The Parental Influence

The unfolding of the sordid and shocking story of narcotics addiction among children in their teens leads to many questions of deep social significance. Not the least of these is the question of parental influence—how is it that the parents of these drug victims have not discovered what was happening to their children, and done something about it?

One explanation is that the dope addiction probably occurs in almost all cases among those children who for one reason or another are not subject to effective parental influence. In New York City the addiction rate is put at one in two hundred of the teen-age school students; probably more than one in two hundred are without real parental

Dope addiction among children seems to be new in America; at least we have heard little of it hitherto. But apparently it is now one of the terrible things, perhaps one of the worst, which can happen to children who lack close and effective adult counsel. Children who have learned to confide fearlessly in their parents would tell them about the first exposure to marijustia and its strange effects. Children who are in intimate daily relation with their parents could not possibly progress to the heroin stage without de-

The specter of dope addiction becomes an additional reason why parents need to remain mentally close to their children, need to have the complete confidence of their children and know them well enough to observe changes in their habits and behavior. Such home conditions may not prevent a child from being exposed to dope, but they can enable him to be saved before addiction occurs.

Secret Weapons

A secret weapon that could win a war has been hinted at in Senate hearings. Such a secret weapon is just what we should like to assume can be created, a special gadget which will bring victory in no time, making further macrifice un necessary

Secret weapons have won wars. The so-called Seven Weeks' War of 1866 was won so quickly over the muchheralded Austrians because Prussia had developed the quick-firing needle gun. In World War I the great secret was the tank, which proved the solution for the problem presented by the fortified trenches.

At the beginning of World War II Hitler dropped dark bints of a secret weapon which would win the war. What he had in mind is not certain. The magnetic mine which sent many Allied ships to the bottom appeared soon afterward but did not seem to be what Hitler meant. The really new weapons, like flame-throwers and the V-1 and V2 bombs, were not perfected until much later, so that Hitler may not have been referring to them-

The debate as to the identity of the German secret weapon produced one suggestion that it might have been the propaganda in which the Nazis excelled, and which helped to overthrow France. President Wilson's otterances proved a powerful weapon in World War I, and nowadays the Communst arguments seem as dangerous as their armies. Could some new form of propagands be what the heads of our armed forces have in mind?

(Continued from Page One) impossible to give intelligent treatment unless the theory on which the treatment is based in horoughly understood."

Bister Kenny, in her letter to me, offered no statistics comparing results of her treatment with those from "modifications" of it. But neither has the National Foundation For Infantile Paraly sis nor any other group presented any statiscal evidence involving a direct comparison between the Kenny method and "modifications" of it. Doctors say that such com patisons would be extremely dif-ficult because polio is marked by many "variable" factors. The National Foundation says

it was largely responsible for "the dissemination of technical information with regard to treat ment as advocated by Miss Ken-ny." It says it has paid for the training of more than 1,000 physical therapists and doctors in techniques as taught by Sister

But the Bister Kenny foundation says such courses as they took were only "short courses", mosty of three months duration, not long enough to learn the "full" Kenny technique.

The Kenny foundation says that a graduate nurse has to take 30 months of Kenny training and that previously-trained physical therapists must take 18 months to qualify. It does not state how
