Crews open new lanes on State Road 434

Crews widening State Road 434, also known as Alafaya Trail, are scheduled to shift traffic in both directions onto the new southbound lanes from south of Econ River Place to south of Chapman Road today.

Motorists are urged to use caution on the shifting travel lanes. The traffic shift will allow the contractor, Southland Construction Inc., to begin work on the east or northbound side of the road. Residents and business owners on the east side of State Road 434 along this stretch should be advised that the travel lanes will be a considerable distance away during this phase, but some access will be maintained.

Once the traffic shifts, activities will include milling up the old roadway and installing drainage pipes as well as reclaimed water lines from Chapman Road to Lake Hayes Road.

There will also be nighttime lane closures during the remainder of the week as crews continue to install utility pipes. Wet weather or other unforeseen circumstances could affect work schedules.

The \$19.3 million widening project, from south McCulloch Road to Mitchell Hammock Road, began in June 2002 and is scheduled for completion in fall 2004.

A missing children mystery turned into a devastating murder-suicide investigation in Lake Mary Monday.

After an angler found two toddlers Sunday in a Maitland retention pond just south of the Seminole County line, police issued a public plea to locate the parents. Less than two hours after their mother, Lisa Randall of Altamonte Springs, reported to the police station Monday morning, the unthinkable occurred, again.

Her estranged husband, Bryan Christopher Randall, drove himself and the couple's two other children in front of a tractor trailer weighted down with a load of vehicles. The accident occurred on Interstate 4 between the Lake Mary Boulevard and State Road 46A exits.

According to police, Randall had picked up the children Friday and was to return them Sunday night. The mother and father had been married 10 years but were in the process of a divorce. That has all changed now as two children and Randall are dead and the two other siblings are recovering in the hospital.

It's alleged that Randall tried to drown his 2-year-old daughter, Yana, and 4-year-old son, Regal, in the pond, that is surrounded by offices at 901 N. Lake Destiny in Maitland. Regal was clinging to life when he was found,



but was upgraded from critical to serious condition Monday evening. His sister was less fortunate, as she was pronounced dead at the scene.

The couple's oldest sons, 8-

Justice pays a visit to Sanford

Lewis discusses the U.S. Constitution with students

Students at Millennium Middle School learned about the judicial system from a firsthand source last week when Florida Supreme Court Justice R. Fred Lewis visited their classroom.

The students in Sean Ashby's civics classes, including six, seventh and eighth graders, were able to learn about the Constitution, the judicial system and its hierarchy from someone in the profession.

"It rejuvenates me every time I walk into a

classroom," said Lewis, who serves on Florida's commission regarding the legal needs of children and is active in the Justice Teaching Institute, a program designed to enhance public education. "It is the real joy of my work. I have my profession and I work at it very hard, but children are my passion.

"The future of Florida is in this and every classroom that we walk into," he added. "We have a responsibility to share with them the experiences we have had and what the judicial system is about."

Iraqi Diary: Relishing a chance to get online

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

9 Aug. 2003 We have limited internet service now but have to stand in line to use it. They charge us \$4 an hour to go online.

We have been very busy lately with trying to keep the peace and keep from getting shot and have not had much time to write. Since they got those two Hussein brothers it has made things worse for us with increased attacks and more anti-U.S. stuff. We certainly did not need any martyrs to rile-up the enemy, but I'm afraid that is exactly what is happening.

I fear for the 2nd Cav guys, all they have is canvas-sided humvees to

patrol with and you can throw a rock through those. The equipment is just not suitable for close urban combat. Fortunately for my patrol, we have armored sides on our vehicles, but that can only stop light weapons fire and flak. It sure won't be much good against an RPG or some kind of bomb.

We had a 2nd Cavalry soldier die from heat stroke today. He had pulled duty in one of the towers on the compound for six straight hours and the heat got him. It is hot beyond imagination here. Iraqis are used to this climate, but G.I.s sure are not conditioned for it, and with 70 pounds of equipment and armored vest on, it just makes it hotter. Sometimes it is so hot that it is hard to concentrate and that gets dangerous.

They give us four bottles of drinking water per per-

Sheriff's office searching for suspect in drug raid

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is still looking for a suspect who ran away from deputies during a drug bust at a home in the Bear Lake area Friday.

A warrant was served at 3182 Tabago Court around 6:30 a.m. Friday. One suspect, 23-year old Antalee Murch, was arrested at the scene on marijuana and cocaine charges.

