Expert lists qualities needed for mayor

What qualities does one look for in a small town mayor? It is a question on the minds of many in Sanford, and one we asked of Professor Scott Schraufnagel, who teaches American National Government at both University of Central Florida and Seminole

Community College.

According to Schraufnagel, whose brother was the mayor of Mason Wis., we should look for the same qualities in a mayor we look for in a friend: honesty, integrity and caring.

Schraufnagel thinks the ideal candidate at least should be somewhat charismatic. "A successful politician must be able to motivate people to action," he said.

A mayor does not necessarily need a formal education, but he or she must be able to communicate effectively both in written and oral form.

One trend that worries Schraufnagel is that of business people offering themselves up as cure-alls for society's ills. "While business people can bring sound management principles to government, it is important not to

underestimate the value of political experience. It is one thing to run a business and another to run a government. Politics is not a pretty process; a person must be willing to compromise and make concessions in order to succeed," said Schraufnagel. "Ronald Reagan did not have any Washington experience, but he surrounded himself with insiders who knew

Tajiri 10-year lease on hold

SANFORD — Despite pleas for help, the Sanford City Commission is holding off on a 10-year lease of the "Little Red School House" to Tajiri Arts, Inc.

While the commission, during last week's work session, appeared to be leaning more toward a five-year lease agreement, City Manager Bill Simmons will be meeting with Tajiri officials to work out some type of arrangement which will then be brought back to the commission for further consideration.

"We now have a three-year lease agreement," Simmons told the commission Monday. "They say they have a problem getting grants when they can't be assured of having the building for a longer term." He added however that he had a concern over leasing the property beyond three year terms.

Commissioner Len Howell said while he had no immediate problem with a 10-year lease, he would hope the commission would re-examine the lease every three years to be certain all lease requirements are maintained.

Commissioner Bob Thomas said he hoped the city would go along with the concept. "We need to do everything we can for something that is going to benefit children," he said.

Commissioner Whitley Echelein however, said he wanted to know what the compelling need is for the requested extension.

Patricia Whitley, chairman and president of Tajiri Arts explained that the needs were for the children. "We have many goals ahead," she said. "Others have gotten grants, but we need a longer time in the building."

She explained that while the present three-year lease was still in effect, "I am presenting it to this commission because you know more of Tajiri Arts than probably the members of the next commission."

Two, possibly three new members will be seated on the city commission when the lease expires.

Whitley said there had been many donations to the organization including three pianos and six computers, but she felt there would be more if they could be assured of being at that location for a longer period of time.

Tajiri Arts School of Performing Arts and Academics,

founded in 1988, opened its doors to 55 students in January of this year at the former Little Red School House, 519 Palmetto Avenue in Sanford.

The studio serves students from the Georgetown, Midway and Goldsboro areas as well as some from Orange and Volusia counties.

At the conclusion of a lengthy discussion regarding the request, Echelein proposed that the city might consider a five

year lease, and if certain conditions were met such as capital improvements, the lease could be re-examined after five years, with the intent of extending it.

City Manager Simmons was asked to prepare a mock-up of the present lease based on input from the commissioners during the work session, and additional meetings with Whitley and her staff.

The matter is expected to be

Sara Jacobson for mayor

Sanford's mayoral race is perhaps the most exciting of the last decade or longer.

As such, eight candidates have tossed their hats into the political ring with the hope of taking the seat at a time when changes will make or break the city.

The *Sanford Herald* believes that Sara Jacobson will be the best leader to take the helm at this critical time in the city's history. Jacobson blends political experience from her service on many volunteer boards and business expertise in Sanford, but it is her tenacity that can make a positive difference for Sanford.

Jacobson is known for her stubborn, forceful will and unwavering commitment to causes she finds important. While some may be put off by this trait, we believe it is just that attitude, coupled with her experience, that will allow her to lead Sanford to the future amid the assaults of those, including powerful forces from the county, who would push their own agendas on the city.

Other candidates would seek peace through too much compromise, we feel. Jacobson would seek the best for Sanford.

Lyn Donato has strong ideas and a commitment to the city, but lacks any political experience. While we believe she would make a desirable public official, it would be unwise to allow her to learn to navigate the political waters in these stormy times.

We hope that Donato stays involved and committed to the city. We hope that she will, perhaps, run for a city commission seat at the next opportunity and that she gains valuable experience and understanding through membership on boards and committees.

Larry Blair lacks any sort of specific plan to bring Sanford through the upcoming tempest. He seems to truly love Sanford, but he should take a look at what the city needs and attempt to formulate a plan for the future before he asks to take the reins as mayor.

While Dean Ray is obviously sold on his adopted hometown and wants to do what he can to help it, he has failed to keep abreast of all the issues and lacks the necessary leadership skills that are necessary for the mayor. Ray has grand ideas for the city, but no specific plans on how to accomplish them. Common sense, Ray's platform, can be a valuable commodity, especially in government, but Ray needs more than that to maneuver through the intricacies of government.

While Bob Thomas has had a strong commitment to the people of Sanford while serving as a city commissioner, his less than forceful nature will not serve him well as mayor. For a dozen years he has made thoughtful decisions and informed choices as a commissioner, and we admire him for being one of the nicest candidates, but he simply lacks the fighter's will to lead the battles facing Sanford in the future.

Larry Dale has only recently shown an interest in Sanford, having gained all of his political experience on volunteer boards and committees in Lake Mary and the county. His work as a developer has centered around Lake Mary and his children have attended schools there. His ties to the heavy hitters in county and state politics could be helpful to Sanford, but we feel he is not as attuned to Sanford's problems and real solutions as Jacobson is.

A.A. "Mac" McClanahan served several terms on the Sanford City Commission, and in his interview with us he was the most forceful we have heard him in a long time. He is right to say decisions should not be based on emotion, but on what is best for the city. He still, though, has no clear vision for Sanford's future and seems content to have it continue on its present course.

Finally, while Vernon Spears is a fine and well-organized man, he needs to gain a better understanding of government to know what is best for Sanford. Perhaps with more experience serving on volunteer boards he would see a path the city should take in order to make the necessary changes Sanford needs to head toward the 21st Century in good shape.

The *Sanford Herald* believes Jacobson can triumphantly steer Sanford in the direction it needs to go.

For commission: Lessard and Pugh

Sanford's District 1 encompasses Georgetown, the downtown historic district and beyond. It is the area on which Sanford's rich history is built. Young families are painstakingly restoring the 100-year old homes, but pockets of abject poverty still plague this district.

Four candidates are running for the District 1 commission seat. The *Sanford Herald* endorses Brady Lessard to sit in it.

Lessard has presented ideas that can bring the fragmented parts of this district together, and that will benefit the whole city. He offers solutions to problems. His enthusiasm is infectious and his vision for Sanford clear.

Walt Padgett continues to contribute much good to the city. He volunteers his time on city boards and owns and operates a premier bed and breakfast in the historic district. But, he is a bit less clear than Lessard in his vision to serve the whole of District 1.

Albert DeLattibeaudiere resides in the Georgetown portion of the district. He has in the past contributed his time and efforts to making sure black residents get a fair shake in gov-

ernment matters, including being instrumental in the rezoning of District 2 to a predominantly black district, ensuring black representation on the board. However, he lacks a plan of cohesiveness for the whole of District 1.

Rick Shearer is passionate about his desire to clean up problems he pinpoints in the police department. His focus is strong, but just too narrow to serve all the needs of all the residents in the district.

The *Herald* believes Brady Lessard should be the next District 1 commissioner.

Sanford's District 2 is has been led by Commissioner Bob Thomas since it was formed a dozen years ago to ensure a black representative on the commission. The district was carved through the Goldsboro area and some adjoining areas to make sure the African-American community was represented in city government.

With Thomas seeking the position of mayor, two candidates have lined up to take his place. The *Sanford Herald* endorses Verdell Pugh to carry on where Thomas left off.

Pugh, who is challenging Velma Hayes Williams for the seat, has a vision for Sanford which demonstrates her pride in the city and a strong desire to bring the whole community together to make improvements rather than having various factions standing off on the issues and failing to find solutions.

Pugh believes private money can be used to finance the improvements that are needed in town, such as the stadium. She also has specific plans on how the city and the Private Industry Council and the schools could help produce a better trained workforce.

Williams and her family have lived for several generations in Sanford and she is devoted to the city and her people. Her ties to the city are strong, but her ideas are not as strongly formed as those of her opponent. Passion can not replace planning when it comes to the leadership of Sanford, however.

The *Herald* believes that both women are ready for the challenges of the office, but that Pugh is better prepared to take on the specific needs of Sanford.

Grave concerns about Dale

Candidate Donato speaks

I am responding to a story in the November 23 and 24, Local & State section of the *Orlando Sentinel*. The *Sentinel* implied that I, Lyn Donato, mayoral candidate, "issued a misleading flier." I have contacted the *Sentinel* regarding the "misleading" story, and I have provided them with documentation that supports a retraction of their article. The *Sentinel* has printed a few "corrections" but they refuse to set the entire record straight. So I will.

