

County Jobs—Officials May Exempt Some Positions From Freeze

 Thirty-three vacant jobs, already approved by Seminole County commissioners, will be reviewed by County Administrator T. Duncan Rose during the next two weeks to determine whether the jobs should be filled.
 Department heads have submitted lists of jobs they need to be exempted from an administrative hiring freeze placed in effect two weeks ago by Rose.
 County projections show that without reductions in staff and programs or increases in taxes, the county will have a \$5 million deficit in fiscal 1983-84.
 The jobs left unfilled in the hiring freeze have a payroll cost of \$450,000 annually.
 One area of concern is the recreation division, where five workers, assigned last year after a sheriff's department investigation revealed that county employees and materials were used for personal gain.
 A re-organization of that division was recommended just prior to Rose's arrival in Seminole County in January. Additionally, eight new jobs were approved for

the division in hopes of solving morale problems there.
 And although some of those positions have been filled, Director of Public Services and Development John Percy said, "The problem in parks haven't changed."
 He said two of the positions — parks designer and maintenance worker-program leader — are extremely important to the division. The parks designer is responsible for mapping out any planned additions or changes to the county's parks while the maintenance worker-program leader is a position designed up by commissioners to supervise work crews from the Seminole County Jail and people assigned to public service for drunk driving convictions.
 Two ad needs seems to have improved while the parks-Moist said he will be turning with Percy this week to determine which of the jobs should be exempted from the hiring freeze.
 Another position in Percy's department was approved Tuesday: Greg Whitley, a former employee at Seminole Hospital, was hired as a maintenance worker at a salary of \$9 per hour. The regular starting salary for maintenance workers is \$8.10 but

Percy recommended hiring Whitley at the higher wage because of his familiarity with the air conditioning and heating system at the hospital building, which will be used by the county for office space.
 Among the jobs which have not been filled are four fire service technicians, assistant training coordinator, fire investigator and a communications specialist in the Public Safety and Emergency services office supervisor, personnel aide and a systems analyst.
 Rose said he will take his recommendations to county commissioners for final approval.
 Commissioners also approved two other positions Tuesday. One of those jobs, a \$83,337-a-year safety officer, will be watched closely by at least two commissioners.
 "Frank Talarico was approved for the post Tuesday but without reservations by Commissioners Barbara Christensen and Bill Mitchell," Mrs. Christensen said the value of the safety officer has yet to be proven while Mitchell asked that additional duties be given to the safety officer.
 Commissioner Robert Sturm disagreed, claiming that

the safety officer has saved the county more than \$250,000.
 Rose told commissioners that Central Service Director Dave Hotaly has been given instructions to document any savings attributed to the safety officer. He said the post will be re-evaluated in coming budget work sessions.
 Talarico is a professional safety engineer and has more than 20 years of experience with Walt Disney World and Martin Marietta Corp.
 Commissioners also approved the hiring of Arthur Joy as a mechanic in the Fleet Management Department. Joy is the hired being at a salary above the county's standard starting pay.
 The Sanford resident will be paid \$276 a week, \$34 more than the starting pay and will work on the approach.
 Commissioners also approved the hiring of 11 temporary counselors in the Manpower office. Those counselors, paid by federal funds, will be used to help administer the county youth employment program in the county.

Moore Running; Yancey's

Lee P. Moore, mayor of the city of Sanford longer than anyone in the city's history, said today that "as this time I have no intention of seeking reelection in 1984."
 He cited the time demands of his position at Sunlantic Corp. as president and owner as the major reason.
 Meanwhile, political observers who have been speculating that City Commissioner Rod Yancey would run for mayor if Moore didn't had their predictions confirmed.
 Yancey confirmed today that, since Moore has decided not to seek reelection, he would begin laying the groundwork for the mayor's position.
 "There is no way I would have run for mayor as long as Lee Moore occupies the post," Yancey said. "He has done an excellent job as

mayor, and if he wanted to continue in that capacity, I'm all for it. But in fact he's not running for mayor in 1984."
 Moore was first elected to the City Commission in 1968 and was chosen as Sunlantic Corp. president in 1970. When the city charter was changed to require that the mayor be elected by the people, Moore was elected for the office in late 1970 but was defeated by a challenger who was elected by landslide in each succeeding election. His current term will expire in January 1985. At that time he will have been mayor for 15 years and a record of 10 years in the city commission for 16 years.
 Moore, who resides in public office, said he will celebrate his 60th birthday in December, with his grandchildren, and a niece of the city commission for 16 years.

