires to go out. A severe cold snap came in February but soon passed away. March had an unusual high temperature, but April was the worst of the winter. May saw a further departure from the normal temperature.

June, the month of roses, was a surprise to the oldest inhabitants. First, ice and snow were common, almost every green thing was killed and fruit was nearly all destroyed. One day snow fell to the depth of three inches.

"July was accompanied by frost and ice. Indian corn was almost all destroyed. August was even more cheerless and the farmers doomed to disappointment. Corn was so badly frozen that it was cut for fodder.

September came in bright and warm and for two weeks the almost frozen people began to thaw out. It was the mildest weather of the year, but on the 16th of the month ice formed a quarter of an inch thick. October and November were very cold, but December turned out to be the very warmest month of the year.
