Oviedo High School hit 10 of 13 field goal attempts in the third quarter Friday night, exploding for 25 points in all, to ice away a first round win in the Seminole County Christmas Tournament.

For losing Santa Fe, Mike Powell hit for 18 points and led all scorers. Bob Scordino was the only other Hawk in double figures, with 11.

Oviedo, playing in class 3A, improved its record to 3-6. Santa Fe dropped to 2-5.

Oviedo mounted a 14-8 first quarter lead on the sharp shooting of Ron Ribbon, who

Oviedo then added another 26 points against Santa Fe's 20 in the final frame.

No less than nine Oviedo players scored, and five hit in double figures.

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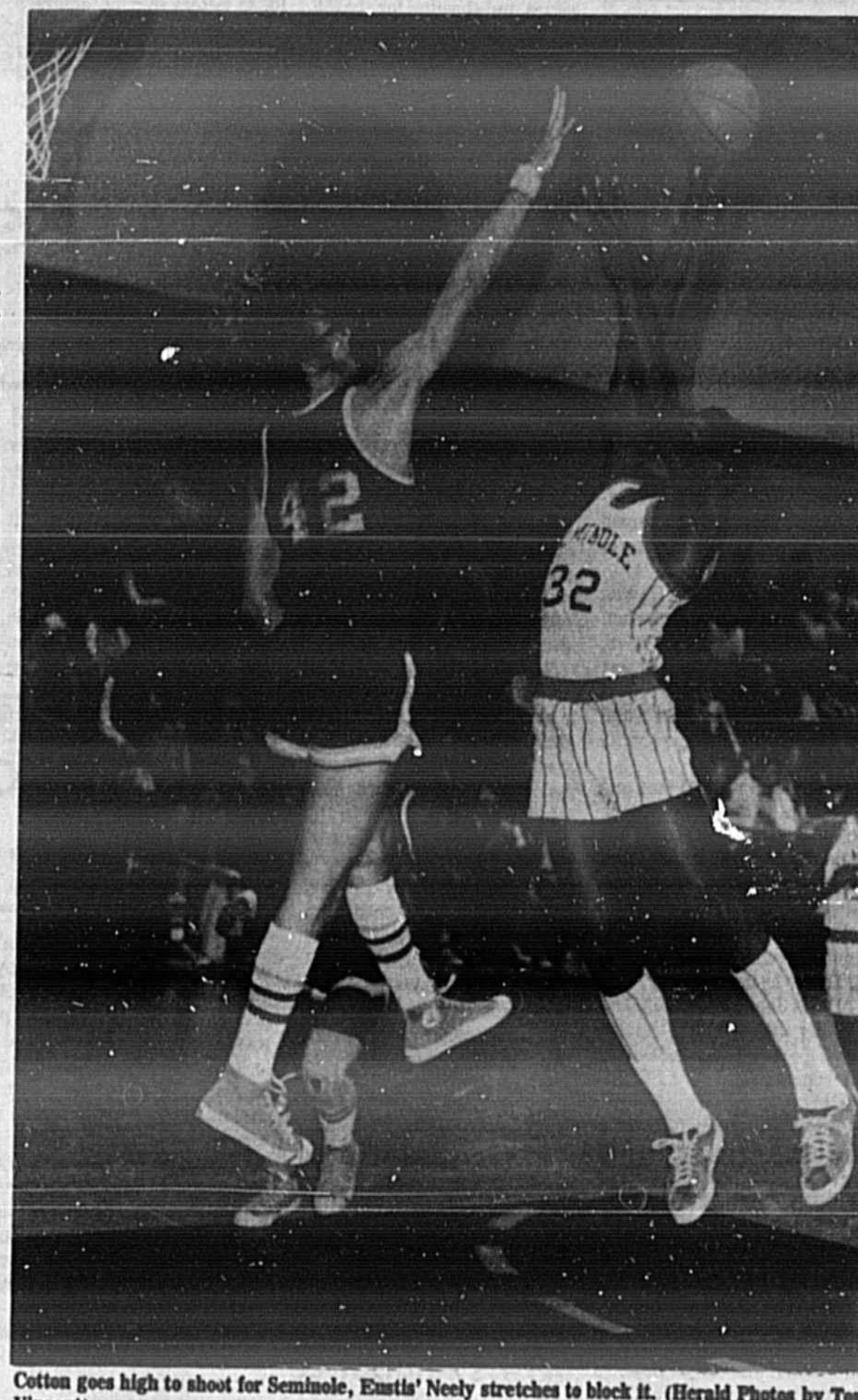