"I have always believed that I was elected because I have some sort of basic intelligence and judgment. I like to believe I haven't been unduly influenced by outside pressures," Moore said today.
 During his years in office, the new city hall, public works complex and police station were constructed. But Moore is most proud of the city's paying off of its long-standing general obligation debt in 1978 and the management of the city over the years, which he says "has been outstanding."
 Moore has lured Sanford to his permanent home since 1966 when he and the former Ann Wiggin, a Sanford native, were married. After attending the University of Florida, he worked for a time, said, then joined the U.S. Army. After his separation from the Army in 1966, he returned to Sanford and has lived here ever since.
 He and Mrs. Moore are the parents of five children and they have four grandchildren.
 Yancey has been a city commissioner for two years, elected in 1980 to a four-year term. He is a graduate of Seminole High School and has attended Try State College in Alabama.
 Yancey has taught school, served four years in the Air Force and worked 18 years for the postal service before joining the bureau of Federal prisons in Atlanta.
 He and his wife, Mary, received the coveted John S. Kender Memorial Award last month from the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce for outstanding community service.

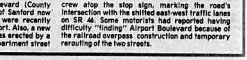

County Wants Five Points Rezoning

The rezoning of 15.85 acres owned by Seminole County along U.S. Highway 17-92 in Sanford will be considered by Sanford's planning and zoning board at its 7:30 p.m. Thursday meeting.
 The property, which is adjacent to the county's Five Points complex, is projected as the site of expansion projects in several county buildings.
 John Percy, Director of Public Services and Development, said the county will ask to change the zoning of the property from multi-family residential-commercial to a commercial office zoning.
 County commissioners approved the rezoning of the property in January for \$481,000.
 Development of the property could be delayed by a \$3 million deficit project for fiscal 1983-84 and larger deficits forecast for the next several years.
 County commissioners have discussed building a new office structure on the property by 1990 but the deficits and a decision to move into the old Seminole Memorial Hospital building may push back construction at Five Points.
 The property behind the Holiday House restaurant was originally considered as a possible site for a new health clinic. But when another site was obtained for the health clinic, commissioners approved the property as a site for a new county administration building.
 The property could also be the site of a predicted expansion of the Seminole County Jail. County Administrator T. Duncan Rose said the jail will need an additional 200 beds.
 The property is also being considered for possible expansion of the county's Public Works and Environmental Services Department.

Following action by the planning and zoning board, the rezoning will go to Sanford City Commissioners for final action.
 And while the county's financial picture may not be too rosy, its financial records are in tip-top condition, according to an audit performed by a consortium of accountants.
 The audit was prepared by Charlie Lansing & Co., May Zima & Co. and Ballia, Berach & Co. and covers the county's financial records for the 1981-82 fiscal year, which ended Sept. 30.
 The county's total assets were \$79.4 million, an increase from the \$76.1 million the previous year. Liabilities dropped from \$23.1 million in 1980-81 to \$19.4 in fiscal 1981-82. But the budget reflected the financial problem that faces county officials.
 Revenues, not including the \$5.4 million health trust fund, were up 3 percent in fiscal 1981-82 while expenses were up 7.3 percent.
 The county also showed \$3 million in budgeted expenses that were not used for construction projects. The county had projected spending \$3.9 million on building projects but spent only \$0.9 million because of delays in these projects.
 The county's enterprise funds, established to separate county

services from the county's general operating fund, showed a profit for the year, the audit showed. The water and sewer fund showed a \$131,000 profit for the year and rate increases already approved should increase the surplus.
 Before collection enterprise funds showed a profit of about \$750,000.
 The report was welcome news to commissioners who have been wrestling with ideas to eliminate the projected deficits. Further delays in planned construction projects may be forthcoming to meet even higher predicted deficits.
 But commissioners did approve Tuesday a work order for renovation of the old hospital, which they renamed the Seminole County Services Building. The work order allows the county's architect, Heiman Hurrey Charvat Peacock/Architects, to go ahead with plans to renovate the building.
 The architect will be paid about \$124,500 for the renovation, which will cost the county about \$1.9 million.

