### Personal income up 0.6 percent

WASHINGTON - Personal Income increased 0.6 percent in March, the second consecutive gain, while spending rose 0.3 percent, the government said today in a report suggesting

continued economic recovery. The Commerce Department said incomes totaled a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$4.99 trillion. The March advance followed a 1 percent gain in February, revised down slightly

from an earlier estimate of 1.1 percent. Spending, meanwhile, totaled a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$4.15 trillion. March marked the fifth consecutive spending increase and came after a 0.8 percent rise the month before. The February gain had been estimated at 0.9 percent.

### Amtrak train derails

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. - An Amtrak train and derailed, killing at least one person and injuring an undetermined number of others. authorities said.

'it appears to be an Amtrak train collided with a dump truck" at a crossing, said police Lt. Carl Burt. He said there was at least one fatality.

Lynn James, a spokeswoman for the city Fire Department, said some people were injured but she did not have an exact figure.

The Colonial, en route from Newport News to New York, consisted of an engine and five passengers cars, all of which derailed, said Amtrak spokesman Cliff Black. Three cars were on their sides, two were upright and the engine was in a ravine.

The accident occurred about 8:25 a.m. 19 miles west of Newport News, Black said.

He said the train had 92 passengers and four

Spokeswomen for Riverside Hospital in Newport News and two other hospitals said they had been notified of the accident, but had not received any injured.

The train had stops in Richmond, Washington, Philadelphia and New York.

SANFORD - Those concerned with Seminole High School say they will do whatever they have to to make sure the school is not the victim of low enrollment.

Though the board had been asked by parents to rezone the district schools to bring Seminole High School up to capacity, they decided last night to spend \$3,000 to survey middle school students to find out if they wouldn't rather have the school be a magnet school.

A magnet school is one which offers special program of study, be it rigorous academics or a vocational program, to students from across

the district. "I'm an educator," said principal Gretchen Schapker. "I will work to ensure the success of whatever program they decide on,"

Schapker had no other comment on the board's decision last night.

Amelia Royster, co-chairman of the Sanford Committee's education committee, said she believed the board not only needed to initiate a magnet program, but also to immediately add students through re-

"Rezoning is an inexpensive and immediate solution to the problem. but we need more." Royster said.

### Gooding's want's HQ in Lake Mary

LAKE MARY - The Gooding's Supermarket corporate office was officially confirmed as a possible new business for Lake Mary. The proposal was revealed in a Planning and Zoning

meeting last night. A site of over 40 acres bordering on Interstate 4 is being considered for the Gooding's main headquarters operation.

The land is presently owned by the Coven Family Trust of Mt. Dora, represented by Paul W. Waters, Realtor, of Orlando.

Waters had requested a rezoning on behalf of the Trust, from A-1. Agriculture, to M-2A. Heavy

Commercial Industrial. According to Lake Mary City Planner Matt West, "Gooding's real estate manager Donald Jones made the official announcement during the meeting last night." He added, "Jones envisioned aving the corporate headquarters as well as a refrigeration warehouse on the Lake Mary site."

West commented, "Mr. Jones indicated Gooding's already has a refrigeration warehouse south of Orlando, and this one would serve the northern

So far however, there has been no indication of

the price Gooding's may be paying for the land, or any projections regarding the economic and employment benefits that may be beneficial to Lake Mary should the proposal become a reality.

Jones was unavailable for comment this morning at his office in the present Gooding's corporate offices, located at 483 Montgomery Place in Altamonte Springs.

### Midges: They're back, of course

SANFORD - The annual spring invasion of the midges is beginning. The bugs are starting to appear along the Sanford lakefront.

Dr. Arshad Ali commented, "I don't believe the midges will be as plentiful this year as in the past." Ali is professor of aquatic entomology and ecology with the University of Florida's Research Center on Celery Avenue.

"We had very good rains last year," he said. "which cuts down on their numbers." He added. "The rains

also made the waters of Lake Monroe and the St. Johns River run faster and that may have flushed out many of the nutrients they need for food."

Midges, or blind mosquitoes as they also are commonly called, generally make their appearance in the Central Florida area in late April through May. They generally return for a few weeks in October or November.

By their very numbers, they cause a nuisance,

especially on vehicle windshields. All commented that eradication is difficult. "There is no one single method that would work," he said. "We □See Midges, Page 5A

#### NRA elects Florida woman

TALLAHASSEE - The election of a Florida woman as second vice president of the National Rifle Association marks a historic milestone, an NRA official said.

