You're Safest In April

Spring is the safest season of the year, and April is the safest month, from the standpoint of accidents. And if the other eleven months could match April's safety record there would be approximately 12,500 fewer fatal accidents in the United States in the course of a year. According to Fred C. Kelly, writing in Your Life Magazine, this is due to the fact that April is more nearly free of the dangers that characterize both winter and summer. Fewer fires are needed, thus the risk of death from burns or asphyxiation is lessened. Babies are not bundled up so heavily in bed, so there is not so much danger of smothering. 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Nassau's Mikkelsons Work Hard, Make Good Living On Their Farm

BILLIARD, Mar. 15—(Special)—When it's winter, as hard work, after thinking and planning, and top-notch good farming, Nassau county's Mikkelsons.

Their 40-acre place near here is a model of a farm, making their farm pay off in good food, comfort, and a tidy income.

As they're doing the type of farming he advocates for all farmers of this section, County Agent Julian Walker likes to talk about the Mikkelsons. Charles and his wife, Amelia, and their three daughters, Carla, Myrtle, and Lillian. "It would be hard to find a family group of this size in Florida that works harder or more effectively than the Mikkelsons," he says.

Scandinavian by birth, Mr. and Mrs. Mikkelson were living in Tacoma, Wash. where he was employed as a machinist in 1916, when they saw an advertisement of land in Nassau county. Mr. Mikkelson's co-workers at the plant were making small investments in mining and timber, but he and his wife decided to put their savings in some of that Nassau county land.

So, after investigating a little, they left Tacoma and came to Nassau. He bought a small piece of land near here, built a house for his family, and then set about clearing the land and striving to make a living from it. Necessity required him to do his hauling for the first two years with a wheelbarrow, as wagons and workhorses cost too much for his available finances during that period. He progressed steadily, nevertheless, by working his head and hands.

All five of their children have been through high school, and all of them worked after school and during the summer.

Planting Of Cover Crops As Soil Aid Said To Be Gaining

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15—(Special)—Agricultural history is repeating. Thousands of American farmers today are using cover crops to protect soil from erosion and to increase its fertility, just as American colonists learned to use them 200 years ago, as Greek and Roman farmers learned to use them 2000 years ago, and Chinese farmers used them even before that.

Recent summaries show that in 1930, the last year for which complete records on AAA soilbuilding practices are available, American farmers participating in the AAA farm program grew 26 million acres of green manure and cover crops. A quarter century ago, few farmers were cover cropping.

The increase reflects years of educational work by state and federal agriculture agencies and active promotion of conservation practices by the AAA farm program.

Cover crops are especially valuable in Southern states during winter months where they protect corn, cotton, and tobacco lands from erosion caused by heavy rains, and improve the soil when plowed under.

Orchard owners in all parts of the nation find cover crops of value in holding the soil between rows of fruit and nut trees. Winter legumes such as Austrian winter peas, vetch, and clover are among the nation's most widely used cover crops.

HOLLYWOOD, Mar. 15—(Special)—The story of one of the most unusual dogs in the world has been brought to light through the illness of her master, Henry Borchardt, who is now confined to the hospital here.

"Tritie" is a five-year-old Belgian police dog. She came to her master's farm at Hallandale during a hard storm a few years ago. Being a bachelor, he took the orphaned little canine with him and trained her to be housekeeper, errand boy and entertainer.

She sweeps the floor, arranges the table cloth, runs errands to and from the fields, delivers eggs to the neighbors, and feeds the chickens. She entertains by jumping the rope, playing ball—which she throws as well as most children, and salutes the United

States flag in the most approved manner.

That is, she did all these before her master was taken away ill. Now she is letting things on the farm go to pot, even refusing to eat, while she lies around disconsolately pining for the return of the man who befriended her.

Famous Lecturer To Get Material For Florida Talk

JACKSONVILLE, Mar. 15.—(Special)—Van Wormer, Walsh is going to construct a lecture on Florida, the Florida Chamber of Commerce announced yesterday. He is among the ranking few in the travel field, and probably a million persons have heard his description of California and Mexico, seen the color films he has developed on these and other states and countries, the trade body said.

Florida's Earl Brown known as Mr. Walsh, and it is through an invitation extended by the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, at Mr. Brown's suggestion, that the famous traveler is coming to Florida for a three-week tour.

Mr. Walsh will leave Lansing, Mich., by motor, arriving in Jacksonville, probably on Mar. 17. He will be accompanied by a cameraman, and, besides helping himself to Florida life and beauty, will take hundreds of feet of color film to another noted lecturer, and friend, Burton Holmes. These he will present to Mr. Holmes as a gift from himself, and from Florida civic organizations whose guests Mr. Walsh and his cameraman will be.

Earl Brown, who is general manager of Florida Exhibits and who is reputed to be the best "showman" Florida ever sent abroad, told Harold Cole, executive vice president of the State Chamber, that Mr. Walsh is highly regarded by eastern industrialists, and that one company has engaged him to lecture to as many as 70,000 of its employees at one time, on world travel subjects.

