A Good Filibuster

A good illustration of the effectiveness of the filibuster as a means of preserving the essence of democracy, as well as a method for defeating iniquitous legislation, is afforded by the defeat of the anti-lynching bill.

As it is, the bill has been defeated, much to the rejoicing not only of the southern senators who filibustered against it, but also of most of the northern senators who would have voted for it if it had been allowed to come to a vote.

For the measure was not an anti-lynching bill at all, but was designed more as a "get even" piece of legislation against certain sections of the South where lynchings have occurred.

But it was brought to the floor of the Senate by senators who hail from certain northern states where the negro population can be and often is the controlling factor in an election between a democrat and a republican.

So here we have a case where a bill, sponsored by a handful of people who were seeking nothing better than revenge against a certain section of the country, gained the support of a majority of the people because they did not understand it and had not taken the trouble to read it.

There isn't the slightest doubt that if the majority of the people in the north knew the contents of the anti-lynching bill, they would be as much against it as their own senators who could have secured its enactment if they had been willing to vote for cloture and shut off debate on the bill but who were afraid it would become the law of the land if they did.

Although Washington was more or less a stay-at-home, his name traveled far. In far corners of the world—Poland, South Africa, Greenland, South America, Australia, Indo-China—his name is to be found; cities, towns, streets, mountains are named after him.

All in all, at least fifty countries of the world perpetuate his name; every state in the union contains the name "Washington" in some manner.

Chick Buyers Find It Easier To Re-Stock
GAINESVILLE, Fla.—Chick buyers in Florida will find it easier this year to restock their flocks with chicks produced under the National Poultry Improvement Plan, says Norman R. Mohrman, poultry specialist with the State Agriculture Extension Service. More states are cooperating and the number of participating hatcheries and breeders is larger than a year ago.

In the 42 states cooperating with the U. S. Department of Agriculture in administering the plan, about 7 million officially selected breeding chickens will be producing hatching eggs this year for the 1,500 hatcheries authorized to sell chicks under the breed-improvement program.

Spiritual Meditation Is Led By Preacher
Dr. James R. Clinton of Philadelphia is conducting each evening at the Congregational Church a spiritual meditation based on his own early struggles against adverse conditions.

Monday evening he spoke on "A Private Interview with the Man of Galilee." He stressed what an interview with Jesus meant to Zachaeus, and what changes it brought in his mode of thought and action. Dr. Clinton believes that religion is not something that is injected into people; it is a quality of life which grows from within.

The germ of religion is in the soul—divine in its origin and nature and endowed with far-reaching possibilities of development—but this germ requires both direction and cultivation, he said.

"We can not create religion but we can direct and cultivate it until it comes to maturity and fruition in personal character," he said. "It is this truth which places the church under the obligation of reaching out in every place and at all times, a friendly hand that more and more people may realize the possibility of interviewing even in this age, the Man of Galilee."

Tuesday evening Dr. Clinton will speak on the subject: "Unafraid in a World of Danger."

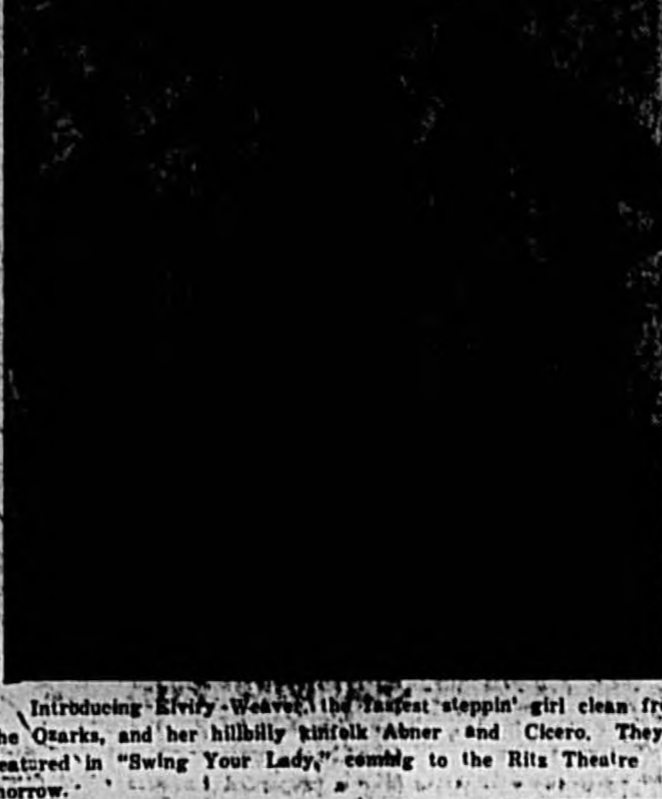

What's The World Coming To?