Marion Hammer. Florida's leading gun lobbyist, is the first woman chosen to hold national NRA office. The job puts her in line for the NRA presidency in four years. "Women and their concerns will be increasingly important to NRA in the years ahead," said Wayne LaPierre, NRA executive vice president. calling Hammer's election a "historic milestone."

NRA's 75-member board voted Hammer, executive director of the NRA Florida affiliate. Unified Sportsmen of Florida, into office Monday at a convention in Salt Lake City.

### Rape conviction sentencing delayed

MIAMI — Sentencing was delayed for a second time for former heavyweight boxing champion Trevor Berbick on a rape conviction while another psychiatrist examines him to determine his mental competency.

Circuit Judge Thomas Wilson postponed sentencing earlier

this month after Berbick made a rambling, 45-minute courtroom speech proclaiming his innocence.

The judge ordered a mental evaluation, but two psychiatrists appointed by the court reached different conclusions. Wilson ordered preparation of a third report Tuesday, and sentencing was reset for May 12.

Berbick was convicted in February of sexually assaulting a 26-year-old family baby-sitter at her Miami apartment after driving her home. The fighter testified the woman willingly had an affair with him.

The prosecution is seeking a 51/2-year prison term set in state sentencing guidelines.

#### Government 'check is in the mall'

MIAMI - "The check is in the mail" is a common way to stall a payment, but the U.S. government shouldn't be using it to explain a lost \$3 million settlement check, a Navy technician has complained.

The government owes the money to Ivan Grayson for the deaths of his wife and two daughters. They were killed in 1987 when their car plunged off a Navy pier in Key West.

"The government lost the case. They lost the appeal. And now they've lost the check," said Grayson's attorney Ira Leessield. "It tends to shake you up a little bit. I hope we don't

get involved in any more wars." He said a prosecutor told him the government sent the check to the U.S. attorney's office in Miami around April 8. It wasn't sent by registered mail.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Sonia O'Donnell said Tuesday the check originated with the U.S. Treasury but was never received by her office. Treasury has now stopped payment on the missing payment, she said.

#### Only plane breaks down

FORT LAUDERDALE — About 100 people holding Florida Air tickets for flights between Fort Lauderdale and Nassau were grounded when the airline's only plane broke down.

"Look, you're never guaranteed transportation," said Jack Robinson, president of Florida Air, which canceled four weekend flights due to mechanical problems on its 19-seat turboprop. "We suspect most of them made other arrangements.

Some people were forced to stay extra nights when the round-trip flights lapsed Saturday night in Nassau, while others bought one-way tickets on other airlines.

Travelers won't get any reimbursement from Florida Air for the skipped flights, but their unused tickets will be good for any flight up to a year from now.

Florida Air offers a discount \$50 round-trip ticket, and prices

range up to \$120.

### Regular guy visits presidents

MIAMI - Robert Roman is not politically connected, holds no office and makes only small campaign contributions. By his own admission, he is a regular guy.

But on Monday, George Bush becomes the third consecutive

president to play host to Roman, 35, an insurance broker from Pembroke Pines. Roman says he doesn't do anything fancy to get invited to

the White House. Handmade signs seem to work pretty well.

Last month. Roman figured out where to stand during a Bush political rally in Hislesh. He cheered and shouted for Bush, holding sloft a hand-lettered sign on yellow poster board. It read: "Welcome President Bush. You are great. Pis, invite

me to the White House." When Bush finally approached, Roman was ready. In 1986, Roman waved a handmade sign at President Reagan in Miami, asking to visit the White House. He and his family

### Group protests execution Friday

TALLAHASSEE - Fighting violence with violence can't succeed, protesters argued as attorneys tried to delay Friday's scheduled execution of Edward Dean Kennedy.

"It's a failure. Killing is wrong no matter who does it." Thomas Horkan Jr., director of the Florida Catholic Conference, told 25 members of the Tallahassee Coalition Against the Death Penalty.

The group encircled the state seal in the center of the Capitol Rotunda and prayed and sang Tuesday.

Kennedy, 48, is scheduled to die in the electric chair on Friday.

## Suit filed, problems with Teen-Aid found

JACKSONVILLE - A state review of the Teen-Aid sexeducation program says it contains medical inaccuracies, outdated theories, misrepresentations and bias.