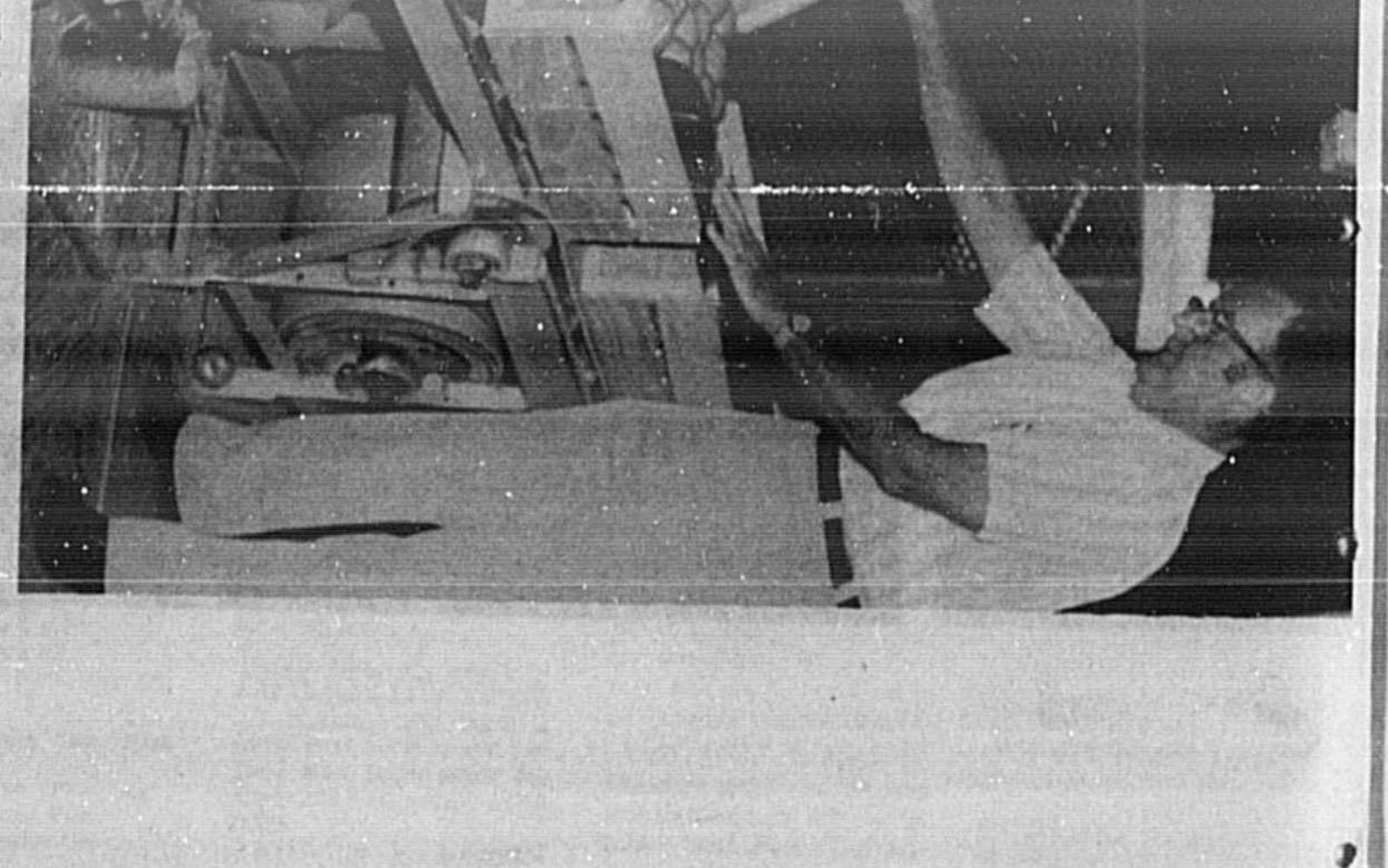

You've heard heard of "diamond knees" and "Cypress knees," Steve Hitchcock, owner of the Cypress Knee Factory, Longwood, is your man.

