

This was caused, it is declared by officials of the French Line, because the boat which burned was referred to in accounts of the disaster as a "French liner", when as a matter of fact it belonged to the Compagnie de Navigation Sud-Atlantique.

It is true that the boat was a French liner but the contention is made that the use of this term conveyed to the readers that it was a French Line boat with a resultant harm to the company's trans-Atlantic business. 