The review was released Tuesday, the same day that Planned Parenthood of Northeast Florida along with 17 parents and students filed a lawsuit to stop Duval County schools from using Teen-Aid.

"Our children have been sold out," said Linda Lanier, executive director of Planned Parenthood of Northeast Florida, who charged that Teen-Aid doesn't teach either birth control or safe

LeAnna Benn, national director of Teen-Aid in Spokane. Wash., said she hadn't seen the lawsuit.

However, she disagrees with the suit's allegations that the curriculum is incomplete, inaccurate, biased and sectarian.

"What Teen-Aid does is instill healthy values in kids," she said. The study of Teen-Aid was conducted by the Florida Department of Education's Center for Prevention and Student Assistance and the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services.

"The overall tone of the curricula is one of sensationalism. which appears to be an attempt to produce fear rather than to abuse.

provide information upon which to base healthy and positive life decisions," said Dr. Charles S. Mahan, deputy secretary for health and state health officer, in a letter to Education Com-

mission Betty Castor. Me. Benn disagreed with the criticisms of the program.

"There is a censorship agenda going on," she said.

The program, she said, was based on the best information available when the curriculum was written in 1988. An update of the text materials, including information on AIDS, is ongoing.

'We teach kids personal development skills rather than condoms," she

The state review said the material contained several medical inaccuracies, such as, "The only way to avoid pregnancy is to abstain from genital contact."

There are many safe and effective forms of contraception. reviewers wrote.

The review also challenged a statement that more than 20 percent of sexually active teens have tested positive for chlamydia. It was not backed up by documentation, the review

Teen-Aid also uses inaccurate or outdated theories on condom use and failure, high risk AIDS groups, and spread of the HIV virus, the review stated.

### **Environmentalists** balk

### Navy calls off plan to test explosives in Florida Keys

TALLAHASSEE - Pressure from state officials and environmentalists has prompted the U.S. Navy to call off its plan to test explosives in a newlyestablished federal marine sanctuary off the Florida Keys, Navy officials say.

The Navy has told Gov. Lawton Chiles the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary won't be disturbed. Instead, officials plan to find somewhere else to detonate mine-sweeping charges planned for use to clear mines laid in the Persian Gulf

last year during the war.
"We're out of the marine sanctuary altogether." Dan Probert, a Key West-based Navy

official who oversees weapons operations, told the Sun-Sentinel in Fort Lauderdale for today's editions. "Obviously we have to live with our neighbors and we really do try to get along with everybody."

Last fall. Navy officials informed state officials they planned to ignite up to 30 charges weighing between 70 and 1,900 pounds in waters west of the Marquesas Keys, off Key

The sanctuary reportedly was considered for the testing because it resembles conditions in the Persian Gulf.

But President Bush declared

the 2.600-square-mile area a federal preserve in November 1990, offering government protection for the sanctuary's abundance of marine life.

The area draws thousands of boaters, divers and fishing enthusiasts yearly.

"We haven't really told the governor's office that we will never try to use the sanctuary," Probert said. "But we don't plan to use it now."

Instead, he said, the Navy in preparing environmental studies to find suitable testing areas in Florida and other states along the Atlantic Coast or along the Gulf of Mexico.

"The Florida Keys are without a doubt environmentally sensitive," said Paul Johnson. an environmental policy analyst for Chiles. "We felt from the beginning that the Navy really should take another look at

Environmentalists also hailed the Navy decision.

"How about that? The federal government has shown a little bit of sense," said Russ Rector, head of the Fort Lauderdalebased Dolphin Freedom Foundation. "A lot of people were applying pressure subtilely and trying to tell the Navy that they were getting ready to step in a bucket of worms."





### Sanford does fill housing opening

SANFORD - The Sanford City Commission on Monday postponed filling a vacany on the Airport Authority but did fill an opening on the Housing Authority.

During Monday night's City Commission meeting, Mayor Bettye Smith said she had been contacted by a number of people either recommending other persons, or seeking the position themselves on the Airport **Authority Board of Directors.** 

"I've been writing down all of the names," she said. "but I haven't had the opportunity to look into their qualifications to the point where I'm ready to make any recommenda-

The position became available through

the resignation of Bob Hattaway. Hattaway was appointed by Governor Lawton Chiles to the Orlando Airport Authority.

