Tornadoes Kill 6, Hurt Hundreds In Three States

At least six persons were killed and hundreds injured by tornadoes in Missouri, Iowa and Illinois.

The violence erupted Tuesday as the Midwest basked in springlike weather that sent the temperatures soaring into the mid-70s. It happened when a cold air mass collided with the unseasonably warm air.

A teen-age boy and two young girls were killed in Missouri and a 3-year-old boy died in Iowa. A policeman in Chicago and a farmer in northeast Illinois also died as a result of the fierce winds.

Damage was heaviest in the Kansas City, St. Louis and O'Fallon, Mo., areas where trees were uprooted, power lines felled, roofs caved in or were ripped off buildings, and various structures were demolished.

"I just heard the window blinds shaking and sounds like something falling," said E.M. Carpenter, superintendent of schools at O'Fallon. Mo. School clocks found amid the debris had stopped at 12:52 p.m.

The O'Fallon High School took the brunt of the first tornado reported. One student was killed and 14 other students, a teacher and two townspeople were injured.

Danny Gene Barber, 15, a senior, died in the main corridor of the school. He apparently was suffocated under a rubble from the school's roof which fell on him as he left his typing class.

"Glass was flying everywhere," said 15-year-old Faye Elliott, a classmate of Barber's. "Then it was over and all we could hear was the rain."

MIAMI (AP)—Florida's five-year struggle to equalize representation in the Legislature goes back today to a federal court whose patience may be running low.

There were indications that the special three-judge federal tribunal may this time reapportion the Legislature by decree on a plan of its own or along the lines of several presented this week.

Three times before, U.S. Judges Warren Jones, David W. Taylor and William McRae approved reapportionment plans fashioned by Legislatures, only to have the U. S. Supreme Court reject the plans as not enough of a change to give Florida population centers the representation due them. The high court's directive says seats in the Legislature should be allotted on a one-man, one-vote basis of representation.

The panel has authority to reapportion the Legislature itself if it decides the lawmakers can't do it.

Florida House and Senate leaders urged the court Tuesday to approve the 48-member, 128-representative plan enacted in special session by the Legislature. It deviates in some areas more than the 16 per cent plan which lawyers say the high court would accept.

Other plans before the court include a 52-member, 68-representative formula put forth by Miami attorneys Dan Paul and Paul says his proposal would enable a more efficient and less costly Legislature, and strays from mathematical perfection only 35 percent in the House and 3.2 per cent in the Senate.

Senate President Verle Pope and House Speaker Ralph Turley, who introduced the 48-member plan, are confident of its success.

A plan was submitted by Rep. Robert Graham calling for a 93-representative and 28 senators, based on 1960 population estimates.

Backing this plan, the Dade County League of Municipalities said all other were unconstitutional because they were based on out-of-date population figures.

The NAACP urged adoption of a plan which would divide each of the state's congressional districts into four Senate and eight House districts of substantially equal population.

This proposal, which would disregard county lines as well as the state's geographical features, was most interesting in reapportioning the chances of Negroes and other minority groups of winning legislative seats.

GIs Moving Into Delta, Scene Of War's Decision

Saigon, South Vietnam (AP) — A reinforced battalion of American infantrymen moved into the Mekong Delta today, becoming the first large contingent of U. S. combat troops based in the area where some commanders say the Vietnam war will be won or lost.

Gen. William C. Westmoreland's headquarters announced that an artillery-supported battalion of the U. S. 9th Infantry Division moved into a base camp 40 miles southwest of Saigon near the delta city of My Tho.

The contingent — estimated at 1,000 men — also included elements of a brigade headquarters in the start of a buildup of American strength in the rich lowlands where until now operations have been largely by South Vietnamese forces.

The infantry contingent, described by a U. S. spokesman as a maneuver battalion, joined engineer and support units which had moved into the delta base camp Jan. 16.

The entry of U. S. combat forces into the delta, where Cong domination, came during one of the periodic lulls in fighting in the Vietnam war.

The U. S. and South Vietnamese military commands report only small ground skirmishes in widely scattered sectors.

Williams has scheduled a Jan. 30 hearing on the request.