The *Sentinel* reporter, Elaine Bennett, clearly wrote her story with only a limited or immediate end in view. She took time only for a tactical decision with no strategic planning included. Her story now has back-fired in the face of the *Sentinel*.

Bennett's headlines stated, "I was not the first woman optician hired by Bowen & King

Optical in Baltimore." Bennett refers to a fabricated conversation held with Mr. Jim Matthews. Matthews submitted a letter that states he received a phone call from Bennett. He reports that she did not identify herself as an *Orlando Sentinel* reporter, nor did she inform him that I was running for public office in Florida.

Furthermore, Matthews spoke with Bennett's boss, Lisa Lockridge. He told her that Bennett did not identify herself, and he thought she was checking an employment reference. Matthews told Lockridge that he believed Bennett's article to be "alanted." He told Lockridge that indeed I "was the first female optician hired by Mr. Phil King who purchased the company in the late sixties." He told her I was the "first female to be hired to work exclusively in the retail environment."

I spoke with Lockridge regarding Matthews' statement, and she told me she "will not retract Bennett's statement, and Matthews is now lying."

In her story, Bennett implies that I am a liar. She wrote that I stated in my "misleading" flier, that I worked for AT&T for 10 years. She said that an "AT&T representative told her that Donato worked for AT&T for 8 years."

Like Jim Matthews, AT&T is the scapegoat. I spoke with Lockridge regarding Bennett's malevolent statement. She said that she "believed Bennett and would not retract/correct Bennett's statement. Only when I threatened to sue the *Sentinel* and provided Lockridge with personnel documents did she "correct" Bennett's statement. The correction occurred in the Nov. 27 section A (corrections & clarifications). The correction simply states that "a representative in AT&T's personnel office said Donato worked for the company from 1984 to 1992. Records show Donato's last day on the payroll was Feb. 22, 1994."

Elaine Bennett's story inferred that I committed fraud. She wrote that I gave no explanation on how I was able to receive. □ See Letters, Page 7A

will be held Friday night, Dec. 6 from 6 to 8, and the Winterfest parade will kick off day-long events, at 10 a.m., on Saturday, Dec. 7.

The homes will open at noon, with the starting point being the Cultural Arts Center, located at Fifth Street and Oak Avenue. To celebrate our new location, Seminole Audubon Chapter in partnership with First Street Gallery, will have a Children's Holiday Birdseed Ornament making project," said Michele de Vivero, who is on the education committee for the group.

The group passed out supplies to create bell-shaped ornaments to students in seven Sanford elementary schools. The students will make the ornaments as a class project during the first week of December and can either take the ornaments home to be used in their own yards, or bring them to First Street Gallery on Saturday, Dec. 7 to decorate the six trees that will be displayed in the vacant lot across the street from the

gallery. The chapter is sponsoring the project to promote awareness, increase wildlife education and teach compassion for living things.

Florida sees an increase in migrating birds during the winter months and food supplies for these wild birds need to be enhanced. De Vivero said the recipe for the ornaments is healthy food for birds and gives kids a fun, creative project.

The chapter will have a booth set up on Saturday so children from other areas will have the opportunity to create the ornaments as well. To reinforce the concept of benefiting the wild bird population, the chapter has arranged for the Birds of Prey Center to have birds on hand for the children to see. The birds of prey will be at the booth from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Several local businesses have donated the supplies needed to make the ornaments.

De Vivero said Home Depot, in Lake Mary, donated peat pots and bird seed. Santa's Christmas Tree Forest, in Eustis, is loaning the chapter tree stands and Wal-Mart and Publix, in Sanford, will donate three trees each for the project.

Supplies for 150 ornaments were distributed to Midway, Pine Crest, Idyllwild, Hamilton, Goldsboro, Wilson elementary schools and to All Souls Catholic School. Up to 500 of the ornaments can be made the day of the event.

Decorating of the "Christmas Trees for the Birds" will take place from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. The tour will wrap up at 5 a.m. well, but will continue on Sunday, from noon to 5. Antique cars will be on display, in front of several of the homes, on Sunday. Crafts, made by local residents, will be on sale in the Cultural Arts Center. Father Christmas will be at various locations on the tour Saturday and Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus will be in attendance on Sunday.

Tickets for the tour, which cost \$15, are available at the Cultural Arts Center, both days, or for more information, call 330-8013. The price of the ticket includes a set of recipe cards featuring favorite recipes from district residents, complimentary beverages and sweets in the Cultural Arts Center, and a complimentary carriage tour upon request. Proceeds from the tour go toward restoration projects in the Sanford Historic District.

1 small bowl for mixing 'birdpaste'
6 plastic spoons
1 medium bowl or shoebox for rolling balls in birdseed

Directions:
MIX together FLOUR, WATER, CORN SYRUP. SPOON thin layer of 'birdpaste' onto outside of Peat Pot, covering outside completely. Gently ROLL Peat Pot into birdseed. Dry about 10 minutes. Meanwhile take one piece of 10-inch Paper Twist, and knot at both ends. Fold the Paper Twist in two and put the loop through the hole in the peat pot from underneath. This makes a loop for hanging. Tie one piece of 5-inch Paper Twist at base of the loop and fan out for a bow. Hang on your tree for the birds.





new 500-room motel. He had the following projections and observations for the future:

TOURISM - The airport needs signs instructing people how to get to Sanford. People get in their rental cars at the airport and head for Orlando. They don't even know where we are. We might work a package deal with the tourists and offer them free bus transportation downtown, or a coupon book, a free day at Disney, a free shuttle bus or even a coupon for a free meal here in Sanford.

LAKEFRONT DEVELOPMENT - We must develop it as an import/export area. I also see a long picnic area along the lakefront with picnic tables, and barbecue pits. It may be a 10-year project, but a boardwalk around the lake would be a real tourist attraction. We also need more lodgings near the Auto Train and Amtrak, to help bring in more tourists to Sanford.

LAW ENFORCEMENT - The QUAD-Squad is good, but they have too much to do. We need more, including citizens' patrols. Police should get raises. It is not fair that they didn't because it lowers the morale further and the police morale is already low.

RACE RELATIONS - I believe Joe Dillard as police chief will straighten things up. I'm proud of Seminole Hope, especially the drug march. I've

worked in black communities and I know a lot of their problems.

DEVELOPMENT - I would get major business to make donations to programs which would help improve the city. I would also get some committees together of persons who have ideas. I want to be a full-time mayor, with an office in city hall and a telephone. You can't market the city on just a part-time basis.

GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS - The city manager has too much power. If I'm elected there will be several new faces in city hall. As for meetings, we should not vote until we understand everything that is going on. We need to have more city meetings. The citizens should have more say-so in government. The present mayor is not allowing people to speak.

HISTORIC STRUCTURES - I agree with keeping the old structures standing, but the need for money to fix them up may cause hardships. I believe every regulation (in the historic district) needs to be backed by common sense.

ANNEXATION - I could go along with annexing Midway. We have other areas with a Sanford address that might also need to be added.

WHY AM I RUNNING - If we have better jobs, more graduates will stay in the city. This city is behind 20 years. It's going to take 10 years or more to bring it back to prosperity. I don't have the cure for everything, but I'll try. I'm not a follower, I'm a leader.

the most viable group to come along in a long time. They've done some fine things and I want to help keep us on the path we're on."

Regarding individual matters, McClanahan had the following observations and comments:

COUNTY COURTHOUSE LOCATION - I see the enlargement of the Seminole County courthouse as a big deal. But it isn't a done deal as some might tell you. I would certainly like to keep it in downtown Sanford.

LAKEFRONT - From the civic center to the New Tribes Mission, Seminole Boulevard needs repaving. But I see no economic purpose to driving in this area, and I would like to see the roadway vacated. In this way, we could expand Fort Mellon Park to the lakefront.

move the ballfields elsewhere, and turn the park into a blend of park and commercial property. Let's make it a passive park rather than an active one, and we can attract more people to the area to enjoy it.

ECONOMIC INCENTIVE - We made a mistake giving 50 percent of the taxes away for the next 10 to 12 years when we developed the Seminole Towne Center Mall. Being involved in giving economic incentives cannot be allowed to be a gamble. We have got to get our tax dollars back. And adding new jobs through incentives to other companies is not going to be any payback. It may be good business for the city to give economic incentives to some businesses, but we can't gamble with taxpayer money. It's going to take a concentrated effort, including all city personnel,

negotiations and cooperation. It's a slow process.

MORALE - The morale of city employees is not even a point if we want a true city manager form of government. We need to take another look at the total city workforce, in order to get a maximum of productivity.

IMAGE - The city government requires a day-to-day effort just to keep it operating. I don't think Sanford has a bad image.

ANNEXATION - I don't believe in annexing Midway.

They belong to Seminole County and they need to stay there. The county has the money to spend for what Midway needs. Annexation should only be decided upon regarding whether it's positive or negative to the city. We aren't rich enough to take on that responsibility.

