

County considers moving election office

Supervisor Sandra Goard says 1st Street location too small

SANFORD — For almost five years, the Seminole County Supervisor of Elections office has been located at 116 West First Street, having moved to that location in June of 1998.

The present facility occupies approximately 8,500 square feet of space, with approximately 2,300 in warehouse space.

Now, there is a serious need for more space. The request for an expansion was first presented to the Seminole County Commission at a Feb. 25 meeting. At that time, the county staff was assigned the task

of coming up with suggestions, both short and long term.

"We have grown significantly," explained Elections Supervisor Sandra Goard. "I've been here for 26 years, and the changes have been unbelievable."

She explained that when she started, there were 56,000 registered voters in the county. "Now there are over 208,000," she said. "We went from 66 voting precincts to 126. In the 1978 general election, we had

1,285 absentee ballots coming in to our office. In the 2002 election there were 15,790."

She expects the requests for absentee ballots in the November 2004 election will increase possibly another sixty percent.

"We haven't increase our staff to handle this increase," she said. "We have to bring in temporary staffers and provide them with phones to handle address changes, absentee requests and other matters. We really need

an expanded area in which to operate."

The proposed recommendations are:

- Option 1 suggests a long term lease agreement with the Orlando Sanford Airport Authority for a 20,000-square-foot office and warehouse building. It is anticipated such a facility would serve for approximately the next 20 years. The cost of the lease would be \$148,000 per year.

- Option 2 suggests a lease agreement for the 3rd floor of the Reflections Building on West Lake Mary Blvd. The annual lease would be \$304,941 with a renovation cost of approximately \$125,000. Staff cautions

Activist, community leader DeLattibeaudiere dies at 83

Lon Howell, who won the commission seat against DeLattibeaudiere in 1992 commented, "He was a really nice man. He always said where he stood and spoke his mind. I have the utmost admiration for him. He will be missed."

Civic leader and friend to everyone, Alfred George DeLattibeaudiere, affectionately known as "Mr. D," passed away Wednesday, March 19, 2003. He was 83.

He was a tall man with distinctive features, and always well-dressed. Most of the long-time Sanford residents knew him, and he knew them by name.

In his political career, he ran, unsuccessfully, three times for seats on the Sanford City Commission, and once for the Seminole County Commission. He seldom campaigned himself, explaining that the citizens had requested that he run, and they would support him and campaign on his behalf. He seldom conducted any publicity campaign and issued no political flyers. His most recent attempt at office was in 1996.

He also served on the city's Planning and Zoning Board. Even though he never succeeded in his campaigning, he was a very frequent member of the audience at Sanford City Commission meetings, and often spoke up on important issues. With a sincere devotion to his city and its citizens, his comments and suggestions often brought about a delay in a commission decision, pending further examination of the situation as DeLattibeaudiere saw it.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by Wilson-Eickelberger Mortuary, Inc. in Sanford, but were not immediately available by press time.

Commission gives go-ahead to start sidewalk construction

LAKE MARY — The Evansdale area may have sidewalks before the beginning of next school year.

Commission Thursday directed city staff and the engineering firm of Dyer, Riddle, Mills and Precourt Inc., to move forward with building sidewalks on both the north and south sides of Evansdale and Pine Tree roads. Following the bid process, construction on the project could begin as early as May.

"It's taken a long time to get to this point, and there's been a lot of frustration," City Manager John Litton said. "At first, we didn't think the neighborhood wanted sidewalks, and then it seemed they only wanted sidewalks on one side of the road. After numerous community meetings, there became a consensus for sidewalks on both sides."

"The sidewalks will be good for the neighborhood and will promote safety," Litton added.

When the Evansdale development was built in the early 1980s, there were no city requirements to build sidewalks in the neighborhood. However, as more residents moved into the area, people became increasingly concerned

with pedestrian safety, especially for children walking to and from school.

Although several residents still oppose sidewalks on both sides, Commission decided to construct the 5-foot walkways on both sides of the roads following months of public input that seemed to favor two sidewalks. The project will also address drainage problems and includes the construction of traffic calming devices. Estimated cost of the project is \$413,372.

