SECURITY POLICE LEAVE SEVERAL GERMAN CITIES AT COMMAND OF FRENCH

SAY THAT POLICE WERE AGITATORS AND KEPT UP REVOLT TOWNS ARE QUIET

Prominent Citizen Arrested for Agitating Unrest Among the Working People

ESSEN, March 9.—French troops have again been withdrawn from Dortmund, which was occupied yesterday for the purpose of rounding up all members of the disbanded security police still at large.

At Recklinhausen, Dr. Eisenreithe has been arrested by French authorities. He is president of the Munich Hall police and acted as such in daytime but at night had assumed various other roles, the French assert, to facilitate his work as an agitator among the labor element.

Railroad Commission Wants Authority to Enforce Decisions

TALLAHASSEE, March 9.—There is a strong probability that the next legislature will be asked to give the railroad commission authority to enforce its rules, it is pointed out, but its decisions must be taken into its courts unless the utility affected complies of its own accord.

As matters now stand, it is pointed out, a decision by the commission regardless of its ultimate outcome, can be held in litigation indefinitely through the various moves by the utility. If the commission were given authority to "enforce" its decision, it is explained, the recourse of appealing to the courts would still be open, but the initiative would have to be taken by the utility and while the matter was pending the decision would be in effect.

Automobile Revenues Have Taken Big Jump Since the Year 1917

TALLAHASSEE, March 9.—Revenues derived from automobile or rather motor vehicle licenses have taken big jumps annually since 1917, according to figures made public by the state comptroller's office. In 1917 the taxes were collected by counties and totaled \$128,277.75. The following year the state took over the collection of the money and the total was \$346,081.28.

All Stockholders in Lincoln Car Are Reimbursed

Henry Ford Pays Off All Claims Amounting to Millions

DETROIT, March 9.—All creditors of the Lincoln Motor Car Company, purchased last year by Henry Ford at Recovery's sale, have been reimbursed in full by Mr. Ford, it has been officially announced. To pay all claims in full took approximately \$4,000,000. Ford took the step, it was announced, despite the fact that he was not required to do so under the terms of purchase.

ARMY PLANES WILL LEAVE MIAMI SOON

EXPECT TO HOP OFF FOR FLIGHT TO PORTO RICO TOMORROW.

MIAMI, March 9.—Captain Thomas Lanphire, commanding the squadron of six army planes on their flight from Texas to Porto Rico, announced this morning that the hop off from Curtis field here to Havana, would not be made until Saturday. The delay was caused by the necessity of overhauling one of the planes and also the requirement of twenty-four hours' notice to Washington of the time for hop-offs.

British Protest Against French Invasion of Ruhr

LONDON, March 9.—It has been reported that the British government has formally protested on legal grounds against the French occupation of territories between the Rhine bridgesheads. It is learned that no formal protest has been made, but only verbal representations by diplomatic channels, pointing out the difficulties created for the British authorities in the Rhineland.

Peonage Charge Against Farmer Will Be Taken Up

TALLAHASSEE, March 9.—Federal grand jury sitting here in April will investigate peonage charges against John Chancy, farmer, of Taylor county, Assistant District Attorney Diamond stated today. Chancy was arrested last week and released on bond pending action of the grand jury. He is charged with having held a negro woman and man in bondage on his farm.

PATTERSON, N. J., March 9.—Charles Di Giacomo, 10 years of age, was in a serious condition in the hospital today as the result of his experience last night when he was accidentally locked in a concrete vault by his pal, William Templeton, a fellow worker in the Peoples Park Bank.

SENATOR JOHNSON ASSAILS PERMANENT COURT OF JUSTICE AS THE FIRST FALSE STEP

Toward Membership in The League of Nations in Another Form

NEW YORK, March 9.—President Harding's proposal that the United States accept membership in the permanent court of international justice was assailed here last night by Senator Johnson, Republican, California, a leader of the senate irreconcilables, as a first "false step" toward membership in the League of Nations.