WHY AM I RUNNING - I have devoted 25 years of my life to the City of Sanford government. I have the qualifications, education, business ability, and I know what and where the problems are. I want to continue being involved.

allocated for stadium renovations would be put to better use to purchase a tower truck for the fire department. Right now, he said, any building over two stories would burn down if there were a fire because firefighters could not reach the higher elevations.

Too many people are getting fed up with the problems in Sanford, he noted.

"I know families who have been here for generations who are wanting to leave," he said.

He believes an apprenticeship program is necessary between the schools and the city to ensure a well-trained workforce and properly staffed city departments.

Sheafer believes the city needs a new city manager who is qualified for the position ("I'm not putting down Bill Simons," he said, "but he's an engineer, not a city manager."). He also believes the city attorney should not have dealings with the city outside his or her context as the city attorney.

"We need to change a lot of things," he said. "The soul of Sanford is up for grabs."

Sheafer had the following to

say on these key issues:

LAKEFRONT - It's a shame, he said, that all that lakefront property from Palmetto to Mellonville is off the tax rolls. Sanford should utilize the lakefront "to its fullest," though he didn't know how the city should do it.

ECONOMIC INCENTIVE - The city should spend money on making sure Sanford has a highly trained workforce, he said. "We have to give kids hope to keep them off the street," he noted.

MORALE - The city employees need to feel good about the city again. Police and fire officials aren't paid enough, he said. All of Sanford is suffering as a result of the poor attitude. "It boggles my mind to see this kind of incompetency," he noted.

WHY HE WANTS TO BE A COMMISSIONER - "Sanford's in my heart," he said. "I love this town so much, I have to do this for her."

unemployment benefits while receiving income from other sources. First of all, I have never drawn unemployment while drawing a salary of any kind. Secondly, if Ms. Bennett was not "out to get me" she would have considered the true facts surrounding unemployment. Such as, it is not illegal to concurrently draw unemployment with other sources of income.

The question regarding sources of income on the qualifying form is "list all sources of income during Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 1988. Again, when I threatened to sue the Sentinel, a correction appeared in the Nov. 27 section A (corrections & clarifications). The Sentinel only stated that "a story in the Nov. 23 Local & State section may have implied that Sanford mayoral candidate Lynda Donato was required to explain sources of income on qualifying papers to run for public office. The qualifying papers form only requires candidates to list sources of income."

And the lies continue. Bennett stated that court records show that I was foreclosed for not paying a mortgage and a lien on a Sanford condominium. I have never owned a Sanford condominium or had a foreclosure for not paying a mortgage or lien. It is true that I filed bankruptcy in the early 1980s due to a bad business deal. However, each debt has been paid in full. I gave Lockridge the name and phone number of my attorney on Nov. 25. Likewise, my attorney has been given permission to speak with Lockridge; however, to date Lockridge has not contacted my attorney.

What are the Sentinel's requirements in order for truth to be known about me? Lisa Lockridge said, "if I would have given Ms. Bennett 30 minutes of my time this article would not have been written like this." Lockridge told me the Sentinel would have printed my side of the story.

I seriously doubt the Sentinel has any sense of fair representation. Other than Larry Dale, each mayoral candidate that met with the Sentinel was regarded as having no ideas or opinions. Don Boyett described each candidate, with the exception of Dale as "senseless" hopefuls.

Speaking of Don - he called me on a Monday morning requesting that I meet with him the "next day or possibly Wednesday." I told him I didn't think 1-2 days notice was sufficient time to give any seriously considered candidate, so we didn't meet.

I was crucified for not giving an interview to the Sentinel, yet in the Nov. 24 Opinion section of the Orlando Sentinel, Don Boyett quoted me as saying I "want the best for Sanford," but I offered no specifics. Ms. Lockridge is checking with Mr. Boyett about his quote; however, I have not seen a correction.

One last thing: Bennett nailed me for not attending Barry University for the last 1/12 to 2 years. My "misleading flier" didn't say I was attending school at this time; I said my B.S. is in progress. The Sentinel failed to mention that Dr. Tony Bennatti, the Central Florida Barry University Director, gave me a letter of endorsement.

Obviously, the Sentinel has no regard for people. Time after time, candidate after candidate, they set out to ruin reputations out of pure malice. They viciously distort the truth to give their candidate of choice the advantage. Don Boyett blatantly writes in his endorsement of Larry Dale that "he is a part of a vast network of political and business movers and shakers." Aren't we, the people,

trying to get away from the "network," the "establishment," and/or the "good ol' boys." Don't we want what is best for our community - not what is best for politics?

Those of us harmed by the Sentinel's corrupted articles are never fortunate enough to get a "retraction" from the Sentinel, only a "correction." The "correction" is never found with "headlines."

I received a phone call within the last two weeks from Elaine Bennett. Ms. Bennett asked me several questions regarding the employment of Ms. Lynda Donato (known to me at the time as Lynda Jernigan). Ms. Bennett did not identify herself as a newspaper reporter, did not inform me that she worked for *The Orlando Sentinel*, nor did she inform me concerning issues surrounding Ms. Donato's employment that occurred over 25 years ago.

It appears that *The Orlando Sentinel* is concerned Ms. Donato was not the first female optician hired by Bowen & King. These are the facts regarding their concern(s):

Candidate defends himself

I have debated with myself ever since I decided to run for office whether I should come forward and tell the citizens of my hometown about a period in my distant past that continues to haunt me to this day. In 1969, when I was 17 years old, I joined the USMC and went to boot camp at Parris Island. During my basic training I was one of the few in my company singled out by the drill instructors for special treatment. This included both physical and emotional harassment. To say I was terrified of these people at the time would be a gross understatement. Towards the end of my basic training I was physically attacked by one of my drill instructors and subsequently injured. As a result of this injury, I was hospitalized and had surgery to my right hand, which I almost lost. Needless to say, my parents did not raise a masochist, and I was not going to

stay anywhere that I was going to be beaten. I decided then and there to go home at the first opportunity and not come back.

I have to say that I did desert the USMC, not because I was against the government or the ongoing war in South East Asia at the time, although as I got older and wiser I realized that our involvement there was wrong and a waste of American lives. I did lie at that time to my family and friends and employers only because I was terrified of being sent back for more physical mistreatment. No one can ever know the many sleepless nights I had, waking up in the middle of the night when I would hear a car slow down in front of my grandparents' house. I always thought that they had finally come for me. Actually, when I was finally picked up, it was somewhat of a relief. I did not have to hide anymore.

If one wonders if I regret what I did, I would have to answer yes. I realize now that had I known then what I know now, there would have been other avenues to take in addressing this assault on my person by this drill instructor. One must keep in mind that I was a scared, uneducated 17 year-old kid at the time. Once I was returned to the Marines, I found out that if I had only stuck it out a little longer, this type of behavior stopped after basic training. I was told by a Master Sergeant that it was common practice in basic for certain recruits to be singled out for what he called special treatment. Does this make what happened to me okay? No, but at least I knew that I should not have expected such physical mistreatment throughout my military service. I was proud to join but not proud of the way I was treated.

Years later, after I matured, I even tried to re-enlist in order to make amends for my past mistake, but according to a letter I got from the Navy Department, the military does not offer second chances.

Contrary to what *The Orlando Sentinel* has reported, I was not dishonorably discharged from the Marines. That would have meant I had a felony conviction against me. With a felony conviction against me, I would not be able to own a gun, vote, and I certainly would not be able to run for public office.

Contrary to what Commissioner Howling Lon stated in his letter to *The Sanford Herald*, if I do get elected as commissioner, I will be able to vote on police issues. My wife may be a police officer, but she does not make up the whole department. As far as his claims of my lying when I was a kid goes - well, look who is calling the kettle black. This guy is an adult, and he still has not learned that lying is wrong. At least I learned that lesson in my youth and have tried to live the best Christian life I can.

If anyone in this city thinks I would subject myself to this kind of attack unless I was deeply committed to making our city government more honest to the citizens it has elected to serve them, then they are both ignorant and foolish. I have faith in the people of Sanford that they, too, want a change from the same old way of doing things.

Basically, it boils down to this: if you want our city to continue its slide down the tube, then don't vote for me. If you are committed to change and making Sanford a safer and better place to live and work, then vote for me.

Historically, Blair and codes

This letter was written in 1982, with copies sent to then-City Manager Pete Knowles, Mayor Lee P. Moore, city commissioners and the zoning commission. The issue was never resolved, so we moved. Mr. Blair is currently a candidate for mayor of Sanford.

On several occasions, my husband and I have spoken in person to Leah (I apologize for not knowing her surname), zoning inspector for the City of Sanford. To our knowledge, Leah has twice inspected the premises of Mr. Larry Blair at 2012 Holly Avenue, Sanford, and has instructed Mr. Blair to remove his chickens from the premises as well as all unlawful accumulations. See Sections 4-10, 4-11, 4-12, 11-27, 13-5, 13-6 and Sections 11-28, 11-29.1 and 11-29.2 of the Sanford City Code.

