

New era begins for State Farmers' Market

Ground breaking represents new generation for Sanford landmark

SANFORD — Old School met Next Generation at the State Farmers' Market on U.S. Highway 17/92.

Recognized as the nation's oldest state-run farmers' market, the Sanford facility is a reminder of the Celery City's once dominate stature in the produce industry. But with apartments and shopping centers sprouting faster than citrus or celery, the State Farmers' Market stood as a relic of the past. State and city officials gathered

Thursday for a ground breaking ceremony that represents a new generation for the market. Sanwa Growers Inc. signed a 20-year lease with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to operate a state-of-the-art distribution center in the facility.

"Sanwa' means new world or new generation," said Nelson Pugh, director of marketing and

development for the agriculture department. "I think it's ironic that the oldest state farmers' market in the nation partners up with a company whose name means new world or new generation."

Sanwa's customers include major grocery stores, restaurants, independent food markets and delicatessens, and the company

Florida's Highwaymen plan Sanford visit

During the 1950s and '60s, a group of young black artists from the Fort Pierce area traveled up and down the state's east coast selling their paintings of Florida landscapes.

Decades later, several of these painters are stopping in Sanford to discuss the journey that has taken them from "starving artists" to becoming a part of Florida's folk art history.

The story of the Highwaymen began in the mid-'50s, when A.E. Backus, a Fort Pierce artist, allowed a group of young black artists to congregate in his studio to watch and learn the art of painting landscapes.

The young men were quick learners. With an entrepreneurial spirit, they decided to travel Florida's east coast and sell their paintings.

Using whatever supplies they had on hand to complete their artwork, they produced thousands of paintings depicting

romantic landscapes of wind-swept palms and placid waterways. Even before the paint was dry, the young entrepreneurs packed up their cars and followed the highway — selling their masterpieces in restaurants, offices, government buildings and any other place where there were perceptive buyers.

As a result of the group's marketing and sales strategy, the more than two dozen young men and one woman became known as the Highwaymen. During the two decades, they produced between 150,000 and 200,000 paintings and sold them at relatively low prices — usually between \$10 and \$25.

By the 1970s, however, the boom-market ended, and many of the paintings were moved into people's attics or sold at garage sales. It appeared the age of the Florida Highwaymen had ended.

One era of art history may have concluded three decades ago, but Art Chester tells his customers at Sanford's Something

Heroes in I-4 rescue 'just doing their job'

SANFORD — As the media gathered Friday morning at the Sanford Fire Station on French Avenue, Sanford Fire Chief Tom Hickson commented on the crew's bemusement with the commotion.

"They're sitting around waiting for the meeting to begin, but wondering why the big to-do over this," Hickson said. "They said they were just doing their jobs."

Their jobs, in this case, called for rescuing a woman Wednesday from a Ford Explorer that dangled precariously off the Interstate-4 bridge over State Road 46. The only things holding the SUV to the bridge were the bolts from the right front tie rods.

Hickson added that he was extremely proud of everyone who took part in the rescue.

Lt. George Seda, Gary Holten, and Karen Matthews were the key personnel in rescuing Christine McMichael. While Seda and Matthews had been with the department a number of years, Holten had only joined the Sanford Fire Department five months ago. All three said they really didn't know what to expect en route to the scene, but were prepared to do whatever possible. Matthews handled the bucket truck operation.

"It takes a group effort to do this," she said. She added that there was never any thought in her mind about how to place the truck on SR-46 to allow raising of the bucket.

"We just pulled up and did it," she said.

Lt. Seda, who received a hug from McMichael after he removed her from the car, said much of the success could be attributed to the young woman herself. "She was very calm during the entire incident," he said. "She only broke down and shed a few tears after we had her safely in the bucket."

Regarding the attention given to the saving of the life, Seda said,

"It's very seldom we get such attention, but I think it's a rare situation. We get, generally, mostly bad news. I'm glad this one turned out like it did."

Seminole County Battalion Chiefs Jim Dickerson and Norm Miller both took the opportunity to thank all others involved in the incident, including the Department of Transportation, Florida Highway Patrol, Seminole County sheriff's personnel and firefighters, and the city of Sanford and its commissioners, who only recently approved purchase of the new bucket truck to replace one that had become worn out.

City Commissioner Randy Jones, on hand to represent the

Sanford police arrest two burglary suspects

SANFORD — Robert Allen Kilpatrick 36, of West 14th Street and Sean Larue Atkins, 22, of West 9th Street, were arrested by Sanford police Tuesday, in connection with a residential burglary.

Police were summoned to a residence in the 2000 block of Rosecliff Circle in reference to a suspicious incident. A man told police he had seen two black males exiting an apartment carrying two suitcase type bags. When he went to the rear of the resi-

dence, he found the back door had been broken open, and summoned police.

With a description of the getaway vehicle, a white Ford Thunderbird, officers began a sweep of the city, and located the vehicle at the intersection of West 3rd Street and Cedar Avenue. At that time, an officer saw who proved to be Atkins, holding a black music keyboard, while talking to another man. When Atkins saw the officer, he attempted to put the instrument back in the Thunderbird, but was stopped by officers.

The two men were identified by the person reporting the incident to police, and articles in the vehicle, including Canadian coins, a laptop computer, computer printer were identified by the home owners as having been missing.

Following interrogation at the Sanford Police Station, both men were taken to the John E. Polk Correctional Facility.

Each has been charged with unarmed burglary to a dwelling, larceny of over \$300/under \$20,000 and dealing in stolen property.

Grassroots politics: Daryl McLain's decision to withdraw from the District 24 congressional primary may not come as a huge surprise. McLain had less name recognition and money than his opponent, House Speaker Tom Feeney. McLain also had little time to make up ground, announcing his candidacy just four months before the election.

There may have been more at play, however. Word Around The Clock is that Feeney and the Republican leadership, not McLain, was itching to scratch a deal to end the potentially bruising primary battle. The reason? McLain's grassroots efforts to put his name on the ballot.

The third term county commissioner may not have the same name recognition as Feeney, but he evidently had little trouble getting registered voters to sign petition cards to qualify for the primary. McLain collected 3,212 signatures in a little more than a month, saving his campaign the \$9,000 qualifying fee.

McLain's advisors say the petition drive cost them about \$450. Feeney has spent several thousand dollars on direct mail pieces to get his name on the ballot.

While signatures don't necessarily translate to votes, Feeney realized that a similar grassroots effort could drain precious resources (i.e. money and time), even if McLain ultimately lost the primary.

Harry Jacobs is the unchallenged candidate on the Democratic side of the ticket and has vowed to tap his personal wealth to fund his campaign if need be.

Sensing a tough general election battle, GOP party leaders want their nominee rested and ready, thus their decision to convince McLain to stay in his District 5 commission seat.

Remembering an icon

For newcomers to the Sanford community (and that includes a lot of us), the passing of Alonzo Kyle Shoemaker Jr. may not have made the impact it should. "Kay," as his friends called him, was the preeminent Sanford son.

Born and raised in the Celery City, Shoemaker made his home here. He also made Sanford the home for hundreds of other families through the work of his company, Shoemaker Construction. Idyllwilde, Racena Park, Kaywood, Loch Harbor — all were subdivisions Shoemaker created or helped create.

But his contributions to the community didn't stop there. He was active on the Sanford Planning and Zoning Board, as well as the county's examining board and board of adjustment. He served on the Tri-County Transit Authority, which later became Lynx, and was president of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, receiving the Topper Award in 1988. He participated in the homebuilders association and was designated as a corporate member of the School of Building Construction at the University of Florida.