Funding for the Evansdale project is available as a result of the county's 10-year extension to the one-cent local option sales tax. The city will receive \$4.7 million over the 10-year life of the tax revenue, with \$622,000 originally allocated to the Evansdale project and \$4 million for the Sand Pond Road/Skyline Drive urban road improvements.

In other business Thursday, Commission approved Metropolitan Homes' request to amend the city's Future Land Use designation for property on the corner of Rinehart Road and Sun Drive. The request was to rezone the property from Medium Density Residential to High Density Residential in order to develop the site with an additional five condominiums in the Feather Edge community.

The Loops of Love Club of Seminole County plans to donate handmade blankets to local children in need.

Winchester rifle tells story of Seminole's past

SANFORD — As a gun collector, Larry Dale uses the rifles in his collection for hunting and sport. There's one, however, that will remain in his gun case and never be shot.

Dale, president of the Orlando Sanford International Airport, recently purchased a special edition Winchester rifle honoring Seminole County. He is only one of 10 people who can boast ownership of the limited production piece.

"I don't have many guns that just sit there," Dale said. "But, this one I will never use. This one is to enjoy and keep as an heirloom."

The rifle was created by Investment Arms Incorporated, a Colorado company that specializes in making limited edition firearms. On the gun's metal and wood are engravings that represent the area's history.

According to Todd Frazier, who works with Investment Arms Incorporated, Seminole

County was chosen as part of its County Historic Series because of its rich and colorful history. Only half of Florida's counties will eventually have a Winchester rifle created to represent them.

"These are beautiful guns," Frazier said. "It makes people proud just looking at them."

Made with American walnut and finished in nickel silver and 24-karat gold overlay, the gun includes engravings of General Sanford, Camp Monroe, Camp

Central Florida produces top young weightlifters

The majority of Team Florida's Olympic-style teenage weightlifters will travel no more than 45 miles to attend the National Junior Weightlifting Championships, being held this year in Altamonte Springs. Twenty-five of the team's 39 female and male lifters live and train in the greater Central Florida area.

"Central Florida has really become the nucleus of weightlifting in Florida," says Team Florida Coach Rick Zensky. "As a team, we have not only more champions from Central Florida than anywhere else, our training programs there are growing daily. The high schools in the region have great weightlifting programs and our USA Weightlifting coaches work closely with those programs. It's a win-win for everyone."

Nine of the lifters are from Spruce Creek High School, eight attend Lake Brantley High School or Rock Lake Middle School, four lifters are from Winter Springs High School, three attend Oviedo High School and one lifter is from Daytona Beach.

In 2002, Team Florida Weightlifting earned three national titles: American Open Champions, Collegiate Champions and Under-23 National Team Champions.

The next competition, the National Junior Weightlifting Championships will be held Friday through Sunday, March 28 - 30 at the Hilton Orlando/Altamonte Springs Hotel, 350 S. North Lake Blvd. in Altamonte Springs. This is the primary qualifying event for the Junior World Team. Athletes meeting or exceeding predetermined qualifying totals and successfully passing drug control at this competition will be eligible for the 2003 USA Weightlifting Junior World Team. These young team members form the foundation for the USA Olympic Weightlifting Team, competing in Athens in 2004 and beyond.

I use the term "Central Florida" rather than just Sanford, because many of the wives and mothers were from elsewhere in the area, including Orlando, Daytona Beach and DeLand.

There were a few tears in the audience, but it was almost like a family reunion. People who might not have known each other before the meeting, ended up giving hugs and words of encouragement to perfect strangers. After all, they were all in the same boat.

Once again, it's time to unite on common ground. Somewhere in this Central Florida area are a few wives and mothers who have the organizational skills to get this started again for our service personnel in the Iraq area.