As owners and occupants of the house at 2008 Holly Avenue, next door to Mr. Blair, our complaints were originally voiced to him and his wife in August 1981. A year later, after no correcting action on their part, we complained in July and August of 1982 to the Zoning Commission of Sanford. Subsequently, Leah there to made her visits. We are now approaching December 1982 and the chickens and unlawful accumulations remain on the premises.

In September 1982, Mr. Blair installed a board fence around portions of his property which in no way corrected the violations but did hide them from our view. We decided at the time to wait upon the city for any further action. To our knowledge, none has been taken.

We have now purchased the property at 2011 Cedar Avenue, across the alley from Mr. Blair's house. Unfortunately, his partially installed fence hides neither the chickens nor the unlawful accumulations nor his numerous cans of garbage strewn throughout the alley.

I object not only to his continued violations but also to being told each time we have made a complaint that Mr. Blair is a member of the variance committee of the county zoning board, and that he is the son-in-law of a contributing columnist to *The Sanford Herald*. My complaints are not based on the appointments he has received or who he is, but the manner in which he violates the City Code.

I invite each of you to visit our home at 2008 Holly Avenue or 2011 Cedar Avenue and see for yourselves.

how the system worked." According to Schraufnagel, one of the biggest problems facing cities today is simply a shortage of funds. Most of the money available already is budgeted for items such as road maintenance, sewage, litter control and the like. Because of this, many mayors are limited to symbolic gestures.

"It's like spinning your wheels. People want more services but in this political climate, nobody wants to pay for them," said Schraufnagel. "I don't suppose anybody in Sanford would like to see a city income tax."

One way to find additional revenue, said Schraufnagel, is to look for waste and mismanagement in city government, and become more efficient in road repair, utilities and other city functions.

"In addition, cities must find ways to do more with less. If there is no money for additional police officers, the city can encourage and sponsor Neighborhood Watch and similar programs," he said.

Schraufnagel emphasized the need for well planned long term growth. He said Sanford should make the most of its historic area and beautiful lakefront by developing a tourist attraction nearby. This along with improving schools, reducing crime and other quality of life issues could be combined with tax incentives to lure more businesses to the area.

"Sometimes cities must spend money on these types of improvements in order to reap

the benefits in the future. The other option is to live in a shell, which is what most people do," said Schraufnagel. "This is an area where politicians can be more effective than business leaders; convincing people that it is in their own best interest to make some sacrifices in the short term for the sake of long term prosperity."

As an example, he cited the presidential race. "Bill Clinton was able to convince many people of the need to spend more on educational programs such as teaching all 8-year-olds to read. He connected all 12-year-olds to the Internet with his campaign slogan: building a bridge to the 21st century."

Schraufnagel expressed skepticism about public-private partnerships. While he thought them useful in some areas, such as building stadiums and other profit oriented ventures, he thought cities were better off doing some things on their own.

He cited LYNX, the Orlando based bus system as an example. "LYNX is so heavily subsidized by the city, they would be better off doing it themselves. Because of the need to make profit, some routes have been cut and service has suffered. Other endeavors like building roads and sewers are just not profit-making ventures."

Another aspect of local government that Schraufnagel advocated was community involvement. "If the streets are going to be safe and businesses are to grow, people must get involved and not rely solely on government to solve our problems."

the county. He added that the city also needs a parking garage downtown.

On other matters, Spears had the following comments and observations:

BASEBALL STADIUM - I'm a baseball fan, but I don't agree with the city's plan to pay to have the stadium renovated. I would like to see it preserved, but I don't like to see the city having to pay for it. The money is needed, but it must come from elsewhere.

PUBLIC SAFETY - We have a lot of problems. Regardless of what the city says, we need a ladder truck (fire department) for the safety and welfare of the people. As for the police department, there is a morale and attitude problem. Morale is lower than it's ever been before. I'm in favor of searching for a new police chief, but maybe if we give Joe Dillard a chance, it'll work out.

CITY APPEARANCE - Our brick roads need fixing. It's a shame to have them like they

are. There are holes on Oak Avenue. We need to clean up the town, get trees which hang over stop signs trimmed.

IMAGE - There are a lot of buildings in the city which belong to churches. They don't pay taxes yet people lean over backward to support them.

CITY OPERATIONS - We have to put someone in charge of city hall. Call them with a question and people don't know the answers. They just walk around in their stocking feet. As for department heads, they should either do their job, or seek another job.

DOWNTOWN - We have a lot of vacant property downtown. We need to find the owners, find out what their plans are and help them. If a building is salvageable, fix it up right now. That goes for residential as well as commercial property. Too many houses are off the tax rolls.

PROSPERITY - We need to draw more business to Sanford, but first we have to provide a place to park. Then we can keep things going downtown like craft shows and antique shows. We

should put a hold on North Park Avenue to keep it away from businesses. On the lakefront, we should have entertainment events at least every quarter to get people to come back to the city.

ECONOMIC INCENTIVE - I'm against paying companies to move in. If we clean up the city, they will want to come anyway. As for offering incentives, only if we have to, but I don't believe in giving them anything. Each case should be judged on what the city is going to get out of it. If we do it that way, with everyone working together, in a few years we will see a great difference.

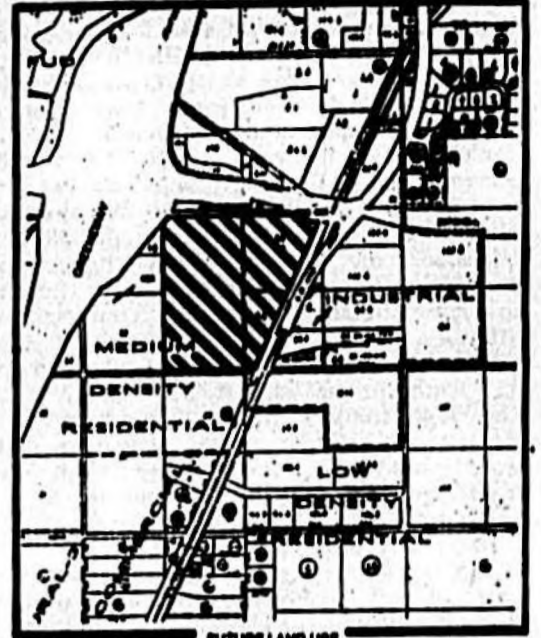
ANNEXATION - I am normally in favor of annexation. The city needs all they can get in tax revenues.

but they can be resolved by bringing the people together to achieve a common goal."

Regarding various problems and needs, Donato had the following observations:

● **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT** — This must be an utmost consideration for the city. We need to be in partnership with business, including those at the airport which will certainly bring more economy. We should look more at federal grants and capitalize on them. As for the Economic Incentive program, some of them are too long, 14 years. That is not good. We should offer three to five year tax incentives. We need strong agreements to protect the city.

● **EMPLOYMENT** — With

many of the new businesses, Sanford residents are not being hired. They say we have no skilled workers, so why shouldn't we tap into Florida state training money. We should also ask the county to get grants for this training.

● **COMMUNICATION** — We need to set up some focus groups, members of the community who will help us in some of the problems and help us open the lines of communication. I want to be a full-time mayor. I would go out into the public, meet with neighborhood associations, and generally improve communications between the people and the government. In this way, the city and its leaders can go a long way toward gaining more respect.

● **CRIME** — This is another

reason for focus groups. We need to target teen problems and issues. We also need to take a look at the police department administration and see if they are approaching the needs where they are. I also believe there are not enough police officers to handle the jobs they face. If the city can allocate \$318,000 for work on the stadium, we should certainly be able to find money for the police department. This city needs to reset its priorities.

● **LAKEFRONT** — We must be extremely aggressive when it comes to lakefront development. It should be a mecca for tourists. How can we motivate this development? We contact developers. They have the visions we may need. The area could also

include a mini-harbor and shops along the waterfront.

● **ANNEXATION** — I am for any annexation, as long as it is going to increase the tax base for the city.

● **WHY AM I RUNNING** — I truly want to turn Sanford into a success story.

immediate solving however, is to eliminate the midges from the lakefront area. "Those midges bother everyone," Dale said. "People can't go anywhere near our lakefront, they can't go fishing, and those businesses, especially the motel, are all suffering. It doesn't need to be that way, and I'm sure there are federal funds we can get to help get rid of the midges."

Regarding specific aims of his campaign Dale commented on the following:

● **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT** — The city needs economic prosperity and development. The county has the highest economic level, but Sanford has the lowest. We need good paying jobs. We have the labor force, but we need to entice business to come into the area.

● **AIRPORT** — Many cities would kill for an airport like we have. But it's not doing property noise abatement. It has to ex-

pand even further, but there is no reason why noise should be a problem if properly handled.

● **HISTORIC PRESERVATION** — We need to keep the historic downtown and residential areas. We need an updated comprehensive plan to entice industry who will pay a decent wage. We are not going to revitalize the downtown area by ourselves. We need people with money to help us.