A second suspect, 27-year old Robert Hand, ordered his pit bull to bite a CCIB drug agent, and then fled the scene. The CCIB agent received a bite wound to the upper part of his leg. The dog was shot and killed and a search of the area for Hand was completed. It's believed he may have phoned a friend, who picked him up in a vehicle, and then left the area.

Because of the police activity, the search of the area, and the fact Hand ran toward Bear Lake Elementary School, the school went on "lock down." Hand was never on campus and the students were never in danger. The measures were taken strictly as a precaution for the safety of students, staff and visitors to campus.

Anyone with information on Hand's whereabouts is asked to contact the Seminole County Sheriff's Office at 407-665-6600. He is wanted for drug charges and aggravated assault on a police officer.

Engineered Homes posts record sales

Eclipsing the \$10 million mark for just the third time ever, Engineered Homes rang up a record \$10.33 million in August home sales at three Central Florida communities.

The Winter Park homebuilding company, which is building Buckingham Estates near Heathrow, averaged approximately \$228,859 on 45 home sales to post its highest dollar volume since commencing operations in 1996, says Engineered Homes Marketing Director Marilyn Anderson.

Thanks to August's figures, Engineered Homes has closed out the year's first eight months with \$50.1 million on 229 home sales — an average of \$218,777 per home sale. The company finished with a record \$72.8 million on 319 sales last year.

Hitting the \$10 million sales plateau in a single month is a remarkable feat for a production builder with so few communities. Engineered Homes has done it three times. The company first did it in March 2001 when it registered \$10.3 million on 55 sales at five residential communities. The company again topped the \$10 million level in June 2002, with \$10.1 million on 40 sales — also at five communities.

The 45 sales were the most for a single month this year and the fifth best monthly total to date.

The company also is on track for posting its best single quarter in history. Engineered Homes rang up \$23.3 million on 109 sales during the second quarter of 2002. Thanks to a sizzling July, the company already has \$18.1 million on 82 this quarter with a month remaining.

"What's amazing," says Anderson, "is that we were able to put up these kinds of sales numbers even though mortgage interest rates have inched back up the past two months."

Engineered Homes continues to be bolstered by its two newest communities — Brighton Lakes in Kissimmee and Mission Park in south Lake County near Clermont.

Brighton Lakes, a 3-year-old, 751-home development near Poinciana that was acquired this past March, tallied 26 sales for \$5.8 million in August — an average sales price of \$223,077. Since its acquisition, Brighton Lakes has logged 74 sales for \$16.3 million. Mission Park, located off U.S. Highway 27 near the Four Corners area, has been a solid seller. It posted \$2.4 million on 14 sales in August.

Buckingham Estates, Engineered Homes' flagship community near Heathrow in south Seminole County, posted \$2.1 million on five sales.

Engineered Homes is currently building in Clermont, Kissimmee and Heathrow and soon will be launching a new community in Ocoee.

The last move was the worst, taking her from one high school to its cross-town rival. She quit at 16, moved in with a brother and his family, went to work, and eventually obtained her GED.

A short time later she married, had two children, was divorced and the nomadic lifestyle returned, but this time she was a single mom.

She had to work three jobs to afford the rent in government subsidized housing in Casselberry. She maintained that pace for six years, and her jobs included being a waitress, school

lunchroom attendant, motel clerk and makeup merchandiser.

"I knew I had to make a change," DePaul said. "I want my kids to be good students, to go to college. I want them to get the education I didn't receive. I want them to have degrees so that they can have careers instead of working like me and living paycheck to paycheck."

"I knew I had to have a stable environment for them," she added. "I knew I needed a house. One night I wrote in my journal that I believed God would let me have a house before I was 40."

On June 19, DePaul celebrated her 38th birthday.

She now works as a delivery driver for a courier company, where a friend told her about Habitat for Humanity.

"It sounded like a great program, and it has turned out that way," DePaul said. "I've helped build houses for others, pounded nails, whatever. While I was working, I was thinking, 'Someday, I'll be working on my own house.'"

"Now thanks to Habitat for Humanity and all those connected with the golf tournament, my kids and I are about to take a giant step in the right direction."

DePaul and her two children will move into the house in early January.

Sanford airport establishes new business incubator

Orlando Sanford International Airport, which is in the midst of a \$1.6 billion expansion, has estab-

lished a new business incubator at the airport complex.

