

As Storm Center Moves Northward To Florida Coast

MIAMI, Oct. 17--(A)-Steadily increasing winds reached 60mile velocity in the Florida Keys and 50 miles at Miami at 2 P. M. today as South Florida battened down for a hurricane approaching with 110 mile winds whirling around its center.

The peak wind at that hour whistled over the little resort fishing town of Islamorada, on upper Matecumbe Key, about 60 airline miles south of Misint.

The storm center was still offshore but was bearing down on the Florida Keys. Winds were steadily increasing, and fitful Minaquella drummed against thousands of boarded up windows in South Florida.

Palm fronds were stirring and leaves and small branches snapped from trees as gusts drove in from the sea. The heavy weather moved toward the Florida Gulf coast, which may get the heaviest blow after the Keys are passed.

The storm is moving on a path approximately the same as that followed by the disastrous Labor Day hurricane of 1935.

#### "Adopting" Industries

Charitable Americans have adopted European families providing them with food and clothing and thereby doubt less saving the lives of many. Now the Economic Co-opera tion Adminstration is thinking of asking American husiness concerns to "adopt" European industries for two years, This would involve training European factory managers and department heads in American plants. Our own experts Amatic hot spots. would go to Europe and advise improvements suggested by 1 28 Inspection on the spot. New machines, if required, would presumably be supplied by the Europeans themselves.

Building up Industry abroad is one of the best possible ways of raising the living standard and combating Communism. By lending their aid, our own industries would help our own economic foundation, since this should eventually reduce the drain of the direct assistance now furnished.

"Why should I build up a competitor?" business men! may ask. This plaint is not likely to be heard as much as it might have been some years ago. American industry is sosolidly established that the amount of damage which European competition could cause is less feared. Certainly it appears that not for some time will continental plants be able to do much more than keep going. American labor is so much more productive than its European counterpart that we need not fear serious loss of business. What loss hence and decency and right that there is might be more than made up by the gain to our own economic and political scenrity.

Moreover Europe, made stronger and given a higher standard of living by new industrial success, might then buy asteles reported the abandonment more rather than less from America.





In any case, lighter credit restrictions and conrols on industry are to be especied before any definite move is made toward imposition of even William Henry limited price and wage ceilings.