● **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT** — This is no longer a celery or truck farm city. Those days are gone with the wind. We need to turn Sanford around. We have plenty of skilled workers but they have got to be better trained. We are not utilizing Seminole Community College for this, and we should be. We have allowed prosperity to pass us by. We also need a better partnership with the county and state, and through federal grants.

● **GOVERNMENT OPERATION** — We missed the ball on federal funds to help fight crime

and help the police. Economic prosperity is not a quick fix, but we must get started on it. Also, the commission needs business people on it. Not just the mayor, but every one of them must have business skills. After all, running a city is a business.

● **POLICE DEPARTMENT** — The Sanford police department has low morale. It needs to be completely reorganized.

● **ANNEXATION** — Let those be annexed that want to be.

● **PROBLEMS** — We need more parking downtown, especially with improvement to government buildings. We need a classy boardwalk area along the lakefront and not a honky-tonk operation. We also need to clean up Highway 17-92. It's the ugliest highway in the county.

● **WHY AM I RUNNING** — It's time for Sanford to have a mayor to bring to the table what I am capable of, services and experience. The mayor must have good connections to get things accomplished, and I have them.

● **PRIORITIES** — We need to restructure our priorities. For example, we need a ladder truck (Fire Dept.). I can't see turning this need down when the city can come up with over \$300,000 to restructure the ball park. As for the ball park, I would encourage the city not to just do things half way.

● **BUSINESS GROWTH** — I can't understand the city's attitude toward new business. For the sake of our future budgets, we need to look for new business. While we romance commerce, we are ignoring industry. We need industry. The job opportunities are much greater.

● **ECONOMIC INCENTIVE** — I don't understand this. We don't have a sustained income, yet we can give money away.

● **WATERFRONT** — God made it beautiful. I believe it could be adapted into the downtown's future. We need to develop it but timing is important. First we must get the rest of our house in order. The lakefront could be developed by ourselves or with a business partnership. Both have their good points.

● **POLICE DEPARTMENT** — The problem with the police may be in the leadership. We must get prostitutes and drug dealers run out of town, make this a drug-free community, and stop providing drug lords with a place in which to conduct their business.

● **WHY AM I RUNNING** — I care for people and care for this city. I see Sanford in the way of northbound growth movements. If we don't grow, we will become a slum. The problem is a power block which has managed this city for 40 years. Changes have to start at the top with a whole new group in place.

need more youth programs.

● **MORALE** — The city employees are more unhappy than any employment force I've known. The single need at city hall is improved management. We must be pro-active and service oriented. We must solve problems rather than treat symptoms. The line of communications in city hall is non-existent. Nothing goes down upper levels down, and nothing goes from lower levels up. Staff expertise is not used. Also, there is no communications with citizens. The city holds work sessions in a small room where there is hardly any room for the public, and the public is not allowed to speak. I would hold those meetings at the start of the regular commission meeting so that everyone could be involved.

● **IMAGE** — The biggest problem with Sanford is the image people have of it. Local businesses often advertise themselves as being "near Orlando" when they are actually in Sanford. Orlando and other outsiders are actually making jokes about us allowing this to happen. Sanford needs a video to promote itself.

● **IMPROVEMENTS** — Sanford needs to clean up its medians. We need to keep the county courthouse in the downtown area. We also need some type of incentive program to entice people to want to make the city more beautiful.

● **LAW ENFORCEMENT** — We aren't paying our police officers a decent wage. I'm not sure hiring more police officers is the answer to fighting crime, because we don't have the money to pay for more. But they do need better salaries.

● **ANNEXATION** — We can't let matters such as annexation become a racial problem. I would propose a task force made up of black, white and Hispanic citizens to help us in this way if they want us to annex Midway or Loch Arbor, or any other area, we must first look at the cost of water and sewer and other needs. We should not try to take on other's problems.

● **WHY AM I RUNNING** — I've been in Sanford for 25 years, and I'm concerned about the direction the city seems to be going. Especially when it comes to the lakefront development. It hasn't changed a bit in 25 years. I believe it's time we started to do something."

waterfront walk. In order for it to happen, we will need to grow, have better code enforcement, an improved visual attitude, and more industrial development, although more residential growth will provide more property taxes.

She continued, "We need sufficient revenue in order to bring us the quality of life we deserve. We need safety, tranquility and prosperity."

Regarding specific issues, Jacobson had the following comments and/or observations:

● **MAIN PROBLEMS** — There is a lot wrong with Sanford's public safety, including law enforcement and fire protection. We need better maintenance to repair our flooding streets. We

issues Blair sees as problems or concerns, he listed the following:

● **CITY PROPERTY** — I'm concerned that the city has just leased the PBA building for \$150 per month. It's not being used for much else, why not sell it and get it put back on the tax rolls. Regarding the need for baseball fields, if we are going to develop the stadium, do we really need ball fields in Fort Mellon Park? If we could get some more commitment about the stadium, we may be able to turn it into a profitable venture.

● **TAXATION** — They say the city needs a new public safety complex. Why couldn't we turn the old police station area into a park. But we have a lot of land not on the tax rolls. That's why we have the least to show but the highest millage.

● **COMMERCIAL GROWTH** — We need to generate more commercial business to build the tax income in the city. We have plenty of developable land available but it isn't being used. We should also give some incentives to people who may develop some of the vacant buildings.

● **ECONOMIC INCENTIVE** — We should involve smaller businesses in the Economic Incentive Program as well as the larger ones, but let's not give away the farm to attract business. What is happening now is that big business moves in, then threatens the city with moving out unless other concessions are granted. This can't be right.

Co. was actually looking at Sanford as a location, "but the farmers had a death grip on the city, so they moved elsewhere."

Regarding individual matters, Thomas observed and commented on the following:

●**LAKEFRONT** — There are a lot of vacant lots along the lakefront. It could become entertainment row. An apartment would be a great potential, and I see one day, a big motel with a convention facility. But the only way we can do it is to attract more people into Sanford.

●**MORALE** — It's unfortunate we couldn't give salary increases to the police department, but you can't get blood out of a turnip. In 1984, we had the luxury of federal and state revenues to help us, but now, we haven't been able to attract industry, and money is running out. All we get now are unfunded mandates. (Regarding the elevation of Joe Dillard to

the position of police chief): Credentials aren't always everything if someone isn't a people person, and Joe Dillard is.

●**LAW ENFORCEMENT** — Citizen marches (against drugs) are good, but it will take much more. Regarding the proposed new Public Safety Complex, I prefer the expandable type so we can grow in the future.

●**EMPLOYMENT** — Too many people don't have job skills. We need to work in concert with schools to have more vocational training. Schools are not meeting the needs of our students. Through a courtship with the school board, we can help the deterioration of the family structure.

●**COMMUNICATIONS** — I would like to get into a courtship with all pastors in the community, go to churches and hold meetings with church leaders and local officials. I believe it will make a difference. I will make myself more visible in the community, including at schools.

●**RACE RELATIONS** — We need people who have nerve and audacity to bring the races together. Are we going to allow our children to face the same rock? People have to exemplify themselves.

●**ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT** — Our economy is suffering from neglect. People are not willing to change but that's what we have to do. Regarding Economic Incentive payments, the city doesn't have the money to do what it wants to do. But I believe small businessmen also deserve some incentives.

●**ANNEXATION** — He said he favors annexation of the Midway area, and said it's an explosive issue that seems certain to meet with opposition.

●**PROBLEMS** — There are several facilities Sanford needs badly. We lost the Greyhound Bus station. We need to get it back. We also need a local train ticket office. Right now all we have is a hickish depot.

●**WHY AM I RUNNING** — I feel I can lead this city to where it should be.