The first 12 years of his life revolved around hunting for cypress with his father. "My Dad had a cypress swamp on the edge of the swamp, and he'd take me out there every year. After he died, I sort of drifted away from it, but later on, I decided to get back in the swamp."

But what is a cypress knee? "Well, they are called 'knees' because they look like human knees. They grow from the roots of cypress trees, and have something to do with the tree's ability to survive in the swampy water. They are used to cut the knees. But there's been in any way a lot of people who have been looking for cypress knees. The knees may be cut from the trees, and each knee is completely unique. The knees are made from cypress wood, and they are used in a variety of ways. A lot of my knowledge comes from a friend of mine, Tom Gaskin. The work can be dangerous, because the trees are always swampy, and there's a lot of mud. The knees are made from a make-shift bit and wear make-good tools," he said.

A license is required, as well as a permit from the state. Hitchcock has a permit, and he's been cutting knees for a long time.

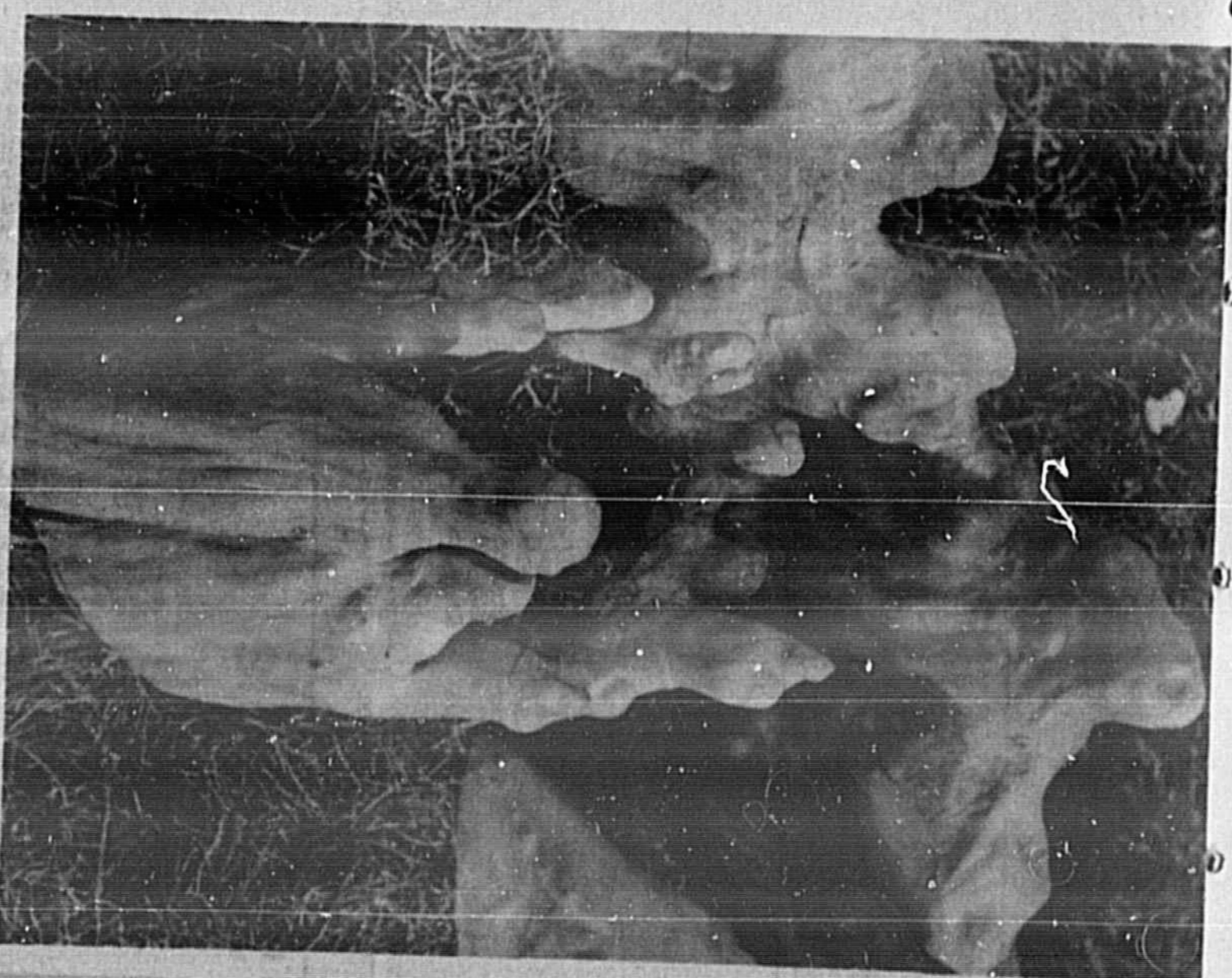

Freeman Issue Up Again Ouster Vote Reset

A second showdown over the temporary ouster of County Atty. Thomas Freeman is expected to take place at Tuesday's county commission meeting.

County Commissioner John Kimbrough said today he will ask again Tuesday for Freeman's removal — if commissioner Sidney Vihlen Jr. attends the meeting.

And, Vihlen — contacted today at his Altamonte Springs office — said he will attend the meeting and is ready to make a decision on the Freeman issue.

Kimrough and Commissioner Dick Williams last Tuesday asked that Freeman be removed until grand jury charges against the county attorney are cleared.

But the commission deadlocked 3-2, with Commissioners Michael Hattaway and Harry Kwiatkowski voting to retain Freeman. Vihlen was absent. He was in Seminole Memorial Hospital with a broken foot.

"If Sidney's there, I think it should come up again. If we can keep Sidney there long enough to address himself to it," Kimbrough said.

Kimrough said the commission needed a consensus — which couldn't be reached with Vihlen absent — to see "which way we were going."

At last week's meeting Hattaway and Kwiatkowski voted confidence in Freeman and charged State Atty. Abbott Herring's office with politics. The grand jury charged Freeman, Kwiatkowski and Hattaway with violation of Florida's Sunshine Law, a law which says all public meetings attended by elected officials must be open to the public.