Diane Crews, vice president of administration at the airport, said the Airport Enterprise Center, located at 2800 Mellonville Ave., has 13,500 square feet of space and already is almost fully leased.

Among the first tenants are Express One International, Inc., an air cargo company; Streetwise, Inc., a custom motorcycle repair facility; Delta Connection Academy, formerly Comair Aviation Academy; W.D. Schock, Inc., aviation land acquisition consultants; and One Source Medical, which manufactures and sells shoe inserts for diabetic patients.

In addition to the incubator program, the airport generates more than \$1.7 billion in area economic activity, according to a Florida Department of Transportation Economic Impact Study prepared by Wilbur Smith Associates, a major U.S. engineering, planning and economics consulting firm.

Larry A. Dale, president and

chief executive officer at the airport, said he isn't surprised at the high number.

"Most people don't realize what a significant impact Orlando Sanford International Airport has, not only in Seminole County but throughout Central Florida," said Dale.

Altogether, commercial and visitor activity facilitated by the airport generates more than 26,000 local jobs with an annual payroll of more than \$974 million, Dale said.

Orlando Sanford International Airport is in the midst of a \$1.6 billion expansion program that will see almost continuous new construction at the airport facility through the year 2020.

"We are expanding Orlando Sanford International Airport in ways that will facilitate more commercial and industrial growth in Seminole County," Dale said, "and we are focusing on permanent, long-term growth."

year-old Bryan Randall, Jr. and 6-year-old Julian Randall, were in the Dodge Durango when their father made a sudden swerve from the right-hand shoulder of I-4 into the oncoming tractor trailer. Julian is in stable condition, but Bryan Jr. died Tuesday.

Police knew within the first couple minutes of the accident that they had found the missing father and children, said Lake Mary Police Chief Richard Beary. An Amber Alert was just being put in a state law enforcement computer for the tan-colored SUV, he added.

What made Randall, a former college basketball star and an Ivy League graduate, turn on his family police may never know as he died shortly after arriving at Orlando Regional Medical Center. Neighbors said "they seemed like lovely people" and "they mowed their lawn and they had a bunch of sweet looking children."

According to Beary, authorities are never really going to know what drove Randall to his actions, but hopefully investigators can piece together the last few days of the man's life to illustrate a more complete picture.

Amongst the tangled metal, police did find a suicide note on a yellow legal pad. In the letter, Randall writes the wife of child support and custody that he could not find a job to seek custody of his children. He stated that he was a stretch of Interstate 4, the A.A. headquarters in Freshport because that's where his wife worked and he suspected she was having an affair with a coworker.

"I'm honestly, it was very well planned and very well thought out," Beary said. "He had who he wanted notified as next of kin and the whole nine yards. It was a very planned event — it was clearly not an accident."

His wife had filed a restraining order against him recently, according to Seminole County records. And, in a police report, she states that her husband was abusive. Maitland Police Chief Gary Clahoun said it was a "domestic situation gone bad."

"I've been in the business for 26 years so I've seen my share of murder-suicides," Beary said. "This one is real tragic because kids are involved and that's a real tough one."

son a day. They also have brought in a water buffalo (500 gal. water trailer) that we can refill our bottles from, but the buffalo sits in the hot sun so the water gets pretty warm. Let me put it this way: you could make a cup of hot tea with the water.

I don't know why water is such a problem, but so is electricity that only works half the time. We have some fans now, but when the electric is off they don't work. It gets 115 inside our living area, the building is metal so it seldom cools down below 100 degrees. It is no oasis, I can tell you that.

I had to go over to the S-2 [Intelligence at battalion level] that handles the New Baghdad area. The intel officer wanted my squad to gather info and try to find the house of a suspected Fedayeen colonel.

We went through the area and stopped at a small shop and asked the locals about any Fedayeen in the neighborhood. One guy told my interpreter there was a high ranking Fedayeen living in the area and gave us a name and even showed us on the map where his house was.

I sent my interpreter walking down the street, he blends in better than a G.I. Anyway we got the house number and found that a family was home in the house and that the suspected Fedayeen colonel that lived there was allegedly in Tikrit. Of course, we were unsure if he really was, but we did get more information than the S-2 expected.

10 Aug. 2003 This is a bad news day. First I got the word that Gary was medevaced to Landstuhl, I guess he is the first family casualty for us, and I hope for the best for him. [Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Carlson's cousin, SFC Gary Stair Jr., also of Sanford, suffered a serious heat-related problem and was sent to the army hospital at Landstuhl, Germany].