Inflation Due To War Spending

NEW YORK (AP) — President Johnson has made clear to Congress that the Vietnam war has made a "deep imprint" on his budget, an imprint most Americans have felt for a year in their personal accounts.

The inflation we now have, and did have through most of 1966, is to a great degree the result of unexpectedly high spending in support of our military effort in Southeast Asia.

This year Johnson demonstrated a slightly changed attitude since his previous budget message. He still hopes for domestic health and wealth while paying for a war without wartime economic controls, even though there has never been before.

and we are called upon to make sacrifices. Even though its cost is only about 1.20% of our Gross National Product, Vietnam is costing.

Recognition that the war is costly does not, however, free us from the correct action. And the question now is how accurate are estimates that Vietnam will cost \$21.4 billion in fiscal 1967, only \$2.5 billion more than in 1967.

A year ago in Washington there was a tendency to underestimate the costs of war. This underestimation turned out to be a \$1-billion error. We spent that much more than we had anticipated.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Michigan Gov. George Romney and key aides see danger to his public posture should he wait too long, as a Republican presidential prospect, to define sharply his position on the Vietnam war. They have a plan to minimize the peril.

Ever since his overwhelming reelection to a third term in November, Romney has been tending of questions on Vietnam by asserting in various ways that he is giving the issue thorough study before offering any specific proposals.

This purely defensive stance was adopted after a critical press burned his hide in 1965 and 1966 for losing or consistently fuzzy answers to Vietnam queries.

The danger in the present tactic is that the longer Romney keeps telling people he is still studying the matter, the higher he will lift expectations with respect to his ultimate pronouncement. The press will be looking for the long bomb. The prospect of a crashing anticlimax is very real. Neither Romney or any other public figure not privy to the highest military and political intelligence can dare to offer earth-shattering specific alternatives to the Johnson strategies.

Should the Michigan lion lounge and bring forth a mouse, his presidential stock could be seriously damaged. Consequently, Romney strategists do not intend to let that

happen. Their plan is to have the governor, after a still undetermined interval, begin issuing a series of statements or position papers on various questions of the Vietnam question. Romney has not indicated publicly what those "areas of concern" are. In December he told newsmen in Washington he would define the areas at the conclusion of the interim government's conference at White Sulphur Springs.

An aide talked him out of it. So there is no way of knowing, today, whether Romney will be talking about military questions, the pacification of the Vietnamese countryside, the future political leadership of the embattled areas, or what.

All we can be sure of is that before too many weeks or months he will be throwing a lot of short passes on Vietnam, in order to avoid standing or falling on one big effort after an incredibly strained accumulation of time.