Perhaps Shoemaker's most visible contribution to the community — aside from the homes he built — is the Orlando Sanford International Airport. In the late 1960s when the U.S. Navy pulled out of Sanford, Shoemaker, along with Jen Paulucci and Lee P. Moore, convinced the Navy brass to sell the abandoned air station to the city. It would be many years before the airport began to fulfill the potential we now recognize today, but Shoemaker had the vision and leadership to lay the foundation. As former mayor Moore said, "Kay was the type of man who would take on a job when things didn't look very promising."

Shoemaker's death comes at a time when we have seen several of Sanford's grand old guard pass in recent months. Earl Weldon, Doc Parker, George "Kim" Kimmons and Walter Gielow are but a few of the local "icons" who are no longer with us. A new generation of leaders is taking their place, much like these men did during their prime. Time marches on, but the contributions of Shoemaker and his peers will long be remembered. The community — both natives and newcomers — owes them a debt of gratitude.

Had enough rain?

I believe all the TV weathermen (and women) have gone on vacation. All we see is the same weather forecast, day after day — "High in the upper 80s to low 90s, with an 80 percent chance of rain and possible thunder showers." They could have pre-recorded this six weeks ago and run it every day, because that's exactly what we have had here in Central Florida.

Now, comes Monday, July 15. It's "Saint Swithin's Day." Tradition says that if it rains on Saint Swithin's Day, it will rain for 40 more days. If it's clear, we'll have no rain for 40 days.

Little is known about Swithin, Bishop of Winchester in England during the 800's (AD). He died in early July, AD 971. When his personal papers were placed for posterity in Winchester Cathedral on July 15, it rained all day, and for 40 days thereafter. Thus (exact wording) "St. Swithin's Day, if thou dost rain, for 40 days it will remain, St. Swithin's Day, if thou be fair, for 40 days will rain nea mair (no more)." We shall see!

But as long as I'm delving into the weather some facts uncovered in the World Almanac and Book of Facts: The highest temperature recorded in Florida (it doesn't say where in the State) was 109 on June 29, 1931. The lowest temperature was 2 below on Feb. 13, 1899. The area in the 50 states with the most average rainfall is Mount Waialeale in Hawaii. It averages 460 inches per year. That's approximately 1 1/4 inches per day every day. (And we think we've got troubles). Thus far this year, we've had just under 26 1/2 inches of rain on the average in our Central Florida communities. (Some more, some less). The average for an entire year is just under 22 1/2 inches.

Yet, most areas still consider the water table below normal, and as a result, watering restrictions are still in effect in many cities and counties.

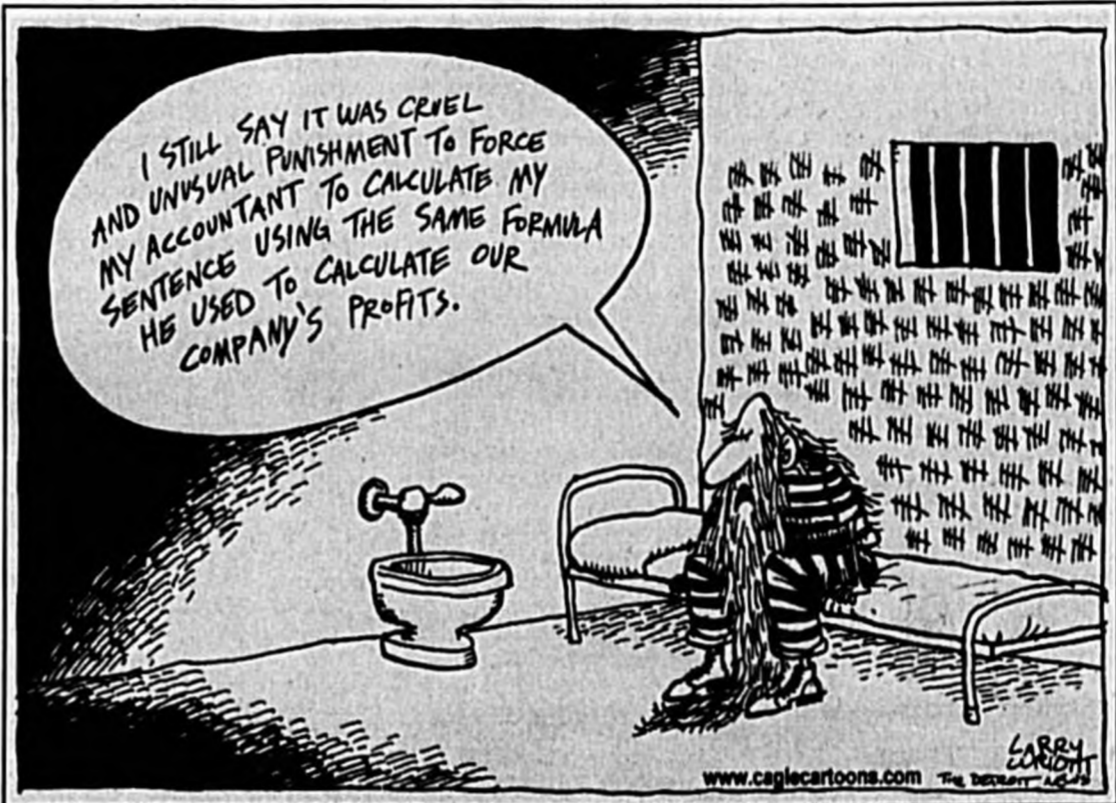
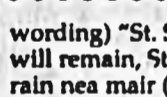
Of course there's that other water table phenomena. Low water tables produce sinkholes. The area that normally holds water below the surface goes dry, and the earth caves into it. On the other hand, high water tables wash out areas above it, and that again is the cause for sinkholes.

Now that I've been talking about the weather I assure you there is nothing I can do about it (Even as I write this it's pouring rain at the Herald building). So remember, drive safely in the rain, watch out for standing water, and if you turn on the wipers, turn on those headlights.

And pray that it doesn't rain on Saint Swithin's Day.

Resident wants basketball court relocated in park

To the editor:

My letter is a plea for help in resolving a problem that affects the quality of life for me and my family. I have turned to you after bringing the matter to the attention of my local law enforcement, my city commission, the Mayor of Sanford and my County Commission.

Several months ago, I wrote a letter to the Mayor requesting to have a city basketball court moved to another location within my neighborhood park. I considered this a very small request. The basketball court is located directly behind my home. There is a fence that separates the court from the yard. Quite often, the basketball is thrown into my back yard. I am constantly interrupted and asked to return the basketball. If I fail to retrieve it or if I do not retrieve it fast enough, I am subjected to profanity and disrespect by the boys. This situation occurs on a regular basis.

I have contacted the local police on several occasions. They informed me that the park is scheduled to close at 9 p.m. This is not the case. There are young men on the court, cursing, yelling, smoking drugs, etc. at all hours of the night. I have been threatened and my children harassed as a result of my complaints. One of my neighbor's (whose son is involved in the disorder) has made it known to the police that she is friends of one of the city commissioners, in an attempt to minimize the conduct of her son and others.

I have attempted to follow a chain of command in resolving this matter. After months of waiting, and the buck being passed, I received a letter from the Asst. City Manager saying he had reviewed the matter and there was nothing they could do. When I spoke with my County Commissioner, he told

me that there was no one higher than the Mayor that I could speak with about my problems.

I am the mother of three teenagers. I have worked very hard to keep my children on a straight and narrow course. My children and I are being harassed and threatened because I choose not to be subjected to vulgar language and disorder every day. I am not asking to have the basketball court removed from the park, just removed from my back door.

I am enclosing a snapshot that I took of one of the juveniles jumping the fence by way of my yard. Jumping the fence is a common occurrence to get to the basketball court. This situation has escalated to a matter of grave concern, as other things have happened and my family is being targeted for retaliation, as the city refuses to move the basketball court.

