## Indicted Officers Remain On Job

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Gov. Reubin Askew has decided to allow the Sarasota County Commission — indicted on charges of conducting public business in private — to remain in office pending a trial next month.

Askew announced Wednesday he would not suspend the five commissioners accused of violating Florida's Government in the Sunshine Law. However, Askew urged them to act only on necessary matters between now and their scheduled July 7 court date.

The five were indicted last Thursday for allegedly meeting behind closed doors on May 3 at the home of Commissioner Irving Snyder. At the time, the indictments charged, they discussed the resignation of the Sarasota County administrator and the reappointment of a planning board member.

The Sunshine Law requires all public business to be conducted in the open and prohibits closed-door sessions except for semi-judicial meetings.

"With the prospect for an early disposition of this case, I believe the best course is to reserve any decision on suspensions pending outcome of the trial," said Askew.

While gubernatorial suspension of officials who have been indicted is usually considered traditional, Askew said "the overriding consideration is the need for Sarasota County to have the benefit of the orderly process of government during this short period before the trial."

Askew's office did not indicate what he might do if the trial is postponed to a later date.

Along with Snyder, Commissioners Kenneth Brumback, Daniel Howe, Larry Rhodes, and John Sata Jr. were all indicted for Sunshine violations.

## Blackburn Gambling Case Conflict Reported By Polk

Sheriff John Polk said today he does not know what time periods were said violated in the decision by Circuit Judge Tom Waddell that led to the jurist's decision to throw out all state evidence gathered by wiretapping a year old gambling case against reputed Mafia associate Harlan Blackburn and his associates, Clyde Lee and Matthew Smith.

Sheriff Polk admitted wiretapping the accused's telephones but said a court order had been obtained and signed by then Circuit Judge E. Thom Rumberger which authorized the tapping.

"We have been working with Orange County authorities and Orlando police," Polk disclosed.

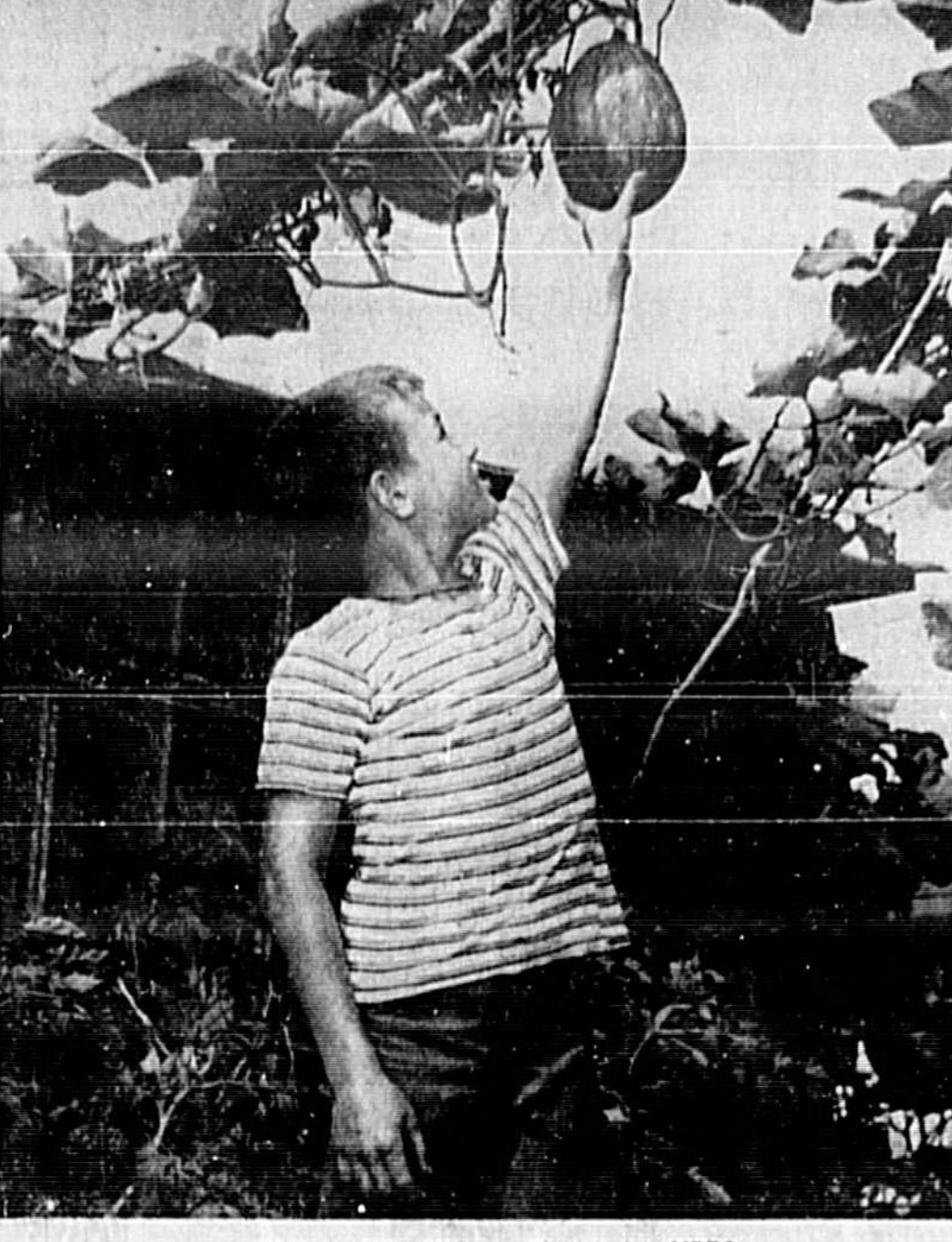
The sheriff added he had not had time to check in order to determine where the court order was violated but stressed he had the utmost respect for Judge Waddell and "if he says there was a reason for throwing out the evidence, I am sure he is correct."