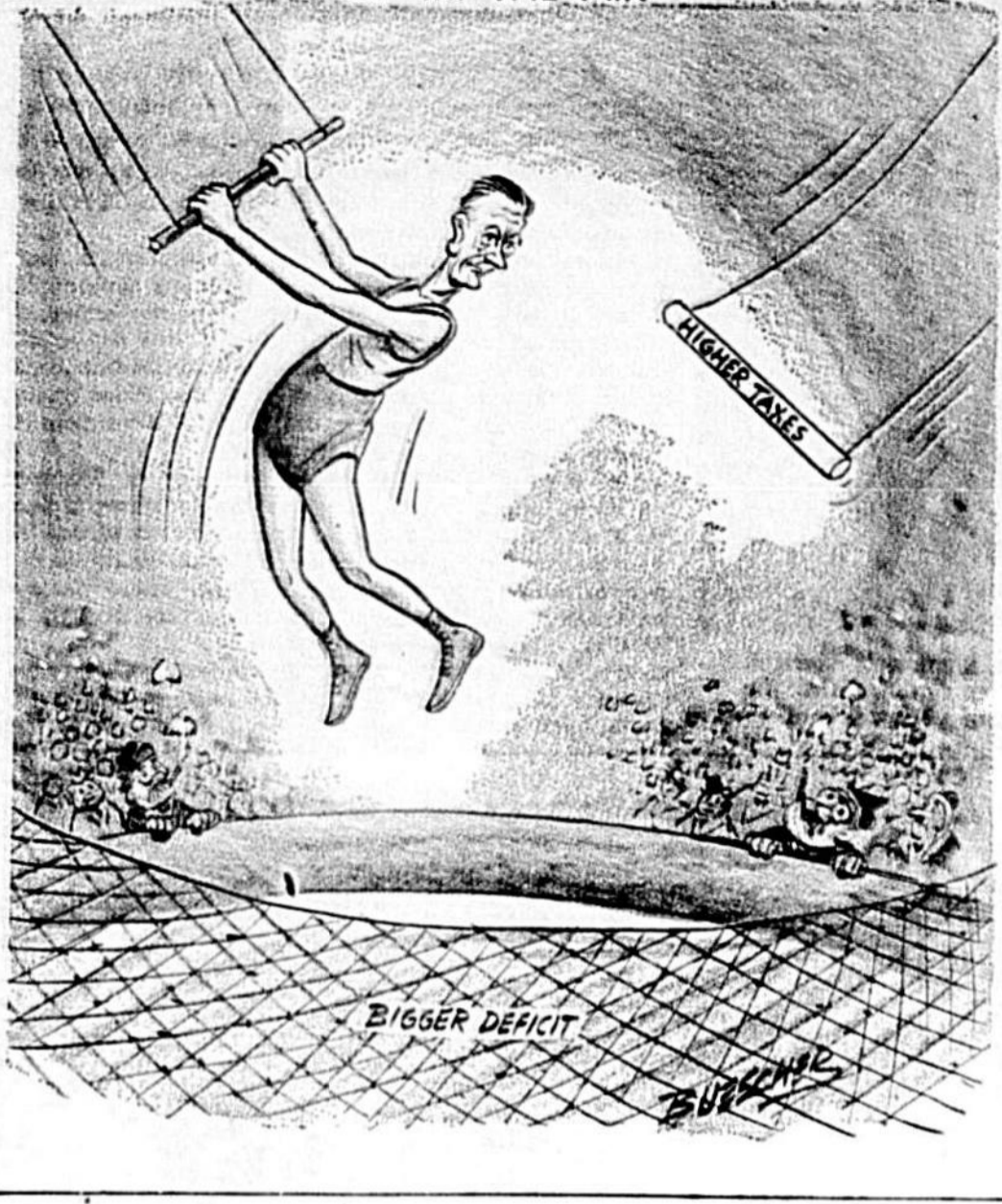
There are babies being born right now who will even live to see the day when they will pay \$2 for a shoeshine—\$1 for each shoe.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Like Socrates of old, Sen. J. W. Fulbright tries to be a gadfly on the conscience of the community.

But sometimes there seems to be more bite than bite.

The Arkansas Democrat, chairman of the Senate's Foreign Relations Committee, has been a steadfast critic on foreign affairs. He flailed Johnson for his handling of the crisis in the Dominican Republic.

He has never let up on Johnson's handling of the war in Vietnam. Now he has put his ideas together in a just-published book, "The Arrogance of Power." It's an enlarged version of his lectures at Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies last year.

But Fulbright as a critic has been sometimes vague and at times writer, unrealistic. This shows up in his book, too.

As an example of some of his past unrealistic: More than a year ago the Red Chinese outlined a plan for the conquest of the world by communism, revolutionaries in underdeveloped countries could be used to encircle and defeat capitalist nations.

Nevertheless, Fulbright suggested trying to make a deal with Red China under which this country would withdraw its forces from Southeast Asia if the Chinese would let their neighbors alone.

The trouble with this is that the Chinese, while proclaiming innocence, could help in a concealed way the Communists in a backward country, particularly one bordering Red China, to take it over. And so on, step by step.

Now in his book Fulbright outlines:

lines a plan for restoring peace in Vietnam although, if you follow him to the end, it's a plan which could wind up solving nothing and leave the United States completely baffled.

Boiled down, this is his idea: The United States, South Vietnam, the Viet Cong and Communist North Vietnam should try to work out peace. The American side would first seek a cease-fire and stop the bombing of North Vietnam, although the Johnson administration insists on that.