I solicit your help in resolving the matter that I feel should be resolved within my own community. Your immediate response is appreciated.

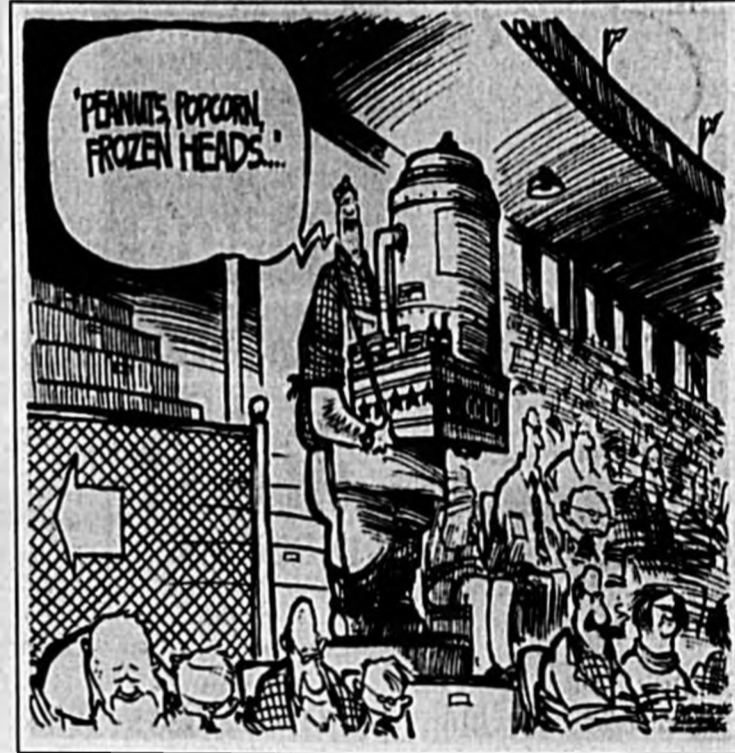
Covington thanks committee for 'magical' reunion

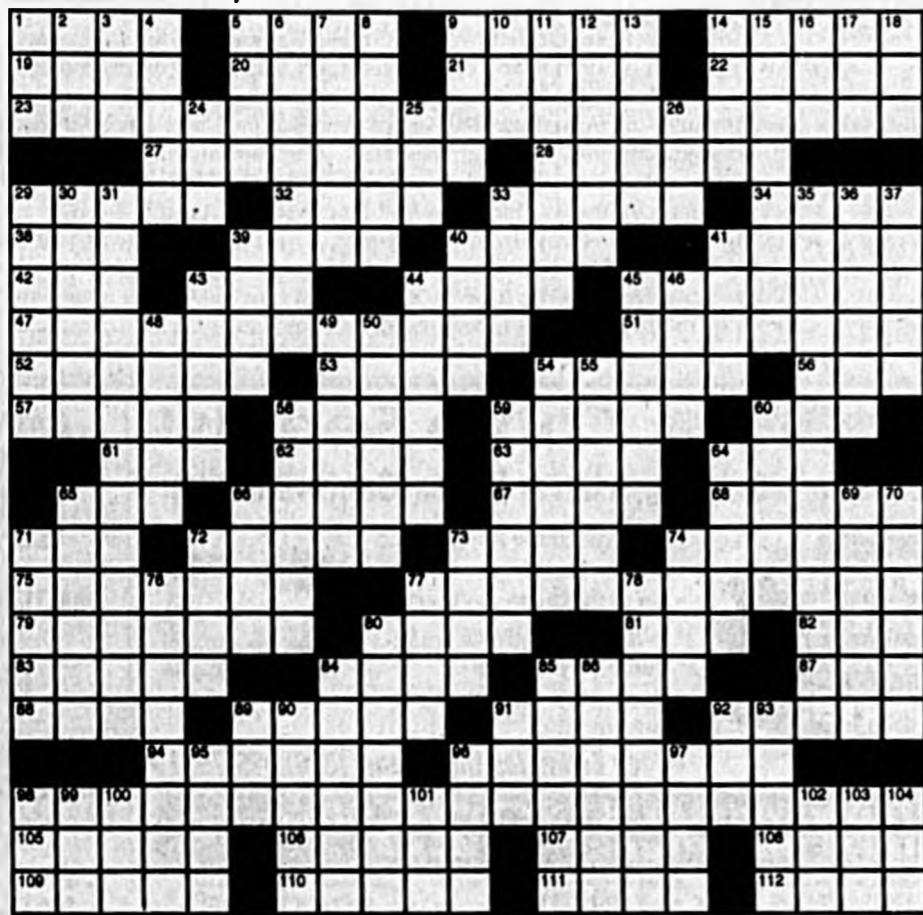

umn was enclosed, probably dated April, 1954. I had written this column for the Sanford Herald during my senior year, 1953-54, so I'll give you excerpts from my earlier journalistic endeavor.

The previous Friday, Miss Barbara Ruprecht had taken her civics class on a field trip to the ACL (Atlantic Coast Line Railroad) station. As they had just completed a study of transportation, this was very interesting and profitable.

The 1954 Salmagundi had been received and had

been proof read by Miss Rebecca Stevens and a few members of her staff. The book should arrive around May 24.

(Since I was editor of the Sally, I remember that evening quite well. Several of us met at Miss Stevens' home on Park Avenue where we sat around her dining room table until late that night, going over the proofs and making corrections).

The library council had taken a trip to St. Augustine where they visited a book bindery. Those taking cars were Mrs. Charles Nicks and Miss Edna Chittenden, sponsor of the

council.

They ate their box lunches on St. Augustine beach then proceeded to the bindery. There they were taken on a tour whereby everything was explained, step-by-step, from the time a book came in until it was ready to be shipped.

During the tour, gold initials were sprayed on the items students had brought for that purpose.

Following the tour, the group took in the old fort and other places of historical interest. They arrived back at SHS in late afternoon.

The previous Tuesday night, the Band Parents had staged a supper for the band students in the lunchroom. On the menu was chicken, salad, slaw, corn, radishes, rolls, tea and cake. About 75 people enjoyed the delicious meal. Immediately afterward, the Band Parents meeting was held in the band room, presided over by President Martin Stinecipher.

The annual Tri Hi Y Tea for the entire senior class was to be held the next Tuesday at McKinley Hall of First Methodist Church. All seniors were encouraged to attend.

Local Red Cross volunteers aiding relief efforts at fires, floods

An American Red Cross of Central Florida volunteer recently left for Guam.

Bob Sherman will provide assistance in flood-ravaged Guam where he will act as the Damage Assessment Officer.

American Red Cross damage assessment teams in Guam have already described a scene of massive destruction after Typhoon Chata'an slammed the Pacific island with 110-mph winds and flooding rains on Friday, July 5. The storm left in its wake downed power lines and poles, trees pulled from their roots, tin roofs wrapped around fences and houses, and homes surrounded by murky floodwa-

ters, according to the team. Nearly 1,800 people fled their homes as the storm approached.

Preliminary damage assessment revealed that 1,348 homes were affected by the storm, about 40 percent of them nearly or completely destroyed.

Additionally, the American Red Cross of Central Florida currently has local volunteers responding to the wildfires in Arizona and flooded regions in Texas. Bob Stein will be returning to Central Florida from Arizona on Thursday. Stein, of St. Cloud, is a Disaster Health volunteer who left on June 28, 2002, to respond to the health needs of the response

workers and volunteers.

Larry Muse of Maitland, a Disaster Mental Health volunteer, is expected to return from Arizona later this week. Jack and Betty Rupp of Altamonte Springs are in charge of fleet operations in Texas, while Elise Howell (Sanford) and Ann Kirkendall (Lake Mary) are coordinating Mass Care with the Central Florida ERV (Emergency Response Vehicle) in Texas.