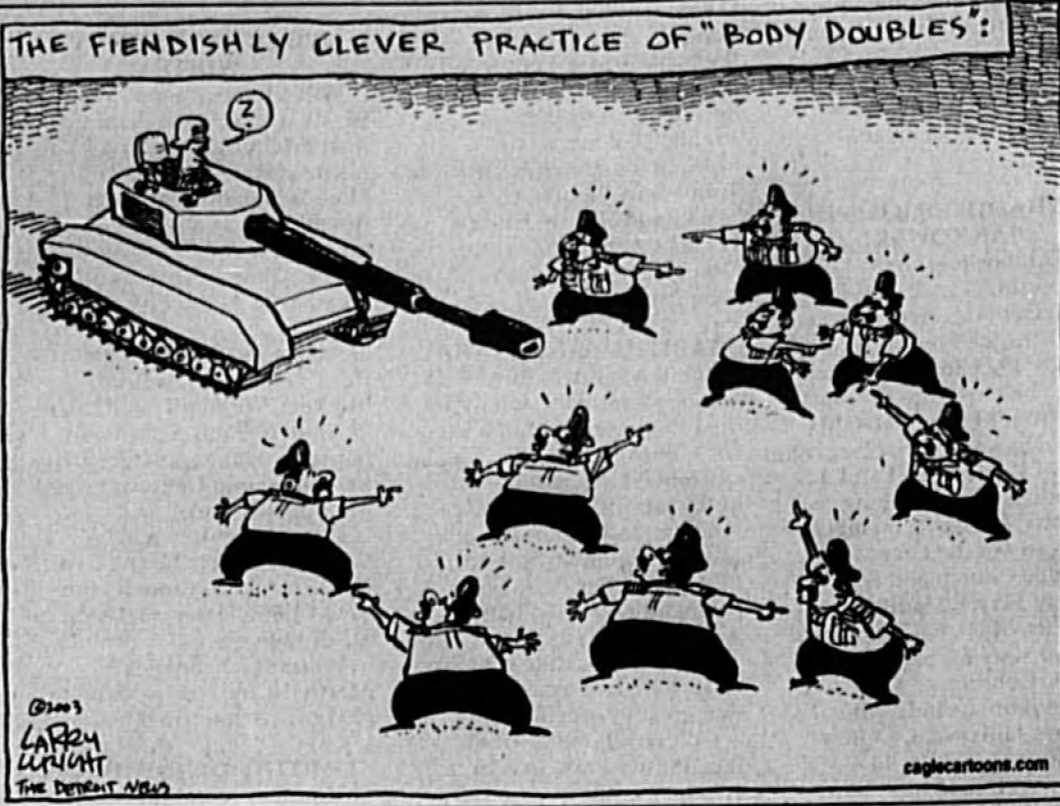
Get together and start the list. Find the name of their parents and get in contact with them. Have them save all incoming letters and e-mail, for use at subsequent meetings.

With our men and women overseas, not knowing what is ahead, as was the case in Desert Storm, they often wrote home to say how wonderful it was that their wives and mothers got together to console each other and share the news.

Recently the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) and City Commission approved funding for Sanford Main Street for a potential total of approximately \$100,000 from the CRA's budget.

The purpose of the funding was to assist Sanford Main Street financially to carry out the Four Point Approach as follows:
Economic Restructuring: means

finding a new purpose for Main Street's enterprises by helping existing downtown businesses expand and recruiting new ones to respond to today's market. Main Street programs help convert unused space into productive property and sharpen the competitiveness of business enterprises.

Design: means getting Main Street into top physical shape. Capitalizing on its best assets — such as historic buildings and traditional downtown layout — is just part of the story. An inviting atmosphere created through window displays, parking areas, signs, sidewalks, streetlights and landscaping conveys a visual message about what downtown has to offer.

Promotion: means selling the image and promise of downtown to all prospects. By marketing the district's unique characteristics to shoppers, investors, new businesses and visitors, an effective promotion strategy forges a positive image through retail promotional activity, special events and marketing campaigns carried out

by local volunteers. Organization: means getting everyone working toward the same goal. The tough work of building consensus and cooperation among the groups that have an important stake in the district can be eased by using the common sense formula of a volunteer driven program and an organizational structure of board and committees.

Now, after the Main Street organization has received the funding they wanted (needed) from the CRA/City I understand that several Main Street board members are rallying the downtown merchants to oppose a project (a new streetscape) that was approved by the CRA 5-0. This project is critical to improving downtown and is essential for Main Street to accomplish its stated purpose and goals via the Four-Point Approach.