In this arrangement Fulbright seems to put the Viet Cong on the same plane of power with North Vietnam, although the Johnson administration considers North Vietnam the main adversary.

And Fulbright suggests, the United States should pledge to remove its forces from South Vietnam. That is what Johnson did at the Manila Conference last fall, provided peace was restored.

Then there should be an international conference—which would have to include Red China—to guarantee an agreement on self-determination for the Vietnamese, plus a plan for

Green Belt Law Interpretation Forthcoming

JACKSONVILLE (AP)—A tax suit which led to 100 per cent fair market value assessments throughout the state also may pave the way for uniform interpretation of Florida's Green Belt Law, which reduces taxes on agricultural land.

Circuit Judge William L. Durden began taking testimony Monday on Green Belt assessment practices in Duval County.

"I hope we can establish standards which the state's assessors can apply here and in Florida's other 66 counties," Durden said.

He kept jurisdiction of the case after his 1966 ruling-upheld by the Florida Supreme Court—Requiring full value assessment of non-agricultural land.

George Steelbes Jr., an attorney representing taxpayers, declared the means of applying the Green Belt law result in some fantastic inequities.

Albert W. Brown, who is in charge of Green Belt application office, testified that some farm land assessed at \$100 an acre for the Duval County assessor's could be sold for as much as \$7,500 an acre if used for industry.

Brown said some applications for Green Belt assessment are unjustified, and those are rejected.

The court was told about 155,000 acres are assessed as agricultural land and most of that is in timber.

Planes Crash On The Ground

MIAMI (AP)—Two Eastern Air Lines planes were damaged Monday night in a freak accident on a ramp in the maintenance area. No passengers were involved.

A spokesman for the air line said a crew was taxiing a two-engine DC-9 toward a hangar when one of the engines accidentally went into reverse.

The aircraft, backed across the ramp and its tail slammed into the nose of a parked Boeing 720 four-engine jet.

Damage, expected to run into the thousands of dollars, was not at once estimated. The Boeing lost one engine and sustained some damage and the DC-9's tail was damaged.

Non-Essentials, Waste Is Out, LBJ Reports

WASHINGTON (AP)—Though President Johnson assured Congress that "waste and non-essentials have been cut out" of his new budget, only one major agency shows a drop in spending for fiscal 1968.

That is the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, for which Johnson asked \$2.3 billion, about \$200 million below the current budget.

For a number of programs, however, Johnson asked far less than Congress authorized for the coming fiscal year. For example, he proposed \$200 million instead of the \$260 million authorized for higher education loans, \$40 million instead of the authorized \$65 million for grants to aid college construction, and \$3 million instead of the authorized \$120 million for health research facilities.

Budget Director Charles L. Schultze said the increase in all "great society" programs comes to about \$1.3 billion.

In some cases what appeared to be spending cuts in budget listings turned out to be otherwise.

Thus, an apparent drop of \$60 million in total outlays for education proved to be a \$60 million increase. The difference came from the sale to private investors of college housing mortgages, with the proceeds applied against the total of budget expenditures for higher education.

Similarly, a look of an apparent drop of \$40 million in the government's commerce and transportation budget shows that outlays actually rise, but the increase is more than offset by the proposed \$70 million increase in postal rates.

Soviet Prexy Visits In Rome

ROME (AP)—Soviet President Nikita Khrushchev arrived in Rome today for the first state visit to Italy by a Soviet chief of state and a historic moment in Rome's 2,500-year history.

The Italian government arranged a full-scale official welcome, but the friendship theme was muted by the "Soviet Monday" march of the Italian Communist party's Rome headquarters. Heavy police reinforcements cordoned the streets and buildings along Postum's route from Ciampino Military Airport.

Mr. K. Appears In Public Again

BUDAPEST (AP)—For the first time since his fall from power, Nikita S. Khrushchev's image has appeared on the stage in Hungary.

A theater at Miskolc in northeastern Hungary staged a version of a novel by the noted 20th-century Czechoslovak novelist Karel Capek.