For Cluster Homes At Wekiva

A request to rezone 54 acres adjacent to the Wekiva Marina in southwest Seminole County has been filed with County Commissioner Robert G. "Bud" Feather.
 Feather, owner of Audubon Habitat Inc., and James H. Pugh, owner of Spack Properties Inc. plan to build 350 cluster homes on the property, leaving 90 percent of the property in its natural state.
 Feather said the property, to be called Wekiva Springs, is currently used for agriculture and use for mobile homes.
 The development will use The Springs, a prestigious

planned community built in the early 1970s, as a guideline for their development plans.
 Feather was vice president and marketing director of Epoch Properties when the company developed The Springs.
 The rezoning must be approved by Seminole County's planning and zoning board and ultimately by county commissioners before development can begin.
 Feather filed the request Monday. The county planning and zoning board is expected to consider the rezoning next month.

Move To Up Drinking Age Moves Legislative Test

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A proposal to raise the drinking age from 19 to 21 meets its key legislative hurdle today when it is considered by the House regulatory industries committee.

The House panel was a major stumbling block when lawmakers voted the drinking age from 18 to 19 two years ago. Supporters had to rely on parliamentary maneuvering to free the legislation from the committee.

Proponents say the new bill is intended to reduce the number of young people being killed in alcohol-related highway accidents. They also point out that Congress has twice asked states to set a drinking age of 21 and has limited certain highway safety grants to those states that do so.

Opponents, including representatives of restaurants, bars and other alcohol-serving establishments, say the bill represents unwanted discrimination against the young and would adversely affect tourism.

Orbit Can Be Corrected

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — It could take days or weeks, but space agency officials said the giant communications satellite that tumbled off course can be directed into the correct orbit to send future space shuttle messages.

Ground controllers received the 2-ton satellite by remote control Tuesday, saving NASA from a devastating blow.

The satellite, vital to the space shuttle program, was launched last Monday from the Kennedy Space Center by the first shuttle, after nearly two years because of a rocket failure.

Robert E. Smith, an NASA assistant administrator, said the \$100 million contract was completed in perfect working order, but it was in too low an orbit.

The satellite has small maneuvering thrusters designed to take it from place to place in space.

Two Escape Berlin Wall Via Highwire

BERLIN (UPI) — Two East Berliners used a bow and arrow to shoot a line across the Berlin Wall, then glided to the west on a pulley 20 feet above the ground while guards were not looking, a West Berlin newspaper and internet sources said.

The nighttime escape, one of the most ingenious in the 22 years since Communist authorities built the wall across the divided city, took place last Thursday, the sources said Tuesday. An account of the escape appeared in the West Berlin newspaper *BZ*.

One of the escapees, a heating engineer identified only as Michael B., 23, told the newspaper he and a 24-year-old electrician friend hatched the plan last New Year's Eve.

The two men said they looked for months for a suitable place on the border to make the daring bid, eventually choosing a 5-story tenement house in the Truppe sector of East Berlin that overlooked the wall. Work hours along the eastern side of the wall have been evacuated and boarded up to prevent such escapes.

\$10.5 Million Cash Heist Aided By Milk Delivery

LONDON (UPI) — Insurance agencies offered a \$100,000 reward today for information on a six-man gang that walked off with Britain's biggest cash haul, reportedly aided by the delivery of a pint of milk to a security guard.

Police kept silent today on exactly how the Easter Monday heist was executed at Express Security's "Fort Fosse" headquarters in east London. They asked anyone who had been in the area to come forward to help in the investigation.