PLANES AND TRAINS
While we marvel at the strides in science and industry in the last quarter century, researchers are charting advances equally remarkable for the next 25 years. This is the first of five articles in which Alexander H. George, after talking with the planners, pictures life in 1963 as it shapes up in the laboratories and on the drafting boards of 1938.

Only 35 years have passed since President "Teddy" Roosevelt was praised by the newspapers for his "characteristic courage" in riding an automobile.

Today more people in the United States ride automobiles than can toothbrushes. Teddy's grandchildren can cross the Pacific in a passenger plane, and transport washes on toward undreamed speed and comfort.

Stratosphere Travel
From scientists and technicians who fall on devices to enter to a populace which travels more than any other in world history, comes the preview of transportation in 1963:

1. AIR TRAVEL DE LUXE—The China-bound North Orient Express slips through the placid atmosphere. In the air-conditioned dining-saloon, New York Inspector Jack McGee tops off luncheon with strawberries and cream some 25,000 feet above the frozen tundra of the Arctic. He and his 200 fellow-passengers are on a two-and-a-half-day flight from New York to Peiping. In deep-cushioned chairs they enjoy a television presentation of the football game between McGee's own Fighting Irish and the Golden Gophers of Minnesota.

After dinner and dancing to melodies from San Francisco, McGee chats by radio telephone with his wife in their Long Island home.

Pipe dream? Not if you take the word of conservative aviators. Technicians now are working on super-charged engines and cabins for high-altitude atmosphere, and there is serious talk that coast-to-coast sub-stratosphere trips will be offered the traveler in two or three years.

The Family Plane

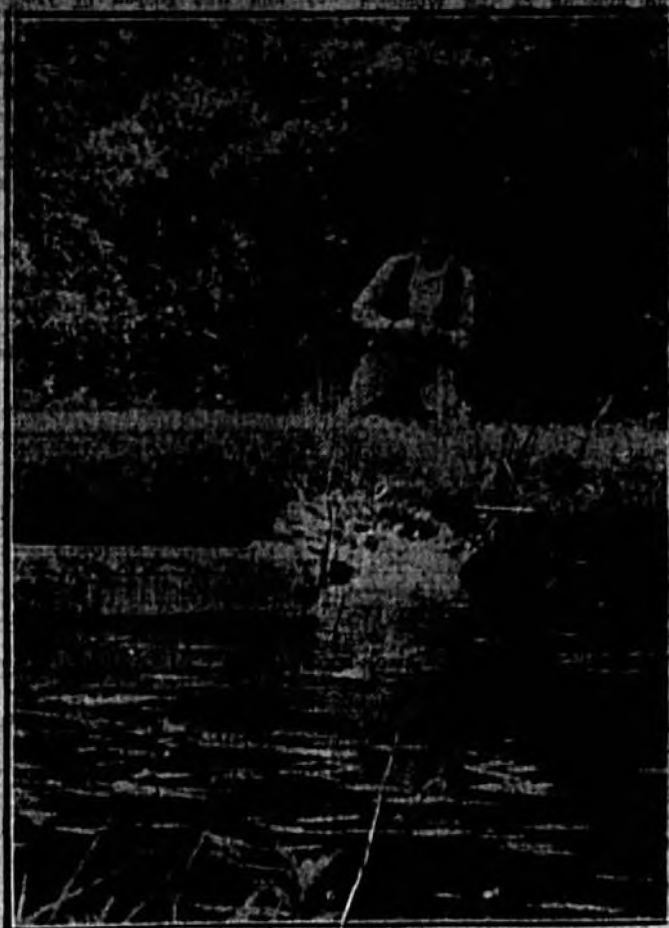

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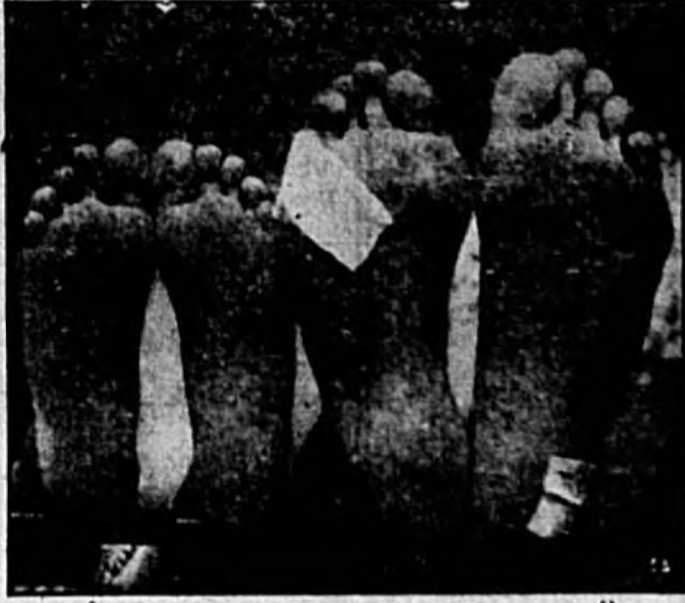

Hull Solicits Co-Operation Of American Nations

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—The United States Government bid yesterday for close co-operation among American republics...

