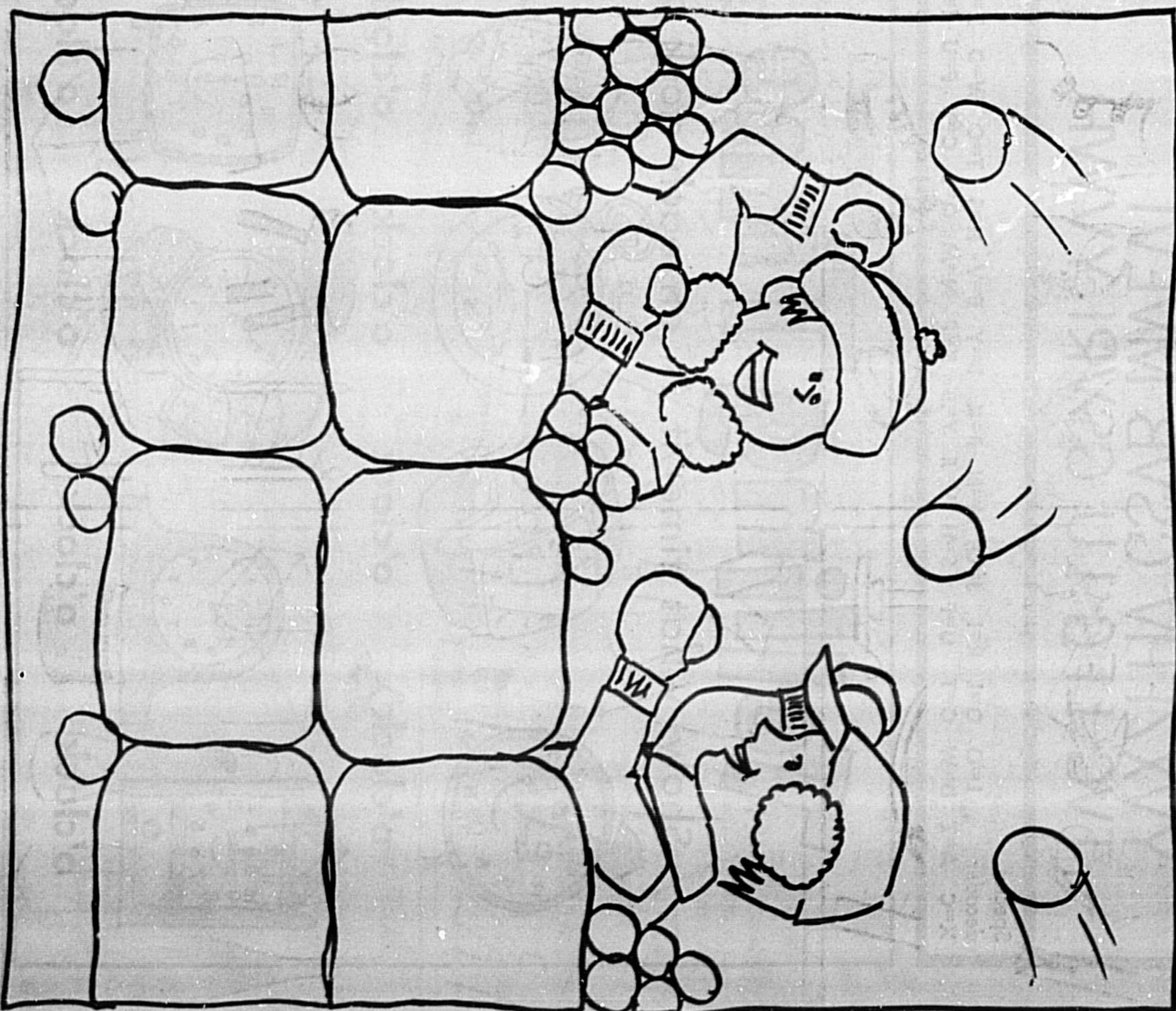

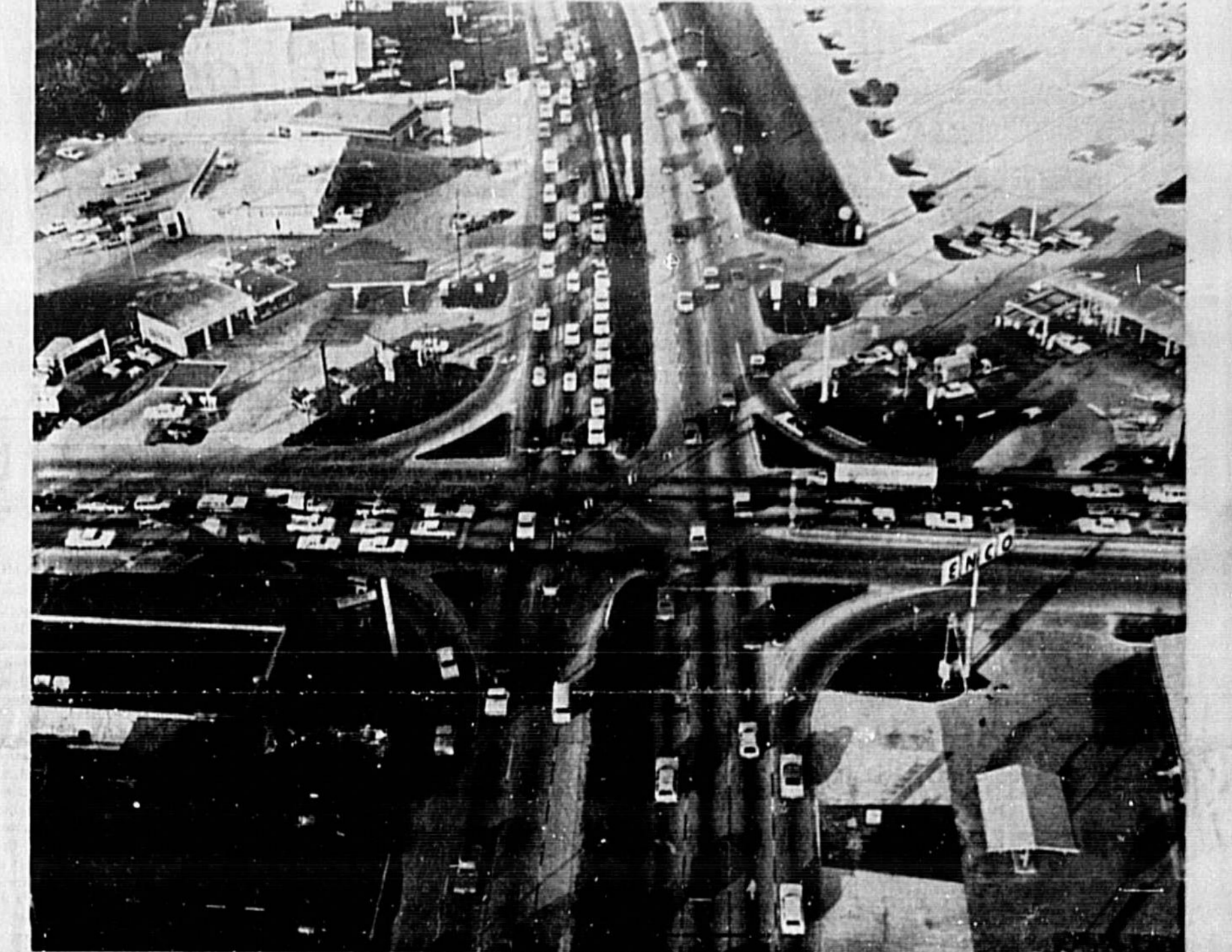