But a few pieces of the robbery began to fall into place as insurance underwriters offered a cash reward of \$250,000 for information leading to conviction of the robbers and recovery of the money.

Although the law enforcement agency has made comparisons in dollar terms itself, Monday's 7 million-pound (\$10.5 million) cash theft was more than twice as much as the £1.2 million haul in Britain's Great Train Robbery of 1968.

Unidentified informants said the shotgun-toting gang of six overpowering the lone guard at the security agency who he ventured out to fetch a pint of milk a milkman had left on the gate for his morning's run of eggs.

TV Series To Make Light Of Refugees' Lives In Miami

MIAMI (UPI) — Most refugees in south Florida who are having trouble finding jobs and acceptance don't think their plight is a laughing matter — but a television production company thinks it's hilarious. Jay Scheer Productions, a Miami-based company, is filming a television comedy series about refugees in south Florida and their struggle to adjust to a new life.

The show, to be entitled "WETS," is being made for possible sale to the networks or cable television. The pilot centers around three young men — Felipe, a Cuban; Phillip, a Haitian; and Philip, a Jew from New York — who meet in a Miami immigration office. The office is shown with gaudy arches and a sign that says "3 million prospects."

The three decide to live together at a place called



"the Motel on the Beach" — MOB for short — and enroll in a job training program for refugees called WETS, an acronym for Workers Employment Training Service.

The production company says it isn't prying fun at the plight of refugees, but is trying to show them in a positive light.

One of the objectives of the show is to portray our newly arrived immigrants Florida as hard-working, industrious and diligent people who have much to offer if only given the opportunity.

"The objective ... is to demonstrate the common bonds, similarities and aspirations shared by peoples of divergent backgrounds," the program summary says.

PLO Urges Compromise On Reagan Peace Plan

AMMAN, Jordan (UPI) — Palestinian Liberation Organization chief Yasser Arafat said he must take this week with Jordan's King Hussein despite their lack of agreement on whether to support President Reagan's Middle East peace plan.

Arafat abruptly left Amman Monday Tuesday after refusing to give the Jordanian monarch a green light to negotiate a settlement with Israel on the basis of Reagan's Sept. 1 peace initiative.

But Jordanian and PLO officials said Arafat would return to Jordan by Friday for a possible agreement with Jordan on a joint Middle East peace move.

Soviet Spies Back Home

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union gave a quiet reception to 47 of its citizens who were expelled from France for allegedly taking part in the biggest spy operation mounted by a Western nation in more than a decade.

Among those expelled were five newspapers of Soviet commercial offices, the chief of the Soviet news agency Tass in Paris and a Tass reporter. French news reports said the chief of KGB operations for France also was on the list.

There was speculation that Vladimir Kouznetsov, a KGB secret police mope who defected in October, exposed his former contacts as spies.

Rub-A-Dub-Dub, Out Of The Tub

WEST HAVEN, Conn. (UPI)—A physician says men who use baby soap after liberating sperm counts leading to temporary infertility.

Dr. Kenneth Cohen cautioned his theory was based on a survey of 100 men in his 30s who complained of infertility. Cohen is associate chief of staff at West Haven Hospital.

Tests showed the man had a sperm count of only 4 million per cubic centimeter of semen, instead of the average of 150 million. Cohen said.

"He said the man used a bar soap up to four times a day for 100 consecutive days. The temperature in his tub reached 105 to 106 degrees."

Four months after the patient stopped using the hot tub, his sperm count increased to 40 million sperm per cubic centimeter, Cohen said.

"This is all speculative," the doctor said, "I wouldn't blow a whistle saying every body has to stop using hot tubs."

He said he plans to study other hot tub users before drawing conclusions.

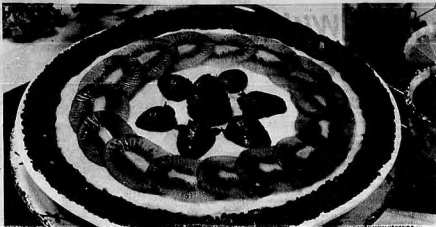