Also, Freeman was charged with soliciting a \$12,400 title insurance kickback. Freeman has denied the charges and along with the two Democratic commissioners — Hattaway and Kwiatkowski — has charged Herring's office with politics.

Contacted today, Vihlen said he has "reviewed" the grand jury report and the charges against Freeman and will be ready to consider the issue at Tuesday's meeting.

"I will be there," Vihlen said. Kimbrough said results of last Tuesday's meeting show that "Freeman still has control of the voting of the commission."

Kimbrough's rationale is that county standards should be applied to Freeman, even though the attorney is not a county employe as such, but provides legal services to the county on a contractual basis.

The county's personnel policy says any employee under indictment by a grand jury must be suspended until charges are cleared.

Though some Democrats say the grand jury charges are politically motivated, some citizens at last Tuesday's meeting said the charges came from unbiased grand jurors — not from Herring, who is a Republican. And, Herring vows his office is non-political and that politics does not influence investigations.

With Williams and Kimbrough asking for Freeman's ouster and Hattaway and Kwiatkowski supporting the attorney, Vihlen has the deciding vote.

School Aid To County Is Reduced \$339,000

State officials have announced Seminole County's school system will be shorted \$339,000 this year. Asst. Supt. Roger Harris said today.

Because of a decline in state revenue collections, the Florida Cabinet approved a two per cent cutback in state spending for the remainder of this fiscal year.

Harris said there are sufficient funds in one of three contingency budgets to make up for the anticipated \$339,000 shortfall.

The \$339,000, or \$400,000 as Harris figures it, will be taken from the countywide contingency fund of \$865,000.

Harris and School Supt. W. P. "Bud" Laver said the school board last year at budget time a healthy contingency fund would be required this year and in fiscal 1976-77 because of anticipated reductions in state funding.

But Harris said the initial memo listed this county's share as \$339,000. He said computer printouts show a figure closer to \$400,000.

Either way the veteran school administrator said Seminole County is solvent and will weather the cut.

However, Harris warned any additional cuts could find this county lacking in contingency funds.

The alternative then, of course, would be to do as other counties have been forced to do — cutback programs or lay off teachers, or both.

Massacre Suspect Identified

WINTER GARDEN (AP) — At least one suspect has been identified in the mysterious shooting in which four persons died Christmas Eve at a furniture store here, a sheriff's spokesman says.