I ask you — what's wrong with this picture?

President Bush bears the burden of history

His tie hung low around his shrunken neck like a necklace. His ears seemed larger as his face looked gaunt. Hair graying, his eyes burned with intensity and purpose as he addressed his nation announcing the war. The burden of the presidency seemed etched in the lines of his face. George W. Bush looks like he has aged ten years in the last twenty-seven months...and matured twenty years. Elected president, he has become a leader.

After 9-11, he responded to events. Now he transcends them. As this president faces the tasks imposed by history, he rises from its pages. It is time for us all to thank the Lord that we have this decisive man in office at this crucial time.

One comes to respect his intelligence and political skill, but more his clarity, his understanding of what is important and his focus on the values he carries in his soul. His wisdom is not the product of complexity or subtlety. It stems, instead, from the simplicity of his profound

understanding of good and evil.

In the State of the Union speech, he spoke of his daily task of facing new terrorist threats and the hourly burden of responding. Now we watch in awe at the dignity with which he bears our burden.

Like a gyroscope he keeps his bearing, always rising above the coming horizon. He intuitively knows where he must lead like the needle of a compass shows us the north.

I don't agree with very much of his domestic program. It is too limited and based on an assumption of governmental inactivity that I do not share. I think that Bill Clinton was the better president up to the water's edge. But, on the critical aspect of his presidency, the war on terror, he is right on and has always been. He keeps his political balance as he maintains his internal ballast. His clarity of vision rises above that of his predecessor and his grasp of the requirements of history is deeper and more thorough.

Clinton always lamented that he was not in office during a time of overwhelming national emergency.

He once told me that you needed a war to rise to top rank among presidents. Yet it is the bitter irony of his presidency that he had a war to fight, he just never realized it and never fought it.

Bush would be wasted in another era. His skills would not have been as finely developed as they have been under this challenge. He would never have truly known him. He likely would not have even come to know himself as well as he now has.

Some say Bush's diplomacy has failed. That's not true. He succeeded in conducting negotiations without letting his purity be corrupted or his vision dimmed. This is the ultimate success, not failure, in diplomacy.

Others say he has squandered the sympathy the world had for us after 9-11. Again the criticism is wide of the mark. He demanded their tears give way to resolution, their empathy to action, their victimhood to victory. He didn't dissipate global support. He mobilized it and those whose camaraderie was phony fell away.

Bush has not abused democracy, he has mobilized it. Nor has he shattered checks and balances, he has carried them into action. He is not overreaching the powers of his office, he is using them.

Roosevelt, Lincoln, and Churchill all looked different to contemporaries than they do to historians. FDR seemed to emerge as a wartime leader only after Pearl Harbor rescued him from a time of vacillation and indecision during the late 1930s. Lincoln appeared to be weak and unable to harness the moral issue of slavery to the task of winning the war. Churchill seemed an imperialist and an empire builder pining for war in a time of peace.

But history has a different view of all three.

Bush lives amid the ambivalence of democracy, but we are watching a Roosevelt, a Lincoln, or a Churchill in the making.