Smith would not reveal any of the names she had complied. "I suggest writing up a list for the Commissioners to consider," she proposed. "In that way, I believe we'll be doing right in selecting the best person."

Commissioner Lon Howell suggested that the other members of the commission may also wish to add names to the Mayor's list of candidates.

Smith said, "I've been in contact with Airport Authority Chairman A.K. Shoemaker, and he told me the board can continue to operate with its present eight members until we can add another person."

Mayor Smith said today, "I'm certain we will have a list of names from which to make our selection by the next City Commission meeting." The meeting is scheduled for May

The second proposal was to elect a member to the Housing Authority Board of Commissioners. The person will replace Alberta Detreville, whose term will expire on May 20., and would not be eligible for reelection.

Three names had been submitted by the

Housing Authority for consideration. Commissioner A.A. McClanahan commented, "I suggest we hold off on making this appointment until we can get a profile of these people." He observed, "I can't say as I know any of them.

Commissioner Bob Thomas, however, moved to accept Rosemary Charles, of 534 William Clark Court, to serve on the board. "I think she will be a good choice," Thomas said, "and I would highly recommend the City appoint her to this position.'

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein seconded the nomination. "I know her," he said, "and I believe she is very concerned about the problems facing the Housing Authority, and I think she will make an excellent member

The recommendation of Rosemary Charles was then approved by a unanimous vote of the Commission.

### House fire victim identified

Middleton was critical of the burgiar bars used in the house. "This ien't the first time some-thing like this has happened," he said. "If people would only learn that the only kind of safe burglar bars to be used are those which have ways to open them from the inside in case of

emergencies," he added. Meanwhile, a fire just a few blocks away from the Emling home is also under investigation. The old two story Masonic Lodge, on North Street at S.R. 427, was found to be burning. just four hours after firemen

responded to the Emling home.
Middleton said the building had been closed for the past three or four years. "We are also continuing our investigation into this fire," Christian said today. "We have a number of questions that remain unanswered about the cause of the blaze." He could not determine how long either of the two investigations would

NASA chief Daniel S. Goldin said Pearson is committed to "accomplishing the mission safer, faster, better and in a cost-effective manner."



### Era ends

Heathkits are no more, and that's bad news for thousands of baby boomers who grew up using those do-it-yourself sets to build their own radios and televisions — not to mention oscilloscopes, voltmeters and other electronic exotics.

The heyday for Heath Co. was in the 1950s and '60s, when Heathkits, along with A.C. Gilbert's chemistry and erector sets, taught kids the basics of electronics, chemistry and engineering. There's no telling how many of today's Silicon Valley fortunes began with a youngster trying to wire the woofers and tweeters of what used to be called a hi-fi back in the days before stereo and compact discs. But it's a matter of history that Apple Computer sprang from a group of Heathkit hobbyists.

Heathkit's sales have declined steadily since 1981, which company president William E. Johnson attributes in part to the fact 'that ready-made imports are now so inexpensive. Another problem was the advent of the integrated circuit, which can replace as many as 432 separate components that diligent Heathkit builders used to assemble one by one.

But as Johnson points out, slipping in an integrated circuit just doesn't provide the challenge or the excitement of learning how things work and making it happen yourself.

Erector sets are still around, and kids today are certainly just as curious as ever. Many of those who might have bought Heathkits a generation ago now pour the same energy and enthusiasm into learning about computers. But figuring out how to write software programs requires some pretty sophisticated knowledge plus a substantial investment by Mom and Dad. With Heathkits, all you needed was a primary school reading level and a good soldering gun.

Best of all, with Heathkits, when the

Best of all, with Heathkits, when the moment finally came to throw the switch on your latest project, if nothing happened the company's experts were ready at the end of the phone line to help you make it work. "We won't let you fall," was Heath Co.'s unwavering pledge to its customers.

We don't get that kind of offer nearly enough anymore.

Listen up, sports fans. Forget about spring training for a second and pay attention to football. The instant replay. Like it? Well it's gone the way of leather belmets, thanks to the National Football League team owners who booted it maybe 80 yards on the far side of the end zone.

### Shrinking U.S.'s Japan obsession

How will Americans deal — psychologically — with the harsh economic events in Japan?

In 1987, when the American stock market took a plunge of 22 percent, it was regarded as an apocalyptic event, marking the end of a decade (of greed), the end of an era (the "American Century") and the end of a way of life (upward mobility). That sort of stuff went on, and on, even after the market went back up, and even when the market went up even further, which is where it is now.

