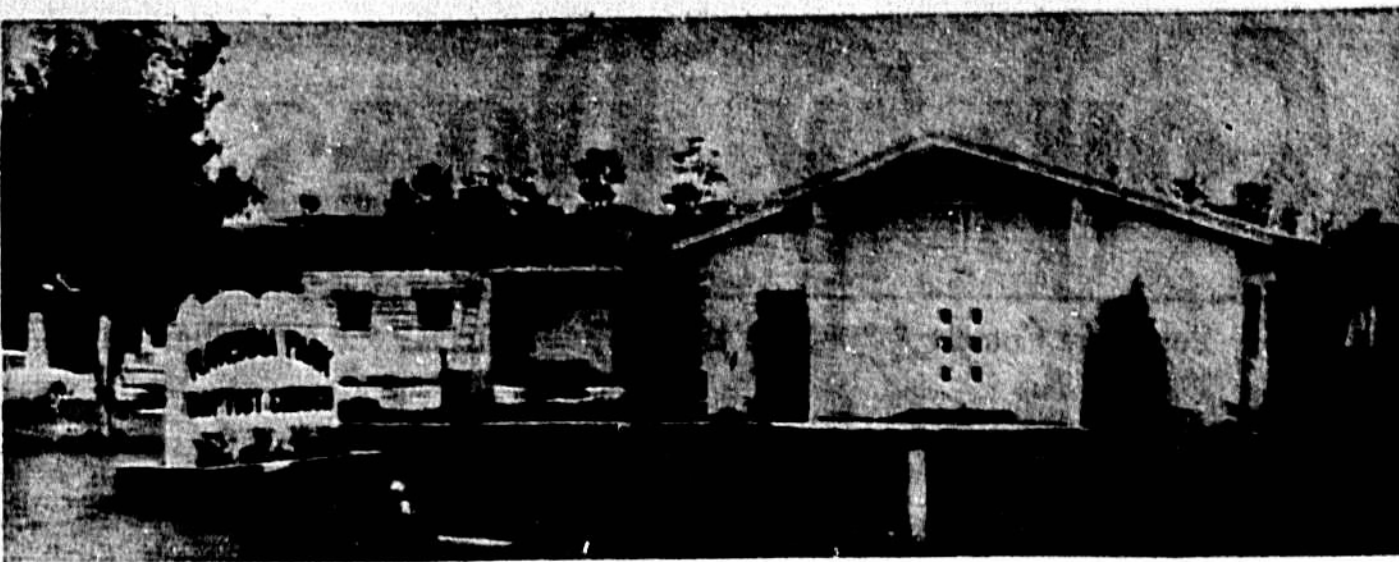

Two Seminole County children have been returned to their homes from St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., while a third child is preparing to leave for the hospital.

Five-year-old Brenda Hanson, of 211 Granada Street, Sanford, arrived home Wednesday, accompanied by her father, Kenneth, who is stationed at Sanford Naval Air Station. Brenda's condition is much improved, although she will return to the hospital in two weeks for an examination, and further tests.

Arriving on the same plane was little four-year-old Jeffrey Decker, of 201 Maple Hill Street, Altamonte Springs. Jeffrey was accompanied to St. Jude by his mother, who reports he is doing fine, even though he must also return to St. Jude on Aug. 26 for further examinations.

Both of these children are stricken with leukemia.

Leaving with her mother within the next week for examination and tests by the specialists at St. Jude Hospital, is little ten-month-old Beth Ann Latta, of 83 North Griffon Road, Casselberry. Beth Ann is suffering from neuroblastoma, a disease of the blood which attacks the nervous system. Beth Ann already has spent six weeks as a patient at St. Jude.

Transportation costs for these children and their parents is paid for by the Seminole County Chapter of ALSA (Aiding Leukemia Sufferers and Their Care and Treatment), and given the child and his parent upon their arrival at St. Jude Hospital.

NEW YORK (AP) — Insurers are poking through buckled ruins and smashed storefronts in riot-stricken areas of Detroit, looking for damage claims totaling millions of dollars.

Prudential Insurance Co. of New York, which is one of the largest insurers in the country, is estimated at \$20 million.

Leading research scientists tell us that foods derived from fuel do not resemble oil at all.

When you have to lose a trick early it is good policy to consider exactly when you want to lose it. There is no bonus paid for winning the first trick. Most players would have doubled four spades with the South hand. Then they would have complained about bad luck. If West had managed to make his contract, they would have been sure West would have made it. In fact he might even have made a trick. Last week we were opened and continued. He would have to gamble that he could get to dummy with a diamond. He would have leading a high diamond and putting on dummy's king. Later he would overtake with West's eight to finesse the spades. Assuming that he had not already run a club trick, he would wind up discarding dummy's losing club on a long diamond.

North 21. East played the club and South took things over. He saw that he wasn't going to make five hearts but he wanted to hold his loss to one trick and the way to do it was to keep East out of the lead as he ducked the first diamond. From then on he had no problems. He won the diamond continuation, then he knocked out West's ace of clubs, and would have been able to discard a spade on dummy's fifth club except that West cashed his ace of spades right away and saved South the trouble. Last week we had beaten him two tricks but he would have involved an almost impossible job of making diamonds on the queen and later. West would have had to lead low to the eight spot.