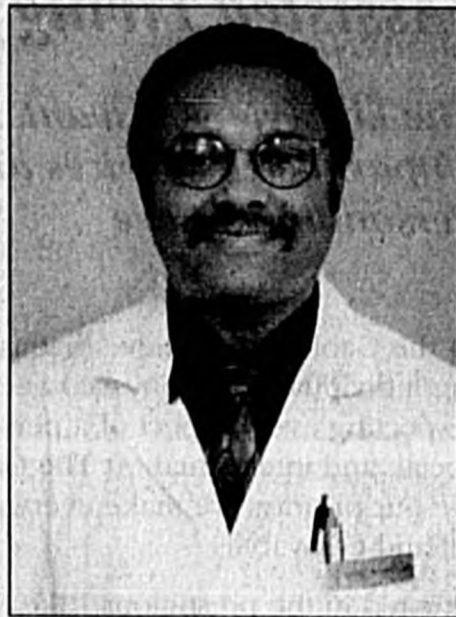

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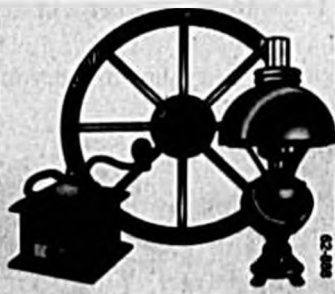

Inflatable life jackets provide safety and comfort for boaters

Inflatable life jackets use a replaceable CO2 gas cylinder as the primary means for inflation. They can also be inflated by blowing into a tube. Life jackets come in a variety of shapes, colors, sizes and materials. Some are made to be more rugged and last longer while others are made to protect you from cold water or an impact with the water. There are stylish ones, and plain ones. And then, there are different types.

No matter which life jacket you choose be sure to get the one that is right for you. Select one based on your planned activities, and the water conditions you expect to encounter.

Remember, spending a little time now can save your life later. United States Coast Guard (USCG) approval means that the life jacket has passed rigorous testing. So, always look for the USCG approval number on any life jacket you buy.

Be sure to read the manufacturer's label and the "Think Safe" pamphlet that is attached to the jacket. You will find valuable information there.

You have heard of the inflatable life jackets. They are available in adult sizes only. They are comfortable for continuous wear in hot weather and provide high flotation when inflated.

Because inflatables have limited buoyancy without being inflated, they are not considered appropriate for use by non-swimmers or weak swimmers, unless worn inflated. They are not for use by children younger than 16 years of age or by persons weighing less than 80 pounds.

There are two types of inflation systems being offered: the first one is the manual inflation PFD, that requires the user to jerk on a pull-tab (lanyard) to inflate. The second is called manual-auto inflation. This type includes a back-up system designed to automatically inflate when it is submerged. The manual-auto type can also be inflated in the same manner as the manual type.

The CO2 gas cylinder is good for only one inflation. To keep the inflatable life jacket in a serviceable condition, a used CO2 cylinder must be replaced after each inflation. You must check the status of the cylinder before each use.

Inflatable life jackets must NOT be worn under clothing because automatic or accidental inflation could restrict breathing and cause injury. They are not suitable for use with personal watercraft or while water-skiing.

With inflatable life jackets, there is no reason to complain about the bulk or how hot it is to wear a life jacket.

city, observed that the city only took possession of the unit last December, at a cost of nearly three-quarter million dollars. Jones also echoed praises for everyone involved.

Not associated with the city, but on hand for the briefing and credited with exceptional service, was Travis Hamilton of Paul's Auto Towing, one of several units credited with attaching the hanging vehicle to prevent it from

falling to the pavement below. "This was an exceptional situation for me," he said. "With 10 years in the business, I usually only get to see the aftermath of a collision. This is the first time I've had someone actually depending on what I and others do."

He said the vehicle was held onto the overpass by only a small part of the suspension, and the right rear tire.

"How it stayed up there," he added, "I don't know, but it did,

and after she was taken out, we were able to pull the vehicle back up to I-4 without it falling."

County Battalion Chief Tommy Martin said in his 30 years in the business, "I've never seen such cooperation among the various departments and personnel."

Battalion Chief Norm Miller added that the citizens of the area are indeed fortunate to have such equipment and such personnel serving their needs.

Eslinger earns prestigious 2002 Child Advocate of the Year award

Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger has been awarded the prestigious R. David Thomas Child Advocate of the Year Award from the Children's Home Society of Florida (CHS).

Eslinger received the award Tuesday night at CHS' Annual Family Award event at Universal Studios.

The award originated in 1982 by Dave Thomas, founder of Wendy's International, and is presented annually by CHS, the oldest and largest not-for-profit child welfare organization in the state. The award was created to recognize leading community volunteers and advocates of children's welfare. Last year's recipient was Dick Bachelor.

"Sheriff Eslinger was chosen for his courage in taking on the daunting responsibility of child protective investigations from the state, which is an enormous

obligation for a law enforcement agency," said CHS Executive Director Kim Brien. "The sheriff has been a tremendous friend to CHS, but, more importantly, a sincere and committed protector of children who live in very dangerous conditions."

In addition to providing protective service investigations, Eslinger was recognized for his agency's pilot program that monitors homes where abuse is suspected by not verified, as a means of providing extra protection for children. Brien added that Eslinger has been an enthusiastic and active supporter of CHS's Lilley House, a crisis nurs-

ery that opened a year ago in Casseberry.

In his remarks, Eslinger said he was honored to receive the award, and added that to do nothing about protective services was much riskier than taking on this new responsibility.

Founded in 1902 in Jacksonville, CHS provides support services for children and families and has become the state's premier child welfare agency. More than 30,000 children have been placed into loving adoptive families during the past century thanks to the CHS. Currently, it serves the tri-county area with 20 different programs including child abuse/neglect prevention and intervention programs, foster care, protective services, and family and individual counseling.

St. Johns district to hold tax rate

If your local property taxes go up this year, the St. Johns River Water Management District isn't to blame.

Every year, a portion of the property taxes paid by local residents goes to the SJRWMD. This year, it is expected to remain the same as this past fiscal year.

Wednesday, the organization's Governing Board voted to hold the line on its tax rate for a second consecutive year.

On a 5-3 vote, the board approved a tentative \$160.5 million budget with a 0.462 millage rate for the 2002-03 fiscal year

which begins this Oct. 1.

The board was divided over potentially decreasing the tentative millage rate. Some members were concerned that a lower rate would not provide enough flexibility to meet water supply development and surface water restoration project needs. As a result, the board directed staff to review priority projects to determine if a lower millage would meet those needs.

Once a tentative millage rate is adopted, it cannot be increased. Final adoption isn't scheduled until September.

The proposed budget is \$25.4 million, or 14 percent less than the current year's spending

plan. The millage will be added to effected property owners in the SJRWMD which include Seminole, Volusia, Orange, Lake, Osceola, Indian River, and parts of Brevard, St. Johns, Putnam, and Clay counties.

Under the proposed 0.462 millage rate, 46.2 cents for every \$1,000 of assessed property value would be included in the annual property taxes in this area. For example, the owner of a \$100,000 house, with the standard \$25,000 homestead exemption, would have \$34.65 in next year's taxes, going to the St. Johns River Water Management District.

Mall to kick off Cash Back for Schools program

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Altamonte Mall will kick off Cash Back for Schools, a community partnership program that will donate \$20,000 in cash to 20 area schools in Seminole and Orange counties on July 15, 2002. Schools can earn points

through receipt redemptions, academic excellence and other in-school methods from July 15 through Dec. 1.