Secretary of State Hull announced this objective and made public a message from President Roosevelt to the president of Argentina, expressing eagerness to assist in the furtherance of inter-American solidarity.

Hull held a luncheon publicly from the European ferment stirred by Adolf Hitler's scolding foreign policy speech and British moves to negotiate a new friendship with Italy.

His expressions concerning the desirability of solidarity on this continent were linked with that situation, however, in the minds of many students of foreign affairs. They were read with special interest in view of a prediction by Senator King (D. Utah), that Germany had become the most powerful nation in Europe.

"This is disturbing to me," said King, "because it seems she will push her economic policies in Latin America, and two nations there have many German citizens already. I refer to Brazil and Argentina."

"It means that she (Germany) will adopt a policy that will seek to undermine the influence of the United States in Latin America, as well as to undermine the Monroe doctrine."

That doctrine is that the western hemisphere is closed to further colonization by European powers.

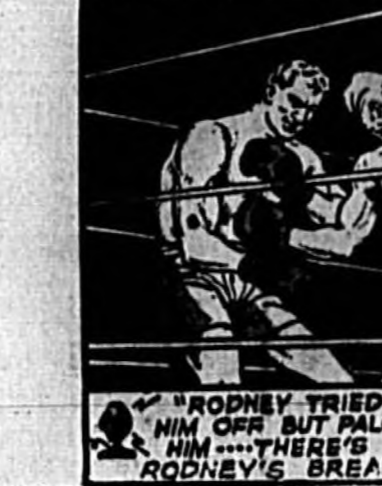

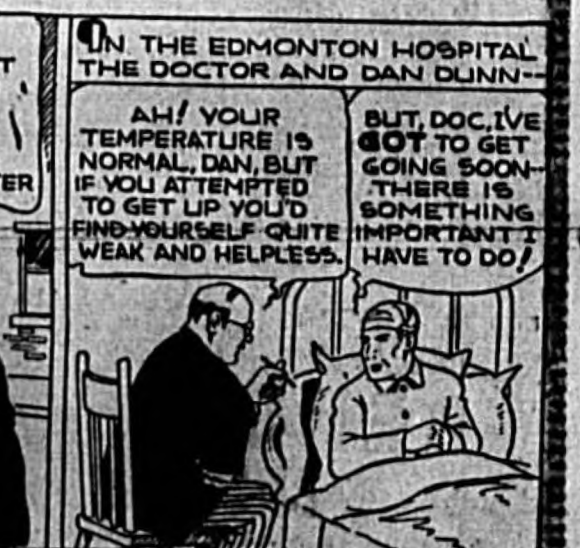

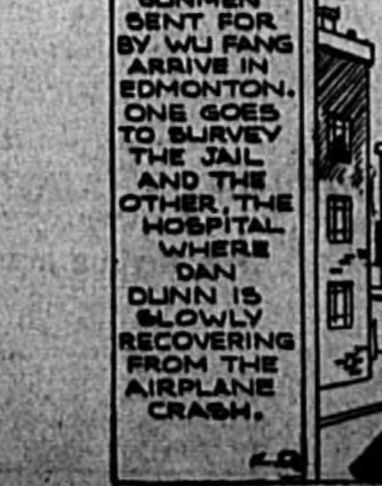

Manifesto By Labor Front Insists General Election Be Called On Policy

Chamberlain Wins In Commons Vote

Winston Churchill, Lloyd George Join Labor In Opposition

LONDON, Feb. 23.—(AP)—The British Labor Party and the Trades Union Council issued a manifesto today demanding the government submit its foreign policy to an immediate general election.

The nation's foreign policy has changed radically within the past few days when Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain decided to seek the friendship of Dictator Hitler of Germany and Mussolini of Italy rather than oppose their "invasion" of weaker countries.

A thundering conservative majority last night gave Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain a House of Commons victory in the wake of a cabinet crisis that ushered out Anthony Eden as foreign secretary and signalled a new British policy of appeasement.

Fighting bitter attacks in the Commons, Chamberlain was supported by 228 votes.

A vote of 330 to 168, Commons rejected a labor motion to censure the Prime Minister's action.
