





Army Officers To Testify

In Meat Purchasing Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Senate panel will take testimony from high-ranking Army officers as it continues to investigate a military purchasing scandal in which Army inspectors say they took bribes and allowed meat packers to ship inferior food to military mess halls. Six Army Health Services Command and Veterinary Corps officers were to testify today before the Senate Gov-

ernment Operations subcommittee. Military meat inspectors testified Monday they were paid bribes and supplied with the services of prostitutes by two New England meat packing firms to keep them

from causing a "hassle" over meat quality requirements in Army contracts. Witnesses also told the Senate panel that the G & G Packing Co. of Boston and Blue Ribbon Frozen Foods of Hamden, Conn., were using ungraded and inferior cuts of beef to fill Army orders for choice steaks and roasts for the military forces. The Army was then billed for higher

priced cuts, witnesses said.

IRS Seeks Two Million

WASHINGTON (AP) - First the bad news: the IRS is looking for a couple of million Americans. Now the good news: the IRS wants to give them some money. The Internal Revenue Service says more than two million Americans might be eligible for a cash windfall from the government, but haven't applied for the money under a special tax credit available to taxpayers who earned less than \$8,000 in 1975.

The IRS had expected up to three million people t qualify for payments of up to \$400 but the service said its figures show that only about one-tenth of that number, or 300,000 individuals, have filed a tax form to receive the

Turner To Be Extradicted?

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) - The 4th District Court of Appeals is considering a request by New York State to extradite promoter Glenn W. Turner as a fugitive from a prison sentence and court fine.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Richard Zaretsky presented oral arguments to the court Tuesday in an effort to overturn a Florida judge's ruling against extradition of the Orlando businessman.

Seminole County Circuit Judge Richard Muldrew ruled in February 1974 that because of a quirk in Florida law Turner could be extradited only if he had escaped from a New York jail or had broken bail, probation or parole. Turner was convicted of criminal contempt in 1974 in New York, sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$65,450 for failing to repay some franchise holders in his Dare To Be Great and Koscot Cormetics sales operations.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) - A psychiatrist says a study shows that television violence affects the mental health of adults the same as it does children and has suggested "prescription TV" for certain personalities. "Dramatized television programs have substantial impact not only upon the young, but also upon adults," Dr. Roderic Gorney of the UCLA Department of Psychiatry told the American Psychiatric Association here Tuesday. "People have always said we should be careful of what our kids watch on TV," he said. "But now, we see that television can affect adult behavior, which in turn carries



The Nation Needs **Energy Program**

Although our national energy policy remains a rather vague set of goals, the government now appears ready to move with vigor into an energy conservation program. The recent announcement by the Energy Research and Development Administration that conservation will henceforth get the "highest priority" seems to confirm that efforts to develop new domestic fuel supplies are not going to do enough to solve our energy problems.

The rate of energy consumption in the United States — particularly the use of oil — should tell us as much. Oil consumption which had been running at 16.7 million barrels a day dropped sharply after the Arab embargo of 1973-74 and the steep increase in price by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries. However, it has now climbed back up and exceeds the 1973 rates. Our oil demand is row at 17.7 million barrels a day, and we are relying more on imports to satisfy that demand than we were in 1973.

With Congress rejecting the administration's plan for a quick phase-out of controls on domestic oil prices, thus holding down the retail price of gasoline and other petroleum products, price is having only a limited effect as an inducement to fuel conservation. While rising utility bills have jarred many Americans into being more mindful of energy consumption in their homes and businesses, ERDA is now convinced that there is much more to be accomplished through conservation programs

Federal Energy Administrator Frank Zarb is warning that another Arab oil embargo is a "real possibility," and would have a more severe effect President Nelson Rockefeller has predicted that our balance of payments deficit will reach the crisis point if we do not hold back the growth in oil imports now running at \$60 billion a year.

While rising utility bills have jarred many Americans into being more mindful of energy use in their homes and businesses, ERDA is n convinced that much more can be accomply through conservation programs on a broad scale.

ERDA figures that Americans could cut their oil consumption by as much as one-half by 1985. The agency conservation plan, yet to be unveiled, apparently will call for both investment and sacrifice to achieve greater efficiency and less waste in the myriad ways that we use energy. The impact could range from architectural features of new buildings to the disappearance of pilot lights in


It has been tempting to hope that new oil and gas discoveries or exotic new energy sources would arrive in time to sustain the energy-consumption habits which are woven deeply into American life. By the end of the 20th Century, according to ER-DA's projections, there likely will be new energy technologies to relieve our dependence on fossil fuels. For the next 25 years, however, that will not be the case, and the nation must now confront the problem of keeping its appetite for energy in balance with a limited means of satisfying it.

Mobile Moguls

Our guess is that the Rolls Royce and Stutz auto companies which are unveiling cars that sell in the \$90,000 to \$100,000 range. have their eye on the Middle East market. The sheiks whose sandy kingdoms float on oil are among the foremost devotees of luxury on wheels. The air-conditioning system in the Rolls, which blows air of one temperature at the face and of another at the feet, is just the thing for a trip across a hot desert.

The irony of this is that the Arab moguls, with their power to embargo and dictate the price of oil, could turn the more humble jalopies in our garages into luxuries we cannot afford to drive. When the earth yields up its last drop of petroleum the price of gasoline will probably be so high that only a \$90,000 Rolls would be worthy of burning it. So it all works out.

More Tremors Shake Northeastern Italy

UDINE, Italy (AP) - New earth tremors shook quakeravaged northeastern Italy before and after midnight, frightening survivors of last week's disaster, injuring several people and bringing down more small buildings. Earlier in the evening a severe quake centered in the Ionian sea jolted Zakinthos and other Greek islands and parts of southern Italy. Thousands on Zakinthos spent the night in the open, but no casualties or damage was

Nine more tremors were recorded in the Friuli region of northeast Italy that was devastated by the killer quake last Thursday. A woman was injured in Braulinz di Trasaghis when a house fell, and injuries were reported to several other persons. Many one-story and two-story buildings weakened by the big quake and more than 50 aftershocks collapsed in Maiano, Venzone, Osoppo, Moggio Udinese and Peonis di Trasaghis.