Schools with the highest average points per student will receive incremental cash awards with the top school receiving as

much as \$4,000. All 20 participating schools are guaranteed a minimum donation.

Included in schools participating in this year's program are South Seminole Middle School and Winter Springs Elementary School.

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Brenda Carey will keep campaign account active through 2004

An opportunity to fill the open District 5 Seminole County Commission seat may have been lost this week, but one candidate plans to keep her campaign account open.

District 5 Commissioner Daryl McLain announced in May that he would challenge Florida Speaker of the House Tom Feeney for the Republican nomination in the newly created 24th Congressional District.

McLain announced Sunday, July 7, that he is withdrawing from the race and will serve his term which ends in 2004.

Brenda Carey, who along with Dennis McCool and Lake Mary City Commissioner Gary Prender had announced intentions to run for McLain's open seat, sent a letter to her supporters indicating she plans to run for the seat.

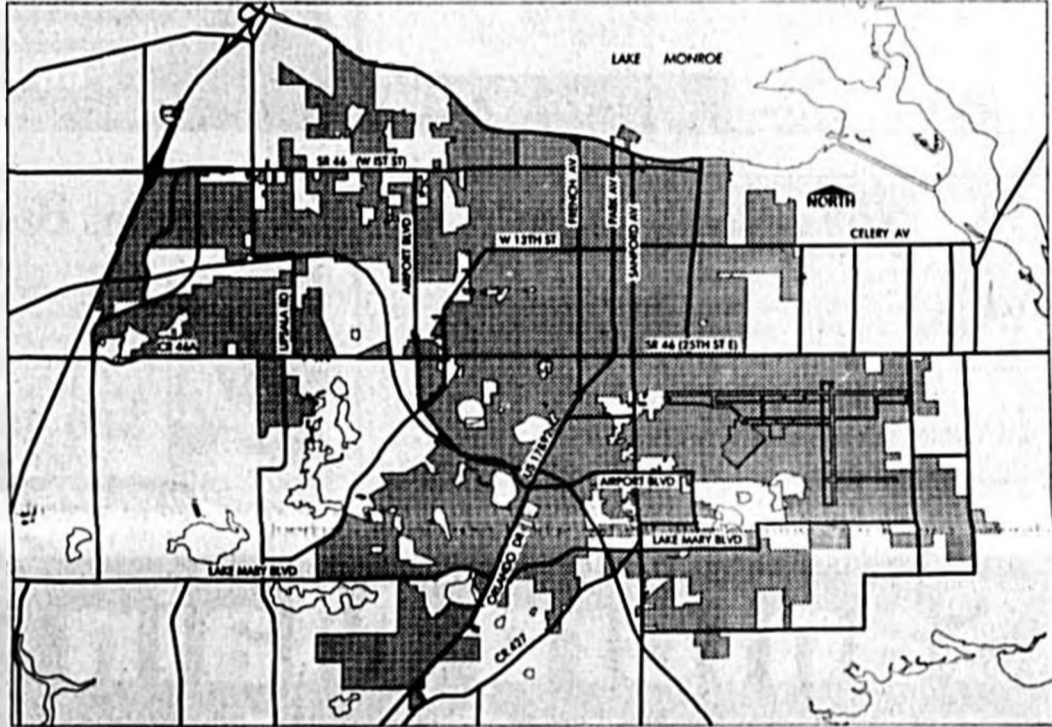

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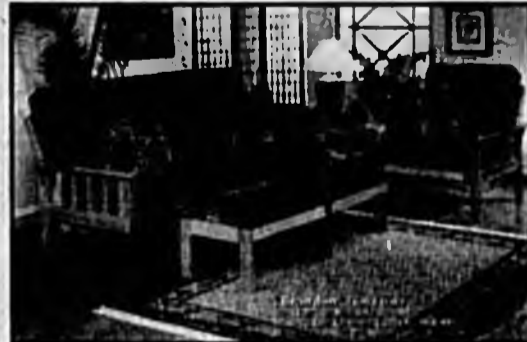

specializes in ethnic foods and herbs. However, Sanwa's president, Tony Leung, was quick to point out that consumers will easily recognize his company's products.
"We're an ethnic food company. Our number one commodity is broccoli," Leung said with a chuckle. Cilantro and chicken are the company's number two and three commodities, respectively.

Sanwa will begin immediately renovating 13,000 square feet — about half of the space in the State Farmers' Market. During the groundbreaking a flatbed semi loaded with several massive refrigeration units sat nearby waiting to be unloaded. Leung said Sanwa will install coolers with six different temperature zones inside the warehouse. The company plans to begin partial operations in three to four months and expects

to complete renovations in January 2003.
"We're going to start very low profile in the fall with just a few employees and limited distribution," Leung said. "Within two years, we will hire 40 to 50 employees — drivers, warehouse workers and office staff."
In addition to the economic benefits created by Sanwa's distribution operations, Leung said there will be a direct benefit to con-

sumers, who can purchase wholesale from the company.
"You won't be able to buy and apple. You'll have to buy a case of apples," Leung said. "You can buy chicken breasts for one-third or one-fourth the cost of the grocery store, but you'll have to buy 40 pounds. You can share with your neighbors."
State officials are looking for other tenants for the market and hope Sanwa's lease attracts other

company's. Don Coker, chief of the Bureau of State Farmers' Markets, said the state may soon announce an agreement for the remaining space.
Sanford's economic development coordinator, John Jones, said Thursday's ceremony is just the beginning for redevelopment at the corner of 13th Street and 17/92.
"This is the first of many exciting things that are going to happen at the state farmers' market," said

Jones.
The state has plans to renovate the outside of the main warehouse, reroute truck traffic away from the 17/92 side of the building and construct a pedestrian market where semis now park. In addition, the city will add a park on the south side of the property.
"It will be a visual improvement along the 17/92 corridor and a creative reuse of an underutilized state facility," Jones said.

Special Antiques Mall a new one has recently started for Florida's famous artists. During the mid-1990s, the Highwaymen and their paintings were rediscovered by the art world; and, today their name has become synonymous with Florida folk art.
Paintings signed by the likes of James Gibson, George Buckner, Alfred Hair and Mary Ann Carroll are in as high, or greater, demand than during the last century. Gone are the days of the \$10 Highwaymen painting. Today, about a dozen of the paintings can be found in the store Chester manages — many bearing price tags

ranging from \$300 to \$3,000.
Visitors to the antique mall, owned by Jacqueline Hopper, will see more than just the Highwaymen's paintings in the store next Saturday and Sunday. Six or seven of the legendary artists plan to visit the store, located at 105 E. 1st Street, to paint, sign autographs and tell their history-making stories.
"A lot of people know about the Highwaymen, but a lot of people don't," Chester said. "Hearing them tell their story, even if people already know it, will be amazing."

NEW SMYRNA BEACH — Ray Ridenour is returning to Volusia County. The veteran basketball coach has decided to leave Oviedo and return to the area of his greatest accomplishments, agreeing to accept the head coaching position for the girls basketball team at New Smyrna Beach High School.

It may not be the junior college job that the 55-year-old was hoping to land, but it gives him a chance to sit in the first seat again after 10-year absence.

Ridenour first became known to Seminole County fans as an assistant under Gene "Torchy" Clark at Florida Tech University, now UCF, in the 1970's, helping build the NCAA Division II program into one of the best in the country.

In 1980 he was named the head men's basketball coach at Daytona Beach Community College and immediately turned that program into one of the most respected, and feared, in the country.

DBCC had not been a top threat in the Mid-Florida Conference before Ridenour's arrival, lagging far behind league powers Seminole Community College and Lake City Community College.

But the loud and tenacious Ridenour, who became well known for his sideline

antics, quickly built a program that opposing coaches marveled at and hated to have to play.

