Survey Under Way By Forest Service

A survey of Florida's forest resources is underway.

Crews from the Florida Forest Service moved into Seminole County last Saturday, and will work in this area for three or four weeks.

Information gathered will show the rate at which timber is being grown, as well as its use in Florida's wood industry. Estimates of forest damage from fire, insects and diseases will be made.

The year-long field work is a joint effort of the state and the U. S. Forest Service, and will cover the entire state.

Policemen Oppose Auto Integration

DETROIT (UPI)—Detroit police went on a "ticket strike" today and Police Commissioner Herbert W. Hart conceded that putting white and Negro officers together in squad cars was one of the prime factors.

Integration of policemen in squad cars was begun on March 1, which coincided with the expiration of 1958 automobile license plates.

The "ticket strike" became quickly apparent when the number of tickets issued to motorists without 1959 plates dropped radically.

In the 24 hours following expiration of the 1958 tags, 72 motorists were ticketed for failing to have their 1959 plates. Last year, the number of tickets issued for the same offense totaled 1,066 in the same period.

"We did anticipate some difficulty with integration as you always have whenever changes are made," he said. "But we will wait and see what develops on this matter."

Plans for the "ticket strike" to demonstrate opposition to integration reportedly were laid at a secret meeting of white police officers a week ago.

"I guess the department just isn't ready for integration yet," said one.

Nation In Clutch Of Nasty Weather

Cold weather maintained its grip on parts of Dixie early today in the wake of snow squalls that dumped up to four inches in North Carolina.

Overnight readings in the 30s chilled sections of northern Florida and Georgia, although temperatures in the 40s predominated over most of Florida and Georgia.

A storm system that hit Florida with high winds powered up the coast Monday into the Carolinas, dumping snow, sleet and rain in its path.

Schools were closed at Winston, N. C., when the snow depth hit four inches. Winston-Salem, N. C., measured two inches and Charlotte 1.8 inches. The snow melted as temperatures climbed above freezing during the day.

Cold weather also invaded the nation's central portion, pushing into the Great Lakes and south into central Texas. Light snows occurred during the night from the eastern Dakotas across Minnesota and into the northern Great Lakes. The heaviest amounts fell along the northern shore of Lake Superior.

Police Seek Link In Safe Robberies

CLEARWATER (UPI)—Police sought today to link a \$150,000 robbery of a fashionable resort hotel safe with a series of safe-robbings along the Florida coast.

Pinellas County Sheriff Don Genung said his men were seeking to determine if the three masked men, carrying revolvers and wearing yachting outfits, who robbed the Safety Harbor Spa safe were part of the same gang which has hit safes in St. Petersburg, Tampa, Bradenton, Sarasota and Fort Myers.

Meanwhile, hotel officials worked on an inventory to determine exactly how much cash, checks and jewelry were stolen. Best estimate was \$150,000 or more.

The safe robbings occurred the night watchman and telephone operator at 2:30 a. m. Monday. The technique was similar to that used to crack the other safes in the area, the last one occurring Feb. 21 at Mans Hotel Department Store in the heart of downtown Sarasota.

Motor Club Votes To Fight Gas Tax

TAMPA (UPI)—The Peninsula Motor Club, representing 46,000 Floridians, will oppose any move to increase taxes paid by car owners.

Directors of the American Automobile Assn. affiliate voted Monday not to support any such tax until the state changes its policy and earmarks license tag revenue for highway purposes.

The board said 26 states now protect their gasoline and license tag revenues by constitutional amendment. It proposed such an amendment prohibiting diversion of motor vehicle taxes to purposes other than road building.

President and General Manager Marvin L. Holloway said "as long as Florida continues to divert over 31 million dollars of tax money annually by automobile owners into the channels not directly serving the already overburdened motorist who pays such taxes in the first place, the state will never be able to provide its citizens and visitors with safe, adequate bridges and highways."

The directors noted that the State Road Department is proposing that the Legislature pass a law allowing local governments to increase the gas tax from seven to eight cents a gallon, with the eighth cent being used at local levels.

The board also urged proper legislation if radar speed checks are to be used; recommended juvenile traffic offenders get the same punishment as adults; urged establishment of a traffic court of record in every county; and asked for issuance of drivers licenses for three years with expiration corresponding to holders' birth months.