Orange County solicitor Rom Powell, saying the case rested on the wiretap evidence, told newsmen, "We won't go to trial Monday." He said he had 30 days to appeal but probably would drop the case.

Over three days of hearings on the admissibility of the wiretap evidence, Waddell ruled it out because he said the tapes had not been placed immediately under a court seal and had been held by an unauthorized person.

The prosecutor noted that Blackburn and Lee are appealing five-year prison sentences on other gambling convictions and Smith a two-year sentence for possession of firearms by a convicted felon. Lee also faces other felony charges in Volusia County, he added.

Lee was recently released from a hospital after recovering from wounds received June 11 when six shots were fired into a telephone booth he was using on Interstate Highway 4. All the bullets struck him in the shoulders and chest. No arrests have been made.

## Rape Hearing Set

Arraignment has been set for June 29 in the case of James Leonard, charged with the rape of a 16-year-old girl on May 6.

A county grand jury returned an indictment on June 15 against Leonard.

The defendant is alleged to have defended the young girl by holding a knife to her throat, while her parents were sleeping in an adjoining bedroom. The victim told authorities that she was awakened by a young man who tapped her on the shoulder.

In another arraignment, Wallace Ogilby, charged with two counts of grand larceny and buying, receiving, or aiding in the concealment of stolen property, entered a "not guilty" plea to both counts. Trial is set for July 26.

Set for arraignment on June 29 are the following defendants: Steven Kierstead, charged with grand larceny, entered a guilty plea to the lesser offense of B&E with intent to commit a misdemeanor; Steven Rowland, charged with grand larceny and John Cauley, charged with grand larceny.

## State Frees 2 Suspects

Edward Schweickert, Edw. Scott Cleared

The state rolls pressed (dropped) charges against several defendants docketed for trial this week and received guilty pleas to lesser offenses from others.

Charges of possession of a barbiturate against Edward Schweickert Jr. were nolle prossed, and in another case against the youth of breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony, grand larceny, the charges were dismissed.

Charges of rape against Edward Scott also were nolle prossed. Scott, 46-year-old Orlando resident, was charged with the rape of a 21-year-old Orlando teacher in March. She said that she was forced at gunpoint to accompany Scott as she waited for a bus at Church Street, Orlando, and was subsequently taken to a wooded area south of Forest City where she was assaulted.

The case of Ernest Daniel, charged with assault with intent to commit rape, was continued until Aug. 1. Daniel is charged in an incident involving a 15-year-old Geneva girl who was allegedly assaulted while she was swimming in a pool in the area.

A mistrial was declared by the court in the case of Ronald Reese, charged with two counts of sale and possession of narcotics in three separate informations. A six-man jury had been selected when the defense moved for the mistrial.