The next bad news is that after Secretary Rumsfeld led us to believe that we'd be going home in September, we've been officially extended here until March 2004. We are like several 3rd Division units, we've been reattached to other units, in our case to the 2nd Cavalry. I think they are playing a shell game to make the public think the whole 3rd Division is going home, but that is not totally true. Many are being left behind attached to other units. I wonder if we will ever get out of this place. We were told this was going to be a quick in-and-out operation. That is what everybody and their families prepared for. I just wish they'd told us the truth instead of jerking us around.

There were two more heat-related deaths in here today or yesterday, but not in our unit. The temperature is in the mid-120s. Last night we slept outside on the humvees, too hot in that metal building. I remember a lot of wind and dust in the middle of the night, and I saw Ali Hammadi, my interpreter, get up from his sleep. I thought he was going to tell me there was a sand storm coming up, but the wind lasted a short

time and he went back to sleep.

Ali Hammadi is a hydro-electric engineer, but since the war he's been employed as our interpreter.

According to the what I read, the desert sand to the west of Baghdad has reached 140 degrees and the eastward wind blows the heat into the city. They say it is one of the hottest times they have seen here. The highest temperature I've seen is 130 degrees, I know that is hard to believe but it is the truth. How in the world people survive in this is beyond me.

The keyboard on this computer is messed up. The space bar doesn't work half the time and I have to monkey with it to space my words, but it is faster than snail mail when I can use it.

Another soldier was killed today and two were wounded, not sure what units they were from, but there have been so many killed that I've

to Bosnia or some place else. I think for many soldiers, this one has been the straw-that-broke-the-camel's-back because they are talking about getting out the first chance they get.

I got the History of Fort Meillon books that you sent that Chris [author Christine Kinlaw-Best] signed for the CSM [Command Sergeant Major] and the 1st Sgt. I told them about the Iraqi war exhibit at the Sanford Museum, too, and that Sanford is proud of having the 2nd Cavalry in their history.

big waste with not a whole lot of progress, although we have put some Iraqi police on the street but not nearly as many as is needed.

Things are still messed up. Cultural and religious differences really make things hard to deal with and cause a lot of problems between the U.S. and Iraqis. Some things are getting a little better as for our living conditions, but when you start with nothing any little thing is better.

There is talk about soldiers being able to take R and R in Kuwait or Qatar, it's pretty nice down there and nobody shoots at you. We've been promised stuff before so we'll believe it when it happens. We are really beat and could use some rest. We still work seven days a week, eight if we can squeeze it in.

We've got a couple of new soldiers in, right straight out of basic training too. I know they're shocked by the way we live and probably a little scared too, we just have to take them under our wings and get them used to things.

First Platoon, the Nightstalkers, are now the Direct Support Platoon for the 2/27 of the 2nd Cavalry, we are now under the cav commander's control, at his request because he wanted an MP outfit with his cavalry guys. Actually our mission became smaller since the 2/27's sector covers only two police stations. We still live at the same place at Camp Marlboro, so nothing has changed but our mission area.

I cross the Tigris River almost everyday. It has marshy banks, dirty looking water, but there's fish in it. I don't get to sight-see too much while on patrol because we are always on the lookout for somebody trying to shoot us.

I'll be stone-nuts by the time I get out of this crazy place. I'm seriously thinking about looking for another line of work. We're spread too thin in too many places and these back-to-back deployments are just getting to be too much. When we do get out of here, we're only promised 90 days stateside before going to Afghanistan or back

On the move: Lake Mary departs the soon-to-be renovated city hall

Moving crews converged on Lake Mary City Hall Tuesday morning as city employees made their way to their temporary home at the Lake Mary Police Department.

The move is a result of "major" renovations needed at the current city hall location at 100 N. Country Club Road in Lake Mary. As movers carried furniture, computers, cubicles, and more than 450 boxes to large semi-trucks, construction workers were preparing for the seven-month long job.

The move, which affects the entire 30-member city hall staff, should last through Friday. During this time, city hall will function with a limited staff. The full spectrum of services will resume Monday at the Lake Mary Police Department, located at 165 E.

Crystal Lake Ave. In preparation for the move, city staff filled six off-site storage units with items for safe keeping. These items will be moved back to city hall in stages after the renovation is complete.

