"I am sorry," he said, "When I get drunk I get mean. I just can't help it." But that won't bring the woman back to life or save him from a long term in prison.

Sheriff Jimmy Sullivan, the "smiling cop" has been indicted by a Dade county grand jury for neglect of duty and allowing a gambling syndicate to operate within his jurisdiction. The grand jury said that his deputies, instead of being used to enforce the law, spent most of their time acting as collectors going around to various gambling houses collecting money to pay the syndicate.

Readers this, doubtless many of you will be taken in with the same old story of how these new machines are going to save the world. The purpose of this article is to raise money to pay the cost of retirement pay, old age and blind pensions and welfare and to part of the ever-increasing burden placed on the taxpayer of all or none.

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"Adopting" Industries

Charitable Americans have adopted European families, providing them with food and clothing and thereby doubtless saving the lives of many. Now the Economic Co-operation Administration is thinking of asking American business concerns to "adopt" European industries for two years.

Building up industry abroad is out of the best possible ways of raising the living standard and combating Communism. By lending their aid, our own industries would help our own economic foundation, since this should eventually reduce the drain of the direct assistance now furnished.

Why should I build up a competitor? business men may ask. This plant is not likely to be heard as much as it might have been some years ago. American industry is so solidly established that the amount of damage which European competition could cause is less feared. Certainly it appears that not for some time will continental plants be able to do much more than keep going.

Moreover Europe, made stronger and given a higher standard of living by new industrial success, might then buy more rather than less from America.

While Communist forces in Korea were enjoying victory after victory during the summer, a widespread supposition arose that these successes were to be put down in support of the doctrine that vastly superior numbers may overwhelm any opponent on the battlefield. It was known that the Korea Reds had a superiority in tanks and for a time in artillery, but it appeared that the chief element of their strength lay in seemingly inexhaustible reserves of men to be thrown into the lines to replace losses.

Now the appraisal of equipment captured when the Red armies south of the 38th Parallel melted away has caused a reversal of this notion. Intelligence officers are quoted as saying that the North Korean army had enough fire power for a force three times its size by World War II standards. That it had more automatic weapons, in relation to the numbers of men, than any comparable armed unit of any nation at that war. This puts a different light on the campaign.

Later appraisals, when more time has elapsed and more details have been learned, may change the picture again. The influence of air and naval strength is yet to be reckoned. But it now appears that the Korea record will go down in the military histories in support not of the doctrine of vast numbers of men but of the doctrine of maximum armament.

Say It With A Smile! A smile works wonders, even when it is used deliberately. The person at whom you smile won't stop to figure out whether you are used to smiling or not. The response to your smile will be quick and unfailing. And the more often you smile, the easier it will be to smile again.

France is facing a grave crisis in her war with the Communist guerrillas under General Ho Chi Minh in Indochina—one of the Asiatic hot spots.

The seriousness of the position is reflected in the urgent week-end appeal to Washington speed up the 20 arms deliveries to the hard-pressed French forces. The request is said to have come from French Defense Minister Jules Moch, who is now in this country seeking aid for his country's rearmament program.

The matter of immediate concern is the threat of a fresh Red offensive in two or three weeks. The French army of 150,000 has been suffering serious reverses and is being retrained for this approaching emergency.

The French request followed their abandonment of the important position of Thanhhe on the frontier between Indochina and China. That is the third frontier stronghold which the French have lost or abandoned in about a month. And today Saigon dispatches reported the abandonment of the outpost of Nakhon.

This creates a serious situation because it leaves some 300 miles of frontier open to Ho Chi Minh guerrillas. They thus have easy access to supplies and other aid from Communist China.

And behind China is Russia, which has a vital interest in the outcome of the struggle. Indochina like Korea, is of great strategic importance to the Soviet Union in the offensive to dominate Asia. Quite apart from other considerations, Moscow gains by keeping a large force of French troops tied up there, weakening the French defenses in Europe and forcing the Paris government to make huge military expenditures.

As a matter of fact, the Indochina which once was a source of much wealth for France has become a military sinkhole for her. The riches have dried up, and she not only is pouring out money to maintain her position but is said to have suffered close to 100,000 casualties during the fighting of the past three years.