Charges were nolle prossed against Gary Thomas, charged with two counts of sale and possession of a central nervous system stimulant in three cases. In a fourth case, in which Thomas was charged on two counts of sale and possession of narcotics, the charge of sale of narcotics was nolle prossed and Thomas entered a guilty plea to possession of narcotics. He was remanded to custody and a pre-sentence investigation ordered by the court.

Butler Armstrong, charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony, grand larceny, entered a guilty plea to the lesser offense of B&E with intent to commit a misdemeanor; petty larceny and is under PSI. Also entering a guilty plea to petty larceny was Stephen

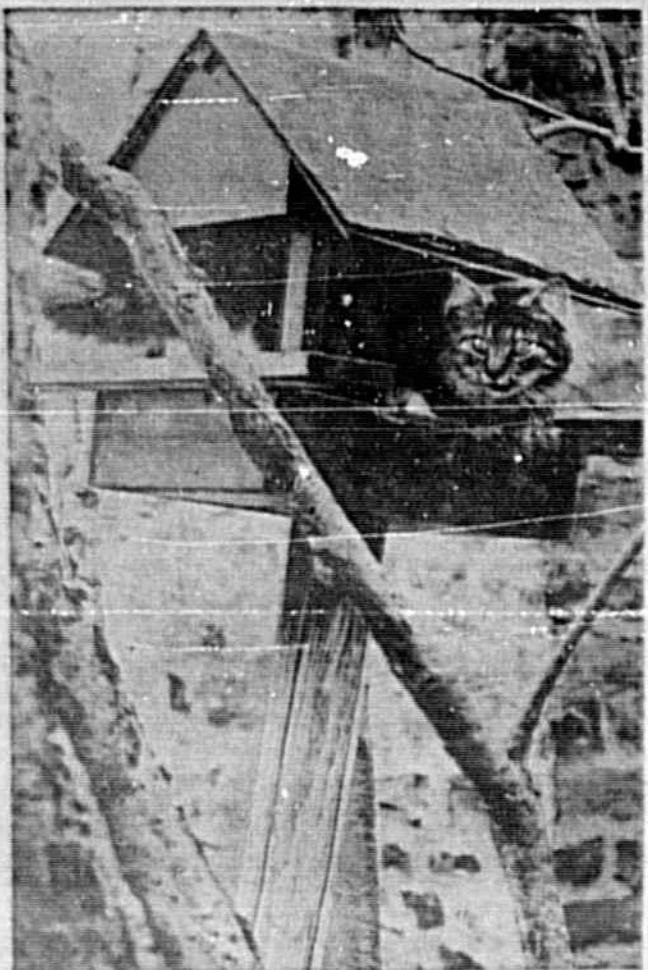

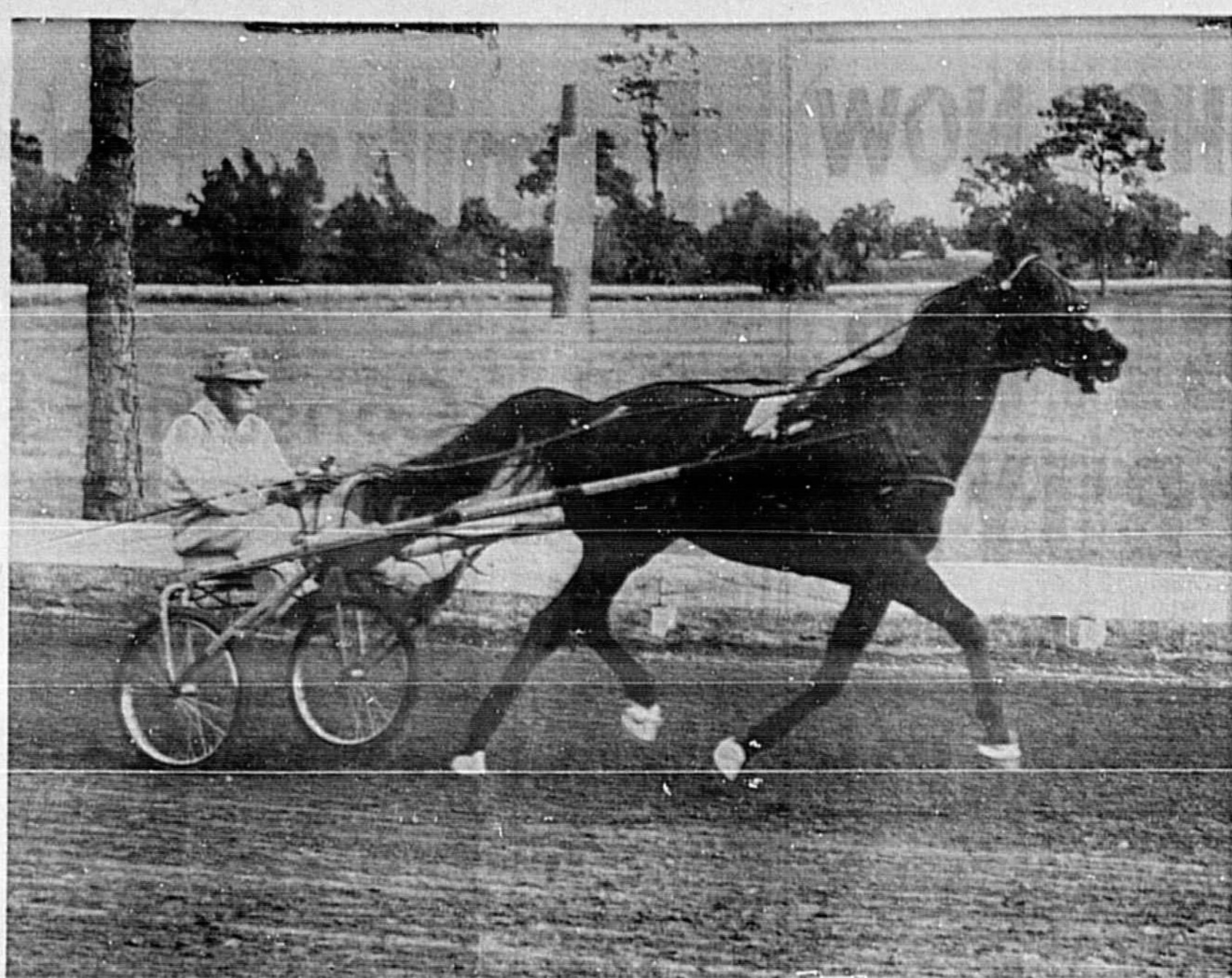

# Red Cross Urges Boatmen Learn To Swim Better

About half the nation's estimated 60 million boat users can not swim well enough to save their lives if they should fall into deep water accidentally, the American Red Cross warned today.

In 1970, boating accidents caused 1,805 drownings, in the U.S. Most of these fatalities could have been prevented if the victims had been able to swim or if proper safety precautions had been taken to avert the accident.

On the eve of National Safe Boating Week (July 4-10), promoted annually by the President of the United States, your Red Cross urges boat owners and their guests who are non-swimmers or poor swimmers to enroll in tuition-free Red Cross swimming and lifesaving courses.

The Red Cross is steadily expanding its small craft training program in schools, colleges, and summer camps. It has developed a method of instruction by which theory can be taught in classrooms in cold weather, with practice sessions on the water following in the spring and summer. It is recommended that boat operators follow these safeguards to reduce boating accidents.