In 13 years the Scots went 312-117 under Ridenour, winning five Mid-Florida Conference Championships and winning a State Championship in 1992, a year before he was mysteriously let go as coach.

After sitting out three years, Ridenour returned to coaching in 1996, becoming an assistant coach at Oviedo High School under then new head boys basketball

coach Ed Kershner, a renowned coach whose stats rivaled that of Ridenour, and the Lions became not just a state powerhouse, but one that is recognized nationally to this day.

But after five seasons with Kershner, Ridenour was asked to give Brian Wilson's young girls team a hand.

Some probably wondered if the outspoken and brutally honest Ridenour could adapt to coaching females, but he did just that, teaching the girls his amazing style of defense and helping the Lions go 24-8 and earn a spot in the regionals.

Ridenour will be missed, assuredly, but things should go smoothly for Wilson as the majority of last year's squad returns. Only one senior that made any significant contributions to the Oviedo cause this past season.

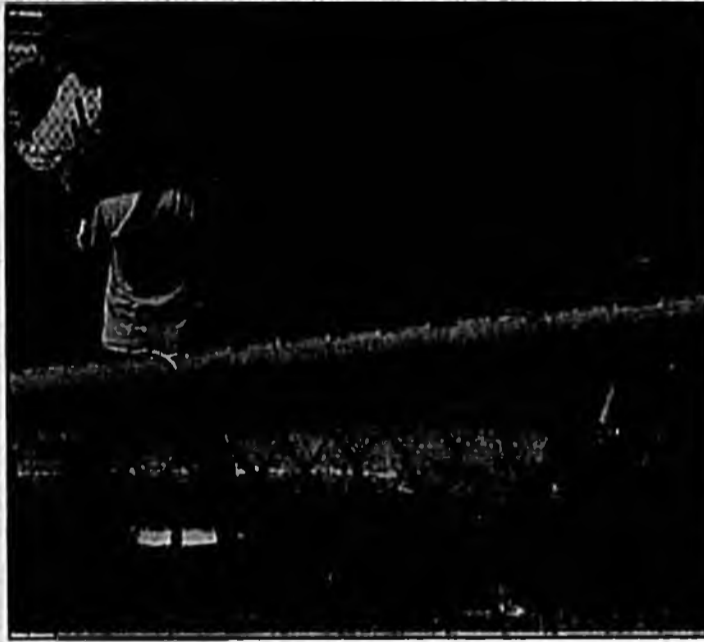

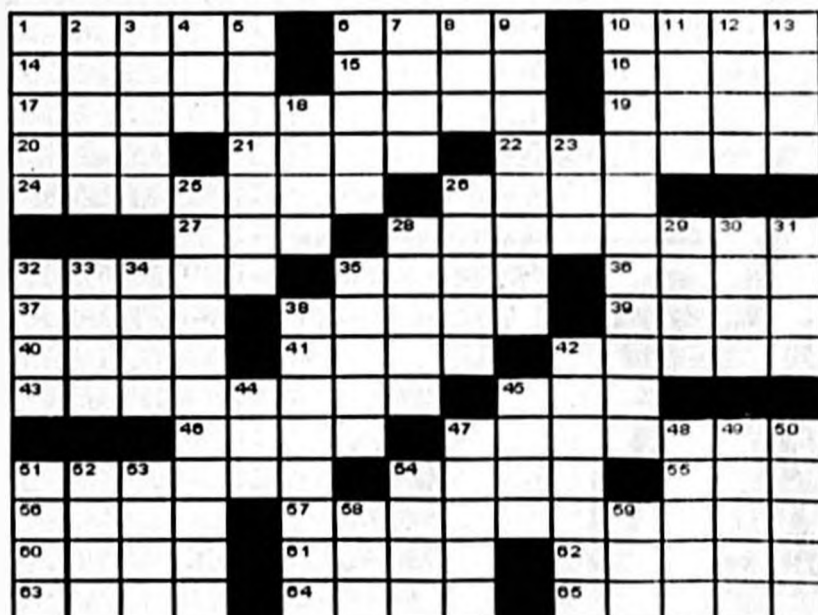

Discover the subtle secrets of stir-fry

Although the terms are often used interchangeably, stir-frying and sautéing are two very different cooking methods. Both techniques are designed to maximize flavor while minimizing cooking time. However, the key to stir-fry lies in keeping the food moving continuously in the pan by lifting, tossing and yes, stirring to ensure that each piece is evenly exposed to the heat without scorching and to seal in the flavor.

Following are a few more stir-fry secrets, courtesy of "Martin Yan's Asian Favorites: From Hong Kong, Taiwan and Thailand" (Ten Speed Press), by Martin Yan. Practice your way to stir-fry perfection with this easy stir-fried beef & mushrooms. Don't let its simplicity fool you — made with cubes of tender flank steak, portobello and oyster mushrooms, there's plenty of flavor going on here.

• **Prepare ahead** — Remember, stir-fry is one of the fastest cooking methods. Make sure you have everything cut up, measured and close at hand before you begin.

• **Uniform sizes** — To ensure even cooking, cut all meats and vegetables into uniform sizes.

• **Heat first, oil second** — First, heat your empty skillet or wok over high heat for 1 to 2 minutes. Once you can feel the heat by lowering your hand slightly over the surface, you're ready to add the oil.

• **Work in order** — Not all ingredients require the same amount of time to cook. Usually, aromatic seasonings like garlic and ginger go first, followed by meats or fish, and lastly, vegetables.

• **Keep it moving** — That's why they call it stir-fry. Keep everything moving in the pan or it will burn quickly.

Stir-Fried Beef & Mushrooms Serves 4

- 8 ounces beef flank steak
- 1 portobello mushroom
- 3 large oyster mushrooms
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup chicken stock
- 1/4 cup diced red bell pepper
- 1/4 cup diced green bell pepper
- 1/2 cup sliced bamboo shoots
- 1 tablespoon chu hou paste

1. Cut flank steak into 3/4-inch cubes. Remove stems from mushrooms and cut the caps into 1-inch pieces.

2. Place a wok over high heat until hot. Add oil, swirling to coat sides. Add beef and stir-fry for 1 to 2 minutes. Remove beef from wok.

3. Return wok to high heat. Add both kinds of mushrooms and stock; cover and cook until mushrooms are tender 2 to 3 minutes. Add bell peppers and bamboo shoots; cook, stirring, for 30 seconds. Return beef to the wok and add chu hou paste; toss and cook until heated through.

4. Transfer to a platter and serve.

Fishing for something Tasty

Tips provide key to perfect seafood on the grill

For many grill wranglers out there, beef can be a breeze, chicken is a cinch and pork ribs pose no problems. Fish, on the other hand ... well, that's another story. More than one backyard chef has broken into a cold sweat trying to figure the proper temperature and timing, and felt faint at the prospect of surgically removing a seafood steak from the grill rack with a spatula. But never fear, there's hope for the piscatorially impaired.

The key to grilling seafood lies in the physical makeup of fish, which is generally more fragile than a hunk of meat. Most fish cooks well over direct heat, however, for larger thicker pieces, indirect heat can provide temperature controls more akin to baking. When lifting fish steaks or fillets off the grill, slide two chopsticks or a two-pronged sauté fork under the fish and gently lift the fish off the grill to avoid tearing. Then slide a spatula under the fish for turning or transferring to a serving dish.

A little support can work wonders towards making sure your fish fillets don't turn into fish topping. Set the fish on a piece of foil trimmed to match its outline, then lift the two together on and off the grill — no sticking, no falling apart and you don't even have to turn the pieces over. A grill basket can be another great option. Instead of trying to turn over the fish on a hot grill, just turn over the basket.