Railway Express Reveals Program Of Improvements

NEW YORK, Mar. 15.—(Special)—Expenditures totaling over \$1,000,000 for new automotive equipment have been announced by L. O. Reed, president of Railway Express Agency, for a broad program of replacement and addition to the company's automotive facilities made necessary, in part, by increased business for national defense industries, it was announced today.

Reed says he has placed the \$2,622 truck, tractor and trailer of specified design and equipped for delivery this year.

In conducting its national rail and air express service, the Express Agency maintains one of the country's largest truck fleets, under one company management. The fleet is made up of more than 13,000 trucks, including electric trucks, tractors and trailers.

Types of trucks and trailers include dump trucks, flatbed trucks, tanker trucks, and trucks with cranes and hoists, and all are equipped with the latest safety devices and accessories. The fleet is being developed exclusively for the Agency. In the past, the Express Agency has purchased trucks and trailers from various sources, but the new program will result in a more uniform fleet.

The new trucks and trailers will be used for the transportation of national defense supplies, and the program is expected to result in a more efficient and economical service.

Legislature To Act On 119 Cone Vetoes

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 15.—(Special)—The 1943 Legislature, opening April 8, will consider 119 bills passed two years ago and vetoed by Governor Cone in a record-setting use of power conferred by the Constitution.

Topping the list will be Senate bills 1216 and 1217 which proposed to broaden and extend payment of state-collected gasoline taxes to counties for road building.

These bills involve about \$300,000,000 of gasoline taxes over a 10-year period. They probably will become paramount issues early in the session, because of similar proposals by the State Road Department's executive division for a new 4.2 cent distribution that would raise the road department's share from the present three cents to four cents, and reduce counties from three cents to two cents.

Plant Quarantine. All past and present members of the Florida State Board of Control are being invited to attend sessions of the Conference, Dr. Creighton said.

The conference program will include papers by entomologists of Florida and other states, in addition to the talks dealing with the Plant Board.

14,000 Participate In Stamp Program

GAINESVILLE, Fla. Mar. 15.—(Special)—Stamps worth \$100,177 were bought by 14,000 participants in the surplus stamp program in Florida in January, the State Agricultural Extension Service has been informed.

Pork products continue to take about a third of the free blue stamps issued by the government in the state during the month, resulting in the purchase of 127,626 pounds of pork valued at \$19,145 and 95,563 pounds of lard valued at \$10,383.

Other surplus products bought with the stamps included vegetables and potatoes valued at \$10,258, fruits valued at \$19,034, and 38,368 dozen eggs valued at \$11,121.

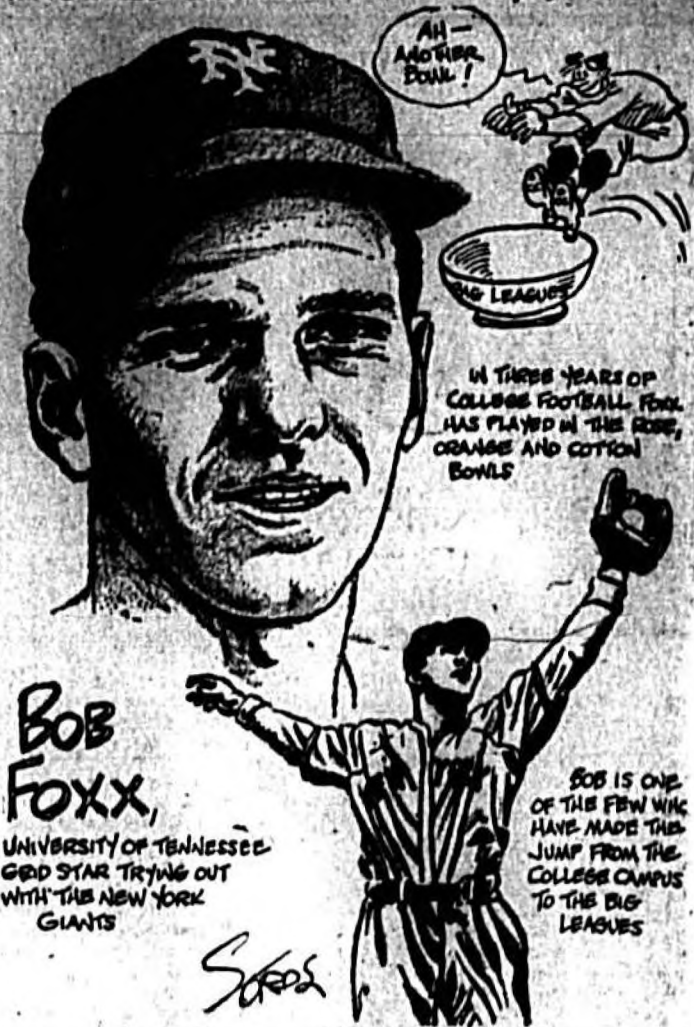