Police Closing In, Killer Takes Life

LEAKSVILLE, N. C. (UPI)—A man sought in three states for slaying a police officer committed suicide in his sister's home near here Monday night while police yielded for him to surrender.

Douglas Barker, 37, turned his 32-caliber revolver on himself while standing in a kitchen closet in the home of a sister, Mrs. Will Ruberson. Officers were on the front doorstep and surrounding the house at the time.

Barker, also Kermit Jackson, Sammy Jackson and James Ward, was wanted for the murder of Police Chief Amos Morris of Mannington, W. Va.

Highway Patrolman James A. Parker had spotted the wanted man's car parked in front of the home and summoned assistance.

"I had a reserve deputy with me at the time when we spotted the car," Parker said. "We called in for assistance and more deputies from Leaksville came out."

"We knew he was in there and we yelled at him to come out and give himself up. I was on the front doorstep and then I heard a couple of shots. We went on in and found him in the closet where he had been hiding since around 4:30."

Farmers Reverse Milk Control Plea

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The state Milk Commission apparently has won a major battle in its efforts to keep milk controls in the Tallahassee area.

Twenty six Lafayette County dairy farmers presented a petition Monday notifying the Leon Circuit Court they have changed their minds and want to keep Commission controls.

Their surprise action may derail the drive of the local Producers Assn to end controls.

Some 24 per cent of the dairy farmers in the area, including the Lafayette dairymen, secured a Circuit Court injunction last month prohibiting the Commission from regulating the industry. But withdrawal of the 26 names from the petition may mean the petition is invalid because it does not have backing of the required 51 per cent of the area's producers.

Judge Hugh Taylor agreed to accept the farmers' petition asking their names be stricken from the original petition.

D. B. Odum, commission auditor, testified that if the producers were allowed to withdraw their names, the petition would not represent the needed 51 per cent to take the area from under Commission control.

Judge Taylor said he would make no decision until all sides of the case were heard.

Nude In Ad Risky, Movie Firm Told

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Post Office Department advised a movie company today it could display the nude charms of a beautiful Spanish woman in a newspaper ad—but only at its own risk.

The department delicately side-stepped, giving advance approval—or disapproval—of the use of Francisco Goya's famous painting, "The Maja Nude," to advertise a movie.

The picture, which hangs in the Prado in Madrid, shows a buxom Spanish Duchess stretched full-length on a couch.

The movie company asked the department for an "advisory ruling" on whether newspapers that carried the proposed ad would be barred from the mails.

General counsel Herbert H. Warburton replied that the department couldn't very well rule on the ad until it actually had appeared in a publication that had gone through the mails.

Warburton said a lot would depend on how the picture was used and what kind of captions appeared with it.

Despite the controversy, "The Maja Nude" is considered an artistic masterpiece.

Mercury To Climb Then Plunge Again

LAKELAND (UPI)—A cold front pushed temperatures down into the 30s in northern Florida today and swept chilly air through the southern end of the state.

The Weather Bureau said the mercury would climb into the 70s in the afternoon, contrasting with Monday's high which lingered in the 60s.

But another cold front was moving southward through the Mississippi Valley and forecasters said it would usher in sub-normal temperatures for the third consecutive night.

Temperatures at 5 a. m. ranged from 37 in Daytona Beach to 36 in Tallahassee and 30 in Key West. In Miami it was 50. Other temperatures were: Orlando, 48; Fort Myers, 47; Cross City, 39; Pensacola, 34.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress was urged today to do its bit to curb the spread of rock and roll music.

Rep. Torbert H. Macdonald (D-Mass.) charged that a new post office policy is subsidizing "the purveyors of this musical nonsense."

Unless the Post Office Department changes the policy, he said, Congress should write a law revising it.

Macdonald attacked a ruling last Aug. 1 which made all phonograph records eligible for lower postal rates as fourth-class mail. This was possible under a law passed by Congress last year, Macdonald said, however, the law was intended to cover educational material and not all types of music.

A Post Office Department spokesman said the department had "no alternative" because "we're merely carrying out the law as set by Congress."
