City Limits Going To Onora Road

Spanish Gold Relics Found Off Florida

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) Two salvage firms licensed by the state have located what appears to be a fortune in old Spanish gold and artifacts that have been lying off Fort Pierce for 240 years.