Speaking before the Bronx board of trade, the California senator declared the demand for American participation in European affairs was based on no logical foundation, but emanated from "a begoggled international intellectuality or an historically perverted imagination."

"Still the cries, the propaganda persists for our entry into Europe," said Senator Johnson. "It takes now one form and then a totally different one and has run the gamut of all possible international organizations. Its advocates appeal in turn with equal fervor to our altruism and our cupidity."

"The demand that America join the League of Nations is succeeded by the beautiful word picture of an economic conference and a great part of the moral weight of the United States might play in a topsy-turvy world. And again now our old leaguers, weary from defeats, in ulcet tones invite us to join the international court."

"An international court which substitutes the rule of law for that of power and the domination of justice for armed might has a sonorous and appealing sound. To argue that just as courts determine issues between individuals it is logical there should be a like mode of adjudication of differences between nations by similar courts, at once strikes a sympathy."

'Auto Master' to Greet Motorists at Hendersonville

HENDERSONVILLE, N. C., Feb. 10.—A novel method of giving aid to the 70,000 motorists who will pass Hendersonville to and from Florida in the course of a year has been devised by the Greater Hendersonville Chamber of Commerce. These sight-seers and sunshine seekers will be traveling over the longest continuous scenic highway in the world, and the first national highway to be designated according to the federal good roads bureau, after the manner of using letters of the alphabet. This wonderful road, stretching from the Great Lakes to the land of perpetual youth being known as route A, or, as our Yankee friends say "root" A.

This helpful idea of Hendersonville origin will be in the shape of a fat jovial, "auto station master," whose duty it will be to greet every car bearing the license tag of a state other than North Carolina, aid its passengers in a hospitable manner, direct them to the dozens of beauty spots and waterfalls in the mountains, and to wish them God speed on their way.

These motorists will hail from every state in the middle west, and from many of the eastern and far western ones as well, who will be saved considerable mileage by the opening up of this new and direct route.

Harding Puts in a Day Cruising

VERO, Fla., March 9.—President Harding yesterday cruised nearly 60 miles on the Indian river, played 18 holes of golf, visited with relatives at Rockledge, shook hands with several hundred people and called it all a vacation.

The chief executive indicated plainly that he had enjoyed it all when he boarded the houseboat Pioneer late in the day to continue the cruise until darkness fell and the craft was anchored for the night several miles north of this town. Today Mr. Harding will come ashore here for a round of golf and may motor to Fort Pierce for another game in the afternoon.

An hour before the members of the presidential party awoke yesterday, the Pioneer cast off from the dock at Titusville and headed down the Indian river through one of Florida's leading citrus fruit sections. The middle of the forenoon brought the boat to Rockledge, where the president and Mrs. Harding went ashore for a visit with the latter's brother, C. B. Kling and his family.

During the stop at Rockledge the president became a freeholder of the state of Florida. Citizens of the little town who went to the pier in a body to greet the visitors, presented the president with a deed to a lot.

The other stop of the day was at Melbourne. It was probably the first time a president of the United States ever had visited the place and those there made the best of it. Mr. Harding and his golfing companions, Edward H. McLean, the Washington publisher, Chairman Lasker, of the shipping board, and former director Dawes of the budget, were conducted in state to the Melbourne country club which proudly displayed to the party a neat little nine hole golf course with water hazards in which alligators were reputed to lie in wait at times for poorly driven balls.

No alligators were seen, however, during the two rounds the presidential foursome had made on the course. Members of the club willingly served as caddies, John S. Chapman, publisher of the Rockford, Ill. Star, carrying the clubs of the publisher of the Marion, O. Star.

Although the itinerary of the "house boat party" still remains undecided except in a tentative way, the progress of the Pioneer yesterday made it reasonably certain that the president and his fellow vacationists would spend Sunday at Palm Beach.

Men Who Mobbled Putnam County Jail Identified Today

On Trial at Palatka Now in Preliminary

PALATKA, March 9.—When thirteen men charged with attack on the Putnam county jail March 3rd, were arraigned before County Judge Calhoun this morning Sheriff Hagan positively identified three of them as those who fired into jail, one of the bullets striking him in the hand. Three were Russel White, Chester Fowler, L. J. Brian, Counsel for the defense indicated that if the men were bound over they would apply to the circuit court for habeas corpus writs to gain release. The remainder of the time was taken up in examination of witnesses.

