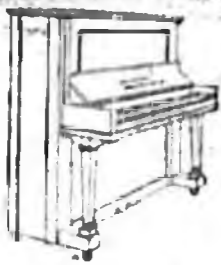

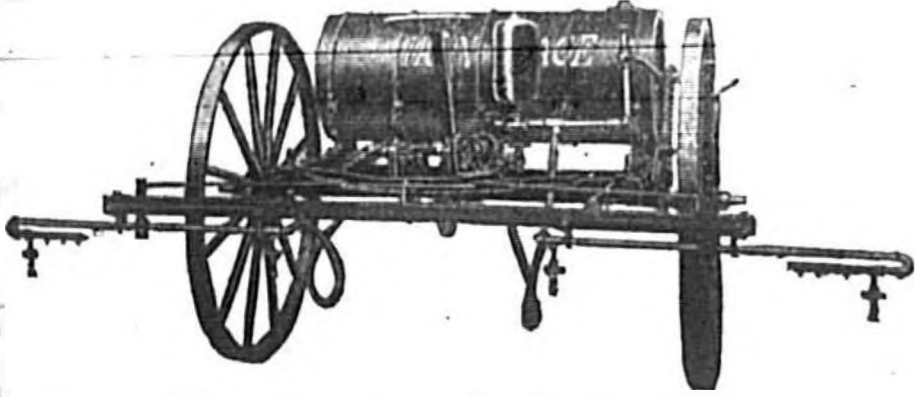

He, Bryce Talbot, gazed, smiled, nodded wearily. It was the girl he had recognized at the street crossing.

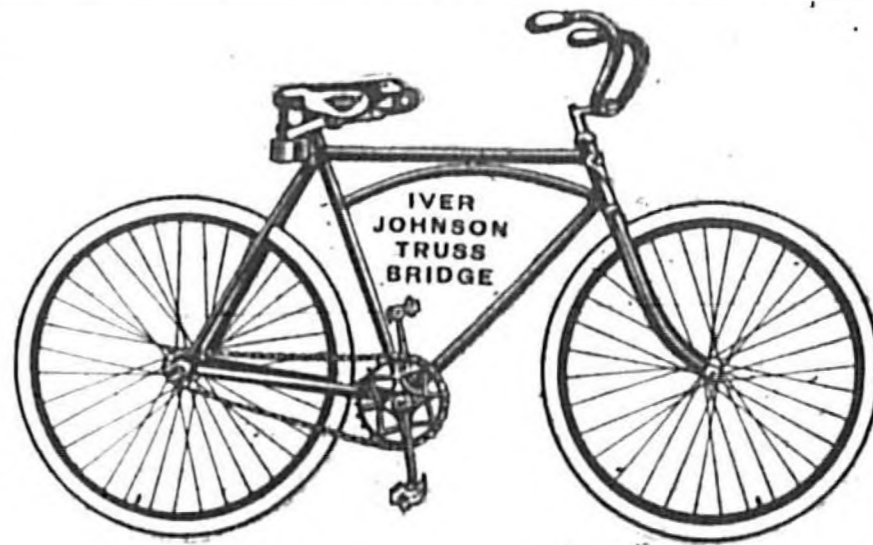

THE PORT OF NEW SMYRNA INLET

A STATEMENT OF THE PRESENT CONDITIONS CONFRONTING THE PEOPLE OF THE EAST COAST AND CENTRAL FLORIDA

The various conventions of the State Waterways Associations have come and gone and whatever value they may have on the future development of the state remains to be seen.

But over at New Smyrna, the natural harbor for central Florida remains the same, and its blue waters are as yet unused by the presence of deep water vessels.

Four years have passed since the agitation of opening the port was begun and in those years New Smyrna has made a greater growth in population and investment building than in the previous forty years.

One year ago I was called to New York and Washington to give information to the northern people of the existence and availability of the harbor as a port of entry and no one I conversed with except Congressman Sparkman of this state expressed any opposition to the opening of the port.

All other congressmen I met acceded to the advisability of opening the port and many wondered at the indifference of the Florida delegation to the request of the legislature made in 1909.

I found that a gigantic bluff had been played upon the state through the report of the engineers and that Congressman Clark in whose district the port is situated have never insisted upon the right of the state to have it taken up on the floor of Congress as a state measure to be respectfully considered.

Fortunately Hon. Claude L'Engle now being representative at large for the state has called it up and had it properly introduced to the attention of the rivers and harbor committee since his election, and it will be considered at the regular session of the present Congress.

Why should a port that is one of the best natural harbors in the state, with a population of over 100,000 people within 75 miles be permitted to be kept closed to the commerce of such a multitude of producers of the necessities and luxuries of civilized life?

The people of Sanford and the inland cities have a vital interest in the answer to this question. Before the Civil war a canal was surveyed and work upon it began to connect Lake Monroe with the port of New Smyrna.

The dredges at Panama will soon have completed their work there, and once towed over to Florida they could make short work of making canals in Florida soil where free from coquina rock.