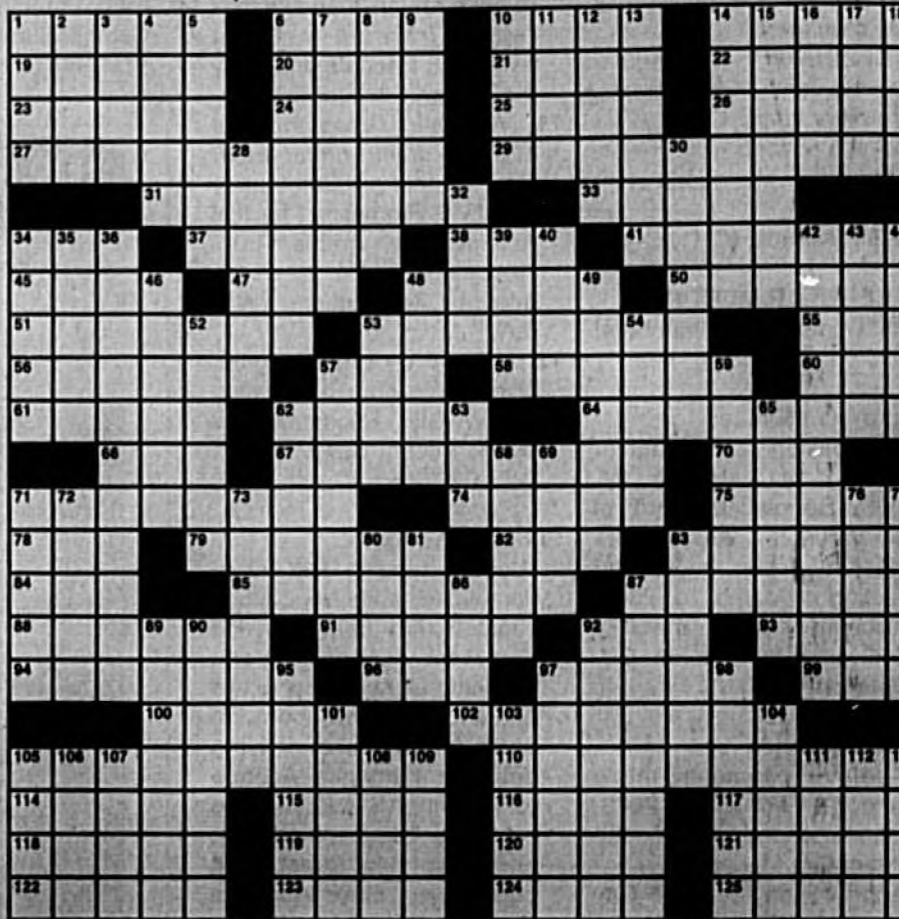

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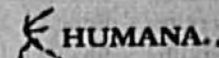

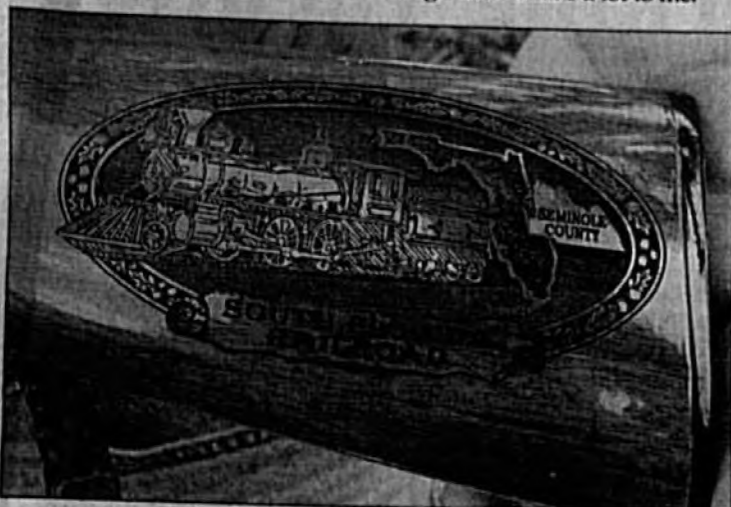

from one square to an entire blanket. They worked together for a common goal."

Cooperative learning classes, such as crocheting, are held twice a year at Willow Creek Church in Winter Springs. Willow Creek Home Educators, a support group for parents who home school their children, sponsor the classes.

"It was lots of fun making the blankets," said Vega's daughter, 11-year-old Briana. "We got together to learn how to do this because we really wanted to help the children."

Project Linus is a national organization based in Illinois that distributes blankets to seriously ill or traumatized children. The non-profit group was established many years ago after a Colorado woman saw a newspaper photo of a child undergoing chemotherapy.

The child was holding a "security" blanket much like that seen in the cartoon strip Peanuts. The group's name-sake, Linus, comes from the cartoon strip, created by

Charles M. Schulz.

The Central Florida chapter of Project Linus has received more than 2,000 donated blankets from "blanketeers," community members who make blankets and donate them to the group, since its establishment approximately two years ago. Each month, a group meets in a Kissimmee quilt shop, Queen Anne's Lace, to make blankets.