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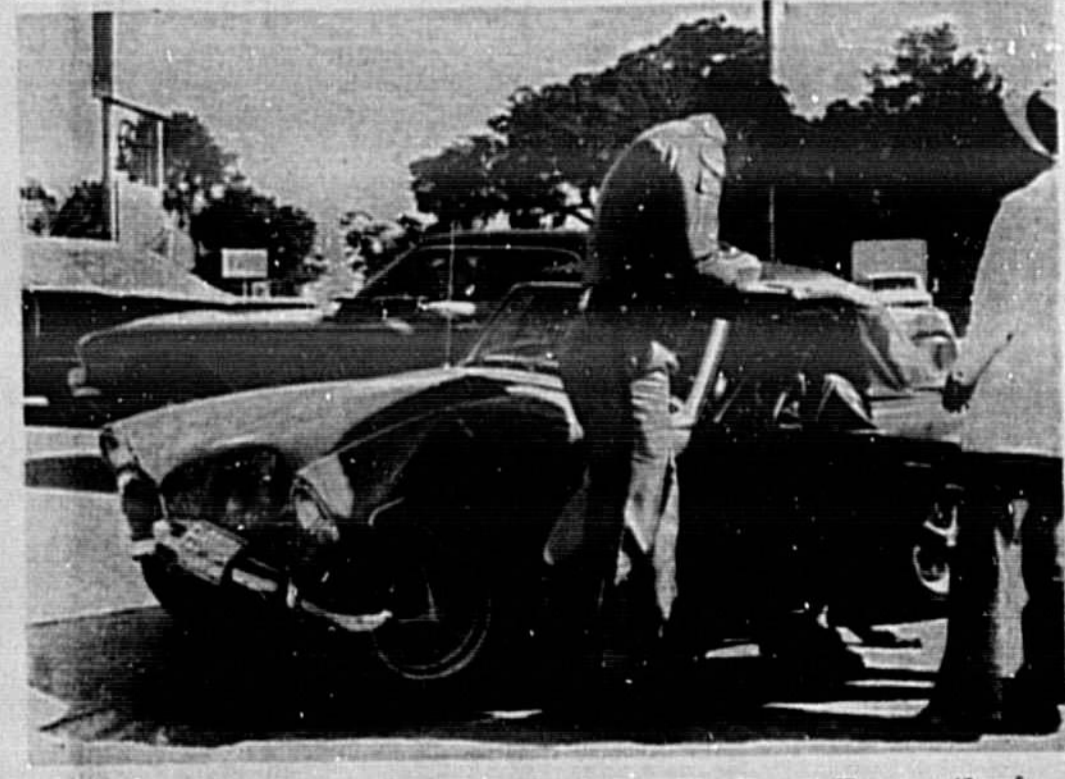