The Japanese stock market did not go down 22 percent for just a few months. It went down over the last two-and-a-half years by more than 55 percent, which is enough percents to get you more than halfway to nothing.

It took a while for the Japanese economy to reflect the Japanese market (or vice versa). But economic growth in the first quarter of 1992 was negative. That is merely a signal of a recession, as are the record number of corporate failures, the crash of real estate values, and the bigger deficits due as expected tax revenues evaporate.

But there is something more at work as well. The fabulous (and sometimes criminal) overpricing of Japanese stocks had helped finance a global Japanese binge of acquisitions. And so, it was said, endiessly, that "the

Japanese are buying up America." Now, with market values decimated, Japanese banks will be calling loans secured by inflated stock prices,

and investors will be unloading some American assets. S&L-style. (Get ready for: "They're selling out Americal")

How will we deal with it? After all, for Americans this isn't just some two-bit, banana-split republic under cyclical economic strain. This is — Japan! — the nation that (we were told) was the next superpower, that would dominate the world, that would steal all our good jobs, that would "manage" America's decline — the nasty

nation that had become the personification of America's anticipatory anxiety.

This is — Japan! — subject of one of the world's silliest books. "The Rising Sun." by Michael Crichton, which reveals in exquisite detail how the conniving and dedicated Japanese are shrewdly taking over America. (If they're so shrewd, why are they in the soup now?)



The play concerns a Japanese corporate takeover in Australia, but a depressed Aussie emphasizes that there's no sense fighting back because "they got the money, the power, they even got the Yanks on the hop."

To be sure, the Yanks have been hop-headed about it, magnifying real problems to absurd levels. But why? Serious Japanese never deluded themselves that Japan could challenge America as the global superpower, economic or otherwise.

It's more an Assertant problems.

It's more an American psychological problem than Japanese. Obsessions fill felt needs, and psychiatrists look for reasons behind obsessions. (Why don't we have shrinks for countries?)

There are lots of reasons that so many Americans sold, and bought, the now-irrelevant myth of inexorable Japanese supremacy. It was a vehicle to urge us to do better, or to trash America, or for political use by the out-party.

### It's rapists who rape women

BOSTON — In the very last interview before his execution, America's most famous and least remorseful murderer, Ted Bundy, finally made a clean breast of things. He confessed: Porn made him do it. His psyche had been putty in the hands of pornography.

putty in the hands of pornography.

The "porn defense" did not elicit a whole lot of sympathy for the serial killer. It went down in the annals along with the "Twinkle defense" mounted by Dan White when he claimed that junk food made him kill San

Francisco's mayor.

But when the Senate returns from spring break, the judiciary committee will be considering a bill to let victims of sexual crimes do what Bundy tried to do: Biame the video, the movie, the book, the magazine. The bill is called the Pornography Victims Compensation Act and under its rules people who have been sexually abused or raped and the families of murder victims could sue the producers or distributers of pornographic material.

This bill is supported by an odd coalition of religious right and feminist left. Lock these folk in a room together and the only thing they would agree on is that pornography causes

great barm.

The traditional right has, of course, long opposed assually explicit material on the grounds of "decency," of good and evil. They have been anti-smut and pro-censorship since fiency littler's books had to be smuggled into

But now a group of feminist scholars attack pernography on the grounds of sexual politics. It isn't prurience that matters but power-lessness. Pornography is defined as material that degrades and therefore discriminates against women. Women are the victims not only of the hardcore video but of the cultural climate it helps create.

For many, sexual violence has become the defining issue of feminism. They see porn as a greater danger than censorship. In an argument between equal rights and free speech — equality comes first. Indeed many of the bills they authored — like one in the Massachusetts Legislature — go further than the one in Congress. They would allow lawsuits against any assually available massachuse.



I am sympathetic to the weather report on the cultural climate for women. It is progress of a sort that the old anti-porn rhetoric about "decency" has been replaced by the new rhetoric about "harm to women." The Republican aponsor of the bill. Sen. Mitch McConneil of Kentucky gets no stars as a friend of feminism. But even he has pitched this bill on the idea that "all women are victims in this culture of sexual violence."

Most American women would agree that everyday female freedom is curtailed more by the fear of violence than anything else. They described themselves as fed up with the images that spew from every media orifice. Fed up with slasher movies and MTV and even with the female characters that inhabit siteoms and advertising.