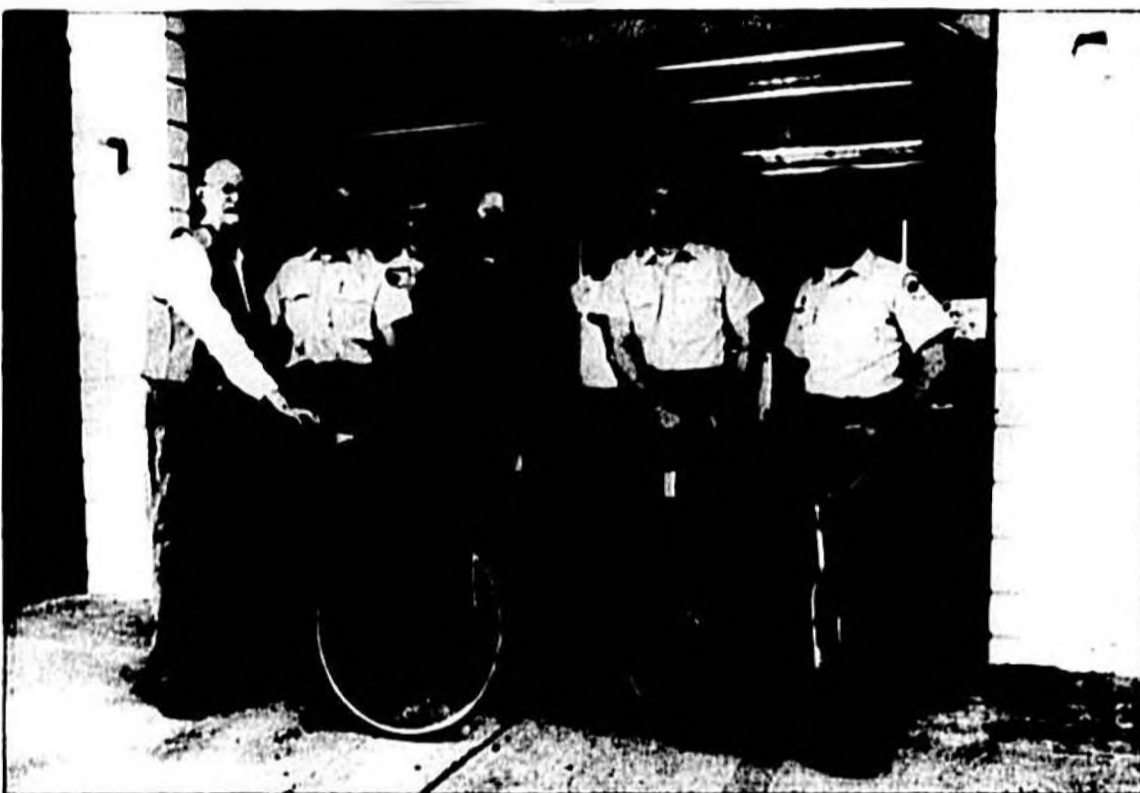

 renovations to the homes in Georgetown.
 DeLattibeaudiere believes strongly that there needs to be a "move on law" that forces those who chose to loiter or commit crimes in Sanford to move along out of town.
 He believes there is a lot of good in Sanford that needs to be explored. Money is being spent on some unnecessary things, he said, such as the stadium renovations and being kept from other much-needed programs such as the renovation of Georgetown.
 DeLattibeaudiere was a policeman in Jamaica for 18 years before moving to Sanford. He

has been a building inspector and has served on many boards and committees for the city government over the years.
 The candidate also took the following stances on the issues:
LAKEFRONT DEVELOPMENT — We need to have hotels on the waterfront, he said, so that we can attract conventions to Sanford. He does not have a preference on whether the city or private investors should finance the development.
ECONOMIC INCENTIVE — The money the city provides to attract businesses in the area should be spread equally between big and small businesses, he noted. Small businesses can provide employment as well as

large ones.
MORALE — The pay, especially for the police officers and firefighters, is "way too low", DeLattibeaudiere said. We need to do something about that before we can even begin to think about other problems, he noted. Morale will improve if we can provide more competitive salaries.
IMAGE — Something needs to be done to ensure code enforcement is taken seriously, he noted. A lot of work needs to be done to clean up Sanford.
WHY HE'S RUNNING FOR OFFICE — "My wife encouraged me to run because she knows I can fix any problem when I set my mind to it," he noted.

 on us.
 "We've got to stop being the test rat for the county," Lossard said. "We've tolerated sub-standard performances on the part of some city employees for too long. We just can't do that anymore."
 He said he intends to donate his salary as a city commissioner to various projects that are part of the "reclamation of Goldsboro and Georgetown."
 He promises that within the next six months, whether he is elected or not, he will be able to build five new parks in Sanford.

all with private money.
 Lossard had the following comments on some of the issues facing the city:
LAKEFRONT — Because it is "just as easy to turn left as it is to turn right" off the interstate, he noted, we have to do something special to draw people into Sanford. Development of the waterfront would make that possible. The development needs to be a combination of public and private money, he said.
ECONOMIC INCENTIVES — He believes Sanford "sold (its) soul on the mall," but that

economic incentives are a good way to attract needed jobs to Sanford. The money could be used to attract both large and small businesses that could use a highly trained workforce in the city.
MORALE — The poor morale in the Sanford Police Department is the result of poor management, he noted. There are plenty of good officers and some great ones, he said, but the low pay and poor management has caused a bad attitude among the officers. The money spent on mediation and litigation with the police union would be enough to give officers a nine percent raise, he suggested.
IMAGE — We need to "take back our streets one-by-one," Lossard said. With more pride in our city we will be able to attract others to see the good things in Sanford.



It was Warrick Dunn who was too good for the Gators (10-1). Dunn ran for a career-best 185 yards and Pooh Bear Williams scored on two short TD runs in the 31st meeting between teams ranked 1-2. "Warrick was sensational," Florida coach Steve Spurrier, now 2-5-1 against the Seminoles, said. "He won the game for them, probably. 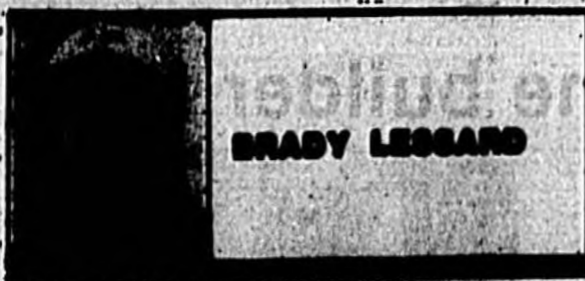
What's Up in the NFL 1996...Week No. 14

Waterfowl hunting in Central Florida

Duck hunters in Central Florida have lots of hunting areas from which to choose for the upcoming season which began this week.

In general, waterfowl hunting is permitted on any water body that has public access, unless it's closed for a specific reason, such as being within a park or in an area where it is illegal to discharge a firearm.

"Because access to many hunting areas is easy, and hunter success rate is nearly twice the national average, Florida is a great place to hunt ducks," said Lt. Joy M. Hill, public information coordinator for the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC).

Waterfowl habitat covers vast areas of Florida and large numbers of migratory ducks winter here, particularly ring-necked ducks, scup, teal, wood ducks and wigeon. In addition, several species, such as the mottled duck (Florida mallard), and the fulvous whistling duck, are year-round residents.

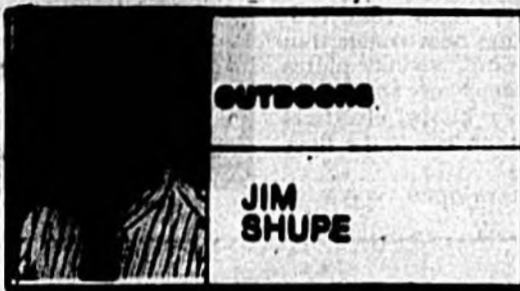
Although there are plenty of good places to duck hunt in Florida, following is a list of a few of the best places in the GFC's Central Region:

GUANA RIVER WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA is located in St. Johns County near St. Augustine. It offers a variety of managed wetland habitats that include 2,300 acre Lake Ponte Vedre, and several smaller ponds and impoundments located in the adjacent uplands.

A good variety of ducks, from teal to diving ducks can be found here. This WMA has specific regulations and is open to hunting only on certain days.

RODMAN RESERVOIR (LAKE OKLAHOMA) is located in Putnam County. It is a deep-water reservoir built and maintained by the Corps of Engineers. Recent counts of ducks on January surveys have ranged widely, up to 3,500. Ring-necked ducks are most common. Statewide regulations apply.

EMERALD MARSH CONSERVATION AREA is located in Lake County and consists of old muck farms in the floodplain of

Lake Griffin that have been restored as wetlands. Hunting is regulated by the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWD), and has been good in recent years. Call them at (904) 329-4500 for details.

HEBRITT ISLAND NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE in Brevard County consistently provides excellent duck hunting. It generally holds the state's largest concentration of wigeon and pintails. Teal, mottled ducks and scup are also abundant.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service closely regulates hunting on the refuge, and hunting is allowed only in certain areas and on certain days. Call (407) 867-0887 for specific regulations.

THE UPPER ST. JOHNS RIVER LAKE AND MARSHES from Indian River County north to Lake Harney have historically been considered among the best waterfowl habitat in the state. This extensive area provides virtually unlimited opportunities for diverse hunting experiences in terms of species, habitats and modes of hunting.

However, the diverse hunting and constantly changing habitats require hunters to do extensive scouting in order to find and access good hunting spots. Much of the area south of Lake Polk is within the Upper St. Johns River Type II WMA and use of the area is regulated by SJRWD. For details contact their office at (904) 329-4500.

T.M. GOODWIN WATERFOWL MANAGEMENT AREA is a 4,000 acre public waterfowl area located in Brevard County in the upper St. Johns River basin. It is part of the Upper St. Johns River

Federal Flood Control Project and may be flooded periodically during adverse water conditions.

It is intensively managed by the GFC to provide high quality habitat for waterfowl and other wetland wildlife. Public access is controlled through the area headquarters. It is open to hunting only on certain days and for a limited number of hunters. For details call (407) 736-2862.

Sebastian Inlet still offers good snook action with fish up to 15 pounds on large live shrimp. County on a few redfish, flounder, small snapper, jack crevalle and ladyfish to be mixed in with snook catches. Snook and tarpon are rated as good in the Sebastian River.

