Grid War Is On To Get Service Of High School Star

CLEVELAND, June 16, (WW)—Yes, there's a war on for the football services of "Touchdown Tommy" Phillips. At the last count, 42 universities or colleges were engaged in an undignified scramble for Ohio's No. 1 high school star.
The coaches, athletic directors and influential alumni have been looking for months around the 17-year-old high school senior whose career sounds like a chapter lifted from Frank Merriwell's amazing exploits.
Francis Leahy, athletic director-head coach of Notre Dame, has been among the visitors to Phillips' home. The dizzy whirl has included almost numberless invitations since last fall and the sensational passing tailback has found time to accept some.
He went to the University of North Carolina to see the Rose Bowl game. He went to Tennessee to look over the Vols' campus. He has been to Notre Dame several times, and to Columbus to view Ohio State. He was asked to fly down to Vanderbilt to enjoy southern hospitality again, but couldn't spare the time from his after-school work at a gasoline station.
No, he didn't pay for the trips. Perhaps they just forgot, but only one of the official or unofficial representatives from the 42 schools of higher learning (and football playing) mentioned might be necessary to hold down a college job to help with expenses. His reputation is so great that only four small Ohio schools have tried to interest him. They know he's big game.

THE REASONS
Last fall he tossed 21 touchdown passes in eight games, scored seven more himself and booted 14 extra points for placement.
He threw five scoring passes against one, four against two, and has done the same thing all through high school.
In one game he completed 34 of 24 heaves, and 17 to 23 in another as his club won seven games and tied its other start.
He also calls signals, and plays basketball.
The tie game is a story in itself. Lawson-d high school held a 20-0 lead late in the third period when the 185-pound triple-threat went into action. He hurled two touchdown passes, sprinted across with the third marker and kicked two extra points for the thrilling tie.
Rated Ohio's best scholastic passer in a decade, he was named captain of The Associated Press all-Ohio selected by ballot of officials, coaches and sports writers, and recognized as official by the Ohio High School coaches' association.
Tom weighs 185 pounds and is five feet 10 inches tall. He is stocky with tremendous power which saw him occasionally on straying from the fullback spot, but usually as a tailback. And he's serene through the entire trying routine.

U. S. Bombers Score 35 Direct Hits On 2 Italian Battleships

Enemy Cruiser and Destroyer Are Hit In Mediterranean; No Planes Are Lost

(By Associated Press)
United States Army Liberators (Consolidated) bombers today are credited with scoring 35 direct bomb hits on two Italian battleships in operations with the RAF in the central Mediterranean. The commander said it was like "shooting fish in a barrel."

Officers reported all planes came back safely. One Fascist battleship was hit in the Mediterranean. The other was set afire and a destroyer damaged.

Meanwhile, British convoys attacked Malta and Tobruk escorted by RAF and United States forces, despite Italian sinking claims. The British broke Axis attacks at El Adem and Acroma, the north key to the stronghold of Tobruk and began the defense of El Adem in the same sector.

The Nazi high command broadcast that Field Marshal Rommel had won the battle of North Africa, but the vital Tobruk stronghold, which Hitler had ordered captured at all costs, remained firmly in British hands.

The German announcement seemed to verify the British contention that the battle of attention had so far failed the enemy's striking power that he now must be held back before he can strike his offensive.

Supply trains were moving a steady stream of fresh tanks, guns and men to Tobruk. Gen. Sir Bernard Montgomery's army seemed to match the enemy's numerical forces which had survived the severe punishment of the six-pound anti-tank shells.

Fighting the RAF and the famed British 25-pound Howitzers.

The very ferocity of the air-sea battle in the adjoining Mediterranean was indicated that the British had determined to move supplies to Tobruk to reinforce their desert army.

Thousands See Sub Torpedo 2 American Ships

NORFOLK, Va., June 17, (AP)—An enemy submarine torpedoed two large American merchant ships Monday within view of thousands of persons at a Virginia beach resort who stared toward the sea as the ships were sunk. A navy blimp and a half dozen naval ships roared over the area in search of the daring undersea attacker. Dropping bombs and depth charges that sent huge gyres of water skyward.

The Navy had no comment as to the fate of the submarine in announcing the twin attacks Tuesday. Only one man was killed in the torpedoings, which occurred about 30 minutes apart. He was Robin Rowland of Philadelphia, second assistant engineer aboard one of the ships. There were 45 in the crew of the vessel and 45 in the crew of the other.







The first ship attacked remained afloat until late last night and the other was towed into port. Soldiers, sailors and coast guardsmen cleared the beach for a stretch of 100 yards in front of a coast guard station and held back the crowds as a surf boat brought ashore three enemy lifeboats and the body of Rowland, which was found floating about a half mile from his ship. His shipmates believed he was buried aboard by the explosion of the torpedo.

A beachhead built up over the shore of bathers and pleasure seekers as Rowland's body, covered with oil, was removed from the surf and carried to the coast guard station.

Petain Admits Discontent In France Grows

(By Associated Press)
A German broadcast today claimed the disintegration of the Reds in several Sevastopol positions, while the Russians claimed advances at Kharkov and Bryansk, capturing many Nazis.

The RAF smashed Ruhr and Rhineland bridges and reported the downing of seven bombers.