Now that you're properly armed, you are truly ready to take on the final frontier of grilling — seafood, that is. Get started with this recipe for "Catfish with Spicy Cantaloupe Slices."

Quick and easy to prepare on the grill using U.S. farm-raised catfish fillets, it's perfect for backyard barbecues with the kids or sumptuous summer dinner parties with friends. Recipe courtesy of "Fish & Shellfish, Grilled & Smoked" (Harvard Common Press) by Karen Adler and Judith Fertig.

Catfish with Spicy Cantaloupe Slices Serves 4

- 4 U.S. farm-raised catfish fillets, 6 to 8 ounces each
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- Juice of half a lime
- 8 to 12 thin wedges ripe cantaloupe, seeded and peeled
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh mint leaves

• 1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes

• 1 cup fresh blueberries, stems removed, or strawberries, hulled (optional)

Lightly oil the fish fillets and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Prepare a hot fire.

When ready to grill, set an oiled perforated grill rack over the fire. Place the fish on the rack and grill until the fish is opaque and just beginning to flake when tested with a fork, 4 to 5 minutes per side, turning once halfway through the grilling time.

Arrange the fillets on 4 serving plates. Fan 2 to 3 wedges of melon on each plate. Squeeze the juice of half a lime over the fish and melon. Sprinkle with the mint leaves, red pepper flakes, and blueberries or strawberries.

Celebrate mustard's tangy legacy

At one time you'd find mustard atop only a few foods: hot dogs, corned beef sandwiches and knishes. However today, you'll find the condiment popping up on all types of dishes, especially when mixed with honey.

Mustard lends a spicy spark to all it touches, while the honey mellows the flavor ever so slightly to make it ideal for poultry, seafood, beef — virtually any dish. That's why it is important to have a versatile mustard marinade handy for all of your favorite meals.

Try out these tangy recipes, courtesy of "Fast Appetizers" (Ten Speed Press).

Mustard-Rosemary Marinade

- Makes 1/4 cups
- 2 tablespoons minced tender rosemary leaves
 - 4 cloves garlic, finely minced
 - 1/3 cup Dijon mustard
 - 1/3 cup dry white wine
 - 1/3 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice
 - 1/4 cup oyster sauce
 - 1/4 cup honey
 - 2 teaspoons hot sauce

Spicy Barbecued Shrimp

- Serves 4 to 8
- 1 pound large raw shrimp (about 16)
 - Mustard-Rosemary marinade
- Shell, devein and split the shrimp deeply along the top side (leaving the tail attached) and refrigerate. The recipe can be prepared to this point up to 8 hours before cooking.

Within 30 minutes of cooking, toss the shrimp with the marinade. Preheat a gas barbecue or indoor grill to medium (350 F) or, if using charcoal or wood, prepare a fire and let it burn until the coals or wood are ash-covered. Brush the grill with oil, then lay the shrimp on the grill. Grill the shrimp about 90 seconds on each side, brushing on extra marinade as they cook. They are done when they turn pink, feel firm when pressed with your finger, and have turned white on the inside (cut into a shrimp to check). Or, broil the shrimp under a hot broiler about 1 minute on each side. Transfer the shrimp to a serving platter.

Serve at once, or refrigerate and serve chilled.

Gotta wear shades

For fashion and safety, sunglasses are a necessity in the Sunshine State

There's nothing like buying a new pair of sunglasses. While the two-spectacle fashion accessory serves a functional purpose, the right choice of shades can make the perfect fashion statement.

Just ask the people in Hollywood. After the opening of "Ocean's Eleven," people flocked to their nearest eye care center to purchase the same sunglasses Julia Roberts wore in the film. The same is true about "Mission Impossible," and Tom Cruise's Oakley sunglasses. People see them, and people want them.

Dixie Taylor, a Longwood real estate agent, knows the feeling. After watching the "Thomas Crowne Affair," Taylor decided she wanted the same Gucci sunglasses Renee Russo wore in the movie. She went to Lake Mary's Bayhead Eye Centre and ordered a pair.

"They are the only really expensive pair of sunglasses I have bought," Taylor said. "And, I loved them. Two other people saw me in them, and they bought themselves a pair, too."

Working in real estate, Taylor said she spends a lot of time

with the public. She wants to look fashionable, which includes what she wears to protect her eyes from the sun.

According to Oma Singh-Rampertab, dispensing optician at Bayhead Eye Centre, every adult in Florida should wear quality sunglasses when they are out in the sun.

"In Florida, it's always so bright outside," Singh-Rampertab said. "Sunlight can damage the eye and cause cataracts. Wearing sunglasses also helps eliminate glare caused by the sun, which benefits drivers and other people working outside."

Ingrid Peterson, doctor of optometry at Bayhead Eye Centre said, in sunlight, there are two bands of ultraviolet (UV) radiation that can affect eyes. UVA rays can harm the cornea and retina of the eye. UVB rays have higher radiation and are most dangerous. These rays are linked to the development of cataracts.

That's the bad news. The good news is that a good pair of sunglasses can help eliminate the UV hazard. Peterson recommends sunglasses with optical quality lenses that are free of distortion that can cause eye strain and limited vision. The lenses should block at least 99 percent of the UV rays, and the frames should be close fitting and adjustable to provide maximum coverage

and comfort.

"There is a fashion advantage to eye protection, as well," Peterson said. "The hot names in sun wear right now are Gucci, Fendi, Calvin Klein and Maui Jim, to name a few designers. The most popular sunglasses tints are brown and gray, but our patients can have lenses tinted any shade they desire."

Style is good, but so is quality—at least for Steve Lazinsk of Sweetwater.

"Quality is relevant," Lazinsk said. "You make an investment when you buy a good pair of sunglasses. But, why shouldn't you buy something of quality when it comes to your eyes?"

David Gendelman, who has researched the history of sunglasses, said legend has it that a tribe of Egyptians known as the Sonolians used a pair of ears severed from a respected member of society, beaten with a mallet, dried, stretched on a special rack and mounted on wooden frames to create history's first pair of sunglasses.

English explorer Robert J. Le Mesurier McClue found a pair of solid wooden blocks with tiny horizontal slits in them during his travels through the Northwest Passage in 1853. His journals report that Eskimos he encountered wore the primitive sunglasses as protection against wind, snow and ice.

Sunglasses became popular in the United States after Sam Foster sold his first pair of Foster Grants in 1929 at the Woolworth store on the Atlantic City Boardwalk. By the 1930s, people in all regions could be found sporting the latest craze in fashion.

However, they probably didn't pay as much to look good as we do today.

According to Singh-Rampertab, a good, quality pair of sunglasses can start with a price of \$70 and go as high as \$300. With price tags in the hundreds of dollars, people may want to purchase one of a variety of accessories that keep sunglasses safe and secure when not in use, including cords, cases and chains.

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What to see during a 'western' family vacation

After 20 years of marriage (an amazing accomplishment for someone who only admits to being 29 years old), my husband and I discovered we both had one regret. We'd never taken our kids on a big family vacation. Because our families live in other states, our vacations were always visiting my relatives or visiting his relatives.

So we started planning. I wanted to take a car trip out west. I remembered my family's car trip out west when I was 17. It began with three days of driving all day and almost all night. My mom and I did most of the driving. (My 18-year old sister and my dad share this genetic trait that makes their right foot too heavy and my two younger sisters were, well, too young!) I remembered all the great places we'd been, how much fun we'd had. I also began to remember other things. The arguing over whose turn it was to sit by the window, the arguing over who was hogging the air conditioning vent, the arguing over who was taking up more space than anyone else.