Captain Jack at Fort Canaveral reports that offshore fishing is good before or several days after passing cold fronts. By then, seas subside and permit fishing. Expect a few king mackerel on S-A Reef and Pelican Flats. Wahoo and dolphin are scattered offshore.

Ponce Inlet has great action with sheepshead, and soon ocean fish in the 8-10 pound range will be spawning around the north jetties. Large live shrimp or fiddler crabs are the top bait. Drum, small bluefish, a few redfish, and jack crevalle are also roaming around the rocks. Trout season is closed, but trout and redear are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

Childress lures McReynolds from Yates

CHARLOTTE — Richard Childress, seeking ways to boost Dale Earnhardt's bid for a record eighth Winston Cup driving title, has lured crew chief Larry McReynolds away from Robert Yates Racing.

McReynolds, whose cars have won 22 races in 11 years on stock car racing's top series, has agreed to join Richard Childress Racing next month as Earnhardt's crew chief, Childress said Friday. Terms of the multi-year deal were not released.

"We've lost races to cars that Larry has prepared," Earnhardt said. "Needless to say I'm very glad to have him working with us instead of against us." Earnhardt has run on some

relatively tough times since winning his second consecutive Winston Cup championship in 1994. It was the seventh season driving title of his career and it tied him with the now-retired Richard Petty for the most championships in the history of the sport.

After losing out to Jeff Gordon in the battle for the 1995 driving title, Earnhardt faded to fourth in this year's final standings, a distant 350 points behind champion Terry Labonte.

Earnhardt has 70 career Winston Cup victories but just two this year and none since the March event at Atlanta Motor Speedway, a span of 37 races.

Enter McReynolds, 37, a soft-spoken, hard-working man with a reputation for providing calm leadership in an often hectic sport.

"Larry is one of the most respected crew chiefs in Winston Cup racing," Earnhardt said. "With his addition to RCR, I feel that another championship is closer than ever."

McReynolds will be the third crew chief on Earnhardt's car in three seasons. Andy Petree left after the 1995 season and was replaced by David Smith, who had no previous experience as a Winston Cup crew chief. Smith next year will become the crew chief for a second car Childress is fielding, this one to be driven by Mike Skinner.

While the addition of McReynolds will give RCR a proven winner, it will create a leadership vacuum at Robert Yates Racing. McReynolds currently oversees the operations of both of Yates' Winston Cup cars

— driven by Ernie Ivan and Dale Jarrett — and serves as Ivan's crew chief.

Yates was meeting with various RYR employees on Friday to discuss a possible successor to McReynolds.

Former local money guru fights creditors

ORLANDO — Charles J. Givens Jr., who teaches people how to get rich, is fighting creditors scrambling to seize his company's assets in a bankruptcy reorganization.

The creditors accuse Givens, owner of International Administrative Services, of fraudulently transferring \$1.3 million from the company in 1982.

When the company filed for protection from creditors last June, it listed liabilities of \$15.3 million and assets of \$14.5 million.

Earlier this week, a U.S. bankruptcy court judge granted creditors' requests to place in escrow \$876,000 from the planned sale of the company's former headquarters building in Altamonte Springs, just outside Orlando.

The creditors allege that most of that money was used to buy the building's mortgage. Givens and one of his sons control the mortgage holder, Van Dan Mortgage Inc.

Because International Administrative Services received nothing for the money taken by Givens, creditors claim, the company should get some of the proceeds of the property's sale to recoup some of the creditors' losses.

The company, which sells financial education, used to operate as the Charles J. Givens Organization.

The company's reorganization plan, filed Monday in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Orlando, offers to pay unsecured creditors half of what they are owed.

Widow with AIDS struggles with fear, anger and secrecy

DEAR ABBY: My husband of 35 years died recently of AIDS. He was a salesman, well-liked, and traveled a lot. Evidently he did more than travel. I was unaware he had AIDS until the lesions appeared. He refused treatment and died a short time later.

I have been tested and the results show that I am HIV-positive. We have two grown children (33 and 30) who are devastated over this. I am in counseling trying to understand how I could have missed the signs.

My primary problem now is, what do I tell his college friends who come to see me? Should I tell the truth — that he had a secret life that I am HIV-positive, that I am terrified? What do I say to our friends as to the cause of his death? Right now, they think it was a virulent form of pneumonia. Also, his out-of-town clients who may have been involved in his activities could be at risk.

How I would love to ask him if the experience was worth the pain he has caused. I wanted to divorce him immediately, but he became sick so fast and I could not just throw him out, although I wanted to.

My children want me to keep the AIDS a secret because of what it will do to their future here in town. But will someone at the hospital let it slip? Will the doctors make a comment?

Sometimes I feel I'm losing my mind. I have contemplated suicide.

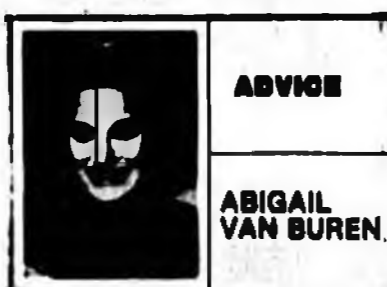
My counselor says it will take a while to work out my anger. I doubt that will ever be done. John knew he had AIDS long before it became apparent, yet he said nothing and did nothing. How vicious and selfish!

I am in massive turmoil. My faith in my religion is gone and I literally have no one to talk to. So you get to catch the flak, Abby.

My doctor says the largest contingent of new AIDS cases in the United States is women in their 50s or older, whose husbands infect them. They seem to think that it will never happen to them. Please tell your readers that they too can become a statistic and that they should be tested just to be on the safe side.

out to you. Thank you for an important letter, which highlights more than one serious issue. The first is confidentiality: You may assume that those in the health-care community will not divulge your family's private medical information.

The decision to make public your husband's cause of death is a very personal one to be made by you and your family. Whatever you decide, I urge you to enter an HIV/AIDS support group. There you can safely vent your feelings with people who understand what you are experiencing because they have dealt with those feelings themselves. There are many excellent AIDS support groups, and the local AIDS organization in your community can put you in touch with one of them.

I discussed your situation with Mervyn Silverman, M.D., past president of the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR). He said that although your diagnosis is a serious one, with the new drugs that have been approved — and others that are on the way — there is real hope for people with HIV/AIDS, something that just a few years ago did not exist for people who tested positive for HIV. That is why it is so important for people to be tested.

He also told me that your physician may have overstated the statistics, but there is a growing number of women and men over 50 who are being diagnosed with HIV. Therefore, people should not be lulled into a false sense of security thinking that AIDS could never happen to them. The couple have two children, Annette and Denise and four grandchildren.

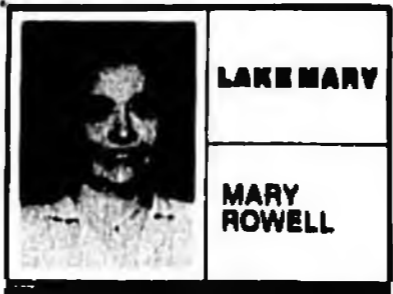
AARP learns benefits of walking

Exercise is not necessarily chosen by people who do. Yet exercise is essential to continued health, especially in older citizens. Exercising does not require 50 push-ups every day.

Eileen Cooney, an R.N. with Columbia Medical Center in Sanford, was the guest speaker for the AARP's November meeting. Eileen said exercise can be as easy as walking. To get started on a walking program, you should not just go out and walk.

The first step is a good pair of shoes, preferably running shoes, but almost any athletic shoe with a good arch will work. Step two? Stretch! You do not want to start working muscles that have not been worked in a while without first stretching them. Make sure your stretching exercises stretch your calf, quadriceps and hamstring. When you stretch, do not make the very common mistake of bouncing.

Another important thing to remember is to start out

slowly. If you have been a couch potato, you do not want to try to do five miles the first day. You won't make it, and you will get discouraged. If you walk outside, do not use a walkman. You cannot hear the traffic, and you could get hurt.

Call to arms: Get your flu shots now

Here's some advice for the flu season: keep your pencils out of your mouth and wash your hands frequently.

And more importantly - if you haven't received a flu shot, get one NOW.

"It's going to be bad this year," says Dr. Bill Byrd, family physician at Palm Springs Urgent Care in Longwood. "We anticipate a very nasty flu season, one of the nastiest in years."

Dr. Harvey Schefsky, from the North Seminole Family practice in Sanford, said he has had some bad bronchitis cases, but so far no influenza cases. "No one has had the high fever of all-over aches that come with the flu."

"We strongly urge those who haven't had their shots to do so," he said. "The flu season runs through February. There is still time to get a shot and have the anti-bodies build up. This helps diminish chances of an epidemic."

Central Florida residents are at additional risk to various forms of flu because of abrupt changes of weather and contact with the large number of international tourists.

Combine this to an urgent warning from U.S. Health Department officials concerning this year's big threat - type A Wuhan, an offspring of the Hong Kong strain of 1968-69 that killed 34,000 Americans - has most Central Floridians gladly holding out their arms for the

new flu vaccine.