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Housing Policies Violated - Charge Paper Airs Building Scheme

MIAMI (AP)—Miami officials of the Federal Housing Administration violated U.S. housing policies by awarding one third of all federal contracts to a single builder and his associates in 1971, the Miami Herald has reported.

The lucrative contracts were assigned to a syndicate of corporations headed by John J. Priests, the newspaper said. By conservative estimates, Priests and his friends reaped more than a million dollars in windfall profits through a tax-subsidizing program designed to shelter low- and moderate-income families, it said. Public documents obtained by the newspaper only after two months of effort reveal that suspended FHA Director William Peski approved an estimated 613 contracts for the Priests syndicate between January and November.

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Smothering The Free Press Is Dangerous

If there is one accomplishment that no presidential administration should take pride in, it is one which the Nixon regime seems bound to achieve. This is, most regretfully, the smothering of the free press.

The latest witness to this comes from a report of the Washington News Committee of the Associated Press Managing Editors Association.

"President Nixon" states the study, "has come close to killing off the presidential press conference as a public institution during his term of office."

Now, managing editors are a hard-headed, usually crusty and suspicious bunch of reporters who have to watch their jobs after pounding pavements, hunting and getting news scoops, studying carefully the overall profession of journalism and then accepting M.E. chair which usually includes a hair shirt.

Thus this was no mere casual or off-handed report. Indeed it is of such moment that it should be read and memorized by every American who wants to have his government honest and sincere enough to stand the test of unglamorized, unstaged and penetrating question-and-answer affairs.

These news executives are hot after the "facts — just the facts." Was this anti-news conference attitude of Nixon, which is not at all of any recent origin of the thin-skinned politician, supported by statistics?

Indeed it was. For the President held nine news conferences in 1971, while the recent average for such affairs is 24.38 annually. "As of Jan. 31st" the report pointed out "the most recent presidential press conference was on Nov. 12th."

Since then momentous international and national events have taken place. There was the India-Pakistan war, presidential preambles, meetings, the Anderson papers was delivered. Nixon took over prime TV time to reveal the hitherto secret meetings with the North Vietnamese in which his top foreign af-

fairs advisor Dr. Henry Kissinger played a star role. Surely almost every one of these developments were of such importance that the absence of an unstaged presidential press conference creates a suspicion that no such means of letting the public know what is, in truth, taking place and the meaning of the event was wanted or intended or would be allowed.

If Richard Milhous Nixon had not left such a trail of anti-free press attitudes behind, dating to his congressional race in California, his troubles when seeking the vice-presidential nomination with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as top of the ticket, his ill-starred '60 presidential campaign, the facade which he lost in a bid for California's gubernatorial office and, finally, his unleashing of Vice President Spiro T. Agnew as journalism hatchet-man the indictment of the AP managing editors would be serious.

Now, however, as it comes when President Nixon is setting out to win a second-term, the result could be made positive. For Mr. Nixon (not all his advisors) is an experienced politician whose logical, legal-trained mind could well detect in this sober report, something which needs to be corrected and corrected fast.

We surely hope that it will be. In talks with some of the Washington correspondents who are covering the many campaign trips into Florida by the Democratic presidential hopefuls seeking a victory in the March 14th Florida primary pat-on-the-back, it was obvious that concealment of facts and lack of communication is, indeed the fate of reporters in the Capital.

Not so here. It was most heartening to hear some of the visiting journalists who know of Florida's "government-in-sunshine" law refer with envy to a situation which lets the public know what the government is doing, how it is doing and why it is so doing.

Since the actual figures may still be formally published by Gallup, I am not privileged to disclose them. They reflect recent queries put just to Democratic voters, and they are indeed crushing.

Interestingly, too, the regional breakdown shows McGovern doing roughly 10 points better in the Middle West than he does nationally.

These findings take on significance in the light of arguments being advanced by McGovern and some independent observers — that his recent showing in Iowa's Democratic precinct caucuses was seven points better than his national poll status.
