





# Worshipper Shot 'In Midway Church

Church, the house where people assemble to worship the "Prince of Peace," was the scene of violence Sunday when a Midway woman was wounded by mistake after she got in the way of a bullet meant for someone else. Mamie William, 51, was struck in the thigh by a .22 caliber slug as she sat in the Glory Mission Church pew waiting for the start of regular Sunday services.

# Vihlen Outlines Road Plans To Ease Traffic Congestion

An expansive proposal to alleviate the traffic congestion of Central Florida, including Seminole County, is under study by state, regional and county planning engineers, Seminole County was definitely included today when it was pointed out the northern loop and the western loop of the metro Orland belt line are the most important. The northern toop would cross Seminole County, between and parallel

to State Road 436 and State Road 434. (See accompanying photo of SR 436-U. S. 17-92 intersection.)

This was revealed by Sidney Vihlen Jr., Seminole County Commission member of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council and the Orange - Seminole - Osceola Tri - County


would shunt Walt Disney World traffic off Interstate 4 and U. S. 441 while the northern loop would prove a boon in traffic alleviation for State Road 436. He added the western loop would commence with an interchange at Maitland, with a spur running westerly for a distance to join the main loop. This would be the early stage of construction, prior to more of the western loop and all of the northern loop,

Vihlen revealed that a traffic and revenue study for the tell expressway is being conducted for Orange County by Campbell, Foxworth and Pugh, planning consultants of Orlando, The study is to determine the financial feasibility of the western loop. Further, Vihlen said, the engineers

Department of Transportation and the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council pinpoint the western and northern loops as "the most important." Ultimately, the metro Orlando belt line would encircle Orlando.

Presently, Vihlen stated, Orange County is negotiating a contract with VTN, Inc., Orlando planning consultant firm, for the next study phase . . . right-of-way alignment, right-of-way costs, costs of construction, including







In talks with some of the Washington correspondents who are covering the many campaign trips into Florida by the Democratic presidential hopefuls seeking a March 14th Florida primary pat-on-the-back, it was obvious that concealment of facts and lack of communication is, indeed the fate of reporters in the

Not so here, it was most heartening to hear some of the visiting journalists who know of Florida's "government-in-sumshine" law refer with envy to it and to those reporters who can enjoy this essential condition which lets the public know what it government is doing, how it is doing and why it is

### Industry Weapon

In calculating the "balance of terror" between East and West in this nuclear age we are accustomed to measuring the preponderance of power in terms of missiles and mega-

It is behind the ramparts, however, where the real balance of power is determined - in the technology and industrial capacity that creates modern armies and weapons and stands behind the threat of their use.

We can see evidence that both the Soviet Union and Communist China are haunted by the imbalance between their own productive capacities and those of the major industrial nations of the Free World. We see both reaching outward to redress the balance,

The Soviet Union trails the United States of America in almost every field of industrial production -- especially in the so-called "high technology" fields, such as computers and mass-produced motor vehicles.

The Chinese Communists are more desperate than the Russians. When the Communists took power in Mainland China in 1949 they pinned their hopes for industrialization on the help they would receive from the more at vanced Soviet Union. Soviet tools and technicians poured into China - only to be withdrawn abruptly with the ideological break between Mao Tse-tung and the Kremlin.

Meanwhile the Communist experiments with cooperative and communal farms also failed to develop the agricultural surplus which would have given the Chinese farm products to export - the only possibility for earning foreign credits to buy tools and technology for heavy industry and mass production.

Where can China turn? Western European businessmen would jeopardize their budding relationship with the Russians if they tried to play both sides of the Communist street, Peking sees that the only route for building bridges for the help she needs lies toward Japan and the United States. This may be the rationale behind Peking's sudden decision to try to patch up tot enmittees with Japan and to roll out the red carpet for President Nixon in