Bue Abraham, Patient Care Director at Lake Mary Care, said that the clinic's supply of 400 flu shots was exhausted in early November and that she is now referring others who want the shot to contact the Seminole County Health Department (323-3724).

"We try to order what we believe will be needed," Abraham said. "Not too much and too little. This year because of the warnings, more and more patients asked early and received their flu vaccine."

The U.S. Drug Administration prepares a new vaccine to meet the needs of each flu season - year old vaccines are of no use. They are destroyed and replaced by a new vaccine for the new flu season.

Obviously, the earlier the shot the better off a patient will be.

"The season has begun and we've got people who still hadn't

had their shot," said Victoria Harrison, the administrator at Palm Springs Urgent Care, which has a supply of flu shots that cost \$10 apiece, which ARE covered by Medicare.

"The first people who come to us for flu vaccines are teachers and parents," Harrison said. "They're particularly at risk being around children who are coughing all the time and rubbing their noses."

"Flu spreads with hand to hand contact," Harrison said. "Kids can't wash their hands at school and after they've coughed into them or tried to wipe away their noses with a tissue they spread the virus to someone else they touch."

"You would be surprised how easy you can get the flu if you've put a pencil in your mouth or use a telephone after someone who had the flu used it," she said. "The key is to have

received a flu shot."

Can you block out the virus without taking a vaccine jab? Not in all cases. It helps immensely but is not the total remedy.

No shot spells big trouble, however.

"The government's warnings are not to be taken lightly," Abraham said. "It's not their job to scare people - but to sufficiently warn them."

"It does seem that the warnings are tougher each year," Harrison said, "and that we try to get ready for the worst."

Particularly at risk are those who suffer from asthma, and those who smoke.

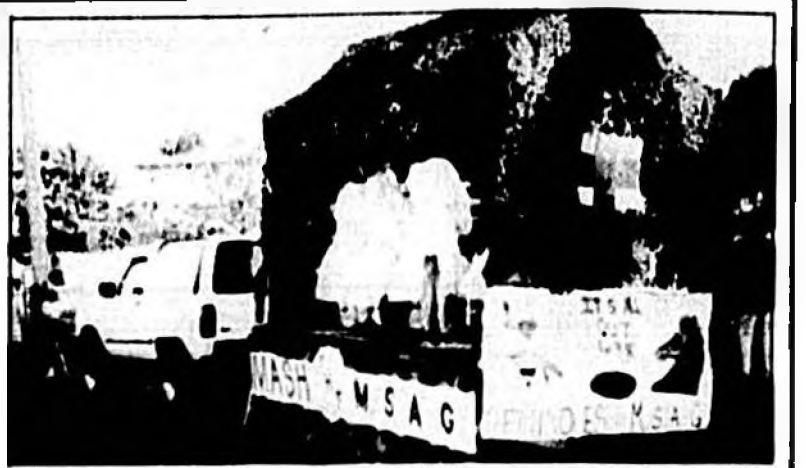

More medical choices than ever for weight control

Redux or fen-phen?

Even before Redux hit the drugstores last summer, many people were already taking another closely related appetite suppressant, a combination of the medicines fenfluramine and phentermine.

Redux is known generically as dexfenfluramine. As the name implies, it is a refined version of fenfluramine, which is one-half of fen-phen.

In its original form, fenfluramine came in two varieties that could not be separated: dexfenfluramine, which curbs hunger, and levofenfluramine, which makes people sleepy.

In the 1980s, doctors found they could offset the sleep-inducing symptoms of fenfluramine by combining it with phentermine, a mild am-

phetamine-like drug.

The two balance each other. Fenfluramine makes people drowsy; phentermine makes them alert. Fenfluramine gives people loose bowels; phentermine makes them constipated.

Eventually, chemists found a way to take the levofenfluramine out of fenfluramine, leaving just dexfenfluramine. The result was Redux.

More prescription diet drugs are in the works. Among them:

• Meridia, or sibutramine, developed by Knoll Pharmaceutical Co., stops hunger by affecting brain levels of the chemicals serotonin and norepinephrine.

• Xenical, or orlistat, made by Hoffmann-La Roche Inc., blocks absorption of fat in the digestive system.

• Leptin, made by Amgen, is a genetically engineered human protein that helps the body regulate fat deposition.

Doing nothing, too much can be bad for your back

NEW YORK - Backache is one of the most common reasons why older Americans visit the doctor. With age, the discs that absorb shock to the spine lose flexibility, increasing susceptibility to injury. In many women, the osteoporosis that comes with age also weakens the spine's support structure.

The risk of backache is increased by both inactivity and too much of the wrong kind of activity. It's best to have an exercise trainer or physician lay out a conditioning program designed for an individual's specific needs.

In general, however, these activities are good for most older people:

- Walking, the more the better. It should be done with athletic shoes, at a normal pace that doesn't interfere with conversation.

- Swimming, with the right kind of strokes. The breast stroke and utterly can put pressure on the spine. The sidestroke and backstroke are easier on the spine.

- Bicycling, but not with a racing bike, whose forward-leaning posture can strain back

muscles. A mountain bike has thicker tires that can absorb road shock and permits a more upright posture.

Studies show that people who stay moderately active usually recover faster. But don't overdo it and stay away from any activity that you think caused the back problem.

Comedy Capers: 'Alive with laughter'

On Dec. 7 and 14, the Frank Evans Senior Center will come alive with laughter when the Lake Mary Players team with the well-known Screen Actors Guild professional, David McLaughlin, in *Comedy Capers*.

The theater, located in the Frank Evans Center (old City Hall) of Lake Mary, is a perfect place to see a show of any kind. The building has lots of windows, wooden floors and a small stage which creates a feeling of intimacy and makes the audience feel up close and personal with the performers.

Comedy Capers consists of six skits and one monologue, each with differing themes. "We use the Carol Burnett style of comedy," McLaughlin explained. "The actual comedy comes mostly from one liners."

McLaughlin is best known for his striking resemblance to, and flawless imitation of, Jack Benny. *Comedy Capers* begins with McLaughlin's monologue in which he impersonates a variety of actors including Benny.

Next is a skit presented by local talent, the Lake Mary Players. "Flight '13' to Nowhere" is the story of three airline crew members and their interactions with each other and the five passengers who are on board. Each passenger has a different background and reason for being on the flight and the humor comes from their conversations with each other and the stewardess, played by Debora Casano. Casano delivers her lines with seeming ease and her timing allows the others to pull off the punchlines.

McLaughlin reappears in the next skit, "The Waitress." He portrays a grouchy elderly customer in a small diner and is accompanied by Carol Halliburton as the overly impatient and impolite waitress. Each utters puns and insults as if they really detested each other and the audience reaps the benefits of eavesdropping on their banter. "Love Potion," which teams Casano with three members of the airline skit, is perhaps the highlight of the evening. Brian Alexander, Shane

Becker, and Abe First-Page compliment Casano in this adaptation of a deal with the devil that goes awry. There is a lot of physical comedy in this skit and each of these young actors appears to be at ease with the exaggerated gestures and asides to the audience. The best line of the evening is delivered when Gavin, portrayed by Alexander, asks First-Page's devil what Hell is like and is asked in return, "Have you ever been to Bithlo?" Local references were made throughout the show, much to the enjoyment of the audience.

Following intermission, the next skit was a pun on daytime drama. "As the Stomach Turns" starred Halliburton in her third skit of the evening. She was convincing in her portrayal of a housewife who was oblivious to the wrong doings going on around her. She simply wanted what was best for her family, especially Gramps, played by the oldest member of the Lake Mary Players, Jim Bilderbeck. This skit was truly in the Carol Burnett style.

A Presidential News Conference followed with McLaughlin, being interviewed by the press, as Ronald Reagan, George Bush, Bill Clinton, and Jimmy Carter. The news reporters played straight men for McLaughlin who delivered the funniest one liners of the evening.

The final act had the audience in stitches. Alexander, Becker, and First-Page teamed with Andrew Ebanks to contribute a little

culture and flare. All that can be said about this skit without spoiling the surprise is that it provided a perfect ending for the show.

Comedy Capers is directed by Joan Wahl, a resident of Winter Springs. Wahl feels very strongly about the need for local theater, especially for the senior residents.

"We encourage seniors to come out," Wahl explained, "not only to watch but to participate. Seniors have a lot to offer and if they come out to volunteer only a couple of hours a week they could have a lot of fun."

Wahl has big plans for this little local theater. "We would like to put together workshops for children. I, myself, am a puppeteer and I would like to pass that along. Art workshops as well as more involvement by SAC actors would really liven this place up, also. Our actors range from 17 to 73 years of age. We are a senior center but we want everyone in the community to be involved and benefit. We give to the community and we would like to have their support."

McLaughlin says of his director, "It's amazing what she's done, especially with the kids. Everyone's attitude is great and we all work well together."

Children and adults alike will enjoy this comical production. Tickets are \$7 per person and are reduced to \$5 with a group of 15 or more. This is a very inexpensive way to enjoy an evening at the theater and support local talent at the same time.