And that isn't the total of France's troubles in Indochina. She is lacking the Vietnams government headed by Bao Dai, former emperor of Annam, Vietnam, and prince of Cochinchina, Tonkin and Annam. However, this government isn't getting full public support because of dissatisfaction with the degree of independence.

The situation has been complicated recently by the fact that Bao Dai for something like three months has been on the French Riviera, and other important officials have been absent. As a result, the Vietnams government hasn't been notably active.

The Vietnams guerrillas under Ho Chi Minh, while receiving local aid from China and Russia, are now all Communist. Some of them are republicans bent on ejecting the French from the country altogether, and the fighting has been going on since 1946.

The French have maintained that no material Russia can do to handle the trouble in Indochina. It remains to be seen whether they can do so or whether another "Asian situation" is developing which will call for outside assistance.

Certainly the French position now is a most uncomfortable one, especially with the border between Red China and Indo China still being wide open to admit further Communist aid.

"Freight Train In Sky" Fliers Face World's Worst Weather In Alaska

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—A freight train in the sky over the North Pacific is helping to win the United Nations' battle in Korea. That's the best way to describe the military air transport service operation which is setting all-time altitude records in the war.

It's a train that never stops rolling, a continuous supply line that depends on the guts of its pilots and the urgency of the job to be done.

With a tailwind halfway around the world there can be no sailing for the weather, no fortifying of communications or shifting of priorities.

The job is not easy. Cargo planes on the Alaska leg of the northern route arrive at Elmendorf AFB here and then head into the world's worst weather factory.

Pilots on the route report increased radio interference by Russian jamming stations, "nuisance value" music and static that has been going on for the past two years. Off Japan their aerial route passes within 150 miles of Soviet Kamchatka.

Birdmen of many lands and many uniforms pilot the big four-engine transports. The planes are a mix of insignias, representing many branches of services, several great commercial airlines, and the transport forces of several countries.

They converge on Elmendorf Air Force base in an almost steady stream through the day and night.

Crews are logging hundreds of hours. Some reach the "top of the list" and are taken off for rest. At such times the commercial pilots prefer Japan, where living is cheaper. The military never stateside layovers with a possibility of seeing their families.

I am definitely assured of being able to clean up my financial obligations within 90 days.

The Democratic candidate for governor, Rep. Walter A. Lynch, immediately accused Governor Dewey of participating in a "barbarous crime." He charged that Hanley had been bought off to give up his own candidacy for governor and to run, instead, for the Senate.

The 73-year-old Lieutenant Governor had been assured of the Republican gubernatorial nomination until Dewey changed his mind about retiring. Dewey announced Sept. 4 that he would seek a third term.

Lynch claimed that Dewey stood "convicted" by his own running mate of larding one of the highest offices in the gift of the people for his own personal gain as though it was a commodity in the market place.

He contended that, as a result of the disclosure, Dewey "should have to be impeached." If re-elected Nov. 7, and that Hanley "could never be seated" in the Senate.

Dewey said that one of the insinuations being drawn from the letter was that Dewey had promised him a state job if he were defeated for the Senate seat. "That's one of those half-truths," Hanley declared.

He said he told Dewey that, if he were defeated, he might have to ask the Governor for a state job. Hanley said that "nearly two years ago, we talked about the possibility" Dewey added: "I told him the state could ill afford to lose his services. Anything he wanted to accept an appointment, I consider it a great honor."

Hanley withdrew as a candidate for governor Sept. 2, and urged Dewey to reconsider his announced decision to return to private law practice.

Hanley said that where he wrote in the letter that, if he went to the Senate "I could be assured of additional compensation," he meant he would be eligible for a state pension of about \$7,000 a year, in addition to his salary as a senator.

Hanley also referred to the part of the letter in which he wrote that he could pay personal debts in 90 days.

He said the source of the money he expected was an insurance policy that was to mature about that time.

In New York City, George Delaney, public relations man for the Democratic State Committee, said that the text, as released by Hanley's office, omitted the first paragraph. The photograph released by the Democrats began:

"Dear King: After further consultation with my accountant and another who was called in for consultation, I have been forced to the position that I dare not gamble on my future."

Hanley's right eye was removed two years ago. He suffered from glaucoma, a hardening of the eyeball.