1. Carry a Coast Guard approved life jacket for every-one aboard. Insist that weak swimmers and non-swimmers wear them at all times, and that all others wear them in hazardous weather conditions.

2. When one boat is overtaking another, the boat being overtaken has the right of way.

3. Sailboats to windward must keep out of the way of power boats which cannot operate outside the channel.

4. Power boats should give way to manually propelled or sail boats to leeward. All skippers conscious of safety should make a point of knowing the swimming abilities of their passengers. If a person goes overboard accidentally, rescue procedures are based on the ability or inability of the person in the water to help him self. If the man overboard can be thrown to him, the boat is to swim, a life saving device can be used, the victim swims to it and is pulled aboard.

5. When a weak or non-swimmer falls overboard, first swing the stern away from the side from which he fell. Toss him a lifesaving device and promptly maneuver the boat back to him. Keep a close watch on him at all times and make the approach as you would do to a mooring at reduced speed and slightly to windward, if possible. Shut off the motor within a few feet of the victim, and bring him aboard.

6. All boatmen should know first aid, including how to give artificial respiration because boats operate far from medical attention. Most Red Cross chapters teach first aid, swimming, and life saving, and some teach small craft safety as well. Call the Central Florida Chapter 425-5421 in Orlando and 322-4125 in Sanford for details about classes.