Gentleman Bandit Holds Up Cafe in Jacksonville Commission Comp shr

Said To Be Same One Who Held Up Several Places

JACKSONVILLE, March 9.—Holding Pete Berio, waiter in a local cafe, and two customers at bay with a pistol, Jacksonville's gentleman bandit, robbed a restaurant's cash register of between \$40 and \$50 about 6:30 o'clock this morning. The description of the bandit tallies with that of the man who has held up two other establishments here within the last two weeks.

SANTIAGO, Chile, March 9.—The cabinet formed early in January with Francisco Carcer Gana as premier, resigned yesterday afternoon in consequence of an adverse vote on a resolution of confidence in the senate.

BEAUTIFUL BOULEVARD ON SHORES OF LAKE MONROE WILL BEAUTIFY THE SHORES

ISADORA DUNCAN MADE REMARKS ABOUT AMERICA

AND NOW SHE IS A WOMAN WITHOUT A COUNTRY

WASHINGTON, March 9.—Isadora Duncan, who says she does not like the United States, is not an American citizen, the department of labor has decided. She lost her citizenship, the department held, through her marriage to Serge Essanine, Russian, last April. Recently, on leaving these shores with her husband, the dancer took occasion to deride American institutions and incidentally took a verbal shot at prohibition. After reading the press reports of her opinions regarding the United States Secretary of Labor Davis announced he would take steps with a view of depriving her of her American citizenship.

300 Acres Everglade Land Sold Today to Miami Land Co.

TALLAHASSEE, March 9.—The International Improvement Board today sold 332 acres of everglade land to the Biscayne Company of Miami, for \$20,000 cash. The land is located on the Key of Biscayne, out from Miami, where it is understood the Biscayne company already has extensive holdings.

American Debt Commission Completes Formal Draft

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The American debt funding commission today completed the formal draft of the debenture which embodies the terms of the debt refunding settlement negotiated with Great Britain. No announcement was made as to when the contract would be submitted for the British signature.

BODY OF JUDGE HARRIS WAS LAID TO REST

MIAMI, Fla., March 8.—A funeral cortege six blocks long in Key West yesterday afternoon bore the body of Judge W. Hunt Harris, who died Tuesday, to his final resting place in Key West cemetery, following funeral services in St. Paul's church. So great was the throng that came to pay their last respects to the distinguished jurist that many were unable to get inside the church.

INDICTMENTS NOLLE PROSSSED

WELLSBURG, W. Va., Feb. 6.—Indictments charging 126 men with conspiracy to attack and destroy mine property at Cliftonville, W. Va., last summer were nolle prossed in circuit court here yesterday. The defendants had been at liberty under bond for several months. The charges grow out of the Clifton mine battle in which Sheriff H. H. Duval and six others were killed.

Constable Killed at Herrin Mines By Coal Miner

WEST FRANKFORT, March 9.—Constable John Kelley, of Zelgler, near here, one of the men under indictment in connection with the Herrin mine killings, was shot and killed shortly before midnight last night by Dan Davis, a coal miner.

TO DEPORT ALIENS FROM TAMPA

CHARLESTON, March 8.—Four aliens alleged to have been members of a party of 32 smuggled into the United States from Cuba at Panama City, Fla., last night left here in charge of immigration officers for Tampa where they will be deported.

In the Legislature Will Be Prepared by Seminole County Representative

WATER FLOODS CELLARS

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—Four square miles of the Bronx early yesterday were transferred into a miniature Yellowstone park when 30 cypress spouted water high into the air after a water main had burst. Torrents flowed into hundreds of cellars and many families living in basements were rouled from their beds. In some instances there were three feet of water in the bedrooms.