The prism held up by many of the anti-porn feminists has helped to read the subtext of media messages about hate and power. But what's good for consciousness-raising isn't

always good for the Obscene material is already illegal. So are rape, sexual abuse and murder. Obscenity is also. however, a vague and moving target defined by community standards. If we take this giant step and allow lawsuits by victims against filmmakers and videostores, the target is likely to become murkier. In these tawsuit-phobic days, book and video sellers may censor their own shelves of anything more sex-ual than Bambi.



For many, sexual violence has become the defining issue of feminism.

At the same time, the victims' compensation act won't deal with the vast problem in our culture: images of women that are appalling without being obscene. The bimbo, the bitch and the dits do their damage with a PG rating.

Nor will it deal with violence against women unless it is specifically sexual. If a vicitim of rape can blame a book, calling it a "how-to" manual, then why can't a victim of battering blame a movie? In a world of copycat crimes, why shouldn't the movie theater that showed "The Deerhunter" be liable for inciting suicide?

Both the right and left wing of this argument seem to agree on something that is highly debatable. They see pornography as the smoking gun of many a sex crime. That's as simplicatic as the idea that sex education promotes acx. And on that, the coalition of right and left, splits down the middle.

I too would like a good bit of climate control, a better, less threatening atmosphere for women. But at the risk of mimicking the gun lobby, it lan't movies that rape women, it's rapists.

### Wright discloses insider insights

FORT WORTH. Texas — Late one evening in 1987, then Speaker of the House Jim Wright was sitting at his desk in the East Wing of the Capitol. He was writing in his journal about a day that was all too typical. "To tell the truth, I am a little weary," he

noted.
"I have had callers all afternoon. The difficulty is to meet all the people who have a legitimate need to talk with you, to give them each enough time and not wind up always on somebody cise's schedule. ... I spend, it seems, such

spend, it seems, such a disproportionate share of my time listening to other people who want to tell me things. ..."

tell me things...."
This particular day, May 12, had its high moments — an "interesting" conversation with Woody Allen and Ginger Rogers. "She



looks young for her age. She and Woody Allen were here with some acreen writers of renown to talk about legislation which would protect their works from artificial coloring and other tampering on the part of people who come late and want to redo works of art," read his journal.

Our associate Dale Van Atta recently was granted wide access to more than a decade of Wright's private journals and other transcriptions. In previous columns we published excerpts that paint a picture of Wright as a flercely partisan and prideful politician, someone who felt awed by the heritage of the House but fretted about its future.

Wright's weariness often was brought on by colleagues who gave him little peace or privacy. On May 15, Wright explained his pet peeve in one journal entry: Everytime he set foot on the floor of the House to watch debate, members swarmed to "sit beside me to use the opportunity to talk with me about something in which they are interested. It makes it impossible for me to hear the debate."

Wright complained that this had made his own debate preparation problematic. These conditions, he relates, forced him to spend more and more "creative time" far from the House floor.

"They will come and sit awaiting my completion of a conversation with one member, or worse, will intrude into that conversation assuming that I'm just passing the time of day with the other member and have nothing important that he is discussing with me. ... If you're on the floor, you ought to be sitting there listening to the debate."

Wright's journals read like a time capsule for his relationship with former President Reagan, which seemed to evolve from reverential to revulsion.

On April 4, 1981, in the wake of the attempted assamination against former President Reagan. Wright hailed Reagan as a "good performer" for the humor and grace he showed in reassuring an anxious nation. "It was the act of a good man and a decent man and a man of good will. ... I frankly do not think (however) he knows about economics."

By Nov. 1, 1982, Reagan was an "alibi artist" who tried to pin too much blame on his predecessors.

By April 16, 1983, Wright wrote that he had lost all "regard for Reagan's acumen as a statesman. I think he is for the birds. ... I really think he is one of the poorest people that we've ever had in the White House for languaging what to do."

Wright found Reagan could be a stubborn negotiator who indulged in earthy language. "He (Reagan) was capable of colorful figures of speech ...." Wright states.

### Candidates begin primary wrap up

PHILADELPHIA - Bill Clinton is seeking endorsements today from Democratic congressional leaders as he begins to wrap up the presidential primary season with a convincing victory in Pennsylvania and clear signs that his character problems are diminishing.