During the renovation period, city hall and its parking area will be a construction site and, therefore, off limits to the general public. City officials are asking parents of Lake Mary Elementary School students to refrain from parking in the city hall lot to drop-off and pick-up their children. This could be a danger to them and their children.

Other services, such as the utility bill drop box, located in the city hall parking lot, will be relocated, approximately one block north, to the Frank Evans Center parking lot at 158 N. Country Club Road. Also, those residents who plan to attend upcoming city commission meetings, held the first and third Thursdays

of each month, should be aware the meetings will be held at the Lake Mary Community Center, located at 260 N. Country Club Road.

Once construction is complete, city hall's main entrance

and parking area will be located off Lakeview Avenue, making the facility more user-friendly and safer for drivers and pedestrians. A covered walkway will lead visitors into the building.

As city government moved into the police station, officers and investigators were also rearranging. Unfortunately, it wasn't the best of times for the police department as they were stretched thin with the murder-suicide investigation on Interstate 4.

Lake Mary officers reported about a dozen other wrecks along I-4 and Lake Mary Boulevard as traffic came to a halt on the west side of the city. Officers also had to lock down Lake Mary Elementary

School as a domestic disturbance incident escalated near the school.

"We were pretty well overwhelmed," said Police Chief Richard Beary.

"I'm sitting in the city manager's office right now because it was the only phone I could find that worked," he added. "It's Murphy's Law. The one time when we don't have phones, computers, fax machines and all the resources we're used to having that's when we need it all."

According to Lewis, it is important for the next generation to fully understand the Constitution so they can make educated decisions later in life.
"The Constitution is still trying to protect us from our-

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selfes if we will let it," said Lewis, who has written published material for the Florida Bar's Continuing Legal Education Program. "But, if you don't know what it is, you don't know if someone is infringing on or taking away those rights."

During Lewis' three-hour lecture, he discussed the structure of the Florida court system and exposed students to how judges operate under the rule of law. The students also analyzed an actual case involving juveniles that initiated in Miami-Dade County. The case, which tested the Fourth Amendment, moved through all levels of the judicial system before finally reaching the U.S. Supreme Court.

Before being appointed to the Florida Supreme Court by the late-Gov. Lawton Chiles in December of 1998, Lewis was a civil and appeals court lawyer in Miami. He has also served the Florida Bar as an inventory attorney.

"The students are now able to put a face with the court system," said Ashby, who taught his class about Lewis before his arrival. "To read about it out of a book is one thing. To have the individual here is so much more beneficial, especially someone as high up in the system as he is."

The game was actually close in the first quarter with Lyman leading just 10-6, but the hosts broke the game open with a pair of fourth quarter scores.

