Merchants Report Sales Up,

Luxury Items Moving Well

Associated Press Merchants in many areas of the country report the Christmas shopping season produced double-digit sales increases over last year, with trade especially good in items like digital watches, black negligees and color

television sets. Americans bought standards like clothing and furniture this year. But luxury items in general sold well, and there was enough money left over to generate a few new fads like pet rocks and mood rings.

"The words 'double digit' have always been used with inflation. We've had double digit increase in business," said Harry Hedberg, vice president of Capitol Court, a major Milwaukee shopping center. "I'm talking about figures 25 per cent above last year.

President Ford Takes Spill

VAIL, Colo. (AP) - Facing paperwork flown here from Washington, President Ford is moving into the homestretch of his skiing vacation with 28 bills still awaiting his approval or rejection.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Roy M. "Mack" Helm has been fired from his post as Utah Highway Patrol chief because of a drinking problem. The state Civil Service Commission ruled Friday that elm could be returned to the patrol if he overcomes "an alcohol problem" and left it up to Public Safety Comissioner Raymond Jackson to decide if, when and how Helm could be reinstated. Jackson had recommended Helm be fired for "continued drunkenness" and conduct unbecoming his office.

Helm was unavailable for comment. His attorney Robert M. McRae, said he would ask for a rehearing.

Carter Speaks On Angola

PLAINS, Ga. (AP) - America should keep its guns and presidential candidate Jinmy Carter says. The former Georgia governor, a candidate for the Democratic nomination, said American assistance to the African nation should be "for humanitarian purposes

In a radio interview from his home, Carter said "Any white involvement in Angola from South Africa, the Soviet Union or the United States is going to be looked upon with a great deal of doubt by the Angolan people."

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., says he has no idea when he will make up his mind about seeking another term in Congress. "I have made no decision, and I don't know when I will make one," the 18-term congressmen said Friday in a telephone interview from his suburban Washington, D.C.,

"I'm still waiting to see how things work out." Mills, 66, added that he is in very good health and still enjoys his House duties.

But Martinez, a Tampa-based heart surgeon, said that with new powers given the board by the 1975 legislature, doctors will be able to better police themselves and possibly reduce swiftly rising permiums for malpractice insurance.

The most significant part of the law passed last session provides specifically that being found liable for medical malpractice is sufficient cause for the board to revoke a physician's license.

And the provision says that doctors who bring complaints against other doctors cannot be sued for libel. Officials hope this will greatly increase the number of doctors willing to file charges against fellow physicians, although they say this has not yet happened.

IN BRIEF Holiday Fatalities Mounting, **Toll Includes 3 Children**

By The Associated Press Three children struck and killed by cars were among at least 19 persons who have died in state traffic accidents thus far during the long Christmas holiday, the Florida Highway Patrol said. Officials had predicted that the toll would reach 31

during the 102-hour holiday. It began at 6 p.m. Wednesday and ends at midnight Sunday. The victims included Nathan A. Campbell, 13, struck from the rear by a hit-and-run vehicle as he rode his bicycle not far from his DeLand home on Christmas Day. Police later charged a motorist with manslaughter. Five-year-old Hudson Vance was killed when he rode his new bicycle into the path of an automobile near his home Friday in rural Polk County south of Lakeland. And Wilbert Arvinger, 13, was killed Friday when he ran into the path of an automobile in his hometown of Fort

Pilot, Son Injured In Crash

POMPANO BEACH (AP) - A pilot and his 13-year-old son are reported in fair condition at a local hospital after their light airplane crashed near a shopping center. Broward County sheriff's deputies said Gary Garner, 36, and Gary Jr. were injured Friday in the crash of the Grumman American, a two-seater trainer, officers said. No other injuries were reported.

Officers said Garner was planning to land at nearby Pompano Air Park when the plane brushed tree tops in a wooded area, spun around and crashed.

Youth Charged In Murders

VERO BEACH (AP) - A Gifford teen-ager has been charged with first-degree murder in the deaths of two Indian River County women whose bodies were found alongside a road, sheriff's deputies say.

Chambliss, 22, and Marilyn Auseye, 23, both from the small town of Gifford. They had been shot, deputies said. Officers said John Wesley Henry, 18, was arrested on two counts of first-degree murder and one count of carrying a concealed firearm.

Suit May End Merger

SARASOTA (AP) — The proposed merger of the financially ailing Palmer Bank Corp. and the Southeast Banking Corp. may be called off because of a suit charging Palmer with fraud, Palmer officials say. A group of shareholders, led by the Casperson family of Sarasota and New Jersey, filed suit Wednesday in Tampa charging that Palmer violated anti-fraud laws by publishing misleading financial information, William Clendenin, Palmer senior vice president, said Friday. The merger with the Miamibased Southeast corporation was scheduled for Dec. 31.

Cuba Ends Rationing

MIAMI (AP) - The Cuban government has announced the end of a voluntary program of sugar rationing imposed last year after sugar prices rose dramatically. Radio Havana says.

In a broadcast monitored Friday in Miami, Radio Havana said the program, under which each Cuban was asked to reduce his consumption of sugar by one pound a month, would formally end Jan. 1.



Salt Negotiations Require Caution

The delay in Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's scheduled trip to Moscow gave President Ford and our arms negotiators a chance to review the bidding in the troubled course of the past year's effort to achieve a new strategic arms limitation agreement.

Mr. Kissinger says the time was needed to firm up the U.S. position in this crucial stage of the SALT II negotiations. That position should reflect our experience with the Russians under the 1972 SALT I agreements. This is not the first time we have seen how deftly the Russians can comply with the letter of an agreement while doing violence to its spirit.