For information about the group, which meets on Friday, call 407-846-7998.

Blankets previously donated were given to children at Kids House of Seminole County and Arnold Palmer Hospital in Orlando.

Parents of the 12 Loops of Love members donated the materials needed to make the blankets. Each blanket consists of 6-by-6 inch squares sewn together to make a 5-foot-by-6-foot and a 4-foot-by-5-foot blanket.

"There is a great need in Central Florida for comfort and it's marvelous that children themselves can provide this aid to other children," said Susan Murphy, coordinator of the Central Florida chapter of Project Linus.

According to Briana, she and the other girls were determined to complete the two blankets before the end of the eight-week class. As recognition of their hard work and dedication, the girls will receive a patch from Project Linus naming them as "blanketeers."

According to Vega, the students have requested to take the class again next year to continue making blankets.

however that there will be difficulty loading trucks and the storage of equipment, ballots and voter registration cards.

Option 3 deals with space at the Wilshire Plaza and Oak Grove Shoppes where the Clerk of Court and Tax Collector have satellite offices. This would involve leasing an additional 2,000 to 5,000 square feet. The annual lease, depending on the size of the facil-

ity, would be \$44,406 to \$85,768, with renovation costs of \$40,000 to \$100,000.

Option 4 is the purchase of Page School, a 20,500 square foot building on Airport Boulevard. This single story building would allow for easy unloading of trucks, but the cost of renovation is higher than elsewhere. The purchase price is \$2,225,000, with additional renovation costs of \$400,000. Staff proposes this

option could cause budgetary difficulty.

In addition to the long term options, there are several other short term suggestions being advanced mostly dealing with the relocation of warehouse space.

The matter will be brought up for discussion and consideration at Tuesday's meeting of the Seminole County Commission, beginning at 9:30 a.m. in the commission chambers.

With the nucleus of that team back the momentum and confidence gained from the playoff run has carried over and Oviedo is showing everyone that it wants to return to Tampa in May.

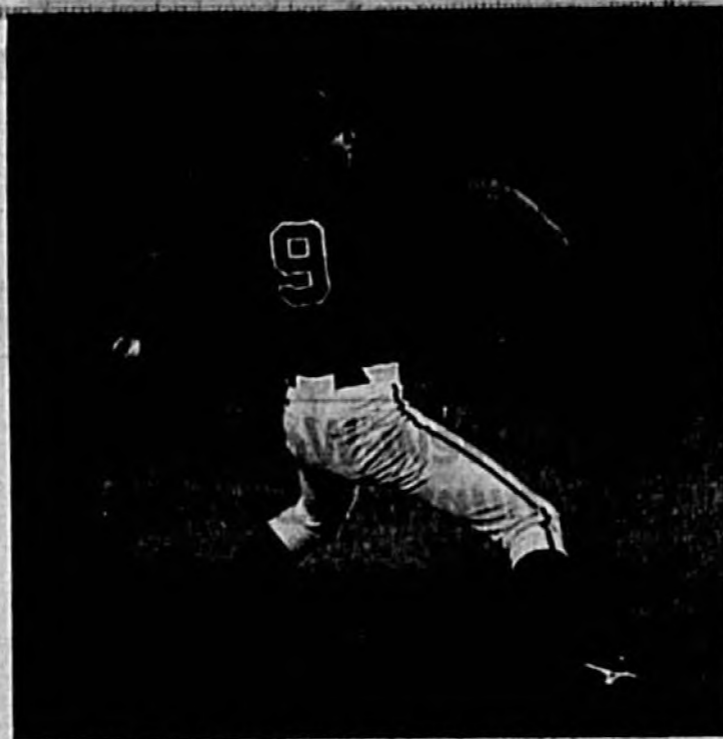

Manatee zones are okayed by court

OCALA — The 5th District Court of Appeal on Tuesday ruled in favor of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), upholding a prior ruling that newly implemented manatee speed zones in Brevard County are legal.

The ruling, which settled the consolidated cases of McGill et al. v. FWC, and City of Titusville v. FWC, affirmed the final order of the Division of Administrative Hearings that rejected several challenges to the FWC's comprehensive revision of the Brevard County Manatee Protection Rules.