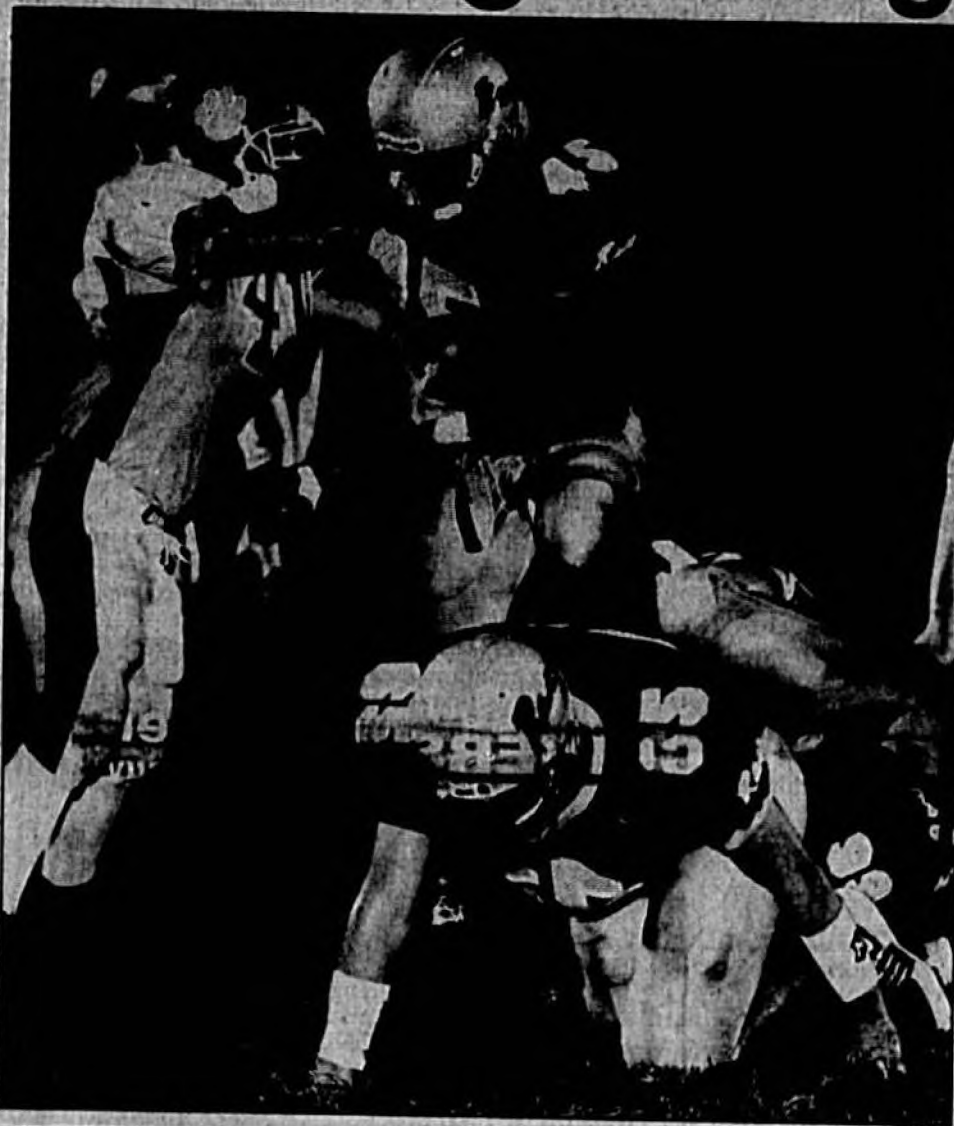

Senior quarterback Ryan Schneider set a school record with 497 yards passing to lead UCF past Florida Atlantic 33-29 Saturday evening at the Florida Citrus Bowl. A crowd of 25,144 witnessed Schneider break or tie six school records in leading the Golden Knights (1-1) to their first win of the season. FAU dropped to 1-2 with the loss.

The I-AA Owls surprised the UCF home crowd when FAU quarterback Jared Allen found Ben Coker from five yards out for a 7-0 lead.

UCF took the lead later in the second quarter on the arm of Schneider as this time the senior signal caller found Luther Huggins on a 16-yard touchdown pass to give the Golden Knights a 14-7 lead.

The Owls scored the equalizer with just 27 seconds remaining in the second quarter when Allen found Anthony Crissinger-Hill on a 40-yard touchdown pass to tie the contest at 14.

UCF regained the lead at the 4:41 mark in the third quarter when Matt Prater connected on a 43-yard field goal. The Golden Knights drove 40 yards in seven plays to take the 17-14 advantage.

The right foot of Prater added to the Golden Knights' lead later in the fourth quarter as the sophomore drilled a 38-yard field goal to push the score to 20-14, UCF.

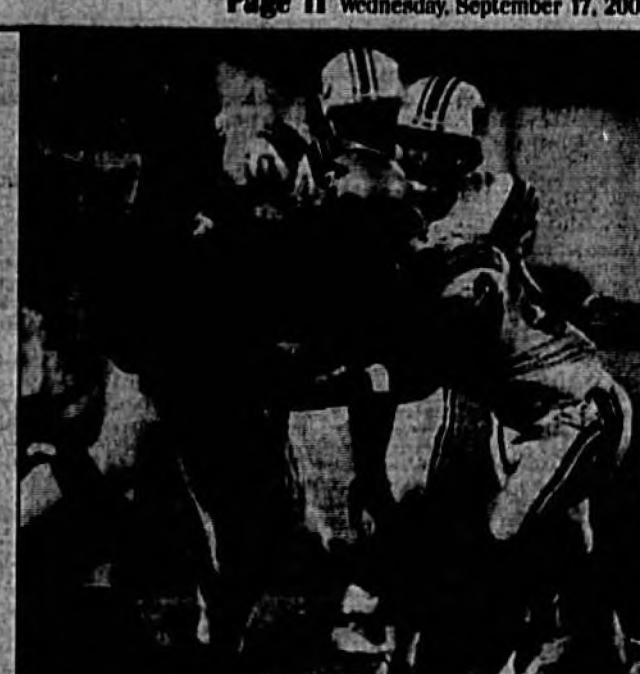