The theater version of "Flight with the Salamanders" was titled "Soviet Boycott on the Destruction of the World." A satire against fascism and nuclear war, the play featured images of President Charles de Gaulle and John F. Kennedy, Premier Khrushchev, and former British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

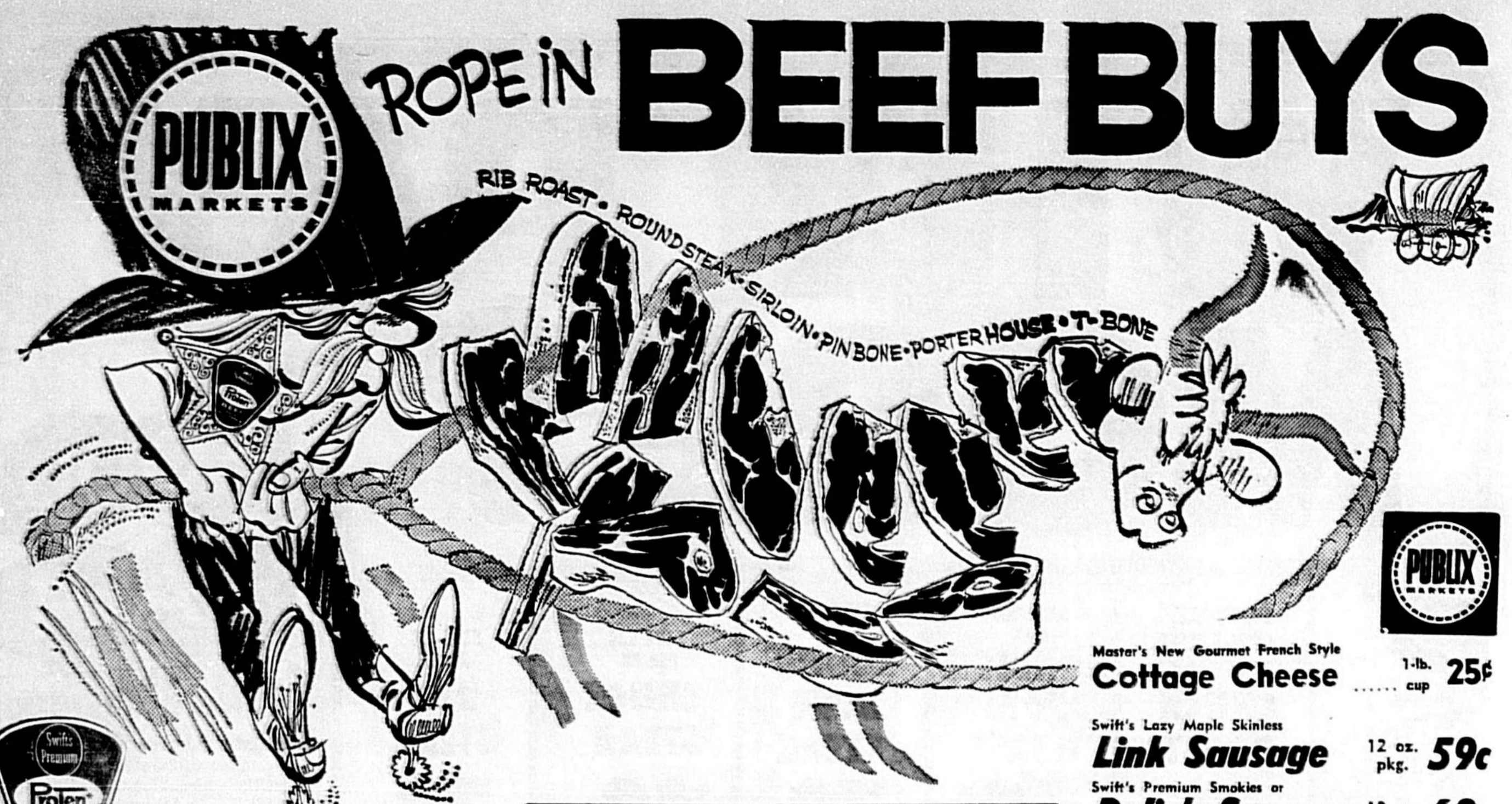