So we decided to fly. Once we decided we would fly, it was a matter of where to fly to. It's comparatively cheap to fly into Las Vegas and to stay there, so we decided to make that our base of operations. From Las Vegas, we could head east to the Grand Canyon and then west to Yosemite and Sequoia/King's Canyon

National Parks.

We left home at 3:30 a.m. The first time. We only had to go back twice to get things we forgot. We arrived at the airport a little less than two hours before departure time. Check-in was relatively quick, and then we headed out to our gate and through security. Now, when we were getting ready for our trip, I decided it would be a good idea to have a First Aid kit with us. After all, we were going to be hiking quite a bit. So I bought a brand new one. I never even thought to open it and check it out. So, of course, I didn't know about the pair of scissors until the security guards insisted on checking our luggage for the suspicious item that had shown up on the X-ray. While security was fishing out the scissors, they made my husband take off his shoes so they could check them out. It did make me feel good to know nothing got by security on our flight!

When we got to Vegas, we stayed at Circus Circus. It was newly renovated, which translated to extremely cheap. The other plus was the Adventure Dome, an indoor theme park, built into the hotel. It was a nice theme park, but it really doesn't hold a candle to anything in Orlando. By 7 p.m. Vegas time, we were all asleep anyway! It's the first time I can ever remember going to sleep for the night while the sun was still shining outside.

We were up the next morn-

ing at 5 a.m. getting ready for a really big day — a bus tour to the Grand Canyon. The ride to the North Rim was awfully long. But not as long as it used to be. After Sept. 11 and up until late spring, tour buses were not allowed to drive over Hoover Dam. They had to take another route that added two hours to the trip. Finally, in the spring, tour buses were granted special exemptions to travel the Hoover Dam route. But there were still precautions. Coming and going, the bus was stopped well before the dam. State patrol officers boarded the bus, checked the overhead compartments and the bathrooms.

The only bad thing about seeing the Grand Canyon was not having enough time to really see it. We had two 30-minute stops on the North Rim. There aren't enough words to describe how amazing the Grand Canyon is. No matter how many pictures you see, nothing can compare to the real thing. The scope, the grandeur, the colors ... you have to be there to really appreciate it. Being there can also make you very sad. There was a good bit of haze the day we were at the Grand Canyon. There's a haze most days. Despite what politicians may say, we live in one big ecosystem. You may designate a place a National Park, but that doesn't stop it from being affected by what happens elsewhere. It's like having a smoking section in a restaurant. The smoke doesn't know it supposed to stay put. The haze that is over the Grand Canyon

many days of the year is courtesy of air pollution from Los Angeles.

We got back to Las Vegas very late after the Grand Canyon tour. The next morning we were up early and in a rental car for the drive to Yosemite.

What can I say about the drive to Yosemite? Horribly long, terribly boring and oh my gosh, how many shades of brown can there be in the world! Las Vegas is surrounded by mountains that, in the far, far distance, look a little majestic. When you get closer, they just look like mounds of brown dirt. Once you leave Vegas, you're in the desert. Deserts look really interesting in documentaries, but really boring in person. And it's a little difficult for people who are used to seeing green more than once every one or two hundred miles! I was also more than a little disconcerted by the occasional road sign advertising a brothel. My 12-year old daughter asked me what a brothel was. I told her we'd discuss it when she was 30 or 40.

The scenery improved immensely about an hour outside of Yosemite. We went into Yosemite on the East side. The road we went in on had only been open for a couple of weeks. For Floridians, it was an amazing site. There was still snow on the ground! We stopped to play in the snow and saw our first wild animals. Two yellow-bellied marmots clamored on the rocks near us.

I don't think I've ever said "Wow" so many times in my

life. There were beautiful rock formations, waterfalls and so much more. It was awe-inspiring. It was the first time in my life I've ever been jealous of Californians. Yosemite is in their backyard and they can visit anytime they want. More than two hours after we entered Yosemite, we reached Yosemite Valley on the other side. Most of the lodging is in Yosemite Valley. We were staying in cabins in Curry Village. Even if we'd been able to afford to stay in one of the lodges in Yosemite Valley, they were booked up long before we started planning our trip. Curry Village is very nice, but ... the cabins are at the bottom of a mountain. There's no a/c in the cabins and since the cabins are packed close together, very little breeze makes it through the too few windows. For a Floridian addicted to air conditioning, it was a little uncomfortable. But the most important thing about visiting Yosemite is staying in Yosemite. Hotels, motels and lodges on the outside of Yosemite may advertise how great they are and how close they are to Yosemite, but trust me, they're not. When you visit Yosemite, you want to stay inside the park. Then you get to see amazing sights, like sunset over Yosemite Falls, the mule deer walking around the campgrounds and everywhere else, and the occasional coyote stopping traffic.

The Canna: A tropical look for Central Florida gardens

Cannas are large plants growing up to six feet tall, native to tropical regions of South America that do well during the heat of summer.

The large leaves 18 to 36 inches long, light green or purple in color, provide a tropical look to the landscape. Their bright colored flowers provide lots of contrast to the landscape and attract attention. Many varieties of Canna have flowers with bright colors such as yellow, red, red-orange, or combinations of these colors.

In central Florida rhizomes are left in the ground during the winter months to grow and flower each year.

The Plant

Canna is a 2 to 5 feet tall herbaceous plant borne from rhizomes, growing upright on single stems. Leaves are simple, alternate, oval with pointed ends, measuring up to 2 feet in length. Leaves have prominent veins and their color varies from green to reddish-purple to bronze to variegated forms. Flowers form during the summer and fall and can be white, red, pink, yellow, salmon or orange. Flowers are borne in terminal spikes that grow about one foot above the

leaves. Flowers are small, formed by 3 sepals and 3 petals green in color and not showy. The enlarged stamens, usually 5, are called staminodia and form the showy part of the flower.

Culture

Cannas enjoy full sun locations where they produce an abundance of flowers over a long period of time.

The plant grows but flowers poorly in the shade. Set rhizomes about 12-18 inches apart for a solid mass of coarse-textured bright color during the summer. They prefer rich, well drained soils, with good moisture. Maintain high moisture levels during the blooming period. Use mulch to keep good soil moisture and reduce weed growth.

Plants are heavy feeders and will need a general fertilizer 2 to 3 times during their growing season. Plants are propagated by division of rhizomes and some varieties can also be propagated by seeds.

The rhizomes may be divided in the spring with each division having one or more eyes.

Uses

Cannas are excellent bor-

der plants. They can be grown in containers and used to decorate patios and recreational areas. They are mainly used as bedding plants and in mass plantings. They can be grown near water gardens to add color to the area.

Their blooms and leaves can be used in floral arrangements to provide a tropical effect. In some countries in South America, the roots are eaten as food.

Pests and Diseases

The Canna leaf-roller caterpillars feed on the leaves, and can produce some damage to the plants. The adult is a brownish colored skipper. Borers and other chewing insects are occasional pests of this plant. Bud rot causes numerous spots on unfolding leaves. The spots run together along veins.

They may be whitish at first but soon turn black. Infected flower buds turn black and die before opening. The disease moves down the leaf stalk, killing young stems and buds.

On older leaves, the disease spreads slowly, forming irregular, yellowish spots with water-soaked margins. Use only healthy roots. Canna mosaic virus causes leaves to have pale yellow stripes from the midrib to the margin. The leaves are wrin-

kled, curled, chlorotic and are often dusty brown.

The stems, sepals and petals have yellow bands. Destroy infected plants and control the aphids which spread the disease. Aster yellows causes irregular, diffuse, dull yellowing of young leaves which turn brown with age.

Infected plants are destroyed. The disease is spread by aphids. Cannas are

susceptible to a rust fungus and the disease can become a serious problem in some varieties. Application of fungicides may be required to control the disease.
