The Legislature Convenes

It is perhaps peculiarly appropriate that Ringling Brothers' and Barnum & Bailey's great combined circus should be presenting its first performance of the season in New York on the same day that "the greatest show on earth" is opening in Tallahassee. The clowns in Madison Square Garden have nothing on Florida's law-makers whose biennial jokes, gestures and jim-cracks would be side-splitting if they were not so serious.

However, as these representatives of the people convene in Tallahassee today to listen to the Governor's address "on the state of the state" and begin their arduous 60 days of labor, it is consoling to know that on the whole the leadership of this Legislature, as well as its membership, is superior to that ordinarily found in these cloistered halls. In Senator Beacham as president of the Senate and in Dan McCarty, youthful speaker of the House, the Legislature has both intelligence and ability.

Most of the more acute problems, with which our representatives will have to cope, deal with finance and taxation and in charge of this important committee has been named L. C. Leedy of Orlando who probably has had as much experience in such matters as anyone in the state and whose character as well as ability will qualify him for the post. The chief difficulty of this job lies in the demand of the people at one in the same time for larger appropriations accompanied by lower taxes.

Among those additional expenditures for which there is the most demand and which seem the most likely of realization are larger old age pensions with added relief for dependent children and the blind, more money for the schools including the university at Gainesville and the college at Tallahassee, a new state hospital for mental patients, vastly increased highway construction and many additional items necessitated by the needs of national defense.

These demands for increased expenditures are heard in the face of a constitutional amendment recently voted abolishing the State ad valorem tax on real estate, which followed closely on the heels of the homestead amendment eliminating all operating tax levies on homes, as well as an almost universal insistence that the 1/2 of 1 percent gross receipts tax be repealed, and while present revenue is already falling to meet previously authorized expenditures.

A partial answer to this plight is seen in the proposal to shift one cent of the gasoline tax revenues from the counties to the State Road Department, to increase the tax on the race tracks and to give the "odd cents break" to the State instead of allowing the tracks to keep it and to increase drivers license fees. No doubt these measures would go a long way toward bringing some semblance of order to the State's financial chaos.

But there is still much to be done. The report of the Brookings Institution has pointed the way toward a systematic reorganization of the State government which is essential to place the State on a sound financial basis. It may be that something along this line can be accomplished. If so, the people of Florida should be eternally grateful to the members of this Legislature.

St. Augustine, 1565-1941

St. Augustine is not only the oldest city of European origin in the United States; it is also one of the most beautiful—and in an unpretentious way—most beautiful. The qualities that the calm and reflective Henry Flagler felt in love with here more than sixty years ago are rare in this country, because the old and the new with us so rarely live and let live. They came as a shock to Flagler at a time when he had amassed an immense fortune and looked up from the close and intense effort of amassing it for the first time in his life. Here he began spending from this fortune very lavishly because he had suddenly awakened to values that greatly successful men have always cultivated, their material success once secured.

Flagler's architectural gifts to St. Augustine are monuments that rank with the best in the United States. Huge as they are, they do no violence to the scale and tones of things there. The Flagler hotels, churches and residences are of metropolitan dimensions, but St. Augustine remains undisturbed by the elegance, pomp and massiveness of these buildings. A new plan of restoration under the auspices of the Carnegie Institution virtually guarantees that St. Augustine will remain itself through the ages, as it has now for 376 years, in spite of having been sacked by pirates, having changed hands thirteen times and quietly gone about its business under five flags.—New York Herald Tribune.

age of only six inches of good top soil in which to grow plants as compared to an average of nine inches in 1939.

"In our enthusiasm to grow bumper crops during the last World War," Mrs. Huttenlocher declared, "we drained all our marshes and cut down our trees to give us more room. Then when the drought came, there was no natural sponge to maintain the water table, and no trees to precipitate moisture in the air."

"Floods followed all because we did not understand conservation," Mrs. Huttenlocher said. She appealed to Garden Club members to back a movement to channel children in soil conservation and not to burn our trees and grasses, since this will destroy the humus.

"Just how and exactly will be the result and we cannot live here," Mrs. Huttenlocher pointed out. "Even Hitler wouldn't want a country like this."

In a final appeal, Mrs. Huttenlocher described Florida's system of 19 State parks, each of which she said has enough charm and individuality to continue to attract thousands of visitors every year.