HIDE ENDS FATALLY

MEMPHIS, March 9.—J. T. Olds, 35, a Yazoo and Mississippi Valley railroad conductor, is dead. Gordon Casarette, 19, grocery clerk, is under arrest on a charge of murder and three other persons are being detained at material witnesses, as an aftermath of an automobile ride and gathering in a suburban store near here which terminated in the fatal wounding of Olds.

CITRUS PRICES DUE TO ADVANCE SOON, IS BELIEF

An advance in prices of citrus fruit late in March was predicted Monday by local citrus shippers who said it was likely shipments will have declined materially by that time. The advance, it was estimated at headquarters of the citrus sub-exchange will be as much as fifty cents a box or more.

Growers who have sent their fruit north in the last week have found prices better than usual, despite the continued heavy shipments. To date fruit have been shipped from the state and at the present rate this figure will be increased considerably by the end of the week.

The up and down tendency in the price has prevailed for some time now, it was said, and although some sales were reported at fancy prices the average f. o. b. Orlando, Pineapple oranges, in some instances brought \$5.35 a box on the market, a price which nets the grower about \$3 a box on the tree. Grapefruit auctions in New York were reported around \$3.35 for the golden variety. Tangerine brights brought as high as \$10.20 a box, with goldens selling for approximately \$8.

The groves are still in need of rain and present prospects, taking the words right out of the mouths of the meteorological experts, they will get moisture soon. The bloom on orange trees is very heavy, but in some instance the grapefruit bloom is light. All the groves, though, are in condition to set a fine crop of fruit.

The movement of grape fruit in the last week has been unusually heavy

for this season and when this rush is over citrus shipments will tumble. Figuring on this decrease and the consequent improvement in demand, is where the growers and shippers see reason to expect a price increase soon. —Orlando Sentinel.

Geyser Rises Out of the Ocean Near Morro Castle

HAVANA, Cuba, March 9.—A geyser rising out of the ocean to a height of 10 metres suddenly appeared off Morro Castle at the entrance to Havana shortly after noon yesterday, and moved to the entrance of the harbor where it subsided.

A big tree near La Punta castle across the harbor mouth from Morro Castle, which has resisted the storms of a century or more, was torn up by the roots and one wall of a house near the presidential palace was crushed in. Several automobiles were wrecked.

The phenomenon is explained by Prof. J. G. Millas of the Havana weather bureau station, as a clash of two currents in the gulf, one from the north and the other from the south, which flow across the entrance to the harbor usually at different distances from the land.

At a point opposite La Punta, it picked up a rowboat and overturned it. The occupant was rescued apparently none the worse for his weird experience.

A deluge of rain and a heavy wind accompanied the visitor and minor

damage from the precipitation thru-out the city has been reported. A man in an automobile was hit by a stream of water and he fled shrieking.

Three Police Killed and Prohi Officer Wounded in Georgia

ATLANTA, March 9.—Three policemen were shot and killed and one prohibition officer wounded in Lulu and Blackshear, two south Georgia towns, late yesterday, according to

reports received here. Vilas Martin and Jack Ryan, marshals at Lulu, were shot and instantly killed by Robert Hope, a mail carrier, and I. C. Brooks was slain in a battle with S. L. Sharpe at Blackshear, prohibition officer J. A. Monroe being wounded. Reports from Lulu said Hope had been arrested by Martin and Ryan and was being taken to jail when the shooting commenced. Ryan and Mar-

tin were said to have been instantly killed. Hope surrendered to the sheriff. Brooks was killed in a battle when he and the prohibition officer attempted to arrest Sharpe at his home near Blackshear, authorities said. The officers had a warrant charging Sharpe with violation of the prohibition laws. Monroe was badly wounded. Sharpe, reports said, escaped.