"It was my kind of campaign, rooted in the desires of the Pennsylvania people and their yearning for a change." Clinton said Tuesday night after trouncing rival Jerry Brown 58 percent to 26 percent.

President Bush captured 77 percent of the primary vote to Patrick Buchanan's 23 percent. The White House called the race over, mathematically, but it counted delegates who won't be awarded until this weekend.

#### Seasoned politician ousted

PHILADELPHIA - Lynn Ycakel, furious with Washington's old-boy ways, beat a seasoned politician in her first run for office. Now the insurgent Democrat faces Republican Sen. Arien Specter, the target of her rage.

Yeakel, a fund-raiser for women's causes who jumped into the U.S. Senate race in anger over Specter's grilling of Anita Hill during the Clarence Thomas hearings, upset Lt. Gov. Mark Singel for the Democratic nomination Tuesday.

On the GOP side, Specter easily defeated state Rep. Stephen Freind, the Legislature's chief abortion foe.

People see me as a new voice, a person who will represent those who are under-represented or unrepresented," Yeakel. 50, said in her victory speech.

### Bush extends moratorium

WASHINGTON - President Bush is extending a regulatory moratorium that the administration claims has saved up to \$20 billion in red-tape costs but which critics say has derailed dozens of health, safety, consumer and environmental rules.

Bush, in a speech today, was expected to announce a three-month extension of the 90-day moratorium he announced Jan. 28 against regulations deemed unnecessary or expensive, White House officials said.

He also was expected to order a tighter review of regulations in order to cut rules that create big costs for businesses. And officials said he would order that far more regulations be subject to scrutiny under a cost-benefit analysis than currently

SAN FRANCISCO - More than 800 women who claimed they were denied jobs as agents with State Farm Insurance Cos. because of their sex will share \$157 million in the biggest sex-discrimination settlement in U.S. history.

"I think this sends a pretty powerful message. This is substantial money," said Guy Saperstein, the lawyer who headed the 13-year fight against the nation's largest carrier of auto and homeowner insurance.

The court-supervised settlement announced Tuesday ends a case that began with a lawsuit filed by Muriel Kraszewski, who said eight State Farm offices rejected her as an agent despite her 12 years of experience in insurance sales.

### Medical consumers threatened

By RICHARD L. YERNACI **Associated Press Writer** 

WASHINGTON - The government has yet to develop sound rules for medicines sold without a prescription, and consumers, especially the elderly, risk overdoses and adverse drug reactions, Congress was told.

"The consequences sometimes are life-threatening for elderly consumers overwhelmed by inaccurate, overly general or simply inadequate information," Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., said

The General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress, found that the Food and Drug Administration doesn't even know how many different non-prescription products are being sold in this country.

"You may ask, how could such a situation exist?" testified Kwai-Cheung Chan, a GAO official. "We found that although FDA requires manufacturing firms to notify it of the products they market, it was not until recently that FDA made the listing of non-prescription product listing files a priority issue."

FDA officials told the hearing they were moving toward completing an examination of all non-prescription drugs on the market, but they could not give any timetables on when that will

Many adults either don't read dosage instructions and warnings or consciously violate them in a desire to get enough of a good thing - with the result that they get too much, wit-nesses told a joint hearing of two House subcommittees.

"Consumers may become frustrated with the lack of destred effects and take two to four times the recommended dose to achieve more rapid and greater results," said Dr. Raymond Lake of the Uniformed Service University in Washington.

Wilma Phillips, a 76-year-old psychologist from Bethesda. Md., acknowledged that she wound up in the hospital with ulcers because of her habit of taking two aspirin every night for two years.




When she was in her teens, Cannavino developed an interest in health food. She experimented with recipes in her mother's kitchen. She says she really got serious abut cooking after she got married. Her husband's mother taught her how to cook Italian food.

"On Thursdays, I plan a menu and I keep it on the computer. It's a little file," she explains. "I pull it un and I revise it. There are things I have to buy every week need that week. If plans change, I can carry it over to the next

It takes her about 20 minutes to plan her meals and prepare a shopping list. To save even more



Cannavino loves to cook and she makes mealtimes something special. She pays attention to how food is presented and believes it is possible, even for busy people, to add elegant touches.