Once again Mr. Kissinger has denied that there is any evidence of Soviet violations of the SALT I treaty. He has conceded, however, that the Burgians are straining it to the limit in their missile deployments and that they had to be warned that an apparent plan to convert an anti-aircraft radar system to an anti-missile radar system was contrary to the treaty.

While Mr. Kissinger thinks his critics are misinterpreting these Soviet tactics, they are a clear warning signal. Any arms agreement with the Russians must be negotiated with the understanding that if any loopholes slip into the language, the Russians are prepared to exploit them. This does not mean that effective arms control is impossible, but only that the terms of treaties must be unequivocal and there must be ironclad provisions for surveillance to make sure the Soviet Union remains in compliance.

The ailing Leonid Brezhnev obviously is growing anxious about the delays which have overtaken SALT II. He was unusually defensive in his recent speech in Warsaw, accusing the West of endangering detente with "pinpricks and snide comments" about Soviet sincerity. He may still be hopeful that he can report a new SALT agreement in his scheduled appearance before the Soviet Communist Party Congress in February.

Mr. Brezhnev's worry about the calendar is not our worry. The United States should take whatever time is necessary to assure that any forthcoming new commitment to arms limitation means what it says, and that it takes nothing for granted. The questions being raised about Soviet willingness to comply with international agreements are not "snide comments" but the result of repeated

The disagreement over how to classify Soviet "Backfire" bombers and U.S. cruise missiles in a SALT II agreement may be the least of the problems for Mr. Kissinger to iron out in the weeks ahead. The furor over alleged violations of the SALT I treaty is driving home the point that the biggest problem of all is getting the Russians to acknowledge exactly what an agreement means and then getting them, to stick to it.

Tactical Forces

More than a quarter of the defense budget goes to equip and operate four separate, independent tactical air forces. The Pentagon plans to spend \$300 billion by 1985 on the four independent tactical air components of the Air Force, the Army, the Navy and the Marine Corps. Each service seeks to equip itself for independent missions.

so it will not have to depend on support from any other service. Meanwhile, all of the services are dedicated to buy performance in aircraft regardless of cost. An open-ended commitment in design philosophy to sophisticated technology has helped boost the cost of the average fighter aircraft from

\$300,000 in World War II to more than \$10 million today. It was hoped that the services would move to fewer types of aircraft with greater common use of components among them.

But little progress has been made. The lack of cost discipline means that a reassessment of missions and roles of the separate branches should be made by the Congress. It is time to eliminate unnecessary duplication and overlapping responsibilities in military aviation.

No, not by a long shot. Just look around at the dictatorships in this world. Not one of them offer the citizen the right to

free speech and free expression! There is no relationship between the plight o these Longwood area families and all this talk of dictatorships, you might say. Then just consider this. Adolph Hitler was thought to be just a local fanatic-but he murdered millions. Fidel Castro was thought to be one of the "good guys" as he fought in the Cuban jungles.

One final point for those who might think the story was only a local issue. It might surprise you to know that it appeared on the front pages of major

newspapers from Boston to Seattle. From Los Angeles to New York. The Associated Press considered the issue so significant that it was placed on its AAA National wire budget, an area reserved for only the most important stories of national interest. and distributed it throughout the country. Enough

As we move toward the New Year, we might all find it refreshing to reflect over all the good things that have happened to us over the past year. Then, why don't we all resolve to put the Golden Rule into effect when it comes to dealing with our family and our neighbors. There hasn't been a better rule created yet and just think what a happy place this world would be if everyone followed it.

HazardData Is Called Misleading

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Nuclea egulatory Commission recently came forth with a careful, detailed study mathematically calculating the chances of major nuclear accidents and the deaths and damage likely to be

The work was carried out by a scientist of

The conclusions, nevertheless, are false and mathematical anomaly and are not privately taken at face value by senior scientists in the with whom this reporter has been in

The study finds that the chance of any individual dying from an accident in a nuclearpowered utility plant in any one year is a miniscule one in five billion - assuming 100 nuclear plants - as contrasted with a one in 4,000 chance of dying in an automobile accident. a one in 10,000 chance of being killed in a fall, a one in 30,000 chance of drowning. The probability of 100 persons dying in a nuclear reactor accident — again assuming 100 operating nuclear utility plants - is calculated at one in 100,000 years, roughly the same probability as 100 persons being killed in a meteorite impact. In contrast with one chance in 16 years of 100 people dying in an explosion, or one in seven years of 100 dying in a fire.

This would seem to place nuclear accidents as one of the least of the worries we might face in the years ahead.

Though the mathematical procedures leading to this conclusion are precise, given the data, there is a catch. Because of the limited experience we have had thus far with nuclear power the probabilities which show up on the answer line may be so distorted as to be

To oversimplify, it is a though one flipped a coin three times, ther developed a theory on how many times heads would appear in 1,000 flips, based on those three trials, modified by logic and mathematical experience. If, by chance, heads appeared three times in a row, we could come up with some weird conclusion as to what would happen in 1,000 tries.

In blunt terms, we do not have sufficient evidence as yet to determine the probability of nuclear accidents or their probable seriousness. Take a recent highly publicized accident in

which a workman, routinely lighting a candle to check on something set a serious fire at one nuclear plant. Since this occurred before the completion of the safety study, it was considered in the mathematics. But as one nuclear scientist in the regulatory agency said wonderingly, no one in a thousand years would have thought of a candle starting a fire in a nuclear plant. If it hadn't happened, it would most certainly not

PENSACOLA — As elapsing time continues to sort out the emotions of Watergate past, it may suggest that the way in which justice was lasting concern as the crimes which brought it about.