However, Chief Deputy Leigh O. McEachern said Sunday that no charges would be filed in the case for several days. He declined further comment.

McEachern refused to confirm or deny a report that a second witness told authorities moments after the slayings that he had been assaulted in the store.

The other witness and the lone survivor was W. E. Zeigler Jr., owner of the store in which his wife, her parents and a customer were found shot. Zeigler was wounded in the incident and is hospitalized.

In what McEachern conceded to be an unusual move, authorities sent several items of undisclosed evidence to the FBI crime lab in Washington.

"We want the results as fast as possible and as accurate as possible," McEachern said. He said results should be ready in two to three days.

He said investigators already have a "pretty good understanding" of who owned the five handguns and one shot gun found in the store after the slayings.

Zeigler's lawyer, Ralph Hadley III, said his questioning of Zeigler indicated revenge as a possible motive for the slayings.

He said Zeigler had been cooperating with police in an earlier investigation.

McEachern said he was unaware of any investigation Zeigler had aided, but he claimed a personal vendetta and family quarrel had been ruled out as possible motives.

The victims of the shooting were Eunice Zeigler, her parents, Perry and Virginia Edwards of Moultrie, Ga., and Charles Mays, a customer who police said was at the store to pick up a television set for a Christmas gift.

Building Is Sought To House Library

Seminole County is actively seeking a temporary building to house the South Seminole branch of the new countywide library service. Envisioned as part of that service were branch libraries in both ends of the county.

Sanford has a branch library, but commissioners now say it will be a year before a building is located to house a courthouse annex. Plans are to put the South Seminole library in the courthouse annex — when a site for the annex is determined.

And, Hattaway said a year is too long to wait before providing services offered by branch facilities.

County officials are seeking a minimum of 6,000 square feet with adequate parking facilities.

Locations preferred are on SR 436 between Red Bug Road and Interstate 4 or the U.S. 17-92 corridor from SR-44 to SR-436.

Hattaway said the building should be ready for immediate occupancy.

Roger Schneider, director of county development, is conducting the feasibility study on locating some courthouse facilities in South Seminole.

Schneider was awaiting a memo from County Atty. Thomas Freeman advising which departments or parts of departments can legally be moved from Sanford, which is the county seat.

Hospital Insurance Costs Up

The administrator of Seminole Memorial Hospital said today he expects some increases in the hospital's insurance premiums for next year.

Administrator Robert Bessner said he doesn't anticipate a special meeting will be set before the regular Jan. 13 board of trustees meeting, to revise its insurance needs. He said he cannot determine the size of the increases.

The hospital's new insurance policies will be awarded to one of three companies, Bessner said.

The bids received to handle the hospital's \$1 million coverage insurance, including liability and malpractice policies which expire Jan. 1 are from:

- Seminole Agency, Sanford.
- All Risk Insurance Co., Casselberry.
- Jones, Hill & Cowan Insurance Agency of Jacksonville and Savannah Ga., the hospital's present insurer.

PSC Rejects Fees, Okays Rail Hike

YALAHASSEE (AP) — The Public Service Commission today rejected a request by the cities of Daytona Beach and Miami for a rehearing on the imposition of franchise fees to city residents exclusively.

The PSC did approve a 2 per cent freight hauling rate increase by Seaboard Coastline Railroad, L&N and Southern Railways.

In turning down the request by Daytona Beach, the commission accepted a staff recommendation that the petition had not been filed within a required 15-day deadline.

The staff said that both petitions brought up the same arguments that had been raised in a previous public hearing on the matter.

Both cities, along with four others, are appealing the commission decision to the Supreme Court.

In granting the increase in interstate freight rates, the PSC exempted "crushed rock hauling, which it is considering in a separate case.

The increases will mean \$2.9 million for Seaboard Coastline, \$102,000 for L&N and \$9,765 for Southern.

Florida Power & Light Co. said the fees, which average about 4 or 5 per cent of a customer's bill, would now be levied solely on residents living in the 150 municipalities served by the companies which impose it.

In addition to Miami and Daytona Beach, the cities of St. Petersburg, Fort Myers, Palmetto and Apopka have joined in the Supreme Court suit.

FP&L, Florida Power Corp., Gulf Power and Tampa Electric were affected by the franchise order.