Cannavino's kitchen is a special place for her. She uses antiques from her grandmother along with all of the modern kitchen gadgetry. All of this is a part of her basic cooking philosophy and her best advice for other cooks. "Too many appliances take the art out of cooking." she warns, referring to the mix it and bake it type of bread makers that are currently popular. Having a good time while she cooks is just as important to her as beng creative. She advised, "Don't be afraid to express your ideas and your personality. Don't make cooking a chore. Make it fun. Don't make it a have to, everyday chore. Get in there and play."

Cannavino says this is great to take to a party. She likes to make a little extra to put over chicken breasts before baking in the oven for a quick supper dish.

the southern Gulf coast and New Orleans, thoughts of Creole cookery, great seafood dishes and delicious desserts made famous in the region still are fresh in my mind as I con-template the writing of this column. The sounds and sights of the Cafe Du Monde are still with me. The chicary coffee and beignets were wonderful (I ate a whole order myself). Shopping in the old market gave us an appetite for lunch. We found a busy restaurant/bakery. The food was good there, too. Later the streetcar took us to the garden district and to Comander's Palace, famous for fine New Orleans dining. Americans have a love affair with the tomato. And although it is a fruit, most of us regard the tomato as a vegetable, putting it No. 4 in the way of preference behind the potato, lettuce and, as such, the onion.

Tomatoes are in good supply throughout the year thanks to imports. From November to June, though, most of the tomatoes we find at stores come from Florida. A medium-sized tomato packs a nutritional wallop, since it is high in vitamin C and vitamin A. potassium. iron and dietary fiber. All this for a mere 35 calories, no less!

Fresh tomatoes add a special flavor to a variety of dishes. Use them to top homemade pizzas or put slices on fish fillets before baking. They're delicious filled with bread crumbs and baked, or added to a stir-fry.

Since pasta continues to grow in popularity, next time it is on the home menu, perk it up with a homemade sauce using fresh tomatoes as the base. It takes 30 minutes or less to make such a sauce, which is a flavorful change from commercially prepared sauces.

To get the most flavor from tomatoes, let them ripen fully on the kitchen counter or in a fruit bowl. Slices for salads or sandwiches taste best when used at room temperature.

DEAR READER: Osteoporosis is a disease primarily affecting the elderly. It is marked by a progressive loss of calcium from bones, making them brittle and susceptible to fractures. The tendency to osteoporosis may be inherited, but the affliction is worsened by inactivity, low levels of estrogen (occurring during and after menopause) and other hormonal factors that are, as yet, incompletely understood.

We all lose calcium from our bones during middle- and oldage; however, many experts believe that those of us who, at early ages, have low bonecalcium develop more severe osteoporosis as they grow older. Thus, the stage may be set during adolescence and the 20s for bone problems in old'age; individuals who consume large amounts of calcium and have rugged bones in their youth may not suffer significant osteoporosis later.

This is especially important for women during the reproductive years because pregnancy drains calcium from an expectant mother, whose bones may weaken if she doesn't use calcium supplements during her confinement - and later, too, if she nurses.

Osteoporosis itself is painless. However, once bones become washed-out' and demineralized, they crack more easily. In general, this takes two forms: frank fractures (such as a broken hip) and compression fractures. The pain caused by progressive crushing of the vertebral bones makes the latter condition extremely uncomfortable. Compression fractures are a major cause of handicap in the elderly.

Some of the easiest hands to play occur when one opponent has bid and the other has not. You start with a lot of useful information about the high-card distribution.

Cover the East-West cards in the diagram. Against your four-spade contract, West leads the heart king. East overtakes with the ace and returns the heart five, West cashing two more tricks in the suit while East discards the club three. West switches to the diamond two. How do you continue? Do you have any views about West's defense?

North's two-heart cue-bid showed a good hand, probably with spade support. South made a game-try with three clubs, which North was happy to accept. Both overbid slightly, but aggression often pays when you know that the opposition's

strength is concentrated in one hand. In this situation you can often make a game with fewer high-card points than are ustomarily required. Once East, who couldn't re-

spond, turns up with the heart ace. West is marked with the spade queen and diamond king. You should win trick four with dummy's diamond queen and cash the A-K of spades, hoping the queen drops. When she does. you consider it no more than

your due. West defended poorly. With his honor cards uncovered, he should have led another heart at trick four, hoping his partner had 10-x-x in spades. If East does have this holding and you ruff the fourth heart with dummy's spade inck, East scores his spade 10. However, if you discard from the dummy. East uppercuts with the spade 10, promoting West's queen.