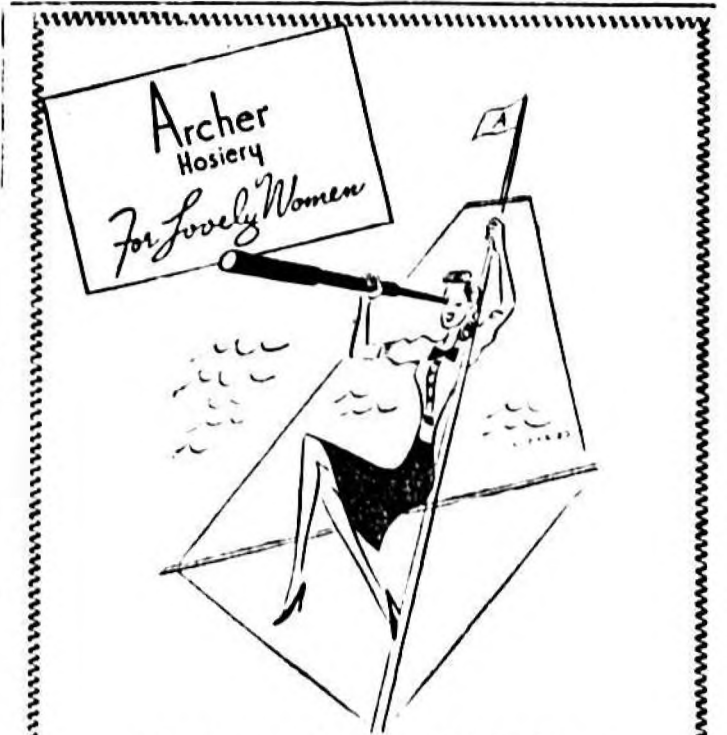

WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—(AP)—Without a word about nickels and dimes, you probably get as much for your money here as anywhere. The District of Columbia is no land of milk and honey, but Congress has put a stoppage on some of the common rackets which drain the tourists' pockets.

Hotel prices aren't cheap anywhere along the line, but if you had all the money in the world to spend, I wouldn't look for the most expensive hotel. I'd probably check into the Willard. It's a comparatively modern hotel, but it has a booby-trap claim that is somehow reminiscent of the days when Senator Douglas congratulated President-elect Lincoln with a heavy hand, shake in its vaulted lobby. Don't get the idea that it is a cheap spot to spend the night. It isn't. Remember that I'm preferring this whole column on the fantasy that money isn't anything if it isn't spent. The next day, I would be up bright and early—about noon—and start on a list of tours. Beginning with the \$1 tour around the capital city, I'd branch out to the Arlington Cemetery and the tomb of the Unknown Soldier—to old Alexandria, which was once one of the young nation's great seaports—to Mount Vernon, where a fellow named George Washington lived and died a great plantation, died and was buried—to the Great Falls of the Potomac River—to Annapolis, where the navy gives vitamins and A. B. C's to future admirals—to the homes of Robert E. Lee and Tom Jefferson—to a dozen other spots that earned their marks in the history books when the nation was churning or giving life in its days of the

Germans Discover Cow's Milk Has Beer Ingredients

BERLIN, Apr. 8.—(AP)—German cows produce "beer" as a by-product of their milk, but it needed Hermann Goering's year-long anti-waste campaign to discover the phenomenon.

The brew, of course, doesn't flow directly from the cow, but the ingredients from which beer is made are contained in the milk. It's a fact and no wartime joke, as Dr. Roeder, a chemist, told the German Chemists' Association.

If I felt like staying up late, I'd lounge in Washington's night life. It doesn't compare with many other cities, but it isn't exactly a blank. It ranges from a Fyrtique show, where you will see a lot of congressmen, to dancing and a floor show on the Shoreham terrace, where you'll see a lot more congressmen.

Everywhere along the line, I'd grab a few good, if too-expensive meals. You probably can't do better in New York, Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia, New Orleans, San Francisco, and a dozen other cities—but it isn't every one of these that will give you river-front fish houses (such as Hall's) where President Grant and his cronies gorged over Chinatown's plates and politics; or steak houses (such as the Occidental) where more politicians have hung their auto-crashed photographs than ever in Hollywood.

In other words, for tourists who must shake the dime bank or those who take a layer from a bulging bank account, Washington is a mecca. If you have any doubts about it, write the Government Printing Office for "Washington—The City and Capital" (\$3) or "The Marine Capital—A Manual of the Origin and Development of Washington" (\$2).