7. Check weather bureau forecasts before taking your run out on open water. Take a transistor radio along to keep posted on changing weather conditions.

8. Most boats if swamped or capsized will stay on the surface, so stay with the boat in such incidents until help arrives. But in dangerous or extremely cold water, try to get to shore as fast as possible.

9. The following are basic rules of the waterways:

1. When boats are meeting in or nearly in a head on position, each should keep to the right.

2. When boats are in a crossing position, the one on the right has the right of way.

## 6c Stamps Valuable

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Stamp collector Clifford Cunningham, a double amputee, bought some six-cent stamps a while back just to use for letters—but as he unfolded them he discovered that the perforations were in the wrong place and the colors were a bit off.

Instead of being perforated at the edge, the 100 stamps have perforation holes that run through the number 6.

In addition, the stripes in the American flag design contain a blue tint instead of the traditional red color, and there is a blue tint on the background which is supposed to be white.

Cunningham, 38, said he withheld news of his six-cent stamps until the new eight-cent stamps were introduced so that the government would be less likely to print more like them and destroy the value of his roll.

He said stamp collectors already have offered him thousands for it.

Cunningham said the stamps are selling for \$30,000 each according to the latest catalogue.

The California Humane Council, a statewide coordinating group of Humane Societies (4421 Canoga Ave., Woodland Hills, Calif. 91364) has just released a report based on a statewide survey to determine the amounts of money spent and the number of animals destroyed in 1970. Following are some of the shocking statistics:  
Last year California taxpayers spent no less than \$30 million, and possibly double that sum on animal control. In addition, it is estimated that at least \$30 million was spent by humane societies and private citizens to board, feed and eventually destroy millions of homeless cats and dogs.

# 'Alligator Alley' May Have 'To Go' Road Said Menace To 'Glades'

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Alligator Alley, modern man's shortcut trail across the Everglades, may have to go to preserve the ancient wilderness, the State Cabinet was told Tuesday.

Ecology professor Arthur R. Marshall, head of the University of Miami's division of applied ecology, submitted a report to the Cabinet detailing the menace to the Glades of creeping civilization.

Marshall also proposed that the state "fill in Canal C-111 from U.S. Highway 1 to Barnes Sound," and "re-examine all existing or proposed drainage canals with a view toward eliminating those which are not needed."

Marshall proposed a 20-point program for "repair" of the Glades area, including the curtailment of canal construction and possibly filling in old canals which carry waters to the coast.

Marshall's plan also called for the restoration of water quality in the Kissimmee lakes through improved sewage treatment and occasional lowering of water levels to allow oxidation of accumulated bottom ooze.

# Businesses Removal Seen SR 436 Growth Eeyed

DELAND — The traffic problem at the intersections of Highway 17-92 and SR 436 and SR 436 and Interstate 4 have solutions in sight. How long the solutions will be effective and when they can be put in effect depend on roads that have yet to be built and elusive federal money.

The solution to the overburdened SR 436 interchange on Interstate 4 was provided in a study prepared by Dr. Joseph A. Wattworth, transportation professor of the department of civil engineering at the University of Florida.

Wattworth studied the interchange, which during the morning and afternoon rush hours takes on the appearance of a traffic jam.

The success of the solution depends on the construction of the proposed beltline loop around the west side of the metropolitan Orlando area.

The DOT has included \$30,000 in the five-year road program to allow for the construction of additional southbound on-ramps and north bound off-ramps.

DOT officials say they are not sure how they are going to handle the fly-over and that is the reason the exact amount of funds agreed to be limited.

Seminole County schools' lunchroom program ended the year with a cash balance of \$14,418.13 on hand.

Charlotte Whitmore, county director of school lunchroom services, said there were several reasons for this marked improvement.

Another renovation that had a hand in the more efficient lunchroom operation is the arrangement with Orange, Volusia and Putnam Counties, which permit all four counties to join in purchasing at a lower cost.

Another reason given for the improved lunchroom program is the increase in the amount of reimbursement given the county by the federal government for the free lunch program for those students, who are financially unable to purchase meals at the regular prices.

Perhaps another change that amounted for some of the financial improvement was the discontinuance of the discount meal tickets, which previously allowed students a small savings, if they bought a meal ticket the first day of the week for that week's lunches.
