Traffic Accidents Are Highest During Christmas Season

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Death never takes a Christmas holiday. . . . December is the most dangerous month of the year for traffic accidents—one-and-one-half times as dangerous as the safest month, June. Concerning it, the National Safety Council says: "Pedestrian deaths soar. In December, 1938, pedestrians made up almost half of the month's motor vehicle traffic. . . . There were 1,690 pedestrian fatalities. Adults bear the brunt of the increase. In December, 1938, deaths of persons 25 years of age and older were twice as frequent as in June."
 Night accidents increase. Peak traffic occurs at dusk or after nightfall, instead of during the daytime as at other times of year. The percentage of drivers skidding goes up.
 Although much of the December increase can be attributed to bad weather, according to the Safety Council, the conviviality of the holiday season is another contributing factor. January and February, both bad-weather months, have no such appalling traffic records.
 The holiday shopping rush, increased traffic due to parties and family reunions, and driving under the influence of liquor all contribute to December's bad record.

Both North and South are affected. Accidents increase 40 percent in the North, 20 percent in the South, at this time of year.
 The causes of the accidents suggest the remedies. For a safe holiday season the Safety Council advises:
 1. Check up on your car—especially electrical and exhaust systems, windshield wiper, brakes, defroster and chains.
 2. Maintain adequate vision and ventilation through windshield and windows.
 3. On slippery pavements keep speed down and car in gear.
 4. Avoid situations requiring quick stops and sudden turns.
 5. Use chains when driving on ice and snow. But even with chains, speed over 20 miles an hour on ice is dangerous.
 6. Always slow down when approaching curves.
 7. Watch out for ice on bridges, in shaded spots, around curves, and over hills—even though most of the pavement is dry.
 8. Start and accelerate slowly to avoid spinning the wheels.
 9. If skid starts, turn the front wheels in the direction in which the car wheels are skidding.
 10. Shorten trips and stop often to relax when conditions are bad.

Borah Warns GOP It Must Discuss U.S. Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Senator Borah (R-Idaho) warned the Republican Party yesterday that it must take a "clear and unmistakable stand on President Roosevelt's foreign policies or face a humiliating retreat" in the 1940 presidential election.
 Borah's warning came in a letter to Allen W. Dulles, a delegate to the 1919 Paris peace conference and one of the 12 advisors of Thomas E. Dewey, New York district attorney and candidate for the Republican presidential nomination.
 The Idaho Senator said he had seen press reports that Dulles, speaking at a luncheon of the executive committee of the New York State Republican club on December 9, had "advised" against a campaign on foreign policies and favored eliminating foreign policy questions as issues in the campaign.
 Other prominent Republicans, Borah said, had urged the same course. This recalled that Alf M. Landon has, in general, been supporting the Roosevelt foreign policy.
 But Borah made clear that he intended to continue criticizing that policy during the coming campaign. He was one of the leaders of the unsuccessful fight in the special session of Congress against the Administration-sponsored amendments to the Neutrality Act.
 "I venture the opinion," Borah wrote Dulles, "that our foreign policy and foreign questions will be the most thoroughly discussed and debated questions in this campaign. If an effort were made to eliminate such issues, or to minimize them, the only result of the effort, in my opinion, would be a humiliating retreat far this side of the middle of October."
 "Any such effort would be a frightful mistake from a purely strategic standpoint and would be worse than a mistake from a moral standpoint. . . ."
 Signed James A. Taylor, and the other President and Mrs. Roosevelt.

President Of Panama Dies Of Heart Attack

Dr. Arosemena Dies While Enroute To Dedicate Public Works Program

Ambassador To U. S. To Succeed

Dr. Augusto S. Boyd Will Head Republic Until Next October

PANAMA, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Dr. Juan Demostenes Arosemena, 59, president of the Republic of Panama, died today of heart disease at Penonomé, 150 miles in the interior.

He suffered an attack here on Nov. 8, but was reported out of danger the next day, and after six weeks in the hospital he apparently was restored to health. He resumed his full activities Dec. 4.

Yesterday he drove to Penonomé where he was expected to dedicate a public works program today. He died after a heart attack early in the morning.

Elected as President in 1936, he began the last year of his term on Oct. 1.

Second Vice President Ezequiel Fernandez Jaen was sworn in as provisional president.

Ambassadors will be succeeded by Dr. Augusto S. Boyd, first vice-president and now ambassador to Washington.

Captain Has 24 Hours Before Making Decision For Internment Or Battle

British Credited For Marksmanship

Finn Troops Report Successes As Reds Are Pushed Back