In Vichy, Marshal Petain admitted discontent is growing in France. He asked the people to let him at least one of the crucial dates in our history to make you share the great hope, which still animates me for the salvation of our country.

The 32-ton Russian tanks which paced Marshal Timoshenko's Ukrainian offensive last month charmed into action against the new German drive and cracked the spine of Marshal Von Brock's armored legions, the Russians reported.

Then the Red army swung over to the offensive in a number of sectors, advanced, and seized more favorable positions. At one point the Russians suddenly launched a surprise attack on a German position and captured it.

Fighting of local character and patrol activity was general on the Russian front, the early morning communiqué of the Red Army said.

The Red air force was active everywhere. It was credited officially with destroying or damaging 12 German tanks, 100 trucks carrying troops and supplies, and 10 anti-aircraft guns.

A German munitions dump was blown up, along with a gasoline depot and a railway train wrecked.

Latin American Trade

Commerce between North and South America must not be regarded as a mere war measure, but the United States must prepare for a lifetime partnership. Edward Tomlinson, expert on Latin American affairs and dean of radio commentators in that field, writes in the Rotarian magazine.

Economic conflicts are widely publicized. Such items as Argentine beef and corn imports to the United States draw widespread comment. But actually, Tomlinson points out, the two American continents really fit together better than any other group of nations in the world.

A striking example of this is tin. Though Bolivia contains 60 percent of the world's supply of tin ore, Tomlinson emphasizes that "until now there has not been a single important tin smelter or refinery anywhere in the Americas." The British and Dutch controlled mines of Malaya and the Netherlands Indies furnished the entire world with some 85 percent of its finished product. Now smelters and refineries are being built in the United States, and the flow of tin ore will be paralleled by the return flow of finished articles.

Other examples cited are Brazilian oilseeds as a substitute for tung-oil from the Far East, Cuban and Brazilian manganese in place of the dwindling supply from Russia and Scandinavia, Argentine and Chilean tungsten to replace sources in Europe, and short wool combs to give the carpet industry its basic materials now available from Argentina and Chile instead of from Mongolia.

By the expansion and diversification of their production and commerce, Tomlinson concludes, "The Americas can make themselves self-supporting and able to withstand economic depressions and economic crises."

I will be guided by reason, rather than by emotion, in the study of that which makes right the matter of right.

I will do my utmost to inspire confidence in the leaders of our war effort.

I will do my utmost to wear my power and my influence as a Legionnaire in a way that will bring credit to my country.

I will resist every temptation to hamper my country's efforts in this war by any means, physical or moral, that will bring discredit to my country.

I will be ever alert as a guardian of my country's rich heritage—the American heritage of freedom and justice.

Rare Birds Seen

For several weeks two Reddish Egrets have loitered in marshes adjacent to Clewiston. This species is a member of the heron family and was one of the plumbe birds sought by hunters in former times.

A Reddish Egret, first seen in 1890, the bird was very rare in Florida. When plumbe hunting was stopped the Snowy and the American Egret regained their former abundance.

The Reddish Egret, however, never became plentiful again and to this day is regarded as an unusual bird in Florida. The two birds visiting in this area are in the white phase. One is in the immature plumage, the other is an adult, the latter being a very beautiful object with white feathers overlain with fine nuptial plumes of rusty color.

The birds are only slightly larger than the Snowy Egret and have yellow or flesh colored bills. The Snowy Egret has a black bill. The American Egret may be distinguished from the Reddish Egret by its much larger size and its black bill.



Russians Crush Nazi Infantry Attacks At Kharkov, Sevastopol

Indications Are War Machine Of Enemy Is Losing Punch; RAF Pounds Port

(By Associated Press) In the Soviet campaign, Russia's armies today beat off a series of furious new German assaults around Sevastopol and shattered tanked German infantry attacks on the Kharkov front amid indications the Nazi war machine is losing some of its knockout punch.

RAF bombers pounded the German U-boat nest at St. Nazaire and attacked airfields and railways in northern France and Belgium. No German night raiders appeared over Britain.

On Wednesday the Sevastopol direction of forces repelled fierce enemy attacks in the morning. The high command reported that the German command had stripped the city of its last reserves of 250,000, of all Soviet civilians. It said the move, revealed when the tide of battle was turning against the Red army drive last month, obviously was aimed at removing the chance of a revolt by the people against their oppressors.

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Jap Losses In Sea Battles Are Much Heavier Than U.S.

ABOARD A FIGHTING SHIP PEARL HARBOR, June 18. (AP)—Admiral Nimitz, commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet, said Wednesday, Japanese personnel losses in the Coral sea and Midway battles were at least 10 times greater than those of the United States and enemy plane losses were in the same proportion.

The admiral, whose masterful strategy set the stage for one of the world's greatest naval battles and utterly destroyed a formidable Japanese fleet to occupy the Hawaiian islands, asserted in an address to the fleet the air power "has taken the leading role" in the war against the Japanese.

In an emotion stirring scene aboard this fighting ship, he declared: "We are greatly increasing our fighting strength. Our ships, planes and pilots are being added in constantly increasing numbers. It will be possible to organize additional (air-craft) carrier groups. Until that time, the admiral asked the veterans of the battles recently passed, to hold the line until our reinforcements are ready to take over."