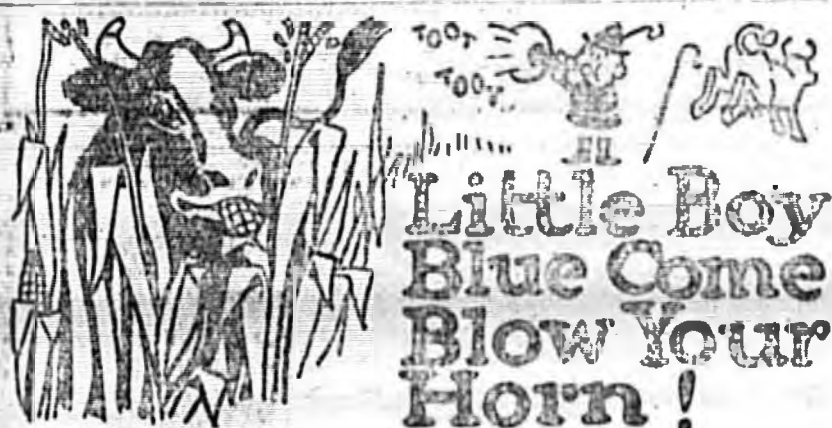

RUBE BENTON IS CLEARED; LANDIS FLAYS ACCUSERS

CHICAGO, March 9.—The controversy over Pitcher J. C. "Rube" Benton, was settled last night by a decision of K. M. Landis, baseball commissioner, declaring him ineligible to play in organized baseball, approving his transfer to the Cincinnati National League by the St. Louis club of the American Association and severely criticizing those who brought the charges against Benton nearly two years after the alleged irregularities occurred.

The case against Benton was one of the most infamous in the history of baseball. The Rube couldn't have been guilty of a part in the baseball scandal.

Middleton Guilty Verdict Rendered Stuart Bank Case

Defense Moves for New Trial; Argument Will Be Heard Today.

WEST PALM BEACH, March 9.—After deliberation less than half an hour, the jury in the case of E. C. Middleton, charged with aiding in the robbery of the bank at Stuart, returned a verdict at 6:30 last night of guilty as charged in the indictment.

Immediately after the verdict was recorded, D. M. Goronto, counsel for the defense, motioned for a new trial and Judge Davis set this morning as the date for argument on the motion.

The case of the defense, centered around an attempt to prove that Middleton was in Avon Park, 75 miles from the scene of the robbery around 12 or 1 o'clock on May 12. The robbery, state's witnesses had testified, had occurred at 11:45 on that day. Defense witnesses who were in Avon Park on May 12, testified as to having seen the two boys, Middleton and Mobley, in a car in that city although their estimates of time varied from 12 noon to near 3 o'clock p. m.

CREW OF BRITISH VESSEL RESCUED FROM ICE FLOE
ST. JOHNS, N. F., March 7.—The crew of the British schooner, A. B. Barteaux, rescued from an ice floe three days after the vessel was crushed by the pack, were brought here today, partly frozen and exhausted, by the Norwegian steamer Tark, which picked them up ten days ago and had been fighting the floes since to get the wrecked men ashore. The fact of their vessel's foundering, of their three days' exposure and their rescue by the Tark had preceded the men of the Barteaux to port by radio, but that account fell short of telling the story of their experiences.

Captain Henry James, with both legs frozen and in danger of amputation, said he and his six men quit their ship February 20, after she had become surrounded by the ice. They had left New York February 5, with anthracite for this port. On the morning of the twentieth the floes folded in on the little schooner, then a huge mass of ice cut through the vessel's bow. The skipper said he had barely time to call his men together and get over the side with a small boat when the Barteaux went down. They managed to keep themselves safe in a floe, but they found they were without food. There was no vessel in sight. The ice was so close they could not row although they had managed to preserve their boat. They were miles from land but they set out to haul the boat over the floes, hoping to find open water near shore. At nightfall, Captain James said, they huddled together in the boat for warmth. With no land in sight they decided to stay where they were and spent the next two foodless days there. The ice was thawed to give them water, vessels were sighted in the distance at times and the men made signals by waving a part of an oil coat at the end of an oar by day and at night set coats afire piece by piece, and signaled by flare. There was little left of the oil skins when rescue came on the morning of the 23rd. The Norwegian steamer Tark found the men barely able to display their signals, and Captain James was almost helpless. Three of the seamen were badly bitten by the cold.