Various boaters, a boat manufacturer, and the cities of Cocoa Beach and Titusville had asserted that the FWC rules should be invalidated based upon arguments that "slow speed zones" do not protect manatees and that available data, including satellite-tracking data, did not support the FWC finding that manatees were frequently sighted in regulated areas.

The court rejected those arguments after a two-week administrative hearing, and the administrative law judge also found there is ample evidence to support the secondary purpose of the rules to protect manatee habitats, including seagrass beds, from destruction by motorboats.

Ross Burnaman, assistant general counsel for the FWC who handled the lawsuit, is happy with the ruling and says it validates the scientific

Siblings will compete in National Jr. Weightlifting Championships

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Olympic-style weightlifting is a family affair for James, John and Meredith Hamill of Longwood.

The three siblings, ages 12-to-16, are the largest number of siblings to qualify for the National Junior Weightlifting Championships that will be held in Altamonte Springs next week.

James, a junior at Lake Brantley High School, won three gold medals in the School Age competition at last year's Junior National Championships in Los Angeles and trained last summer at the US Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs. MEN CHARGED WITH TAKING OF GOPHER TORTOISES

Two Silver Springs men are facing criminal charges today taking a species of special concern after Marion County Sheriff's Office deputies found seven gopher tortoises in the trunk of one of the men's car.

Officers of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) charged Alvin Justin Strickland, 38, and David Alan Strickland, 41, both of 6330 SE 182 Ave., with one count each of taking a species of special concern (gopher tortoises), which is a first-degree misdemeanor and carries a maximum penalty of up to one year in prison and a \$1,000 fine. The pair could face additional counts of the same charge.

The two admitted they caught

the turtles in the Ocala National Forest near Highway 314 and Forest Road 88 on Sunday. After catching the tortoises, they placed them in the trunk of Brook's 1983 Ford LTD.

Strickland told Deputy Keith Miller that he planned to eat a couple of the tortoises and sell the rest.

The episode began at about 7 p.m., Sunday when Brook flagged down Deputy Miller on Highway 314 and asked for a ride to Salt Springs because his car had overheated while he was trying to help a friend pull his vehicle out of the woods. On the way to Salt Springs, they came upon the friend, Strickland, walking along the highway.

Strickland then told the deputy his own version of how the pair came to be walking along the highway a couple of miles apart. He advised he had had a fight with his girlfriend and left her in the woods. After Miller said they needed to return to the woods to locate the girlfriend to be sure she was not injured, Brook admitted the real reason they were in the woods — to catch gopher tortoises.

Another deputy, Tommy Stephens, arrived on the scene and transported Brook back to his car so he could open the trunk of the LTD. Inside were seven live tortoises crawling around. Miller then called FWC Lt. Gregg Eason and Officer Kathleen Kelly so the FWC officers could continue the investigation and handle the gopher situation.

When Eason and Kelly interviewed Strickland, he told them he used a 24-foot gopher pulling pole to remove the tortoises from their burrows. After an extensive search, Eason found and confiscated the pulling pole near a gopher burrow in the area where Strickland and Brook said they had been catching tortoises earlier in the day. Strickland, who was arrested for the same offense in 1998, also admitted he had been catching and eating gophers all his life, and has been selling them for the past two years.

Strickland and Brook received notices to appear in court at the Marion County Judicial Center on April 7. The gophers were uninjured and released to their

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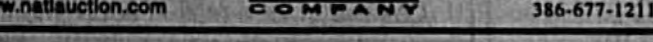

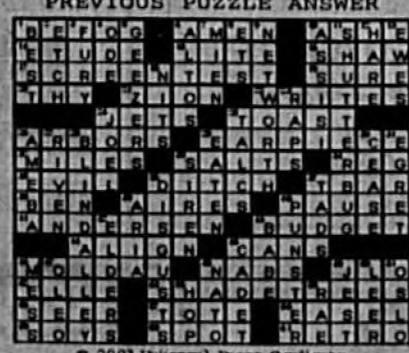