The true policy of the people of central Florida is to cooperate with the people of the East Coast to open this port as speedily as possible.

The board of engineers have no power beyond that of advisory recommendations or the reverse. The secretary of war has no power to present a report if called upon by Congress to make one.

With this neglected property will be retarded for years to come. The country between the St. Johns and the Indian river has some of the richest lands in the world and a canal from Lake Monroe to the coast will drain thousands of acres and make them capable of cultivation.

With deep water at New Smyrna and a water route from Sanford to that point produce can be placed in New York in four days after leaving the fields at Sanford, all by water and at lowest freight rates known in transportation circles.

This I believe to be the true policy to support by the people of this part of the state. I have always believed it and advocated it since the original movement began four years ago.

As president of the original and first organization to procure and disseminate information about this port, I would

say that the flag raised at New Smyrna in 1909 has never been lowered and that organization has never been remiss in its efforts to do what it started to do at the beginning of the movement.

We welcome all other efforts to improve the waterways in other parts of the state, but with the port of New Smyrna opened the waterways in the central part of the state will have their natural terminals there the same as those of the north part will find at Jacksonville.

With this explanation of the invitation we submit the question to the consideration of the voters and their interests in the problem of the East Coast and central Florida.

At the Presbyterian Church History of the Early Days Proved Most Interesting Topic

Last Sunday night at the Presbyterian church the early days of the pioneers was reviewed and the evening was given over to a revival of these first steps in Presbyterianism. The first Presbyterian church was founded in this part of Florida at Ft. Reade in the Orange House, the only hotel in the region. This was before the present city of Sanford had been founded and the real settlement was at Ft. Reade. Some thirty years ago a few devoted souls met in the reception hall of the Orange House and founded the first Presbyterian church that at that time was the only one south of Palatka. There were at that time only about eight families living in that vicinity. Mrs. Holland, one of the members and founders of the church read a very interesting paper at the meeting Sunday night, relating the circumstances, and was followed by Hon. J. N. Whitner, himself one of the devoted band of early Presbyterians. He told in a most interesting manner the early struggles of those pioneer days in the wilderness and the little church of Silver Lake where Presbyterians were forced to meet in a single room at one of the houses. It is difficult to believe that story of the first Presbyterians in Sanford or hark back to the first days in view of the fact that the congregation has grown to such proportions in this age and forces one to believe that many of us who are living in the luxuries of this age and who are living in the luxuries of times of 1913 would hardly have gone through such vicissitudes to attend church.

Bringing up these bits of history of the church and the country in which we are living and enjoying the fruits made possible by the hardy pioneers made a wonderful story and many who were present were greatly interested. At the conclusion of Mr. Whitner's address Hon. D. L. Thrasher was called upon to make a prophecy for the future of the churches in Sanford and the Presbyterian church in particular and in his usual happy manner gave a brief outline of what should be done and would be done in the way of building a new structure and new members and his prophecy was a glowing account of the many good things in store for the church.

The musical program of the evening was one of the features and was greatly enhanced by a solo rendered by Mr. Suhr who has a voice of wonderful depth and timbre.

Dr. Browder assisted by the choir, hood and the officers of the church and the ladies propose to make these Spiday evening services very interesting each night and the laymen of the church will take a more active part in the Sunday night services and also the prayer meetings on Wednesday nights.

Mix Up In Orlando Schools

Anent the mandamus proceedings against County Treasurer J. H. Tucker, for the non-payment of the school warrants issued in favor of the teachers of the Orlando public school, Mr. Tucker stated today that he would file an answer to be heard before Judge Perkins at the Kissingmire court on Friday. "I want this matter as to the legality of payment settled by the court," said the treasurer, "although I think the warrants should be paid, and am perfectly willing to pay them, but as there is \$1400 a month to be paid out I think the matter is of sufficient importance to know that it is being legally done. I am anxious that the matter be settled at an early date, as next Tuesday the second months school warrants will become due." The status of affairs that has led up to the point where the teachers are being deprived of prompt payment of their salaries found its origin in the double day session of the school, in which teachers, although putting in the legal five hours' time each day, the children are only being taught four hours a day. Owing to disappointment in the erection of a new school building, this double daily session was inaugurated as the best means of tiding over a condition over which the trustees had no control. The superintendent, Mr. J. F. McKinnon objected to the double session, stating that other buildings could have been provided and when the scholars failed to receive the legal five hours per day that such teacher was supposed to give, he refused to issue the warrants in payment, on the ground that they had failed to put in a full day in teaching the pupils. The county school board came to the relief of the trustees and teachers when President James Knox signed the warrants after they had been drawn by Superintendent McKinnon as secretary. But owing to the fact that the superintendent had balked at the questionable legality of the proceedings, the treasurer of the school fund decided to withhold payment, hence the mandamus proceedings which were argued before Judge Perkins Saturday in DeLand at which time Treasurer Tucker was ordered to make payment or show cause why, said payment should not be made. Reporter-Star.
